



It were easief to pass through the eye of a needle than to force a way uninvited into the heavily-barred, closely-guarded, prison-like building in which the copper, silver and gold coins of Canada are made at Ottawa. The guard on duty, having satisfied himself by a brief scrutiny through a small wicket that the visitor is not an anarchist, swings the forbidding nimself by a brief scrutnly through a small wicket that the visitor is not an anarchist, swings the forbidding gate open on the order of the Deputy Master of the Mint, Dr. Bonar, and an assistant proceeds to initiate the inquisitive stranger into the mysteries of a business which it would be highly improper and dangerous for anyone to attempt to follow outside. There is no legal competition in the art of coinmaking. It is one of the monopolies that is protected by law. Money making is, of course, a different thing, but this is done not by manufacturing crins, but by trying to collect them after they leave the Mint. There are some people who go about musty cursoity shops picking up olds masters in rare china and furniture centuries old, but these are men who inherit the collecting craze from fathers who preferred current coin of the realm to old armor and tapestry when they made a lodgment with their bankers. made a lodgment with their bankers. The impression is prevalent at Ottawa that those who enter the Royal Mint have to walk about in bathing costumes, with their hands sanded; that they are weighed on entering and leaving, and their every movement dogged by a Cossack-like policeman bristling with daggers and shooting irons. There are no such embarrassing and exciting experiences in store for those who enter by the front gate. A tour through the Mint is as uninspiring as a visit to the Bankruptey Court, and less exciting than a five-cent show. There is no gold dust on the floor and no medals struck and presented in honor of the occasion.

Great accuracy is, of course, essential, but this is secured at the Mint by delicate weighing machines, which at the end of a day's work would record the loss of half a five-cent piece, and no one leaves the Mint until it is found. Some of the automati: balances record a weight as small as the one-thousandth part of a grain. Over or under weight coins an'd any that develop defects in the process of minting are rejected by automatic testers that display almost human intelligence in separating the good from the imperfect coinage. All coins rejected are defaced by a special stamping machine and returned to the melting pot.

But to return to the several processes. The Mint is divided into a mint office, where the raw material is received; a melting house, where the bullion is melted, blended with other metals and cast into bars; the coining department, where the bars of metal are rolled out and stamped; the assay department, where the bars and finished coins are tested, at every stage of manufacture; the die department, where the dies are made, and the general mechanical department. The several processes through which the raw metal goes before the finished coin is produced are melting, rolling, adjusting, cutting, marking, annealing, cleaning, coining and testing. Crude oil is used as fuel for melting and annealing. metals and cast into bars; the coin-

and annealing.
The metals are mixed in standard The metals are mixed in standard proportions in the melting process, and here a small percentage is allowed for shrinkage in weight. The bars are tested in the assay department before passing on to the rolling machines, where the metal is rolled out to the required thickness. These "fillets" are again tested for thickness, and if not correct to within one-twenty-thousandth part of an inch are returned to the melting furnaces. If correct they are softened by annealing and then pass through the thinning and finishing mills. In the case of gold the "fillets" are not roll. hearing and then pass through the thinning and finishing mills. In the case of gold the "fillets" are not rolled, but drawn out by heavy chains in a machine specially constructed for the purpose. In the cutting machines the unstamped coin is punched out and automatically tested. The residue of the metal after punching goes back to be re-melted. The unfinished coin next passes through a marking machine, where the beaded edge is made to protect the face of the coin from wear and tear. This machine marks six hundred blank coins a minute. The metal discs next go to the annealing furnace, are go to the annealing furnace, are cleaned in a weak bath of sulphuric

deaned in a weak bath of sulphuric acid, put in with sawdust in a revolving drum and dried and are then ready for the stamp presses. The bright, unfinished coins reach the dies through a feed tube, and mechanical fingers seize one at a time, place it in a collar plate, the dies stamping the designs on both sides in one operation. Expert steel fingers then hurry the finished coin into a delivery tube, the rate being one hundred a minute. ired a minute.

After passing through automatic After passing through automatic, weight-testing machines the coins are spread out on an endless belt and examiners keep a keen lookout for split, notched, discolored or otherwise defective coins. Gold and silver coins pass through an automatic machine at the rate of twenty a minute, any defects in weight or coinage being detected. After this, boys "ring" the coins.

PREVISION IN DREAMS. Occult Research is Full of Strange

He was trying to apeak to me, bet I did not hear his voice; rather it was as if the whole air was echoing, I am in their power. Then, suddenly, he was swallowed up in darkness."
