"This is what happened at Loos, in Champagne, and on the Somme. It was true to a much less extent of the two last and highly successful French offensives on the Verdun front. In all other cases the Germans were ready, or we should have gone further Corn Syrup, tins. than we did. At Verdun the only warning the enemy had was the pre liminary bombardment. There was no unusual concentration of troops, because they were already on the spot. To that extent the important element

of surprise had been re-established. "During the last three months I have been able to visit practically the whole French front from Verdun to Belfort. The conditions are now such as to make it possible for the French command to launch an attack wherever and whenever it chooses, without giving the enemy more warning than that of the increased number of rounds fired beforehand by the artlilery at given points before the attack. A simultaneous bombardment along the front would puzzle the most accomplished strategist the Germans

"The French are now in a position everywhere to do what the Germans, as a result of disregarding treaties

"The French have made such vast preparations beyond every part of the line, have accumulated such vast stores of ammunition and material. have constructed such immense lengths of new roads and railroads. that they are now in a position, whenever they choose, to prepare an attack on a big scale without showing their hands until the last moment."

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
