



# Sir Wilfrid Laurier Likely To Support A Conscription Policy

## Liberal Leader May Feel Compelled to Revise His Utterances and Stand Behind Government's Proposals Regarding Subject.

### QUEBEC GRITS STRONGLY OPPOSE CONSCRIPTION

#### Half-Hearted Support of Some Liberal Elements Expected to be More or Less Conditional — Laurier May Have to Blow Hot and Cold.

Ottawa, May 22.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier will probably support conscription. Placed in possession of information brought back from Great Britain by Sir Robert Borden, and followed by the possibility of a serious division in the ranks of the opposition, the Liberal leader is understood to have revised his well known anti-conscription policy and is expected to at least stand behind the principle of the government's proposals. Sir Wilfrid is said to be at present engaged in an effort to get certain of his Quebec supporters to follow him, and it is believed in parliamentary circles that the majority of them will bow before the rising tide of public opinion, and renounce the anti-compulsion sentiments they have recently been expressing among their compatriots.

#### Conditional Support.

But while the opposition is expected to support the principle of the government's measure it is anticipated in the best informed circles that their support will be more or less conditional. It is expected that the opposition leader will attach to any support of the bill certain conditions which, while satisfying the sentiment in English speaking Canada, for universal military service, will at the same time appease the anti-conscriptionists who are believed to exercise considerable influence in certain sections of Quebec. In other words an attempt will probably be made to please both conscriptionists and anti-conscriptionists at one and the same time.

#### Women Want Age Raised.

London, Ont., May 22.—Acting on behalf of all the women organizations of London, Mrs. H. A. Boomer, president of the Council of Women today telegraphed Premier Borden protesting against conscription of boys of eighteen.

#### Desire Referendum.

Montreal, May 22.—A petition was presented at the city council to protest to the government at Ottawa against putting conscription in force without a referendum to the people.

#### More Grit Opposition.

Quebec, May 22.—Alderman Dussault, at last night's meeting against conscription, announced that on Friday he will present a motion to the city council asking that the council register against conscription. He also announced the near creation of an anti-conscription league throughout the entire district.

#### Conservative Quebec Loyal.

The Quebec members of the cabinet are standing squarely behind the prime minister, and it is not unlikely that they will continue to support his campaign of education throughout their province. The conscription bill, unless present plans fall, will be brought down on Friday. This will give an opportunity to the members to study its contents over the week-end, and permit of its being immediately taken up next week. The bill is being drafted upon a principle of absolute non-partisanship. Its details are being worked out, so that by no possible stretch of the imagination can it be attacked along partisan lines. Neither fear nor favor will be shown to any province, class or party. Only the military economic needs of the country are being considered.

#### Liberal Clubs Against.

Montreal, May 22.—At meetings last night in the Lemieux and Letellier Clubs, speeches were delivered in opposition to the conscription proposals. At the meeting in the Lemieux Club a resolution was adopted expressing confidence in Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the hope that he would protect the rights of Canadians and the Canadian constitution. At the Letellier Club it was decided to call an open air mass meeting for Thursday night and invite Mayor Martin and others to speak against conscription.

# FRANCE NOW WAKING FOR THE RUSSIANS

## Premier Ribot Says that When Russia Takes Offensive France Will Force Peace.

Paris, May 22.—Parliament was reopened today and the expected interpellations regarding the conduct of the war were presented in the chamber. Addressing the deputies in regard to the interpellations, Premier Ribot said:

"The government has thought some changes should be made, and it has made them. It has re-organized the high commands to relieve it of every operation. The Minister of War now works in co-operation with the military committee of the chamber.

#### Submarine Warfare.

"In reference to submarine warfare I recognize that, while the tonnage loss has diminished, we must seek more energetic and decisive means of dealing with submarines.

"No conquests and no covetousness—that, in substance, is what the Russian government declares. France replies that it could not oppress any nationality, even that of its enemies. It will call to its aid to defend the small nations not vengeance but justice.

"What France also wishes is a durable peace but we do not wish military dispositions to endure which can destroy this durable peace when it is once made. If the German people comprehend this, it would make peace easier to attain. Now let Russia make her offensive and we will be able to talk of peace not in an equivocal manner but openly and in peace, if they do not ask it of us, we will impose it.

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# HUNS GETTING TERRIBLE HAMMERING IN FRANCE

## TEUTON ARMIES IN FRANCE ARE GRABBLING YIELDING

### Generals Haig and Nivelle Continuing Relentless Pressure Against Invaders — Russian Situation Appears None Too Favorable.

The German armies in France are slowly yielding ground before the relentless pressure exercised by Generals Haig and Nivelle and the vital question is as to whether their morale can be maintained under the terrific pounding to which they are subjected day and night. Apparently the Allied commanders have abandoned the policy of sudden thrusts at chosen points and are relying on a constant hammering over a wide front in the belief that sooner or later the iron hammer must either break or crack.

While there is little immediate prospect of sensational developments in the battle area, the political situation remains fraught with many possibilities. The latest news from Russia indicates that the crisis in that country continues acute and the menace that Russia may withdraw from the Entente or be plunged into chaos still throws its shadows over the future. ## NEUTRALS TO GET NO MORE FOOD STUFFS

### Canadian Government Stops Exports of Wheat and Flour to All but Allies.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, May 22.—One of the reasons for the high cost of wheat and flour is that large quantities have been going to neutral countries, particularly to Holland. This has diminished the supply to such an extent as to provide an excuse for increasing the price in this country. The government in considering the food situation has come to the decision to prohibit in the meantime the exportation of wheat and wheat flour to other than British and allied countries. It is felt that this action will have an immediate effect upon the prices prevailing in this country with regard to these commodities.

## MRS. ARTHUR CREMONA AGAIN BEFORE COURT YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

### Interesting Evidence in Hearing of Charge Against Woman for Obtaining Money Under False Pretences.

The case against Mrs. Arthur Cremona for obtaining money under false pretences, was taken up in the police court yesterday afternoon with Mr. Edward Kelly on the stand. She stated that Mrs. Cremona had asked her to cash a cheque for her on April 27. The cheque was signed by A. H. Cremona who, defendant claimed, was her husband. The witness took it to the Bank of Nova Scotia and had it cashed. The defendant came to her home on the next Tuesday, May 1, with a cheque for \$70 which she wanted cashed, as she said she wanted to go to the dentist in the morning. The witness gave her \$70 and later took the cheque to the bank and received the money asked for on it.

## Municipal Action

A further extension in the cost of living regulations has been made by Hon. T. W. Crothers, minister of labor, who has charge of the administration of legislation. These regulations provided that when municipalities have taken all the action that they were empowered to do, they should notify the minister of labor and he would continue any new action considered advisable. Today he notified parties concerned that henceforth when municipalities wished to conduct an investigation under oath they will be allowed to name the investigator and the minister of labor will clothe him with all the powers in this regard which he himself possesses. The minister states that he had come across incidents where municipalities would have desired to make the appointment of an investigator, and he felt that it would facilitate inquiry and bring results and at the same time create confidence in the efficiency of the legislation by the public knowing personally the investigators, this extension of the powers should be made.

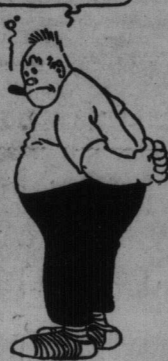

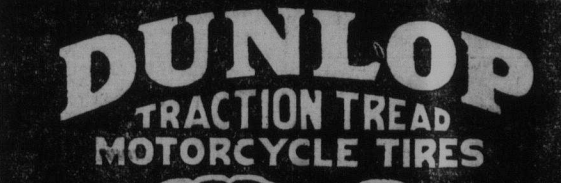

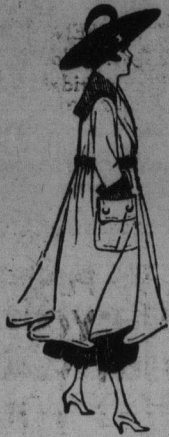

# DISGRACEFUL CONDITION OF SOLDIERS' QUARTERS IN IMMIGRATION SHEDS

## Men Have Not Been Issued with Underclothes for Months—Some Have Received No Pay Since March 5th—Quarters Unclean—Vermin in Sleeping Apartments—Men Claim They Are Not Properly Treated—Major Frost Says He Is Not To Blame.

Complaints have been voiced regarding the conditions under which members of the Special Service Company live. This company, which performs local guard duty and other branches of home service, is quartered in the immigration building at West St. John.

Yesterday, S. H. Mayes, chairman of the Returned Soldiers' Reception Committee, and a Standard reporter visited the building and made an inspection of the quarters. They also interviewed several members of the company as to their accommodation and clothing and the facts gleaned were, to say the least, startling.

**Soldiers in Bad State.**

Before the 153rd Battalion left for overseas every member of that unit went before a medical board. Those unfit for service overseas were detailed for special duty on the West Side. They reported the first week in April for bed and ration with the 62nd Battalion, but apparently no provision was made for new clothing with the result that there are members of the special company without underclothing, while those who are fortunate enough to possess a suit have had it washed for two months. The condition of the clothes can readily be imagined.

In addition to the fact that they have not been provided with clothing, the majority of the men have received no money since March 5th, when they were paid by the paymaster.

# NOTICE FOR PERMANENT SIDEWALKS

## Ratepayers of Lancaster Declare in Favor of Bond Issue for that Purpose.

The progressive policy of the Lancaster Highway Board in providing the people of the parish with modern up-to-date concrete sidewalks was heartily endorsed at a largely attended meeting of the ratepayers held last evening in the Temperance Hall, Fairville, when the resolution protesting against the issue of bonds for \$100,000 for permanent sidewalks was voted down by a four to one vote.

Last year the highway board issued bonds for \$15,000 for the purpose of building concrete sidewalks and built three and seven-eighths miles, and this year they have a bill before the legislature asking for authority to issue an additional \$10,000 for the same purpose. Some opposition was manifested to this issue at a recent meeting of the Lancaster Board of Trade and last night's meeting was the outcome of the discussion that night.

About 8.15 William Linton called the meeting to order and M. Kane was elected chairman and A. J. LeBlanc secretary. The chairman called on those who were responsible for the calling of the meeting to state the object.

William Linton said he was one who was responsible for the meeting and it had been called to consider whether it was wise at the present time to issue any further bonds for sidewalks. The parish had already spent \$15,000 in concrete sidewalks and if the proposed issue was through it would only leave \$1,541 of the amount appropriated for sidewalk purposes for repair work. The highway board had about \$4,000 to spend for sidewalks and he did not think they should spend more than that amount this year. He also objected to the work because of the increased cost of material and labor which would make the sidewalks cost more and the taxpayers would get less for their money.

Amador Anderson.

Amador Anderson was the next speaker. He thought that the present was a time to practice economy rather than to indulge in new expenditures. It was very nice to have the walks if they could be got for nothing, but he was sure the taxes would have to be increased and he felt the sidewalks could wait. He considered the roads to be more in need of money than the sidewalks. He then proposed the following resolution: "Whereas: There is at the present time a bill before the legislature of New Brunswick to allow the Parish of Lancaster to issue bonds for \$10,000 for sidewalks:

"And whereas: We are engaged in a great world war, the end of which is not in sight and which requires all the effort and power of the Commonwealth to bring said war to a successful issue:

"And also in view of the fact that in the year 1916 a bond issue of \$15,000 was made and sidewalks laid in all parts of the parish seriously requiring them:

"Therefore we the ratepayers of Lancaster put ourselves on record as against the issue of said bonds."

This was seconded by Adam Campbell who contended that this work should be left until after the war and then done by returned soldiers.

Councillor O'Brien.

Councillor O'Brien, said the statement had been made that the same value could not be gotten as last year, but he could tell the meeting that they could get better value, for he had an offer from a reputable firm to do the work at fifteen cents per yard less than the last year price, because they had learned from the experience of last year how the work could be done more cheaply and get just as good a job. The highway board considered it cheaper to build permanent sidewalks than spread ashes on repair work. The cost of which would pay the interest and sinking fund on the bonds. Something had been said about spending money on the roads, but so far as he knew the only bad piece of road in the parish was on Main street, Fairville, and the people who had to walk were entitled to as much consideration as those who drove. The new sidewalks would not increase the taxes because of the fact before mentioned that the amount usually spent on repairs would be available for interest and sinking fund. He then read a list of streets on which it was proposed to build the sidewalks showing that every part of the parish was to receive consideration. He was inclined to believe that the meeting had been called to serve certain interests but he was convinced that the interests were not those of the taxpayers of the parish.

J. A. Barry.

J. A. Barry said the war was always brought into a question of this kind, but he was inclined to think the war was not the real cause of the meeting. The councillors of the parish had looked after the interests of the people and those who were objecting to this measure should have made their protest when the matter was before the municipal council.

Councillor Golding.

Councillor Golding thought the meeting had been called at very short notice. He considered it good business to lay permanent sidewalks rather than keep on spreading ashes and the taxes would not be raised because this was done.

After a number of those present had spoken for or against the resolution the chairman put the question and the resolution was lost by a vote of 21 to 86, the meeting consequently approving the action of the Highway Board.

**THE VETERANS WILL ATTEND UNVEILING**

Of Tablet to Lieut. Chas. M. Lawson—Major Johnston to Officiate—Empire Day at the High School.

The members of the European War Veterans' Association will attend the Empire Day exercises at the High School this afternoon. The proceedings will be of especial interest to the veterans in view of the fact that a portrait and tablet in memory of the late Lieut. Charles Murray Lawson, formerly of the High School staff, will be unveiled. The unveiling will be done by Major Gordon Johnston, one of the returned officers of the famous 26th, a comrade of the deceased officer. Lieut. Lawson was the first officer of the gallant 26th to fall in action.

The portrait is the gift of the School Board. The excellent brass tablet is the work of Mr. Plummer. The tablet bears the following inscription:  
Lieut. Charles Murray Lawson,  
26th Battalion, C.E.F.,  
Born August 19th, 1883. Killed on active service in France, November 26th, 1915. Gold Medalist, 1899. Teacher in the Saint John High School, 1912-1915.

This tablet was placed here by the Alumnae to honor the memory of a brilliant scholar, a faithful teacher and a brave comrade.

**MANY SUPPORT SUFFRAGE FOR WOMEN OF N. B.**

Large Delegations Going to Fredericton to Support Important Measure—Bill to be Introduced on Tuesday.

Much interest is being evinced in the measure which will be introduced in the House of Assembly at Fredericton on Tuesday next, providing for the granting of the suffrage to all females in the province over the age of twenty-one years. The members of the local Women's Suffrage Association have been especially active in promoting this legislation, and plans are being perfected to have a large delegation attend at Fredericton when the measure is considered by the house in committee.

The attitude of the two political parties on the question has not been defined. While the bill will be introduced by a member of the government, Hon. Dr. Roberts, it is in no sense a government measure, the members of the government not having seen fit to take the responsibility of introducing the bill as coming from the executive.

Miss Clara McGivern said last evening that in addition to the support the bill would receive from the Suffrage Association, the measure had the hearty endorsement of the local Council of women, the Social Service Congress, the Trades and Labor Council and the Women's Christian Temperance Union. It is expected that delegations from these bodies will appear at Fredericton in support of the measure. Arrangements will likely be made to have the Fredericton branch of the W. C. T. U. represent the unions at Fredericton when the bill is taken into consideration. Women from various centres in the province who are active in the suffrage movement are planning to go to Fredericton in its support. No property qualification is involved in the provisions of the bill as it now stands.

**MISS EDITH HEGAN EXPECTED TOMORROW**

Daughter of George Hegan of this City Has Been on Active Service for Two Years and a Half—Lately in Russia.

Another nursing sister from this city has reached Canada after a long service in war work at the front. George Hegan was advised yesterday that his daughter, Miss Edith T. Hegan, had arrived at Quebec, accompanying a party of returned soldiers. Miss Hegan is expected to arrive in the city tomorrow and she will doubtless receive a hearty reception from her numerous friends.

Miss Hegan has been on active service overseas for the past two years and a half. For some time past she has been engaged in war work in Russia. It is hoped that she may be able to enjoy a short leave after her long and splendid service on behalf of the Allied cause since the outbreak of the war.

**MR. HAZEN TO EMPLOY RETURNED SOLDIER IN HIS OTTAWA OFFICES**

Minister of Marine, Ever Alive to Interests of Khaki Heroes, Will Take Frank Gray to Capital.

Charles Robinson, secretary of the Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission, received a telegram yesterday from Hon. J. D. Hazen requesting the services of a returned soldier for his office at Ottawa. Frank Gray, who saw some of the heaviest fighting on the western front, and who was invalided home, has accepted the position and will leave on Friday for Ottawa.
