Asphalt Pavements Kill Trees.

In connection with the re-paving of Brooklyn streets, which has become a subject of pressing concern through the recent outgiving of the Mayor, an interesting point has been made concerning the effect of aspha't pavements on trees. Experience shows that in streets where such pavements have been laid the trees do not flourish, if indeed they do not speedily wither. The reason is not far to seek. It is apparent on a moment's thought that it is almost impossible for water to penetrate to the roots of the trees beneath such an impervious covering, and hence their decline is inevitable. No plans are now in view for increasing the asphalt pavements in Brooklyn, but this matter is worth keeping in mind against the possibility that the question may be raised at some time in the future Asphalt pavements have certain undoubted disadvantages, along with equally undoubted disadvantages. The drawback mentioned here is doubtless sel-forntaken into account.

Where so much depends upon order and accuracy in the managament of the house-keeper it is not always easy to proportion the work of each day. Too much is thrown upon Monday and Tuesday—why not postpone washing till the latter day? On Monday the house can be put to rights, bread baked and desserts made for that day and the next. That night the table may be laid and covered with netting put in soak and all the material made ready for breakfast. Where there is but one domestic or none at all, the week's labor is thus under much better control. The first meal should consist of few dishes, and the dinner may all be previously cooked save the vegetables. The domestic, who swept hall, steps and piazza, while the fire was kindling, has only to remove the breakfast things, wash the dishes and go to her laundry work. On Wednesday she is not over-fatigued by the previous day's work, and there is time enough to keep the house clean during the remainder of the week, finishing up odd jobs on Monday, Where two or more girls are kept the same custom might well prevail, by which means the cook will be able to do all cooking, so that the food may be niely cooked as usual.—Hetter M.
