12th. Appointed Elder David James, Messenger to Sister Associations in the State of Maine; and Elder Joseph Crandall to Nova Scotia—in case of failure, Elder Francis Pickle: and that Seventy Shillings be given to the latter to defray expences.

13th. Voted that our next Association be in the Baptist Meeting House, St. John, on the third Monday after the 20th June, 1828.

14th. That Elder Richard Scott preach the introductory Sermon; that Elder John Masters write the Circular, and Elder David Harris the Corresponding Letter.

16th. In answer to the questions submitted by the Church of Salisbury—It is recommended that Churches destitute of Pastoral aid, endeavour to obtain help from some of their Ministering Brehren in cases of discipline; and that this Association consider the

dissolution of a Church, to avoid discipline, very dishonouring to the Laws of the head of the Church, and would be introducing a very dangerous error: hence they recommend a strict and prayerful adherence to the Word of God, which in every case and in every situation, is a perfect rule for the government and well ordering of the House of God: and they would further recommend, that in all the duties to be attended to, a gospel temper and childlike disposition be possessed, without which the grand enemy of Souls is likely to succeed in his endeavours to cause discord and division.

17th. That the liberality of the Mite Societies of St. John, Nortan, 2d Hampton, and Waterbury, be acknowledged, and the thanks of this Body be offered for their continued exertions and labours of

love.

18th. That Fasting and Prayer be still recommended to be attended to on the first day of the year, as also the Monthly Missionary Prayer Meeting.

19th. That Henry Blakslee superintend the Printing of the

Minutes, and that 1000 copies be printed.

20th. That the Association acknowledge the very uncommon at-

tention of the brethren and friends of Kingsclear.

The business of the Association being finished, the Members took their leave for their respective homes, with the pleasing sensation of having had an agreeable and profitable Session.

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CIRCULAR LETTER

THE MESSENGERS of the NEW-BRUNSWICK BAPTIST CHURCHES, convened in Association, at King's Clear, July 1827, to the respective Churches they represent, send Christian Sclutation.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN IN THE LORD-

In the present Circular we are disposed to call your attention to the propriety and importance of making active and unremitted exertions for the spiritual welfare of your fellow men. We are fully sensible that it is God alone who can effect the renovation and salvation of a soul. It is however equally certain that he is accustomed in the economy of Grace as well as in Providence to work by He usually employs the zealous efforts of his people for the accomplishment of his gracious purposes. Our Lord called his disciples the salt of the earth; and the light of the world: and hence enforced upon them to be careful to retain the savour of grace, that they might diffuse it abroad, and to let their light shine before men, that others might be enlightened thereby.

WHEN believers possess a due sense of the greatness of that mercy which God has exercised towards them, in delivering them from that eternal destruction which they justly deserved, and making them the partakers of the infinitely rich blessings of the Gospel of Christ, they cannot fail to perceive the propriety of striving to glorify him by employing the more earnest efforts for the promotion

of his cause in the salvation of souls.

A LIVELY apprehension of the lamentable state of the unconverted, and the misery to which they are exposed, is calculated to excite commiseration in the hearts of the pious, and to induce them to use all the means in their power for the salvation of such as are ready to perish. A proper consideration of what Jesus has done and suffered for the salvation of guilty and polluted sinners, tends to influence and enable his people to disregard and surmount all the trials and obstacles which may present themselves in the way of their earnest endeavours to promote the future happiness of their fellow men. Nor ought the example of such of God's chosen as

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have relinquished all prospects of worldly enjoyment, and borne the greatest privations, and endured persecution and death, for the furtherance of this good cause, to be overlooked by any who bear the christian name.

Dear Brethren, you hope, and we also trust that the Lord has plucked you as brands from the burning, and has bestowed upon you the inestimable treasures of his grace. Many of your fellow immortals are perishing in their sins. It is your duty and your interest, to endeavour to be instrumental in bringing them to the knowledge of the glorious Redeemer. You will doubtless be ready to reply, we are indeed under the strongest obligations possible to love God supremely, and to devote curselves and all that we have to the honour of his name, and the promotion of his kingdom among the sons of men. By what means may we hope most effectually to subserve this best of causes—the cause of God and truth?

Such are the diversities of the situations and circumstances of believers, that it is difficult to give any particular directions applicable to all cases. Each one should study to ascertain the best means of usefulness according to the situation in which he is placed,

and diligently pursue them.

WE would however suggest a few thoughts relative to the most important and necessary measures to be pursued for the advance-

ment of the Redeemer's kingdom-

1. Encourage the Preaching of the Gospel among yourselves .-We are informed by the inspired penman, that, it pleased God by the fooishness of preaching to save them that believe, that faith cometh by hearing, and that Ministers are given for the perfecting of the Observation evinces that the plain, faithful, and scriptural preaching of the word is made the principal means, under the influence of the Holy Spirit, for the conversion of sinners, and the sanctification of believers. Consequently, they who would promote the interests of religion in their own place, should endeavour to support the preaching of the Gospel. Have you a Pastor? strive to encourage his heart and strengthen his hands in his important work, and be careful to make such provision for his temporal support as may free his mind from worldly cares. If you have no Pastor, pray earnestly that God may give you one after his own heart; and use active exertions to obtain a suitable one by making provision for his support, and looking out and inviting him to labor

You know also that vast multitudes of heathen are sitting in the region and shadow of death, require the light of the glorious Gospel to be diffused among them. God is crowning Missionary exertions, both at home and abroad with abundant success-certainly then it behoves his people to be active in sending the Gospel to the destitute. If you have a Missionary Society established, afford it your aid, if not, form one without delay. Should you be unable to afford much assistance, be sure that you do all in your power. We are dependant on God for our worldly substance, and we have no reason to suppose that contributing a portion of it, for the promotion of his glory, and the good of men, will impoverish us, nor that withholding it will enrich us. See Prov. 3, 10, 11, and Chap. 11, 3, 4.

III. Assist Bible Societies. The dissemination of the Scriptures, which are able to make men wise unto salvation, is calculated to produce the most glorious effects; and has been signally owned and blessed of God, to the advancement of his cause. In connection with these we may recommend Tr. t Societies, and Sunday Schools. Each of these institutions has its peculiar advantages, and all mutually unite their influence to promote the general good. valuable and worthy of our assistance: but if it be not consistent for persons to take an active part in aiding all, they can have their choice to which of them their influence shall be given. Let every one however, assist some of them, as means and opportunities admit.

IV. Fill your places in the House of God. ought to be decidedly for God. Church Members absent themselves without unavoidable necessity, they wrong their sculs, injure the Church, dishearten their Pastor, and dishonour God. Paul says, I beseech you, therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your reasonable service. who possess gifts for exhortation or prayer, improve the talents bestowed upon them.

Consequently if we desire to be instrumental in promoting the interests of religion, it behoves us to endeavour to maintain a sacred nearness to God, to observe his statutes, to walk uprightly in the various relations of life, to train up our children, and those committed to our charge, in the nurture and admonition of the Lord; to arouse and admonish our fellow creatures, and by a suitable example to evince to them, the reality, excellence, and yalue of the religion of Christ.

BRETHREN, may the Lord impress upon all our minds a lively sense of our obligations to him; may he inspire us with an ardent desire for the prosperity of Zion; may he influence and enable us to pursue that course, which will tend to the promotion of his glory, and the eternal welfare of our fellow men, for Christ's sake: AMEN.
