## OOD LAWS BADLY ADMINISTERED BECOME BAD LAWS. The following extract from an articl

The following extract from an article en libel legislation recently prepared by John King, Q. C., shows how even legislation cannot help the papers to properly protect themselves. The article in question declares that wise adrinistration is as necessary as good

laws, and goes on to say:

The newspaper press is greatly indebted to the legislature of Oniario for the law of libel as it stands. With some slight changes, such as those indicated, the law would be improved, to the mutual advantage of publishers and the newspaper public. Too much, however, should not be expected from legislation. Not a few of the present grievances against the libel law are lue, not to the Act itself, but to the sprit is which, in some cases, it is administered in the courts, and to anomalies and absurdities which still anomalies and absurdities which still anomates and absurdates which still prevail in our general rules of proced-are and practice. These rules govern in all cases not expressly covered by the statute, and a good deal of discre-tion is allowed in their application. This discretion is not always wisely ex-arcised. Abuses like these the legislature can do little to remedy. UTOPIA IS COMING.

Scheme Will Be Effected.

Ray, B. Q. Denham of North Tona-wanda, N. Y., created a considerable stir in that city by delivering a Sunday night lecture last week which was the climax of a series of sermons in advocacy of Edward Bellamy's social scheme. Mr. Denham is the pastor of the wealthiest and most faskionable congregation in his city, and his radical teachings have caused much surprise. The previous Sunday moraing he declared that God's will would not be done on earth as it is done in heaven until the plan of government advocated by Edward Bellamy was fully realized. In his last lecture he declared that the signs of the times indicated that the day of its realization is about realized. In his last lecture he declared that the signs of the times indicated that the day of its realization is about to dawn. As stepping stones to this he advocated the income tax, the single tax and the nationalization of railways, coal mines and telegraph systems. One great point presented by the speaker was that of the inequality of land holdings. He declared that man no more made land than he did sunshine and air, and he had no more right to monoplize the one than the other. He also declared that the beattude "Biesz-d are the meek, for they shall inherit the earth," could not be fulfilled outside of economic equality. He also touched on the great paper mill trust that has just been effected, and said that such things hasten the day when the people will learn to centralize all industry in the nation. These views met with a more general approval in the wealthiest class present than was to be expected. This was shown by the enthusiasm of bankers and others.

Progress of Colored People.
When the negroes were set free at
the end of the rebellion there were no
poorer people in modern civilization.
Nevertheless, they have since then acquired wealth. Professor Jones, of Wheeling, W. Va., lately said: "In a generation the colored people have accumulated and pay taxes on \$400. a generation the colored people nave accumulated and pay taxes on \$400,-000,000 of real estate. We own and operate a street car railway in Arkansas. We own \$863,000 worth of shipping, \$102,000 worth of wharfage, five banks with a capital of \$3,000,000, and 200 daily and weekly newspapers." We have acquired and control 18 colleges, 34 eademies and 51 high schools and seminaries. We have more than 30,000 teachers in the public schools. 33 painters of merited reputation, 16 sculptors, 2,000 physicians, 295 dentists, 3,000 lawyers, 2,800 ministers, 540 telegraph operators, 3,000 skilled workmen of all sorts and conditions, 1,466 engineers, 1,600 captains and pictors, and a street and a seminaries. 1,466 engineers, 1,600 captains and pi lots of vessels, 2,970 bookkeepers an stenographers, and 8,000 printers."



Since the memory of man runs not to the contrary, or, more definitely, since the late Jeremy Bentham inaugurated the doctrine of the greatest good of the greatest number, there has been an effort, tentative yet perceptible, to get things ship-shape, to provide through arbitration against war, to improve sanitation, to fell disease, to foster matrimony and simplify existence. One does not need to be prophetic to assume that ultimately the effort will succeed. But consider the result. What with universal peace, universal sanitation, the fanging of the microbe and continuous matrimony, in no time at all—in two centuries at most—De Nadailiac declares that the earth will be overpopulated and that there won't in calculations that are curiously sug Nadaillac declares that the earth will be overpopulated and that there won't be enough food to go around. If he is right, then, indeed, the struggle for life will begin in earnest, and not of individual with individual, but of nation with nation, a stuggle such as history has never known and which will result in the survival of the fittest—providing always survival there be. It will be the clash and clatter of empires and republics contending, not for principles, but for bread; a sigantic upheaval in which whole races will disappear, and all because humanity is in love with an ideal that is not in love with it, because peace is not a blessing and because the microbe is a boon.

The Origin of the Cat.

It is impossible to trace the origin of the domestic cat with certainty to any existing species or variety of the wildcat. Indeed, the time at which the cat was first domesticated and introduced to human society is purely a matter of conjecture. Professor Shaler expresses the opinion that the domestication of the cat must have been much later than that of the dox while much later than that of the dog, while other naturalists give reasons for be-lieving to the contrary.

Some people agree with Professor Shaler, and for this reason: That dogs were probably first domesticated in order to assist in hunting, and, therefore, probably, in what is called the hunting age of human society, whereas the cat has nowhere been gen-erally used as a bunting animal. The dog is executably reparations: he loves dog is essentially gregarious; he loves to hunt in packs, and when introduced to a human family he regards the fam-ily as his pack and hunts accordingly, so that he is easily made serviceable the human hunter. The cat, on contrary, is unsocial; it lives alone, nts alone and feeds alone as that hunts alone and feeds alone, so that it could not be expected to be easily trained to hunt either with men or for trained to hunt either with men or for them. In fact, the only member of the cat family that is known to have been trained to hunt is the cheetah, though an ancient Egyptian painting, which may be seen in the British Mu-seum, represents a cat which is appar-ently assisting a hunter to catch birds.

There is another reason for thinking that the cat must have been adopted by man after the hunting age, namely, the cat's wonderful attachment to lo-cality. Animals like the wolf, with which the dog is most closely allied, follow their prey over vast tracts of country, and seem to be entirely des-titute of local attachment. The wildtitute of local attachment. The wild-cat, on the contrary, settles down in a particular spot and waits for its prey to come. When removed from its accustomed habitat it seems to lone its akill, and therefore would be useless to men in a hunting age, because in that age men seldom had fixed habita-tions, but roamed abroad wherever game was to be found. Of course, much of this is conjecture. Whether the cat or the dog was first adopted by men cannot now be certainly known, but the cat was well known as a domestic animal at an early pe-riod of human history.

Te Surpase Niagara.

But bly as the Niagara scheme is, work has just commenced upon a still larger scheme of water-power development near Massena, on the St. Lawrence river, United States of America. It is intended to develop here 150,000 horse-power by taking advantage of the difference in level between the St. Lawrence river and the Grass river, flowing nearly parallel to it at a dis-Lawrence river and the Grass river, flowing nearly parallel to it at a distance of three and a half miles. A big canal is to be cut across the intervening plateau, and a fall of water fifty feet in height thus obtained on the banks of the Grass river. The latter river will itself form the "tall race" of "undecided manner" for a considerable distance. Upon picking up the head power station. This scheme dwarfs the power station. This scheme awarts the Niagara one, since not only do the plans provide for a greater amount of power, but man is going to do what mature has done for him at Niagara—amely provide the waterfall. The namely, provide the waterfall. capital for carrying out this secessary capital for carrying out this scheme has been provided, work has been commenced and it is hoped that some of the turbines and dynamos will be working by December, 1898. If no unforeseen difficulty occur, and if this scheme be completed by the date mamed, it will certainly form one of the most remarkable achievements of the century.—Chambers' Journal.

Discric Turret-Turning.

One great drawback to hydraulic machinery is its tendency to freeze up in cold climates, which, of course, at once destroys its efficiency, says Cassier's Magazine. Steam, on the other hand, while free from the defect of freezing, must always take a certain perceptible amount of time to overcome the inertia of the piston and its attached machinery. Moreover, this inertia, once overcome, requires an equal force to bring the machinery to rest again. Thus it is found that with a turret fifteen feet in diameter the least movement possible with steam machinery, calculated on the rim of the turner, on one of the warships of the United States several months ago showed that with eteotric turning sear a turret of the same diameter could be moved—shat is, started and stopped again—size of those of day birds.

The chief objection to all radical inmovations like this one has hitherto been based on the sound principle that in actual conflict the machinery or motive power might break down and the work would have to be done by hand power in such an emergency; thus guns, turrets and every other fighting appliance on board some warships are provided with alternative hand tackle. But there does not seem to be any reason why electricity would not lend itself to be coupled with hand power apparatus, at least as well, if not better, than either steam or hydraulic power.

BOAT AND SLED.

AVING braved the perils of the deep in every section of the world, J. T. Mathews, who recently brought this weather beaten personality to anchor at Baltimore, is about to start on a trip to the Klon-

thewa, who recently brought this weather beaten personality to anchor at Baltimore, is about to start on a trip to the Klondike, in company with several other venturesome spirits, with a novel boat of his own invention. Mr. Mathaw' new boat is of such an unusual design that it has excited a great deal of ridicule from the marine experts of Baltimore, but he meets every criticism with the one remark: "I have sailed on every ocean and commercial waterwary of the world, and therefore I know what suits the Pacific ocean." Mr. Mathews' vessel is built on the order of a catmaran, but he has gone the twinhull idea one better by providing his boat with three hulls. He has constructed the boat for a twofold purpose—going through the water and where water ends and ice begins to gilde over the frozen surface, this being made possible by the equipping of the three keels with sicel runners.

The boat is 34 feet 6 inches long.

Each of the boats will be provided with cabins containing barths. The center boat of the craft will be shipped by rail in sections to Seattle, where the two smaller boats will be added. Mr. Mathews has formed his party of Klondike explorers into a company, to be known as the Mathews-Taby Alaskan Mining and Trading company, which has been regularly incorporated for the purpose of carrying on business in the gold fields. The prospectors will go by rail to Seattle, and will there embark on their three-hulled boat and set sail for the Yukon country. Snow falls all the year round in the part of the country to be traversed. Mr. Mathews regards "three" as a mascot number when gold mining is the object in view, and in addition to providing a trio of hulls for his Yukon craft he has caused each member of the party to sign a binding agreement that they will work together, prospecting and digging for old in the Klondike, for not less than three years.

He explains his reason for putting this limit on the combined efforts of the party by stating that three years is the length of time that he considers it will take for each man to acquire a sufficient quantity of Alaskan yellow metal to enable all to return with a fortune.

In the Commons Mr. Reid (Oona, Grenville) offered a resolution declaring that the Government should take immediate steps to do something more to assist in the development of our butter trade, and that this House is of the opinion that the Government should place in the estimates for the present session an amount to be paid to the farmers directly in way of a bonus of one cent per pound on a specified quantity of the finest fresh creamery butter to be exported to Great Britain while fresh and in condition to secure a reputation for itself and establish a lasting demand, and that the bonus be continued for three consecutive years; this bonus to be increased at the discretion of the Government on butter made during the winter months; all such butter to be subject to a rigid Government inspection. That this bonus be paid to only those farmers who will furnish for export regular supplies.
