

# ARE HIGHLY IMPORTANT

Petitions were presented by Hon. Mr. Maxwell in favor of the bill to amend the St. John Assessment Act, by Mr. Byrne for the incorporation of the Bathurst Skating and Curling Co. and to authorize the Municipality of Gloucester to make a temporary loan of \$6,000.

Provision was also made for penalizing express and transportation companies which received for transportation outside the province heads and carcasses of big game which were not properly tagged as required by law.

A section was also introduced to prevent the trapping of fur bearing animals by non-residents except under license. Dealers in furs would be required to keep a record of all purchases of furs and persons from whom such burchases were made, and such record would be open at all times to officials of the Crown Land Department.

A Splendid Provision.

Dealers in carcasses of game animals would be required to take out a license and would not be allowed to have more than two carcasses of game in their possession at one time. They will be required to keep a record of the purchases. The same provision will apply to taxidermists who must register the names of all persons sending them game or fish to be mounted, the idea being that every possible provision be made for the department to trace illegal killing of game.

It will probably be some time before a regular doctor will diagnose a case as belonging to the specialty of the osteopathist, or will recommend the patient to seek a homeopathic physician. Therefore the nonconformist must diagnose for himself. On the whole if we admit the right of the profession to prescribe the extent of training to qualify for the practice of medicine in this province, it seems not unfair for them to impose upon dissenters the same burden of preparation that they lay upon their own class. ## **REBELLION IN OFFICER'S DIARY**

Regina, April 12.—With the construction of rallways and development of the West, many of the battlefields and historic spots of the old Northwest Rebellion, of 1855, are being changed into industrial centres; many of the heroes of those sitring times have gone into the Great Beyond, and the large and virgin prairie which formed the stage for this great drama of Western Canada's history, is to-day dotted with the happy homes of settlers. Twenty-four years ago on Saturday on April 10, 1885, Col. Otter started for the front to strike what was perhaps the first blow in defence of British justice.

The following extracts from the diary of George B. Murphy, of Qu'Appelle, furnish many historic facts, and call to mind many of the men and in cidents relative to the opening up of the last Great West, and the peaceful bas selzed stores at Batoche.


