ISTER MARY DOMINIC DOYLE.

The late Sister Mary Dominic Doyle, whose remains were interred in the Sisters' Cemetery, Belvedere, at 12.30 yesterday, Jan 1, was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Doyle, "Doyles," Grand River, West Coast, Newfound-

She was born in 1382, entered the congregation of the Sisters of Mercy. in the Mercy Convent, Military Road in November, 1906, and was professed on August 28th, 1909.

From the time of her entrance into religion until aobut two years ago, all her energies were unselfshiy and unsparingly devoted to the service of God in the education of His little ones. especially the poor. She spent the greater part of her religious life in St. Vincent's School, Harvey Road; a year in the Mercy Convent, Brigus; two years in St. Joseph's School, Waterford Bridge and some time in St. Joseph's School, Hoylestown; Serious indications of failing health

necessitated her recall to the Mother of the Sisters of Mercy, Militin 1922. To one of an active


