The Foxes.

The Company has been formed for the purpose of breeding Silver Black Foxes in captivity and have secured three pairs of choice Island stock of Silver Black Foxes that cannot be excelled anywhere for beauty and lustre and just such stock as is bound to meet with ready sale as a live stock proposition or a sure and profitable seller on the fur market one pair of 80 per cent Black Cross Foxes and three pairs which are 60 per cent Black. These Cross Foxes have proven great breeders having litters of from four to six and past breeding records have shown that of these litters 56 per cent have been Silver Blacks.

The Ranch

The Ranch is beautifully situated in the hard wood, Birch Grove, of John H. Harrington, Caretaker, at Coldbrook in Kings County. There will be a fox house in each pen of average size and double floored, inside of which is a den for breeding purposes, each den being lined with material that absorbs all moisture; with modern ventilators so arranged that they may be opened or closed as occasion requires to suit the changeable atmosphere condition; in short this will be one of the most sanitary and best ranches constructed in this Province.

Two Americas Linked In a Wireless Chain

London, Aug. 22.—Wireless telegraph soon will be fully established between the United States and South America States, according to a statement made to-day by Wm. Marconi.

In an address at the annual meeting of the Marconi Company in London he announced that a fifty-year concession had been granted by the Brazilian Government, which would enable the company to inaugurate a wireless telegraph service between that country and New York and elsewhere in the United States. This, Mr. Marconi said, would be the beginning of a network of communication between South America, the United States and Europe.

A Forward Move in United States

In order to meet competition of the western apples in packing, which has great weight in sales, the State Board of Agriculture of Delaware U. S. A., has decided to establish an apple packing school for the instruction of Delaware growers.

Since standardizing and grading fruit increases prices, it has been suggested to all the large apple growers that they send their own men to the schools and pay their registration and their board for the week. The first week's work on their return to the orchard's will more than pay all this expense. The school will begin early in October or earlier and will be held either in Camden or in Dover.

The influence of packing upon sales was evidenced a few years ago, when Delaware apple growers competed at the Madison Square Garden Exhibition, the Western apples taking the greater number of prizes. Last year an expert apple packer came to Delaware and spent three weeks instructing some of the larger growers as to the packing in boxes and barrels. His work had its effect in last year's shows.

To Check Bee Diseases

If a percentage of the hives in an apiary are found to be attacked with foul brood, or any form of infectious disease, they can only be successfully treated when the material used for housing the colonies is sound and in good order. If bees have access to the combs of a hive by any other means than the legitimate entrance, the spread of the disease cannot be controlled with any certainty.

Spraying with chemicals for foul brood is not advisable, for nothing in the way of a spray that will do more than arrest the disease has yet been found. The starvation treatment is regarded as the only method that will effect a permanent cure, and this, we believe, it will do if properly carried out. It is also of great importance that bees should be prevented from robbing each other's hives while the apiary is under treatment.

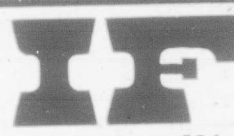

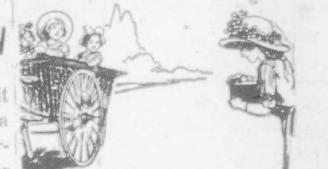

...been submitted to the local government handed down from Fielding to Murray and to this and this alone is due the present deplorable state of the road system throughout Nova Scotia. There can therefore be no doubt that the Morning Chronicle had a lucid moment when it gave expression to this sentiment which is in accord with the views of so many people in the province of Nova Scotia.

With the record of the Murray Government in handling the road monies of this province both from revenue and loans it would be utter madness to largely increase their resources in this regard. In the hands of the Murray Government, the road monies have simply constituted campaign funds which have been deliberately used for election purposes. Road commissions in the past have simply been orders on the road monies for political purposes. So tender is the Murray Government on this subject that they took the trouble to pass a special resolution in the legislature condemning the Borden Government proposal for the distribution of a large amount of money in this province for road purposes. When the Borden Government succeeded in passing through the House of Commons an act which would have given the province of Nova Scotia over \$200,000, in the past two years the liberal majority in the senate was made use of to kill the measure. No more barefaced act of partisanship was ever perpetrated in the Senate of Canada than the killing of this road bill. No intelligent reason could be given for it. It was apparent on the face of it that the sole objection was that the measure was intensely popular throughout the whole country and the Liberal opposition feared that political advantage would accrue to Mr Borden and his followers if this measure was allowed to pass. Though unable to kill the measure in the House of Commons, the liberal machine went to that asylum for disappointed and worn out politicians and lined up their venerable partisans against the measure for political purposes.

Good Roads Nova Scotia wants and Good Roads Nova Scotia must have. While it may be true, that what is called permanent roads in the sense of expensive bitumastic or macadamized road such as are used in Cities requiring no repairs for years is out of the question, yet Permanently Good Roads is what is aimed at and this implies roads to be put in a good condition primarily and kept good from year to year by the judicious expenditures of road monies.

However, with a government in power which has for 31 years absolutely failed to show the people of Nova Scotia a sincere or honest effort to even use to the best advantage the funds available for road purposes, it is utter folly to expect them to put any progressive agitation movement into practical execution. Therefore the Good Roads go on and ripen public opinion still more until a new and progressive and up to date government replace the old Murray barnacled and water-logged ship of state, long since stranded on the shoals of inaction.

The opinions were unanimous that there is an urgent need of a more progressive and modern road policy in Nova Scotia, and more expressed the opinion, even the Morning Chronicle included, that our road system should be removed from political influence. Now the only political influence to which the administration of our

Apple Famine in Ontario

That there will be an apple famine in Ontario is predicted in the crop report issued Aug. 20 by the Provincial Department of Agriculture. According to the statements of the Province, the apple crop will be remarkably light, and under exceptional favorable conditions will not equal half the normal yield of the orchards. From the first of the season the apple trees have suffered greatly from early frosts and subsequent dry spells while even in many of the sprayed orchards the scab ravages have been very bad. The Kent caterpillar has also been bad in the eastern sections and some orchards have been greatly defoliated. The early frosts have also injured the vineyards badly, and the grape crop will be but small. The pear yield will be good, while plums and peaches will be fully up to the yield of last year.

The Cabbage Worm

There are many remedies more or less effective, but sometimes it seems that in spite of all efforts against them they keep right on as though nothing had happened. One of the best of the simple remedies and very easy of application is good ashes and salt; two parts of the former to one of the latter. I prefer the best quality of table salt to the coarser kinds, and if applied in the early morning while the plants are still damp it will generally terminate their engagement. However, rains will wash off the application, and reinforcements may be expected at any time, so constant watching is necessary. Both the salt and ashes are excellent fertilizers and the former is especially helpful in heading and hardening up the heads.

The salt will often discolor the leaves, even to turning them black where too much of it adheres, but it will do very little, if any, harm and so frequent applications are recommended. Tobacco dust is also a good remedy, both as a fertilizer and insecticide but is not easily obtained except of the seeds-men or at tobacco factories. Some writers of very considerable reputation have strongly advocated the employing of boys with nets to capture and destroy the millers. Our judgement of his plan, however, is that an active boy chasing through the patch with his net, intent upon capturing the miller would knock more plants than the worms would destroy.

Many have objections to using the arsenical poisons, but we believe when judiciously used no possible harm can come, either from Paris green or arsenate of lead. The former may be used as a dry or spray mixture. In using the dust application, a convenient plan is to use a rounding teaspoonful of the Paris green to a quart of rye or wheat flour. Mix thoroughly and put into a tarleton bag. It should be applied in the early, still morning while the dew is on, by shaking slightly over the plants. If used as a spray mixture, a weak solution say, one pound to the hundred gallons of water will be strong enough. Arsenate of lead will only require about half the strength for potatoes. The smooth, glassy surface of the cabbage leaf does not readily hold spray mixtures of any kind but this can be remedied by using soapy water. Even quite strong suds will do no harm. —Fruit Grower and Farmer.

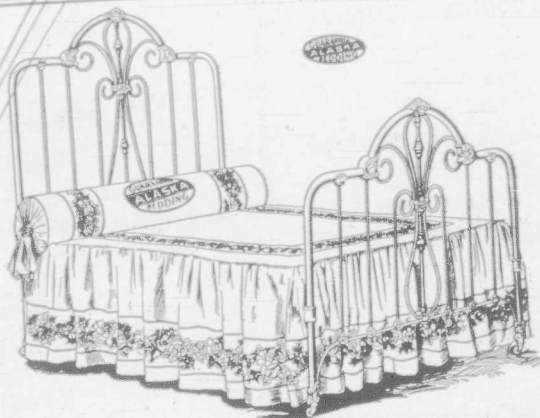
