ARNILL AFFIDAVIT TISSUE OF LIES, DECLARE CONTRACTORS MERRITHEW AND SMITH

Veniot's "Bombshell" Launched at Grit Meeting in Woodstock Proved a Bubble Which is Promptly Pricked by Messrs. Smith and Merrithew---Premier Clarke Knew Absolutely Nothing of Payments to James H. Crocket.

EVERY STATEMENT IN CHARGE FALSE—NO PAYMENT TO PARTY FRIENDS -HOLD BACK MATTER BETWEEN SMITH-MERRITHEW FIRM AND HIB-BARD CO. OVER WHICH GOVERNMENT HAD NO CONTROL - HOLD BACK PAID BY CHEQUE NO. 257 OF ST. JOHN AND QUEBEC RAIL-

A complete and satisfying refutation of the "affidavit" of R. J. Arnill, published as another opposition "bombshell" under flaring headlines in the Telegraph of yesterday morning has been furnished under oath by Messrs Luther B. Smith and E. Lorne Merrithew of the railway contracting firm of Smith & Merrithew of which Mr. Arnill was once a

The affidavits which are published herewith establish beyond question that the allegations featured by the Telegraph and contained in Mr. Arnill's sworn declaration are without foundation.

The Standard also reproduces this morning from the Fredericton Gleaner Mr. Crocket's version of the transactions alleged by Mr. Arnill. The affidavits and Mr. Crocket's statement are worthy of careful perusal. Then the people of the province can judge who tells the truth. The affidavits follow:

Fredericton, N. B., Sept. 15—Povince of New Brunswick, County of York.

I, E. Lorne Merrithew, of the city of Fredericton, in the County of York, contractor, do salemnly declare:

1. That I was a member of the firm of Smith & Merrithew, contractors, which firm had a contract under the Hibbard Company, Limited, for the construction of a portion of the St. John and Quebec Railway north of Fredericton, during the years 1912 and 1913, the other members of the firm being Luther B. Smith and Robert J. Arnill. Subsequently this firm was dissolved and a company incorporated under the New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies Act including a members of the said company Mr. Smith and myself, but of which the said

Mr. Arnill was not a member or stockholder.

2. That I have carefully read the solemn declaration of the said Robert J. Arnill as published under date of Sept. 15th Inst. in the columns of "The Daily Telegraph," a newspaper printed in the city of St. John, in this

province.

3. That I have a personal and Intimate knowledge of the transactions referred to in the said declaration; that it is true as stated in the said declaration that the said firm of Smith & Merrithew during the time of Mr. Arnill's association as a partner undertook and completed a contract for the construction of nine and one-half miles of the line of the St. John and Quebec Railway, but the said contract was a contract with the Hibbard Co., Ltd., a sub-contractor under the St. John and Quebec Railway Co.

4. That under the terms of the said contract the Hibbard Co., Ltd. was entitled to hold back ten per cent.

of the value of the work until completion and in accordance with said terms when the work was finished the hold-back amounted to \$16,590.70 and not \$25,000 as stated in the said declaration, that our work was completed in advance of that of some of the other sub-contractors and on completion we applied to the Hibbard Co. for the payment of the amount of the holdback, but I was withheld, the reason given to us being that the amount would not be paid until all the work then under construction was finished and the claims of the other contraction.

In our negotiations for payment we frequently applied to the Hibbard Co. and also to the St. Jo Quebec Railway Co. for payment without success

NEVER DISCUSSED WITH GOVERNMENT OR PARTY LEADERS.

ERNMENT FOR PAYMENT WE WERE DISTINCTLY TOLD THAT T WAS ENTIRELY A MATTER BETWEEN US AND HIBBARD CO. AND ONE OVER WHICH THEY HAD NO CONTROL, AND MR. ARNILL IN HIS DECLARATION STATES WHAT IS ABSOLUTELY UNTRUE WHEN HE SAYS THAT "ON MANY OCCASIONS WE DISCUSSED THE SITUATION WITH THE GOVERNMENT PARTY LEADERS AND WITH MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNMENT AND FINALLY WE STATED THAT WE WERE WILLING TO MAKE A CONTRIBUTION OF \$2,500 TO THE PARTY FUNDS IF WE WERE PAID THE MONEY WHICH WAS DUE US." NO SUCH DISCUSSION EVER TOOK PLACE WITH THE GOVERNMENT OR ANY MEMBER OF THE GOVERNMENT, AND NO SUCH CONTRIBUTION OF \$2,500 OR ANY AMOUNT WAS MADE TO PARTY FUNDS.

5. That it is not true as stated in the fourth paragraph of the said declaration that Mr. James H. Crocket, the managing director of the Gleaner, Limited, informed us that he could help us to get our money, but as a matter of fact I, myself, knowing Mr. Crocket's friendly relations with the manager of the Hibbard Co., apached him and asked him if he would assist us, and he told me that he would talk with the manager about matter. It is not true as stated by Mr. Arnill that Mr. Crocket asked us how much we were prepared to pay If we got our money, neither is it true that we told him that we would give him \$2,500 for his services in the matter. Neither is it true, as stated, that Mr. Crocket reported to us from time to time what steps he was taking to get our money from the government for our conversation with Mr. Crocket related only to negotiations with the Hibbard Co. and no references were made at any time to the government.

HOLD-BACK WAS PAID BY ST. JOHN AND QUEBEC RAILWAY

5. That it is not true as stated in the 6th paragraph of the said declaration that on the 4th day of 8. As a matter of fact the amount of the hold-back (being \$16,590.70, and not an amount in excess of \$25,000 as falsely stated by Mr. Arnill in his said declaration) was not paid to us by the government, but by cheque No. 257 of the Saint John and Quebec Railway Company, signed by Irving R. Todd, president, and John D. Palmer, treasurer of the said company, setting forth that the amount was the balance of ten per cent. hold-back due by the Hibbard Company to Smith & Merrithew, the said cheque being dated the 23rd day of October, 1915.

7. THAT THE STATEMENT MADE BY MR. ARNILL IN PARAGRAPH SEVEN OF HIS DECLA-

RATION AS TO THE PAYMENT OF THE SUM OF \$2,500 IS NOT TRUE. Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 15.—From returns received up to a late hour to-night at least six Conservatives were

elected yesterday. Similkamon and South Okanagan joined the Conservative columns this

orning.
All the cabinet members have been efeated, except Hon. W. R. Ross, and his election is certain. From the Grand Trunk Pacific district he has a plurality of sixty votes, with some places in Peace River yet to hear

from.

Cowiohan, Kaslo, Nelson, Fince George, Similkamon and South Okanagan are safely Conservative. Hon. Mr. Bowser may win on the soldiers vote. Lucas, in Yale, stood a chance of winning this morning, but he is now defeated. The soldiers' vote might turn the scale for Lieut. McKenzle, in Delta, and possibly two others, which would run the Conservative opposition in the house up to ten. That will mean at least 37 Liberals are returned.

That will mean at least 37 East-as are returned.

Until tonight it was thought that Captain W. W. Foster, Conservative, had been elected in the Islands constituency. Late returns, however, give the riding to Jackson, Liberal, with 317 votes, a majority of 33.

Count Apponyi and Other Faction Leaders Attack Premier Tisza.

PERSONAL ISSUES BROUGHT INTO DEBATE

Opposition Leader Demands Guarantee that Mistakes of Army Leaders will not b.

Budapest, Sept. 14, via London ept. 15-The Hungarian parliament today was again the scene of great ex itement. Count Albert Apponyi, tephen Rakovsky and other leaders of the opposition attacked Premier Tisza, and the latter defended him-

Tisza, and the latter detended self by criticizing them.

Premier Tisza inserted a personal issue into the discussion when he said he regretted his "foolishness" in recommending to Baron Burfan, the Austro-Hungarian foreign minister, that he confidentially discussed the state of affairs with Rakovsky. The premier called the criticisms of the army leaders by the head of the people's party as "well poisoning."

Count Apponyl declared that the

army leaders by the head of the people's party as "well poisoning."

Count Apponyi declared that the three chief questions needing discussion were the foreign policies, the military situation and the food supply. The harmony and unity needed for considering these three problems, Count Apponyl said, were endangered by the introduction of other questions, such as Premier Tisza's attempt to bind Hungary economically to its allies for a long period of time.

Discussing the military situation, Count Apponyl said it was, of course, out of the question to think of a change in the leadership of the army, which is now regaining the strong confidence of the people. When, however, the Entente leaders, he said, had made a mistake guarantees always had been offered that the mistakes would not be repeated, and he insisted, therefore, that Austro-Hungary should also have such guarantees. 



Verdun Would be of MOMENTOUS QUESTIONS THAT HAVE OCCUPIED PUBLIC MIND OF ENGLAND LATELY

Shall the Cabinet be Filmed or Not" One SECOND PHI Matter that Raised a Hue and Cry-Women in the Pulpits and the Votes for Women OF THE HOUSE OF

England, August 24.—Momentous questions have engaged the public mind of England during the past week—questions of such far-reaching importance that the wars going on in Europe, Asia, Africa, Mexico and Borneo sank temporarily into insignificance. All England for days stood on tiptoe, with its heart in its mouth awaiting the ultimate decision on the tramendous question, shall the cabinet be filmed, or shall the cabinet not be filmed? Probably in all the history of the Empire no group of absent-minded British statesmen had ever posed such a dis-turbing question. Consternation prevailed among the politicians; the press gave way to an excitement it has never displayed in the most trying periods of the world war; an immense trapidation preyed upon the public mind. When the gentle Huns were thundering at the gates or Paris and eating up the road to Calais, the great British public remained calm, feeling that whatever the cabinet might do the army would save the situation. But the very idea that the cabinet should be filmed, that the world should have an opportunity to see that august body in action, or inaction, was altogether too much for even English phlegm. Everywhere one heard the awed whisper: "This government has made a record for blunders; but this is the limit."

In the tumult only Lord Northcliffe remained composed in the serene conviction that even if the appearance of the cabinet as rivals of Charlie Chaplin caused a general election, it did not necessarily follow pire would lose its place in the sun. "Be brave, Britons! Be calm!" cried the Napoleon of journalism. "All is not yet lost. If Mr. Asquith has made up his mind to have the cabinet filmed be sure he

will exercise his prerogative of changing it again."

And when Mr. Asquith, bowing to the protests of old-fashioned and decorous citizens, calmly announced that the cabinet would not attempt usurp the place of Charlie Chaplin, the Daily Mail observed:

This film episode is a moving picture of their handling of a score of problems. First, a decision of very doubtful wisdom; then a storm ablic and parliamentary indignation; then a day or two of wobbling, and finally a climb down.

"The fact is this cabinet never could have been filmed. It wobbles

Another question which has temporarily overshadowed the war is whether women should be permitted to preach in mission halls. It is hinted that the amazing personage who proposed this terrible revolution in the religious life of old England did so in jest. But women have apparently taken it seriously, and the venerable vicars of the Church of England have been plunged into a panic. Never was there such a casti-gation of the over-weening ambitions of women since Jupiter overthrew the female divinities on Mount Olympus. The good parsons have suddenly deluged England with a wealth of theological lore. Many of the arguments of the venerable vicars have the flavor of the celebrated theological rows of the 16th century as to whether or not women had souls. Women must be highly edified by the debate, especially when they remember that if they abandoned the churches the parsons would have to preach to vacant pews.

Since the war women have taken over much of the work formerly done by men. Hundreds of thousands of women are now wearing breeches, laboring in fields, forges, munition factories. Even the flapper, who devotes herself with tremendous energy to the business of amusing the boys in khaki, has discarded long skirts in favor of abbreviations, which in the course of evolution more and more make by comparison the kilts of the Scottich warriors appear old-fashioned and over-modest If the woman hadn't donned man's clothes and invaded practically all fields of labor, England couldn't have carried on the war as long as she has Possibly women will be enlisted before the war is finished. Already women in Russia are serving as soldiers, and an Irish girl is a






