

SENSATION FALLOWS SERMON ON OATH Charlottetown Stirred by Remarks of Rev. T. F. Fulton Protesting Against Abolition of Clause in Entirety.

Charlottetown, P. E. I., June 27.— A sensation has been created here by a sermon on the coronation oath preached in St. James Presbyterian Church last night by the pastor, Rev. T. F. Fulwion. He favored, he de-ciared, the triking out of the words "worship of saints and the mass as dolatrous and superstitious," which were needlessly offensive to Roman Catholics, but opposed urther change. He gave an historical review of the struggle in England for religious free-dom and held that their freedom was obtained at too great a cost to be tampered with.
