Doings at Trinity.

The daily doings at Trinity are not importance or variety in themselves to entitle them to publication. There are, however, so many of our people living at St. John's and other places, and they are still so deeply interested in everything that goes on in Trinity, and so much pleased when they can read of it in the local press, that one is tempted to publish those doings more frequently than otherwise one would feel disposed to do.

Empire Day was observed this year in a few ways beyond the usual. The teachers and children of the three day schools assembled at St. Paul's School grounds at 10 o'clock and after being addressed by the clergy, marched with flags and cheers around the town, and then dispersed to enjoy the finest day of the season, in various ways. There were several pic-nic and trouting parties, and some of the shops closed during the afternoon. In the evening a children's concert-entertainment was held in the Parish Hall. This was given by the pupils of Mrs. Forster's music class, together with a few of their young friends. Mrs. Forster gave generously and unselfishly of her time and talents towards the training of the children and she received in return for it, the unanimous thanks and the assurance of pleasure and enjoyment from an audience that filled the hall, plus \$38 for a public object. It was in every respect one of the best entertainments that have been given to the public within the last few years.

A long, low building down by the water side, not far from the Hotel site, was removed years ago. At the building left of a group of stores that were used as a business premises over a hundred years ago. Its timbers now form parts of several buildings elsewhere, and if they would talk they could tell of plots that were hatched in its upper room, by men who in those days held human life pretty cheap. One of those plots fortunately was ninned in the hud, and instead of ending in a tragedy, it resulted in the disappearance of the plotters from Trinity, and thus ridding the place of a number of men who were no credit to it, or to any cause they professed to represent. Some ten years ago in a fishing parish of Nova Scotia, I met three men who surprised me by telling me that they had heard their grandfathers talk about a place called Trinity, in Newfoundland; and as they talked, my thoughts went back to that upper room in that store by the water side and to the averted tragedy that I had often heard my grandfather tell about. They were. however, respectable citizens of a respected community, and in no way responsible for their grandfathers doings, so "I held my tongue and spake nothing," realizing once again that the world is a small one after

Flour and Sugar Stored at Halifax.

In those days of high prices and scarcity of foodstuffs it may be interesting to note that stored in the sheds at the South End Terminals is sufficient flour and sugar to meet the needs of the populace of Halifax for many months. The exact quantity is not known, but it has been estimated that there are over 1/4 a million bags of flour, and several hundred thousand

The sugar is in Shed 24, and the quantity is daily increasing. Whether this is for export or not is unknown, one side of the shed is stacked high with bags. It is understood that the bags are brought around from the Woodside Refinery by rail. Shed number 23, situated east of number 24, is

empty. The flour is in sheds 25 and 28. In the former the space is practically all used, leaving only room for gangs to work. Many large stacks are in shed 28, and a large shipment was sent forward by the Furness Liner Sachem. The steamer Chatham is due here to load a cargo of flour and it is believed will take her cargo from these sheds.



Produce and Provisions.

(From Saturday's Trade Review.) THE CODFISHERY.—The Summer codfishery may be said to have begun this week. At Bonne Bay traps had from five to thirty quintals, on Tuesday and Wednesday. At Petty Hr. one to three quintals were caught with jiggers and Thursday news came in from Cape St. Mary's that the fishery had begun well there and Red Island and Placentia Bay boats had taken 10 to 30 qtls. At Outer Cove, Pouch Cove, and Flat Rock and Dunfield there is a good sign.

CODFISH.—The shipments to for-

eign markets this week were the lowest of any weeks since New Year. There are two vessels loading for Oporto, one for Brazil and one for the West Indies. The Hazel Trahey too 2,683 qtls. for Barbados, The stocks at Oporto are over 50,000 qtls., but the consumption for the week is high, viz., 11,400. There are eight Nfld. vessels waiting outside to discharge fish cargoes at Oporto. The price has fallen to 52 shillings at Oporto and 50 shillings at Lisbon. In St. John's very little is doing. The normal price is \$10.50 for No. 1, but on being culled it averages about \$8.00.

COD LIVER OIL.—The shipment from St. John's this week amounted to about 3000 gallons to the United States. The demand is slowing down and buyers of large lots for Medicinal use are awaiting developments arising out of the Norwegian catch. We quote the following from last issue of the "Drug Trades Weekly."

Codliver Oil-The oil is in a weak position here. The price of Nfld. oil has been cut to \$80.00 a barrel by dealers. Norwegian is still commanding \$85.00, but the steadily increasing supplies keep its position easy.

CODOIL .- During the week just ended, 11,537 gallons of Common Codoil were shipped to Boston. The price has gained ground again, owing to the scarcity in both the United States and England. The St. John's price is \$310 this week for large lots. The following from last week's issue of the New York "Drug Trades Weekly" throws light on the situation.

Cod Oil-The increasing scarcity of Nfld. cod oil has forced the price up rapidly, and sales were made during the week as high as \$1,25 per gallon, with a tendency to even higher leyels. In some quarters the belief is expressed that stocks are not sufficient o supply both American and English buyers until the new catch has been brought in. English interests are especially active in Nfid. and have had much to do with the present shortage. Domestic cod oil is very firmly held around \$1.10 per gallon, but is expected to advance on the strength of the Nfld. situation.

HERRING.-Split Herring are gone down to \$4 in the local market and they must be sound and well packed to bring this price. Sales of big lots were made yesterday at \$3.50, but they were not No. 1. The local exporters are not buying and what trade is going is in the hands of two or three Brokers. It is said that there are some 12,000 barrels to come out of Notre Dame Bay. Scotch Pack are not spoken of.

LOBSTERS. - Packers are doing well since the Labrador Fishery opened on the South and West Coasts. The probable price for new pack will be \$30 per case of 48 one lb. flats. P. E. I. packers, we hear, are holding their catch for \$40 in New York. Banking financiers there who are setting their faces against luxuries which lobsters are at this price-will not advance for these prices. Our Nftd. packers should not ask a price that will kill the market. Some West Coast buyers, who paid \$37 and \$38 last Summer, had to sell at \$34 and lost heavily.

CANNED SALMON .- We endorse what the Telegram printed this week about booming the canned salmon industry. Our esteemed contemporary, however, was not aware that 2,000 cases of cans for salmon were sent to Labrador last Summer. The salmon were not plentiful and not all these cans were used, but the investors paid expenses and were encouraged to go in on a large scale this season. The Jutland Sea Fight.

The battle of Jutland was "The Day" that all patriotic Germans had been looking forward to for years, and though an unfinished action, it was the greatest naval battle of the late war. It was on May 31, 1916, that the entire German high seas fleet left port and steamed up the west coast of Denmark, but it was quickly sighted by British scouts, and the main British fleet came out to meet it. The battle cruiser squadron, under the command of Admiral Sir David Beatty, was nearer the scene of action than the main battle fleet under Sir John Jellicoe, and of course came into action before the main battle fleet could ar rive. The action opened about 3.30 in the afternoon and for two hours the Germans fought very well indeed, and scored some notable hits, the "Queen Mary" and the "Indefatigable" being sunk. Admiral Beatty ran parallel to the Germans and toward their main fleet, which he engaged with great daring. By 5 o'clock the Germans were more or less obscured by darkness and mist, while the British offered a much clearer target to the enemy. Towards p.m the main British fleet arrived, but was only able to see the enemy at intervals. Nevertheless it engaged them as well as possible up to midnight. During the night Jellicoe manœuvred to get between the German fleet and its base, and Beatty tried to get between it and the coast of Jutland. But, aided by the darkness, the Germans succeeded in getting away. The destroyers of both fleets tore about like mad things all through the night and fought any enemy shins they came across. The following morning the German ships were nowhere to be seen, and there was nothing for the British fleet to do but return to its base. The losses on each side were about equal. In a sense it was a drawn battle, indecisive and unfinished. Eut two things may be noted. First, after the British main fleet arrived, the Germans' only idea was to run away, while the British strained every effort to bring them to action. Second, they never dared to come out and fight again, and ended by an ignominous surrender without striking a blow. The Press Bureau published our losses at first, so that it appeared a British defeat, and not till a week after did we learn it was much more of a victory. If the Germans ever have a great battle fleet again, and want another "Day," our Navy will always be delighted to oblige.

Garden Competition, '20.

Children will do well not to attempt too much. (c) In dry weather do not allow the earth around the plants to become hard and "caked."


