THE DANGER PERIOD.

With two public holidays com May 24 and June 3, the Crown Land partment issues a most timely wanng with regard to forest fires.

ne or two fires have been reported. for the next few weeks the danger rill be very great, and all reasonable people who have occasion to go to the woods on pleasure or on business must to so with a full sense of their responsibility to avoid causing fire.

More than seventy-five per cent. of forest fires, the department reminds he public, are preventable, and ninety per cent. are attributed to the careness of those who go to the woods for purposes of recreation. Automibile travel and camping have increased the fire hazard. One of the most imrtant points to be remembered is that it is necessary to choose with care the place in which a fire is to be built along the stream or in the woods for cooking purposes, and that it is that such fires are extinguished beyond

The public is reminded, too, that motoring parties, who throw burning matches, cigarettes, or cigars from a car are very likely to cause destructive fires, although they might carelessly assume that the practice is harmless. It is anything but that.

In asking everybody to do his part as a good citizen in the matter of saving the forests the Crown Land Department makes a request which is both necessary and reasonable, and which should have an earnest response, because that carelessness which dependence that the practice is industry, Canada will make a long and wise step towards independence in the matter of fuel.

## NATIONAL POLICIES.

If Canada should decide not to prevent the export of pulpwood from private lands the decision would not be founded on the fear that the United States would cut off shipments of American coal, although a contrary view is held by many Americans and is now directly asserted by the New York Commercial. That journal predicts that there will be no interference with the supply of either pulp or pulpwood from this country, because of the fear of retaliation. It goes on to say that "Canada has coal supplies, such as they are, but mainly she is dependent upon the States for all the good coal she burns. Her own coal is so charged with sulphur that it neither ships nor keeps well."

The Commercial is wrongly informed both as to Canadian sentiment and as to the quality of Canadian coal, but its liscussion of the matter serves one good purpose in reminding Canadians how much the national interest may be dvanced by making a much greater use of the coal of which Canada has io abundant a supply and much of which is of a high quality. ## **SUPERANNUATION BILL BEFORE HOUSE**

Will Cost \$1,435,000 a Year -Measure Given First Reading.

Ottawa, May 21-First reading of a bill providing for the superannuation of civil servants, was given in the House of Commons today. The resolution on which the bill is based states that it is "a measure to provide for the superannuation of civil servants; to provide for contributions by civil servants to the consolidated revenue fund to civil servants and to the widows and children of deceased civil servants of superannaution allowances or gratuities."

Right Hon. Arthur Meighen, asked what would be the annual cost to the country or the average cost for the first five years and the anticipated cost for the second five.

Hon. J. A. Robb, acting Minister of Finance, explained that the cost to new entrants would be 5 per cent of the payroll. The civil servants would pay 5 per cent, so it was impossible to determine exactly what the cost would be without knowing how many civil servants would transfer. He estimated that if all transferred, the cost to the Government will be about \$1,435,000 a year.

Mr. Meighen—"That \$1,435,000 must be 5 per cent of the present civil service salary total?"







Instead of seeing a frail and helpless woman propped up in bed by pillows, as he expected, he was amazed to see a bright old lady, who gets around quite comfortably herself and who showed the reporter two more quilts of the "T" pattern she is making entirely by herself for the Pythian Sisters. One pattern is orange and the other green. "Two good Irish colors," she commented, as she spread them out. "I was born in County Derry, north of Ireland, on May 22, 1834, being the eleventh child—and final one—of a family. My father's name was John Marrs—not Marr—and my mother's name was Daniels. All were strict Presbyterians, one of my father's brothers being a kirk minister. I suppose I was the only turncoat in the family as today I am a Methodist. 
Brother Comes Here.

The prices of sardines and herring was cut from \$12 to \$6 a hogshead by the packers on Tuesday, according to a statement given out yesterday by J. F. Calder, Dominion Fisheries Inspector of Campobello, who is at present in the

When asked for a possible reason for the 50 per cent. cut Mr. Calder attributed it partly to the fact that the fish were very plentiful and the catches exceptionally large for the season and to a combination of other reasons.

Record catches were being made, Mr. Calder said, especially at and near St. Andrews, where some of the weirmen had made as much as \$5,000 already. This amount, he said, was a record at this early stage in the fishing season. The ponds were fished out, he said, and all the catches were now being made by the weirmen. Campobello and Grand Manan fishermen were receiving their share of the fruits of the ocean, but the catches were not as large as those made at St. Andrews.
