NOTICES.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE will meet on the second Tuesday of February, May, August and November at 4 o'clock in the Synod office, University street.

ANNUAL SERMONS are appointed to be preached and collections taken up as follows:

In January, on the first Sunday after the Epiphany, for *Foreign Missions*.

In February, for the *Mission Fund of this Diocese*, by Envelopes which are distributed in the churches on the first Sunday in the month, and handed in with the Offertory collection on the second Sunday in the month.

In March, for the *Widows and Orphans Fund*.

In May, for *Theological Training*, in aid of the Theological College at Montreal, or Bishop's College, at Lennoxville.

In September, for the *Mission Fund*.

In November, for the *Superannuation Fund*.

An assessment is made towards the *Mission Fund of Algoma*.

An assessment is made towards *Expenses of Synod*. (See page 787, Journal XVII.).

All Parochial Missionary collections should be made in each Parish or Mission, and forwarded to the Secretary with lists, by the 31st December, on which day the Synod Accounts for the year are closed. Sums received after this date cannot be printed in the Treasurer's report of the previous year.

It is not safe to send money through the post offices, except in the form of post office order, made payable at St. Catherine's street centre, or by cheque or bank draft made payable to order.

The Secretary of the Executive Committee desires to call special attention to the fact that he acknowledges the receipt of all sums sent to him on the days on which they come to hand. If at any time such acknowledgment be not received in due course, the person who made the remittance is requested to notify him without delay, in order that enquiry may be made.

FORTIETH ANNUAL SESSION
OF THE
SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY, 17th JANUARY, 1899.

The Fortieth Annual Session of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal was held on Tuesday, the seventeenth day of January, in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine.

There was a celebration of the Holy Communion in the Cathedral at half past ten o'clock, the Lord Bishop being assisted by the Rector, Archdeacon Naylor, Rural Deans Longhurst and Smith, and Rev. H. Plaisted.

The Synod assembled in the Synod Hall, at two o'clock, when the Session was opened with prayer by the Bishop.

The rolls were called by Rev. Canon Empson and Major E. L. Bond.

The Bishop delivered his charge to the Synod. At its close the Synod sang the Doxology.

BISHOP'S CHARGE.

"In the Primitive Church there was a warm and reverential greeting between pastor and people with which we are all familiar, and which rises in my thoughts at this moment. As the pastor entered the church, we are told, he said, 'Lift up your hearts,' and the people answered, 'We lift them up to the Lord.' Brethren, lift up your hearts at this time with me, and help me to thank God reverently and gratefully, for the added mercies of another year granted me at the close of a long life. Since we last met I have been given health and strength to perform my regular duties, to make my usual journeys, and to take my part (at least by my presence) on those public occasions when, as a citizen of Montreal, and your Bishop, it seemed desirable that I should show sympathy and respect. I have indeed also much to be thankful for (my age being considered) in the kindness and helpfulness which have met me on every hand, as well from the laity as the clergy; everything has been done to promote the work I have at heart, and to spare me unnecessary fatigue and anxiety. Valuable assistance (which should be specially

acknowledged) has been rendered by the archdeacons and rural deans, who have visited the churches within their respective spheres of duty, and duly reported to me all that concerns the well-being and prosperity of the diocese.

"After a long waiting (praying always for Divine guidance), we have been able to appoint a successor to our late much valued friend, the Rev. Canon Henderson, Doctor of Divinity, Trinity College, Dublin, and it is with pleasure and assured hope that I now introduce to the Synod the Rev. Henry Monck Mason Hackett, M.A., B.D., who takes his place as Principal of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College. I feel that Principal Hackett will not long be a stranger amongst us, and I believe that the important work he has come to carry on will be blessed to his own soul, as well as to the souls of the young men towards whom he will stand as pastor, father and friend. I find by communication with our new Principal that he is well satisfied with the prospect before him. He acknowledges with great feeling the warmth of his reception by the immediate friends of the college. He finds the college buildings in beauty and convenience even to exceed his somewhat high anticipations. He hopes, moreover, that the number of students will shortly increase, as there are but twenty now on the roll, and the college is able to provide for double that number. We are ready to welcome all young men desiring to serve God in the Church, and to help them to the utmost of our power, provided they show, by their present life and conversation, that they are suitable persons to serve in that Holy ministry. We are under great obligations to the committee who visited the Old Country last summer, and who so well and ably conducted their successful search for our Principal. We recognize in him the answer to many anxious heartfelt prayers, with much patient enquiry, and we know that the God Who heareth and answereth prayer will not hide His countenance from him, or us, in the responsible work which lies before us. At this moment we sustain a heavy loss in the absence of the Rev. F. J. Steen, M.A., who has been advised by his physicians to abstain from mental work for a season, and seek to establish his health by travel abroad. We hope to receive him back, in due time, in recovered health. His residence here endeared him not only to the students, but to many others in the Church at large.

THE MISSION BOARD.

"I desire to call your special and patient attention to those proceedings of the Provincial Synod, of September, 1898, which touch

the erection and organization of a Board of Domestic and Foreign missions, to be under the direction and control of the General Synod. It had been proposed, as most of you will remember, to amalgamate the several Provincial Boards, and form one central board, for the management of the mission work of the Church of England in Canada; and, this done, to merge the present organization in the new Board.

"It was my own opinion (confirmed by your action at the meeting of this synod a year ago) that the organization of the proposed Board of General Synod had not yet reached the stage which would make it right to abandon our present duties and responsibilities to those working on our behalf in the mission field, and pass them on to the Board of the General Synod. I quite admit that such a well organized central Board is most desirable, but such a Board cannot be put in working order in one or two meetings of the General Synod, held at long intervals, and representative of so large and important and diversified a portion of the Church as the Dominion of Canada.

"The Upper House, at the meeting of the Provincial Synod, in September last, sent two messages to the Lower House, emphatically asserting their desire for amalgamation, but subject to certain stated amendments. These messages will be found in the Journal of the Provincial Synod. No action concerning these messages can bear fruit before the next meeting of the General Synod, and as the matter is important, affecting the future of the Church as a missionary body, I ask you to spare no pains to inform yourselves as to the facts, and details of the subject, that at the next meeting of the General Synod your delegates will know how, rightly, to represent your opinions and decisions. I pray you let your debate be reasonable and dispassionate, as becomes Christian men, and business men. The subject of finance is one the citizens of Montreal fully understand, and to you as business men I have no instructions to give. Personally, I am in full accord with the main object of the General Synod in this matter, but I deprecate hasty action, especially as there is no need for haste, seeing that existing institutions meet all the need, but, more even than hasty action, I deprecate experiment. One organization and one office for the whole work is a grand conception, but the building thereof will take thought and time, and time must be allowed. We must not, however, loose our hold on our own institutions until we are assured that the cause of missions will gain by the change.

"I pray you take a wide view, and a clear view, of the question. The object before us is the spread of the Gospel of Christ, the means

to be used are men and money, men rightly placed, money rightly guarded.

"Never, perhaps, in the history of the Church of Canada has it been more necessary than at the present time to emphasize the value of missionary effort both at home and abroad. God forbid that I should even seem to put a stumbling-block in the way of the action of the General Synod. Far from that, in taking the stand we do, I, and those who think with me, feel that we cannot be too careful in the establishment of a work, the end of which none of us can see, and the perfection of which we all most earnestly desire, and would prayerfully and patiently bear in mind.

A RETROSPECT.

"In this connection it seems fitting that I should allow myself a few remarks on the subject of the stirring events which have occupied the minds of civilized men, especially English-speaking men, in the course of the year just now past. I will speak briefly, and with desire to make what I say of use to the Church in this diocese. It is not necessary that I should rehearse the events themselves; that is being done in every newspaper and magazine published in this month of January, 1899. But I ask. What are these things to us? What bearing have they on that Christmas anthem, "Glory to God in the highest, on earth, peace, good-will toward men?" On earth 'peace.' Yes, that should be the heart's desire of Christian men. As Christians, it is our heritage and right; for what does the Apostle say: "The wisdom that is from above is first pure, then peaceable." How well the sacred words accord, 'Glory to God in the highest,' 'The wisdom that is from above.' All we do that is right, good, and true, comes from the indwelling of the Holy Spirit. If what we do comes not from the inspiration of that same spirit, let us doubt our very best thoughts. 'First pure.' I would dwell a moment here. It is not always easy in individual cases to be sure of purity of motive; but, in national affairs, the difficulty is not quite so great, and I think we shall be in general agreement when I say that in undertaking the late war (whatever may have been some misreckoning of details), there was undoubted purity of motive on the part of our nearest neighbors. That being the case, we may hope for the future development of the fruits of peace and righteousness. They had, and have our sympathy, because they allowed 'patience to have her perfect work' until it did not seem right longer to wait. But the beginning of strife is like the letting out of water; no one can tell just how it will go, or where it will end; and, therefore, let us not in our own lives, in our home circles, in our parishes,

be in haste to remedy faults and mistakes before the time. 'The Lord is King, be the people never so impatient. He sitteth between the cherubims be the earth never so unquiet.' Let belief in this supreme rule give us patience to wait, at least until we can be sure of our own purity of motive and of our right to interfere in concerns in which from force of circumstances we may for the time find ourselves involved. We, of the British nation, so far as Europe and North America are concerned, have been in enjoyment of a long peace. I can speak out of my experience and remind you of the growth and prosperity of the Dominion, of its growth from a few hamlets and small cities, bordering the rivers in the East, to the stretch of provinces across the continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific, from the Arctic to the boundary of the United States, the territory of a people speaking our language, observing kindred laws, possessing the same traditions, history, religion, as ourselves. I will not call them cousins, it is a misnomer; they are our brothers, children of the same national parent. We may differ (as brothers differ) in disposition, aims and taste, but the kinship is there, apparent to all strangers, if not to ourselves. Can you look round the world and find any continent so exceptionally blessed as this? We have climates second to none, healthful and invigorating, open to the pursuits of peace, and the peaceful pursuit of exploration and travel, places to tempt the settler to make a home for himself and a heritage for his children, and places to allure those restless spirits to whom the hardships of mining seem a second nature. All honour to them; they are the pioneers of civilization, and while indulging the bent of their own inclinations, they open up the lone corners of the earth to the lasting benefit of knowledge and progress. And where is the Church in all this moving and seething human unrest? Thanks be to God for the greatest of His mercies, the Church of Christ is not behind in aim and intention. The Church is not an impersonal existence; the Church is an aggregation of faithful men entrusted with the great message of 'good-will toward men.' The 'good-will' of God concerning the world. No light responsibility; a responsibility which we dare not slight. We are gathered here to-day to consider carefully and carry forward faithfully, the knowledge of this Gospel, this good news. There must be enthusiasm, but not mere impulse, earnestness, but not obstinacy; right rather than might, leaving to a wise and an overruling God in Whom we place our faith, the final disposition of events.

PROHIBITION REFERENCES.

"It may be expected that I shall say something on the subject of prohibition. I do not pretend to put forth anything original, but

simply to state the ground on which I have taken my stand against the liquor traffic. I ought, perhaps, first to remind myself, and you that many good men are averse to prohibition, while advocating a temperance as severe as that of the prohibitionists. The arguments with which they support their views, so far as I understand, are chiefly these: While deploring the present evil of drunkenness, they say that we must acknowledge that the evil is already on the decrease, that even amongst the mass of the people it is not so common as it was a hundred, or even fifty, years ago. Half a century ago insobriety was counted a manly attainment amongst gentlemen; and the smuggler, and the worker of an illicit still, were regarded as heroes defying tyranny on behalf of the poor. Men and women too, drank to excess, and were not ashamed. Those averse to prohibition fear now that over-restraint will cause reaction, and the law itself be found creating a generation of law-breakers. The improvement within the latter half of this century these persons attribute chiefly to education. Education instructs the intellect, and strengthens the brain. They say that the artisan class, the professional class, the governing class of the present day, have need of steady hands and eyes, clear minds and healthy bodies to bear the strain of new inventions, if they are to succeed in any lucrative calling. Our factories are full of complicated machinery, our business is dependent on telegraphs, mails and telephones, and blundering workmen and officials stand little chance of rising to any important trust in an industrial community, not to speak of the fact that common mistakes and errors of judgment may lead to serious loss of life, as well as property. An instinct of self-preservation keeps some men sober, and there are good thoughtful persons who believe that this initiatory effort of nature will, by exercise, lead to good habits, and good habits to right abstract principles. Life, they argue, is a great deal more interesting than it was a hundred years ago, and more hopeful. Books as well as men have their part in the making of good society, travel is easy and cheap, and the experience is enlarged, the mind is active, and the human being rightly awakened and amused without the excitement of strong drink. In a word, the whole body is happy and healthy, and easily and unconsciously responsive to the will; self-respect follows and a desire to rise socially. Self-respect does not allow a man 'to put an enemy into his mouth to steal away his brains'; it is a weak mind, a want of intelligence, an idle, unfurnished brain which induces a habit of intemperance. Thus these reasoners speak, and some of them, at all events, are religious men.

"Now all this, to my mind, makes for prohibition. I do not

think I have understated the arguments of these good men, and I have not entangled the question with the reasoning of those few who oppose from a fear thereby of weakening faith in God.

"If all this be true, as I think it is, and due in no small measure to the advocates of prohibition, then let us promote and hasten the process, 'make it easy to do right, and difficult to do wrong;' let us adopt Father Matthew's decision, 'the principle of prohibition seems to me,' he says, 'the only safe and certain remedy for the evils of intemperance.' I add, the liquor traffic is most injurious to the best interests of the commonwealth from every point of view. It provides a beverage, which eventually impairs (if not destroys) the mental powers, which has a pernicious effect on the body, which perverts to evil the family and social intercourse, and which destroys the happiness and prosperity of millions.

ITS SPIRITUAL ASPECT.

"Viewed in its spiritual aspect, its working is most disastrous; viewed in its humanitarian aspect, its action on mankind is most deteriorating.

"An eminent scientist writes: 'It is remarkable that all the diseases arising from drinking spirituous or fermented liquors, are liable to become hereditary, even to the third generation, increasing (if the cause be continued) till the family becomes extinct.'

"A Canadian statesman said: 'An enormous proportion, probably three-fourths, of the vice that prevails at the present day, of the crime with which we have to contend, of the lunacy, the idiocy, the poverty, and the misery of every kind, is owing to the foul evil of intemperance.'

"Cardinal Manning has borne this witness: 'For thirty-five years I have been priest and bishop in London, and I now approach my eightieth year, and have learned some lessons, and the first is this, the chief bar to the working of the Holy Spirit of God in the souls of men and women is intoxicating drink. I know of no antagonist to that good spirit more direct, more subtle, more stealthy, more ubiquitous, than intoxicating drink.'

"The recorder of Montreal reports:—'I contend that the abuse of liquor is the direct or indirect cause of nearly all the crimes. Without that unfortunate passion for alcohol, we would have a model population. Out of 6,000 persons who appear before the Recorder every year, three-quarters of them are brought there by such abuse. And how many profound miseries are secretly suffered and latently undermine the individuals, families and society! What serious consequences result from that vice which ruins the constitu-

tion and fills up the jails and asylums! How many afflictions are, to a large extent, soothed by our benevolent societies and leagues, and religious institutions, which are, at all times, willing to succor all unfortunate beings, without calculating, without enquiring as to the reason why the children are weeping and the women suffering!

"The jails are, nevertheless, over-crowded to such a degree as to hold back the arm of the judge, who, besides, must often tolerate, sometimes forgive, and always endeavor to correct.

"Moreover, the asylums are so crowded that they have to be continually enlarged, and the orphanages, industrial schools and reformatories have a population of several thousands. On the other hand, the superior tribunals resound with the echoes of separations and horrible crimes, which may be attributed, in most cases, to drunkenness."

"Surely this (with vastly more that might be adduced) points with a most direct finger to prohibition. But then the question is put. Will prohibition prohibit? Unquestionably it will, provided the law makers are honest in their legislation. If the 'manufacture, importation and sale' of intoxicants be prohibited, what can you do with the liquor? Where will you find a market? And then another question is put, 'Will not prohibition foster smuggling?' Surely no. There would be no temptation to smuggle when there was no market for that which was smuggled. Without prohibition, the illicit mingles with the lawful, and cannot be detected. Prohibition destroys the market, and with it the temptation to smuggle.

"A word or two more. What can be done to supply the eight millions of lost revenue which would be caused by prohibition. The Finance Minister can satisfactorily answer that question. But there will be no 'lost revenue.' The revenue will be increased. The fifty millions now utterly wasted—worse than wasted—will be used in such a way as greatly to increase the revenue. As to the statement that a large yearly sum is expended in the purchase of grain, in the employment of labor, for all the requirements of the 'traffic,' the sum bears little proportion to the amount thrown away on drink, to which must be added the expense entailed in suppressing the disorder which drink creates in a community.

"These are some of the considerations which move, to so much earnestness, those who aim at prohibition.

LETTER FROM THE S. P. C. K.

warmly the general interest evinced by the Church in the colonies in the bicentenary of that venerable Society, the pioneer of missionary work in the Church of England. An effort is now being made to fix one Sunday in the year when sermons shall be preached in all churches everywhere for the recognition and support of this useful and generous Society, to which we owe so much. And, in accordance with the wish expressed in the letter referred to, I desire to recommend the Sunday nearest to the 8th of March for an annual thanksgiving offering.

"The education of the young seems to take part in the unrest of modern things. People of age cannot follow their children into the schools, but they can (out of their experience) observe, reflect and comment on what is done there, judging by results of character and attainments. True sanctified knowledge is strength and satisfaction. It raises the character and guides the will. We think we hear too much about prizes and honours, and find less than we expect of solid fundamental learning. This makes us of the older generation anxious for our sons and daughters. More in the way of education has been given to them than to us, and more will be required. The so-called secular teachers are doing what they can to advance 'the higher learning' in all its branches; but I am not aware that adequate provision is made to instruct the individual child in the things which belong to its peace—a creature with mind capable of abstract moral thought. In other words, the simple duties to God and the neighbour are left to develop themselves. The clergy in some parts of the Dominion seem required to stand aside and confine their duty to their churches. Religion seems to be considered out of place in the schools. We naturally ask who is to teach the children (if nothing else) honour, honesty, truthful speaking, and such like virtues? It is not fair to leave it, for example, to the labouring classes, who have neither the time nor the ability. I trust I need not say that, so far as opportunity serves, the clergy as a body will do their very utmost. It seems to me the outlook is dark, but it would be wrong to doubt. The Spirit of God still broods over the dark world. Faith forbids us to imagine that any of the light already given will be withdrawn. We must work and pray, and not faint. The Church of England must gather up 'the fragments which remain' to Her, and count upon multiplied success and blessings. Let her look (after the home teaching) first to her Sunday schools. Cherish the children; instruct the teachers; bring more simple and direct guidance into the pulpit; study the Church catechism, use it as a text book; there, religious and moral teaching are well combined; there, is material to build the right sort of

human character, whether for young or old. But, always remember, Bible education is national blessing.

"In this connection I would make mention of the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, a lay organization especially formed to carry out the holy work of bringing to Christ those persons so unhappy as to be ignorant of the Saviour. It takes its name from that incident related in St. John's Gospel, when Andrew, having been called to follow Jesus, first finds his own brother Simon and brings him to Jesus. Let it be so with our laity who know the Lord. Let each seek brother after brother, and strive by prayer and example to bring him to Christ. This is the opportunity for every Christian. If the clergy may not teach in the schools, there are other places where they may teach, and great will be their gratitude for the lay help which gathers the young into the fold of Christ's visible Church on earth.

"While holding out the right hand of fellowship to the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, and giving a warm welcome to the special work it proposes to do, we will not forget to value and cherish those older institutions whose names are household words amongst us. And here the Sunday school comes first on the list. It is a great matter that the children of our Church people may be said to have a habit of attending school (at least in cities) as part of their religious duty; but we cannot think the schools themselves have attained to all the usefulness of which they are capable. Yet, we may believe that the urgency of present need will awaken

and understanding equal to the occasion. What is chiefly wanted is good classes, or meetings for teachers, where (under the direction of the pastor) a regular course of instruction is followed; for we must not lose sight of the fact that many of the available teachers have no training or experience to enable them to dispense with regular assistance of this kind. In the province of Quebec we are greatly helped by the provision made in the Protestant public schools for regular instruction in the Scriptures. A graduated course of Bible study is there prepared, by authority, which includes systematic instruction in both Old and New Testament, and requires also memorized knowledge of the Ten Commandments, Lord's Prayer, the Beatitudes, the 23rd Psalm and other great truths. Moreover, care is taken, by inspection and examination, to see that the teachers are rightly qualified for this part of their duty to the children under their instruction. In this diocese the students in the Normal School attend a weekly class taught by Arch-

deacon Evans. Also we have the advantage in this diocese of a Ladies' Church school, which should in itself be a training school for Sunday school teachers. I allude to the Dunham Ladies' College, which bids fair to become a regular part of our Church system, notwithstanding the difficulty experienced in its establishment. All the college now requires is a fair amount of the patronage of our Church members, which its present efficiency deserves. A movement in favour of country life for young people is likely to be progressive. If that should happen, the situation of the college in the refined and pretty surroundings of the healthful village of Dunham is a direct advantage not to be overlooked.

"The French mission work, which appeals to a different class of supporters, deserves mention also. It has in the past given us some excellent results, and the educational advantages are beyond praise. Here also nothing more than a fair amount of patronage, on the part of people able to pay the reasonable school fees, is wanted to make the establishment self-supporting. There are now 74 pupils in the school, as against 60 at the same period last year. The pupils for whose benefit the school is specially designed, have increased 50 per cent. The Rev. H. E. Benoit is collecting in England, and the Rev. F. W. M. Barnes in Canada. The expenses have been considerably reduced—as far as possible—keeping efficiency in view. The mission received \$500, a donation from the Rev. R. Lewis, B.D., of Maitland, Ont. This donation came at a most opportune time.

"The temperance societies, the Girls' Friendly and kindred societies, the Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Associations, the Prisoners' Aid Association, and all those valuable Associations (which my limited space will not permit me to mention), having for their aim mutual benefit and improvement, as well as moral and religious happiness, join hands here and take their place and part in the education of the world. Let us not fail to ask God's blessing upon them, let us not hold back from giving them our personal support and sympathy.

"Of the three diocesan institutions—the Church Home, the Andrews' Home and the Jones' Convalescent Home for Children—I have nothing but good to say, and, for details of their work and progress, I must refer you to the excellent reports annually furnished to the public. I heartily commend these Church institutions to your prayers and your support.

THE CHURCH FUNDS.

"That I may not detain you too long, I hasten to direct your attention to our most important Church funds. First, the mission

fund. We are in our chronic need of more supplies, not having sufficient means adequately to remunerate our present clergy, while we have need of men, in order to do our full duty in the mission field. At the same time, we are reminded by the generosity of many of our Church members that they are not unmindful of this primary necessity, so far as money is concerned. The late Robert Hamilton, Esq., of the Church and diocese of Quebec, dying, has bequeathed \$10,000 to the Bishop of Montreal, in trust, for the use of the Church in the Gatineau district. It is my wish that a resolution of gratitude and sympathy should go from this Synod to the family of the late Mr. Hamilton, whose memory is worthy to be cherished by all good men, as well for the honour and integrity of his character, as a citizen, as for his conspicuous piety, and his large charity, especially to the Church of England, of which he was a most valuable member.

"Another good and thoughtful man (still amongst us), John Bradford, Esq., of Granby, has donated \$5,000 to the Mission Fund, subject to a life interest in favour of his wife. We are very grateful for this sum also, and it would be right to express it. And here I desire to thank those communicants who, in answer to my appeal some months ago, contributed \$1,250.37, in small sums, towards the extinction of the Mission Fund debt. Such a response was most encouraging, and I trust further effort in the same direction will be made.

"A legacy of \$500 has been received from the late Mrs. Hutton for the Superannuation Fund, which is most acceptable. Mrs. Hutton (the widow of our late valued friend and Synod treasurer, James Hutton, Esq.) was, like her husband, deeply attached to the Church in which she worked continuously, through a long and active life, to the great advantage of every society with which she was connected. I mention her with affection, and venerate her memory. A gift in perpetuity has also been made to the Widows and Orphans Fund, of the interest of the sum of \$250, to be held by trustees appointed by Walter Drake, Esq., the donor, in memory of his late wife. I desire that suitable acknowledgment shall also be made of this very timely gift, with an expression of sympathy for a loss in which all Church members have a part. Mrs. Drake was one of our most consistent and useful Church workers. Quiet and unobtrusive in her charity, she was greatly beloved for her amiability and Christian virtues. I may make mention here of two ladies, full of years and honour, faithful and loving members of the Church, who have recently been called to their eternal rest—Mrs. Molson and Mrs. Coffin. Their names are associated with all the older Pro-

testant benevolent societies still doing excellent work in the city. These societies are models of Christian organization and utility, bearing present witness to the devotion and charity of their founders. Neither may I forget the Hon. Thos. Wood, of Dunham, who in a good old age has passed to his rest. He represented Dunham in the Synod as far back as 1872. He was always ready with his help and advice on behalf of the Church, in the Legislature. He was a good man, and greatly missed. Except for Mr. Drake's kind gift, I should have nothing that is cheering to say about the Widows and Orphans Fund. It has made little progress since last year. I am depressed more than all by the fact that a number of the clergy of the diocese, to whom it is invaluable, fail to recognize their duty concerning the fund. I cannot help feeling that there is a

LACK OF UNDERSTANDING,

as well as sympathy, in their apparent neglect of this heart-appealing as well as important fund. It partakes of the nature of an insurance, although it is truly benevolent both in intention and application. Unless they have private means our clergy are not in a position to save money, seeing that the salaries provided by the Mission Fund are a minimum sum, and other support is both irregular and precarious much more so than it ought to be. And yet many of the clergy do not seem to put any value on the generous provision for the future of bereaved loved ones, made for them by the Church, inasmuch as they are careless to a grievous fault about paying the small annual sum expected of them (not to speak of the annual offertory which the congregation should make). I will not attempt to explain this neglect. Indeed, I feel ashamed to bring it to the notice of this assembly, and would not do so if the case were less urgent. Should I live to meet you again, I do trust that I shall not be compelled to recur to this fault, but that I may be able to ask the Church at large to put this fund on a sound business footing. It is a fund in the distribution of which there is no place for misappropriation, only those persons with full right to the benefit can receive the grants.

"We have to record the death of the respected widow of the late Rev. Joseph Merrick, whose long and faithful services to the diocese, in the earlier part of its history, fully entitled her to the provision which added materially to the security and comfort of her old age.

"It only remains to speak of the Woman's Auxilliary. The report of the Woman's Auxilliary on the subject of missions is very

encouraging. They are working in Japan, Saskatchewan, Algoma, and amongst the Chinese in New Westminster, besides giving good and kind attention to the requirements of our own diocese, following always their own methods, which are womanly, sympathetic and helpful. Their meetings are regularly held and well attended, and they have this year added several names to the list of life members.

"While adverting to mission work, I observe with satisfaction that St. Matthias' Church, Westmount, has obtained \$500 for the support of a missionary in Uganda, without diminishing its contributions to the Mission Fund of the diocese and other domestic claims. They propose to repeat this effort annually.

"I cannot pass over in silence the recent loss which the Church has sustained in the death of the Right Reverend Dr. Sullivan, second bishop of Algoma, for many years associated with the active Church work of this city and diocese. I cannot hope, in the few minutes I must allow myself, to do justice to his great ability and brilliant attainments, as pastor, preacher and administrator; nor can I say all that is in my heart of the grief which presses upon me now as memory recalls the past years. Working with me in St. George's with fidelity and affection, he was, indeed, my brother in Christ. Those to whom he ministered, and especially those who knew him intimately, appreciated his manly Christian virtues and gentle disposition, as well as his eloquence and fervour, while he himself seemed unconscious of any unusual talent or merit. Of his work in Algoma I will not speak now; most of you know how well he performed his arduous duties, in spite of failing health and strength. The God he loved and served and worshipped has called him to Himself—called him, we believe, to the exceeding great reward which He has promised to those who love Him. And the great loss remains with us.

VISITS AND CONSECRATIONS.

"During the year one hundred and two congregations have been visited; seventy-three confirmations held, when nine hundred and sixteen persons were confirmed. At the Christmas ordinations, three deacons were ordained. At Outremont the Church of the Ascension was dedicated. The cemetery at Stanbridge was consecrated. The cemetery and chancel of St. John's, Brome, were consecrated; St. Alban's church, Parkmans, in the rectory of Shawville, was opened—a beautiful and complete little church, doing credit to the people of the neighborhood and to the zeal of Archdeacon Naylor. We join with the congregation and pastor in humbly thanking God. St. Stephen's chapel, Montreal, at the junction of Atwa-

ter avenue and Dorchester street, was opened. The position is one of peculiar adaptability, and the building, though only the precursor of a commodious church, is very attractive. The wisdom of the move seems to be vindicated by the fact that the church is full, and that within the year forty-nine persons were confirmed. The addition to All Saints' Church, St. Denis street, has been completed, and formally opened for service. It contributes materially to the efficiency and beauty of the edifice and to the usefulness of the church.

"It is with much regret that the executive committee has been obliged to accept the resignation of their secretary, the Rev. Canon Empson, the state of whose health requires him to retire from active work. His long and able service, his intimate acquaintance with the details of diocesan affairs, the intelligence and good sense with which he has managed the Synod funds, his absolute integrity, added to his Christian faithfulness, make his loss all but irreparable. The only cheering point in the matter is the fact that he is still with us, and we may hope that entire rest may so far restore him that some years of great comfort and happiness may yet be in store for him. No clergyman amongst us has served the Church more faithfully or effectually than Canon Empson, both as pastor in former years, and guardian of Her substance as secretary of the Synod in later times; but I need not commend him to your notice; we all know his worth, and have had experiences of his kind and helpful sympathy. No one, clergy or laity, sought his advice or assistance without finding both. I have recommended him for superannuation."

"The resignation of Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., of the charge of the mission of Cote St. Paul, which has been under his care for twenty-two years, must not pass unnoticed. His honorary service for that long period has been most self-denying and arduous. It would be impossible to reckon the value of his work in this district. His patience, his self-forgetfulness, his Christian sympathy with the congregation of the Church of the Redeemer, are beyond praise. He has consistently shown the feelings of a true pastor, impelled by love to Christ and His Church. Let us heartily give him the only thing now in our power; let us give him our united thanks as a Church and Synod, with recognition of the true respect and warm feeling we have towards him.

"Beloved brethren, when we look back over the Synod year, just closed; when we consider the visitation of 102 parishes and missions; when we consider that I have enjoyed the loving care of almost every clerical home in the country parts of the diocese,

spending one, two or three nights in each home, the visit hallowed by the word of God and prayer; when we consider the prayer we have had together; and the intercession made for the 916 persons confirmed, the Holy Communion administered almost daily, week after week, during many weeks, the fresh ardour of the hundreds of the young early dedicating themselves to the service of God, when we consider the burden of our thoughts, our exhortations, our intercessions, our pleadings with God, for the outpouring of the Holy Spirit, through the advocacy of the Lord Jesus Christ; when we consider our entreaty that all would have faith in the promise of God, that He was more ready to give the Holy Spirit to them that ask than a father is to give bread to his hungry child; and when we consider, besides all this, how it has been followed up by missions, and missionary meetings, through chosen ministers, as well as by the archdeacons and rural deans, surely we should look for and expect fruit unto everlasting life; surely, we have reason to be persuaded that, through the infinite mercy of God, a large blessing will be poured out upon the Church in this diocese. Beloved brethren, let us have faith in God, and watch for the manifestation of the power of the Holy Ghost, in more and more of sanctification and consecration, that with deep gratitude we may glorify God's great name.

"And to-day, and at this time (in all our discussions and in all our intercourse), let the spirit which has pervaded in the past year our individual parishes, pervade this united representation of the Church, and then the glory of God will be promoted, and we shall return to our various spheres of duty filled with peace and joy, and strengthened for our work by God's spirit in the inner man.

"And, now unto Him that is able to keep you from falling, and to present you faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy, to the only wise God our Saviour, be glory and majesty, dominion and power, both now and ever. Amen."

The Dean moved, seconded by Rev. Canon Norton: That Rev. Canon Empson be re-elected clerical secretary of this Synod. *Carried.*

Dr. L. H. Davidson moved, seconded by Mr. Walter Drake: That Major E. L. Bond be elected Lay-Secretary of this Synod. *Carried.*

Rev. Canon Norton moved, seconded by Mr. A. F. Gault: That Mr. Charles Garth be re-elected Treasurer of this Synod. *Carried.*

Dr. T. P. Butler moved, seconded by Dr. L. H. Davidson: That Messrs. E. P. Hannaford and H. J. Mudge be re-elected auditors. *Carried.*

For the Provincial Synod :—Mr. Buzzell and Rev. J. W. Dennis, of the lay vote. Ven. Archdeacon Evans and Mr. H. J. Mudge, of the clerical vote.

For the Executive Committee :—Ven. Archdeacon Mills and Col. Cole, of the lay vote. Ven. Archdeacon Naylor and Mr. Alexander Pridham, of the clerical vote.

For the Diocesan Court :—Rev. B. S. T. Marriott and Mr. W. L. Davidson, of the lay vote. Rev. Rural Dean Brown and Mr. R. A. Dickson, of the clerical vote.

The Chancellor submitted a report of the Committee on Canons, with a revised edition of the last (1893) edition. He gave notice that he would move the adoption of the report.

It was also decided that Dr. Henneker be given an opportunity of addressing the Synod to-morrow at twelve o'clock, when he presents the report of Bishop's College, Lennoxville.

The Dean moved a suspension of the rules of order to enable him to bring in a resolution asking for a Committee to draft a resolution of condolence. *Carried.*

The Dean then moved the appointment of a Committee to draft a resolution of condolence with the family of the late Bishop Sullivan. *Carried.*

The Bishop named the Dean and Dr. L. H. Davidson as a Committee under the resolution.

Notices of motion were given by Dr. L. H. Davidson, The Dean, Dr. T. P. Butler, Rev. R. Hewton, Rev. F. H. Graham, Rev. I. H. Lackey, Mr. E. P. Hannaford, Rev. W. A. Fyles, Dr. L. H. Davidson and Rev. J. W. Dennis.

The unfinished business of 1898 was taken up, and Rev. Rural Dean Sanders moved, seconded by Rev. A. B. Given: That section 5 of the Constitution, page 18, which reads as below, be expunged:

5. The salaries to Clergymen employed as missionaries shall not be less than the following, viz.:

For Deacons..\$500 per annum.
For Priests under 10 years' standing.. 600 " "
For Priests above 10 years' standing.. 700 " "

Carried on division.

A motion by Mr. D. R. McCord was ruled out of order, not being in the form of a resolution. Mr. McCord gave notice that he would put it in proper form and move it later on.

Rev. A. B. Given moved, seconded by Rev. H. Kittson:

That, owing to the present existing circumstances in connection with the Widows and Orphans Fund, an assessment of one per cent. on the clerical stipends be levied on the parishes for the next five years towards increasing capital of said account, the said assessment not to interfere in any way with the said annual collection.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Canon Davidson, seconded by Judge Foster: That the motion of Rev. A. B. Given be referred to the Committee on the Widows and Orphans Fund, with a request that every effort possible or method reasonable should be inaugurated for the increase of the Widows and Orphans Fund. *Carried.*

On motion by the Dean, the rules of order were suspended, and he moved that Rev. Mr. Lloyd of the Diocese of Toronto be invited to take a seat in the House. *Carried.*

Rev. Mr. Lloyd was then introduced to the floor of the Synod.

Dr. L. H. Davidson moved, seconded by Rev. H. Kittson:

SECOND DAY, WEDNESDAY, 18th JANUARY, 1899.

The Synod assembled at ten o'clock, and the Bishop opened with prayer. The minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and confirmed.

Dr. H. B. Carmichael being unable to attend to-day's session, Mr. T. H. Schneider was named in his place as scrutineer of the ballot on the General Synod. Rev. Rural Dean Robinson was named in place of Archdeacon Mills as scrutineer of the ballot on the Executive Committee.

Rev. Canon Evans handed in a report of the Committee on Works of Mercy, and gave notice that he would move its adoption.

Dr. L. H. Davidson, in the absence of Rev. Canon Anderson, presented a report of the Committee on Better Observance of the Lord's day, and gave notice of a motion for its adoption.

Notices were given by Rev. Seth A. Mills and Rev. Canon Davidson. The debate was resumed on Dr. L. H. Davidson's motion *re* tobacco smoking.

The Chancellor moved, seconded by the Dean: That the words, "the Clergy of the Church and amongst," be expunged from the motion now before the House.

Rev. B. S. T. Marriott moved, seconded by Mr. D. R. McCord, in amendment to the amendment: That this Synod deplores the rapid extension and increase of tobacco and cigarette smoking amongst all classes of the community and in particular amongst the young; and would express the hope that all members of the Church, and especially the clergy, will do their best to prevail upon Christian parents to exercise their divinely bestowed right of oversight and authority to restrain their children, with reference especially to this growing evil. *Lost.*

The Chancellor's amendment was then put to the House, and *Carried.*

The original motion of Dr. Davidson, changing by permission of the House, the word "increase" to the word "abuse," and as thus amended was *adopted.*

Mr. R. W. Henneker presented the report of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, and addressed the Synod.

Rev. G. Abbott Smith moved, seconded by Judge Foster: That the report just read be received; and he gave notice that he would move its adoption.

The Chancellor presented the report of the Executive Committee, and moved, seconded by Dr. Davidson, the adoption of the resolution in regard to South Stukely on page 1 of the report. *Carried.*

The Chancellor moved the adoption of the rules defining the duties of Missionary Agent on page 2 of the report. *Carried.*

The Chancellor moved the adoption of the clause under "Mission Fund debt," in reference to Mr. Bradford's donation. See page 3 of the report. *Carried.*

The action of the Committee in reference to the Secretary (see page 4) was confirmed, as was also the clause regarding the superannuation of the Secretary of the Executive Committee, page 4.

The Chancellor moved the adoption of the resolution in the report of the Committee on Widows and Orphans Fund, pp. 5 and 6. *Carried.*

The Treasurer's reports and statements of the several funds (pp. 20 to 50) were *adopted.*

At one o'clock the Synod adjourned.

SECOND DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION.

The ballots were taken at two o'clock.

At half past two the Synod re-assembled, and discussion of the report of the Executive Committee was resumed, the report on Grants for 1899 being taken up.

Judge Foster moved, seconded by Rev. Canon Davidson: That the question of the annual grant to South Stukely be remitted to the Executive Committee for further consideration, and for the appearance of the Incumbent and Judge Foster before the committee, with the understanding that the grant of \$400 should be continued till after resultant decision. *Carried.*

Rev. Rural Dean Sanders moved, seconded by Rev. A. B. Given: That the Schedule for equalization of grants be adopted, and the Executive Committee be instructed to modify the scheme of grants in the other columns accordingly. *Lost.*

Rev. Rural Dean Sanders moved, seconded by Archdeacon Mills: That the grant to Lachute be restored to the same figures as in the past. *Carried.*

Rev. Rural Dean Smith moved, seconded by Rev. J. H. Bell: That the grants recommended by the Executive Committee to the Missions of Onslow, Portage du Fort, River Desert, Thorne and Leslie, be referred back for further consideration. *Carried.*

The minutes of yesterday's meeting were read and confirmed.

It was decided that the offertory at the Missionary meeting, \$17.02, be given to the Mission fund of this Diocese.

The Dean presented the report of the Committee appointed to draw up a resolution of condolence with the family of the late Bishop Sullivan. The resolution read as follows, and on motion by the Dean, seconded by Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., was adopted, the members of Synod standing:

That the Synod of Montreal, whilst bowing becomingly to the divine will, desires to place on record its sense of sorrow at the deep loss which the Church has sustained through the death of the late Right Reverend Bishop Sullivan. The members of the Synod find it hard to realize that one in every way such a master of men, one so dearly loved and prized, has passed away in the midst of countless admirers and friends. His ministry in the diocese of Montreal, in every way a remarkable one, his devoted work in the diocese of Algoma, which made Algoma a household word throughout the whole Dominion, his earnest spiritual life, which dominated the whole of his ministry, his charming personality, and his admirable example—all combined to make the name Edward Sullivan one unique in its influence on the religious life of Canada. The loss of such men to the whole Church can only be softened by the sure and certain hope of the resurrection to eternal life; and, pointing to that blessed hope, we would pray God that comfort may reach the hearts of those whose bitter sorrow at this moment deserves our sincerest sympathy, and to whom we tender it with the deepest respect.

Ven. Archdeacon Evans read report of Committee on Superannuation, and moved, seconded by the Dean, the adoption of the report.

Dr. T. P. Butler raised a point of order that there can be no discussion on the report as it has not been printed, as was ordered by resolution adopted at the last Synod (see page 42, 39th report).

The Bishop ruled the point of order well taken.

Moved by Dr. Davidson, seconded by Rev. Canon Norton: That the rule referred to, regarding the printing of reports of Committees before discussion, be waived at the present session. *Carried.*

The report on Superannuation was *Carried.*

Rev. Canon Norton read report of the Committee on system of Nominations before balloting, and moved the adoption of the report, seconded by Major Bond.

Mr. A. G. B. Claxton moved in amendment the following resolution of which he had given notice, seconded by Rev. B. S. T. Marriott: That the report of the Committee on system of Nominations be not adopted, but it be resolved that no names shall be printed on the ballot papers supplied by the Synod; and further, that the section of the by-laws regarding the Executive Committee be amended by adding after the first paragraph the following words:

That, save and except the Dean and Rural Deans, no clerical member of the Executive Committee shall sit for more than three years consecutively, and that after having sat on said Committee for said period of three years, they shall not be eligible for re-election until one year has elapsed.

That the Treasurer and 15 lay delegates, making up said Committee, shall not respectively remain in office more than three years consecutively, and, that after having sat on said Committee for said time, they shall not be eligible as members until one year has elapsed.

That for the year after the coming into force of these provisions, no more than eight of the lay members who have already served three years consecutively may be re-elected.

THIRD DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION.

Rev. F. H. Graham moved in amendment to the amendment, seconded by Rev. F. Charters: That the report of the Committee on Nominations be not adopted, but that the ballot papers be printed as at this Synod, without any names upon them, and that they be distributed in Synod the day before the election takes place.—*Lost*.

Mr. Claxton's motion was then put and *lost*.

The motion for the adoption of the report of the Committee was put and *carried*. And it was further resolved that the number of times of his attendance at meetings during the year be printed opposite each name.

On motion by Rev. J. F. Renaud, seconded by Rev. Canon Davidson, the rules were suspended, and the following resolution was adopted: That this Synod notes with sorrow the absence during this session of one of the most active as well as one of the most venerable and beloved of the members and officers of this body. It would, therefore, send him its affectionate greetings, and would express the hope that his life may be spared, usefulness prolonged, and that peace and comfort may crown the later years of life of the Venerable Archdeacon Lindsay.—*Carried*.

Rev. Dr. Ker read report of the Committee on Negotiations with the Colonial Church and School Society, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. F. Charters.—*Carried*.

Rev. T. E. Cunningham read report of the C. E. T. S., and moved its adoption, seconded by Major Bond.—*Carried*.

The following resolution in connection with the C. E. T. S. report was moved by Rev. F. H. Graham, seconded by Rev. J. A. Elliot, and *carried*: That this Synod authorizes the Council of the Church of England Temperance Society to take the necessary steps towards the formation of a Diocesan Band of Hope Society, with headquarters in Montreal, for the support of present existing Bands of Hope, and the organization of new ones.

Rev. J. F. Renaud read report of the Andrews Home, and moved its adoption, seconded by Major Bond.—*Carried*.

A resolution for the re-election of the Corporation of the Andrews Home was also *adopted*. The Dean, Archdeacons Lindsay, Evans and Mills, Canon Anderson, Revs. J. F. Renaud, A. French, R. Hewton; Messrs. C. Garth, Walter Drake, Dr. L. H. Davidson, Major Bond, the Chancellor, George Hague, Richard White, and H. J. Mudge.

Rev. G. Osborne Troop read report of the Committee on Foreign and Domestic Missions, and moved its adoption, seconded by Dr. Davidson.—*Carried*.

Rev. S. H. Mallinson added to the Committee.

Rev. G. Osborne Troop read report of Committee on Evangelization of Jews in Montreal, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst.—*Carried.*

Ven. Archdeacon Naylor read a report of the Committee on Church Provision in the Lumber Districts, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Sanders.—*Carried.*

Dr. L. H. Davidson moved, seconded by Archdeacon Naylor: That report of the Committee on work in the Lumber Districts be referred to the Executive Committee, the Committee on Domestic and Foreign Missions, and the Committee on Books and Tracts, for consideration and such further assistance to the objects therein mentioned, as may be possible.—*Carried.*

Dr. Davidson moved, seconded by Rev. Canon Norton: That there be an evening session of the Synod at eight o'clock.—*Carried.*

Rev. G. Osborne Troop (in the absence of Principal Lariviere) read report of the Committee on French Work, and moved its adoption, seconded by Dr. Davidson.—*Carried.*

Rural Dean Longhurst read report of the Committee on Dunham Ladies College, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. Canon Davidson.—*Carried.*

Dr. L. H. Davidson moved, that as the resolution which he was about to propose, was a personal matter to the Bishop, his Lordship be requested to leave the chair, and that Ven. Archdeacon Mills do take it. He then moved, seconded by the Dean:

That the Clerical and Lay Members of this House desire to express to the beloved and Venerable President of Synod their Right Reverend Father in God, their affectionate and thankful congratulations on the so soon to be attained twentieth anniversary of his Consecration on the 25th January, 1899, to the high, holy and Apostolic office of a Bishop, in the One Holy Catholic Church; expressing also their hope that in God's providence he may yet have many years of usefulness, and finally may receive from the Great Head of the Church Himself the 'Well done' of the faithful and accepted servant.—*Carried*, the House standing.

Ven. Archdeacon Mills conveyed the resolution to the Bishop, who briefly and feelingly thanked the House.

The Dean of Montreal read a resolution of which he had given notice, and coupled with it a memorial of which Dr. Davidson had given notice, and moved the adoption of both, seconded by Dr. Davidson:

pared by the General Synod, subject to certain amendments, and has also recommended the merging in the Scheme of the General Board the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada, be it hereby resolved that this Synod do memorialize the General Synod in the form following, to wit:

To the Upper and Lower Houses of the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada.

The Memorial of the Bishop, Clergy and Laity of the Church of England in the Diocese of Montreal in Synod assembled,

Respectfully sheweth:

(1) That at the meeting of the said Synod holden at the City of Montreal, from the 19th to 22nd January, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, the following resolution was adopted: "That this Synod having carefully considered the scheme adopted by the General Synod of Canada, at its last meeting in Winnipeg, in September, 1896, for the formation of a Missionary Society for the Church of England, in Canada, and a Board of Missions and Executive Committee, is of opinion that the provisions of the said scheme, and in particular sections 7, 8, 10 and 13, are opposed to and in contravention of the basal principles upon which said General Synod was formed, and on adoption, said scheme cannot be and is not accepted by this Diocese. That further, this Synod is of opinion that further careful consideration of the question and composition of a General Board of Missions is necessary, and that the whole matter should be referred back to said General Synod for the removal of the provisions in said scheme in contravention as aforesaid of the said basal principles and for further consideration generally, and that in the meantime this Synod is unable to take action or representation on the Executive Committee in said scheme mentioned, or to assent to the dissolution of the presently existing D. & F. Missionary Society of the Church of England in this Ecclesiastical Province, or the interruption in any way of its work; and said Synod, as an integral portion of the Provincial Synod of Canada, and of said D. & F., respectively insists on the continuation of said Society's Board and work, until the Provincial Synod of Canada shall have taken action in the premises."

(2) That the following resolution was also adopted at said meeting of Synod:—"That the resolution adopted by this Synod regarding the scheme of the General Synod of Canada re Missionary Society, Board of Missions, and Executive Committee, be communicated by the Secretaries as soon as practicable to his Grace the Primate of all Canada, President of the Upper House, and to the Prolocutor of the Lower House of the General Synod, for communi-

cation to the several Houses, and to the proposed Board of Missions, to the Prolocutor of the Provincial Synod of Canada, and to the Secretary of the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society, for communication to such Synod and Board."

(3) That in accordance with the latter resolution, the Resolution firstly above mentioned was formally communicated to the Provincial Synod of Canada, and was considered by both Houses of said Synod at its last Session holden in the City of Montreal in the month of September in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, resulting in a Message from the Upper House (No. 10) in the following terms: "The President of the Upper House begs to inform the Prolocutor that the Upper House has adopted the following resolutions: That this House adopts the scheme for a General Board of Missions of the Church of England in Canada, prepared by the General Synod, with the amendments noted below, and is prepared to support these amendments at the next meeting of the General Synod. This House also recommends the merging in this General Scheme of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada:

(1) "Section VIII, line 3, after the words "in Canada" insert "receiving or seeking aid."

(2) "In Section X, line 3, after the word "Diocese" insert "receiving or seeking aid."

(3) In line 5, after the word "division" insert "and to the Executive Committee."

(4) Delete the third paragraph commencing "each division."

(5) In Section XIII, line 2, after the word "Diocese," insert "seeking or receiving aid."

(6) In Section XII, after the words "or if found practicable to each parish for a minimum sum," substitute "for a definite sum."

And of another Message No. 18 as follows: "The President of the Upper House begs to inform the Prolocutor that the Upper House has adopted the following resolution. "That the Upper House concurs in the opinion of the Lower House communicated in Message No. 9 that the merging of the Provincial Board of Missions in the General Board should be effected forthwith.

"But the Upper House considers that the adoption of the General Scheme by this Provincial Synod cannot be final until the General Synod has incorporated in it the Amendments supported by the two Houses thereof."

"And which said two messages were concurred in by the Lower House as appears from the following resolution: "That this House "having conferred with the Upper House since the receipt of its "message (No. 10), and said Upper House having by Message No. "18 re-affirmed its position, this House do now concur in Message "No. 10 and Message No. 18 from the Upper House."

"Wherefore the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal reserving to itself to make such further suggestions as to amendments in said Scheme as may appear to it desirable, respectfully prays that said recommendations of the said Provincial Synod of Canada may be adopted by said "General Synod and said Scheme be amended accordingly."

And which said Memorial shall be signed on behalf of this Synod by the Clerical Secretary under the Seal of the Diocese of Montreal and be forwarded in due course to the Upper and Lower House of said General Synod of Canada for consideration at the next Session of said Synod."

Dr. T. P. Butler moved, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Sanders: That the Constitution be amended by erasing the words "third Tuesday" on the first line of article 10, page 3, and substituting therefor the words "last Tuesday."—*Carried.*

Rev. R. Hewton moved, seconded by Rev. H. E. Wright:

(1) That the Bishop be respectfully requested to nominate a Committee to draft and submit to his Lordship for approval and authorization, a special form of service to be used with candidates for confirmation, and communicants' classes.

(2) That in the event of this Committee being appointed, clergymen interested in having such an authorized service be invited to submit suggested forms to said Committee.—*Carried.*

The Bishop named as a Committee, the Dean, Archdeacon Mills, Revs. R. Hewton, (Convener) and Rev. H. E. Wright.

Rev. F. H. Graham moved, seconded by Rev. F. Charters:

That application be made through the proper channels to the proper authorities to change Article 4 of the Constitution (page 2) to read as follows:

After words "within one Cure" the words "no more than two representatives to be elected for the whole Cure."

Moved in amendment by Rev. Canon Davidson, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Brown: That the motion of Rev. F. H. Graham be referred to a special Committee for the due consideration of the lay representatives in this House, taking into view not only the number of church buildings, but also the number of communicants definitely attached to the several district churches, when more than

one, within each separate parochial cure. Said Committee to report on the first day of the next ensuing session.—*Lost*.

Rev. F. H. Graham's motion was also *lost*.

At six o'clock the Synod adjourned till eight o'clock.

EVENING SESSION, THIRD DAY.

The Synod met at eight o'clock. The Rev. I. H. Lackey moved, seconded by Rev. W. E. Kaneen:—

"To provide for a systematic transfer of clergymen within the Diocese of Montreal.

"I. The Executive Committee of the Synod shall meet during the month next preceding the annual meeting of Synod, and take into consideration:

(1) "Such several missions or parishes, in which the then incumbent has been in charge for five or more years.

(2) "Such several missions or parishes, in which the then incumbent has been in charge for at least one year, and from the people or incumbent of which, a petition has been presented for the transfer of said incumbent.

"II. (1) The Executive Committee shall draft a scheme for recommendation to the Bishop for the transfer of such clergymen as have been in charge of their respective Cures for five or more years; provided no petition has been presented for the continuance in their present Cures.

(2) "They shall on consideration of petitions presented, recommend to the Bishop such transfer of clergymen as they shall deem to be in the interest of those concerned, and of the Church work in the Diocese.

(3) "With regard to a clergyman who has been in charge of a Cure for five or more years, and concerning which a petition has been presented asking that he be continued in charge; if such petition be granted, no further consideration concerning the transfer of such clergyman shall be held for five years, or until a petition relating thereto has been presented.

(4) "The Lay petitioners above referred to shall in their petition declare themselves to be Communicants of the Church of England during the past year, and entitled to vote at vestry meetings in the parish concerning which they petition.

(5) "The report concerning the transfer of clergy shall be included in the annual report of the Executive Committee, for presentation to Synod. It shall not be discussed by the members of Synod, but any member may claim the right to be heard before the

(6) "Nothing in these resolutions shall be deemed to interfere with the already existing right of the Bishop to make appointments to Parishes and Missions.

III. (1) "All future appointments to Rectories shall be for a period not exceeding five years.

(2) When such Rector shall have been in charge for five years, the Bishop shall confirm him in the charge thereof according to the present Canon concerning such Rectories; or may, on the petition of the vestry of said Rectory, transfer him to another Cure and declare the Rectory vacant."

It was moved in amendment by Dr. Davidson, seconded by Archdeacon Naylor: That the motion of Rev. I. H. Lackey regarding a systematic transfer of clergymen, be referred to the Executive Committee for consideration and report at the next session of Synod.—*Carried.*

Moved by Mr. Chas. Garth, seconded by Dr. T. P. Butler: That the Executive Committee be requested to examine into the present method of accounting and auditing the receipts and expenditures of the Synod so as to insure a full and complete system of book-keeping and registration of the securities of the Synod with income therefrom.—*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. W. A. Fyles, seconded by Mr. Granville Gilmore: That the Decree of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese for a partial division of the Parishes of Montreal and of St. James the Apostle, and the erection of the parish of St. Paul, hereto annexed, be sanctioned by this Synod.

DECREE.

For a partial division of the Parishes of Montreal and St. James the Apostle.

To all whom these Presents may in anywise concern, I, William Bennett Bond, by Divine permission Lord Bishop of the Diocese of Montreal, send greeting:—

Whereas it has been deemed advisable to partially divide the Parishes of Montreal and St. James the Apostle, by separating therefrom those portions of said Parishes which are embraced within the limits of, and include the following, to wit, the Town of St. Paul, the Parish of Cote St. Paul, and the whole municipality of Verdun, as they appear on the cadastral plans of the Island (or Parish) of Montreal.

Now, therefore, as these Presents witness, I, as such Lord Bishop aforesaid, under and by virtue of the Canon on the subject of Division of Parishes in said Diocese, passed in the thirty-sixth session and confirmed in the thirty-seventh session of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, with the consent of the Standing Committee constituted by said Canon, embodied in a resolution of said committee passed at a meeting of said committee duly convened and held on the sixteenth day of January, eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, of which resolution a duly certified copy is hereunto attached, do hereby decree, that the above-described portion of said parishes of Montreal and of St. James the Apostle shall henceforth be separated from and cease to form parts of said Parishes, and shall henceforth be and form the "Parish or Mission of St. Paul" for all purposes generally whatsoever.

Given under my hand and seal, at the City of Montreal, this sixteenth day of January, in the year of Our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine.

W. B. MONTREAL.

Which decree was consented to by the Standing Committee named under the Canon by the following Resolution.

Resolved: That the Standing Committee do consent to the Decree submitted by the Lord Bishop for the partial division of the Parishes of Montreal, and St. James the Apostle, and the formation of the Parish or Mission of St. Paul. 16th January, 1899.

Archdeacon Evans raised the point of order, that as this resolution entailed a change in a Parish, and notice had not been printed in the notice paper convening the Synod, it could not be dealt with at this Synod.

The Bishop ruled the point of order well taken.

Moved by Dr. L. H. Davidson, seconded by the Rev. W. A. Fyles: That the provision as to publication of the decree, and resolution of the Standing Committee assenting thereto, be waived, and that the decree for a partial division of the Parishes of Montreal and St. James the Apostle, and the erection of the Parish of St. Paul, be sanctioned by this Synod.

Dr. T. P. Butler raised the point of order that the resolution was illegal.

The Bishop ruled the point well taken.

The meeting then adjourned till Friday morning at ten o'clock, the Bishop having pronounced the Benediction.

FOURTH DAY, FRIDAY, 20th JANUARY, 1899.

The Session of the fourth day was opened with prayer by the Lord Bishop.

The minutes of yesterday's meetings were read and confirmed.

The Bishop read a summary of statistics of Rural Deanery of Clarendon.

The Special Committees were named.

Notice of motion was given by Rev. Canon Davidson.

Rev. Canon Evans read report of the Committee on Works of Mercy, and moved the adoption of the report, seconded by Rev. R. Hewton.—*Carried.*

Moved by Dr. L. H. Davidson, seconded by the Dean: That inasmuch as the year 1900 will mark the fiftieth anniversary of the creation of the Diocese of Montreal, and be its Jubilee Year, a special Committee be appointed to take such action under the direction of the Bishop, as may best secure the due and proper observance of the same.—*Carried.* The Bishop named the following Committee with power to add to their number. The Bishop (Convener), the Dean, Dr. L. H. Davidson, Archdeacon Lindsay, Canon Mussen, Canon Anderson, Mr. C. Garth, Canon Norton, Rev. F. H. Graham, Mr. Drake, Canon Davidson, Archdeacon Mills, Archdeacon Naylor, Canon Empson.

It was moved by Rev. J. W. Dennis, seconded by Rev. H. Kittson:

That this House being of opinion that it is necessary to adopt some means of increasing the income of the Mission Fund, respectfully desires the Bishop of the Diocese to call upon the people to practice special acts of self-denial during the season of Lent; the cost of such denial to be cast into the Lord's Treasury on Easter day or as soon after as convenient.—*Carried.*

A motion by Mr. D. R. McCord:—

"Resolved that it is desirable to endow Christ Church Cathedral, and, when opportunity presents itself, vested rights being always respected, make it in the true sense a Cathedral Church, and that steps be taken by this Synod to carry the same into effect,—was held over until next meeting of Synod, the following to be added to the notice of motion: That as soon as such sum or sums towards the endowment of Christ Church Cathedral be donated, bequeathed or otherwise forthcoming, as in the opinion of the Synod warrant it, negotiations be opened with the authorities of Christ Church, with a view of carrying out the idea embodied in this resolution.

Dr. L. H. Davidson read a report of the Committee on Better Observance of the Lord's Day, and moved its adoption, seconded by the Dean.—*Carried.*

The rules of order were suspended to enable the Dean to move the following resolution, seconded by Rev. H. Kittson: Resolved, that this Synod do communicate to the Rev. Canon Anderson its sense of loss in his absence from the floor of this House at the time of presenting and reading of the report of the Committee on the Lord's day observance (a subject in which he has taken such a deep interest all his life, and in the reading of which the Synod has always delighted), and that this House further expresses the hope that many years may be granted him in which he may be able yet himself to present and read his report.—*Carried.*

Mr. D. L. McCord moved, seconded by Rev. Canon Dixon: That the memorials referred to in the report on Lord's Day Observance be forwarded to the proper quarters to make the same operative, and that the Committee as Lord's Day Observance be respectfully requested to prepare the necessary memorials to be forwarded by the Secretary.—*Carried.*

The rules of order were suspended on motion by the Dean to enable him to move the following resolution. He then moved, seconded by Mr. Garth: That this Synod desires to most heartily express its deep sympathy with the sister-Diocese of Quebec in the great loss which it and the whole Church have suffered through the removal by death of that most earnest and most generous Churchman, Robert Hamilton, Esq., whose conspicuous piety, generosity and true-hearted loyalty to the Church afford a bright and most stimulating example to the members of the Church at large, for which it would return thanks to God.

And this Synod also most gratefully acknowledges the generous benefaction made by Mr. Hamilton, of the sum of ten thousand dollars for the work of the Church in this Diocese, and also its gratitude for the benefactions of the same donor to the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, the joint property of the Dioceses of Quebec and Montreal, to which during his lifetime he made many and large gifts.

This Synod would express to the members of the family of the late Mr. Hamilton its sincere sympathy and its admiration of his character and virtues.

And that this resolution be communicated to the Synod of Quebec, and to the family of Mr. Hamilton.—*Carried.*

Rev. Seth A. Mills moved, seconded by Archdeacon Naylor:

That it is most desirable and necessary for the safe-guarding of the best interests of the Diocese that the Executive Committee do procure a suitable book, with printed headings and columns for the purpose of recording services, attendance at Divine Worship, Offer-

Rev. Canon Dixon read Report of the Committee on caring for the wants of young Church people coming to Montreal, and moved the adoption of the report, seconded by Rev. J. A. Elliott. Also that a small expenditure of money be authorized to carry out the work necessary.—*Carried.*

The rules of order were suspended to enable Rev. Rural Dean Sanders to move the following resolution, seconded by Mr. Walter Drake: That this Synod desires to put on record its sense of the deep attachment manifested throughout life by the late Mrs. James Hutton to the Church in this Diocese, and further evidenced by her remembrance of the needs of its Superannuation Fund in her will, and would commend to those having means the remembrance in like manner in their Testamentary provisions of the needs of the Diocese, not forgetting them, however, during their lives.—*Carried.*

Dr. L. H. Davidson moved, seconded by the very Rev. the Dean of Montreal: That this Synod learns with extreme regret of the Superannuation of Canon Empson, and his withdrawal from active work in the position he has so long and ably filled. The Synod would express its high appreciation of his long and faithful services in the position of Secretary of Synod, and also of Secretary of the Executive Committee, to the great (and perhaps the as yet not fully appreciated) benefit of this Diocese. And the Synod would further express to Canon Empson its sincere hope that God may give him yet many years of happiness and usefulness, and that he may still be able to give some assistance in carrying on the financial affairs of this Diocese.—*Carried.*

Rev. E. P. Judge moved, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Sanders: That this Synod desires to place on record its deep sense of the debt of gratitude which the Church in the diocese of Montreal owes to Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C., for his long and faithful services as Lay-reader in charge of the Mission of Cote St. Paul, recognizing that such zeal on the part of a layman as he has manifested in the conduct of the public worship in the building of the beautiful Church structure; in the carrying on of the Sunday School; in the visiting of the sick; and in many other labours for the advancement of the Church in the locality; is unique in the history of the diocese, and is, therefore, an inspiring example to members of the Church.—*Carried unanimously.*

Moved by Ven. Archdeacon Evans, seconded by Mr. Charles Garth: That this Synod gratefully acknowledges the generous gift of John Bradford, Esq., to the Mission Fund of this Diocese, and would express the hope that the blessing involved in the words of the Master, "It is more blessed to give than to receive," may be fully his; and the Synod would express the hope also that the example thus furnished by Mr. Bradford may be followed by many others to their own benefit, and the advantage of Holy Church."

That this resolution be communicated by the Secretary to Mr. Bradford.—*Carried.*

Moved by Archdeacon Mills, seconded by Mr. Hannaford: That this Synod desires to express to Mr. Walter Drake its sincere appreciation of his gift to the Widows and Orphans Fund; and hopes that many years may be given to him of continued usefulness and blessing, sympathizing with him in the severe loss to him of which said gift is a memorial.—*Carried.*

At one o'clock the Synod adjourned.

FOURTH DAY, AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod re-assembled at half past two o'clock.

By permission of the House, the following resolution, of which Rev. Canon Davidson had given notice of motion, was allowed to stand over as unfinished business till next year:

That the Synod recalling to mind the weighty references on the subject by the Chief Pastor, in his charge to the Synod at the preceding session, and further the fact that the Canon for Deaconesses has long been found on the pages of the "Constitution and Canons, etc." (p. 40), expresses the hope that responsive action may be reached this year.

(1) In the setting apart through individual devotion and consecration of some of our earnest godly women to an office, alike primitive, scriptural and practical.

(2) In the drawing the attention of persons of means (women or men) to the great need and desideratum of a house or home where might centre and whence might emanate and expand a direct renewal of the godly ministrations of women, such as surrounded our Divine Master's person and attended the inspired and primitive promulgators of the Gospel.

(3) In the re-appointment of a Committee, charged with the development of this important movement for Christ and His Church.

ing the Non-Roman population is one demanding immediate attention, and that a Committee be appointed to act with representatives of other religious bodies for the reduction of civil exaction of License Fee to the maximum of Two Dollars, and for the removal of any other disabilities now operating.—*Carried.*

The Bishop named the following Committee: Rev. Canon Davidson (Convener), Dr. L. H. Davidson, Rev. Dr. Ker, and Rev. J. A. Elliott.

Rev. G. Abbott Smith moved, seconded by Rev. R. Hewton: That the report of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, be received.—*Carried.*

The Principal Hackett moved, seconded by Rev. Dr. Ker: That the Montreal Diocesan Synod takes this opportunity of expressing its satisfaction at the improved state of the health of Principal Adams, and its earnest hope that he may soon be enabled to discharge again the duties of his high and useful office.—*Carried.*

Rev. Canon Davidson moved, seconded by Rev. F. H. Graham:

That, in the judgment of this Synod, the discriminations in the Church Temporalities Act of this Province, excluding women of the Church from membership in the Vestries of this Diocese, should be repealed, to which end the Officers of the Synod are hereby instructed to take needful action before the Legislature of this Province for the earliest possible removal of the disability imposed in the existing Act.

Discussion of this motion was postponed till next year.

Rural Dean Sanders moved, seconded by Rev. Dr. Ker:

That this Synod regrets the absence of Mr. Richard White, who has acted for many years as its Lay Secretary, and trusts he may soon be restored to his wonted health.—*Carried.*

Rev. Rural Dean Sanders moved, seconded by Rev. A. B. Given:

That the grant hitherto made by this Diocese to the Diocese of Algoma be no longer continued.

Moved in amendment by Dr. Davidson, seconded by the Dean: That all the words after "Diocese of Algoma" be struck out, and the following inserted instead thereof: "be continued for another year, for the same amount and for the same purpose as during the past year."

Rev. F. H. Graham moved in amendment to the amendment, seconded by Rev. H. Kittson: That for the present year the grant to the Diocese of Algoma be paid, and that after the present year all contributions to the Diocese of Algoma shall be voluntary, and that due notice shall be given to the Secretary of the said Diocese to this effect.—*Lost.*

Moved in amendment to the amendment by Archdeacon Naylor,

seconded by Rural Dean Longhurst: That an assessment for the purpose of making up a sum of \$500 for the current year be made as before, upon the clerical stipends, said assessment to be paid by the several parishes, and that only the amount contributed by the parishes in this way shall be paid.—*Lost*.

Dr. Davidson's amendment was then put to the House, and *carried*, the following words to be added: but this Synod would desire it to be understood that it does not pledge itself for a renewal.

Moved by Rev. Rural Dean Sanders, seconded by Archdeacon Mills: That the Synod Service on Tuesday evening be cancelled, and the Synod Sermon be preached at the morning service as in former years.—*Carried*.

Rev. H. Jekill moved, seconded by Rural Dean Sanders:

That this Synod deploras and deprecates the negligence of many of the Clergy of the Diocese in not sending in the Parochial Reports as requested by the Bishop to the officers duly appointed and authorized to receive them, thus necessitating a very serious defectiveness in the statistics of the Diocese to the great detriment of the Church.—*Carried*.

Rev. H. Kittson in the absence of Rev. Canon Ellegood, moved, seconded by Rev. Canon Empson:

That this Synod requests the Clergy of the Diocese to instruct the children from time to time and others belonging to their respective parishes on the importance and the blessedness of being kind to dumb animals.—*Carried*.

Dr. Davidson read report of the special Committee on Dunham Ladies College, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst.—*Carried*.

Rev. J. A. Elliott in the absence of Rev. E. I. Rexford read report of the Committee on Education, and moved its adoption, seconded by Rev. R. Hewton. Report was amended and *carried*.

Dr. L. H. Davidson moved that the thanks of the Synod be tendered to the "Gazette" and the "Witness" and "Evangelical Churchman" for supply of papers to the Synod, and to the "Gazette," "Witness" and "Star" for their reports of the proceedings of this session.—*Carried*.

The Dean moved, seconded by Judge Foster: That this Synod desires to record its sense of the great benefits conferred upon the work of the Church in this Diocese through the labours and loving services of the members of the Montreal Diocesan Woman's Auxilliary, and hereby returns its sincere thanks to that Association, and would invoke God's continual and rich blessings upon their faithful and loving efforts in behalf of Missions and Missionary work, Diocesan, Domestic and Foreign.—*Carried*.

Rev. Canon Norton moved, seconded by the Dean, a vote of thanks to the clerical Secretary, Canon Empson.—*Carried.*

Rev. F. H. Graham moved, seconded by Rev. G. Osborne Troop, a vote of thanks to the Treasurer, Mr. Charles Garth.—*Carried.*

Dr. L. H. Davidson moved that the Very Rev. the Dean do take the chair. He then moved: That the thanks of this Synod are due and hereby tendered to the Lord Bishop for the gracious, patient and impartial manner in which he presided over the Synod.—*Carried,* the House standing.

The Dean conveyed the resolution to his Lordship, who made a brief reply.

The minutes of the fourth and last day of the session were then read and confirmed.

The Doxology was sung, and the Lord Bishop closed the session by pronouncing the Benediction.

APPENDIX.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee begs to make the following report of its proceedings to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal at its fortieth session, in January, 1899.

MEETINGS.

Meetings were held on 8th February, 10th May, 13th September, 8th November, and special meetings on 5th December and 12th January, 1899.

GRANTS.

Grants were made during the year 1898 as follows:—

West Shefford, grant re-considered, and allowed to remain at \$200 for 1898.

Sabrevois, grant increased to \$400 for 1898, in view of the special circumstance of the withdrawal of the grant from the Colonial Church and School Society.

Bristol, stipend increased to \$550.

Sault au Recollet, a grant of \$100 for 1898.

St. Francis, Indian Village, a grant of \$20 per month until some other arrangements shall have been made by the Bishop.

South Stukely, the following resolution was adopted:—"That, hearing the report of the special committee appointed to visit the mission of South Stukely, and the demand of the parishioners for the fulfilment of the contract made with them by the Executive Committee, and submitted to Synod, this Committee feels that it is in honour bound to continue the grant at the rate agreed upon, to the end of this year, when said contract expires; but it regrets extremely that such grant should be insisted on, when it is admitted that the whole or the greater part of the stipend might be raised in the mission itself. The Committee will seek confirmation of this action at the next meeting of the Synod." The above resolution was communicated to the incumbent and wardens.

Beauharnois, \$50 placed in the hands of the Bishop for 1898 to enable him to pay a student for summer work in the mission.

St. Philip's Church, Montreal West. The incumbent and church-wardens were notified in May that a continuance of the grant would not be entertained, and that monetary assistance from the Mission Fund ceased with the special grant of \$100 made at the meeting in February.

Church of the Redeemer, Cote St. Paul. A grant of \$350 for 1899.

RE-ADJUSTMENT OF PARISHES.

The old parish of Franklin and Havelock has been divided, Franklin being added to the Rectory of Ormstown, and Havelock being added to the Mission of Edwardstown. By this arrangement a saving has been effected of the grant formerly made to Franklin and Havelock.

MISSIONARY AGENT.

The following rules and regulations were adopted defining the duties of the Clerical Missionary Agent:—

- 1st.—That it shall be the duty of the Missionary Agent to visit each and every separate congregation in this Diocese receiving aid from the Mission Fund, and ascertain as accurately as possible how much may reasonably be expected to be paid annually towards the support of the clergyman, with the specific object of making as many as possible of the older missions self-supporting.
- 2nd.—That it should also be his duty upon invitation of any rector to carry out the directions of the Executive Committee with regard to visiting his parish, where the rector shall feel that it would be for the benefit of his parish that such visit be made, whether in connection with his stipend or contributions to the Mission Fund.
- 3rd.—That notice of his appointment as Clerical Missionary Agent, with a copy of these rules, shall be sent to every clergyman having a cure in this Diocese, and stating that he is about to visit all the missions in order to make a house-to-house canvass, for the purpose of increasing, if possible, the amounts contributed towards the missionaries' stipends, and also to obtain a renewal of the three years' guarantee at such increased rates, and further to increase the annual contributions to the Mission Fund.
- 4th.—That such notice shall also instruct each missionary to hand to the agent on his entering the mission a complete list of all Church families and members in his mission, and to aid him in every way in carrying out his work; and, whenever it seems desirable in the agent's opinion, to hold meetings, with a view to interest the people, and to promote an enthusiasm in the work of the Church.
- 5th.—That the agent shall be under the direct control of the Executive Committee, which may direct him from time to time, as to the needs of the work.
- 6th.—That he shall lay a detailed report of parishes visited, work done, and results therefrom, before each quarterly meeting of the Executive Committee.

At the meeting held in May, a sub-committee was named to make an appointment of a Clerical Missionary Agent, and at the September meeting, the Committee reported, that, in the absence of sufficient information for the election of a properly qualified person to fill the office, it felt itself unable at present to make the desired appointment.

At the meeting in January, 1899, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:—

Resolved—That the Executive Committee of the Diocese of Montreal feels it its duty to place on record its high appreciation of the value of the services Dr. Davidson has rendered to the Church in the Mission of Cote St. Paul. Although actively engaged in the practice of his profession, he, for a period of over 22 years, ministered to the people there, building up a flourishing congregation and Sunday School, preparing Candidates for Confirmation, and laying broad and deep the foundation of Church work in the Mission.

The Committee does not venture to thank Dr. Davidson, believing that the Master's "Well done" is the only reward he desires. It trusts, however, that the example of Dr. Davidson's quiet and earnest work in the cause of pure and undefiled religion will prove a strong incentive to one and another of the laymen of the Diocese to go and do likewise.

MISSION FUND DEBT.

The Committee has great pleasure in reporting, that, John Bradford, Esq., of Granby, has made a donation of five thousand dollars towards the reduction of the debt of the Mission Fund, arrangements to be made by the Executive Committee to pay interest thereon at the rate of five per cent. per annum to Mrs. Bradford, said payments to be made semi-annually. At the death of Mrs. Bradford the capital is to revert absolutely to the Mission Fund.

Mr. Bradford's generous donation was most gratefully accepted on the terms proposed by him, and the Bishop and the Treasurer were authorized to execute on behalf of the Synod any and all agreements which may be deemed necessary in the premises.

The legacy of ten thousand dollars bequeathed by the late Robert Hamilton, Esq., of Quebec, to the Bishop in trust, for missions on the Gatineau, has been paid, less one thousand dollars, the Government legacy duty, and, by advice of the Chancellor a special committee has been named by the Bishop for its investment.

SECRETARY OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Rev. Canon Empson, at the meeting held in May, handed in his resignation as Secretary of the Executive Committee, stating that, owing to the state of his health, he felt compelled to do so,

and proposing that his resignation should take effect on 1st October, by which time his successor could be chosen, and become familiar with the work of the office.

The following resolution was adopted:—That Rev. Canon Empson be requested not to press his resignation, but that an assistant secretary be appointed by this Committee to work with and under Rev. Canon Empson, until the next meeting of the Synod, and that a small committee be appointed to choose such assistant secretary and confer with Canon Empson as to the carrying out of this arrangement.

It was also resolved:—That the Committee appointed under the above resolution be authorized to fix the stipend to be paid to the assistant-secretary.

At the meeting held in September, the Dean reported that the Committee had appointed Rev. J. Gilbert Baylis as assistant secretary, and that he had entered upon his duties.

At the meeting held on 12th January, 1899, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: This Committee most sincerely regret to have to inform the Synod that the Rev. Canon Empson has, since the foregoing action was taken, felt obliged to seek for Superannuation, to which the Committee has most reluctantly assented, but the Committee hope that his services may be still retained as supervisor of the office work generally, at such additional remuneration, beyond the ordinary superannuation allowance, as may be agreed, and that the Executive Committee be authorized so to act.

The grant of £163 has been renewed for payment of the Society's missionaries for the year 1899.

PRESENTATION.

R. A. A. Jones, Esq., of England, wrote to the Bishop of Montreal, offering to present to the Diocese a portrait of the late Rev. Robert Phelps, who was formerly rector of St. Thomas' Church, Montreal. The Committee decided to accept the portrait.

SUPERANNUATION FUND.

The Bishop reported that Rev. A. D. Lockhart resigned his parish, and had been placed on the Superannuation Fund, from 1st April, 1898.

BEQUESTS.

A legacy of \$500 has been received for the Superannuation Fund, from the executors of the estate of the late Mrs. Jane Hutton.

The Treasurer was authorized to receive the donation, and to sign a notarial document, providing that the interest on said sum appear annually and in perpetuity in the reports of the Synod, as "Interest upon donation in memory of Mrs. Walter Drake."

Mr. Drake also paid to the fund \$12.50, one year's interest.

ST. DENIS STREET PROPERTY.

A property, consisting of seven houses of two tenements each, on which the Synod had a mortgage, has been purchased at Sheriff's sale.

The total cost, including all the necessary repairs and insurance, amounted to \$27,305.39. The property is now in excellent order, and it is hoped that it will be fully rented by 1st May next, and pay a fair return on the capital invested therein.

A resolution was adopted by the Committee on Investments to dispose of the property, either in one lot or in separate lots for a consideration not less than the total cost of principal and interest.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON "THE BETTER OBSERVANCE OF THE LORD'S DAY."

Your Committee, in presenting their Annual Report to Synod, on "The Better Observance of The Lord's Day," are guided by the search-light, far-reaching words of Isaiah, the Evangelical Prophet of the Old Testament (Is. 21, 11-12); "The burden of Dumah (or Idumoea), He called to me out of Seir, Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of the night? The watchman said, The morning cometh, and also the night: if ye will inquire, inquire ye: return, come." "The burden of Dumah" is also the burden of Humanity; with its never-ceasing unrest; disquietude; bereavement; sorrow; care and trouble; moaning out, from its countless watch-towers, the same piteous, wailing cry: "Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of the night?"

Blessed be God;—The Voice from Seir, augmented with the swell of Prophets and Apostles, and holy men of old, and of the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, unite with the watchman in responding: "The Morning cometh;" the morning of a day that knows no sunset; the *Sabbatismos* of St. Paul; the Church's "Blessed Hope;" the long, long deferred answer to the Master's own promise: "Surely I come quickly." (Rev. 22, 20); "I will come again and receive you unto Myself, that where I am there ye may be also." (John 14, 3.)

Your Committee here emphasize the fact that the only two institutions surviving the wreck and ruin of the Fall were, and are, *Marriage*, and the *Sabbath*:—*Marriage*, the unit of human government; the safe-guard in all civilized lands of social ties, and of the endearments of family life:—The *Sabbath*, the unit of God's Sovereignty in the armies of Heaven, and among the inhabitants of the earth.

This primeval tie God Himself has established, and no one should ever put asunder.

In May last, in the Albert Hall, London, England, Lord Salisbury, the Prime Minister, delivered a noteworthy speech in which he divides the nations of the world into two great classes, the Living and the Dying. Some States he adds are growing stronger and stronger. These are for the most part the Christian (he might

very safely have said, the Protestant speaking and Sabbath observing nations of the world. Others, he continues, are growing weaker and weaker. The first tend inevitably to dominate and absorb the second.

Late events would seem to substantiate these assertions of Lord Salisbury, and it is not necessary to enter into detail to carry conviction to any present.

On coming nearer home in our own Dominion, in our own Diocese and City, how stands God's primeval Ordinance?

Time was when Moody, the American Evangelist, could say that perhaps in no other City of America was Sunday better observed than in a sister City of the Dominion. She has since fallen from that high estate, and is now running a race with our own City and Province for bad pre-eminence in Sunday desecration. Else, why the rejection at the last Session of the Dominion Parliament of even the meagre, emasculated and wholly inadequate Sabbath Observance Bill.

Again, why the practice in so many parishes of Eastern Canada of holding purely political meetings and delivering political harangues on the Lord's day at the very doors of the parish church?

Why the race between steamboat and railroad companies for pre-eminence in fighting against God, by secularizing that Day which He has specially set apart as a *Day of a HOLY REST* for every member of His large human family, by excursions and other avoidable traffic?

Your Committee feel that although in the past little apparent result has followed similar efforts on the part of this Synod, nevertheless it is its duty again to memorialize the great railroad and steamboat companies against these ever-increasing desecrations of the Lord's Day to the undoubted injury of the community at large, both temporally and spiritually; and that a Memorial should be sent to the authorities of the Canadian Pacific Railway, the Grand Trunk Railway System, and the Richelieu and Ontario Navigation Company, praying their urgent consideration of the injurious effect upon the community at large of Sunday excursions by rail and by boat, and praying these companies to do all in their power if not wholly to abandon such unrighteous practice, at least to reduce it to the lowest possible point. And your Committee would further suggest that a Memorial should again be sent to the authorities of the City of Montreal praying for the enforcement as fully as possible of all and every Law By-law or Regulation tending to preserve the sanctity of the Lord's Day by preventing the opening of theatres, places of amusement, saloons, cigar stores, and all other places of business traffic.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROVISION FOR THE LUMBER DISTRICTS.

The Church kept up her usual work last winter amongst the men in the lumber camps, on the Coulonge River, and in the River Desert District.

1. On the Coulonge River, the Rev. J. L. Flanagan and the Rev. J. H. Bell, spent 12 days, in which they visited 10 camps, containing 400 men, of whom they estimated 20 per cent. were Protestant. They also visited 2 private houses. They held 12 services during

the trip, and also distributed literature which had been kindly supplied to them.

2. In the River Desert District, the Rev. A. B. Groulx reported having visited 5 camps in which were about 180 men, of whom a very small proportion were Protestants. He also made monthly visits to one of the lumber depots. There were 5 camps at Bark Lake, which he did not succeed in reaching, owing to the early break up of the winter.

In the latter part of the summer, the Rev. Mr. Groulx left River Desert, and the Rev. R. C. Brewer was appointed to succeed him. He arrived at River Desert in October, and received a hearty welcome from his former friends and parishioners.

He writes encouragingly of the prospects for the future, although the shanties this winter will be very far North, some of them 120 miles from River Desert across long chains of lakes, reaching to the Barriere, the division of the Diocese of Montreal from that of Moosonee, where there are Indians and Hudson Bay Co. officials. He hopes to make a visit to them during the winter.

He proceeds to say that: "Bark Lake District surrounds this Northernmost Depot, an area of 50 x 30 miles, wherein are 2 Depots and 6 shanties of Messrs. Gilmour & Hughson. Bark Lake Depot is 2 1-2 days (35 miles is a day's journey) from Desert. The Thomassino District is about 60 miles Northwest from River Desert, and within its area of 50 x 20 miles are 7 shanties belonging to Gilmour & Hughson and 1 Depot. The W. C. Edwards Co. also have 2 shanties in the Thomassino, and 2 more at the "Redan," some 20 miles beyond the Gilmour's Thomassino Depot. In each of the Gilmour's and the Edwards' shanties the men average 40, and in some of them there are 100 men. In the Thomassino District the majority of the men are English-speaking and Protestant." We see then that there are from 700 to 800 men to be visited, and long distances to be travelled. The work of the Desert Missionary will be no easy undertaking this winter. There may even be hardship and suffering in the long drives across the great lakes.

Mr. Brewer appeals for a young man to volunteer to travel with him in his journeys during the month of January, a student, if possible, or one desirous of working for Christ and his Church,—a young man not afraid of roughing it,—who, for the love of Christ, would be willing to give his time and strength. Mr. Brewer would give him a warm welcome in his Mission House at River Desert, and would take him with him on his journeys.

Your Committee enclose this appeal; some of them know what it is to travel on the great lakes in this northern region, and they feel that it is next to impossible, or at all events attended with

great danger, for one man alone to undertake these long journeys. Bark Lake in Mr. Brewer's District is described as being 60 miles in length and 20 miles in width. Who would like to venture alone upon this great expanse of ice? Yet we expect our Missionary to do it. Will not some one volunteer to be his companion and fellow-missionary?

The time has come when new Mission Buildings are urgently needed at River Desert. A site has been secured, but not wholly paid for. The people are exerting themselves to the utmost, but they greatly need assistance, and especially they will need assistance when the work of building commences. The resident Church population is small, and quite unable to do all that is required; but they and we are members one of another. It must be both the happiness and the interest of the many or the strong to minister to the few and weak.

Mr. Brewer pleads for the organization of a Church of England Lumberman's Mission, which would make it its aim to provide a systematic supply, both of general literature and illustrated papers, and also of sound Church literature, in the form of books as well as of periodicals.

Your Committee believe that such an organization charged specially with the care of the work in the lumber districts would promote the interests of the Church materially, but they would suggest also that it should undertake the provision of such financial assistance as may be needed to erect suitable mission buildings wherever in this Diocese the Church undertakes work like that at River Desert.

Your Committee would suggest as an alternative that the need might be met by some strong Congregation undertaking this work as its own special mission.

The Missionaries and Committee desire to thank the donors of literature for their assistance. An appeal made last year for a set of lantern slides on scriptural subjects has as yet borne no fruit. We venture to repeat this appeal. A lantern is available, but we have no slides. A suitable set would be a great help to instruct and interest the men in the camps.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL OF THE CHURCH OF ENGLAND
TEMPERANCE SOCIETY.

Once more we desire to bring the claims of this important subject before the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal.

The Plebiscite lately taken shows the mind of the people on the question of temperance, and it is therefore hoped that the Dominion Government will enact such legislation as shall promote the true interests of temperance.

The Committee would advise that Bands of Hope be more largely organized throughout the Diocese, especially through the medium of the Sunday Schools, as a means of educating a stronger temperance sentiment among the young, and where possible seek to establish adult societies. The Committee would also advise that if possible a Central Band of Hope Society be formed, which, through representatives, would weld the various Bands in the Diocese together, and aid materially in making the temperance movement more prominent.

We have to report that, as far as we know, only 20 complied with the Bishop's request about preaching a Temperance Sermon on Temperance Sunday. The Church of England, with her wealth of influence and power, should occupy a leading position in the struggle for temperance reform. Victory is sure to come, and victory means untold blessings to the individual, the home, and the Commonwealth. Let us earnestly pray that the day is not far distant when the vice of drunkenness shall be forever banished from our country.

THE REPORT OF THE CORPORATION OF THE ANDREWS HOME.

The Corporation of The Andrews Home herewith present their Third Annual Report to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal.

The Quarterly Meetings required by the Charter have been regularly held.

At the Meeting of the 26th January, the following gentlemen were appointed as a House Committee:—A. F. Gault, Esq., Chairman; Ven. Archdeacon Evans, D.C.L.; Rev. A. French, M.A.; Rev. J. F. Renaud, Secretary; Chas. Garth, Esq.; Dr. L. H. Davidson, Q.C.; Major E. L. Bond, Henry J. Mudge, Esq., and subsequently F. Wolferstan Thomas, Esq., Hon. Treasurer, to act on the Committee.

The House Committee held in all fifteen meetings during the year, every second Thursday in the month, at 9.15 a.m., when the business of the Institution was transacted, correspondence submitted, and at which a comparative monthly statement was presented by the Secretary of matters connected with immigration work, finances and all that concerned the welfare of the institution.

His Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese and President of this Corporation has frequently visited and inspected the Home and Office Work during the year.

The Corporation desire to express their appreciation of the faithful work punctually done by the members of the House Committee, who also kindly undertook the work of visitors; and also desire to thank the ladies appointed by the Synod, who kindly from time to time visited and inspected the Home, viz.: Mrs. (Dean) Carmichael, Mrs. A. F. Gault, Mrs. L. H. Davidson, Mrs. E. L. Bond, Mrs. Redpath, Mrs. Garth Bulmer, Miss Mudge, Miss Bond, Mrs. Lindsay and Mrs. Mercer.

The Primate of all Canada, while passing through to the North-West, manifested his continued interest and approval of The Andrews Home by a visit and close inspection of the whole premises, emphasizing a previous statement of his satisfaction with regard to the foundation of The Andrews Home, and his appreciation of the many benefits conferred on the newly-arrived through its instrumentality.

In addition to the above we are in receipt of many letters from those who passed through the Home, acknowledging the care taken, good advice given and benefits received from The Andrews Home. Besides the testimony of words, we have received donations of small sums of money, a painting on glass, offerings of fruit and vegetables, etc., from immigrants, all testifying of gratitude. We find

in our Visitor's Book most satisfactory testimonies from ladies and gentlemen of the management of the Home and good work carried on by the Corporation. The following:—Rev. John Shelley, Rev. Ramsay Sparles, Rev. J. A. Panter, Rev. M. Evanson, Rev. R. Phillips, Rev. Arthur Steele King, Rev. Dr. Salts, and Rev. Dr. Hole, are some of the S. P. C. K. Chaplains who came out in care of parties of immigrants making their headquarters in the Andrews Home, all expressing themselves perfectly satisfied with the internal arrangements made for the comfort of immigrants. The Rev. Dr. Salts, of St. John's College, Cambridge, Vicar of Littleboro', was most enthusiastic with regard to the capabilities of the Home, and stated he would have much pleasure in letting intending immigrants know where they could be safely and comfortably housed and advised by those of their own Communion.

During the recent session of Provincial Synod, held September last, Bishops and Clergy took the opportunity of visiting the Home, while some accepted its hospitality, and expressed themselves as astonished as well as delighted with the premises, extent of the work, the care and interest taken in the immigrant, placing their opinion on record.

The same constant supervision and care is exercised with regard to the provision for the separation of the sexes, and the written and verbal testimonies received are most gratifying. The Corporation have received through the Secretary of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge their report for 1898, in which is noted in satisfactory terms the work of the Andrews Home. A resolution was passed by the Corporation requesting this Synod to acknowledge by resolution the effective work done by the Venerable Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, the liberality and care shown in watching over and providing for the temporal and spiritual needs of Church of England immigrants, even to our very shores, thus making us responsible for the carrying on of the work which they have so admirably begun. Your Corporation feel that such a resolution would be most appropriate, and we would be glad to take our place with thousands of others in the tribute of thankfulness to Almighty God for the benefits received through that Society, which, for two hundred years, has been permitted to work so efficiently the wide world over for Christ and the advancement of His Church.

We would accord the Rev. T. H. Leslie, of Winnipeg, S. P. C. K. Chaplain, our thanks for his cheerful assistance in our immigration work. Also the Clergy of the Diocese who have so kindly interested themselves in placing men and lads.

of Toronto to co-operate with the Chaplain at Montreal in the interests of immigrants. We desire to acknowledge his valuable assistance in this connection.

The property belonging to the Corporation is in good condition. There have been a few necessary expenditures and repairs. The staff has been faithful and efficient in the discharge of their several duties. The Janitor meets all immigrant trains in uniform (the steamers when necessary), while the Matron, when notified of the expected arrival of women, girls and members of the Girls' Friendly Society, is prepared to meet them on arrival at station or on vessel.

We cannot close the Report without bearing record to the almost daily kindness extended to the Home in free advertisements for situations, etc., on behalf of immigrants by the City papers. The *Star*, *Witness* and *Herald*, the management of which have generously donated copies for the use of the inmates. Messrs. Lovell & Son have greatly facilitated our work by the gift of their valuable directory.

The C. P. R. and G. T. Railway System have continued their valuable assistance in advancing our work, which the Corporation gratefully acknowledges. It may be pleasing to the authorities to know the unvaried courtesy extended by their officials to our Secretary and Janitor. As also the several shipping companies, viz.: The Allan, Dominion, Beaver and Elder-Dempster Lines. Immigrants arriving by these lines have borne testimony to the care and comfort received. These companies have always helped us to return any special cases of sick or needy ones. Indeed, during the year we have received from the public nothing but courtesy and generosity in this special work of the Master and our Lord in the care of and provision for the stranger. There have been 818 newly arrived individuals, remaining for a short or longer period in the Home; an increase of 403 over the previous year. While there have been 1,360 inmates and an average number of 21 daily boarders, 21,263 meals have been supplied, a daily average of 58. Boys are charged from \$1.50 to \$2 per week, men \$3, children in arms free; 1,465 men have called at the office for information, seeking situations, etc., and a total of 2,097 visits during the past year.

The Corporation desire to note the care taken of the women and girls by the Matron in the Women's Department; 1,900 visits were paid to the Matron's office, an increase of 743 this year. There have been 618 applications for girls, while 70 have been placed in situations. The total number of women and girls from the tender age of 1 year and upward were 291. The Matron's influence with the women is beneficial, quiet in manner, firm yet gentle, and her gift of languages is most useful to the Home.

The Girls' Friendly Society retain the use of the room assigned to the members, who from time to time wish to occupy that apartment, and benefit by the privileges accorded them at the Andrews Home.

The Corporation desires to acknowledge the courtesy of the Dominion Government through the Superintendent of Immigration, who had noted with much interest our immigration work for the past year, and who had notified the immigration agents at Halifax and St. John of the Andrews Home as a Church of England Institution established for the purpose of assisting at the smallest cost the newly arrived immigrant, requesting them to commend the Institution to all who desire to benefit by such assistance and help.

Lord Strathcona has also been pleased to signify his satisfaction with the Annual Report of the Andrews Home, which he had read with much interest, and remarks, "which certainly is a record of much good work done."

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee are glad to be able to report a growing interest on the part of this Diocese in both Domestic and Foreign Missions. The Missionary meeting has ceased to be regarded as a mere effort to obtain money from a more or less unwilling people, in support of a work concerning which they knew little and cared less. The missionary gatherings during the past year, including two held by the D. and F. Society of the Canadian Church, have been thronged by men and women, who manifested an intelligent, enthusiastic and personal interest in the progress of the Kingdom of God among men. A readiness to go forth to the Domestic or Foreign part of God's great Field is steadily developing in the hearts of many, and gives cheering promise for the future. Dr. Minnie Gomery (a daughter of a clergyman well known in the Diocese), having graduated with distinction from Bishop's Medical College, has offered her services to the Church Missionary Society, and is now undergoing special training in London, England, in expectation of entering the Field in a few months as a Medical Missionary. Mr. Kristen Borup, who went out from Montreal to Uganda not long ago, and is largely maintained by the Woman's Auxiliary of the Church of St. Matthias, Westmount. Mr. Borup is proving a second "Mackay of Uganda" by his remarkable ability as a practical craftsman. He is mending watches, building chimneys and making doors for the houses, to the greater comfort of the missionaries, and the unconcealed admiration of the natives.

The number of those who thus take their place in the forefront of the Christian host has been well described as the *pulse* by which the vitality of the whole Body may be tested. If the Church is really healthy at home, it will be correspondingly strong abroad. We cannot too earnestly encourage personal devotion on the part of our young churchmen and churchwomen to the work of our glorious Master in our own vast North-West, or in that still vaster region which reaches out to the "uttermost parts of the earth."

Never before in the history of the world or God's Church has the "open door" stood ajar to such an inviting and almost universal extent for the entering in of the reapers of an Eternal Harvest as in this year of grace 1899. The nations of the earth stand as with open arms seeking the advent of a Deliverer, and awaiting the fulness of Redemption as alone found in the knowledge and religion of Jesus. Apostles, Evangelists, Pastors and Teachers have for years, since Carey, Martyn, Heber, Mackenzie, Patteson and Hannington led the way, been multiplying, and piercing the regions of darkness. Our generation beyond any preceding has in wonder lifted up its eyes and beheld fields white already to the harvest. The exclamation has been exacted, "What hath God wrought," and the Invincible Arm of Him who doth according to His will in the army of heaven and among the inhabitants of the earth (Dan. 4, 35) has been revealed in the signal rending of empire, and the marvellous impulses given to the Anglo-Saxon and Christian peoples for the leavening if not the conquest of the world. Christians of England and Christians of the United States have been roused (though inadequately) beyond prior experience. Funds have been contributed, and the living messengers stand awaiting the orders of the Church to give effect to their sacrifice upon the altar of duty expressed—"Here I am, send me." The discrimination and success of missionary societies have been accentuated in such testimony as that borne by the explorer Stanley in regard to some still labourers and those preceding, who wrote from Ugogo—"These Mission Societies certainly contrive to produce extraordinary men." Our own Canadian Church has made a beginning, and can rejoice in good men and true in icy regions or amid burning sands—clad in the

panoply of unfaltering zeal—inspired by love of Christ and souls. The Church in Canada is at this hour amid the critical fires of comparison, privilege and opportunity. Examples in Mother-Land and adjoining Republic inspire to a worthy participation in the great reaping. The Faith of sons in the field demands reinforcements and unstinted supply. Our spiritual descent argues robust devotion and unhesitating action. Material aid to exhausted home effort claims our attention in our fellows in the West, in new-comers by ocean liner and colonizing train. Nations sitting in darkness and the shadow of death touch the keenest sensibilities of Christian hearts. Our great Dominion Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society—comprehensive of every member of our Communion—opens an effectual door to every worthy helper, and the Church in Canada needs a double measure of Pentecostal fire and life within Her bounds and to far-off nations of the globe. Your Committee would urge a more hearty and largely increased co-operation with the great Societies—the S. P. C. K. and the S. P. G., and the C. M. S., while not forgetting the members of our household of Faith in the missionary jurisdictions of the West. The Bishop of London has lately said: "God has called every member of the Church to share in the responsibility which He has committed to it. . . God left Himself, so to speak, in the hands of men. . . God leaves His purposes now in our hands, yours and mine."

Your Committee are constrained to express regret that, owing to lack of funds, the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada should be unable to take up and send out as its own representatives such candidates as Dr. Minnie Gomery and others, who are moved to offer themselves for missionary work. Your Committee cannot forget that it is (under the Constitution of the Provincial D. and F. Society) the Corresponding Committee for this Diocese of the Board of Management of that Society, and that part of its duty is to report all statistics and other information relative to general missionary work, and it would express the hope that all items of information of this character from the different parishes and missions of the Diocese, and statistics as to work done and contributions made, be sent as frequently as possible between the meetings of Synod to the Chairman of the Committee.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON DUNHAM LADIES' COLLEGE.

It is safe to say that among the educational interests of the Church there are none that can be more confidently commended than those which surround the Diocesan School for girls at Dunham. It is well that the Synod should know how prosperous and generally satisfactory is its present condition, apart from endowments, which alone can secure its permanent success.

The capacity of the building is taxed almost to its utmost in providing accommodation for an increased number of pupils, there being thirty-two resident at present writing—there are also twenty-two day scholars. The buildings are in good order, and the grounds kept with sufficient care to have won the \$100.00 prize offered by the Committee of Public Instruction. The receipts for the term ending December 1st were \$2,000 and over, and showed a balance of some \$180; but certain expenditures were made intended to cover the whole educational year, so that, unforeseen circumstances alone excepted, we confidently look forward to having a balance at the end of the third term of perhaps \$1,000.

As the Institution is in need of endowments for the sustenance, improvement, and, in the near future, enlargement of the fabric, so it is highly desirable that more bursaries should be established, bestowable by the Bishop on deserving would-be pupils, who otherwise could not afford to avail themselves of the benefits of the College, and also competitive scholarships to be worked for by pupils.

The Executive Committee will not be satisfied until the cost of Education and board per capita is brought down to the level of the ordinary Convent school charges, that so invitingly abound in our midst, and which continue to have the effect of drawing away our young girls.

With a view of securing the best possible system of Institutional Bookkeeping in connection with the financial carrying on of the affairs of the College, Mr. Plimsoll, a public accountant, has visited the College, and, in a verbally expressed interim report, states his approval of the way in which the records of the finances are being carried on.

We learn that the Bishop of the Diocese was able to be present at the June distribution of prizes, and that he declared himself again very warmly interested in the welfare of the Institution.

A good Library would prove a great boon to all concerned in the class work of the College.

Your Committee would hail with no ordinary pleasure the prospect of Dunham Ladies' College becoming in a true sense Diocesan,

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The most remarkable event in connection with the history of education during the past year has been the debate in Provincial Synod upon the subject of Religious Education in Public Schools of this Ecclesiastical Province. Among the many interesting points brought out in the course of the debate, two call for special mention in this report. First, there was a very strong feeling expressed in favour of securing for the children in these public schools the very largest possible measure of definite religious instruction and training; and, second, that in the Province of Quebec the children of the Public Schools enjoyed many of the advantages of religious education which the clergy were labouring to secure for the children in other Provinces.

And in this connection it may be well for us to bear in mind that, while we may be favourably placed in this Diocese in reference to religious education, we should be ready to co-operate with those who are endeavouring to secure similar advantages in the schools of other dioceses.

Dunham Ladies' College and Sabrevois College, the only educational institutions reporting to this Synod, are making satisfactory progress, as will appear from the reports made direct to Synod.

There are several other educational institutions in the Diocese having a more or less distinctive Church character, but which have no direct connection with this Synod. Several of these institutions are doing excellent work for education generally, and in the interests of the Church.

So far as we are able to learn, the scheme of Religious Education prescribed by the Protestant Committee of the Council of Public Instruction for the Protestant Schools of the Province is being carried out with a fair degree of success.

In this matter very much depends upon the sympathetic co-operation of the people of the districts in which the schools are held.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EVANGELIZATION OF JEWS IN MONTREAL.

Your Committee beg to report that during the past year a deputation from the London Society for Promoting Christianity amongst the Jews visited Canada, including in its visitation the City of Montreal. The deputation consisted of the Rev. Mr. Flad, Missionary to the Jews in Tunis; the Rev. Frederick Smith, of long experience in the work of the London Society, and his daughter, Miss Litt-Smith. Sermons were preached in several of the city churches by the clergymen of the deputation, and excellent addresses were given to ladies and children by Miss Litt-Smith. Public meetings were held in the Synod Hall and in parish school-rooms, and fresh interest awakened in the hearts of many in the welfare of God's ancient people. Your Committee held a conference with the deputation, as a result of which we are unable to suggest any further steps at the present time in regard to the Jews in Montreal beyond those taken by private individuals. We, however, earnestly commend our Jewish fellow-citizens to the sympathy, love and faithful prayers of all true Christians, with a view to the removal on both sides of long-standing prejudice. "Pray for the peace of Jerusalem; they shall prosper that love thee."

nection with our Church, was obliged to narrow its sphere of operation, owing to lack of means, and a year ago decided to limit itself henceforth to educational work only. As members of the Synod we were pleased with this decision, because we believe that our French Missions should be regarded in the same light and placed on the same level as English Missions.

With reference to educational work, we are glad to report satisfactory results. At the last annual competitive examinations for the A. A., for dentistry, and at the McGill Normal, the pupils of Sabrevois College attained, as usual, a very high position indeed. At present the College is in a better position than it has been for years. The proportion of French pupils is larger this year than it has been since 1886, when the present Principal was appointed. Interest has been awakened, and friends have come to the assistance in a tangible way at the most opportune time.

Last spring the contributions in Montreal far exceeded those of the previous years. We regard this as a good omen. A collecting agent has been lately sent to England in order to raise funds for the removal of the financial liabilities which have so long embarrassed the work.

Your Committee would also express the hope that, in connection with the efforts now being made to re-establish the financial condition of the Sabrevois College Work, other suggestions aiming at proper representation of the Synod itself on the Managing Committee and in the Society, and also for representation of the other Diocese of this Ecclesiastical Province therein, may ultimately be adopted.

We have pleasure in stating that the Rev. R. Lewis, of Maitland, Ont., has recently donated \$500 to the work of the Sabrevois Committee. We regard it as a very pleasing duty to express our sincere thanks to the donor, and we hope that other generous churchmen, animated by the same spirit, will also follow the example of that kind gentleman.

3. The strangers from the Mother Land are looked after by the Rev. J. F. Renaud, Chaplain of the Andrews Home.

4. Strangers who are patients in our hospitals have been regularly visited in the past by the Chaplain, the Rev. Canon Evans. The Rev. E. McManus now holds the position of Chaplain.

5. Your Committee feel strongly that there must be a great leakage of the young Churchmen and women coming from the country because of their neglect to obtain letters of introduction from their clergy. When the question was debated in Synod it was stated that one reason why such letters were not given more frequently, was because the country clergy did not know to whom they should be sent. Your Committee, soon after the said debate, sent cards to every country clergyman, requesting him to address such letters to the Rev. E. McManus, and stating that he would notify the city clergy. He received very few replies to this invitation—only three last year.

6. Your Committee suggest that members of the Provincial Synod be instructed by this Synod to have the question of a system of inter-diocesan cards brought into use, by which members of the Church removing from any one diocese to another may be similarly introduced. They are of opinion that the American Church has such a system.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUPERANNUATION.

Your Committee beg to report that 32 of the Clergy are entitled to rank upon the fund through having complied with all the conditions of the canon, and 14 are qualified through having availed themselves of the canon as amended in 1884, making the total number qualified 46. Thirty-five are disqualified through being in arrears of subscriptions to the fund, and 24 are disqualified through being in arrears of both subscriptions and collections for the fund. The whole as per subjoined lists:—

Your Committee further beg to report that they have carefully considered the following resolution referred to them by the last Synod, viz.:

That the creation of a Widows and Orphans Fund and a Super-

annuation Fund has for its end solely provisions for those whose circumstances demand this source of income, and it is desirable that this feature of these benevolent benefits should be incorporated into the respective Canons of these two important Funds. This Synod desires the respective Committees of these Funds to mature recommendations for presentation to the next Synod expressive of the limitations needful.

Your Committee beg to report thereon as follows, viz.:—

That it is highly improbable that any legislation such as suggested by the resolution can be made retroactive.

That such cases as would be affected by such legislation are likely to be extremely few.

That, in any case, so long as the Canon contains the clause it now does, making it compulsory for all clergymen, on being licensed to the cure of souls in the Diocese, to become subscribers to the fund, it would be impossible to enact any legislation which would enforce the idea of the resolution.

Your Committee would express the hope that, if any cases exist or arise where persons with independent incomes are entitled under the Canon to become beneficiaries upon the Fund, such persons will be found ready to forego their rights in the general interests of the Church, and of their less highly fortunate brethren.

REPORT OF UNIVERSITY AND SCHOOL OF BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE (FOUNDED 1845), TO SYNOD OF MONTREAL, JANUARY, 1899.

The session of 1897-8 closed with an attendance in the Faculties of Divinity and Arts of 60 students, though as many as 69 had been on the list at different times during the year. As a result of the year's work the following degrees were granted in course at the annual Convocation on June 30, 1898:—

B.A., 13; 6 of which were in honours, 3 in classics, 3 in mathematics, the others in various optional combinations.

Of these 13 graduates, 4 have returned this year for their Divinity course, 2 have been accepted as candidates for Holy Orders by the Bishop of Nebraska, one is being employed as lay-reader in Labrador, and two are studying medicine.

The degree of M.A. in course was conferred on 9 Bachelors, and that of M. A. *ad eundem* on one Cambridge and one McGill graduate, and that of B. A. *ad eundem* on two Cambridge graduates.

The Honorary degree of D.C.L. was conferred on Rt. Rev. Bishop Niles, of New Hampshire; on Rev. Principal Grant, of Queen's College, Kingston; Hon. W. B. Ives, M.P.; Sir James D. Edgar, Speaker of the House of Commons; Rev. T. W. Fyles, the eminent naturalist; Robert Tilley, Esq.; and Rev. Prof. Scarth.

In addition to these, 10 candidates (8 male and 2 female), were, during the session ending with the spring of 1898, admitted to the degrees of C.M. M.D., and the degree of M.D. *ad eundem* was conferred upon three gentlemen.

The degree of Doctor of Dental Surgery was also conferred on three graduates in dentistry.

Of the Divinity class of that year, 3 have been ordained, and are serving in the Dioceses of Montreal, Ottawa and Niagara respectively, one is engaged as lay-reader in Labrador (in addition to the graduate already referred to), 2 are temporarily employed as masters in grammar schools, the rest have returned to complete their course.

The first or Michaelmas term of the present academical year opened under circumstances of difficulty and sorrow. The suddenness of the attack by which our beloved Principal was prostrated—the time of its occurrence—a few days before the opening of term, as well as its character, rendering any approach to him on the subject of business impossible, might well have resulted in most

disastrous consequences, had it not been for the energy and unanimity with which the friends of the College, both within and without its teaching staff, rallied to its aid, and combined their efforts to meet the emergency.

Even as it is, considering the suddenness with which we were deprived of the directing influence of a head so untiring in its activity, and so comprehensive in its capacity, we can hardly hope to escape some sort of check in the progress (at all events as regards numbers) which has been unbroken during the past few years. We look earnestly—and we feel assured not in vain—for the support and encouragement of our friends in this city and Diocese, in our efforts to maintain our position as an institution seeking to be a means of promoting the welfare and increase of the Church, and of sound knowledge.

The number of students in attendance during the past term (the first of the session 1898-9) in the Faculties of Divinity and Arts has been in all 64. The term closed with an attendance of 59. Of this number 31 are avowedly in course of preparation for Holy Orders.

In the Faculty of Medicine, including the Dental College, the present attendance is about 100.

In B. C. School the number of boys last term was 117, making a general total of persons under instruction of (about) 276.

Our work during the past term has gone on regularly, and with fair success.

A little delay in supplying the Principal's place in the work of the Mathematical Chair was of course unavoidable; but valuable and timely aid was rendered to us in the interval by one of our own graduates in this department, Rev. H. A. Dickson. From a large number of candidates the Council at length selected Mr. W. J. Rusk, a graduate in first-class mathematical honours of Toronto University, and Fellow of his college, having also a teaching record of marked distinction. By the middle of October he had entered upon his work, and, in efficiency as well as personal character, he seems to have amply justified our selection.

In other departments the work has been steady and satisfactory. As former reports have shown, our efforts for some years past have been directed towards widening the scope of our course. We have now, besides the three honour courses of Classics, Mathematics and Theology, six optional courses open to those whose attainments just fall short of qualification for honours. These are modern languages, Philosophy, Theology, History, Natural Science, Law. The

first of these, Philosophy, including Political Science, as well as Logic and Psychology, has this year been much enlarged, in the hope of developing it ere long into a regular honour course, and it has been placed in the hands of Mr. L. R. Holme, Hulsean Prizeman at Cambridge, a lecturer of eminent power and success. This new departure has received what may be called its "inauguration" in a lecture on Political Science, delivered by that distinguished authority on this subject, Sir John G. Bourinot, Clerk of the House of Commons, who kindly came to us for the purpose in October last. The occasion was further celebrated by a special Convocation, in which the honorary degree of D.C.L. was conferred upon him.

We have again secured the services (as assistant lecturer in classics) of Mr. J. S. Brewer, an honour graduate of Cambridge, who is also a member of our Divinity class.

I may mention that, in accordance with the strongly expressed recommendation of our French lecturer, the "Gouin method" of teaching that language has been adopted for students of the first year.

The work of providing instruction in the Art of Teaching, and the preparation of candidates for the higher diplomas in this branch, has for some time been before us as an object to be aimed at. The Principal had in his mind plans for putting such a course in operation during the present session. His illness has inevitably deranged those plans, but I am now in the course of correspondence with Dr. Robins, of the Normal School, who in 1897 gave us the great benefit of his personal presence and services in this department; and I have not yet given up the hope that something of the sort may be taken in hand even during the present session.

In the department of Divinity, the work has been much as usual. As is requisite in a Church institution, all our work is so planned as that every department may include a certain proportion of religious teaching. Our students, indeed, are far from being limited to members of our own Church. Yet, without shrinking from plain distinctive teaching, our instructors are careful to avoid harshness and severity of tone, and hence their teaching has not been found to have the effect of excluding or repelling such dissentient members. In the first year, instruction is given in the Old Testament in English, and in the New Testament in Greek; and in the second and third years in the same subjects, with the addition of Christian Evidences. Even those students whose work (as honour men) is limited otherwise to a single branch of subjects, are required to attend lectures, and pass examinations in portions of the Old and

New Testaments; and, although their marks in these last do not conduce towards their standing in the honour subject, it is gratifying to note that manifest interest is generally shown, and good work done, in the Scripture subjects.

As regards the Divinity class proper, we have in all 14 students occupied in Theology exclusively. Of these all but two are graduates, one of these two being shortly about to take the final examination for his degree at Oxford. Of the graduates, 2 are Cambridge honour men, the others our own. Of the 14, 11 are taking the ordinary L. S. T. course, the 3 others a special post-graduate course in honour theology.

The final examinations in Divinity are this year to be conducted by Rev. Prof. Body, D.D., of the General Theological Seminary, New York, late Provost of Trinity College, Toronto.

On the provision for special training in the devotional habit, as well as exercise in the delivery of addresses on spiritual subjects, etc., as afforded in the Divinity House, it is not necessary that I should dwell, nor yet on the proceedings of the College Brotherhood of Readers, with their meetings for prayer and conference, nor on the voluntary associations for missionary and devotional purposes among the students at large.

The supervision of the Arts Building, as regards its internal discipline and order, is exercised by Mr. Holme, who resides within it, and who has succeeded in maintaining a very satisfactory degree of discipline, without sacrificing the goodwill and confidence of the students among whom he lives.

I am happy to report substantial progress towards the completion of the College Chapel, all its windows having been filled with stained glass (chiefly through the generosity of the Bishop of Quebec and the Hon. Senator Price), the whole representing a complete series of Scripture subjects. A new lectern-eagle has been added, and also a set of altar rails of polished brass, the latter the gift of D. E. Wilkinson, Esq., the father of our Professor of Pastoral Theology. A handsome mural tablet, also of polished brass, in memory of our late munificent benefactor, J. H. R. Molson, Esq., has also been placed in the Chapel by our Chancellor, R. W. Heneker, Esq.

We have to record with deep thankfulness the fact that we have at length been enabled to fulfil the conditions required by the S. P. C. K. as necessary to qualify ourselves for its donation of £1,000 sterling to our Jubilee Fund. This donation has now been paid over to us, and by its means our Principal's Salary Endowment

Fund and Mountain Pastoral Theology Professorship Fund have been raised to the degree of completeness required by the Society, viz., respectively, \$20,000 and \$25,000.

Under the will of the late Robert Hamilton, Esq., the College has inherited a bequest of \$25,000; this sum, together with his former donation to the Jubilee Fund, making up a total benefaction of \$45,000. A proposition has recently been made by the Bishop of Quebec to the effect that, in recognition of his long course of noble and systematic generosity in the Church's service, an effort be made to provide a substantial memorial to him, and that this memorial should take the form of an enlargement and improvement of the College building in the Arts department.

Plans of the proposed improvements have already been made; which will not only afford the needed internal accommodation, but will add greatly to the external appearance and character of the College building. The total cost has been estimated at about \$15,000, towards which the Bishop of Quebec and the Hon. Senator Price have each promised a contribution of \$2,000.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE SCHOOL.

The following notes are furnished by the Headmaster with regard to this department of the institution:—

The School opened for the work of the year on September 18. There have been 114 boys on the roll, of whom 45 were new-comers, showing an increase of 18 over last year, when the total number at any one time was 96.

The health of the School has been good; the conduct of the boys has been generally excellent.

The Headmaster is assisted by a staff of six masters, five of whom are resident. There is also a short-hand master, and a resident instructor in drill and gymnastics.

The new appointments in September were those of Mr. F. B. Grundy (Univ. of London), and Mr. W. E. Patterson, B.A. (Bishop's College), as assistant masters.

The result of the examinations held in December shows that much satisfactory work is being done, and in some cases it approaches a degree of excellence that has not been reached for some years past.

My Lord and Brethren of the Clergy and Laity,

Your Committee was convened on the 16th day of January, 1899, when the following reports were submitted to the meeting:—

MONTREAL DIOCESAN BRANCH OF THE GIRLS' FRIENDLY SOCIETY.

(Secretary, Miss L. Mudge.)

This Society has a membership of over 200, including Associates. There are 4 branches working steadily in the city in connection with St. George's, St. Jude's, Grace, and St. John the Evangelist churches. The latter branch receives special mention for marked progress during the year.

The hope is expressed that the work of this Society may become better known in the country in order that girls coming into the city from the rural districts may be encouraged to take advantage of its protection and privileges.

REPORT OF THE ROBERT JONES' CONVALESCENT HOSPITAL.

(Per Miss Bond, secretary Ladies' Committee.)

This Institution reports very fully, going into the smallest details. The results are very gratifying and amply justify the existence of the Hospital.

The number admitted has so far exceeded the average of former years. This fact indicates that the benefits of the Institution are more appreciated as they become better known.

PRISONERS' AID.

As the admirable report of this Association is already published, we call attention to these leading figures.

Number of released prisoners helped, including old cases, 161; got work through the Society directly or indirectly, 47; meals given, 358; night lodgings, 305; number of visits on behalf of released prisoners, 747.

MONTREAL WOMAN'S AUXILIARY.

Mrs. Everett, the recording secretary, reports greater enthusiasm and better results. The number of Diocesan branches increased to 61; number of new life members, 5. For various mission objects outside the Diocese, the Diocesan Board is pledged to the sum of \$467. 88 bales have been sent out; 71 to the North-west, 17, including Christmas trees, to Missions within the Diocese.

THE HOSPITAL CHAPLAIN.

Your Hospital Chaplain has, during the year, visited the Montreal General Hospital 111 times; the Royal Victoria Hospital, 115 times; the Homoeopathic and Civic, 47 and 50 times respectively, making in all 320 visits to hospitals. There were between the two large hospitals 1080 bedside services and 1359 friendly visits to patients, in all 2439 visits to patients. In the wards of the two smaller hospitals, on 262 occasions there were religious exercises. In the larger hospitals the Holy Communion was administered 15 times, and the funeral service was read 15 times. The duties of Hospital Chaplain becoming now a part of the work of the City Missionary, and your Chaplain being now relieved of it, he takes this opportunity, while gratefully acknowledging the amazing goodness of Almighty God in preserving him during those fifteen years of service, when often exposed to danger from contagious diseases, of bearing testimony to the never-varying courteousness, kindness and urbanity of the officials of those hospitals, which came under his care. He desires also to bear record to the faithfulness of the St. George's Y.M.C.A. These young men ever held up the hands of your Chaplain, and were the source of the greatest comfort and strength to him, and more particularly in the parts they always have taken in the Afternoon Services at the General Hospital.

Rev. Thos. Everett, Chaplain of Western Hospital, has visited that institution 120 times during 1898, and hopes to continue the work and call at the Hospital at least twice each week during 1899. Rev. Rural Dean Sanders, secretary of Church Home, reports the presence in the Home of 17 elderly ladies, members of the Anglican Communion, who fully enjoy the comfort and protection to be found within its walls.

RURAL DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

My Lord,

The 38th annual meeting of the Rural Deanery of Bedford was held at Farnham, on Thursday, January 5, 1899.

The Holy Communion was celebrated at St. James' Church at 10 o'clock, immediately after which the members of the Chapter assembled at the Rectory for the transaction of business.

The parochial reports, a summary of which I have the honour to transmit herewith, will furnish your Lordship with general information of the present state of the Deanery, which, I think, may be fairly characterized as one of substantial and healthy progress. This is further substantiated by certain details of work done which are not embodied in the scheduled reports, and which I am happy to bring under your notice.

(1) A Parish Hall, valued at \$1,000, has been built at Abbotsford.
 (2) The Rectory at Bedford, which was in a very dilapidated condition, has been thoroughly repaired and renovated at a cost of about \$700.

(3) Several improvements have been made in the Church property at Dunham, including the erection of a new barn, re-painting of the Rectory and outbuildings, a new wire fence in front of the Rectory, and other repairs.

(4) A furnace, costing \$165, has been placed in the Rectory at Farnham, and a stone wall put up in the rear of the graveyard.

(5) Great improvements, including a new and handsome porch, have been made in the Rectory at Stanbridge East, through the efforts of the Ladies' Guild.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The condition of our Sunday Schools was discussed at the Deanery meeting, and a proposition to hold a Summer School for S. S. Teachers at Dunham, in the month of August, met with general approval.

DUNHAM LADIES' COLLEGE.

The "Church School for Girls" at Dunham continues to vindicate its existence by the excellence of the education given and its increasing popularity. The attendance during the past year has steadily grown from term to term, and the pupils have won a high place in the Provincial examinations.

MISSION OF UPTON.

There is one dark spot in our generally prosperous Deanery—the Mission of Upton—in which, owing to removals and financial reverses, our congregation has been reduced almost to a vanishing point. During the past year the Missionary in charge, who resides at Milton, has served the few Upton people without any remuneration whatever from them, and there is apparently no disposition on their part to contribute anything to his support. I respectfully submit that the condition of this mission requires the serious consideration of your Lordship and the Executive Committee.

CLERICAL CHANGES.

Since the commencement of the year, the Rev. William Harris has assumed charge of the Rectory at Stanbridge East, and the Rev. W. C. Bernard, M.A., has very recently been appointed to the Rectory of St Armand West, vacated by the Rev. A. C. Wilson, who has been transferred to Malone, in the Diocese of Albany, N. Y. Both these clergymen have been heartily welcomed to their new spheres of labour, and the prospects of the work under their direction are very bright.

RURAL DEANERY OF BROME.

My Lord,

The Annual Chapter of this Deanery was convened in the parish of Sutton in the first week of the year. Owing, however, to the difficult and dubious state of the roads, the attendance was but small, and, owing to the fact that but five Returns had been received, the business arising from them was likewise on the meagre side. The following points were, however, considered as being of sufficient importance to find express mention.

The attention of the Chapter being drawn to the benefaction made by the late W. A. Bickford to the Church of the Good Shepherd, Glen Sutton, by the donation of five hundred dollars to be added to the Endowment Fund of that Mission, his act received our warm commendation and the expression of the hope that others under God's Providence might be led to "go and do likewise." Mr.

Bickford was but a simple farmer, one of that large class that has done so much for this section of our country by dint of manual labour, joined with industry and perseverance. Mr. Bickford in his later years there worked for the love of Christ and His Church. To His Ministers he grew reverent, and, as far as it lay in his power, generous also. Finding his life's ending not far off, he called his pastor to his side and gave him the sum above mentioned, and enjoined on him to have it invested forthwith. His pastor did so as soon as possible, but, on his return from the Synod office, the soul of W. A. Bickford had been called away, and as we may assuredly hope, to hear the commendation of the Great Head of the Church "Well done, good and faithful servant, enter thou into the joy of thy Lord."

IMPROVEMENTS.

From the following Missions a few items of expenditure for improvements have been forwarded as worthy of mention:

1. The Rev. I. Lackey, in addition to the donation mentioned above, reports that the work of the Church continues active. The Sunday School musters well, and is well attended to. The Ladies' Aid Guild still work with a will and with an object, which, just now, is the reduction of the debt incurred for the renovations and repairs on the church. There remains now but a very small debt. He reports that the interest in the Church Services at West Potton is improving. Being at one time altogether under the influences of the Advent sect, the Church's ministrations were regarded as something undesirable and needless. This prejudice is wearing away. An organ has been placed in the West Potton Church, largely by the generosity of Messrs. Willis & Co., of Montreal, who, while not quite donating it, put it down at a nominal sum which would bring it within the ability of the few Church adherents to meet.

2. The Rev. G. A. Mason reports that a wire fence has been placed around certain parts of the Church property in Iron Hill at a cost of twenty-five dollars. In West Brome the church shed which had been thrown down by a storm was re-erected at a cost of fifty dollars, and the church itself re-painted at an equal cost.

3. The Rev. A. Buckland, lately appointed to Eastman, makes report that the church building at East Bolton is rapidly falling into decay, and, as there are no families belonging to the Church within the sound of its bell, he requests to be allowed to take it down and have it re-erected at or near the Shonyo School house, where he has now at regular times quite a congregation. But whether the place he mentioned is the best place to remove the church to, supposing he is permitted so to do, is a question open to discussion, and a matter on which the Deanery Chapter might make investigation if it were duly brought before it; so far it has not.

The Missionary meetings were held in this Deanery during the month of October. The weather was all that could be desired, the deputations were efficient, and each member put in an appearance, and the meetings were made interesting. The Rector of Waterloo and the Incumbent of Iron Hill took one section of the Deanery; the Rural Dean, the Rector of St Mark's, Newport, Vt., Rev. Alex. Crone, and Mr. B. Heeney, of the Diocesan Theological College, took the other. The largest meetings were at Glen Sutton and Eastman. As might be expected, the evening meetings were in all cases better attended than those held at other hours. The changes in the Deanery have been few. The Rev. E. P. Judge has taken the place vacated by Rev. F. A. Pratt, and Rev. A. Buckland having received Deacon's orders has been put in charge of Eastman. The Chapter gave a hearty welcome to both, and wished them God Speed in their work.

Owing to the tardiness, from sickness and other causes, of the incoming of the Parochial Reports, I have not been able to draw up any comparison of the work done or the state of the Church in this Deanery, with that of five years or ten years ago. And perhaps it is just as well.

RURAL DEANERY OF CLARENDON.

My Lord,

There have been two meetings of our Deanery during the past year. A short meeting was held at Hull on January 17, for the formal hearing and adoption of the Deanery Report before the meeting of Synod, at which there were present nine of the clergy.

The twenty-eighth regular and annual meeting was held at Aylmer on the 11th and 12th days of May, at which eight of the clergy were present. The first day of our meeting was occupied by discussing matters connected with the Deanery, and the second day partook more of a devotional character.

I. CLERICAL CHANGES.

We have to report a great many clerical changes during the past year, and regret the loss of some of our most faithful clergy, who have removed to other parts of our Diocese.

The Rev. J. L. Flanagan, who left the Mission of Thorne and Leslie, has been succeeded by the Rev. F. W. Barnes. The Rev. C. Boyd, LL.D., who resigned the Mission of Wakefield, has been succeeded by the Rev. J. H. Bell. The vacancy created by the Rev. J. H. Bell leaving the Mission of Alleyne, has been filled by the appointment of the Rev. T. W. Ball, M.A.

The vacancy created by the appointment of Rev. Alex. Elliott, of Eardley, to St. Stephen's, Montreal, has been filled by the appointment of the Rev. W. Weaver. The Rev. A. B. Groulx, having resigned the Mission of River Desert, has been succeeded by the Rev. R. C. Brewer, the former missionary, who has been re-appointed to his old charge.

The Rev. W. A. Fyles, B.A., having been appointed to the Church of the Redeemer, Montreal, has been succeeded in the Parish of Onslow by the Rev. H. Plaisted, M.A., of Portage du Fort; which parish in turn has been filled by the appointment of the Rev. R. Warrington. We are glad to welcome to our Deanery the Rev. J. J. Lowe, who has been appointed by Your Lordship, Assistant to the Ven. Archdeacon Naylor, of Clarendon. The Rev. F. W. Barnes, having resigned the Mission of Thorne, has been succeeded by the Rev. C. Lummis.

II. MISSIONARY WORK.

The Rev. A. B. Groulx reported having visited five lumber camps, meeting in all about 180 men, of whom 15 were Protestants and the rest chiefly French Roman Catholics. He stated that he visited the depots once a month.

The Rev. J. H. Bell and Rev. J. A. Flanagan visited ten lumber camps, containing on an average 40 men each, about 400 men in all; of these twenty per cent. were Protestants. Services were also held at two private houses en route, twelve services being held in all. One of the shanties contained 70 men, and was termed "The Protestant Camp."

Literature was distributed in the different camps, and the journey occupied twelve days.

Missionary meetings have been held in most of the parishes and Missions of our Deanery, special deputations having been appointed. There is a general feeling, however, that the members of the Church do not seem to rise to the realization of their privileges and responsibilities in the matter of attending missionary meetings.

III. S. P. C. K.

The former secretary (Rev. A. Elliott) having left the Deanery, the Rev. J. W. Bell was appointed in his place. The Archdeacon stated that the secretary of S.P.C.K. in England had sent a letter expressing their gratification with our Deanery, which had been the only one in Canada to take up an annual collection on its behalf. The appointment of Rev. H. Gomery as general agent of the Society in Canada has stirred up a fresh interest in its work.

IV. WORK OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

A meeting of the Deanery branch of the Diocesan Sunday School Association was held at Aylmer in October, at which several of the clergy and Sunday School teachers were present.

The reports from the different Sunday Schools of the Deanery were very encouraging. The Association seems to be exerting a good influence in promoting better and more systematic methods of teaching. As statistics are given in the report of the Diocesan Sunday School Association, it is unnecessary to go into particulars in this our Deanery Report.

V. SPECIAL RESOLUTIONS.

1. That the thanks of the Deanery be tendered to those who visited the lumber camps.

2. That this Deanery, taking into consideration the present state of the Widows and Orphans and Superannuation Funds, would strongly recommend that changes be made to increase the capital of these funds.

This Deanery desires to place on record its sense of gratitude for the bequest of \$10,000 by the late Mr. Robert Hamilton, to the Diocese of Montreal, for Missionary Work in the Gatineau District.

VI. SPECIAL PAROCHIAL REPORTS.

1. *Aylmer*.—The Rev. R. F. Taylor reports that the church is in good repair, and that \$100 have been expended in completing cellar and chapel in the basement. The wardens have in addition expended \$200 on repairs of rectory and sheds.

2. *Aylwin*.—The Rev. W. E. Kaneen reports, in way of improvements, the removal of one of the vestry rooms at St. James' Church, Wright, which has been converted into an organ and choir chamber. He also reports the reduction of debt on St. Stephen's from \$100 to \$50.

3. *Alleync.*—Rev. T. W. Ball reports that the following improvements have been made during the past year: The gallery has been painted and driving shed shingled.

4. *Bristol.*—Rev. J. M. Coffin reports the following improvements: Parsonage dining-room floored, wainscoted and painted, and cellar renovated. St. Thomas' Church—A stone font, crimson altar cloth and matting have been donated by friends during the past year, also new windows on both sides of the church, artistically finished in amber, blue and crimson glass, which adds very much to the appearance of the church. The roof has also been painted during the past year. St. Barnabas—A bell has been purchased and belfry erected. Matting has also been provided during the year. St. Luke's Church reports \$21.65 collected for Church Improvement Fund.

5. *Chelsea.*—Rev. A. A. Allen reports that, as several hundred dollars have been expended on the church, parsonage and outbuildings during the last three years, there is little to report. However, he reports new partial flooring in wood-shed, more of the solid rock removed from around the premises, interior of parsonage re-painted and re-papered, and many improvements made in parsonage grounds.

A union House of Worship has been built at Kirk's Ferry for the summer residents from Ottawa, and by special request dedicated or set apart by the Incumbent of Chelsea for purposes of a sacred nature.

6. *Clarendon.*—Ven. Archdeacon Naylor reports:

(1). St. Matthew's Church, North Clarendon, was taken over last spring, and is being worked as part of this parish, with the assistance of Mr. J. A. Poston, student, during the summer; and now with the assistance of Rev. J. J. Lowe, L.S.T., Bishop's College. The St. Matthew's congregation have placed a good toned organ in their church this summer, which Mr. Poston was greatly instrumental in getting, and they have made an excellent beginning with the weekly envelope system for stipend.

(2). St. Paul's Church, Shawville,—The grounds have been improved by the erection of an iron fence of very neat design along the street in front of the church.

(3). St. Alban's Church, Parkman.—This church, begun last year, is now nearly complete internally, and was opened for continuous use July 14, 1898. It has been built almost entirely by the voluntary work of the people, and, were all the benefactors to be named, the list would include nearly every man, woman and youth in the neighbourhood. Two beautiful brass Rochester lamps have just been put up as the gift of Mrs. W. H. Smiley, of Kazubazua, whilst the oak lecturn now being made is the gift of Miss Ethel Bond. We are also indebted to Miss Maggie Thompson, of Portage du Fort, for skillful needlework.

The financial affairs of the parish are improving, and the missionary offerings and other offerings have been more liberal than last year.

7. *Eardley*.—Rev. W. Weaver reports the following improvements: Church furniture and interior of church varnished, table and chair provided for vestry, kneeling stools for chancel, platform for reading desk, and step for outside of vestry door.

8. *Hull*.—The Women's Guild have added to the Re-rooting Fund, and we hope to proceed with the work this spring. The verandah of the rectory has also been painted, which improves its appearance. A new stove has been purchased for Sunday School, and a few other minor improvements have been made. I am happy to report also an increased attendance at Sunday School.

9. *North Wakefield*.—The Rev. J. H. Bell reports many improvements, among which we may mention especially those in connection with the parsonage. The interior has been greatly renovated and improved by the painting of the walls, ceiling, etc. The cellar has been enlarged and completed by additional excavation. A new hot-air furnace has been placed there at a cost of \$120.00, which will be a great comfort in providing a proper means for heating the parsonage. The incumbent (this I say as Rural Dean) has been instrumental in building a barn and stable which is quite a model of convenience and neatness. Fifty dollars in cash have been expended on the erection, besides materials given. A woodshed and porch have also been added to the kitchen. In all this work he has been assisted by the willing hearts and hands of his people. Matting has been provided for the Masham Church, and other improvements made in connection with the church buildings. I must also make mention of the great improvements made in clearing the glebe land of stumps and stones, which is an arduous task, and has added greatly to its appearance and value. Thirty days' labour was given in the re-clearing and cleaning up these seven acres of glebe land.

10. *Portage du Fort*.—As many improvements have been made in this parish during the last few years, there is not much to report. The incumbent reports, however, a fund amounting to \$150 towards bricking the church at Bryson.

11. *River Desert*.—Rev. A. B. Groulx, the late incumbent, reports a few improvements made in the painting and plastering of the Mission House. Rev. R. Brewer reports that \$120 has been paid on account of principal on the new church lots, of which the cost price is \$300. There is still a debt of \$180 due, with 7 per cent. interest, which is compounded, and two years to pay it in.

The statement with regard to new Church Building Fund is as follows:—Collected by Rev. A. B. Groulx and deposited with Synod, \$109; donation by Ladies' Aid, \$35.31, to which may be added \$29 held by Mr. Groulx, making a total of \$163.31. As there are some church families leaving River Desert, and the mission is endeavoring to raise money towards the Building Fund for new church, and the instalments falling due on the church lots, the incumbent expresses his wish to contribute all they can to the Mission Fund, and hopes that the Committee will be satisfied that their assessment remain at \$25 for a period of two years until things may improve.

In concluding the report of the Deanery of Clarendon, I would express a hope that there are signs of an era of better temporal prosperity for the Church in the regions of the Gatineau and Upper Ottawa. However, this is not the most important thought to have in mind. The chief thing is whether our dear old Church is striking her roots ever deeper in human souls and bearing fruit to the honour and glory of her Divine Lord.

The number of candidates presented for the Apostolic rite of Laying on of Hands, their earnest and reverent demeanor, the large number of communicants, and the hearty services in the well-filled churches during Your Lordship's last visitation, may, we humbly trust, be in some degree an index of a deepening in spiritual life, and of our people stretching out their hands unto God.

The following report of the Rural Dean was adopted as that of the Deanery, &c., &c.:

In reviewing the Church's work in the Deanery of Iberville, we are constrained to thank God and take courage for the future. Owing to the many changes that have taken place in the Deanery, the Statistical Report is of necessity defective, and, in some instances, fragmentary.

In addition to the statistics above referred to, we are pleased to report that most successful meeting of the Deanery branch of the Diocesan Sunday School Association was held last June in Clarenceville.

At our last annual meeting, the Rev. W. C. Bernard and the Rural Dean were appointed a committee to visit the Missions of Edwardstown, Havelock, Franklin Centre and the Parish of Hinchinbrooke, to confer with the incumbents and people upon the question of the better adjustment of their boundaries in the interests of the Church.

Your Committee carried out their instructions, and the result of their mission is embodied in the following resolutions adopted by the respective vestries after due notice had been given of the meeting.

1st. Hinchinbrooke.—Moved by W. L. Burns, and seconded by Dr. Monk, That, in the estimation of this meeting, it is not thought advisable to make any change at the present time in the Parish of Huntingdon and Hinchinbrooke.

Franklin Centre.—Moved by A. W. Rowe, and seconded by T. Platt, That, in our estimation it would be most desirable that the Franklin Centre Mission, in the best interest of the Church in this part of the Deanery, become part of the Parish of Ormstown, at such time as the Bishop may see fit to decree the same.—*Carried unanimously.*

Havelock.—Moved by R. Buchanan, and seconded by J. Waddell, That, in the estimation of the congregation of Havelock, the question of the re-arrangement of the Missions of Havelock and Edwardstown be left altogether in the hands of the Bishop, and, if he sees his way clear to unite Edwardstown and Havelock, the people of this place will make no objection.—*Carried unanimously.*

Edwardstown.—Moved by O. Bastin, and seconded by A. Sever, That the people of the congregation of St. Matthew's Church, Edwardstown, do leave the question of the re-arrangement of the Missions of Edwardstown and Havelock entirely in the hands of the Bishop.—*Carried unanimously.*

We are pleased to report that the Bishop has effected this re-arrangement at a saving to the Mission Fund of two hundred and seventy-five dollars per year.

IMPROVEMENTS.

The Rev. J. J. Roy reports that the church in Sabrevois has been painted and decorated at a cost of \$150, and a memorial window placed in the church at a cost of \$160.

The rectory at Ormstown has been greatly improved, also a wood shed and horse barn built at considerable cost to the Parish. The church in Valleyfield will shortly be opened.

CHANGES.

The Rev. T. B. Jeakins having resigned the Parish of Huntingdon, Rev. W. R. P. Lewis, B.A., was appointed to succeed him; the Rev. A. D. Lockhart having resigned, the Rev. J. I. Strong was appointed to the Rectory of Ormstown; the Rev. W. C. Bernard, M.A., having resigned, the Rev. Seth Mills has been appointed to Lacolle Parish; the Bishop has appointed the Rev. W. J. M. Beattie to the Mission of Valleyfield, and the Rev. J. A. Poston to that of Edwards-town and Havelock.

One hundred and sixty-five dollars is the amount of debt reported in the Deanery. All the Church property is reported insured.

In our humble estimation, the Church in the Deanery was never better prepared or equipped to do the Master's work. God grant to all grace to be faithful.

RURAL DEANERY OF SHEFFORD.

My Lord,

I have again the honour to report the proceedings of the Deanery Chapter for the current year.

Archdeacon was passed by a standing vote, he being through continued sickness unable to be present with the Chapter.

Annual statistical reports were presented by the Chairman and discussed one by one. The tone of all of them was more encouraging on the whole than in previous years.

CHANGES.

There has been but one change in the personnel of the Deanery—that caused by the resignation of Archdeacon Lindsay from the important Rectory and charge of Waterloo and Frost Village, which he had served with such signal success and unremitting devotion for a period of.....years. Rev. T. B. Jeakins, late of Huntingdon, has succeeded to his labours and is working to sustain the level of this large parochial field.

SALARIES.

It is very satisfactory to be able to report that the clerical salaries, though in some cases a long way below the canonical mark, and miserably inadequate as a remuneration for missionary work, faithfully performed, have been this year promptly met on the part of the congregations. Arrears were reported from only two missions, and these so small that they are hardly worth considering, especially as by the time this report is printed we expect confidently that they will be paid, if not before.

Considerable arrears of \$138.17 have been paid by the congregation of West Shefford (which had been allowed to accumulate for former years), chiefly due to the energy displayed by the present staff of wardens.

By a reference to the accompanying table of statistics it will be seen that the salaries paid during the year to the incumbents of North Shefford, Milton and South Stukely have been respectively \$550, \$535 and \$460, instead of \$600, \$600 and \$700, which is by Canon of Synod the minimum that should be paid.

SUMMARY OF STATISTICS.

Below I offer a comparative statement of statistics and sums raised during the years 1897 and 1898, in regard to the leading items concerning which Your Lordship's questions are sent out for reply. In Church families, adherents and communicants, will be found a

small increase, as also in Sunday School scholars, Church property endowments and general solvency, and a small decrease in the number of new communicants, baptized, confirmed, salaries paid and in amounts collected for the different mission funds. The apparently large decrease in the Diocesan Mission Fund collection is due to the absence of special effort, such as Your Lordship's appeal drew forth last year, and the decrease in the amount raised for general purposes and the grand total is due to the extra amount expended last year in the erection of the Memorial Hall in the Rectory of Granby.

RESOLUTIONS.

The Rural Dean undertook to secure from the Chancellor an opinion as to the duty of recording burials in consecrated grounds, when deaths have occurred elsewhere—by resolution of the last Chapter meeting.

It was moved that the Deanery recommend to the Synod the desirability of its issuing to the clergy, for use in their vestries, a Record book of services, offertory collections, church attendance, preacher's name, sermon, text, etc., so that one uniform method might prevail throughout the Diocese in a particular which is deemed most important to the accurate and full compilation of parish statistics.

IMPROVEMENTS.

In Granby great improvement is reported to have been made in the removing and re-building of the church and rectory grounds, fencing and re-levelling about the church and Memorial Hall approaches. A new library had also been built in the Hall, and nearly 300 new books installed therein. Sixteen of the glebe building lots have now been leased, producing a rental of \$312.50 per annum and a "Johnson Trust Fund" created by deposit with the Synod of sums amounting to \$700.00, arising from the sale of some of these lots. The new Church Building Fund amounts this year to \$107.12, and a new Organ Fund to \$70.30.

An effort is being made to buy a bell for Fulford Church, the fund amounting to \$55.00. For the use of the Churches in West Shefford and Fulford a grant of Ancient and Modern Hymn Books has been made by the Society, and the young ladies of the parish have brought the grant (£2.00) up to \$21.00, and books have been secured to that amount.

North Shefford, Roxton and Warden.—A new wire fence has been placed around the church property at Warden, costing \$40.00. In repairs to the parsonage, \$30.00 have been spent. New Hymn books (ancient and modern) have been placed in the church at Roxton, and the ladies have added about \$40.00 to their Lecture Hall fund.

Milton.—Here the church shed has been re-roofed at a cost of \$30.00, and repairs to stable and fencing of glebe effected for \$14.00. Nothing further has been done in the matter of a new parsonage, \$250.00 being promised a year ago by the people themselves. A guarantee to raise \$25.00 towards the clerical salary has been given by the people of Canaan.

At South Stukely the parsonage has been partly re-shingled, a new east verandah made and some repairs effected on barn and stable and painting done on parsonage.

FRENCH WORK.

Nothing has been attempted in connection with French Evangelization work, except that, for a few months during the summer, Mr. Antoine Parent, a young confirmer of Sabrevois Mission Schools, has been doing a colporteur work in the Deanery, working from Granby and Waterloo as centres, and receiving a salary through the generosity of a Church-woman known to your Lordship. The result is in Higher hands and cannot at present be estimated.

We have been visited officially by Rev. Mr. Lariviere, principal of Sabrevois Schools, who has greatly interested our congregations

by the sermons he preached in behalf of the French work, and our people contributed very liberally to his forcible appeals.

RURAL DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

My Lord,

I beg to submit the statistical returns for 1898, together with the following report:

The annual meeting of the Rural Deanery was held at Lachute on Monday, January 16. The attendance was, for several reasons, smaller than usual, only four of the ten parishes being represented. Reports have been received from all the parishes, and are, on the whole, very satisfactory.

During the past year some changes have taken place among the clergy. Rev. R. C. Brewer has been transferred from Mille Isles to the River Desert; Rev. J. W. Dennis resigned St. Andrews, and has been appointed to Mille Isles; Rev. A. E. Mount, who was obliged through ill health to resign North Gore, will shortly go to St. Andrews. We welcomed amongst us the Rev. S. H. Mallinson, appointed to Grenville about a year ago.

The Rev. R. F. Hutchings, of Arundel, received the assistance of a student during the summer, thereby enabling him to minister more efficiently to the scattered members of his very large mission. He is grateful for the grant made for that purpose. The appointment of a lay reader in Grenville is of great benefit, as the rector can once more take up the services in Belts' schoolhouse.

It is pleasing to learn that the Government has at length consented to sell to the Grenville parish its house on the bank of the canal which has for many years been occupied by the rector. The formal transfer has not yet been effected, but the congregation have already made necessary repairs and improvements by repairing and painting the verandah, by putting a new galvanized iron roof on the house, by putting in a new cistern and also a furnace. All this has involved much effort and considerable expense. Grenville may be congratulated upon the good results accomplished. The congregations at Calumet and Grenville have each erected a large and much-needed horse shed.

At Shrewsbury, in the Mission of North Gore, the young men have manifested praiseworthy energy by building an addition to the parsonage to serve as a study.

In the Buckingham Parish much work has been done. The Ladies' Guild have purchased an organ for St. Thomas' Church, while the grounds about the church have been considerably improved, and repairs on the church are about to be made. At Buckingham, the horse shed has been rebuilt and the parsonage entirely renovated at a cost of some \$300. The prospects for a new St. Stephen's church are considered encouraging, and it is expected work will be begun in the spring. The parish received from Messrs. Clowes & Sons, of London, a grant of Hymns, Ancient and Modern, to the value of \$10.00.

The Deanery, by resolution, expressed sincere regret that, through ill-health, Canon Empson felt obliged to resign his position, which means a distinct loss to the Church in this diocese.

The Deanery would again record its thanks to the Woman's Auxiliary, of Montreal, for the help rendered many of our missions this Christmas.

The returns made do not call for special comment, but they show the steady, faithful work of the clergy.
