





PRIZES AT UPPER CANADA

Upper Canada College was founded in 1820 after the model of the great public schools of England, and has for more than half a century done the most educational work. From its ranks have come youths who distinguished themselves at the University and have since held prominent positions on the bench as well as in Parliament, the learned professions, the ranks of commerce, like other institutions, it has not been without its vicissitudes, and has recently passed through a crisis in its history.

The Public Hall was crowded with the pupils and their friends. Principal Dickson presided at the chair supported by Bishop Sheehan, Dr. Daniel Wilson, a number of principals and professors of other Toronto educational institutions, clergymen and prominent citizens.

Principal Dickson, who was loudly cheered, gave a brief yet interesting account of the school's record for the year. He had been 30% against last year. Of these 188 were boys, and 144 had been an average attendance of 296, 50 per cent of the school.

From the Protestant Press, Boston, Oct. 21. Archbishop Lynch and his colleagues, who were guests at Government House along with Cardinal Taschereau, were the very persons who during the recent visit of the Governor-General to Toronto, studiously refused from paying to His Excellency, in the recognized manner, the respect due to him as the official representative of Her Majesty. In view of this we do not hesitate to reiterate the opinion that the extending of the Cardinal's visit to the representative of the Governor-General, to such persons was an insult, not only to the Protestant sentiment of the country, but to all loyal subjects of Her Majesty. In the action of the Roman Catholic hierarchy towards the Governor-General, who they publicly associated themselves with the lawlessness and crime at this time unfurling in the streets of the United Kingdom. Such persons, whether priests or laymen, ought not, in our judgment, to be entertained at Government House in Toronto. Whatever the motives of the "penal" Lieutenant-Governor may have been in his efforts to assemble around his person a mixed company to do honor to Cardinal Taschereau and Archbishop Lynch, we venture to express our conviction that in doing so he committed a mistake; and that after the event has passed, he is able to gauge the Protestant opinion upon the wisdom of his action, not so much from the number of those Protestants who felt constrained to accept his invitation, as from the number of those eminent divines who felt obliged in the circumstances to remain away.

We cannot regard this whole matter as unimportant, as it is a manifestation of a general trend of everything said and done during the recent visit of Cardinal Taschereau, which was unmistakably to bring to light the differences existing between Protestantism and Roman Catholicism, and to influence the public mind as to the proper distinction between Popery and Evangelical Christianity.

Dr. J. J. Macdonnell Does Not See Why There Should Be Any Discrimination. Sir, I am sorry that you thought it necessary, in dealing with the visit of Cardinal Taschereau to Toronto, to write the following sentence: "The entertainment of Cardinal Taschereau, in his official capacity, at Government House and the invitation of Protestant clergy to meet him, were manifestly to do honor to the Moderator of the General Assembly at Winnipeg, and in distinction to other churches to meet him."

I cannot for a moment imagine that you would think the Lieutenant-Governor justified in making a discrimination between Protestant and Roman Catholic dignitaries, or that one should be invited to Government House and another to Manitoba. Is there, then, any radical difference between the person of our Lieutenant-Governor in offering the hospitality of Government House to Cardinal Taschereau and that of the Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba in entertaining the Moderator of the General Assembly at Winnipeg, and in distinction to other churches to meet him?

You know perfectly well that I am with you in your determination to exercise perpetual vigilance as to the unwelcome encroachments of the Church of Rome on our civil or religious freedom. I am all the more sorry that you should have your attention on one who is not an enemy, and who simply followed the tradition of his general head, Protestant and Roman Catholic clergy and laymen on an occasion which would be considered as one of the R.C. Church. Let us fight real foes; let us not set up men of straw in order to have the satisfaction of knocking them down. Yours truly, D. J. Macdonnell.

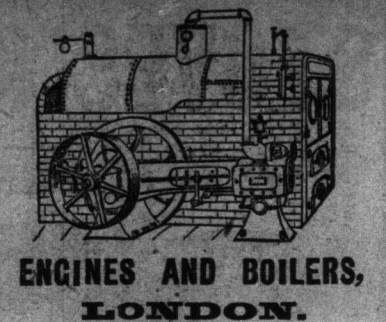

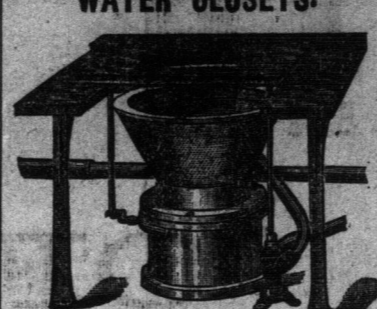
