FOUR YOUNG MEN DROWNED

Their Boat Was Swamped During a Storm.

Collision on the L. E. and D. R. R.—Woman Frightfully Burned.

Michigan, Mich., Nov. 5.—During the storm on Sunday four prominent young men of this place lost their lives by drowning. The dead are: Geo. W. Levin, Abel Levin, Emil Carlson and Albin Carlson.

The men went across Lake Michigan in the morning in two boats, the Levin brothers in one and the Carlson brothers in the other. During the afternoon a fierce storm came up and the boys decided that they would be safer in one boat, so they started home in that way. It is supposed that the boat became swamped and the men gave up the struggle in the ice cold water. A searching party was out all night, but obtained no trace of the bodies. One of the boats was found tied to a tree on shore, where they had intended to return for it after the storm subsided.

COLLISION ON THE L. E. AND D. R. R.
Leamington, Ont., Nov. 5.—A freight train on the L. E. and D. R. R. was pulling into the switch to let the east-bound express pass last evening about 6 o'clock, when two tenders which were attached to the rear end, broke loose, and remained on the main track, coming into collision with the express, with the result that both tenders were derailed, together with the engine and baggage car of the express. The engineer and fireman of the express jumped. Their escape from instant death is almost miraculous, as the baggage car and tender plunged into the river. Traffic was delayed several hours.

LOST BOTH FEET.
Winnipeg, Nov. 5.—F. Nadon, a young brakeman on the Crow's Nest Pass line, lost his feet at Dunmore Junction, in attempting to jump on a watercar. He missed the step and both feet were caught under the wheels of the car, which passed over them.

SUICIDE AND SHOOTING.
Monday, N. W. T., Nov. 5.—Peter Law, aged about 25, committed suicide yesterday by shooting himself in the mouth. He worked in a livery stable in town, and up to the time of his death was apparently in good health and spirits. His relatives are in Edinburgh, Scotland.

TERRIBLY BURNED.

DANGER IN STREETS OF OLD LONDON.

Heaviest Fog Known in Years Enveloped the Metropolis.

British People Told They Must Pay More Taxes to Carry on the War—Murder in a London Bank.

London, Nov. 5.—A fog such as Great Britain had not experienced for years enveloped London and half of the United Kingdom yesterday, blocking shipping, deranging railways and throwing business in London, Birmingham and other provincial cities into confusion.

So dense was it that a walk into the streets was an adventure. The fog descended upon the metropolis and the suburbs so thickly that between 4 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon the principal avenues of traffic resembled the steam room of a Turkish bath. Hundreds of thousands of London's and suburban population vainly endeavored to grope their way to the railway stations. The few who succeeded found the trains all stalled.

Around Trafalgar Square and the houses of parliament scenes unparalleled for years were witnessed. Hundreds of omnibuses, cabs, carts and wagons formed an inextricable and immovable mass. The mounted police, in trying to clear away the jam, got lost themselves. Many vehicles were in collision. The drivers, not knowing where they were, stood at the heads of their horses patiently awaiting the lifting of the premature darkness.

ENORMOUS COST OF WAR.
London, Nov. 5.—What is regarded as an important announcement preparing the people of Great Britain for new taxes and fresh loans was made tonight by the chancellor of the exchequer, Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, in a speech at Bristol. After alluding to the enormous increase in the ordinary expenditures of the government he reviewed the war taxes and said that the ever-increasing demand of the national exchequer gave reasons for careful thought and even anxiety for the future.

"The cost of the war in South Africa is enormous," said Sir Michael. "It still drags on. It may be, when next year comes, that I may have to ask the people of this country to bear even greater burdens and to make even greater sacrifices."

Sir Michael announced that the government was communicating with the authorities in South Africa with a view to a change of the situation of the concentration camps, and to an amelioration of their conditions.

BLAZE AT PORT HURON!
Entailing a Loss of \$300,000—Two Elevators and Much Grain Destroyed.

Port Huron, Mich., Nov. 5.—Fire last night destroyed two large adjoining grain elevators owned by the Botsford Elevator Company here, entailing a loss of \$300,000. The loss of the contents of wheat, 90,000 bushels of corn and 14,000 bushels of oats in the buildings, and the grain was fully insured. The steamer Spokane, from Chicago, was unloading grain when the fire started, and was only saved by the heroic efforts of her crew. One residence near by was also burned.

OTHER FIRES.
Jennings, Ia., Nov. 5.—Five blocks of the main business part of the town were destroyed by yesterday's fire which started in the restaurant of Mr. Dudley. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.

SMALLPOX AMONG INDIANS.

TAXES ON McCLARY COMPANY

Amount Must Be Considered by the Aldermen.

The Firm Asks for Fixed Assessment of \$150,000

And Presents Proposition to the Council—Monday Will Be Proclaimed a Holiday.

A very important letter from the McClary Manufacturing Company, which was read before the city council last night, produced something of a mild sensation, because, though some of the aldermen had known that it would be read, it was entirely new and unexpected.

Our limitation of assessment expires early in the year and in view of the assessment of this province on personal property, as applied to an incorporated manufacturing company of a large capital being beyond all reasonable limits, we ask you to procure at the next session of the Ontario Government, legislation limiting our assessment to \$150,000 per year for all purposes for the term of not less than ten years after the expiration of the present limitation, and should assessment not to exceed what it would be under amended legislation, as in this case we might be compelled to pay a tax to the government of the same amount as that imposed in the Province of Quebec.

London, Tuesday, Nov. 5.

How hard we were all working to save the Dominion this time last year, and how well those of us who won are doing it!

The man who discovers some effective fuel to take the place of anthracite coal will be voted a benefactor by millions of us, and make a fortune for himself besides.

The Canadian fall is one of the most beautiful of seasons. It is a great improvement upon British weather at this time of the year, as the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall have already had demonstrated to them.

Consumptives are having a hard time at present. It has been decided that disease is infectious. In future, the health railway companies will hire one who is a consumptive, or who bears likely to become one.

Another sign of progress in Eastern Canada is the announcement that a dam is to be put up at North Sydney, Cape Breton. The industries of the country are extending on all hands.

The annual expenditure of New York is ninety-eight millions of dollars. Wonder there is a scramble for the holding of so large a sum, where there are so many professional politicians either anxious to hold a job or hold of one.

Talk of this country being a narrow ledge on the United States border! We have report by Census Commissioner Fisher that at Port Providence, on Great Slave Lake, 900 miles north of the United States boundary, the leading Conservative orients are growing in plenty, and what more the settlement is lighted by electricity.

All the Liberal candidates in recent elections have been returned; and the few fellows saw defeat ahead, and declined to enter the race. This condition of affairs leads the Montreal Gazette, the leading Conservative organ in Eastern Canada, to call for leaders.

In rural regions the house stove has not been the favorite place in which to hide money. Almost every day we hear of persons who have lost their money, and all of ready cash through forgetting that the stove was used as a bank until a fire had been lighted. The savings bank is a much safer place in which to retain surplus cash.

The British troops in South Africa did get the Boers under subjection. They have 69 mobile columns fighting against the enemy in as many different localities. Unfortunately, some of the columns carry too much baggage—there have been pianos sent to the front as baggage—so the agile Boers, though often closely pursued, manage to escape the meshes attached to be set for him.

Dr. McGuire, of the Northwest Territories, believes that in 25 years how Canada will have a larger population west of Winnipeg than east. The judge is probably within the mark, even though we count, as we have a right to do, by all present indications, on a very great augmentation of the population of Ontario through the development of her great resources in the northwestern portion of the Province.

The United States Department of Agriculture has made another discovery which will tend to make the sparrow still more unpopular. In the draught the mosquito has a natural enemy, but the sparrow is unusually fond of young dragon-flies, known as "sops." As soon as these flies appear from the water, and get their wings in order, the sparrows catch them by the thousand, and fatten on them. This enables the mosquito to multiply, and inflict great injury by spreading malaria.

Mr. Hanbury, a member of the Ontario Government, paid a warm tribute to the enterprise of the press in selling noteworthy events during the present war with promptitude. He had often read dispatches in newspapers twelve hours ahead of the time when the same news was officially received by the Government. We remember how Frederick Hamilton, Toronto Globe correspondent, "peddled" the War Office, and all editors, in sending his graphic reports of the fighting at Paardeberg, who achieve fame in this way, cannot stand on ceremony, and come to eat or sleep till their work is completed.

East Kent. A vacancy for East Kent in the Ontario Legislature, created by the death of the late Robert Ferguson, of Belleville, was yesterday filled by election by acclamation of Mr. Lee. East Kent is all right for Premier Ross, and it will be all right in the general election for the Ontario Legislature.

Enthusiastic Renomination of Premier Ross.

As the report elsewhere shows, the Hon. George W. Ross, Premier of Ontario, was yesterday enthusiastically renominated by the Liberals of West Middlesex as their standard-bearer for the representation of the splendid riding in the Legislature of the Province. That enthusiasm, that determination to increase the majority of the Middlesex Premier in his own constituency, are but omens of the greater triumphs for Mr. Ross in the general election to be held next year.

Perhaps the most useful thing we can do today is to point out the respective tendencies of the two leaders, Premier Ross and Mr. J. P. Whitney, leader of the Opposition. Take first, then, MR. WHITNEY'S TENDENCIES.

He opposed the creation of a Minister of Agriculture.

He opposed the establishment of the Algoma Pioneer Farm, the Western Dairy School, and the fruit spraying experiments.

He opposed many of the grants intended to make the Agricultural College more efficient.

He opposed the grant to the Poultry Association.

He opposed the appointment of a Provincial Road Commissioner.

He opposed the appointment of a Clerk of Forestry.

He opposed the providing of more accommodation for the insane by the erection of a new Asylum at Brockville.

He voted against a plebiscite on the temperance question.

He opposed a grant to the Victorian Order of Nurses.

He opposed a grant for the making of Township surveys in New Ontario.

He opposed the appointment of a Superintendent of Neglected Children.

He opposed the appointment of a Municipal Auditor.

PREMIER ROSS' TENDENCIES.

Premier Ross favors (1) the early settlement of the unoccupied lands of the Province by colonization and by the projection of railways into New Ontario.

(2) The manufacture within the Province, and so far as practicable by Canadian labor, of the products of our forests, such as pine and spruce, into lumber and pulp, and a smelting and refining of our mineral products, such as iron, nickel and copper ore, for the markets of the world.

(3) The increase of our agricultural wealth by improved methods in husbandry, fruit-growing, dairying, cold-storage and the production of beet sugar, and by reclaiming the un-drained lands of the Province.

(4) The extension of our trade with Great Britain in all natural products, but especially in cattle, horses and dressed meats.

(5) The disposal of our forest wealth, with a view to its perpetuation by reforestation, timber reserves and parks.

(6) The improvement of transportation by the better construction of highways and the removal of tolls.

(7) The regulation of rates for passengers and freight on all railways subsidized by the Province, and the ultimate control of such railways, at the option of the Legislature.

(8) The application of public revenues for the development of the Province and the relief of the taxpayers.

(9) The revision from time to time, as the public interests may require, of the laws governing the municipal and political institutions of the Province, and the improvement and enforcement of all laws affecting public morality.

(10) The maintenance of the independence of the Legislative Assembly as the guardian of the constitutional rights of the Province.

(11) The application of sound principles of education to the courses of instruction in all our schools and colleges, including technical schools for those concerned in industrial pursuits, agricultural schools for those concerned in husbandry, and schools of mining and engineering where a wider range of scientific knowledge is required.

The Antidote for Loafing.

The Montreal police magistrate says that much evil comes from boys congregating together in the evening at street corners. There is no doubt much truth in the statement. Street corner loafing, with bad companions, has been the ruin of many a boy.

There is a point to be considered here, however. In most homes there is no room for boys to play. They must go outside to do it. Be the evenings ever so bright, though, they are not permitted to play on the streets, and the corner lots and "commons" that once were safety valves are about as scarce as hens' teeth. What are healthy lads to do, under such circumstances, when they cannot have a little game of any kind, even on a side street of commodious width, without the police pouncing down upon them? It seems to us that society, by its rules, first decrees that boys shall not loaf, and then hauls them before the magistrate whenever they engage in the only other occupation open to healthy lads in hours of recreation.

If the boys must not loaf—and all agree that it is not healthy—they should be provided with as many playgrounds as may be necessary for their healthful development, and under the

head of playgrounds we would be inclined to include any open space where reasonable play might be indulged in without injury to person or property.

Breaking Marriages by Wholesale.

There were 2,418 divorces in Michigan last year, or one for every ten marriages. Over one-half the couples divorced had no children. It is proved by the divorce statistics of this state that where a couple lives together for ten years, they are likely to maintain the marriage tie; as few divorces take place in the case of persons married for a longer period, though one couple thought they would be better to separate after fifty-five years. To Canadians the noteworthy fact is that for every divorce that is granted in this country, there are at least four hundred granted in Michigan State alone. It is a record of instability in the marital state which Canadians never wish to imitate.

Municipal Coal Yards.

Ottawa coal dealers, it is asserted, combined to raise the price of coal to \$4 a ton—more than the article is worth, after giving a reasonable profit for handling. The city council, as a result, has agreed to apply to the legislature for legislation to permit it to establish a municipal coal yard, at which coal may be bought at first cost after paying for mining and carriage. The experiment will be watched with much interest by other municipalities. As a defensive measure, it really seems to be warranted.

Ice.

As the ice-harvesting season will soon be here, dealers and the public health officers will be much interested in the experiments and investigations made by the Massachusetts Board of Health. Contrary to the opinion of not a few, it has been ascertained by these experiments that water really purifies itself from bacteria in the process of freezing. In its tendency to purify itself during the period of crystallization water will push the bacteria down into the unfrozen liquid, but if the pond is so shallow that all the water freezes into a solid mass, it is evident that all the bacteria are contained in the ice, and are more numerous at the bottom than at the top. Hence the Massachusetts Board of Health feels that ice should be cut only on deep water, the deeper the better, inasmuch as the depth furnishes a retreat for the bacteria. Illustrative of this point may be mentioned that part of the experiment when polluted water was frozen in a pail. In the rapid transformation of that water into ice, the bacteria did not have time to escape from the top and sides entirely, but during the freezing process the greater bulk of them moved toward the center, which was the last to solidify, and when the ice was cut into pieces for examination, the outside was found to contain about 100 bacteria per cubic centimeter, while the middle contained about 20,000. Similar experiments were made with sewage, and bacteria were always driven back from the ice formation.

government deserves to, and, we trust may, continue to hold the helm of the ship of state in our beloved land for more than one decade of the new century. Mr. G. C. Elliott, of Ekfrid township, vice-president of the West Middlesex Reform Association, was chairman in a few well-chosen remarks that were to follow. Mr. Elliott stated that it had always been a source of pleasure to him since confederation to meet the Reformers of West Middlesex, and never had he derived greater pleasure from meeting his old confederates than today. 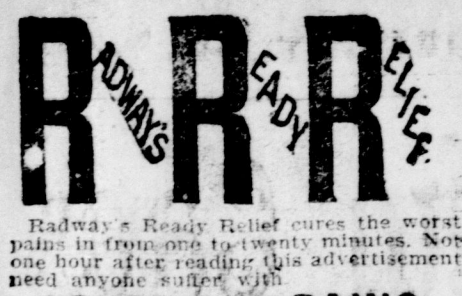

WATER COMMISSIONERS.

The committee, if they obtained the pavilion, would form a joint stock company, comprising many leading merchants and citizens. Mr. McCann said that stock has already been subscribed to the extent of \$1,000. The board will consider the tender.

ASSESSMENT IS \$138,000

Court of Revision So Fixes Street Railway Rating.

Figures \$60,000 Under Those of Assessment Commissioner—Other Changes.

The work of the court of revision for this year was completed yesterday, when the appeal involving the largest amount considered—that of the street railway company—was heard, and its assessment fixed for the year, provided the scrap iron assessment does not go through. Should it be operative, the assessment will drop to what it has been in the past. By agreement of the two parties, it was decided to make the assessment \$138,000, a total reduction from that made by Commissioner Grant of \$80,000. The court reduced the assessment on rails, poles and wires from \$113,000 to \$85,000. Bridges were assessed at \$18,000, and \$5,900 was taken from this item. Valuation on cars was \$67,000, and it was reduced to \$40,000.

Mr. Thomas McCormick, who would sell his residence and a lot across the road from it for \$20,000, though it was assessed at \$24,500, was granted a reduction of \$1,500, and the whole assessment of \$5,000 personally placed upon Mr. J. D. Saunby was removed by Dr. H. Macbeth, J. S. Plimel, W. J. Reed, Charles Cater, A. McInnes, Wm. Watson, W. C. Coe, S. J. Bell, Margaret Richardson, O. A. Taylor, W. T. Ferguson, Alf Keane, T. Macbeth.

These were allowed: Jeremiah Moran, real, \$100 off; Alf Tory, income, assessed in Hamilton; J. C. Elliott, statute labor; R. E. McInnes, statute labor; W. S. B. Barkwell, reduced from \$1,500 to \$5,000.

Inspector McCallum was added to the roll on account of income.

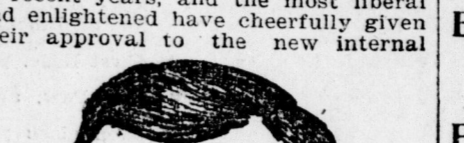
