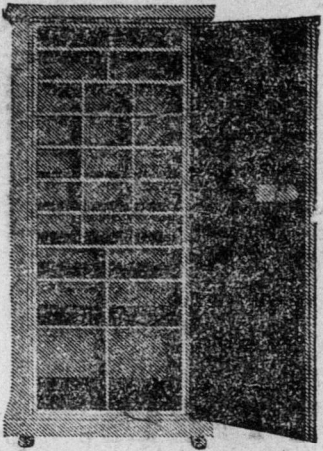

The Evening Chit-Chat

By RUTH CAMERON



"I have found that one of the best ways to get children into the habit of doing the right thing, is to try to make the right course of least resistance. I suppose that sounds obvious, but I know a great many mothers who waste much energy because they do not realize and practice that method."

So a woman who has been eminently successful in the difficult profession of motherhood puts one of the secrets of her success.

And this is the way she explains and illustrates that statement.

"I used to have the children keep their rubbers and overshoes upstairs in their own closets, so that they would not get them mixed. And all the time I was bothered by finding them left all over the house. It was always 'Bobby, why didn't you take your rubbers upstairs?' or 'Eleanor, this is the second time this week that I've stumbled over your overshoes.' Finally, I decided to make it easier for them to be orderly, and see if that wouldn't help. Father made a box for the rubbers of the whole family with a little compartment for each one of us, and we kept it in the back hall—now I almost never have any trouble."

"Then, again, I always wanted the children to put on aprons before the came into the kitchen to do anything. The girls had aprons of their own which they kept up stairs, and the boys were supposed to hunt up one of mine. Well, it seemed impossible to enforce that rule. It was: 'Oh, I was only going to make a little paste and I didn't want to go way upstairs for my apron,' or 'Oh,

bother, mother, I couldn't find any of our old aprons.' So finally one day after Eleanor had spilled a cup of milk down the front of her new dress, I had father put up five hooks right in the entry as you go into the kitchen—I had the girls bring down their aprons, and gave the boys each one of their own, and told them they were to hang their aprons on those hooks and were not to pass by into the kitchen without taking down their own and putting it on—you wouldn't believe the time in cleaning up their clothes that has saved me."

"That's two examples. I could give you a dozen more, but you see what I mean. Instead of wearing yourself out hammering at the children, trying to get them to do something hard or inconvenient, just study out how you can make what you want them to do more natural and easy—in other words, try to make the right course of least resistance."

Does this idea appeal to you as good? It certainly does to me.

And right in my own life, I have an unconscious example of its efficacy. Last Christmas I had a small desk dictionary given me. During the last year I know that I've looked up ten words to every one I looked up during the time I had to go into the other room, open the bookcase and pull down a heavy dictionary.

It is human nature to follow the course of least resistance. Much can be accomplished in training one's children and one's self to overcome this tendency. But much can also be accomplished by making the right course the course of least resistance. Think and see if there is not some obstacle or some unsatisfactory condition in your household which might be overcome with a consequent saving of energy for you.

When coal is needed on the fire in the sick room it should be brought into the room in paper bags, which should be laid gently on the fire to prevent noise.

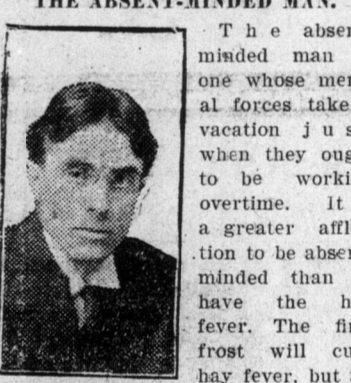

Household Notes.
Never polish a piano with anything but refined linseed oil.
A mixture of borax and red pepper is good to rid closets of insects.
Verdigris can be removed from brass by the use of ammonia.
Nothing makes a finer polish for tinware than good wood ashes.

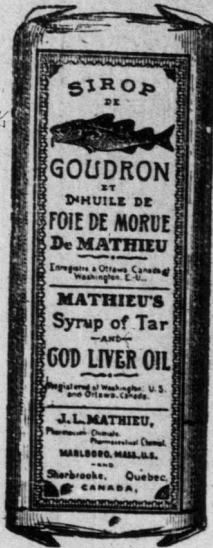

Budget of News From Newtown

The Court of Revision for the Census of the two sections between Loo Cove and Cape Freels, was held at Wesleyville on Wednesday last being postponed from Friday of the preceding week. Magistrate Miller presided, and only the enumerators and clerks were present. A considerable amount of business, involving several changes in the sheets, was done. The population for these two sections has increased during the past decade at the average of 40 per annum, which is a very slight percentage of increase for a population of nearly 4,500.
The Fogota being behind time on this trip, failed to call at this port to-day going south. There may have been other more urgent reasons for skipping this port, but being behind time is not a sufficiently pressing one for passing by a settlement of importance at which no other steamer calls, and whose mails represent the embodiment of inconvenience.

On the 17th inst. the Third Sunday in Advent, a mission meeting was held in St. Stephen's Church at Greenspond. My Dear Editor,—You are quite mistaken in your suggestion that politics had anything to do with my C. M. G. Neither the Governor nor the Government had anything to do with it or knew anything about it. The application was made for me by the Administrator, Sir W. H. Horwood. Governor after Governor has recommended me. Sir Henry McCallum fairly worried the Colonial Office about me, but all to no effect. There was a black mark against me both at the Colonial and Foreign Office. I had carried out the Bait Act. The minister in 1887 told Sir A. Shea that a good understanding with France was worth a hundred Newfoundland and they would not allow the act to become law. It was the meeting of the Colonial Premiers and their united support of our case that made the Bait Act into law. One of the reviewers of my history was the present minister for Ireland, the Rt. Hon. Augustine Burrell, well-known as the author of "Obliter Dites," a judicious, etc., a most witty and humorous writer. Other reviewers took up the early history, etc., in my book, but what captured Burrell's fancy were such stories as Killy and Carson, Boulton and Strahan, Boyd and Winton, the Governor using the press gang to build the church. He analyzed these old yarns and finally wound up the review by declaring that I had told more good stories than any other Colonial or American historian. As he is the literary man in the present ministry you can now see now how I obtained by C. M. G., it was given me for my history alone.

Yuan obtained for the Empress Dowager more than two million dollars, which permit the carrying on of the Government, beyond the period, which the rebels fixed for the assembly of a National Convention.

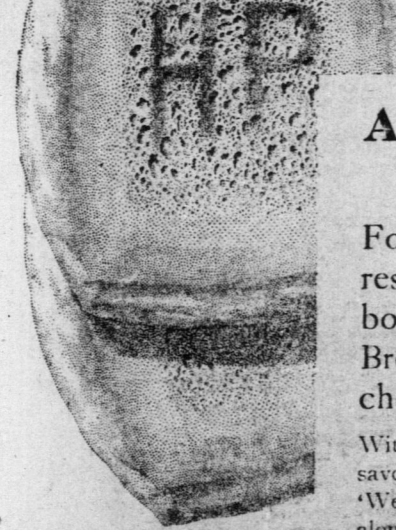

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
CONSTANTINOPLE, Jan. 2. Britain has threatened to intervene in Macedonia and Albania. Sir Gerard A. Lowther, the British Ambassador, informed the Grand Vizier that if the situation in European Turkey does not improve, the British Foreign Office will be obliged to publish in a blue book the reports of the British Consuls relative to many crimes committed in Macedonia and Albania. The Ambassador also informed the Vizier that the intervention of the Powers suspended at the time of the declaration of the Turkish Constitution would be resumed. The Ambassador purposely had a conference with the Bulgarian Minister in Turkey. This leads to the belief that Britain is prepared for intervention: Rumors predict that revolutionary outbreaks in Macedonia and Albania are imminent.

NANKING, Jan. 2.
Dr. Sun Yat Sen has taken oath of office as Provisional President of the Republic of China and has been formally invested with the powers of the office. He delivered an address in which he promised to dethrone the Manchus, re-establish peace, promote trade, devote his entire energy to the Chinese nation, and aid the Chinese people to realize its aspirations. When the Manchus had finally abdicated and peace was restored, he would resign his provisional office. He announced that a strong control by the Government would be organized over the entire administration, the system remodelled and modernized, and a parliament representative of the people would be elected. The provinces would be autonomous as regards local affairs. Each would select its own Governor. The army and navy would be made national institutions under the control of a central parliament which would deal with the finances of the country. The whole fiscal system would be readjusted.

TABRIZ, Persia, Jan. 2.
Eight men were hanged yesterday by order of the Russian court martial and eight this afternoon, in connection with a recent attack of Russian troops, and officers composing the court martial are trying prisoners in batches. In nearly every case they are condemned to be summarily hanged and the bodies displayed throughout the day in the public square. Solar Ed. Dowleh, a brother of the ex-Shah, arrived this afternoon and assumed the Governorship. His escort was composed of Russian Cossacks.

LONDON, Jan. 2.
The division in the Cabinet over Woman Suffrage promises most interesting developments. Lloyd George will address a meeting in favour of Woman Suffrage at the Albert Hall, on February 28th. There will be a counter meeting in the same hall five days later, at which the Lord Chancellor and Louis Harcourt, the Secretary for the Colonies, and possibly other anti-suffrage members of the Cabinet will speak. The promoters of the latter meeting hope to be able to get the Prime Minister to attend and make a speech.

EDINBURGH, Jan. 2.
The Powder Hall Marathon was won by Rolehmanum, of Finland. Hans Holmer was second; Fred. Cameron, third; K. Longboat dropped out at the sixteenth mile.

PEKIN, Jan. 2.
Seven hundred soldiers, guarding the Lanchow Arsenal, mutinied to-day. Part of the Government troops, among whom there has been a revolutionary movement for some time, favour a Republic.

HALIFAX, Jan. 2.
The results of the curling to-day between the Scottish and the Nova Scotian teams are: Scotts, 161, Nova Scotia, 173.

CHRISTCHURCH, N. Z., Jan. 2.
The Australian Tennis champions have completed a successful defence of the Davis International Lawn Tennis Cup by defeating the Americans in a double match.

LONDON, Jan. 2.
Officers of the Trade Unions and representatives of employees have gone to Manchester to open negotiations in regard to a settlement of the lock-out in the cotton trade of Lancashire.

He Was Anxious.

Last night a young man of the West End made enquiries at the police station about his brother, who is a fireman on the Solway. 
