

The average life of a man should be one hundred years. Some men and women exceed this by a few years. Some men, like Thomas Parr, who claimed to be 152 years of age at his death. Old Parr was born at Winnington, in Shropshire, England, in 1483. In 1563, at the age of 80, he married, and a son and daughter were born. He married for the second time when he was 122 years of age. At 130 years of age he was able-to do ordinary farm work. Lord Arundel took an interest in him in 1635 and improved his living conditions. These did not agree with his health, and he started to decline. He died on the 14th of Novem ber. 1635, in London, and was buried in the south transcept of Westminster Abbey, where the inscription on the brass tablet over his grave may still

be seen.
Actuarial statistics show that sanitation, better housing and food is tending to add about ten years to the average life. Yet a large proportion of people now die before they reach half the normal time for their deaths. This serious matter has claimed the attention of many scientists, and since Eli Metchnikoff published his theory of old age, about thirty-five years ago, many theories have been developed.
