Illicit Distillery in Amaranth.

The following case was tried at the Toronto Assizes on Thursday last:—

THE QUEEN VS. HICKS AND EVANS.—Mr. R. M. Fleming appeared for the Crown: Mr. D. L. Scott, Orangeville, appeared for the defendant Evans alone. The defendant Hicks was not represented.

This was a prosecution by the Crown against the parties for illicit distilling. They charged that the parties made 50 gallons of spirits without license. There were other counts in the declaration, and these with their penalties were set out. Mr. Fleming opened the case for the Crown by relating the events that had taken place at the time of the entrance on the premises by the Inspector of Inland Revenue. He called evidence, Charles Edward Romain, Inspector of Inland Revenue, was at the village of Waldemar, in the township of Amaranth, on the 6th of May, 1872, on information he had received; went there with Mr. James Gow, the Collector of Inland Revenue; they found a man and woman engaged, when they reached the spot, rolling a barrel of spirits into the Grand River; he ordered them to desist, which they did, and he proceeded to take an inventory of the plant and apparatus on the premises. The man gave his name as W. J. Johnson. Mr. Romain described the situation as about four or five rods from a tavern kept by Hicks and Evans, and immediately on the banks of the river. The man who gave his name as "Johnson," subsequently admitted his proper name was Hicks, and that the woman spoken of was his wife. The informer said the parties were Robert Hicks and Alexander Evans, and were the proprietors of the tavern, an old ashery close by, and the distillery. Mr. Romain could identify Hicks, but he could not identify Evans, whom he had not seen; but he believed the first information he had received was correct, as subsequent events all proved the correctness of what he had been told. Parties wishing to go into distilling make application to the Collector of Inland Revenue. This application must be approved by the District Inspector, (the office filled by the witness.) There had been no such application in this case. The barrel of spirits he supposed was made there. The spirit ranked in quality with the spirit of the ordinary "Swamp whiskey," as it was called. The duty was 63 cents per proof gallon at that time. The schedule he produced was made in triplicate. They had the materials for mashing, distilling, and rectifying, the latter as far as they could see so. They must have worked more than one day before they got there. He thought the capacity of the place would be equal to two barrels per week. There were no returns made from this distillery; it would be the last thing they would do. It appeared about \$100 worth of property, whiskey and plant was sold, and about \$30 worth destroyed. Mr. Scott said he appeared for Evans alone. Hicks was not represented. In answer to Mr. Scott, Mr. Romain proceeded to state that his information was that if he went to the place indicated he would find the work in full operation. He could not swear that he saw Evans, but Evans may have been there. A Mr. Dawson, Reeve of the Township of Lather, acted in their behalf, for Mr. Dawson jumped off the train on its approach to Waldemar, in collusion with the conductor of the train, and ran down to tell the parties that the Inspector was coming. Mr. Romain jumped off too, and ran a race with the Reeve, but the latter knew the short cuts better and got there in advance. When Mr. Romain got there he found the parties rolling the barrel as described, and others were on the spot. He covered them with his revolver telling them his authority, when he proceeded as described. He did not know anything of the parties more than what was given to him by the informer. The spirits were about 33 under proof, according to test made.

James Gow was Collector of Inland Revenue, and accompanied Mr. Romain on the excursion just described by him. Mr. Gow did not know any further about the offenders than what had been communicated by parties giving them information. They had found some mill off in the left of a stable attached to the hotel. The man who gave his name as "Johnson," but afterwards was found to be Hicks, appeared to be proprietor of the hotel.

This closed the case for the Crown. Mr. Scott said he did not think there was any necessity to go into a defence, as it had not been stated in evidence that Evans was there, nor had he been associated with defendant, Hicks, in the act complained of.

Mr. Fleming contended that under the Act relating to Inland Revenue, sec. 158, general evidence might be given.

His Lordship decided that there was no evidence as against Evans.

His Lordship addressed the jury, and remarked that as far as Evans was concerned there was no evidence; but in the case of Hicks they could scarcely doubt that he had committed the offence of distilling, charged in the first count. The second count charged him with rectifying, was also proved. The third count charged double license as penalty. The fourth count charged them with possession of apparatus; this was proved also. The fifth count charged them with neglecting to make report with description of the apparatus was also held proved. And a further penalty for every day in which it shall be omitted to make these necessary returns. His Lordship directed that they should find the charges all proved as against Hicks. The penalties, he observed, appeared to be heavy, but it was the act of the Legislature in fixing these penalties.

The jury returned in 20 minutes with a verdict acquitting Evans, and a verdict for the Crown as regard Hicks, on all the counts, including the following penalties:—On the first count \$200; second count \$200; third count \$500, and \$63 (double duty); fourth count \$100; fifth count \$500; sixth count \$100, a total of \$1,663.
