IN THE FEDERAL MINT

A TRIP THROUGH IT IS SOLEMN
AND ALMOST DULL.

Most of the Traditions of Elaborate
Precautions Are Fabulous — Mint
Office, Melting House, Coining
House, and Die Department Are
the Chief Subdivisions of Money-
Making Plant.

only Mint have to walk about in the streets, and that they are weighed on entering and leaving, and their every movement is watched by a policeman bristling with daggers and shooting iron. They are kept in cages, and are not permitted to meet in groups, and are kept waiting in stors for those who enter by the Mint gates. They are treated with as unscrupulous as a visit to the Bankruptcy Court, and less exciting than a trial before a criminal judge. No gold dust on the floor and no medals struck and presented in honor.

About sixty men are employed in the different processes of the Mint. Mr. M. was employed at sixteen years of age.

Miners employed are not searched on leaving the Mint, as is done in some mines and manufacturing concerns. But this is secured at the Mint by delicate weighing machines, which are so constructed that they will detect the loss of half a five-cent piece, and no one is allowed to leave the Mint without passing through them.

Some of the automatic balances record a weight as small as the weight of a feather, and will register or under weight coin as $\frac{1}{16}$ any that develop defects in the process of minting. The machines are so constructed that they display almost human intelligence in separating the good from the bad, and the defective pieces are detected by a special stamping machine and returned to the melting

But to return to the several processes. The Mint is divided into a minting office, where the coins are struck; a melting house, where the bullion is melted, blended with other metals and cast into bars; the coining department where the bars of metal are rolled out and stamped; the testing department, where the finished coins are tested at every stage of manufacture; the die department, where the dies are made, and the general mechanical department. The raw metal goes before the finished coin is produced are melting, rolling, adjusting, cutting, marking, annealing, cleaning, coining and testing. The gas used as fuel for melting and annealing.

The metals are mixed in standard proportions in the melting process, and here a small percentage is allowed for waste. The weights of the coins are tested in the testing department.

before passing on to the rolling machines, where the metal is rolled out into sheets. The sheets are then cut into "fillets" are again tested for thickness and then rolled into coils of twenty-thousand part of an inch are returned to the melting furnace, reheated and then passed through the rolling and then pass through the thinning and finishing mills. In the rolling mills the metal is rolled thinner, but drawn out by heavy chains and rollers. The metal is then cut into the purpose. In the cutting machines the unstamped coin is punched out of the metal. The metal residue of the metal after punching goes back to be re-melted. The unstamped metal is then passed through a marking machine, where the beads are punched into the metal. The metal is then rolled into the coin from wear and tear. This machine marks six hundred blank coins from one piece of metal. The metal is then passed through the go to the annealing furnace. The coins are cleaned in a weak bath of sulphuric acid. The coins are then passed through a drum and dried and are then passed through a brightening machine. The bright, unfinished coins reach the dies through a feed tube, and machines. The coins are then placed in a collar plate, the die stamping the designs on both sides of the coin. The coins are then passed through a hot water bath and then hurry the finished coin into a delivery tray, the rate being one coin per second.

After passing through automatic weight-testing machines the coins are spread out on an endless belt and examiners keep a keen lookout for split, nipped, discolored or otherwise defective coins. 
