Regular Meeting Town Council

The Regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held in the Police Court Room on Thursday July 17th 1919, at eight o'clock p. m. Present, Mayor Doyle, Ald. Durick, Fish, Jeffrey, Russell and Sargeant. Minutes of meeting of July 7th were read and confirmed.

A letter from Lord Beaverbrook thanking the Council for their cordial reception tendered him on his visit to Newcastle was read as follows.

New York, July 9th. 1919.
My Dear Mayor

I take the occasion of my departure for England to thank you and the members of the Council for the cordial reception you gave me on my visit to Newcastle. I hope therefore that you convey to them and through them to the people of Newcastle, my gratitude for the kindness of their welcome. It is always a pleasure to me to be among my old friends and my fellow townsmen, and I need not assure you and them, that I have and shall continue to have, the interest of Newcastle at heart and to hope for and believe in its continued prosperity.

On motion of Ald. Durick, seconded by Ald. Sargeant the same was received and ordered filed.

The Petition Committee recommended that the petitions regarding taxes be referred to the assessors for report, and on motion of Ald. Durick seconded by Ald. Sargeant this recommendation was adopted.

With reference to petition requesting repeal of bye-law governing dances, it was moved by Ald. Durick seconded by Ald. Sargeant, that section 3 of Bye-Law No. 9 be amended by striking out sub-section 3 b, and substituting therefor the following—

3 b. No Dance shall be held in the Town of Newcastle without a permit from the Mayor or Bye-Law Committee, carried.

Yeas:—Ald. Jeffrey, Sargeant, Fish, Durick.

Nays:—Ald. Russell.

The Finance Committee recommended payment of the following accounts.

D. W. Stohart \$5.78; Richards and A'Hern \$22.00 Miranichi Manufacturing Co. Ltd. \$134.87, Lounsbury Co. Ltd. \$47.00 and on motion of Ald. Russell, seconded by Ald. Durick the same were passed and ordered paid.

The accounts of P. Hennessy for \$115.00 from the Public Works Committee was passed and ordered paid on motion of Ald. Sargeant seconded by Ald. Durick.

The Park and Fire Committee recommended payment of the accounts of R. G. Anderson & Son \$22.00, Sumner Co. \$19.35; Landry & McIvor \$14.00, and on motion of Ald. Jeffrey seconded by Ald. Russell the same were passed and ordered paid. On motion of Ald. Durick, seconded by Ald. Jeffrey the following Light and Water Accounts were passed and ordered paid.

Canadian Fairbanks \$7.14, I. C. Coal Mining Co. Ltd. \$273.26, Canadian Brass Co. Ltd., \$74.16; T. McAvity & Sons Ltd. \$43.49; Sumner Co. \$168.45; Fraser Ltd. \$90.00; Sumner Co. \$1897.17; Can. Electric Co. Ltd. \$121.92; Imperial Oil Ltd. \$70.85; P. Hennessy \$9.43; and D. K. MacLaren Ltd. \$2.70.

It was moved by Ald. Jeffrey, seconded by Ald. Russell and carried that the chief of Police be instructed to give notice that execution will be issued for all Dog Taxes unpaid after August 1st.

The Police and Appointment to Office Committee recommended the re-appointment of Mrs. S. A. Demers as School Trustee, and on motion of Ald. Fish seconded by Ald. Sargeant the recommendation was adopted.

The Mayor called attention to the fact that July 19th had been proclaimed a Holiday by the Governor General, and stated he did not consider a proclamation by the Mayor necessary. After a short discussion it was moved by Ald. Fish seconded by Ald. Durick and carried, that the Council recommend that the citizens observe Saturday as a holiday, and it was moved by Ald. Russell seconded by Ald. Jeffrey and carried that the Mayor issue a proclamation making

Serious Fire Last Night

Fire broke out last night at 11.30 o'clock in the Fish building occupied by Mr. LeRoy White as a Grocery and Mr. Geo. M. Lake as a Harness Store. It was one of the most stubborn fires that the Newcastle Fire Dept has had to contend with for some time. The fire started upstairs over the portion of the building occupied by Mr. White and spread rapidly through the walls to the part occupied by Mr. Lake.

The firemen played three streams of water on the building for upwards of two hours before they succeeded in getting it under control. The building was badly damaged and gutted with water and is practically a total loss.

Some of the stock carried by Messrs White and Lake was removed, but on account of the dense smoke, the larger portion was left in the building, and was badly damaged by water. Mr. White, and his brother Frank, who conducts the business, were both out of town on business at the time of the outbreak of the fire, but motored into town about 12.30 p. m. to find their place of business in flames and gutted with water. The origin of the fire is unknown and insurance is carried on both building and stock.

Mr. White carried \$1000.00 insurance on stock. Mr. Lake \$3500.00 on his stock and machinery, and Mrs. Jas. O. Fish \$1000.00 insurance on the building.

BAPTIST DISTRICT ANNUAL MEETING

The annual meeting of the United Baptists of the 10th District, met in the Whitneyville Church, Thursday and Friday, July 10th and 11th. The meeting on Thursday night was presided over by the chairman, Rev. H. E. Allaby and a large congregation was present. The opening exercises were led by the chairman, assisted by D. C. Keane and Rev. W. Camp.

Rev. R. W. Hopkins of Upper Blackville delivered the annual sermon taking his text from Psalm 104. Let my meditation be sweet unto Him. This was an address of particular merit and was delivered in Mr. Hopkins' original and pleasing manner.

The chairman appointed the standing committees as follows: Nominating—H. W. B. Smith, D. C. Keane, H. F. Whitney.

Resolutions—Revs. Camp and Kinley.

The secretary then presented the program, which was adopted. The offering was taken, amounting to \$9.35.

Rev. W. C. Machum, the newly appointed secretary of Sunday School and young People's Work, was called to the platform and addressed the meeting on "The Importance of Religious Character." Although this was Mr. Machum's first visit to the District, in his initial address he enlisted the cooperation of his audience in the important work he has undertaken. The meeting closed with the benediction by Rev. J. G. A. Belyea.

The choir rendered appropriate music throughout the session.

The meeting on Friday morning, was presided over by Rev. H. E. Allaby. Prayer was offered by D. C. Keane, L.C. The business of the day was then taken up. The courtesies of the gathering were extended to Miss Machum, Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, and other visitors. Church letters were read by Mr. Haviland Hovey. These letters were discussed by Revs. Camp, Kinley, Belyea, and Weaver and D. C. Keane. At the juncture business was suspended and a delightful devotional half hour was conducted by Rev. G. S. Weaver. At 11.50 a. m. business was resumed.

The new workers, Miss Esther Clarke, first lady preacher in the province, Mr. D. C. Keane, licence of the 10th District, Rev. R. W. Hopkins, pastor at Upper Blackville, and Rev. G. S. Weaver, pastor at Whitneyville were fittingly welcomed by the chairman. Each worker responded appreciatively.

Allotments for the coming year were proposed and adopted.

The report of the nominating committee was read and adopted. Following are the officers for the ensuing year:—

President—Rev. W. Camp.
Vice-President—Rev. G. S. Weaver.
Secretary—Rev. E. A. Kinley.

Members of Executive Committee: Revs. R. W. Hopkins and H. E. Allaby, Miss Clark, Mr. C. C. Hayward, J. Corney.

The new chairman was then installed.

The retiring chairman, Rev. Mr. Allaby, then addressed the meeting on Sacrifice, Union and Reconstruction. A co-operative Committee on S. S. Work was appointed, consisting of—Rev. H. E. Allaby, Miss Clark, and Mr. John Corney.

The chairman spoke appreciatively of the spirit and work of Miss Clarke at Grangeville.

In the Friday session, Rev. J. G. A. Belyea, Secretary of the N. B. Association, addressed the meeting on Home Missions, in which address he reviewed the history and present work of Home Missions in this province.

The report of the Resolutions Committee was read and adopted as follows:

Resolved: That this meeting put itself on record as appreciating the action of our Federal Government in bringing forward a law providing for Dominion wide Prohibition and for the determined stand which the members of the committee have taken to have it placed on our Statute Books. We also wish to record our disgust at the action of the Senate in standing in the way of this measure, the enactment of which is of vital importance to the welfare of Canada during the time of reconstruction.

Resolved.—That this meeting express its heartfelt Christian sympathy to Rev. H. E. and Mrs. Allaby, in the loss of their baby girl, the sunshine of whose life God loaned them for such a short time, and also to the families throughout the District, who during the past serious year have been forced to bow their heads in sorrow for the loss of their loved ones.

Resolved: That the officers and delegates of the District meeting tender our hearty thanks to the pastor and people of the Whitneyville Church for the use of their Church building, and for their unbounded hospitality which has made our stay in Whitneyville so pleasant, and also to the choir for their service.

We have learned with deep sorrow the very serious charges laid against the character of Rev. Sterling W. Stackhouse. This offence is said to have been committed while he was pastor of one of our churches. There fore resolved:

That in view of these sworn testimonies before the divorce court and on other occasions without refutation.

And in view of the circumstances attending Mr. Stackhouse's departure from our province. We the members of the Tenth District assembled in our annual gathering express our conviction that until he clears himself of these charges that he be not permitted to exercise the functions of a Baptist Minister and further resolved:

That unless these charges be proved false we request our convention to strike the name of Sterling W. Stackhouse from the list of ordained ministers and that he be regarded a minister of the gospel no longer among us.

The Collar

The collar should be just large enough to permit a man's hand to pass inside the collar between the lower end of the collar and the neck or breast of the horse. If the collar is too loose it will cause friction; if too tight it will choke the horse, and cause sore withers. Test the fitting of the collar by lifting up the horse's head.

The harness should fit the collar; if too long, they will probably be buckled too tight at the top, and in this way the collar will be made to pinch the horse at the top. Sores thus produced begin by a pimple or very small boil, often overlooked because the mane covers it.

Examine your horse continually, and if there is any sore spot, adjust the collar so that it will not touch that spot. If the skin is merely wrinkled, bathe it with clean water, containing a little salt.

If the collar "rides up", it can be kept down by a martingale running to the girth, or by an extra girth running from trace to trace, back of the forelegs.



BOLSHEVIKI ASSUME CONTROL

Possibly the most tumultuous gathering
of its kind—a so called school meeting
was held at Nordin, N.B. on Monday Even-
ing 14th Inst. The meeting was fairly
evenly divided into two parties, the one
seeking the election of Frank Taylor, and
the other the re-election of Thos. Daugh-
ney. The latter however had taken the
precaution to bring with him, to the meet-
ing, a gang of hoodlums whose instructions
were to prevent any of the party repre-
senting Taylor from being heard.

Their first move in the direction
was the nomination of Angus Kenny as chair-
man knowing that Kenny, a violent repub-
lican of Daughney, was entirely un-
fitted either by education, or experience, to act
as chairman of any gathering. Kenny
started the ball rolling by attempting to
begin in the middle of the crowd of busi-
ness, but was sharply called to order by
Joseph H. O'Beirne. Kenny attempted to
press his point, but was easily prevented
from doing so. Seeing that they were a
minority in the school, the Daughney
party resorted to other tactics, one of them
being to get a number of instructions, but
the school (with but a few exceptions) re-
fused to act on any of the instructions of the
Daughney supporters. Some of the
Daughney supporters have been boast-
ing that they had taken the school, but
both sides are silent about the school. Ar-
rests are expected within the next few days
by these cross violators of the law. The
Daughney supporters within and without
the Hall kept up a constant yelling and
whooping in order to prevent the party re-
presenting Taylor from being heard. The
decisions of the Chairman were ludicrous
in the extreme. Boiled down, they simply
meant that his party could talk as long,
and as often, as they wished, but by every
expedient he endeavored to prevent the
opposition from being heard. These at-
tempts were prevented more often than
not by J. H. O'Beirne.

Some of the most active parties in the
Daughney crowd were women from out-
side the District whooped and yelled like
maniacs in support of their candidate.
Seeing that there was no intent to re-
nder fair play to their candidate, the party
representing Taylor withdrew from the
Hall. They have petitioned the Education
Dept. to set aside the election (so-called)
of Daughney and are confident of a deci-
sion in their favor.

Patrick Keane the Secty. of the meet-
ing was too excited to take notes and so
simply contented himself with shouting
and waving his hands in the air.

A new meeting will undoubtedly be or-
dered as an appeal has been made against
the ridiculous affair, to the Board of Ed-
ucation or the Inspector.

To Adopt the Unit System Reported

It is reported that the Government proposes to adopt the unit system in

the administration of the national railways, which will be an important change in line with recommendations made by various Boards of Trade in the Maritime Provinces who fear that the plan of having the head offices at Toronto would lead to a neglect of the interests of the Eastern Provinces. It is not officially confirmed, but it is stated that in the event of the unit system being adopted, the following are among the changes probable:
General Superintendent L. S. Brown would become General Manager of the Atlantic or Eastern District; W. A. Kingsland, at present Assistant General Manager Eastern lines, would be made general manager Central District, and F. P. Brady at present General Manager Eastern lines, would become General Manager Western District. Mr. Brown would thus have his headquarters at Moncton and have absolute jurisdiction over all lines and questions arising within his territory which would likely extend from Montreal eastward.

If these views are carried out with a co-ordinating central head, there is little doubt the changes would do much to allay the feeling of dissatisfaction in railway matters at present existing in the Maritime Provinces.

Medical Men Suggest Amendments to Prohibition Law

St. John, N. B., July 16.—At the final session of the New Brunswick Medical Society held this afternoon the committee appointed to bring a report on the suggested amendments to the Prohibition Act submitted a resolution in which they put themselves on record as affirming:
That alcohol is a necessary drug and should be under no more restrictions than any other drug, that the prices now charged for alcohol are excessive and the Government be asked to control the price. The alcohol, and alcoholic stimulants now obtainable is, in many cases impure, adulterated and not up to the drug standard. The Government is responsible for the quality of alcohol and should put these sections of the act in force.

One section of the Act states that only one sale a day may be made to one person. We advise, stated the doctors, that this part of the section be eliminated as it is often necessary to prescribe more than one form of alcohol in a day. It is admitted that occasionally provisions of the Act are violated by physicians, and this violation is much deprecated. The authorities are requested to report violations to the medical council for their action. We feel, however, that physicians are only responsible for an infinitesimal part of the drunkenness that exists and would ask the Government to take steps to control the sale of proprietary medicines and alcohol extracts. We believe that special prescription blanks required for alcohol are inconvenient and unnecessary. We protest against their use. The word "visit" used in the Act should mean either office or house call.
