# DIOCESAN CONSTITUTION

OF THE

## QUEBEC BRANCH OF THE WOMAN'S AUXILIARY

1. This Association shall be called "The Quebec Diocesan Branch of the Woman's Auxiliary to the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England in Canada."

2. The objects of this Association shall be: To awaken missionary zeal among the church women in the Diocese; to diffuse missionary intelligence; to raise money for missionary objects, and to encourage the formation of Parochial Branches throughout the Diocese.

3. All women who shall contribute 10 cts and upwards, to the funds of the Auxiliary annually, either through the Diocesan Branch or a Parochial Branch or as individuals, shall be considered members of this Association, and shall be entitled to vote at all general meetings. Each Delegate shall have two votes, one for her Parish and one as a member.

4. The Executive Committee of the Diocesan Branch shall consist of a President (who shall be the wife of the Bishop of the Diocese,) Vice-Presidents (who shall be the Presidents of the Parochial Branches) a Treasurer, a Secretary, an Assistant-Secretary, a Dorcas Secretary, a Literature Secretary, the Editor of the Leaflet, the officers of the Parochial Branches and a delegate from each Branch, provided always that if the Bishop's wife declines to accept office, the President shall be elected at the Annual Meeting.

5. The Diocesan Branch shall be the medium between the Parochial Branches and the Woman Auxiliary to the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions.

6. The Parochial Branches shall report Quarterly to the Diocesan Branch, and the Treasurer of each Parochial Branch shall be required to send to the Diocesan Treasurer, at least one week before the Annual Meeting, a Statement of all amounts of money or clothing, &c., sent by her Branch since

the last Annual meeting through the Diocesan Parochial Branch Secretary as soon as possible after the meeting of the Branch.

7. The Diocesan Branch shall be responsible for arranging plans of business.

8. The Annual Meeting shall be held in May, at which meeting the Treasurer shall be presented, and officers elected.

9. A Special Meeting may be called at any time by the President or any two members of the Branch.

10. This Constitution shall be read at the Meeting of the Branch, and at every subsequent meeting, present, notice in writing to be given at the meeting.

1. The President, Treasurer and Secretary shall be present at all meetings. The Parochial Branches shall be represented in all parishes of the Diocese.

2. The Secretary of the Branch shall attend all meetings of the Branch, prepare and read the minutes, prepare and read the reports of the Parochial Branches with all proposals for the support of Domestic and Foreign Missions.

3. The Diocesan Branch shall receive all offerings and offerings sent through the Parochial Branches and offerings sent through the Treasurer of the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions. The amount of the Quebec, such amount shall be determined by each Parochial Branch at the request of a Parochial Branch Secretary to the Diocesan Treasurer. The Diocesan Treasurer shall be responsible for the money so sent.

4. The Secretary of the Branch shall be the Secretary of the Diocese. She shall be responsible for the ensuing year, immediately after the meeting, notify her if any change

the last Annual meeting, either direct to any Mission or through the Diocesan Treasurer, and the Secretary of each Parochial Branch shall send an Annual Report to the Diocesan Secretary as soon as possible after the Annual Meeting of her Branch.

7. The Diocesan Branch shall hold four general Meetings for arranging plans of work, and for the transaction of general business

8. The Annual Meeting shall be held in May, at which meeting all financial reports shall be presented, and officers elected for the ensuing year by ballot.

9. A Special Meeting of the Diocesan Branch may be called at any time by the President, upon the request of any three members of the Branch.

10. This constitution may be changed at any regular Meeting of the Branch by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, notice in writing having been given at a previous meeting.

#### BY-LAWS.

1. The President, or one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings. She shall take the general supervision of the Parochial Branches and urge the formation of such Branches in all parishes of the Diocese.

2. The Secretary or Assistant-Secretary shall give notice of all meetings of the branch, record the proceedings of such meetings, prepare an Annual Report, conduct all the correspondence of the Diocesan Branch, and furnish the Parochial Branches with all possible intelligence concerning the work of Domestic and Foreign Missions.

3. The Diocesan Treasurer shall receive all subscriptions and offerings sent through her; and forward to the Secretary-Treasurer of the Board of Management of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society of the Church of England, at Quebec, such amounts, and for such purposes as may be determined by each Parochial Branch. Provided, that at the request of a Parochial Branch, money may be sent through the Diocesan Treasurer, direct to the purpose desired, the Diocesan Treasurer obtaining triplicate vouchers for the money so sent.

4. The Secretary of each Parochial Branch shall send to the Secretary of the Diocesan Branch, a list of the Officers for the ensuing year, immediately after the Annual Meeting, and also notify her if any change is made during the year.

BY-LAWS.

1. The President, or, in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents, shall preside at all meetings.

2. The duty of the Recording Secretary shall be to give notice of all meetings, and to keep a record of such meetings. She shall prepare an Annual Report; and send an Annual Statement of the work of the Branch to the Secretary of the Diocesan Auxilliary, at least two weeks before the Diocesan Annual Meeting.

3. The corresponding Secretary shall conduct all the correspondence of the Society, and shall prepare an Annual Report of such correspondence.

4. The Treasurer shall receive and forward to the Diocesan Treasurer all money offerings, and keep an account of all money and articles contributed for Missionary purposes. She shall present a monthly statement, and prepared and Annual Report to be presented at the Annual Meeting, and shall also send to the Diocesan Treasurer a yearly financial Report.

5. The board shall endeavor to increase in the Church a Missionary spirit; shall decide on the best methods of augmenting the funds; endeavor to promote in every way the efficiency of the Branch in its labor of love and mercy, by visiting the several congregations, explaining the objects of the Society, enrolling new members, and soliciting regular subscriptions.

6. In the interest of the Branch it is recommended that it should elect a lady, resident in Quebec, not already holding any office, to represent it at the business meetings of the Diocesan Branch and to vote on its behalf.

This lady may be chosen from amongst the members of the City Parochial Branches or from any ready to become such. She would be expected to be present at all the Diocesan meetings or to obtain notes of what may transpire at them, to advise her Branch of any subject to be voted upon and be prepared to give expression to its wishes upon the same. # JUNIOR CONSTITUTION

## MOTTO.

1. That all parishes of the Diocese of Quebec be urged to form Junior Branches of the W. A. subject always to the approval of the clergyman of the parish.
2. The Branch shall be called the (name of parish) Junior Branch of the W. A.
3. The objects of this Association are: To pray for Missions, to learn as much as possible about Missions, to work for Missions, to interest others in Missionary work, and to give to Missions.
4. All children may become members of this Association upon the payment of five cents Membership fee annually to the Treasurer of their Branch.
5. All members to be requested to use the members' prayer, have a member's card, and use, if any, the silver badge of the W. A.
6. The Officers of the Junior Branch shall be *at least* a Superintendent, a Secretary and a Treasurer. The Superintendent shall be a member of the W. A. if there is a Branch in the Parish, if not she may be nominated by the Rector of the Parish, pay an annual fee of ten cents to the Diocesan Treasurer, and so become a member of the W. A. The Secretary and Treasurer shall be elected annually from among the members of the Junior Branch.
7. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent to arrange the Meetings, prepare and oversee the work, provide interesting and simple Missionary intelligence, and read, or have it read to the children, and where practicable regular instruction given on Missionary subjects.
8. The Secretary shall enter the names of the members in a book, call the Roll, prepare an Annual Report and send it to the Diocesan Secretary for Junior Branches, at least two weeks before the Diocesan Annual Meeting.
9. The Treasurer shall keep a careful record of all money received and expended, and prepare a Report for the Annual Meeting of her Branch. Her books may be overlooked by the Superintendent at any time.
10. The Annual Meeting of the Junior Branch, shall be

held at least a week before that of the Senior Branch. The Junior Members to take part in the Senior Meeting as well, if they so desire.

11. This Constitution may be changed at any General Meeting of the Diocesan Branch, notice in writing having been given three months beforehand.

#### SUGGESTIONS.

That the following clause be inserted after Clause 7. List of objects for which to work having been obtained from the Provincial Officer for the Juniors (Miss Tilley), the Rector and Superintendent shall decide for which object the Branch shall work.

#### PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

You will remember, my dear friends, that last year, owing to  
the special services connected with the Centenary Celebration  
of our Church, we had, before our Annual Meeting, no Special  
Service of our own. But, to day we have gathered together in  
the Mother Church of our Diocese, have sought through our  
Lord Jesus Christ in the Holy Communion the special blessing  
of our dear Father in Heaven, while the Bishop has offered to  
us all his hearty greetings and has earnestly wished us God's  
speed.

To these Greetings of the Bishop, we who reside in the City  
of Quebec desire now to add ours to those who have so kindly  
come from a distance to confer with us for the common wealth;  
and we earnestly trust, that, while we gather some ideas from  
those who are working so zealously in the Townships we may,  
by our mutual conference, impart new life and new spirit to  
all our delegates, so that the work throughout the Diocese  
may grow and increase.

Our Meeting last year was held on the first day of Synod  
and two days before the Centenary Celebration of the Diocese  
of Quebec.

Little did we imagine at our last year's Meeting, what a  
High and Glorious Celebration it would be, in its Early  
Communion, in its Great Morning service of Thankfulness  
and Praise, in its Public Luncheon with the speeches of the  
Bishops and other public men, in the special convocation of  
the University of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, for the grant-  
ing of Hon. Degrees, and in the great Evening conversazione,  
with which our proceedings were brought, in all joy, to a  
most successful close, and now we have entered upon, and  
completed the first year of a second Century of our Diocesan  
Church life, and during this year there has occurred an Event  
fraught with consequences to the Church in the whole Domi-  
nion, and greatly affecting the position and character of our W.  
A. work—I mean the unification of the Church in Canada.  
For it is well known, that last September, there was held in

Toronto a General Synod, with duly appointed Lay and Clerical Delegates from all the Canadian Dioceses, and at this Synod the two existing Provinces and certain independent Dioceses were all united into one harmonious whole, with the most Rev. Dr. Machray, the Lord Archbishop of Rupertsland as our first Primate.

Hence it is evident, since a goodly proportion of our work has been done for the Church in the North West, that *now* and *henceforth* that work will be no longer Missionary work, done for those who are carrying on the battle of our Lord outside our Church in Lower Canada, but it is being done and will be done henceforth for Brothers and Sisters of *our own* Family and of our own House. This is a thought, which should spur us on in all our undertakings to even greater ardour and self sacrifice than ever before.

Indeed, there has been a suggestion made by our Provincial Board of Management to the effect that so important an event in the life of the Church in the Dominion ought to be marked by the W. A. in some special manner, by raising e. g., by a small special Subscription, from all members of the W. A., a sum of \$5,000 or more as a thank-offering of our Church's unification and blessed unity.

This large sum would arise from an average contribution of say 25 cents from each member of the W. A., and, since many would gladly contribute larger sums, these amounts would probably more than make up for the deficiency caused by the fact, that many of our members would not be able perhaps to give as much as the average sum.

The Plan is explained in the 1st page of the *March Leaflet*, and I hope, that at this meeting we shall arrange, as far as we are concerned in Quebec Diocese, for a good Thank-offering to be raised by the Woman's Auxiliary. But, in order that it may be a *true* Thank-offering with a continuous existence, may we not make the earnest suggestion to the Provincial Board Woman's Auxiliary, that the capital raised should not be spent *at once* and *soon forgotten*, but rather, that the \$5,000 or more should be invested under the name of the "Church Unification Thank-offering Fund," and only the interest of this sum (say about \$250 per annum) voted year by year by the Provincial Board to such purposes as may, from time to time, seem most in need. And now, my dear friends, allow me to lay before you a brief record of the work which we have been permitted, with God's blessing, to accomplish during the past year. And first of all, I would say there is one great part of our work which can never be counted or estimated, and that,

is the prayers which the members of the Woman's Auxiliary offer, and the result which is assuredly granted to those prayers. And there is also a second part which is almost as hard to reckon, and that is the continued and self-denying labours of a great part of our members.

For our work cannot be gauged by the money value of the clothing that is made for the Indians and others, seeing that the quiet influence of those who engage in such good works as these, is a most eloquent sermon to all around, and does more than all our outward work and gifts. But as to money, we know that, during the year ending to-day, we raised in the Quebec Diocesan Branch of the W. A. \$2,312.55; of this the Treasurer will give you a full account in her Report, and you will see how many hearts have been cheered and how many souls have been fed by all the various good works in which you, my dear friends, have taken so great a part. But although, we ought indeed to be thankful that we have been able to accomplish so much, yet we cannot shut our eyes to the fact that the needs seem to grow almost faster than our work. For instance, we have been asked to contribute towards the sum of \$1,000 needed for the noble work that is growing under the care of the Bishop of McKenzie River. Then again, the Rev. J. W. Tims asks for \$1,500 to pay half the cost of a school for fifty children now building at the South Camp of the Blackfoot Reserve: this school was undertaken at the earnest request of the Indians themselves. The Rev. H. G. Socken, Sarcee Reserve, also writes that his Boys' Home is threatened with having to close unless help to the amount of \$1000 is sent very quickly. The children now in the Home are getting on wonderfully, and many more are waiting to be taken in when the funds will permit. The Lord Bishop of Saskatchewan and Calgary has sent his sanction to both the above appeals, so that we know they are worthy of our help. And once more the Rev. F. Gough Brick, of Christ Church Mission, Peace River, in the Diocese of Athabaska, pleads earnestly for the Indians' schools which have to be carried on (as Bishop Young told us when he was in Quebec), without the aid of any Government Grant: and it is also certain that the work in our Great North-West, Japan, and other foreign fields are only flagging for want of sufficient funds. There is plainly more than ample room for the exertion of all our energies; and therefore, in conclusion, by way of being practical, I would venture to make the following suggestions:—

1. "That we should all pray more earnestly, using the *W. A. prayer daily at noon*. And if we would really pray, we must also learn to follow what is going on in the Mission Field. This we can do by reading some of the numerous Missionary Periodicals, which are constantly passing through our hands. And we ought to remember that unless we thus read, and so obtain some little insight into the great work that is being done in different parts of the world, we cannot continue to be interested and we are not likely to continue instant in prayer.

But if we become fairly well informed upon Missionary subjects, and if we constantly remember in prayer those who are working for God in Icy North and Sunny South, we are also certain to be the means of interesting others, and of leading them also to undertake some personal work and service for our Great Master and only Saviour Jesus Christ. Oh! let there be then more knowledge, more prayer, more work, more self-sacrificing giving, and more exertion of influence upon others. And let each one of us determine to lead at any rate one, and if possible more than one of our friends, during the coming year, to join our ranks, so that our work may be doubled, so that Christ's Kingdom may be, so far as we are concerned, greatly blessed and enlarged.....

## ANNUAL REPORT OF THE RECORDING SECRETARY

MAY 9TH. 1894.

During the past year we have had three Quarterly and five Executive Committee Meetings.

The Quarterly Meeting, held in Sherbrooke in October last, proved most helpful to all who had the pleasure of attending it; great interest in the work was shewn by those present, who were stirred afresh by the very able addresses delivered. Warm thanks are due to our friends in Sherbrooke for their very hearty welcome.

The Secretary has only received some of the Branch Reports, but hopes to have them all in before the Annual Report is printed.

There are twenty-six Senior Branches, one Sub-division, and six Junior Branches.

During the past year, three new Branches have been organized, viz; Stanstead, Cookshire Junior, numbering 32, and St. Peter's Junior, with a membership of twelve.

It is to be regretted that two Branches have been obliged to close: St. George's, Beauce, owing to a redistribution of the Parish, which has so reduced their numbers, that they have thought it better to discontinue work for the present; and Bourg Louis, which claims that, owing to the increased Assessment to the Diocesan Board they are unable to assist the Mission work.

A Junior Constitution has been adopted, and Mrs Carpenter, of Richmond, appointed Secretary of the Junior Branches.

In June last, it was arranged that Miss Sngden should visit Quebec, and give a lecture on her work amongst the women of India; through some mistake she only arrived here in July so was too late to hold a Meeting.

She however visited some of the Branches in the St. Francis District, where she was most warmly received, and obtained very substantial help.

At our Quarterly Meeting in January we had the privilege of a visit from the Bishop of Athabaska, who gave a graphic account of his work, and told how best we could help him and his people.

In the same month he addressed a meeting in the Church Hall, under the auspices of the W. A., and again told of the noble work he and his little band of helpers are doing.

Later on in the year, we had the pleasure of hearing the Revd. G. Rogers of Ruperts' Land, whose very interesting illustrated lecture on work amongst church people in the Diocese to which he belongs, was much appreciated.

As most of the Diocesan Branches of the Woman's Auxiliary send in to the Provincial Dorcas Secretary an estimate of what has been spent on new material and freight during the year, we have adopted the same plan.

To meet some of the many appeals, which have reached us, it was agreed that each of our Branches be asked to hold an entertainment, the proceeds to be devoted to meeting these appeals. Many of the Branches have responded, and the Treasurer has a sum of money in hand, which we will have the pleasure of voting away to day.

It is with regret that we record the death of several members of the Woman's Auxiliary, and the removal of many from this Diocese.

Early in the Summer, arrangements were made for the coming of Miss Sugden to some parts of our Diocese, and her visit was much appreciated by those who heard her tell the sad tale of the suffering of the women in India.

In the month of September, Revd. W. A. Burman wrote, announcing that the Government was taking over St. Paul's Industrial School, so that our assistance, regarding the salary of a Lady Missionary there, would be no longer required.

A vote of thanks to Miss Mellishe for the faithful and successful work, done by her at St. Paul's and congratulations upon her marriage were forwarded to her, at our request, after the October Quarterly Meeting. Close upon this followed an urgent appeal from Revd. H. G. Stocken for a lady Missionary for his school of Sarcee girls. It having been ascertained that Niagara was willing to transfer her share of our joint arrangement to Mr Stocken, this Branch decided to do the same, and with the cordial approval of the Bishop of his Diocese (Calgary), Mr Stocken has appointed Mrs Canning, matron of the Boys' Home, and Miss Foley that of the Girls' Home, dividing the salary between them.

## TREASURER'S REPORT

# EIGHTH ANNUAL MEETING

For the first time since I never been your Treasurer I have to report a slightly retrograde motion. No doubt something of this is due to the prevailing depression, but I fear we cannot lay the whole of the responsibility upon the "hard times," as the greatest falling off is in our town congregations and chiefly in the largest branches.

I trust that the tide is now at its lowest ebb and that another year there will be every reason for thankful rejoicing for a bountiful supply to carry on the work God has given us to do. Freely we have received, surely we should also freely give, good measure, pressed down and running over.

Contributions from the country branches have, on the whole, increased, and some of the branches have done wonderfully well, when the number of their members is considered.

I am thankful to report that we have not failed in keeping any of our engagements. St. Paul's Industrial School in Rupertsland having been taken over by the Government we have transferred our grant for a Lady Teacher, to the School on the Sarcee Reserve; but, there having been delay in appointing a teacher, I have not yet made any payment to Mr. Stocken for that purpose.

The grant of \$50 has also been paid as usual to Mr Hinchliffe, for the Home on the Piegan Reserve.

I am glad to say that the fund for the support of our own lady Medical Missionary to Japan was, after a season of depression, again revived; and I have been enabled to send the \$150 promised, and was obliged to draw only \$18.45 from the Foreign Mission Fund to supplement the direct subscriptions to his fund.

We have in the accounts this year gifts, in varying sums, for every Diocese in the North West besides Algoma. Would it not be better if we concentrated our interest more and gave generous and substantial aid to a few Dioceses instead of trifles to all?

When the Bishop of MacKenzie River was here, the Auxiliary, as a body, and also as individuals, was full of enthusiasm; and though we did not actually pledge ourselves to *continue* our gifts to him, I feel sure that he inferred (and with very good reason), that we should not forget him and his distant Diocese. But alas! new comers pleaded eloquently too, and I fear our old friend, not being on the spot, is almost forgotten and I have but \$20, to send him against \$147 last year.

To the Bishop of Athabaska I have sent \$72, and to the Revd. G. Rogers of Ruperts Land for the Mission Fund there, \$54, which amount was collected at the Meeting held when he was here. Far be it from me to wish to turn a deaf ear to any of those devoted Missionaries or to refuse to help them; but I strongly deprecate the somewhat childish way of *dropping* one to take up another.

The Missionary's daughter that our branch has been educating brings her School days to a close this year.

She has been the special care of the Misses Penny in London, with whom she has boarded, and our kind friend Mrs Boomer, to whom we owe so much, has been like a mother to her. The three years that she has spent at school in London, have been, I trust, profitable to her in every way and to us there has been nothing but pleasure; not one jarring note has disturbed the perfect harmony of our intercourse throughout those three years. We were, I fancy, particularly fortunate in the selection of a girl, who appreciated to the full her advantages, and exerted herself to make the most of her opportunities.

Miss Sugden's visit to some of the branches roused our women to exert themselves to help the women of India, and I had the pleasure of sending to the Treasurer of the Church of England Zenana Missionary Society, \$118.06, nearly three times as much as we sent last year. As I have kept the accounts open until the very last moment, I am obliged to

present them before they have been audited ; but that will be done before they are sent to the printer,

Mrs Scarth, President, and the Secretary were sent as delegates from our Branch to the Annual Diocesan Meeting held in Quebec in June last—one of the Vice-Presidents (Mrs Adams) was also present at that meeting.

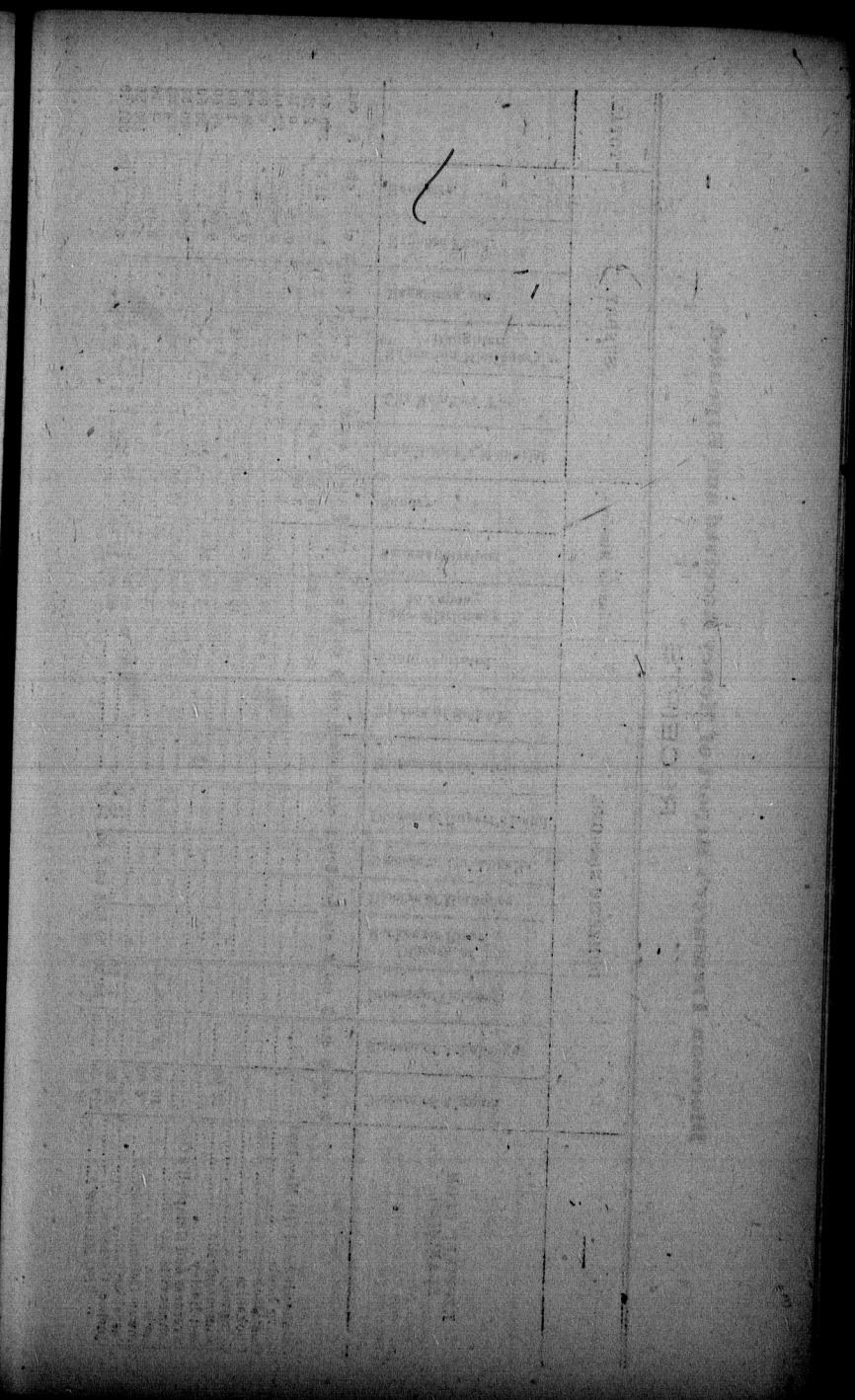

### SUGGESTIONS FOR FORMING BRANCH

Many seem to be under the impression that only the Clergyman's wife should start a Branch and become it's President. Though sometimes very desirable, this is not at all necessary, and often the Incumbent's wife is already over-burdened with other duties; while many able women in the congregation have far more time to devote to the work, but do not know how to start it.

Consult your clergyman and, having gained his consent, and acting under his authority, write to the Diocesan Secretary asking for helpful papers, member's cards &c., &c. Should it be desired, a request may be made for a visit from one or more members of the Diocesan Branch. After studying the papers and being clear on all points, make a careful canvass of the parish, asking each individual woman to join, or at least to attend the first meeting. Ask the clergyman to give notice of this meeting on the previous Sunday and to urge all women to take part in the movement. Divine guidance should be asked on opening the meeting; then the letter from our Honorary-President should be read, as it explains the objects and privileges of the work of the Woman's Auxiliary so beautifully and so clearly. Enroll Members. The officers should then be elected, choosing those most fitted for the office, regardless of social position or wealth. See Parochial Constitution, page 5, for further instructions. Each Branch is at perfect liberty to make its own arrangements as to how the funds are to be raised, the work done, and how often the members shall meet, &c., &c. All the Diocesan Branch asks from them is a Report (however short) for each Quarterly Meeting, and one for the Annual Meeting, giving an account of all that has been done during the year. Though there may be but little to say, these Reports keep the Branches in touch with the Diocesan Branch and make the members realize that they are not units but sister-workers, with thousands of others in our great Dominion, all striving to do their Master's work by strengthening the hands of those who are carrying the gospel message "to all nations." Another link that binds us together is the membership card which each member should possess. This card has the name of the member, that of the President of the Branch to which she belongs, the motto of the Quebec Diocesan Branch, "Ye have done it unto Me," the motto of the whole Canadian Woman's Auxiliary, "The Love of Christ constraineth us," and above all the prayer which is

used in all the different Dioceses, so that our petitions for a blessing on our work ascend as one to the Throne of Grace. This prayer was compiled by our Honorary-President, Mrs Williams, as embodying the two prayers formerly used in the Missionary Litany issued by the D. and F. M. Society, for use at their meetings.

At the Triennial Meeting of 1892, it was decided to ask each member to use this prayer at noon every day.

The Diocesan Secretary will gladly give any assistance desired at any time, either by letter or in person. Her expenses will be paid by the Diocesan Branch.

The Dorcas Secretary conducts all correspondence concerning the clothing.
