DOG BIT 14 CYCLISTS.

Four Canadian Victims of the Rapid Animal at the Pasteur Institute in New York-Ten More Coming.

New York, July 13 .- Four of fourteen icyclists who were bitten by a dog while cycling in Oxford county, Ont. on June 21, went to the Pasteur Institute on Saturday to be treated for hydrophobia. They are Delbert Mayberry, of Ingersoll, Ont., who was bit-ten on the right leg; Geo. Spencer, of Ingersoll, Ont., who was bitten or left leg; James Mooney, o Dorchester, Ont., bitten on the right wrist and right leg. The patients were accompanied by Dr. George, of Salford,

The dog, which was a large, black Newfoundland, was owned by a farmer of Somerville, Ont., named Harris. He had owned the dog for many years, but owing to the animal's bad temper he had always kept it chained to a stake in the rear of the farmhouse. When Harris went to feed the dog on June 20 the animal snapped at him, and Harris noticed that it was frothing at the mouth. The farmer went to his house to get a gun to shoot the dog with, but before he repose to Start a Colony in Manitoba. turned the animal broke his chain and ran out into the highway. Harris informed the neighboring farmers of what had occurred. Unsuitable Marriages How Cause Endless Trouble.

Overwork at School Promotes Insanity -Such Is Dr. Daniel Clerk's Opinion.

Toronto, July 14 .- At the conference f charities and correction here. Dr. Daniel Clark, superintendent of the Toronto asylum for the insane, read a paper on "The relation of the public to the insane." Dr. Clark first noted the fact of heredity. "At least 60 per cent of the insane are foredoomed by heredity," he said. They cannot be turned out at the gate to look after themselves. \* \* \* Many have relatives who are not friends and who heartlessly refuse to have anything fo do with the convalescent insane. Few charitable institutions will take in those who have been thus afflicted. It is difficult for many such to procure employment. We all know how diffident the public are to take these into their shops and houses, although pronounced by medical officers of asylums to be industrious, harmless and recovered. Not only so, but the convalescents say they are watched and gazed at, and criticised in society. They are often not trusted, and treated as if they were expected to again break out into mania or do some overt-act against the wel being of their relatives or neighbors.
Such treatment irritates the mentally
well and often causes a relapse which
