



Why Not Pull Together?

A good deal of interest is naturally taken on this continent in the strong expressions of approval of an alliance between Great Britain and the United States, which were given utterance to in a late sederunt of the British House of Commons.

Recent happenings in the world's history are very educative in this regard. It has been shown that in her determination to keep China free from Russian and German restrictions, and retain that immense market for the whole trading world, of which the English-speaking population are no small portion, the British people are really fighting the battle of trade freedom for the United States, as well as for themselves. Then the traditional policy of the British nation has always favored freedom, and this has drawn out their sympathy to the United States in the policy of opposition to Spain's outrageous treatment of her Cuban colonists.

History has been rapidly made recently, and so has sentiment. There has been a drawing together of Great Britain and the United States in a manner that has not been possible for many years. We can only hope that this friendly alliance of the English-speaking race will become yet stronger and prove more effective in the banishment of war and the promotion of those interests that make for peace, progress and development. The Advertiser has always held that a moral, if not an organic union, of the two branches of the race would be of enormous advantage to mankind and to civilization.

when the admiral and the first three officers of the ship and 28 men had been killed and 48 wounded out of a total of 200, the fourth officer, then in command, decided to sink the vessel to keep it from failing into the hands of the enemy. He went below with men to do this duty, but was interrupted, while the hole was filling with water, by a Chilian officer who had boarded the helpless craft with a small squad of men. The fight had lasted an hour and a half. The upper works of the Huascar were in fragments, but her boilers were uninjured. She was taken into port, repaired, and within a few weeks was doing service at sea

for her captors. A FATEFUL SHELL. The battle of Sept. 17, 1894, off the mouth of the Yalu River, between the fleets of China and Japan, is the nearworking of such a force. Capt. McGif-Nearly 100 men were killed and wound-

The chief gunnery officer and the torpedo lieutenfleet may be on a fast cruiser, but better on the best battleship in his squadron. Since it is no longer possible for the commander to stimulate his men, by personal bravery before their eyes, in repelling boarders or leading them to the enemy's deck, he may do the next best thing by being of the ship that takes the lead in the fighting, stimulat-

ing the others in that way. The approach of the lines, by their combined speed, is propably at the rate of 28 miles an hour. The few minutes that elapse before the fleets meet for this first crucial test of the modern ironclad must be minutes of the most extreme and agonizing tension, and in them the fate of the battle may be decided. Some of the best eight-inch guns can fire four 210-pound shells in a minute. The rain of melinite shells poured from guns firing smokeless powder will wreck all parts of opposing ships except where they are protected by heavy armor. In three minutes six six-inch guns would fire 72 projectiles.

TERRIBLE BLAST OF FIRE. The partially protected cruisers will suffer most. Says one writer: "In that terrible blast of fire the compartments forward will be blown away or riddled like sieves. Watertight doors are useless when there are no watertight walls. The ships will be covered with debris. The upper works and the fun- functions. nels will be gone. Few ships of the barbette type have the barbettes properly supported. The explosion of shells under them will loosen them, and

in some of the vessels these masses of metal, weighing 700 or 800 tons, will sink and go down through the bottom, the vessel, of course, soon sinking under the water in its turn."

A DARK PROPHECY.

The same writer, who is one of the most eminent authorities on the fighting capabilities of the modern warship, H. W. Wilson has a dark prophecy to make. He reminds warriors that they have not sufficiently protected the funnels of their craft. The funnels will be naces, the men in the hold will be stifled, and fire may be expected to break out. The mechanism of a warship is as complicated as the nerves of a human body.
