THE trout fishing season ended on the 1st inst., and will remain closed till the 1st of next May. Quail may be shot from this time up to the 1st of January. Cattle Fair.—The Mount Forest cattle fair held on Wednesday last was very largely attended. A considerable number of sales were effected. The average rates were: Oxen, per yoke, \$75 to \$100; steers, \$60 to \$65; cows, \$20 to \$30; heifers, \$16 to \$20.

Confession of a Murderer.

The girl Elizabeth Jones, now in consistence in the penitontiary for the murder of her cousin, in the township of Delaware, in the year 1868, has made a most startling statement, the purport of which has been known for several weeks, but which is only now given to the public. #### A True Reformer.

The powerful and suggestive speech made by Mr. Blake at Aurora has been, since its delivery, the almost exclusive subject of political discussion. Some writers seem to regard it as premature, as in the fullest sense "disturbing," and even as slightly revolutionary. Others, again, accustomed only to the old cockpit style of political warfare, which has prevailed for so many years in this country, and in their narrow, prejudiced and partizan vision, seeing nothing beyond this limit, and are have raised the shout that the speaker is about to leave the Reform party; that this speech is the key-note of the new department. gloating over the hoped-for split in the Reform ranks, they (the Conservatives) are prepared to hail the formation of a new party, in the hope that their own, which is now beaten, battered and powerless, may once more seize the reins of power, and fatten on the spoils of office. A third, and we believe more numerous and more tolerant, class in the community, view it in a different light. They regard it as an effort to elevate the political standard by introducing new topics and new themes in the lose sight of the dead past, with its bitter memories, its constant crimi nations, and its old feuds. Whatever may be their opinion of the questions started by Mr. Blake, they see noth ing revolutionary in bringing them up or in discussing them. Some of them have already formed the subject of debate, and others, though more subtle and abstract in their nature, are yet legitimate themes on which the statesman, the political philosopher, or even the common politican may descant without the necessity of reverting to old issues or raking up the old sores, and mis takes and iniquities of our past poli

tical history.

Mr. Blake assumes the whole responsibility for his utterances at Aurora, but as a man of independent thought, and hoking at the grave possibilities of the future, he did not hesitate to discuss questions which have already engaged, or assuredly will, largely engage publicatiention. The chief of there are, the Constitution of the Senate, the Independence of Parliament and purity of election, compulsory voting, the recognition and adjustment of the principle of the representation of mnorities, and our relations to the Empire. It is not our purpose at present to enter into the merits of any of these subjects, but who ever reads them ever cannot but came to the conclusion that not only as abstract questions, but in their bearing towards this country, they are of the utmost importance; and now that they are openly and boldly, placed in the arena of public discussion, they cannot be ignored or driven out of sight. And why should they be? Is it more patriotic to obstimately shut our eyes to the probabilities of the future, and regard these changes as revolutionary innovations, or in the true spirit of reform to take them up as healthy subjects for thought and discussion, so that if they are to be classed among the inevitable issues to which we are dritting, we may have them viewed in every aspect, and discussed from tical history.

But we take it that he is impressed with the belief that the old dead to sues should at least be decended in the belief that the tendency of public thought is in the direction of larger and more important questions which affect our future, which will form attractive subjects of consideration to all intelligent minds, and especially to the youth oit his country, who are beginning to interest themselves in public affairs, and whose hopes and aspirations—albeit they may be too high pitched—never theless indicate mental life and activity, and in time will get toned down. The ideas to which he has given definite shape are not original, for thinking men have for years been revolving them in their own minds. In such shape they have now been placed before the public, and have become public property. We can see in this speech, therefore, no new departure—far less the attempt to form a new party. But we see in it the giving shape and tangible form to ideas which had been vaguely flooting through the public mind—some of which, after fruitless discussion, may be shelved among the impossibilities, and some of which, as Mr. Blake says, "may yet be crystallized into Acts of Parliament." For our part we are content to let them be tried by their merits. If they possess the germs which will in time bud into legislation—if they are rugt. In principle, and possess political vitality—no opposition—can destroy them; and if they are nothing tut the dream of a political enthusiast, they will sooner or later come to naught.

Illicit Distillery in Amaranth.

The following case was tried at the Toronto Assizes on Thursday last: oronic Assizes on Thursday last:

THE QUEEN VS. HICKS AND EVANS.—

T. R. M. Fleming appeared for the rown: Mr. D. L. Scott, Orangeville, ppeared for the defendant Evans alone, he defendant Hicks was not represented.

Charles Edward Romain, Inspector of Unland Revenue, was at the village of Waldemar, in the township of Amaranth, on the 6th of May, 1872, on information he had received; went there with Mr. James Gow, the Collector of Inland Revenue; they found a man and woman engaged, when they reached the spot, rolling a barrel of spirits into the Grand River; he ordered them to desist, which they did, and he proceeded to take an inventory of the plant and apparatus on the premises. The man gave his name as W. J. Johnson. Mr. Romain described the situation as about four or five roofs from a twern kept by Hicks and Evans, and immediately on the banks of the river. The man who gave his name as "Johnson," subsequently admitted his proper name was Hicks, and that the woman spoken of was his wife. The informer said the parties were Robert Hicks and Loxan, for Evans, and were the root of the first information he had received was correct, as subsequent-events all proved the correctness of what he helived the first information he had received was correct, as subsequent-events all proved the correctness of what he had been told.
