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LONG LIVE EDWARD VII., The New Monarch Enters His Capital and Attends Privy Council.

LORDS AND COMMONS, Take the Oath—Her Majesty's Remains still at Osborne.

KING ENTERS HIS CAPITAL, London, Jan. 23.—1 p.m.—The King entered his capital at 12.55 p.m. and proceeded to Marlborough House.

Took Title of Edward VII. London, Jan. 23.—3.05 p.m.—At the meeting of the Privy Council the King took the title of Edward VII, King of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland and Emperor of India.

WELLINGTON'S MESSAGE, Warden Springer Categraphed British Secretary of State.

SYMPATHY IN BEREAVEMENT, County Court Room is Draped in Mourning.

When the County Council assembled this morning the court-room, according to the instructions they passed on Tuesday, was tastefully decorated with respect to the death of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria. The Queen's picture, the Coat of Arms, the Warden's coat of arms, were all shrouded in black as they were, gave fitting evidence that the County of Wellington is in mourning for the death of their beloved Sovereign.

Warden Springer, in accordance with the motion passed at Tuesday's meeting, sent a cablegram containing a message of sympathy to the Secretary of State, London, England; the text of which is given in the Warden's address to the Council.

To the Council of the County of Wellington: Gentlemen—Permit me to again thank you for the honor you have done me in unanimously electing me to the highest office in the gift of the council, an honor which is probably never conferred on any man in this county. At the moment of my election I was the first wardman of this county for the 20th century. I trust I shall be able to fill the position with satisfaction to the council and the taxpayers of the county generally. I have most been informed by ex-Warden Henderson that since the December session, he, together with the undersigned, inspected the superstructure of the new steel bridge erected on the boundary line between Milford and Normandy, known as the "Steel Bridge," and found that it was not completed according to contract. The engineer recommended that the contractor should be paid \$400 on account, viz. \$700 by this county and \$300 by the County of Grey retaining a balance of \$1000 on each county until the work is properly completed in accordance with the specifications.

The grant of \$400 for the erection of the Provincial Winter Falls building was made by the council in the month of December when the works were completed and the balance of \$2000 as soon as the work is done by the contractor. The work is now fully completed with the exception of the pointing of the masonry work, which cannot be done until the spring. The contractor has retained a sufficient amount of the contract money to pay for the work of having the bridge repainted. I have the honor to be, gentlemen, your obedient servant, WARDEN.

The address was referred to a special committee consisting of the following: Hamilton, Harrison, Laidlaw, Lang, Dryden, Dow, and McKewen.

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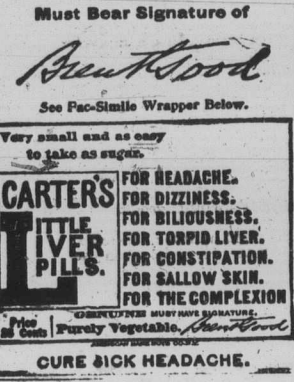
