

ANNUAL LOSS IS SIX MILLIONS

Mr. E. N. Lewis, M. P., Speaks on Pulp Problem

Favors Restrictive Laws to Compel American Manufacturers to Locate Here

(Mail and Empire.)

Mr. E. N. Lewis, M. P., for West Huron, brought out some interesting facts concerning the pulpwood industry in Canada, in an address to the Canadian Club yesterday. The chief feature of his remarks was a strong appeal to canadians to support the proposal to impose an export duty on pulpwood, thus compelling American manufacturers of this commodity to remove to this country and erect mills, hire workmen, and buy necessary equipment in this country. In would mean an increase of \$6,000,000 in the profits and earnings of Canadian manufacturers and employes for that is the estimated receipts of the 761 pulp mills of the Republic, of which 108 are in New York State, as against a total in this country of 58 mills. The speaker urged that the matter be proceeded with in a national spirit, excluding all political considerations, and adopting that legislation promising such large returns from a standpoint of both business and patrictism. The cases of two Quebec villages was cited, Grand Mere and Batiscan, the former manufacturing paper, with a population increased from 500 to 5,000 persons on that account, the latter manufacturing pulpwood only, which it sent to the United States, and its population had remained at only 500. When the Ontario government placed an export duty on saw logs the Americans in that business came to Canada and built saw mills here. Such would be the case with the paper industry, the speaker argued, if an export duty on pulpwood were effected.

Mr. Lewis quoted figures as follows: Japan imports 5,000,000 million pounds of British paper and 3,500,000 of American; Canada is not mentioned. England imports \$23,369,075 worth of paper, principally from the United States. Where does she get her pulpwood? From Canada, yet Canada is not mentioned as an exporter of paper at all. These figures went to show that while Canada supplied most of the raw material for this paper, it had no benefit from the process of manufacture. Some Canadians feared retaliation from the United States in case du

000,000 to \$160,000,000, making her West Indies and all Central and South America combined. So the Americans would not be so foolish as to retaliate upon Canada. When the latter saw fit to build up her own industries, for the reason that she was such an excellent customer. Then the press of the United States would be opposed to any governmental action that would cause Canada to curtail her export of pulpwood.

The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) A homesteader may, if he sc desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement.

(3) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead, or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4) The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement.

(5) A homesteader intending to per-

(5) A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention.

NEW METHODIST CHURCH AT WOODSTOCK DEDICATED

(Woodstock Dispatch.)

The dedication services of the new Methodist church took place on Sunday morning last. As early as 10.30 o'clock people began to assemble in the church and before the time for opening the service the building was crowded to its fullest capacity and not even standing room could be obtained.


