

Big Bomb Placed in Doorway of Co-operative Bakery Blows in the Front, Also Jumps Street

Police Working on Bomb Outrage And Are Following Up Some Clues

Bomb Was Placed in Doorway of Bakery—Explosion Woke Up People All Over the City—Much Damage Done to Both of the Buildings.

Some few minutes before 1.20 o'clock Sunday morning someone placed a bomb in the doorway of the International Co-operative Bakery on Front Street. It was a big bomb bus-like in every way. Among other things it contained a lot of big railway spikes. Put in a place to do damage it was planned to carry out its function.

About 1.20 there was an explosion which shook the whole neighborhood and was heard all over the city. Some people at distant points were awakened from sleep. The front of the bakery was blown and wrecked from cellar to ceiling. Spikes the bomb had contained were embedded in the ceiling of the shop. In all the police found seven shrapnel.

There was no trace of the rest of the bomb though parts of it may be in the water in the cellar. The force of the explosion wrecked the front of the Rosenberg building opposite, blowing in the fronts of the three stories on the ground floor.

People sleeping in the rooms upstairs were showered with flying glass in their beds. Windows in houses two blocks away were broken. The three stores were occupied as Rosenberg's Grocery, Smith's Meat Store and Rosenberg's Pop Shop.

Piles of glass and debris from the explosion strew the vicinity of the wrecked buildings. The bakery which was the object of the destruction of the authors of the outrage, is not as badly damaged as the building across the street. No one was in the bakery building at the time.

Girl Declares She and the Chauffeur Were Held Up, But Latter Denies Story

According to Story of Young Woman Two Soldiers Held Them Up and Relieved Them of Money and Jewellery—Police Are Investigating.

NIAGARA FALLS, N. Y., March 22—Russel Howey, driver of the taxi which figured in an alleged hold-up on the Lewiston mountain Saturday night has denied the story Dorothy Robinson, of Kensington told the police, according to the report of Patrolman William Dawson. Owing to the conflicting stories a rigid investigation will be made the police say.

When half way down to Lewiston Miss Robinson says the taxi encountered another automobile in the center of the highway with two soldiers examining the engine. When the taxi approached she says, she and the chauffeur were ordered to dismount and the soldiers, each holding a revolver, took the money from them and ordered them to proceed. After waiting in vain for the return of the chauffeur, who she would notify the police of this city, Miss Robinson says she took a later car for Lewiston.

Howey, who told Patrolman Dawson that he drove the girl to Lewiston says that she delivered her without mishap and that she paid him his fare there. He denies that there was any hold-up or delay of any kind during the trip from this city to Lewiston.

Suggests New Scheme For Bringing of Water Here and Other Places

M. Frederick A. Dallyn, Provincial Sanitary Engineer, addressed the Welland Water Commission and the City Council and spoke on the pipe line scheme for a purer water supply for this district. His scheme was to build a reservoir at Fonthill on a site 825 feet above the sea level. In case of any break in the pipes, a system of shut-off valves would be installed, and water then could be maintained at a proper pressure. The cost would be such as to double the present rates, followed by a gradual reduction, until they returned to normal.

The municipalities interested with St. Catharines and Welland are Port Dalhousie, Merrittton, Thorold, Allanburg, Port Robinson, Fonthill, Hornberstone, Port Colborne, Niagara Falls and Stamford. Engineers had estimated that the population of these municipalities would amount to 110,000 in 1930.

He stated also that chlorination was not satisfactory, as it did not remove the deleterious solids. Welland, he stated, could only get pure water from either of two points: Port Colborne or in the Niagara River at Chippawa. Niagara Falls would in a few years, be compelled to go to Chippawa for water. His scheme would cost \$6,500,000 and would take four years to construct. The annual cost was estimated at \$542,000, divided between the different municipalities. Mr. Dallyn urged action in this district for a more adequate and purer water supply.

Frank Fleming Willing to Box Champ Kilbane

CANADIAN CRACK FEATHER WOULD CONCEDE MANY POINTS FOR BOUT

Many exalted members of the boxing fraternity are looking Toronto-ward, and there is every prospect that before long several champions and title-contenders will make their first whirl in a local ring. And why not? The Queen City has loyally supported the sport and fans are entitled to see the best in the business. Johnny Kilbane, is already preparing for his meeting here under G.A.C. auspices with Frankie Fleming, who on his record is probably the Cleveland veteran's greatest rival for the 126-lb. honors. Fleming for the last few years has had to go out of his class to get any bouts at all, and even the pick of the 155-pounders fight shy of the game.

Only a month or so ago a local match-maker scoured Buffalo and Detroit in an effort to secure a suitable opponent for him, but every boy he approached had a pressing engagement elsewhere when Frankie's name came up. "They will get any too anxious to meet him, judging from the story wired from Buffalo that he would not enter the ring with Fleming unless an outside referee was selected. The latter's attitude is altogether different. He is so keen to force Kilbane to defend his laurels that he says that he will meet Kilbane under any old conditions and on a win-new world's champion if Kilbane toes the scratch and well he knows it."

The Preparation Fleming's next bout of any account will be here next Friday night when he clashes with Terry Martin of New York, at Massey Hall in the main bout of the G.A.C. show. Martin who is a legitimate 126 pounder, was picked by promoter Hallett only after mature consideration. He is the best of the younger generation and Fleming will find in him a boy capable of making him extend himself to the utmost. According to New York despatch Martin has never been defeated or even knocked off his feet, while he has beaten such good boys as Eddy Morgan, Frankie Callahan, Jimmy Lane, Frankie Conniffey, Eddy Murphy, Charlie Hayes, and Joe Leonard. If he wins over Fleming or even holds the Canadian champion to a draw, he will be right in line for a battle with Kilbane or Volger. Morgan was one of the boys selected to go to France recently with Johnny Griffiths, but an accident received in training prevented him from making the trip.

Sudden Death of Miss Laura Shea After Short Illness

St. Catharines residents were shocked on Saturday afternoon when they heard of the unexpected death of Miss Laura Shea, which took place at the General and Marine Hospital, after a couple of hours illness. The late Miss Shea was on an N.S.&T. car on her way to keep an appointment with her physician, and when in the vicinity of the station on St. Paul street, she was taken ill and carried into Magness drug store. Later she was taken to the hospital where she passed away shortly afterwards.

Tells of Amalgamation of United Veterans' League and the Grand Army of Canada, and Makes Strong Plea to the G. W. V. A. to Come in and Make a United Whole.

President Harry Flynn of the United Veterans League at the big mass meeting of returned soldiers at Griffins Opera House Sunday afternoon, made an earnest appeal to the Great War Veterans Association to come in with his organization and the Grand Army of Canada. The combined soldiers organization could present a solid front to the Government at Ottawa. The U. V. L. and G. A. C. are amalgamating, the ceremony to take place at a convention in Toronto April 15th. These two organizations are political and have practically the same constitutions. With the G. W. V. A. there is the difference of the Gratuity plan, but some compromise could easily be made.

"We were told at Ottawa that as soon as we decided among ourselves, what we want we were to come back, and I think the three forces should combine and then present our case to the government," said Mr. Flynn.

The lower floor of the Griffin Opera House was nearly filled the audience being composed principally of returned soldiers, though there were some non-combatant soldiers and women present.

The meeting was with President Flynn to a remarkable extent, all his points being enthusiastically cheered. There were one or two hostile parties in the audience who sought to discredit Flynn's case by discrediting Flynn, but it was pointed out very aptly by Flynn himself that no matter what Flynn had done or had not done, the case for the returned soldiers was the same. He repeated that he had served as a stretcher bearer in the front lines. He had tried to enlist as a fighting man but a disability had prevented this.

The meeting showed little sympathy with the two or three who tried to attack Flynn and howled them down unmercifully. W. J. Westwood was in the chair and on the platform were Aldermen Graves, Dakers, Riffer and Veate. Mayor Lovelace and Ald. Avery were in the audience.

Harry Capewell and Captain Tupper, the fighting parson, who represents the G. A. C. also spoke.

Mr. Westwood explained that the money collected at the door was to go to apoor widow whose husband had died leaving her destitute, her son having been killed in battle. As the son had not been her support, she could not receive a pension under the Pension system.

"If the government did its duty no such distress as this could take place said Mr. Capewell. He hoped to see the time when the returned men would receive justice. He spoke of the amalgamation of the G. A. C. and U. V. L. and said the new name would probably be the Grand Army of United Veterans. All the officers of both organizations will resign and a new election will be held of the combined bodies.

Captain Tuper the next speaker said after what he found when he came back from France he would not be a man unless he were on the platform speaking on the interests of the returned men and their dependents.

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

ABOUT THE SEED DRILL

What Is Considered to be the Most Efficient Type.

The Feeding Device is the Heart of the Drill—Seed Should Be Dropped Directly Under the Axle of the Disc—Give the Bearings Careful Inspection.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

As the drill sows, so shall the farmer reap, is no fallacy. It is as true in its content as the maxim "As a man sows so shall he reap." Given the right kind of a grain drill, the seed is all planted at a uniform depth, evenly covered; the earth compacted just enough to retain the moisture around it. These conditions mean that the young plants will all come up at the same time, that the roots will be well protected, and that the grain will ripen uniformly. As the grain is planted, so will it grow and ripen. If some of the seed is planted too shallow, and some too deep, the seed that comes up first, ripens first. Thus it is that some of the grain is ready to harvest while other patches are still in the milk stage.

The feeding device is the heart of the grain drill. Upon its reliability depends the accuracy of sowing the seed. The drill scale is computed for the average sized seeds, and therefore cannot always be depended upon when the size of them varies from the normal. If the grain is oversized or undersized the required amount per acre may be sown by setting the feed lever at a point slightly greater or slightly less than shown on the indicator. There are, in common use, two different forms of feeding devices. The fluted-cylinder-force feed, and the double-run-force feed. The amount of seed sown by the fluted-cylinder-force feed may be regulated by a lever which changes the size of the outlet, but it does not always handle all classes of seed without breaking them, as can be done with the double-run-force feed, which necessarily requires for driving it a disc wheel, or a cog wheel with from nine to fifteen sets of cogs that make as many speeds or feeds.

In the most efficient type of grain drills the seed should be deposited as nearly directly under the axle of the disc as possible, as this is the only place where the seed can be dropped directly on to the bottom of the trench without hindrance. By this method the disc is not run deeper than the seed is deposited, thus the draft is reduced to a minimum. If the seed is deposited in the rear of the centre of the axle, the rotation of the disc tends to carry earth and seed up with it, causing the seed to be unevenly deposited. In operation, a properly angled disc opens a trench about two inches wide. The falling seed strikes the concave side of the shield and the convex side of the disc, and is thus scattered evenly over the entire width of the trench.

Grain seed drills are divided into four kinds, according to the type of furrow opener—The open delivery single disc and the close delivery single disc, the double disc; the shoe, and the hoe drills. The open delivery single disc furrow opener deposits the seed between the shield and the convex side of the disc. The space is open from the end of the boot between the disc and shield to the bottom or lower end of the shield. The shield prevents the falling seed from becoming mixed with the loose earth and surface trash and insures its free passage to the bottom of the trench made by the disc. It will also do excellent work in highly cultivated soil that is free from trash.

The closed delivery single disc furrow opener has a closed boot, similar to a hoe furrow opener, which comes down at the rear edge of the disc and deposits the seed about two inches back of the disc. It does not plant the seed at as even a depth as either the open delivery single disc or the double disc, but deposits it at least eight inches in rear of the disc hub, and wherever it meets with an obstruction, rock or hard frozen soil the disc rises up and carries the boot with it, broadcasting the seed on the surface.

There are many styles of double discs, but the one that plants the seed under or slightly back of the disc axle, or hub, is the one to use, for that point is the deepest part of the furrow. The furrow opener that shoots the grain forward of this centre is to be avoided, for the reason that the seed reaches the ground before the furrow is fully formed, and it is, therefore, mixed with the soil as the seed trench is being made, causing what is termed "waxy" sowing. The double disc type of opener tends to spread out the seed, more than other kinds, so that each seed has a somewhat greater area from which to draw moisture.

The hoe furrow opener or shovel opener does not penetrate the ground readily and clogs easier than any of the other types. The shoe opener does no better work, and rather than clog will run over trash and thus plant the seed at varying depths.

In selecting a drill the bearings should be given careful inspection. They should be dust proof. The hard roller must be considered superior to all others for this kind of work, as the oil can be forced into the bearing from the centre, and as it works out it carries all the dirt with it. It should have a well-braced seed box with steel hopper bottom to allow the seed to pass freely into the cups; strong frame and substantial wheels are important features. The distance between the furrow opener varies to some extent but six inches is the usual spacing. The seed tubes may be of rubber or of steel ribbon. The rubber tubes give good satisfaction, but are not durable if exposed to the weather. The steel ribbon tubes serve the purpose well, and if painted will last as long as the drill.—Jno. Ryans, O. A. College, Guelph.

HOUSECLEANING TIME

In the Spring a Woman's Fancy Turns That Way.

She Finds the Work Fascinating—Some Very Practical Hints as to Doing the Job—Recipes for Cleaning and Polishing.

(Contributed by Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto.)

HOUSECLEANING for the most part is fascinating work, that is, after we pass the cellar. After all, this is really the most important part of the house and should receive first consideration in the spring. Probably it will never be known how much of the low state of vitality found in some families is to be charge to ill-ventilated, badly-lighted, poorly-drained cellars, where decaying vegetables are kept, sending its foul germladen air to every part of the house.

If vegetables are stored in the cellar they should be carefully picked over and all growth and decayed ones removed. In addition to thoroughly cleaning, the walls should be white-washed, and if the cellar is at all damp, it is well to keep a metal or earthen receptacle containing unslaked lime constantly present. Not a day should pass without the cellar being properly aired. In the very hot summer days, the windows should be opened every night and closed during the day. The reason for this is, that the outdoor air in the daytime is much warmer than in the cellar.

This warm, moist-laden air enters the cellar atmosphere of the cellar, and the moisture condenses and rests on all surfaces making the cellar damp and warm. By opening the windows at night and closing them in the daytime the cellar is kept dry, pure and clean. It is well, too, before leaving the cellar to see that the screens are placed properly in the windows—screens of fine wire netting to prevent flies or insects entering. We cannot emphasize too emphatically the need for proper protection against flies. More diseases are caused by flies than we are wont to believe, and while doing the spring cleaning it is well to see that each room is screened properly to prevent the entrance of flies.

If we attend to the little things before we start the actual cleaning, such as sorting and cleaning drawers, putting away furs, winter curtains, extra blankets, etc., and laying in a supply of cleaning materials, this will save a lot of time. It has been customary to envy the home with new furniture. We think it would be easy to make the house look well if we just had some new chairs, dressers, tables, etc., but, as a matter of fact, it does not make the housecleaning half as interesting as if we have some old furniture (which we have longed to discard for years) to transform into something new. What could be more fascinating than the painting of chairs, tables and other furniture or to have it harmonize with the walls, the drapery, the woodwork, and the floor.

It is not only that a floor looks much better if it is painted or polished, but it saves time and energy in cleaning. The rough surface collects greasy moisture, dust settles in it and soon grimy discolored and unhealthy conditions exist. Fine floors are hard to keep clean. The following methods of treating them may be of value:

1st. Spread over the floor strips of old sheeting, to this add two coats of paint. This will secure a very satisfactory border for the floor and the centre may be covered with a rug.

2nd. Apply a coat of linseed oil. Then fill cracks with "Crack and Crevice Filler," and apply an oak stain and two coats of floor finish.

It is difficult to say which rooms in the house should receive the most careful consideration. The bedroom is important because it is in the bedroom the person should receive that perfect sleep which will insure physical and mental strength.

The kitchen, too, is important, because here the woman spends a great deal of her time. It will be found most satisfactory to have linoleum placed on the kitchen floor. This is easily kept clean, and is soft, warm, elastic and wears well. There should be nothing in the kitchen which cannot be washed. The furniture, walls, etc., should be washable. While cleaning this spring it is especially important that we should see that all the utensils which are being used constantly should be in a convenient place, and if possible, closed cupboards should be placed in the kitchen.

The following recipes and information may be found of value in doing the spring cleaning:

Washing Windows.—Always dust first and clean the woodwork before the glass. The glass may be washed with warm water and soap, ammonia, or kerosene, or whitening and ammonia. In washing wring the cloth almost dry, rinse off the window, and dry with a soft cloth and polish with a soft paper or cloth.

Painted Woodwork.—Wash in warm soapy water with a soft cloth, doing a little at a time and drying as you go along. For light painted wood use whitening paste.

Varnished Woodwork.—If very soiled use soap and water. Dry very thoroughly and then rub with ammonia or kerosene. To use kerosene just dampen the cloth and after rubbing on the varnished woodwork rub again with a dry cloth. If not, you will find a white glow will result.

Dustless Dusters.—Dip the cheese cloth in a mixture made from ½ cup melted parowax.

Note.—These dusters may be washed several times before they require to be dipped again.

There are many helpful suggestions for cleaning, and labor-saving devices appearing in weekly papers and magazines from time to time. It is a good plan to cut these out, place them in a labelled envelope or box for future use.—Miss D. M. Sutherland, Women's Institutes Branch.

Mr. Flynn was not at all hetive
about statements he made. He offered
to back them up with bets of \$200
to \$50. There were no takers.
Premier Borden was again men-
tioned. He had come to Halifax and
then skurried south, afraid to meet
his own people, said Mr. Flynn. He
also referred to Borden's interest in
the Winnipeg Cold Storage Co., which
had to throw away tons of food which
had rotted.

At the close of his address Mr.
Flynn invited anyone who had any
questions to ask to come onto the
platform. The meeting gave a patient
hearing to one G. W. V. A. man who
bore the scars of 39 wounds when he
added his word of criticism of the
government for not treating the sol-
diers and their dependents properly
but when another man came on the
stage and wanted to attack Flynn's
own record, the meeting would have
none of it and roared him down.

Someone on the stage started the
National Anthem and the meeting
dispersed, the consensus of opinion
being that Flynn was on the right
tack and had made out a good case,
while those who had tried to embarr-
ass him had merely embarrassed their
own interests.

DRAINAGE IS IMPORTANT

Some Benefits of a Well Devised
Drainage Plan.

Guesswork Is the Poorest Method to
Adopt—Get the Land Levels and
Then Arrange for Tiling—How
to Protect Drainage Outlets.

WHEN a man is about to
erect a building, be it ever
so small, the first thing
he does is to make a plan.
That plan may be on paper or it may
exist only in the mind of the builder,
yet it is a plan. Without a plan to
follow, a builder cannot do good
work. The same is true of the drain-
age. The man who places a "string"
or "line" of tile in a watercourse,
which traverses his fields, should not
do so without asking himself such
questions as: "Am I putting this tile
in the lowest part?" "Will I be able
to get a satisfactory outlet? How
many acres will this tile drain, and
is it large enough to drain it satis-
factorily? Have I sufficient grade to
drain the holes in the rear fifty?"
The answers to these questions are
questions he is like a builder without a
plan; he is working in the dark; his
work cannot be efficient. All these
things are the drainage plan answers,
and more.

No matter how small the means
for immediate construction of drains,
or how few the drains which are
about to be installed, he should not do
so without having first laid out a
plan of which these drains will be
a part. On rolling land such a plan
is not hard to decide upon, because
the differences in elevation are very
pronounced, and any one who is
familiar with such lands is able to
intelligently plan a system of drains
for them. But where the area is
large and the topography irregular,
or very flat, guesswork is out of
the question. It is then that we must
resort to the tape and the levelling
instrument for reliable information.
A drainage plan shows first of all
the differences in height or elevation
between all parts of the farm over
which the survey extended. This al-
lows the owner of the land to plan
his own system of drainage. The pos-
session of the levels for all parts of
the farm lays bare the most advan-
tageous routes for tile drains, from a
study of the levels and contours of
the land it is possible to calculate the
acreage which each main tile must
drain. This information together
with the fall or grade procurable is
the only true guide to help us decide
upon the size of tile needed in any
given drain. It is only when the plan-
ner has a picture of the whole pro-
ject before him that he can draft an
efficient yet economical plan of drains
for any piece of land.

Future Benefits.—The benefits of
a plan do not end with the comple-
tion of the drainage system. Only
those of value to the farmer are
of value to find a drain, the location of
which was nowhere recorded, know
the value of guidance such as is of-
fered by a plan. When a tile-drafter
has a plan to follow he will give good
service for several generations;
therefore for the convenience of our
children and grandchildren it is ne-
cessary to have a plan of our under-
ground drainage work.

There is another way in which a
drainage plan is very helpful to a
farm owner; it is a splendid guide
toward certifying the acreage of
any part of the farm. Fences are
located on the plan, and the
whole plan drawn to scale, so that
with the aid of a rule it is possible
to measure the area of any part of
the land surveyed. This is a great
assistance in planning a season's
crops as well as in calculating yields
per acre.

Protecting Drainage Outlets.
The, particularly clay tile, should
not run out to the mouth of the
drain. If a piece of old gas pipe,
eight or ten feet long, can be secured,
this should be placed in the drain in
place of the drain tile. Putting
this a piece of corrugated steel, or
even a plank trough is much better
than running the tile right to the end,
where they will be broken, washed in-
to the outlet, or otherwise destroyed,
allowing the earth to roll in and stop
the flow of water.

Under any condition the bank is
liable to wear and animals pastur-
ing in the field may tramp it down,
and block the tile, so in the second
place, an abutment should be built
through which the outlet discharges
its water and the bank will be kept
in a state of preservation. This may
be made of concrete, stone or plank,
and should be a permanent structure.
In some cases where the flow is heavy
and the water would have a tendency
to undermine the wall, it is well to
build an apron on which the force
of the falling water is broken.
There is still another precaution
which should be given due consider-
ation. Frequently small animals,
muskrats, coons, ground hogs and
others, seek refuge in the tile. Here
they are entrapped, and form a dam
to the flowing water. To overcome
such, the outlet should have bars
across the end. These may be quite
small, and close together so that
nothing can get through. A screen
may be fitted over the end, but un-
less the mesh is quite large the water
is retarded in its flow. Sometimes the
drain tile is threaded with wire. This
forms a good protection.

When all these devices are given
attention, the outlet should remain
in a state of efficiency for years, and
the system, if properly installed,
should give satisfaction.—F. L. Per-
guson, O. A. College, Guelph.

required a large measure of initiative to overcome. The task of rendering the highest and most efficient service was shouldered and Canada paid tribute to the success which attend-ed those efforts by over subscribing the amount asked for during the Red Shield Drive.



Your Income Tax Return Should be Filed at Once!!

All persons residing in Canada, employed in Canada, or carrying on business in Canada, are liable to a tax on income, as follows:

Every unmarried person, or widow, or widower, without dependants as defined by the Act, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

All other individuals, who during the calendar year 1919, received or earned \$2,000 or more.

Every corporation and joint stock company, whose profits exceeded \$2,000 during the fiscal year ended in 1919.

CLASS 1
Forms to be used in filing returns on or before the 31st of March, 1920. Trustees, executors, administrators, agents and assignees must use Form T 3.

Employers making a return of the names and amounts paid to all directors, officials, agents or other employees must use Form T 4.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies making a return of all dividends and bonuses paid to shareholders and members during 1919, must use Form T 5.

NOTE:—Individuals commencing partnership must file returns in their individual capacity on Form T 1 or T 1 A.

PENALTY
Every person who is required to make this return, who fails to do so within the time limit, shall be subject to a penalty of \$10.00 for each day during which the default continues—and all such penalties shall be assessed and collected from the person liable to make the return in the same manner in which taxes are assessed and collected.
