#### DIRE DESOLATION.

Resulting from Monday's Storm in Alabama.

The Damago Reckoned by Millions-Homes Deinged.

MOBILE, Ala., Oct. 3 .- The damage done MORILE, Ala., Oct. 3.—The damage done by yesterday's storm will reach up into the millions. The steamer Crescent City was wrecked on the bay. In the gardeners' district across the river dwelt 23 families, the homes of which could be seen from any eminence in the city. Only one of, these homes can now be seen standing, and no news has yet been received. It is believed that many of the inhabitants have been lost.

The home of Stephen Walter was swept away, and his entire family, consisting of himself, his wife, and his niece, Miss Carrie

himself, his wife, and his nicce, Miss Carrie Wise, were drowned.

At Grand Bay four churches were destroyed, while at Soranton five churches suffered a like fate. Houses have been shattered, crops ruined, and desolation appears on every hand.

PENSACOLA, Fla., Oct. 3.—The most destructive storm that Pensacola has experienced in twenty years began at 6 o'clock yesterday morning and raged with increased fury until a late hour yesterday voening. No loss of life has been reported, but upon every street uprooted trees, broken fences and roofless buildings testify to the storm's force. The greater damage was on the bay. Before the storm reached its height several steamships that were taking on eargoes,

fore the storm reached its height several steamships that were taking on oargoes, raised steam and ran down to the lower bay where they had plenty of sea room. Every stick of timber in the bay was cast adrift and is now strewn along the beaches for miles.

Railroad communications are cut off. The only train reaching the city during the day was from the north at 4:35. All telegraphic communication was cut off before 10 o'clock yesterday, the wires being down in every direction, and no news of the storm could be sent out last night.

SEDATIVE OR STIMULANT?

Dr. Arnott Discusses the Properties of Alcohol,

And Gives His Reasons for the Belie That It Acts as a Narcotic or Sedative—Distinguished Physicians Think Likewise.

The great interest taken on the discussion concerning the medicinal uses of alcohol at the recent meeting of the Canadian Medical Association in this city prompted a reporter to interview Dr. Arnot on the subject, of which that gentleman has made a deep study.

\*\*The subject was introduced by Dr. Har. "The sunject was introduced by Dr. Har-rison, of Selkirk, the president-elect for the cusuing year, in a very able and liberal paper, in which he maintained the correct-ness of the old theory that alcohol is a stimulant," said the doctor in reply to

"You say the old theory is the other view held by many beside yourself?"

"O yes; in the old country many of the most distinguished men hold that the action of alcohol is similar to that of chloroform or opium. For instance, Prof. Wilkes, of Guy's Hospital, in a paper real before the British Medical Association, said that the stimulant theory was held only by a few antiquated physicians. And in the discussion which followed the expression was not called in question. Then Prof. Whitta, of Belfast, the author of one of the best books for medical students, says that we will never understand the action of alcohol as long as we look upon it as a stimulant."

Howland, of Toronto, was made permanent chairman. The noteworthy feature of this convention was the contest between the more conservative elements, led by J. J. Maclaren, Q.C., John McDougall, F. S. He has no objection to but finds commendation for a close union of the race on the continent of North America, north of Mexico, an area, in his opinion, vast mough with resources great enough for the energies of any people. At the same time a compact continental territory is held to offer the best means of defense against an aggressive power and offers practically no temptations to attack. This is what the writer says of the present position of the United States:

"In our present condition, we have over all the great nations of the world one advantage of incalculable value. We are the only one that is not in one of its parts threatened by powerful neighbors, the only one not under the necessity of keeping up a large armament on land or water for the security of its possessions, the only one that can turn all the energies of its population to productive employment, the only one that is outirely free. This is a blessing for which the American people can never be too thankful. It should not be lightly jeoparded."

The lodgment of a seed in the opening of this sack is the usual cause of peritonitis. Indeed some physicians to-day say that it is the only cause of inflammation of the bowels.
