The young man gave a supper to a number of friends at which the guests were as far as possible. Several times during the evening Ravevez cried: "This is nothing but a big surprise is awaiting you at the end."

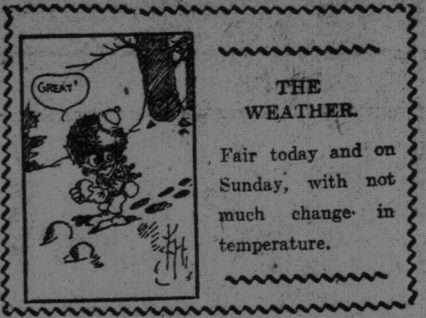

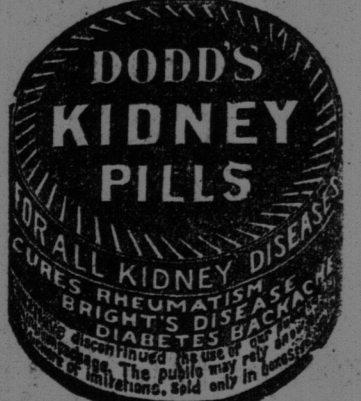

BLACKSOD BAY PROJECT MOVING

Still Hopeful of Fast Atlantic Service via Irish Port—What C. N. Armstrong Says. (Montreal Herald). That the Blacksod Bay fast line project will be pushed through is the opinion of Mr. C. N. Armstrong, who has just returned from Great Britain, and after spending a couple of days in Montreal, left for New York last night. "The syndicate which has it in hand," said Mr. Armstrong, "is making time for a couple of weeks awaiting the passage of a bill granting them bonuses. They have a charter for a railway from Colborne, the junction point of the three railways at Blacksod Bay, about eighty miles. They are now awaiting the passage of the bill granting them a subsidy for the road. If they get it, however, they will go ahead with the building of the railway. "The grant promised by the government is £130,000, and the counties of Sligo and Mayo, through which the line would pass, will have also promised financial support."

WILL ARGUE IT IN THE COURTS

Legal Proceedings Follow Engagement of Team of Entertainers for Cameraphone Show. A case for the courts has developed out of the engagement of Bixley and Holcomb, a singing and dancing team, to take part in the cameraphone entertainment in the Opera House several weeks ago. The team arrived here to take part on the programme but a dispute arose and they did not appear. They retained J. A. Barry to look after their interests, and in connection with the matter L. E. Acker, of Halifax, was arrested here last evening on a bailable writ for some \$155. Mr. Acker came here yesterday from Halifax and it was reported that he intended to open a vaudeville theatre in the former Every Day Club hall, but this he denied last night, saying that he was en route to Bangor. The arrest was made about 7:30. Bail was secured and he was released. Mr. Barry said last night that Bixley and Holcomb had been engaged through Mr. Acker to perform at the cameraphone show. They claimed the engagement for ten days, but on reaching here they were informed by the management that the engagement was for only four days. Because of this they did not make their bow to the public. Mr. Barry said the claim is for \$130 for the ten days and a sum to cover expenses during the time they were here in excess of ten days. H. J. Smith is representing Mr. Acker. Bixley is Robert Dohy, of this city. Mr. Acker said last night that Bixley & Holcomb had no claim upon him; that the manager of the cameraphone entertainment had telephoned to him at Halifax and asked him to recommend a singing act, which he did, and that he telegraphed Bixley & Holcomb to come here.

BRING IN THE SETTLERS

The interview with Mr. C. A. Duff-Miller, which the Times prints today should be read by all the people, but with special attention by the members of the legislature which is soon to meet in annual session. Mr. Duff-Miller puts his finger on the weak spots of our immigration policy. There is a lack of judicious expenditure, a lack of handy literature, a lack of reasonable effort to get at the right kind of settlers.

MATTERS POLITICAL

At Ottawa business is being attended to with a diligence that promises an early close of this session of parliament. The estimates are going through without factional opposition, and as much of the time as possible is being devoted to government business. This may give the men with private bills, but doubtless time will be found for a reasonable discussion of such of these bills as are of real importance.

HOPEFUL INDICATIONS

One of the hopeful signs of the times in St. John is the deeper interest taken by an increasing number of men in matters relating to moral and social reform. For example, the members of a men's bible class in one of the smaller churches of the city last evening considered this subject, and will take it up again next Friday night, with special reference to what the church can do to improve social conditions. Among other questions considered and to be considered is that of providing something to take the place of the saloon as a social centre for men. The relation

of the individual citizen to such questions as the drink evil, the spread of tuberculosis, habitable tenements, the general appearance of the city, the unemployed, playgrounds for children, and others affecting the health and welfare and productive capacity of the people was touched upon at the meeting referred to, and the men present manifested a deep interest in the subject.

This, as the pastor of the church remarked, is practical Christianity. It has to do with the world we live in and the people who are our neighbors. The feeling was expressed by some speakers that the churches did not endeavor as they should to get hold of the persons most in need of the sympathy and help which marked the earthly life of the founder of the Christian religion—that they were too much a social centre for those who are well-dressed, well-fed, and well-to-do. This was not said in a spirit hostile to the churches, but as a criticism from men who declared that good movements should originate in the church.

The more men can be induced to come together and face seriously the question of personal responsibility for undesirable conditions around them the more certain it is that reforms will be instituted. Now and then one hears a pessimist assert that the world grows worse, and that work for social betterment is largely wasted. Nothing could be farther from the truth. The history of mankind in the past. The thoughtful student of history, comparing present conditions with those of a few centuries ago, sees how far we have travelled on the upward way. The steady evolution of the race is apparent, when a broad view is taken.

WOMAN SUFFRAGE

The New York Evening Post gives some business reasons in support of woman suffrage. We quote: "Suffragists make use of the woman taxpayer who is not allowed to vote, as a standard illustration of the injustice of the present system. Yet there must be hundreds of thousands of women who do not pay taxes, but whose rights to the present business organization. There are, for instance, women stockholders in corporations. The latest report of the New Jersey Board of Statistics of Labor and Industries show that out of 2,132 manufacturing establishments in that state, 64.3 per cent. are owned by corporations, numbering in all 73,452, no less than 24,338 were women. Say that, in addition, one-half of the beneficiaries for whom stock is held by 4,300 banks and trust companies, were women, and we see how large a property interest these have in New Jersey's incorporated capital. What voice have such owners in the shaping of New Jersey's corporation laws? About the same that married women have in the shaping of insurance laws that are designed primarily for their and their children's protection. Better than shedding tears over the wrongs inflicted by hostile legislation upon the widow and the orphan, would it be to give the widow and her daughter a vote with which to combat such legislation."

**CLASH OF WORLDS
A FAR OFF DANGER**

**Professor Pickering Takes Issue
With Dr. Lowell as to Menace
of Dark Stars**

Cambridge, Mass., March 11.—Professor William H. Pickering, of the Harvard astronomical observatory, asserted this afternoon that the chance of a collision between the sun and some large dark body, as recently described by Dr. Percival Lowell, is remote.

Dr. Lowell is giving a series of lectures at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In concluding the first of these he graphically described a possible end of the world. He pictured space as fairly swarming with dark stars, which were a menace to the solar system. Contact with one of these dark stars would disrupt the solar system, destroy the sun and the earth and form new nebulae. Professor Pickering admits that such dark stars exist, but holds that to represent them as fairly swarming in space is incorrect.

"The chance of a collision," said Professor Pickering, "is about one in one hundred million raised to the one millionth power, which even to only one slightly acquainted with mathematics means that such a collision is highly improbable."

"A more possible danger, but nevertheless a highly improbable one, is that the solar system in its journey through space may come close enough to some such dark body as to cause a disturbance in the orbital motion of planets, and perhaps carry some of them, the earth included, into space. The entire danger is so remote, however, that there need be no popular apprehension about it."

**NO RACIAL MIXTURE
SAYS HARVARD HEAD**

**Dr. Eliot Opposes Inter-marriage
of Irish, English, Germans,
Italians, Jews and French**

Montgomery, Ala., March 11.—"There should be no admixture of race stocks," declared Dr. Eliot, president of Harvard university, in an interview. "I believe, for example, that the Irish should not intermarry with the Americans of English descent; that the Germans should not marry the Italians; that the Jews should not marry the French. Each race should maintain its own individuality. The experience of civilization shows that racial stocks are never mixed with profit and that such unions do not bring forth the best and strongest children. There is no reason, however, why the races cannot live together side by side in perfect peace and amity."

"In the case of the negroes and the whites the races should be kept apart in every respect. The South has a wise policy. I believe that Booker T. Washington has the right ideas and that Dubois is injuring the progress of his race with his views."

He emphatically denied that he ever said that there was a suffrage problem in the North owing to the predominance of Catholics.

"In the North," he said, "we are afflicted in our civic life by having masses of voters who know nothing of liberty. Take the Irish. They say themselves that at home they had no experience at self-government. Our problem is to show the newer arrivals that it is to their interest to have sufficient government and not lavish expenditures."

But Did Not Like Original**

Vancouver, B. C., March 12.—Miss Annie Banderson, and her woman companion are today on their way back to England, and Fred Spearman, a young farmer of Delaware, the girl's spouse-elect, is trying to be philosophic over an expenditure of \$500, money forwarded to Miss Banderson to pay her passage across the ocean.

The coming of the English maiden was the result of a twelve months' fountainship courtship, set in motion through the machinations of a matrimonial agent.

After the exchange of many love-laden letters, matrimony was decided upon, and the girl forwarded her photograph and a request for \$500.

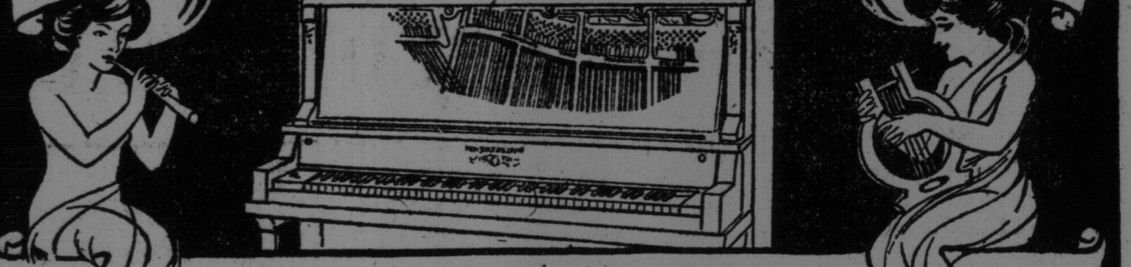
