New Five Cent Rate-Known as TWO NUMBER METHOD

Beginning July 1st, calls can be given by either of two methods, namely:

Two Number-Where a subscriber is willing to talk to any person at the telephone called.

Long Distance—Where a particular person is wanted.

Two Number Method. The subscriber calls the operator in the usual manner. The operator will enswer, saying "Number." The subscriber will then give the operator the desired number, followed by his own number, as "Rothesay, 20," "this is Main 3014-21." The calling subscriber will hold the receiver to his ear until connected with the called telephone, or is advised "Line Busy or "They Don't Answer." If the called telephone answers it constitutes a message. A particular person will not be procured. The Initial Rate for this Service will be 5 cents for three minutes and 1

cent for each additional minute. Messages Cannot be Reversed, but must be charged to the Telephone from which they originate.

Important. As the operator cannot tell the telephone number of the person calling, it is necessary that the subscriber, on either a special or party line, should give his own number as well as the number desired. 

### The Skunk as Asset to the Farme

The Skunk as Asset to the Farmer.

The United States department of agriculture advises farmers to protect the skunk as a valuable asset. The animal is described as one of the greatest helpers of the farmer in destroying insects which are harmful to crops. It is said that the increase of the destructive white grub is due to the extermination of the skunk. Skunks are valuable from a fur-bearing standpoint. A Boston firm shipped 1,200,000 skunk skins last year. About one half came from Massachusetts. It is probable that about an equal number will be shipped this season. Skunks are born in litters of about four a year and increase almost as fast as cats. Skunk skins are worth from \$1.55 to \$4.25, according to the grade. Skunk farms exist in New England and in nearly every case have been profitable. The bite of a skunk, the department of agriculture states, is not dangerous, as has been supposed. His ordor is worse than his bite. The annimal is not difficult to handle when he and his owner get acquainted. The best way to lift the skunk is by his tail, the board announces.

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
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
