## AN UNWANTED WAIF

Although representatives of the Canadian and Provincial Governments assembled at Ottawa to consider the question of unemployment, no concrete results were attained, judging from the official announcements of the findings of the Conference. Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, the Great War Veterans Association and many other public bodies in Canada have, for the past few years, been urging the Governments of Canada to serious ly consider the problem of employment, under-employment and unemployment. At the last Session of the Canadian Parliament a resolution was adopted whereby the Canadian Government was committed to a policy of devising ways and means to deal effectively with the problem. Mr. Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, expressed the views of the Canadian Labor Movement on this Conference when he declared in a statement to the Press:

"Judging by press reports, very little definite action has re sulted from the Dominion-Provincial Conference on Unemployment. The responsibility for dealing with the unemployment pro blem during the past two or three years has been made a football among municipal, provincial and federal authorities. Now this conference has adjourned, apparently satisfied that their duty to the unemployed workers of Canada has been fulfilled by passing a resolution expressing the pious hope that industry will adopt this unwanted waif as its own.

"With employers making general demands for longer work ing days, thus limiting the number of workers required, aud sometimes, there is every reason to believe, restricting production in order to prevent a break in prices, it is difficult to see how much relief is to come from that particular source.

"Perhaps more than is expressed in the resolutions for pub lication really was decided upon at the secret sessions of the conference, from which results may come at a later date. 
