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



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

When the great herds of reindeer go south in the fall, the Indians are in waiting for them, killing sufficient meat to keep them from starvation during the months of darkness and desolation.

The meat, as killed, is packed into caches-either high in the trees, well out of the reach of wolves, or in some natural cave, which is barriaded with rocks and timber.

What the Sydney Record Has to Say About the Big Sealer.
