

What They Want.

Publicity has been given the aspirations of the Five Allied Powers, Great Britain, France, Belgium, Italy and Japan, touching their demands concerning territory and the reconstitution of boundary lines, and it is now for the Peace Conference to adjust them co-ordinatively, and in such an amicable manner as will not give rise to any bickerings or recriminations by the countries concerned. The British representatives believe

that it is possible to establish a League of Nations, and that the same is desirable, but the establishment thereof must be done by the Present Peace Congress. Britain has no continental purposes, beyond those of a just and lasting peace for all countries under the principle of self-determination, but she asks that there shall be international freedom of transit by railroads and waterways, which is in a general way the British idea of the definition of commerce freedom in peace time. Over the conquered German Colonies in the South Pacific, and those on the African Continent, Great Britain will take mandatory control for Australia and the South African Union, and in addition she will have the mandate over German East Africa, certain parts of Arabia and in Mesopotamia. Great Britain will also enter a pool with the other four Allies in the matter of indemnities, particularly for air raiding damages and

shipping losses. lost provinces of Alsace-Lorraine unconditionally, and the right to discuss and ultimately fix the Rhine frontiers of that country, even to the necessity of creating buffer States. and also to re-annex the Sarre river basin. France will also insist that the Northern left bank of the Rhine should be free of military works of all kinds, and that the people in that zone should be left free to make a decision as to whether they delire to join France, form an independent State or return to Germany. The bill for reparation against her late enemy when ready for presentation is estimated to be sixty thousand million francs, a sum sixty times more than the war indemnity collected by Germany from the French people in 1871. . Over Syria France feels that she should exercise a guardianship until such time as the inhabitans are able to

govern themselves. Belgium's demand includes reparation for damages wrought by Germany and insists that the amount of her claim shall be the first lien on German assets up to a sum of 15,-000.000.000 francs or a greater sum if return is not made of the machinery and material stolen by the Germans. Further Belgium believes that she should be the first payee, because she was the first country invaded: because her neutrality was violated an because she suffered more at the hand of the Germans than any other country in the war. Territorially Belgium desires from Holland the left Bank of the river Scheldt and the peninsula of Maestricht, which pushes into Belgian Limburg. So far as Luxemburg is concerned Belgium will agree to that duchy deciding for itself whether it wishes to join Belgium or France or retain its own autonomy. Italy asks for the Trentino so far as the Brenner Pass, including the whole of the Southern Tyrol, Trieste, Istria, Flume, Zara, Sebenico, the majority of the Dalmatian Archipelago.

"Daniel O'Connell." LAST NIGHT'S LECTURE BY MR. JUSTICE KENT.

St. Joseph's course of lectures closed last night with Judge Kent's very interesting and able essay on O'Conneil. President Clooney in introducing the lecturer stressed the cultural significance of these literary evenings, and voiced the gratitude of St. Joseph's Institute to each and all of the speakers

Judge Kent limited his paper to Judge Kent limited his paper to the passing of Catholic Emancipation, (1829). He portrayed vividity the lamentable conditions obtaining in Ireland in the 18th century, the oppression of the penal law, the travesties of justice, the confiscations and imprisonments that were of daily occurence. He then went on to sketch the early career of the Liberator. With evident sympathy and knowledge Judge Kent enlarged on O'Connell's forensic gifts—his popu-lar oratory exactly attuned to his audience, his deep acquaintance with law, his marvellous intuitions of the weak points of witnesses, his power of fascination over juries. Resolving and the resolving search of the resolving search ing to free his countrymen from their civil disabilities he banded the whole nation into one vast society for the obtention of their rights unrough parliamentary means. For nell, a witness in his college days of the dreaded excesses of the French Revolution, was inexorably oppose to the employment of force, and was determined, that come what might, he should never be a party to blood-shed. With indomitable energy, and through many ups and downs the Liberator struggled towards his goal for twenty years, and at last noble ambition was realized. Todemocratic ideals have made such progress, we can scarcely realize man's religion stamping him as a parish and an outcast. But such

was the case a century ago, and O'Connell in breaking these fetters, not only proved himself a glorious Catholic champion, but a benefactor as well of the human race. In thanking the lecturer Rev. Dr. Kitchen expressed the hope that

JELLICOE TAKES UP THE PEN.

A book written by Admiral Viscount Jellicoe, the former Commander of the British Grand Fleet, which will appear to-morrow, gives the cause of the sinking of the British cruiser Hampshire, on which Lord Kitchener lost his life. Admiral Jellicoe ex-Mrs. William Butt, (Britannia), plains that the Hampshire struck a German moored mine, which had been laid by submarines. The book con-tains revelations of British unpreparedness at the beginning of the war. The Grand Fleet had to run out of harbor several times because sub-marines were reported inside. Ad-miral Jellicoe says he averted a night action with his big ships off Jutland because the British searchlights and fire controls were defective. He re-commends a greater superiority of all classes of vessels than in 1914.

Position Finding Wireless Station.

Located at Cape Race.

Ottawa, Feb. 3.-The Department of the Naval Service has established on the east coast of Canada four direction-finding stations which will, it is expected, prove of great value to vessels lost in the feg and unable to determine their position. These stations are located at Cape Sable, the mouth of Halifax Harbour, Cape Canso, and Cape Race, Newfoundland. From any or all of these stations a vessel equipped with wireless may obtain a bearing while at a distance of several hundred miles from the

The Reichsbank more than doubled its gold reserve during the war, partly by drawing to itself gold from the other allies and partly by very successful canvass of the private stores of gold in the country. According to the law issue of paper money by the Reichsbank must bear a direct ratio to the amount of the gold reserve. This particular law was evaded by creating other State institutions unfettered by such a restriction which could issue paper money. It can hardly be doubted that the Reichsbank itself during the revolution issued more paper money than the law allows. It has been a very curious fact that the German citizen began by hoarding gold, then took to hoarding silver, then to hoarding nickel, and finally, just be-fore the revolution, to hoarding pa-per money. This shows a curious delusion in the popular mind, but at the same time it also shows how great factor gold reserve was in mainaining the fabric of credit in Ger-

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
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
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
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
