What our Neighbours think of Us. The American newspapers are turning their attention to our political scandal, and several of them have lengthy editorial notices, containing some shrewd and well directed criticism.

The New York Daily Bulletin of the 8th inst. says: The committee, however, was by no means formed for the purpose of "investigating to find out." It has, in fact, evinced an evident tendency to hush up any unpleasant facts, and at an adjourned meeting in Montreal a few days ago considerable surprise and indignation was manifested at the dilatory proceedings of the committee.

The sum and substance of the matter is this: Sir Hugh Allan found out that the obtaining of the charter for the Railroad Company which he represented depended on political favor. Sir John A. Macdonald was the head of the New Dominion cabinet, but his place depended on the votes of a phalanx of forty-five members of Parliament known as the French party, who always voted, like so many sheep, at the bidding of Sir George E. Cartier, who died within the last few months.

The Ritualistic Movement. A memorial was lately presented to the archbishops of Canterbury and York, signed by sixty thousand members of the Church of England, having reference to the great increase of Ritualistic teaching in that church. A very apropos illustration of the evil complained of was furnished by the fact that a petition was shortly afterwards presented to the Canterbury Convocation, by 400 Anglican clergymen, in favour of what they designated the Sacramental Confession.

These statements need little comment. They are clear evidences of corruption; and yet the majority of three on the Committee appointed to investigate the affair have substantially refused to commence their labours—evidently inspired by the Government—on the ground that they cannot examine the witnesses on oath without special legislation. This procedure leads one to the conclusion that the Government are afraid of a trial—are conscious, in fact, that they could not clear their reputation if placed on the witness stand.

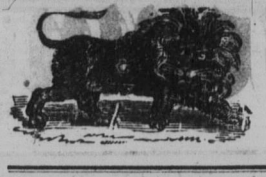
