DALHOUSIE TOWN COUNCIL MEETS

Committees and Officers Appointed For the Year—First Meeting Sees Much Business Transacted.

IMPORTANT RESOLUTIONS

The inaugural meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council room on Wednesday evening, 11th inst., when the following members constituting a full board were present: Mayor Stewart and Aldermen Chiverton, Scott, Mercier, Harquail, Jamieson, Barthe, Stewart and Bateman. The Mayor took the chair at eight o'clock, and in a few well chosen words welcomed the members of the new Council to the business of the year. He referred to the confidence which the electorate had placed in him, and pledged himself to the utmost of his ability to live up to that confidence, calling upon the Aldermen and Officers of the town to co-operate with him in the conduct of the town's business and to help in the advancement and progress of Dalhousie. In conclusion he asked the Clerk to read the returns of the election by which the present Council was constituted, which returns were adopted by the meeting.

The minutes of the preceding Regular, and a special meeting, were then read and confirmed.

A letter was read by the Clerk from the County Clerk regarding the establishment of a General Home for the poor of the County, which letter was left upon the table for future consideration.

Pool table licenses were granted to A. J. Arsenault and Louis J. LeBlanc. An application from Messrs. A. & R. Legrie regarding Water and steam dig and dredge was read, and handed over to the Water Committee for attention at their discretion.

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CONFESSES TO DOUBLE MURDER

Canby, Arrested at Montreal Admits Killing Two Policemen

MONTREAL, May 11.—A full confession was last evening made by Timothy Canby, the Liverpool Irishman, who has been arrested on the charge of murdering Constables Fortin and O'Connell last Friday night.

Canby, who was night watchman at the Ames Holden warehouse, said he had arranged with a second-hand dealer to sell him stolen boots, and took a bag of them to dispose of them but when he went into the store Constable O'Connell appeared and he went out. The O'Connell arrested him, and after a struggle, Fortin came to the policeman's aid.

O'Connell seized his hands from behind, he still holding the revolver, which again exploded, hitting O'Connell in the abdomen with fatal results.

Canby evidently felt his position keenly and completely broke down when he made the confession.

Canby could load at this berth, as the public wharf makes steamship loading at this wharf almost prohibitive, and is no inducement to the charterers of steamers to have them take cargo at our port. At eleven o'clock the meeting was adjourned until Wednesday, the 18th inst., at eight o'clock, p. m.

It will be seen from the above that the New Council is getting right down to business, and while it is always the case that a New Board is inclined to make a few changes, the fact is that Mayor Stewart and his Aldermen made a splendid showing and we have not the slightest doubt that they will make good in the strictest sense of the term. The motto of the New Council is Dalhousie and Progress and we are confident that they will assure your readers that they intend to live up to this. It is a hard working Board, and that the members mean business cannot be doubted. Altogether the first meeting was a most successful one, and the amount of business got through the meeting was a credit to the Board.

A little hitch occurred in the proceedings when Mayor Stewart asked the late Clerk and Treasurer for his bonds, and the latter stated that he could not find them. The matter was left over until the next meeting, when it will no doubt be straightened out.

ALMS HOUSE NEEDED AT ONCE

Matter up for Consideration of Council Provokes Lengthy Discussion. No Definite Action Taken.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Council Chamber Tuesday evening. There were present His Worship Mayor Murray and Couns. Harison, Miller, McDonald, Moore, Moore and White.

The minutes of May 3rd were read and approved.

A communication from Joseph Dalton in reference to assessment was read complaining of rate of assessment, and asking for adjustment. Referred to Committee on Assessment and Appeals.

An application for position on police from Thos. Lockhart, who had served at Sherbrooke for six months was read and referred to the Police and License Committee.

Wm. T. Grey and Thos. Ellisworth applied for trucking licenses. Referred to Police and License Com.

Application for three stable licenses were read from Messrs. Fremette, Almarie and Levesque, Gray and Danbolt, were also referred to Police and License Committee.

On recommendation of the Board of Health the following accounts were ordered to be paid:

F. J. Dolan, 1.25

The Police and License Com. reported recommending the granting of trucking, action, pool and billiard and bowling licenses, were received and adopted.

On recommendation of Chairman White of the Police and License Committee, departmental accounts were passed.

Coun. McDonald in the absence of the Chairman of the Finance Committee departmental accounts were passed. Among the accounts was one from Messrs. Trueman & McKenna for auditing the bill for damages brought by Doucette, amounting to \$150.00.

On recommendation of Chairman McDonald a number of Water and Sewerage accounts were ordered paid.

Coun. White asked what revenue was derived from this service.

Coun. McDonald—One hundred and fifty dollars clear last year, which would be increased this year.

On motion of Coun. Moore the lowest tender was accepted.—Carried.

Coun. McDonald reported that the government engineer had asked what the town would charge to place a hydrant or pipe for fire service near the freight shed on the government wharf. The tender was \$20.00. The members of the committee they had agreed to quote \$20.00 for the season of navigation.

On motion of Coun. McDonald an agreement was granted a fire hydrant for \$20.00 per season.

Coun. McDonald from the Board of Health again brought the matter of forcing a number of property owners to enter the public sewers. These property owners had been notified but three out of five had done nothing, while two were preparing to connect. A complaint had been lodged in regard to the stomach of one of these properties and action was needed at once.

After some discussion Coun. White moved that the persons so notified be again notified that they must connect their properties with the sewers forthwith.

NEW DESIGNS FOR CURRENCY ON JAN. 1

Likeness of Edward VII. on Stamps and Coins for Another Seven Months

OTTAWA, May 11.—The head of King George will not appear on the coins or postage stamps of Canada before the end of the year. The likeness of Edward, the Peacemaker, will continue on the currency and stamps of Canada for another six months at least. In the case of the postage stamps any design may be used, but it is the custom to have the monarch's head on the two cent stamp, which is the one most in use. The department has a six months' supply on hand and these will be used up while the designs are being prepared for the new issue of George V. stamps.

Changing the design of the metal currency is also a matter of time. Designs have to be prepared and approved both in Canada and Great Britain. When the head of the King appears on a coin the special approval of the monarch must be obtained. The finance department has for some time been looking into the question of designs for the new gold coinage of Canada and on these the head of King George will appear, but the first of January will probably be the date of the inauguration.



EARTHQUAKES AT COSTA RICA SAN JOSE, Costa Rica, May 11—Heavy earthquakes were felt today. Thousands of persons are leaving the city in alarm. A series of severe shocks were experienced yesterday.
