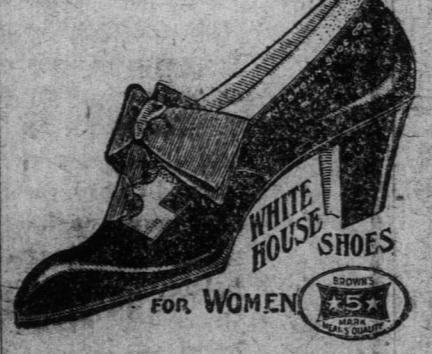
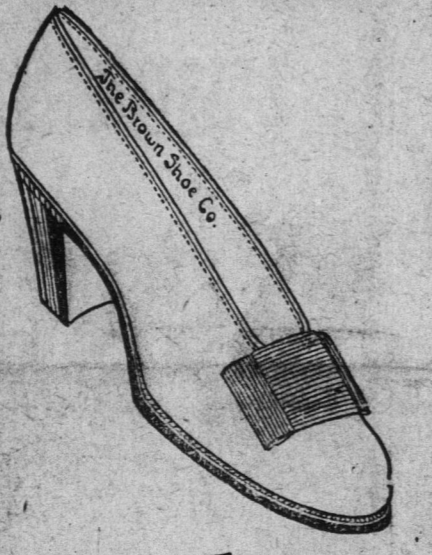

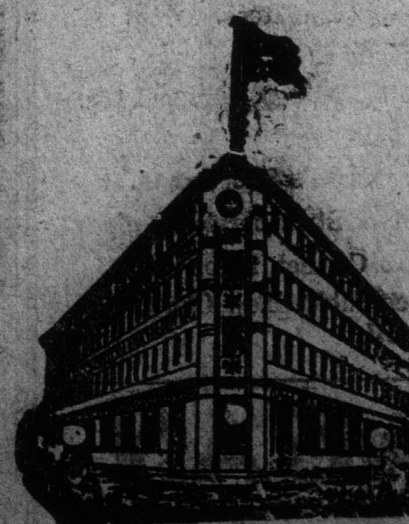

Conference Fails.

The Conference at Buckingham Palace has failed to bring about a settlement between the Irish parties on the Home Rule Bill. Mr. Asquith announced the failure in the House of Commons yesterday. His statement was to the effect that the Convention was unable to agree in principle or in detail on such an area. He announced that the second reading of the Amending Bill would be taken up on Tuesday next. The Prime Minister declined to give any further information at present. It is a pity that the Conference has failed, but that failure forces back into the proper arena the further consideration of the matter. The King was doubtless prompted by the highest sense of duty in bringing about the Conference at Buckingham Palace, but the very fact that the King took the initiative and that the Conference was held in Buckingham Palace aroused hostility. Many people strongly resent any increase in Royal influence. They wish to see the influence of Royalty, the Lords and the Army lessened rather than increased, and they view with jealousy any steps taken by Royalty out of the common. On the other hand, it is easy to understand how the King with civil war staring him in the face, would strive to do everything within his duty to keep peace between the armed opponents in Ireland and strive to bring the disputing parties together. It should be remembered that this is all the King did. He invited the leaders of the two chief English and the two chief Irish parties to come together. He expressed his opinion as to the gravity of the crisis and asked them to do their best to settle the disputes, which threatened dire peril to the nation. He expressed no opinion as to the merits or demerits of the relative contentions. He brought no influence to bear on one side against the other. He laid down no lines for a settlement. He offered no advice as to the settlement. He left to the conferees the initiative, the discussion and the decision. The feature of the Buckingham Palace Conference was merely a Royal expression of the opinion that the crisis was grave and that he wished them to arrive at a settlement, and the holding of the Conference in a Royal Palace, occupied by the King, instead of at the old-time Palace of St. Stephen's or elsewhere. The fight will now be resumed in the House of Commons. Tuesday will be awaited anxiously, for the lines of Government will take on the Amending Bill. If reports be true, the

Buckingham Palace Conference has further narrowed the differences between the parties. It would appear that the only difference is whether Tyrone and Permagh shall be excluded from the Dublin Parliament. Carson wants them excluded by the Home Rule Bill itself. Redmond is willing to leave it to the vote of each county whether or not exclusion shall take place.

Old Native Leaves Again.

Mr. G. F. Culleton, a native of St. John's, who came here from the States on a vacation, after an absence of 55 years away, leaves this evening by the Pomeranian en route to Baltimore, where Mr. Culleton holds a responsible position with the American Government. Mr. Culleton has no relatives in the city now, though he has renewed the acquaintance of many old friends. He left here in 1859 when he was 16 years of age. On arrival here a few weeks ago he was surprised with our city which was completely changed from the time he last saw it.

Kyle Further Delayed.

The Reid Nfld. Co. received a wireless message from Capt. Parsons, of the s.s. Kyle, last night, which stated that the ship had been jammed at Smokey since Wednesday, and only got clear at 4 a.m. yesterday, when she left there for north, a thick fog with N.E. wind prevailing, so that at 8 a.m. the ship was again forced to anchor at Double Island to await a clear. The station at Holton reports very little ice north.

SPLENDID UNIFORMS.—The C. L. B. Old Comrades' new uniforms, which were worn for the first time on Sunday last, have since been commented on favourably. They were the products of the British Clothing Factory and are of such excellent style and finish that we hear orders will be placed for 200 more such uniforms.

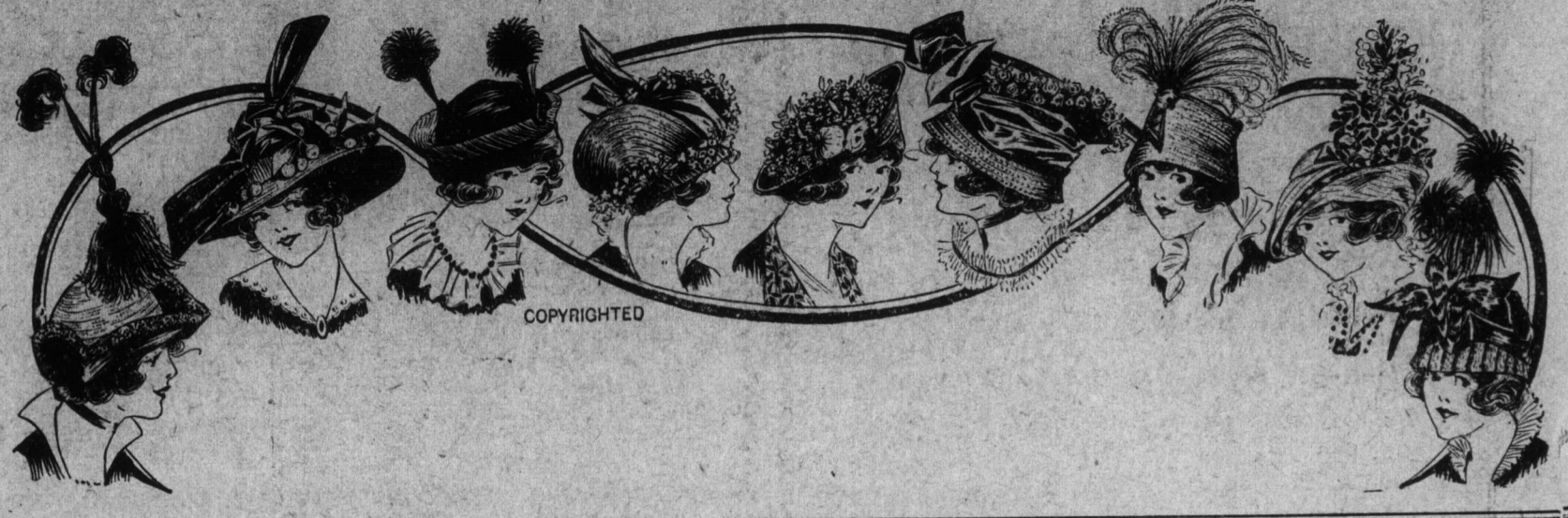

At the City Hall.

The weekly session of the Municipal Board took place yesterday afternoon. Mr. Gosling presiding. The only member absent was Mr. Jackman.

Mr. Mullaly asked if any action had been taken as to beautifying Cathedral Park, as requested the previous week. There had been nothing done and it was ordered that Engineer Ryan visit the place and see what was necessary to be done.

Mr. Anderson said that goats were constantly in the small park near the East End Fire Hall and destroying trees there. The question then arose of where is the Impounder, who is he, and how much salary does he get. He gets \$36.50 per month and all perquisites, that is, \$2 for every horse or cow impounded and 50c. for a goat.

Mr. Anderson thought that because less commission was paid for catching goats the Impounder was directing his attention to other animals that gave him a better income, thereby allowing goats to roam the city unmolested and destroy what property they liked.

The Secretary reported that he had learned on various occasions from the Impounder that it was almost an impossibility to catch a goat and scold when he did succeed in catching one the women of the neighbourhood would attack the Impounder and that in all cases he would have to surrender it. However, the decision reached by the Board was that the Impounder should give returns to the Secretary as to how many animals he had impounded, as it was learned he (the Impounder) was making a bonanza of it.

The bill of \$81 for watering the dredge Priestman was returned by the Marine and Fisheries Department unpaid, accompanied by a letter intimating that owing to the amount of good work that the dredge was doing in the city coves the bill should not be collected. Much discussion followed and it was decided not to collect the bill.

I. G. Sullivan reported that the installation of proposed oil tanks by Job Bros. and Co. was not dangerous to fire. Referred to Solicitor.

Mr. M. J. McEvoy referred to the injustice done him in collecting taxes from him. A report from the Solicitor will be had on the matter.

An application from R. Hopkins for a position was filed.

Mr. B. Dunfield complained of unfair treatment to impounded cattle. Not true.

W. C. Young asked that a light be placed near his residence, Freshwater Road. Referred to Lighting Committee.

Mr. P. C. Mars asked Council's opinion of the calcium chloride as a dust consumer. The Secretary will reply.

Mr. P. Myrick was given permission to make repairs to Fishermen's Institute, subject to the approval of the Engineer.

Kent and Co. were awarded contract to supply quarry spawls at 55 cents a ton. That was the lowest tender.

An exhaustive and interesting report was received from the Sanitary Committee and many practical suggestions were received and will be considered at next meeting.

Mr. Bradshaw mentioned that about \$12,000 worth of goods upon which about \$3,500 duty were collected. He was of the opinion that this duty money should be got back by the city and that there should be places in the city for keeping the Council's stores the same as applies to H. M. S. Calypso. The suggestion was endorsed and the Secretary will write the Assistant Collector of Customs about the matter.

Several of the plans were approved, but the Engineer was instructed that no water service would be given until proper sanitary arrangements were made.

Residents of Beaumont Street complained re the improper filling of opening made for laying of water and sewerage pipes in that section. The Council hopes to overcome the irregular system complained of, but at all times residents must remember that the streets are opened for them to make connections.

The Health Officers report was read. It was decided that the Health Officer be asked to meet a committee from the Board to discuss matters in connection with his department. The meeting will take place next week.

On motion of Messrs. McNamara and Morris it was decided that in future meetings the regular sessions will be held at 8 p.m. on Fridays instead of 3.30 p.m. as heretofore. The meeting adjourned at 6.15 p.m.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram
LONDON, July 24. The Daily Telegraph's Dublin correspondent asserts that the War Office has issued orders prohibiting British soldiers, on pain of court-martial, from aiding or assisting either of the Irish Volunteer forces.

CAPE FINISTERRE, Spain.

A wireless received from Sir Thos. Lipton's steam yacht Erin, which is conveying the challenger, said that all was well on board the Shamrock, that she had made 222 miles in the last 24 hours, and that the weather was beautiful.

LONDON, July 24.

The fact that the Conference has been rendered abortive by failure to agree as to the area of Ulster to be excluded from control by the Dublin Parliament, was confirmed by Mr. Asquith, in the House of Commons to-day. His statement was brief. He said that the possibility of agreeing upon an area to be excluded from operation of the Home Rule Bill, had been considered, but the convention was unable to agree in principle or in detail on such an area, and this had brought its meeting to a close. Mr. Asquith added that "this report is made, Mr. Speaker, by the Chairman of the Conference to the King." He then announced that the second reading of the Amending Bill would be taken up on Tuesday next, July 28.

Invited to inform the House as to the exact differences of opinion which had prevented attainment of a settlement by the Conference, the Prime Minister said in reply: "I can make no statement on the subject at the present moment." The Commons then adjourned.

Except among Radicals and Labour members, who opposed a conference of any kind, and think the matter should have been fought out on the floors of the Commons, it is felt in Parliamentary circles that the meeting of the political leaders at Buckingham Palace has done much good. It is pointed out that they had shown now for the opposing Irish leaders are prepared to go, and that this would assist the Government in reframing the Amending Bill. Curzon, it is understood, announced the demand for a clean cut of the Province of Ulster from the Dublin Parliament, and were prepared to accept exclusion of six counties. The Nationalists, on the other hand, agreed to have the four northeastern counties excluded, and would allow

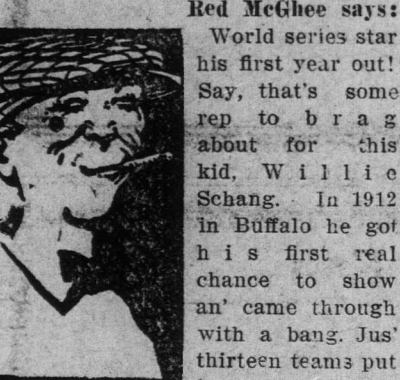

The s.s. Florizel left New York today for here via Halifax.

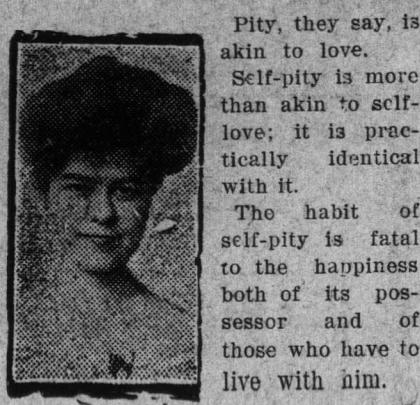

Pity, they say, is akin to love. Self-pity is more than akin to self-love; it is practically identical with it. The habit of self-pity is fatal to the happiness both of its possessor and of those who have to live with him. It darkens his outlook; it hides his happiness from him; it cramps his capabilities; it narrows his sympathies. People who are always pitying themselves usually have little pity to spare for other people's troubles. A woman who has developed this unfortunate habit, was brought into close contact with a relative's deep trouble. The self-pityer is a woman of nervous temperament and she was greatly upset by the whole affair. It came at a time when she had much to do, it started her nerves to jangling. At the same time it broke the relative's heart and spoiled her life. And yet whom do you think that woman pitied the most? Herself, of course. "It does seem too bad that I should have to have this experience when I'm all tired out and nervous," she went about saying. She was looking at the spectacle of a broken heart and a wrecked life and she scarcely seemed to see it at all, because the spectre of her own misfortune in being upset by her con-

tact, with the experience loomed up between. One would have thought that if she felt no more generous emotion she might at least have been moved to be thankful for the peace and happiness of her own life. But her only thought was, "It does seem too bad that I should have to have this experience when I'm all tired out and nervous." Such is the power of self-pity to distort one's vision. Another woman who has lost her husband and her money, and been forced to open a boarding house to support her children, is the wonder of my life, because she seems so cheerful and happy. She has no servant, she does all the work herself, she has had to give up all social life and all the larger interests which once meant so much to her, and yet I never heard her utter a word of complaint; never even heard her imply by word or look that she thought she was having a hard time. I was speaking of this to a woman who is in her confidence and she explained it in this way. "She simply won't let herself pity herself. She says that's a sure way to be unhappy. Never permit yourself under any circumstances to think of yourself as a martyr. Nothing nullifies the value of sacrifice like an attitude of self-pity. The real martyrs have never been conscious of their martyrdom. Remember, those who lavish their pity and sympathy on themselves do not have any left to give to others."

Oil.



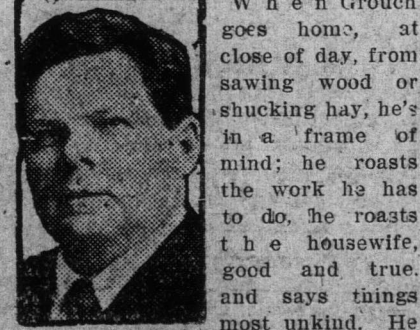

NEWS BY CABLE.

Special to Evening Telegram. KINGSTON, Jamaica, July 24. Huerta and his party of fugitives from Mexico, arrived here to-day on board the German cruiser Dresden, from Puerto, Mexico.

Special to Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, July 24. Advice from Hammondsport report that the "America" will start from Newfoundland for the Azores on August 11. All obstacles have been overcome.

Special to Evening Telegram. VIENNA, July 24. All the Austrian and Hungarian reservists living abroad were warned by the Army authorities to-day to be ready to join their regiments at twenty-four hours' notice.

Special to the Evening Telegram. SYDNEY, N.S. Wales, July 24. The island of Aoba, in the New Hebrides, is in imminent danger of collapsing from incessant earthquake shocks. Already there have been several fatalities. If the steaming volcano erupts, the whole population, numbering 5,000, are doomed.


Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, July 24. Two suffragettes belonging to the British nobility, Lady Barclay and Edith Fitzgerald, were arrested to-day at Buckingham Palace, where they made persistent attempts to present to the King a letter written to His Majesty by Mrs. Pankhurst.

LONDON, July 24. The Buckingham Palace Conference met again to-day and held the shortest of its four sessions. The discussion lasted only 40 minutes. The members then left the Palace. No statement was given out as to the result of the meeting, but it was expected that the Premier would make an announcement in the House of Commons in the course of to-day. According to the Liverpool Daily Post, a leading Liberal newspaper, it is frankly acknowledged to-day that the effort made by the Conference in Buckingham Palace to reconcile the conflicting views of Irish Nationalists and Ulster Unionists must be abandoned. The Post adds that a report of this unhappy result of the Conference will be published in the Court circular this evening.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, July 24. The St. John Street Railway strike is settled.

BERLIN, July 24. With the exception of the Post, the Berlin afternoon papers endorse the step taken by Austria which they deem necessary to put an end to the campaign of assassination and sedition. They assure her of Germany's support if that is necessary.

LOURDES, To-day. More than 40,000 visitors to the Eucharistic Congress have been divided into eleven sections, where eleven different languages are spoken. The attendance increased to-day by the arrival of thousands of individual pilgrims from all parts of the world.

PARIS, July 24. The prevailing tone of the French Press in connection with the Austrian note to Serbia is expressed by the Temps to-day. The newspaper says: "The document is without precedent for its annoyance and unlimited demand, and considers if Serbia allows Austrian police activities in Serbian territories the independence of Serbia is lost."

COLOGNE, July 24. An inspired despatch from Berlin to the Cologne Gazette says it is imperative in the interest of peace that the voice of Europe should impress Serbia with the necessity of submitting to the demands of Austria and concludes with the significant intimation that if an attempt be made by a third Power to stiffen Serbia's back, the conflict will cease to be purely Austria-Serbian.

OSTER BAY, To-day. The reply of Roosevelt to the libel suit of Barnes to-day was a renewed attack on the Republican State Chairman and a promise to help the suit forward. Roosevelt said he would not be deterred from attacking Barnes by the suit, but on the contrary would assail him the harder. He expressed the hope he would have an opportunity to go on the witness stand against Barnes before the election.

NEW YORK, To-day. Chairman William Barnes, of the Republican State Committee, has brought a suit of libel against Theodore Roosevelt, based upon Roosevelt's statement on Wednesday night attacking Mr. Barnes and endorsing the candidacy of Harvey D. Hinman, for nomination as Governor at the Republican Primaries. The complaint in the suit asked damages of \$50,000 on the ground that the statement issued by the former President, contained references to Barnes that were libellous, false and untrue.

LONDON, To-day. The formal announcement that the Buckingham Palace conference rule could not bridge the narrow difference which separated Ulsterites and Nationalists was made to the King by the Speaker of the Commons and to the House by the Premier. No one sees any possibility of a settlement of the dispute, unless it is by the Government appealing to the verdict of the country through a general election and such step would be considered generally not a compromise but a surrender by the Asquith's Cabinet. The information given by the public by the Premier was brief and unsatisfying as to details. Asquith said the Amending Bill will be taken up on Wednesday.

BELFAST, To-day. Leading business men, clergymen, bankers, manufacturers who declared of an anti-Home Rule movement are unanimous in endorsing the uncompromising attitude of Carson and Captain James Craig in demanding the total and permanent exclusion of Ulster from the workings of the Home Rule Bill. The business community is suffering severely through a stagnation in trade and tight money. There is unwillingness to order new stocks of goods with the fear of civil war hanging overhead. A large proportion of the commercial world would endorse a settlement of the controversy on a compromise basis, but realizing that popular sentiment is against them, they dare not insist on anything less than Carson's original demands. The Ulster Provisional Government awaits orders from Sir Edward and Captain Craig who are still in London. It is believed here the next step will be general mobilization of the volunteer forces as a

kind of armed demonstration which they impress the Government if the Government still is unyielding. It appears certain according to declarations by prominent Ulstermen that the Provisional Government will be set up before the Home Rule Bill is passed. Belfast probably will be policed by volunteers drawn from four local regiments, who will be known as the Town Guard. The same regiments also will furnish a quota of 10,000 fully armed men for a second line fighting force, a so-called special service corps consisting of about forty thousand men, most of them old soldiers to be officered by former Regulars and having full transport and machine gun sections will comprise the first line of flying column. This force will be ready to rush to any quarter in Ulster where nationalists defy the Provisional Government by rioting and reinforcing the local citizen troops. It is understood the police in Belfast probably will be withdrawn immediately the Provisional Government is set up, thus leaving everything in the hands of the volunteers.

LONDON, To-day. Augustine Birrell, Chief Secretary for Ireland, said the Government will go forward with its previous proposals in regard to amendments to the Home Rule Bill. This will enable each county in Ulster to vote itself in or out of Home Rule. The forecast was that counties Antrim, Down, Armagh and Londonderry will vote to remain outside the provisions of the Home Rule Bill; Fermanagh, Cavan, Monaghan, Tyrone and Donegal will vote to come in under the Home Rule Government. Birrell warned the public not to be hoodwinked into believing there would be civil war in Ireland. He was convinced that no such thing would happen. If it did, the Government would inevitably interfere.

JOHN B. AYRE. Fishery Facts.

While the fishery news received from Lamaline and vicinity is good, the fishermen of that section will not reap such a harvest as may be imagined. Saying the approximate total catch from Lord's Cove to Point Crewe is 12,500 quintals, it must be taken into consideration that this represents the catch of about 50 traps evenly distributed, whose average according to these figures, would be 250 quintals each. Each trap usually carries a crew of five men, whose wages is generally half their catch. This would allow each man 25 quintals, which at the very high figure of \$6.50 per quintal would only realize \$162.50. That it is good wages for about two months' work will not be denied, but when the expenses entered, and the fact that it practically represents the catch of winter months, are taken into consideration it will readily appear that they have not struck the bonanza at first reported. None will dispute the fact that the fishery on the whole is far ahead of previous years, and will only go to recoup some of the losses met with in that section during the past few years. At Larn the prospects for a good voyage are bright, and one man who operates three traps on that part of the coast is reported to have over 1,000 quintals ashore to date.

Larcenies Epidemic. Larceny seems to become epidemic in the city, and within the past few weeks the police have had to do with more thefts than ever before. Last night five arrests were made for larceny. Two young men and a young woman were charged with stealing lumber from the premises of the Horwood Lumber Co., and two teamsters were taken into custody by Sergeant Mackey, for taking a quantity of horse harness from a stable in the East End. All five offenders will be dealt with by the Magistrate this afternoon. We learn that the Horwood Lumber people have had a considerable amount of lumber stolen on them during the past couple of months. Most of the perpetrators are unknown and the police should endeavor to round them up.

Psychic Phenomena.

"There are more things in heaven
and earth, Horatio, than are dreamt
of in your philosophy."—Hamlet.
Thousands of years before our
Christian era, seven wise men of
Greece were asked to embody their
conception of the wisdom of life in
short pithy sentences to be exhibited
in letters of gold over the entrance of
the Delphic Theatre of Apollo. The
wisest of these wise men, Solon, con-
sidered the essence of wisdom to be
this, "Know thyself." The advice of
an English poet of the seventeenth
century was the same. Pope says,
"Know then thyself, presume not God
to scan, the proper study of mankind
is man." And yet how little, how al-
most nothing, even we of the twen-
tieth century now know of ourselves!

We acknowledge with the Psalmist
that we are "fearfully and wonder-
fully made," but how wonderfully and
fearfully the big majority but faintly
realize.

Our men of science, though they can
name and locate every bone of the
body and know some of the special
functions of the different organs, can
perform with marvellous skill the
most amazing operations to lengthen
life or straighten limbs, acknowledge
that of man himself, the Ego, "little
we may say nothing, is known."

No doubt in the past man has not
been ready for such knowledge, but
to-day, we seem to be on the thresh-
old of this mysterious inner temple
of man. It is because a deeper knowl-
edge on this subject is necessary to
combat the demoralizing tendencies of
modern life?

In any case, within the last fifty
years, psychology, the study of the
mind and soul of man, is for the first
time in history being put upon a sci-
entific basis. In the new psycho-physi-
ological laboratories of Leipzig, Mos-
cow, Harvard, etc., psychic phenom-
ena are being seriously considered
and experimented with, and delicate
instruments as the ergograph, dynamo-
graph, etc., now record the posi-
tive effects of different sounds, differ-
ent colors, etc., on the pulse and
brain of man, while mysterious so-
called "abnormal" phenomena are
also being carefully studied. The re-
sults of these experiments make the
subject an absorbingly interesting
one, for they presage a most im-
portant, most momentous revolution
in man's conceived ideas of man.

A large and growing body of eminent
men have devoted and are now
devoting much of their time to the
so-called "abnormal" psychic mani-
festations, feeling that this will lead
to a better understanding of man in
his normal state, and there is no
better guarantee of the importance
of the subject than the association
with it of such names as Fred W.
Meyers (author of "Human Person-
ality," etc., a classic on this subject),
Sir William Crookes, Sir Oliver Lodge,
William James, Dr. Hodgson, Dr.
Sidds, Dr. Morton Prince, Charcot,
Bernheim, Liebau, Flammarion,
Lombroso, Jastrow, Dr. Maxwell,
Ochorowicz, and many other well
known names. (Some of these are re-
cently deceased.)

Women's Work.

For the soul comfort of the gentle-
man who has old-fashioned ideas
about woman's sphere, let such a one
be cautioned against reading Olive
Schreiner's book, Women and Labor.
There are many shocks to his sensi-
bilities in its pages. Perhaps he has
prided himself on the gallantry of
his position. He may have read a pa-
per at some time or delivered an ora-
tion on fair daughters, or the queenli-
ness of women, or something of that
kind. Then he would not like this:—

"The lofty theorist who to-night
stands before the drawing-room fire
in spotless shirtfront and perfectly
fitting clothes, and declaims upon the
amplitude of woman's work in life as
child-bearer and the mighty value of
that labor, which exceeds all other,
making it unnecessary for her to
share man's grosser and lower toils:
Does he always remember his theory?
When waking, to-morrow morning,
he finds that the elderly house drudge
who rises at dawn while he yet
sleeps, to make his tea and clean his
boots, has brought his tea late and
polished his boots ill; may he not even
sharply condemn her and assure
her she will have to leave unless she
works harder and rises earlier? He
does not exclaim to her, 'Divine child-
bearer! Potential mother of the
race! Why should you clean my
boots or bring up my tea while I lie
warm in bed? Is it not enough you
should have the holy and mysterious
power of bringing the race to life? Let
that content you. Henceforth I
shall get up at dawn and make my
own tea and clean my own boots, and
pay you just the same.'"

Is Woman Man's Interior?

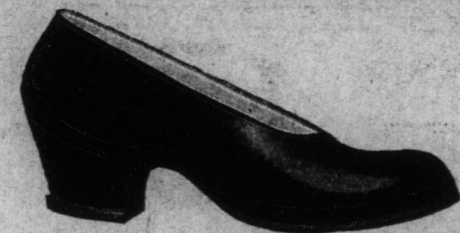
The idea so widely current that

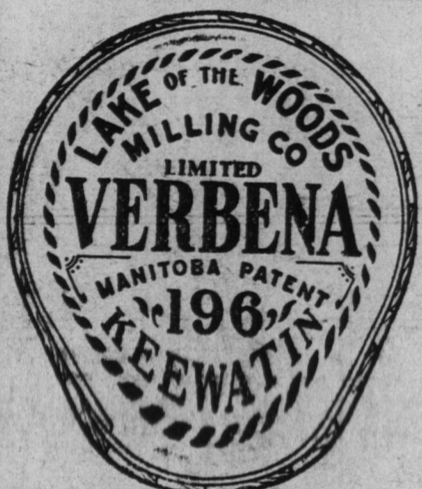
