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NOT EVEN A POSSIBILITY.

STRIKE REMOVS ON THE GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY.

Company and Men Are a Unit in Desiring a Friendly Outcome of the Negotiations Now in Progress.—Merely a Matter of Details to Be Arranged Between the Parties.

Montreal, March 25.—A special from Winnipeg says: Grand Chief Clark of the Conductors' Brotherhood and Grand Master Wilkinson of the Trainmen's Union say that the grievances between the Grand Trunk Railway and the employees is virtually settled. There is no possibility of a strike. A committee of men to meet the divisional superintendents at different points to arrange some details.

Mr. Wilkins of the Conductors' Brotherhood and Mr. Morrison of the Trainmen's Union, who have been in Montreal, have been instructed to proceed to other places to arrange other matters.

Mr. Walcott, assistant manager, said to-day that the Grand Trunk Railway question remains as it was yesterday. He gave the purport of the ultimatum which was sent to the chiefs of the Brotherhood and order.

This ultimatum does not contain anything like a positive refusal of the employees' demand. It only declines to treat further with the Brotherhood until the superintendents of various divisions shall negotiate with the men at places where they work and shall adjust any inequalities which may exist. But it states that the company will not concede the strike of wages demanded by the unions.

Mr. Walcott says that the order and brotherhood as labor unions first, and only secondarily as labor unions, are entitled to represent the employees of the Grand Trunk Railway.

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GREAT WAS THE SURPRISE.

London, March 25.—The suit of Miss Dalrymple Hopkins against the Rev. Mr. Wallis, proctor of Trinity Hall, Cambridge, for £1000 damages for false imprisonment in connection with her arrest on the charge of "walking the streets with a university man" was decided by a jury to-day against Miss Hopkins.
