

In this work they have been aided by the wild storms which are generated every winter in the comparatively high latitudes of the south Pacific, and which, approaching Australia from the southeast, impinge directly on this coast with a force only exceeded by the great winter storms of the north Atlantic. Along the foot of these dunes lies the Ninety Mile beach, preserving everywhere the long line of its very shallow curve almost unbroken by any projecting point through all its long stretch, and so seeming to the eye of the observer wherever he may take his stand to run in a perfectly straight line on either hand, up or down, as far as sight can reach. — San Francisco Chronicle. 
