Sir John A. Macdonald introduced a Bill No. 1 respecting the administration of Oaths of Office; which was read the first time.

Mr. Speaker reported His Excellency's Speech from the Throne, and read a copy thereof to The House, which is as follows:-

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

On meeting you again I have the pleasing duty to perform of congratulating you on the sufficient harvest of last year and on the prosperity and substantial pro-

gress of the country.

Since the suppression of the insurrection in the North-West Territories peace and order have been restored and now prevail. After so serious an outbreak some disquiet and apprehension of the recurrence of those disorders may naturally be expected to linger, and it will be the duty of my Government to make such precautionary arrangements as will assure the present inhabitants, as well as intending settlers, of efficient protection against all disturbance.

I warmly congratulate you on the practical completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway, and on the announcement that it will be open for the daily carriage of passengers and freight from Ocean to Ocean, in the month of June next. This great work so important alike to the Empire and the Dominion cannot fail to increase the trade between British Columbia and the other Provinces, to ensure the early development and settlement of Manitoba and the North-West, and greatly to

add to the commercial prosperity of the whole country.

Should the negotiations between Her Majesty's Government and that of the United States for the appointment of a Joint Commission to adjust what is known as "The Fishery Question" and to consider the best means of developing our International Commerce, fail to secure any satisfactory result, you will be asked to make provision for the protection of our inshore Fisheries by the extension of our present system of Marine Police.

The measure submitted to you last Session for the consolidation of the Statutes and for the introduction into the North West Territories of a more simple and economical system for the transfer of land will be again laid before you for consideration and legislative action. The Acts of last Session will be found to be included in the

first of those measures.

You will also be asked to consider the expediency of improving the judiciary

system which obtains in those Territories.

Your attention will be invited to the propriety of amending the law-relating to the business of the office of Queen's Printer and of providing for the more satisfactory working of the present system of Government and Parliamentary printing.

A numerical census of the North-West Territories has been taken and a measure based thereon for the representation of the people in Parliament will be laid before

Other measures will be laid before you, and among them will be found Bills for providing for a better mode of trial of claims against the Crown, for regulating Post Office Savings Banks in British Columbia and the North-West Territories, for expediting the issue of patents for Indian Lands, for the administration of the rights of the Crown in the foreshores of the Dominion, for the establishment of an Experimental Farm, and for the amendment of the Chinese Immigration Act.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

The accounts for the past year will be laid before you. You will find that the estimate of receipts has been fully realized, but I regret to say that the outbreak in the North-West has added largely to the expenditure of the country.

The Estimates for the ensuing year will be submitted to you. They have been prepared with due regard to economy and the requirements of the Public Service.

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I commend these several subjects and the others which may engage your attention to your best consideration, and I earnestly trust that the result of your deliberations may, under the Divine Blessing, conduce to the advancement and prosperity of Canada.

On motion of Sir John A. Macdonald, His Excellency's Speech was ordered to be taken into consideration to-morrow.

1st. To a very complete collection of pamphlets which may be referred to under the head of Political Economy in the Supplementary Catalogue. These pamphlets range from the year 1827 to the end of 1885, and cover the history of the rise and progress of the Corn Law agitation, the establishment of Free Trade in England,

and the rise and course of the Fair Trade movement of the present time.

2nd. To a collection of volumes of "Selected Essays," culled from duplicate copies of various magazines, arranged according to subjects, and bound and numbered in due order. In these volumes all the principal articles that have appeared for several years past on such subjects as Practical Economy, the Colonies, Biography, History, &c., will be found collected together; and care has been taken to indicate in as many cases as possible the public character of the Essays, the school of thought to which they belong and the sources whence they have been drawn. Improvement in the classification will, no doubt, be made as experience is had, and as suggestions may be received from members of the two Houses.

This collection has been made on the suggestion of a distinguished member of the House of Commons, and the Librarians have particular pleasure in presenting it to the notice of The House.

To a collection of scrap books in which all the speeches that have been reported in The Times, since September last; all the articles of consequence; all the letters on Colonial Affairs, Political Economy, Parliamentary Procedure, Political Organization, History, Biography, &c., will be found to refer to those parts of the speeches of public men in England in which the Colonies or Trade questions were A separate volume will contain the Proceedings in the Imperial Parliament during the current Session so that reference may be had to it in advance of Hansard's Reports.

4th. To a certain volume in which have been collected all published articles, reports, speeches and pamphlets on the subject of Imperial Federation. These volumes contain all that has been published on this subject from the first meeting in July, 1884, to the last speech of the Premier in England, in January, 1886, and particular attention will be given to the task of making the collection complete by adding

from time to time everything that can be had upon the subject.

The Librarians desire to press strongly on the notice of The House the necessity for protecting the Library by limiting the number of persons having the privilege of taking books to their homes. Nearly a thousand persons have enjoyed this privilege in past years, most of them residing in the city of Ottawa. Experience has made it painfully clear that the privilege of obtaining books, which is precious and ought to be respected, is lightly held in the great majority of cases. Books are returned to the Library deprived of valuable plates. Whole pages are torn out of some volumes. containing matter which might easily be copied. Books obtained by private persons are constantly loaned to others, and even sent hundreds of miles by post. Whole sets of books have been so constantly handled as to become offensive, and have literally fallen to pieces on the shelves. Books have been taken away by persons who have appropriated them, and who have boldly declared that the books had been returned. The best editions of our classic English writers, in particular those editions which would afford most pleasure to gentlemen of both Houses, who are advancing in age and who find a good type essential to study, have had to be hidden away in cupboards to save them from the reckless handling of persons possessing and misusing a special privilege in the Library.

The Librarians consider it essential also that some fixed rule should be adopted with regard to the practice of permitting strangers to obtain books through members of Parliament during the Session, and with regard to the number of books obtainable by members themselves. Considerable difficulty is always experienced in enforcing the return of books obtained by strangers and charged to members.

The Librarians consider that the rule which limits a member of either House to three works at one time might reasonably be made more liberal, and the number increased to six. But in the face of the rule which limits the number to three, the Librarians regret to have to report that books have been taken out of the Library in numbers from six to sixty. It is obvious that such a practice must seriously interfere with the usefulness of the Library and with the readiness of its response to the

continual demands made upon it by the members of the two Houses.

Among the practices most objectionable is one that has prevailed too much among members of Parliament, who, against the strict rule of the Library adopted by Parliament have insisted on taking from the Library the volumes of Canadian pamphlets. The consequence has been disastrous. Losses have occurred continually, and the gaps in the lists of our volumes offer constant protest against the practice of permitting the pamphlets to be taken out of the room. Many of the pamphlets are valuable; most of them can never be replaced. Even the English Sessional Papers have not escaped loss; and recently it was found that a most valuable report on Acts of Parliament had been deliberately cut out of the papers for 1875. The usefulness of the series was destroyed by the abstraction of a report which might have been obtained in London for a shilling.

For the first time the Catalogue of the accession to the Library during the year is presented in a form which includes subjects as well as authors, so that books sought for on any subject may be found under the name of the author and under the subject heading also. The books under the subject heading have been placed in alphabetical order. This annual Catalogue is susceptible of further improvements in its classification, and in future issues it is expected that these improvements will be effected. Since 1880 the Catalogue of accessions has been published as an author catalogue simply; and the Librarians entertain with interest the hope of being authorized to present to Parliament a subject as well as author catalogue of all accessions from 1880 to the present time.

During the last Session gentlemen in the House of Commons, whose interest in the Library the Librarians desire most cordially to solicit, and which they hope may continue and increase, offered various criticisms of its management, and various sug-

gestions for its improvement. Two complaints were particularly made.

One was that books named in the catalogue were not to be found in the Library, and no record of their fate is preserved. This is quite true. It is one of the unhappy consequences of a relaxation of wise rules; of the too liberal granting of the privileges of the Library to strangers, and of the indifference which even on the part of members of Parliament has too often prevailed regarding the books of the Library.

The other was that the Catalogues of the Library were not systematic, and that access to the contents of the Library was not easily had. The Librarians desire to say, in justice to the memory of the distinguished gentleman who preceded them, whose merits they can only hope in time to aspire to, that after giving the system every consideration, they do not think that any improvement could be effected without such cost and trouble as the change would ill compensate. Every known form of cataloguing is open to serious objections. "Whatever system you adopt," says a distinguished library scientist, "you will be sorry for it, and wished you had adopted some other." And a writer in the London Times, of January, 1886, exhibits a similar

view of the question, as follows:-

"Sir Antonio Panizzi, the leviathan of bibliographers, branded cataloguemaking as the most difficult and thankless of literary tasks. He emphasized its perplexities before committees, commissions and boards, and the tilt which he ran againt the Council and Fellows of the Royal Society, in the year 1837, over the catalogue of their scientific books which he had then in preparation, was in exasperation at their want of sympathy with the Librarian's handiwork. His failure, for such it was, to index the British Museum Library-he stopped short at letter A, printed in 1841—became merely a further illustration of his own views of the impossibilities of perfection in bibliography. This great catalogue, again in the press after 45 years of revision at the hands of Messrs. J. Winter Jones, W. B. Rye, Thomas Watts, George Bullen, Coventry Patmore, W. R. S. Ralston, Emanuel Deutsch, G. W. Porter, Richard Garnett, Russel Martineau, and a host of specialists, is far from satisfying any of the survivors, the incongruities and shortcomings being as thick as the famed autumnal leaves in Vallombrosa. The science of bibliography is still in its infancy, in spite of the avidity displayed by American and English Librarians in filling their shelves during the last fifteen years with treatises on the mystery and art of catalogue formation."

The system pursued in the Library is as follows :-

The Catalogue of the Library is divided into two sections, one containing works on Law, Politics and Statistics, the other embracing the works on Arts, Literature and Science. All books are classified under their respective subjects, so that for purposes of consultation, every work possessed by the Library on any given subject may be found under its general title. As it is with the Catalogue, so it is with the works on the shelves; all those of the same category being placed in juxtaposition. In order to find out the works of any given author or those on any given subject, it is necessary to consult the two Indexes which refer to the page or pages in the Catalogue where such names or titles are to be found. Thus, all works on "Constitutional Law" will be found at pages 21-56 of the Law Catalogue, and all those bearing on the History of Canada, between pages 1270-1338. The Index is an unerring guide to the Catalogue, and the Catalogue contains everything that is or ought

to be in the Library. It is not to be expected that any person unaccustomed to the system could, without guidance, find his way through the Index and Catalogues. There is no library of any importance conducted in a manner rendering such a feat possible; few libraries tolerate any indiscriminate handling of their catalogues, and, as a rule, only experts or library clerks can successfully cope with the catalogue of a

large library.

It is hoped that the accessions since last year will prove most satisfactory to those who most thoroughly test and enjoy the advantages of the Library. A natural and inevitable demand, during prolonged Sessions, for works in which amusement may be found by men fatigued with long sittings and with legal and political studies, has induced the Librarians to provide works meeting that demand, but in measured quantity. The works of some standard writers having been worn out have been renewed, and a considerable number of works of recent fiction have been added. It will be found also that all available recent literature dealing with such questions as the State, Constitutional Law, the Torrens system, Liquor question and Temperance, Railway Commissions and Management, Political Economy, published since last year, or to which, since last year, attention has been directed, has been collected for the Library. The latest editions of the principal legal text-books, especially those which deal with International Law, the most recent volumes on the operation of the Bankruptcy Act of 1881, England, and on the Franchise Act of 1884, in England; a variety of small text-books concerning the working out of the new Election Laws in the Mother Country; and the latest compilations of the Political and Constitutional History of Great Britain will be found added to the shelves since last Session.

The books added to the Library since last year are now in excellent condition. The binding is specially good, the type, in most cases, pleasant to the eye; the pages are unsoiled, and the character and variety of the contents render access to the shelves one of the great pleasures of life to every man of taste, to every studious man, and every one seeking any kind of intellectual recreation or professional or political information. But if the practice is continued of converting the Library of Parliament into a circulating library during the recess, by the next Session a large percentage of these volumes will be broken, soiled, dog-eared, perhaps plateless, and wholly unfit to be offered to those for whose pleasure and service this Library was

created and is maintained.

We are glad to report that the Canadian section is nearly complete in several important parts; all the works bearing on the Wars of 1756-60 and 1812-13 have been secured as well as a considerable number of treatises and studies on the chrestomathy of the Indian dialects of North America. Many important additions have also been

made in other parts of this section.

The Librarians beg to call the attention of Parliament to the fact that the General Catalogue of the Library has not been printed since 1857 (the law section only having been issued in 1880), and, consequently, copies of this Catalogue are difficult to obtain, and are, moreover, of very little value, the additions to the Library having rendered it most incomplete. It will rest with Parliament to decide whether it should not be reprinted at an early date. The Librarians, however, respectfully suggest that the Catalogue of the Canadian Section, at least, be reprinted this year. The plan on which it was originally, and long ago, started fails to meet the present requirements; it does not give, without much research, an adequate idea of that section.

Honourable members could see for themselves at a glance that it no longer fulfils its object, and that a new Canadian Catalogue should be issued as soon as possible. The list of donations and copyrights is appended. The Supplementary Catalogue

will be issued early next week.

That should the negotiations between Her Majesty's Government and that of the United States for the appointment of a Joint Commission to adjust what is known as "The Fishery Question" and to consider the best means of developing our International Commerce, fail to secure any satisfactory result, we shall be ready to make such provision for the protection of our Inshore Fisheries by the extension of

our present system of Marine Police as may be necessary for that purpose.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of the Municipal Council of the City of St. Catharines, Ontario; praying that no further sums of money be paid towards the passages of Immigrants to Canada.

Of Archibald MacDonald and others, of Stromness and other places; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct a Railway from the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway at or near Medicine Hat or Dunmore, in the Province of Assiniboia, in a southerly direction to the boundary line between Canada and the United States.

Of the Bank of New Brunswick; praying for the passing of an Act empowering

them to reduce their Capital Stock.

Of F. Paquette and others, of the Townships of Barford, Hereford and Auckland, in the Counties of Stanstead and Compton, Quebec; praying that the export duty upon saw-logs made from timber growing in the aforesaid Townships, may be remitted.

Sir Hector Langevin presented,-Return to Order of The House, of the 30th March, 1885, for a Return showing the date and hour ef departure from Toronto and arrival at Brockville of all trains on the Grand Trunk Railway carrying Her Majesty's mails from the 1st February to the 30th April, in the years 1881, 1882, 1883, 1884, and in the present year up to the date of the Return; also, the date and hour of departure from Brockville and Ottawa and of arrival at Ottawa and Brockville of all similar trains on that portion of the Canadian Pacific Railway between the two points last named during the same periods of time.

Four Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received:-

Of Sir A. T. Galt, G.C.M.G., and others; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of The Alberta Railway Company.

Of Ezra Butler Eddy, of the City of Hull, and others, of the Province of Quebec; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of The E. B. Eddy Manufacturing Company.

Of the Canada Atlantic Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act to further extend the time for the completion of their Railway, to extend their corporate powers, and for further Amendments to their Act of Incorporation.

Of the London and Ontario Investment Company (Limited); praying for the passing of an Act to extend their corporate powers, and for further Amendments to their Act of Incorporation.

Of R. R. Fitch and others; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name

of The Brandon, Battleford and Edmonton Railway Company.

Of the Sable and Spanish Boom and Slide Company of Algoma (Limited); praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to attach booms to the shores at the mouth of the Spanish River, at points South and East of Island G. or Rock Island; also, to construct and maintain piers from certain points on the North shore of said river; and also, to charge reasonable tolls on saw logs, lumber and timber for the use of such works.

Of the Nipissing and James Bay Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to build their road in three Sections; also to extend the time for the commencement and completion of the said Sections of their Railway.

Of T. J. Lamontagne and others, of Ste. Anne des Monts; and of the Reverend Joseph St. Laurent, Caré, and others, of Newport, County of Gaspé; severally complaining of a reduction in bounties to fishing boats; and praying that in the matter of fishing bounties, full and perfect justice may be done to Canadian fishermen.

Mr. Beaty, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented

the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

The Committee have examined the notices given on the following Petitions, and find them sufficient, viz. :- Of the Bank of New Brunswick, praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to reduce their Capital Stock; of Archibald MacDonald and others, praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to construct a Railway from the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, at or near Medicine Hat or Dunmore, in the District of Assiniboia, in a southerly direction to the boundary line between Canada and the United States; of John Hallam and others, praying for an Act of incorporation under the name of the Midland Bank of Canada, -and of the North-West Central Railway Company, praying for the passing of an Act to extend the time for the construction and equipment of their Railway, and for other purposes.

As the time for receiving Petitions for Private Bills will expire on Saturday next, the 6th inst., the Committee recommend that the same be extended to Thursday, the 25th March, instant.

Mr. Weldon introduced a Bill No. 14 to reduce the Capital Stock of the Bank of New Brunswick; which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Monday next.

On motion of Mr. Beaty, the time for receiving Petitions for Private Bills, was extended to Thursday, the 25th instant, pursuant to the recommendation of the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

The following Bills were severally introduced, read the first time, and ordered for a second reading, on Monday next, viz.:—

By Mr. Edgar:—Bill No. 15 further to amend "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies and Trading Corporations."

By Mr. McCallum:—Bill No. 16 to incorporate the Medicine Hat, Dunmore and Benton Railway Company.

The House resumed the further consideration of Mr. Casey's proposed motion for an Address to His Excellency the Governor General for copies of instructions or circulars issued to Revising Officers in regard to the performance of their duties under the Electoral Franchise Act of 1885.

And the question being put, it was agreed to.

NOTICES OF MOTIONS.

Mr. Blake—On Monday next—Committee of the Whole House to consider the following Resolutions:—

1. That under the terms of Union each of the Provinces of the Dominion as existing in 1881, at the time of the confirmation by Parliament of the charter granted to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, had full Legislative authority to provide for the construction of local railways running from one point to another

within the limits of the Province.

2. That by Section 15 of the Charter it is provided as follows, viz:—"For twenty years from the date hereof, no line of railway shall be authorized by the Dominion Parliament to be constructed south of the Canadian Pacific Railway from any point at or near the Canadian Pacific Railway, except such line as shall run south-west or to the westward of south-west, nor to within 15 miles of latitude 49°, and in the establishment of any new Province in the North-West Territories, provision shall be made for continuing such prohibition after such establishment until the expiration of said period."

3. That during the debate in the House of Commons on the Act to confirm the charter, objection was taken to the monopoly and limitation proposed to be created

by the said clause.

4. That during the debate in explanation of its real meaning and effect, and of the policy of the Government on the subject, and with a view to obviate such objection, the Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, then and now First Minister, used the

following language :-

"In order to give them a chance we have provided that the Dominion Parlia"ment—mind you the Dominion Parliament, we cannot check any other Parliament,
"we cannot check Ontario, we cannot check Manitoba—shall for the first ten years
"after the construction of the road, give their own road, into which they are putting
"so much money and so much land, a fair chance of existence."

5. That thereafter in the course of the debate, Thomas White, Esq., then a supporter and now a member of the Government, with the same object used the follow-

ing language :-

"But we are told now that because of the fifteen miles there never can be any "other railway into this Country. To what does that apply?-simply to the Ter-"ritories over which the Dominion Parliament has control. There is nothing to " prevent Manitoba now, if it thinks proper, granting a charter from Winnipeg to the "boundary line. At this very moment there is a company in course of organization "to build a railroad from Winnipeg to West Lynn on the boundary, and after this "agreement is ratified. This provision does not take away from Manitoba a single right it possesses. In fact this Parliament could not take away those "rights. It has the same rights as the other Provinces for the incorporation " of railway companies within the boun lary of the Province itself, and there is " nothing to prevent the Province of Manitoba from chartering a railway from "Winnipeg to the boundary to connect with any southern railway. The only guar-"antee which this company has under the contract, is that the traffic shall not be "tapped far west on the prairie section, thus diverting the traffic away from their line to a foreign line. But there is nothing to prevent a railway being built in "Manitoba within the Province that would carry the traffic to any railway that " may tap it from the American side. That is the position with respect to this mat-66 ter."

^{6.} That on the explanations made Parliament confirmed the charter.

7. That three Provinces of the Dominion viz.:—Manitoba, Ontario and British Columbia, are or may be affected by the construction to be placed on the said provision and the policy of the Government in regard thereto.

8. That since the confirmation of the said charter, the Local Legislature of Manitoba has passed several Acts creating companies for the construction of Rail-

ways within the Province.

9. That some of these Acts have been disallowed on the advice of the Government of the day on the ground as expressed in the report of the Minister of Justice, of date Jan. 4, 1882, approved by Order in Council Jan. 12, 1882, that the Acts conflict with the settled policy of the Dominion as evidenced by the clause in the contract with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, which was ratified and adopted by Parliament.

10. That on the 5th Feby., 1884, Sir Charles Tupper, then Minister of Railways, in proposing to this House resolutions authorizing a large loan to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company with a view to induce The House to agree to the said loan and with the object of expounding authoritatively the policy of the Government

on the subject made the following statement :-

"I showed on a former occasion that the present Government had adopted the "policy of their predecessors in regard to what is called the monopoly in the Pro-"vince of Manitoba; that when the late Government undertook to carry on the "construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway as a Government work, they felt "bound to protect the traffic of the road from being drawn off to lines "to the south of us in the adjoining Republic, and had consequently "refused to issue a proclamation which would charter lines within the "Province of Manitoba to connect with American lines to the south. I said that the "present Government, when we came into power, adopted that policy; that we felt, "as our predecessors dil, that, grappling with so gigantic a work as the construc-"tion of the Canadian Pacific Railway, we were bound to adopt every possible means "of protecting our own line against having its traffic drawn to lines to the south-"and, mark you, this was at a time when we did not contemplate at an early day " carrying the Canadian Pacific Railway further than Port Arthur. I said further that "when we made it obligatory upon the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to ex-"tend at once the line north of Lake Superior, giving us an all-rail route "from Montreal to the Pacific Ocean, or from Callander to the Pacific "Ocean, we felt obliged to give to that Company, upon which we im-"posed such onerovs obligations, all the security that we had considered neces-"sary, and that our predecessors in the Government had considered necessary, for "the protection of the Canadian Pacific Railway. But I am glad to be able to state "to the House, that although true to that policy, the Government refused to give assent to the construction of lines within the Province of Manitoba to connect with "American railways to the south, such is the evidence presented by the operation "of the line so far as it has gone, such is the conclusion arrived at by the Canadian "Pacific Railway Company itself in regard to the ability of a through line of the "Canadian Pacific Railway to take care of itself, and by the inherent power of its "own advantages to maintain its position notwithstanding any competition to which "it may be subjected, we are now in a position to review and to reconsider the "policy of the late Government and the policy of the present Government, as to the "continued necessity for any long period of protecting the Canadian Pacific Railway "against competition within the Province of Manitoba, and I am glad to be able to "state to the House that such is the confidence of the Canadian Pacific Railway "Company in the power of the Canadian Pacific Railway to protect itself that when "the line is constructed north of Lake Superior, the Government feel it will not be "incumbent upon them to preserve the position they have hitherto felt bound to "preserve, that of refusing to consent to the construction of lines within the Province "of Manitoba, connecting it with American railways to the south. I can give no "better evidence to the House and the Country of the advanced position which we "consider this great enterprise of the Canadian Pacific Railway has attained, than

"when I say that I feel it is consistent with what we owe to the people of this Country and to that great national work, that the Government should not deem it incumbent on themselves to pursue the restrictive policy within the Province of Manitoba which we have hitherto been obliged to maintain."

11. That upon the said explanation and statement Parliament agreed to the

loan.

12. That the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway has been constructed north of

Lake Superior.

13. That by an Act passed by the Local Legislature of Manitoba on the 3rd June, 1884, entitled "An Act to amend An Act to incorporate the Manitoba Central Railway Company and amending Acts," power was given to the Manitoba Central Railway Company to construct a Railway as follows: "From the Town of Morris southerly to the boundary line of the said Province between the Red River and the first principal meridian within the said Province," and providing that no portion of said Railway should be built in the portion of Territory added to the said Province in the year 1881 in such a way as to contravene the terms in which said Territory was added to the said Province.

14. That the authentic copy of said Act did not reach the Secretary of State for Canada until after the 1st day of April, A.D. 1885, about ten months after its passage.

15. That by consequence the period in which the power of disallowance can be

exercised in respect of the said Act has not yet expired.

16. That the rights of the Provinces, the interests of Manitoba, and the declared policy of the Government, all point to the propriety of leaving the said Act to its

operation.

17. That a humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, setting forth the preceding Resolutions and praying that His Excellency will be graciously pleased not to exercise the power of disallowance as to the said Act, and so to leave the said Act to its operation.

Sir Richard Cartwright—On Monday next—Enquiry of Ministry—What is the total number of immigrants reported to have settled in Canada during the calendar year 1885?

Mr. Orton-On Monday next-Committee of the Whole House to consider the

following Resolutions:-

1. That it is desirable, in order to obviate the impoverishing drainage of money from Canada to pay interest upon borrowed capital, that the amount of foreign capital required for the development of our agricultural as well as other resources be

limited to as small an amount as practical.

2. That it will materially lessen the necessity to borrow foreign capital if mortgages on improved farm property be made a negotiable security by an issue by the Government of Canada of Dominion Notes equal to any such mortgages on improved farm lands to the extent of one half the actual value thereot, such notes to be redeemable in Government bonds based upon such real estate mortgages, and bearing interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum.

3. That it is expedient to grant charters to farm or real estate banks the capital stock of which may consist, not only of specie and Dominion of Canada notes and bonds, but also of first liens upon improved farm lands equal to one half the value thereof; and that as the main source of wealth in Canada is agricultural, it is expedient that the rate of interest charged by said farmers' banks shall be restricted to 6

per cent. per annum.

4. That in order to prevent any clashing of interests between such farmers' banks and ordinary chartered banks, as well as for the general convenience of the public, it is expedient that there be uniformity in the circulating medium, and that all banks be compelled to circulate only Dominion of Canada Notes; and in order to compensate chartered banks for any profit they may derive from the issue of their own bills, there shall be an estimate made of such profit up to the expiration of the charter of

all such banks by properly authorized actuaries, and the amounts so arrived at shall

be paid by an increased issue to said banks of Dominion of Canada Notes.

5. That in order to provide for the interest on any bonds issued by the Government of Canada to redeem notes issued to farmers' banks there shall be a special stamp marked upon such Dominion Notes characterizing the particular farmers' bank to which said notes have been issued, and such tarmers' banks shall provide the interest to the Treasury Department of the Government to meet that of any bonds issued by the Government of Canada for the redemption of such notes.

Of the Toronto Board of Trade; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to create a gratuity fund for the benefit of their members, to extend their corporate powers, and for further Amendments to their Act of Incorporation.

Of George S. Birrell and others; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the

name of The Tecumseh-Insurance Company of Canada.

Of the West Ontario Pacific Railway Company; praying for the passing of an Act to extend the time for the commencement and completion of their Railway, to extend their corporate powers, and for further Amendments to their Act of Incorporation.

Mr. McLelan presented,—Return to an Order of The House of the 1st instant, for a Return of the Receipt and Expenditure, in detail, chargeable to the Consolidated Fund, from the 1st day of July, 1884, to the 1st day of March, 1885, and from the 1st day of July, 1885, to the 1st day of March, 1886.

Of the Union Bank of Lower Canada; praying for the passing of an Act empowering them to reduce their Capital Stock; also, to change the name of the said Bank to that of The Union Bank of Canada.

Mr. White (Cardwell), from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as

"which the timber was required."

And the question being put on the amendment, it was agreed to.

Thirteen Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. Carling presented,—Return under Act 48-49 Victoria, Chapter 3, intituled: "An Ant to provide for the taking of the Census in the Province of Manitoba, the North-west Territories and the District of Keewatin."

On motion of Sir Hector Langevin, it was Resolved,—That when this House adjourns this day, it do stand adjourned until Thursday next.

On motion of Mr. White (Hastings), the Public Accounts of the Dominion of Canada for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1885, and the Report of the Auditor-General on Appropriation Accounts for the same year, were referred to the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts.

Mr. Ives, from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented the First Report of the said Committee, recommending, that as the time for presenting Private Bills will expire on Thursday next, the 11th instant, the same be extended to Wednesday, the 31st March, instant.—Time extended accordingly.

On motion of Mr. White (Renfrew), the Select Standing Committee on Immigration and Colonization obtained leave to employ a short-hand writer, to take down such evidence, as the Committee may deem necessary.

On motion of Mr. Desjardins, the First Report of the Select Committee appointed to supervise the Official Report of the Debates of this House during the present Session, was concurred in.

On motion of Mr. White (Renfrew), it was Ordered,—That the Quorum of the Select Standing Committee on Immigration and Colonization, do consist of Fifteen Members, instead of Nine Members, as contained in the Order of Reference of the 3rd March, instant.

Sir Hector Langevin presented,—Return to an Order of The House of the 30th March, 1885, for a Return showing the number of persons who, on the 30th June, 1884, had deposits in the Post Office Savings Bank of the following amounts:—

And,—Return to an Order of The House of the 27th April, 1885, for a Statement showing :—

1. The number of lots sold in the Township of Viger, Temiscouata, belonging to

the Indians, the amount of the sale and the name of the purchaser.

2. The payments made to the Department, to the agent, Mr. G. H. Deschêne, and to Mr. Antoine LeBel; showing in detail the date of such payments; when made and the amount of each payment.

3. A detailed statement of the amounts transmitted to the Department by Messrs Deschêne and LeBel, out of all moneys received by them up to date, and the date of

such transmission.

4. Copies of the report of Mr. Dingman, on the occasion of his visit to the Viger

Agency, in September, 1884.

5. Copies of correspondence with the Department in relation to the claims of Edouard Morin, and others, for lands purchased by them in the said Indian Reserve.

And,—Return to an Order of The House of the 8th April, 1885, for a Statement of all sums entered in the Public Accounts of Canada as having been expended for Railways, Canals and Navigation in British Columbia, the North-West Territories, Keewatin, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Nova Scotia proper, and Cape Breton Island, up to the 1st January, 1885; also, the superficies and population of each of the said divisions of Canada respectively.

And also,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 1st instant, for a copy of the report of the medical men appointed by the Government to enquire into the mental condition of Louis Riel, after his conviction.

Mr. Costigan presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General of the 12th March, 1885, for copies of all Reports, Orders in Council and correspondence, not already ordered, on the subject of the effect of the decision of the Supreme Court as to the License Act of 1883, and of the steps to be taken to review the same, and of the steps to be taken under the Act meanwhile, with copies of all letters or telegrams to the Commissioners or Inspectors giving them instructions as to their conduct or action or information as to the intensions or action of the Government.

Mr. Bowell presented,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 1st instant, for a Return in the form used in the Statements usually published in the Gazette, of the Exports and Imports from the 1st day of July, 1884, to the 1st day of February, 1885, and from the 1st day of July, 1885, to the 1st day of February, 1886, distinguishing the products of Canada and those of other countries.

And,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 2nd April, 1884, for copies of all correspondence, papers and telegrams between the Government or any Member thereof, and any person or persons relating to the superannuation of James Hearn, late Preventive Officer at Arichat, N.S.; and also all correspondence and telegrams relating to the appointment of his successor and the continuance of the latter in office.

And also,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 27th April, 1885, for a Return of all moneys received by the Government as export duty levied on oak, pine and spruce logs since Confederation, up to January 1st, 1885, showing the amounts received from each shipping point where such duties were levied, giving in detail the amounts collected each year, and giving the names of each person from whom duties have been collected, and also the amounts he or she has paid each year.

Mr. Cameron (Huron) introduced a Bill No. 23 to further amend the Law of Evidence in Criminal Cases; which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Thursday next.

The Bill No. 14 to reduce the Capital Stock of the Bank of New Brunswick, was read the second time, and referred to the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce.

The House then adjourned until Thursday next.

NOTICES OF MOTIONS.

Mr. Blake-On Thursday next-Committee of The Whole House to consider the following Resolutions:-

1. That under the terms of Union each of the Provinces of the Dominion as existing in 1881, at the time of the confirmation by Parliament of the charter granted to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, had full Legislative authority to provide for the construction of local railways running from one point to another

within the limits of the Province.

2. That by Section 15 of the Charter it is provided as follows, viz. :- "For "twenty years from the date hereof, no line of railway shall be authorized by the "Dominion Parliament to be constructed south of the Canadian Pacific Railway " from any point at or near the Canadian Pacific Railway, except such line as shall "run south west or to the westward of south-west, nor to within 15 miles of latitude "49°, and in the establishment of any new Province in the North-West Territories, pro-"vision shall be made for continuing such prohibition after such establishment until "the expiration of said period."

3. That during the debate in the House of Commons on the Act to confirm the charter, objection was taken to the monopoly and limitation proposed to be created

by the said clause.

4. That during the debate in explanation of its real meaning and effect, and of the policy of the Government on the subject, and with a view to obviate such objection, the Right Hon. Sir John A. Macdonald, then and now First Minister, used the

following language :-

"In order to give them a chance we have provided that the Dominion Parlia-"ment-mind you the Dominion Parliament, we cannot check any other Parliament "we cannot check Ontario, we cannot check Manitoba-shall for the first ten years "after the construction of the road, give their own road, into which they are putting "so much money and so much land, a fair chance of existence."

5. That thereafter in the course of the debate, Thomas White, Esq., then a supporter and now a member of the Government, with the same object used the follow-

ing language :-

"But we are told now that because of the fifteen miles there never can be any "other railway into this Country. To what does that apply?—simply to the Ter-"ritories over which the Dominion Parliament has control. There is nothing to " prevent Manitoba now, if it thinks proper, granting a charter from Winnipeg to the "boundary line. At this very moment there is a company in course of organization "to build a railroad from Winnipeg to West Lynn on the boundary, and after this agreement is ratified. This provision does not take away from Manitoba "a single right it possesses. In fact this Parliament could not take away those "rights. It has the same rights as the other Provinces for the incorporation " of railway companies within the boundary of the Province itself, and there is "nothing to prevent the Province of Manitoba from chartering a railway from "Winnipeg to the boundary to connect with any southern railway. The only guar-"antee which this company has under the contract, is that the traffic shall not be "tapped far west on the prairie section, thus diverting the traffic away from their line to a foreign line. But there is nothing to prevent a railway being built in "Manitoba within the Province that would carry the traffic to any railway that " may tap it from the American side. That is the position with respect to this mat-" ter."

6. That on the explanations made Parliament confirmed the charter.

7. That three Provinces of the Dominion, viz.:—Manitoba, Ontario and British Columbia, are or may be affected by the construction to be placed on the said provision and the policy of the Government in regard thereto.

8. That since the confirmation of the said charter, the Local Legislature of Manitoba has passed several Acts creating companies for the construction of Rail-

ways within the Province.

9. That some of these Acts have been disallowed on the advice of the Government of the day on the ground as expressed in the report of the Minister of Justice, of date Jan. 4, 1882, approved by Order in Council Jan. 12, 1882, that the Acts conflict with the settled policy of the Dominion as evidenced by the clause in the contract with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, which was ratified and adopted by Parliament.

10. That on the 5th Feby., 1884, Sir Charles Tupper, then Minister of Railways, in proposing to this House resolutions authorizing a large loan to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, with a view to induce The House to agree to the said loan and with the object of expounding authoritatively the policy of the Government

on the subject, made the following statement :-

"I showed on a former occasion that the present Government had adopted the "policy of their predecessors in regard to what is called the monopoly in the Pro-"vince of Manitoba; that when the late Government undertook to carry on the "construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway as a Government work, they felt "bound to protect the traffic of the road from being drawn off to lines "to the south of us in the adjoining Republic, and had consequently "refused to issue a proclamation which would charter lines within "Province of Manitoba to connect with American lines to the south. I said that the "present Government, when we came into power, adopted that policy; that we felt, "as our predecessors dil, that, grappling with so gigantic a work as the construc-"tion of the Canadian Pacific Railway, we were bound to adopt every possible means " of protecting our own line against having its traffic drawn to lines to the south-"and, mark you, this was at a time when we did not contemplate at an early day " carrying the Canadian Pacific Railway further than Port Arthur. I said further that "when we made it obligatory upon the Canadian Pacific Railway Company to ex-"tend at once the line north of Lake Superior, giving us an all-rail route "from Montreal to the Pacific Ocean, or from Callander to the Pacific "Ocean, we felt obliged to give to that Company, upon which we im-"posed such onerous obligations, all the security that we had considered neces-"sary, and that our predecessors in the Government had considered necessary, for "the protection of the Canadian Pacific Railway. But I am glad to be able to state "to the House, that although true to that policy, the Government refused to give "assent to the construction of lines within the Province of Manitoba to connect with "American railways to the south, such is the evidence presented by the operation "of the line so far as it has gone, such is the conclusion arrived at by the Canadian "Pacific Railway Company itself in regard to the ability of a through line of the "Canadian Pacific Railway to take care of itself, and by the inherent power of its "own advantages to maintain its position notwithstanding any competition to which "it may be subjected, we are now in a position to review and to reconsider the "policy of the late Government and the policy of the present Government, as to the "continued necessity for any long period of protecting the Canadian Pacific Railway "against competition within the Province of Manitoba, and I am glad to be able to "state to the House that such is the confidence of the Canadian Pacific Railway "Company in the power of the Canadian Pacific Railway to protect itself that when "the line is constructed north of Lake Superior, the Government feel it will not be "incumbent upon them to preserve the position they have hitherto felt bound to " preserve, that of refusing to consent to the construction of lines within the Province "of Manitoba, connecting it with American railways to the south. I can give no "better evidence to the House and the Country of the advanced position which we "consider this great enterprise of the Canadian Pacific Railway has attained, than "when I say that I feel it is consistent with what we owe to the people of this Country and to that great national work, that the Government should not deem it incumbent on themselves to pursue the restrictive policy within the Province of Manitoba which we have hitherto been obliged to maintain."

11. That upon the said explanation and statement Parliament agreed to the

loan.

12. That the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway has been constructed north of

Lake Superior.

13. That by an Act passed by the Local Legislature of Manitoba on the 3rd June, 1884, entitled "An Act to amend An Act to incorporate the Manitoba Central Railway Company and amending Acts," power was given to the Manitoba Central Railway Company to construct a Railway as follows: "From the Town of Morris southerly to the boundary line of the said Province between the Red River and the first principal meridian within the said Province," and providing that no portion of said Railway should be built in the portion of Territory added to the said Province in the year 1881 in such a way as to contravene the terms in which said Territory was added to the said Province.

14. That the authentic copy of said Act did not reach the Secretary of State for Canada until after the 1st day of April, A.D. 1885, about ten months after its passage.

15. That by consequence the period in which the power of disallowance can be

exercised in respect of the said Act has not yet expired.

16. That the rights of the Provinces, the interests of Manitoba, and the declared policy of the Government, all point to the propriety of leaving the said Act to its

operation.

17. That a humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Governor General, setting forth the preceding Resolutions and praying that His Excellency will be graciously pleased not to exercise the power of disallowance as to the said Act, and so to leave the said Act to its operation.

PRAYERS.

Six Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of the Reverend W. J. Keilty and others, of Innismore and other places, County of Peterborough, Ontario; praying that the Indians living in the vicinity of Chemong Lake, as well as those throughout Ontario, may be permitted to kill fish with spears during the winter season.

Of Alexander Macdonald, of the City of Toronto; representing that suits are now pending in reference to his several claims against the North-West Central Railway Company; and praying that no action of Parliament may be taken to interfere

with his rights before the courts.

Of J. B. Flamand and others, of the Village of Killarney; and of W. H. Plummer and others, of the Village of Sault Ste. Marie and other places, fishermen and others, all of the District of Algoma; severally praying for such Amendments to the Fisheries Act as will remove the close season for Salmon, Trout and White Fish in the Province of Ontario, thereby placing them on an equal footing with their American competitors.

Of Angus P. MacDonald and others, of the City of Toronto; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the North Canadian Pacific Railway

Company.

Of Samuel Smith Macdonell, of the Town of Windsor, Ontario, and other places; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Forbes Trochilic Steam Engine Central Company of Canada, and for the extension of certain Letters Patent.

Of the Reverned E. Beliveau, Curé, and others; praying for an Act of Incorporation under the name of the Sainte Ursule, Mattawin and Lake Temiscamingue Railway Company.

Of Mrs. R. Whaley and others, of the City of Toronto; praying for the passing

of an Act making seduction a criminal offence.

Of Patrick Jones, Mayor, and others; and of the Reverend A. Bélanger, Curé, and others, of the Municipality of Malbaie, No. 1; of Messrs. John Le Boutillier and Company and others, of the Municipality of Gaspé; of Zéphirin Fournier and others, of the Municipality of Gaspé Bay, North, and Sydenham, South; and of Robert Pye, Mayor, and others, of West Douglas, Fishermen and others, all of the County of Gaspé; severally complaining of a reduction in bounties to fishing boats; and praying that in the matter of fishing bounties full and perfect justice may be done to Canadian fishermen.

On motion of Sir Hector Langevin, a Select Committee composed of Sir Adolphe Caron, and Messrs, Blake, Cameron (Huron), Colby, Daly, Davies, Desjardins, Fortin, Laurier, Macmillan (Middlesex), Ouimet, Scriver, Tassé, Weldon, Wells, and Wright, was appointed to assist Mr. Speaker in the direction of the Library of Parliament,

so far as the interests of this House are concerned, and to act as Members of a Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library, and a Message was ordered to be sent to the Senate to acquaint their Honours therewith.

Mr. Stairs introduced a Bill No. 64 to amend the Act incorporating the Pictou Coal and Iron Company, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Wednesday next.

Howlan, which was read and received; praying to be permitted to lay before the House a Petition for an Act of incorporation under the name of "The Northumberland Straits Sub-way Company," notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills;—and the said Petition was referred to the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

Mr. Paint presented a petition of J. J. Curran and others, which was read and received; praying to be permitted to lay before The House a Petition for an Act to amend the Charter of the Montreal Board of Trade, 4 and 5 Victoria, Chapter 90, of the late Province of Canada, and the Act of the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada, 38 Victoria, Chapter 57, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills;—and the said Petition was referred to the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

2. The section or part of section—the Township and range where such home-

stead is situated;

3. The name of the person whose entry was cancelled, or who abandoned his homestead;

4. The reasons for such cancellation or abandonment.

Mr. Charlton-On Wednesday next-The following Resolutions:-

1. That the growing practice in the Canadian House of Commons of delivering speeches of great length, having the character of carefully and elaborately prepared written essays, and indulging in voluminous and often irrelevant extracts, is destructive of legitimate and pertinent debate upon public questions, is a waste of valuable time, unreasonably lengthens the Sessions of Parliament, threatens by increased bulk and cost to lead to the abolition of the official Report of the Debates, encourages a discursive and diffuse, rather than an incisive and concise style of public speaking, is a marked contrast to the practice in regard to debate that prevails in the British House of Commons, and tends to repel the public from a careful and intelligent consideration of the proceedings of Parliament.

2. That it is expedient to adopt the following rules to apply in future to the mode

of conducting debates in the House of Commons of Canada:

(1). The speech of the Finance Minister, the reply to the same, or the speech of a member moving a motion or resolution shall not exceed two hours each, except by

consent of the House obtained at the opening of the debate.

(2). With the exception of the Budget Speech of the Finance Minister, the chief reply to the same, and the mover of a motion or resolution, no member shall in any debate speak at greater length than one hour and a half, except the acting leader of the Government, or of the Opposition, who shall not exceed two hours each, except by the unanimous consent of The House.

(3). After any question shall have been under the consideration of the House for three days, speeches upon the same shall be limited to one hour each, except in the case of the acting leader of the Government, or of the Opposition, who shall not

exceed two hours each, except by the unanimous consent of The House.

(4). After any question shall have been under the consideration of The House for five days, The House may, upon the motion of any member, and by a three-quarters vote of the members present, restrict the time to be occupied by any member, except the acting leader of the Government, or of the Opposition, to not less than fifteen minutes each.

(5). The above restrictions as to time shall aprly to the proceedings of The House when in Committee, as well as when Mr. Speaker is in the Chair, but shall not be held to abridge the privileges of a member, when The House is in Committee, except as to the length of time he may speak upon each occasion when he is entitled to address the Chairman.

(6). The foregoing rules as to restriction of time may be suspended for one speech in the case of any individual member, by the unanimous consent of The

Macdonald and others, praying for an Act of incorporation under the name of the North Canadian Pacific Railway Company, and find that the Notices have not been published for the full period of time required by the 51st Rule, but as the proposed undertaking has been largely commented upon in the Manitoba press, and as the road, if constructed, will open up a large track of undeveloped country and will not interfere with any vested rights, the Committee recommend that the Notices given be deemed sufficient.

The Committee have also examined the following Petitions, viz.:—Of the Lennox Passage Bridge Company; of the North American Telegraph Company; and of the Kootenay Railway Company, severally praying for permission to present to the House a Petition for an Act of incorporation, notwithstanding the expiration of the

time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills; also the Petitions of the Montreal Board of Trade; of the Ottawa Board of Trade; and of the Napanee, Tamworth and Quebec Railway Company, severally praying for permission to present a Petition to the House for an Act amending their Act of incorporation, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills; and the reasons given in each case, justify the Committee in recommending that the necessary permission be granted.

Sir Hector Langevin presented,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 5th instant, for copies of all correspondence with the Department of Public Works, the Minister of Railways and Canals, and the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, relative to repairs of the Public Wharf at Port Hastings, Inverness, N.S.

And,—Order of The House, of the 5th instant, for copies of all correspondence with the Department of Public Works relative to protection required to the north of Smith's Island to prevent the total destruction of Port Hood Harbour, Inverness, N.S.; also a copy of the Engineer's report thereon.

Paint and others; praying for an Act authorizing them to construct a bridge across the Lennox Passage, Cape Breton;—the Petition of the Montreal Board of Trade; praying for amendments to their Act of incorporation;—and the Petition of Eli M. Upton and others; praying for an Act to incorporate The North American Telegraph Company, presented this day, were severally read and received.

Sir Hector Langevin introduced a Bill No. 76 respecting the Burlington Canal, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

Order of The House for a Return to date of all moneys paid to Bell & Lewis, Howard Wright, J. Stewart and Mr. Sinclair for transport service during the Rebellion, with copies of all contracts, transfers, and correspondence, telegrams, &c., connected therewith, stating in each case the rate per ton, points between which service was performed, and distance between such points.

Order of The House for Return showing names of all contractors from whom teams were engaged for transport, number of teams engaged from each, with rate of pay per day per team, and the total amount paid to each of such contractors.

Order of The House for Return of names of all persons employed as purchasing agents, showing when, by whom, and on whose recommendation appointed, rate of pay and length of employment.

Order of The House for Return of names and appointments of the medical and hospital staff (other than Regimental), showing whether they were in the Active Militia, and, if so, their rank and corps, with rates of pay and length of service in all cases.

Order of The House for Return of names of the staff paymasters appointed, showing whether non-combatants or not, with rank and corps of such as were in the Active Militia; with rate of pay and length of services in all cases.

Order of The House for Return of names of all officers, surgeons and assistant surgeons in the Active Militia, who volunteered for service in the North-West, with rank and corps.

Order of The House for Return of names, rank and corps of the officers composing the Military Claims Commission, while at Winnipeg; stating also any subsequent changes in the *personnel* of the Commission, with reasons for the same.

Order of The House for a Return of all horses purchased for use during the expedition, showing name and rank (if any) of persons by whom purchases were made, and number purchased by each; authority for purchase, price paid, and final disposition of the horses by sale or otherwise, when the service was over, with price received for such as were sold.

Order of The House for copies of all correspondence between one James Anderson and the Minister of Militia, Major General Middleton, and any member of the Government, with respect to the purchasing of supplies, cost of transport and other expenditure incurred during the North-West Rebellion.

Order of The House for a Return of all horses, ponies, cattle, furs, waggons, carts and other property seized by the Mounted Police or Expeditionary Force, while on service in the North-West between March 27th and August 1st, with the disposition made of the same, the names of persons from whom such seizures were made, and the amounts (if any) paid, received, or now payable or receivable, on account of such property.

And also,—Order of The House for a Return showing all purchases of food, material, medical supplies and comforts, forage and equipment, by tender and otherwise, showing quantities, price and names of persons from whom purchased, for the use of the North-West Expeditionary Force, with schedule of quantities of each description remaining unused at the end of the campaign, and the final disposition of the same by sale or otherwise, with amounts received for such as were sold.

On motion of Mr. Orton, The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider certain Resolutions to provide for the granting of Charters of Farm or Real Estate Banks.

Two Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of W. R. Foot and others, Fishermen and others, of the Village of Parry Sound, District of Parry Sound; praying for such amendments to the Fisheries Act as will remove the close season for Salmon, Trout and White Fish in the Province of Ontario, thereby placing them on an equal footing with their American competitors.

Of the Grand Trunk Railway Company of Canada; praying that the Bill now before Parliament for constituting a Court of Railway Commissioners for Canada,

and to amend the Consolidated Railway Act of 1879, may not become law.

Of Samuel Prowse and others, Fishermen and others, of Murray Harbour, Prince Edward Island; complaining of a reduction in bounties to fishing boats; and praying that in the matter of fishing bounties, full and perfect justice may be done to Canadian fishermen.

Mr. Hall, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the First Report of the said Committee, reporting the following Bills with amendments, viz.:—

Bill No. 18 to incorporate the Midland Bank of Canada;—and Bill No. 60 to incorporate the "Colonial Bank of Canada."

Sir Adolphe Caron, from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, reporting the Bill No. 37 to naturalize Girolamo Consentini, commonly called Baron Girolamo Consentini, without amendment.

And the following Bills with amendments, viz.:-

Bill No. 30 to incorporate the E. B. Eddy Manufacturing Company.

Bill No. 36 to grant certain powers to the Sable and Spanish Boom and Slide

Company of Algoma (Limited).

PRAYERS.

Four Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Mr. McLelan laid before The House,—Abstract of Statements of Fire and Inland Marine Insurance Companies in Canada, for the year 1885.

On motion of Mr. Sproule, the Petition of S. J. Dawson and ctubers, presented this day, praying to be permitted to lay before The House a Petition for an Act of incorporation under the name of "The Victoria and Sault Ste. Marie Junction Railway Company," notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills, was read and received, and referred to the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

Mr. Beaty, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Ninth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee have examined the following Petitions and find the Notices given thereon sufficient, viz.:—Of C. W. Moberly and others, praying for an Act of incorporation under the name of The Kootenay Railway Company; and of The Napanee, Tamworth and Quebec Railway Company, praying for certain amendments to their

Act of incorporation.

The Committee have also examined the Petition of Murray Dodd and others, praying for the passing of an Act authorizing the construction of a bridge across the Lennox Passage, Cape Breton, and find that no Notices were published, but as the necessity for the application has arisen at too recent a date to permit of the usual publication of notice and as the proposed bridge, if constructed, will not interfere with any invested rights, but will largely facilitate the public interests of that part of the Dominion, the Committee feel justified in recommending to your Honourable House a suspension of the 51st Rule in reference to this Petition.

The Committee have also examined the Petition of the Montreal Board of Trade, praying for the passing of an Act to extend their corporate powers, and for further amendments to their Act of incorporation, and find that the Notices are short in point of time, but as the necessity for the proposed amendments arose at a very recent date, and as the application seems to have been made by mutual consent of all persons interested in or affected by the proposed measure, the Committee recommend

that the Notice given be deemed sufficient.

The Committee have also examined the Petition of E. M. Upton and others, praying for an Act of incorporation under the name of The North American Telegraph Company, and find that Notice was published (for the full time required) in the Canada Gazette only, but as the operations of the proposed Company, if carried into effect, would affect the country as a whole, rather than any particular district or locality, the Committee recommend that Notice in the Canada Gazette be considered sufficient.

The Committee have also examined the Petition of John McDougald and others, praying to be permitted to lay before The House a Petition for an Act empowering them to construct a Railway from a point on the Canadian Pacific Railway, near Columbia River, to Gold River, and thence to the head of the said river, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills, and the reasons given by the promoters for the delay in presenting their Petition justify the Committee in recommending that the necessary permission be granted.

Mr. Taylor, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

43. Molasses when not so imported—twenty per cent. ad valorem..... 20 per cent. The value upon which the ad valorem duty shall be levied and collected upon all the above-named syrups and molasses shall be the value

thereof free on board at the last port of shipment.

44. Provided that Molasses, when imported for or received into any Refinery or sugar factory, or to be used for any other purpose than actual consumption, shall be subject to, and there shall be levied and collected thereon, an additional duty of five cents per 5 cents per Imperial gallon.....

Provided that the change in the rates of duty on sugars and molasses shall apply only to importations arriving in Canada on and after the thirty-first day of March instant, and not to such articles warehoused prior to that date.

45. Sugar candy, brown or white, and confectionery, a specific duty of one and a quarter cents per pound and thirty-five per cent. ad 11 cts. per lb. and 35 p.c.

2. Resolved,—That it is expedient to amend Schedule "B," being the list of goods which are entitled to entry free of duty when imported to Canada, by substituting the following provisions for the corresponding items now contained therein:-

Jamieson; and Mr. Bowell was consulted during its progress, and when Mr. Jamieson ultimately sold his "blind share," Mr. Bowell received from Mr. Jamieson, upon some transaction between them relating to the affair, \$500 out of the price of the said "blind share";

That Messrs. White and Jamieson fulfilled their agreement further to promote the interests of the Company, and the Company subsequently obtained from the Government an Order in Council for a very favorable exchange of part of their land for other land on the shore of the South Saskatchewan, in what is known as the Parish

That rumours got abroad, and the Government was made aware of the facts and

of the rumours, and hesitated to act;

That Messrs. McDougall, M.P., and Dodd, M.P., continued to press for the removal of Mr. Roche; and in the end a plan was devised for the accomplishment of their object, by the remodelling of the Pilotage Board, and the creation of a new Board for the comparatively unimportant out-ports, on which minor Board Mr.

Roche was to be put without his consent, and the constitution of a Board for the

great Port of Sydney on which Mr. Roche's name was not to appear;

That having heard that he was by some such scheme to be turned out, Mr. Roche communicated with Mr. Dodd, M.P., who told him that the fact was so; reminded him of his requests and warnings about voting against the Government candidate, and told him that he must submit to the consequences;

That the substance of this statement was communicated to the Government, which, however, proceeded to carry out the plan, and created the two Boards accordingly; thus accomplishing the end sought of displacing Mr. Roche from the main functions of his office in pursuance of the threat of Mr. Dodd, M.P., and the determination of Mr. McDougall, M.P., to punish him for voting, as they believed he had

voted, against the Government candidate;

PRAYERS.

Four Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of C. W. Jackson and others, of Fort Qu'Appelle and other places, in the North-West Territories; praying for the passing of an Act authorizing the granting of land to the Wood Mountain and Qu'Appelle Railway Company in aid of their Railway.

Of William F. Smith and others, of the County of Brandon, Manitoba; praying that no action be taken in the matter of an application to have the Charter of the

Brandon Bridge Company confirmed or their powers extended.

Of the Chiefs, Councillors and Indians of the Nes-cagh Tribe of the Thempsean Nation of Indians, resident on the Waas River, British Columbia; complaining of certain grievances; and praying that they may not be deprived of their lands, gardens, berry patches and hunting grounds.

Of the Ottawa Board of Trade; praying that the Bill now before Parliament for constituting a Court of Railway Commissioners for Canada, and to amend the Con-

solidated Railway Act of 1879, may become law.

A Message was received from the Senate, with the following Bill No. 80 of their own, intituled: "An Act further to amend 'The Interpretation Act,'" to which the concurrence of this House was desired. PRAYERS.

Seventeen Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of Eleanor Macpherson and others, of Halifax, Nova Scotia; praying for the passing of an Act making Seduction a criminal offence.

Of James E. Shatford and others; and of John D. Wynaught and others; severally complaining of a reduction in bounties to Fishing boats; and praying that in the matter of fishing bounties, full and perfect justice may be done to Canadian fishermen.

Of J. N. Asselin, M.P.P., and others, of Ste. Félicité, County of Rimouski; praying for the adoption of such measures as will secure the construction of a Pier at the said place.

Sir Hector Langevin, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, reporting the following Bills with amendments, viz.:—

Bill No. 35 to amend the Act to incorporate The Lake Nipissing and James' Bay Railway Company;—and

Bill No. 27 to amend the Act to incorporate The West Ontario Pacific Railway Company.

The Committee would also recommend that as the time for the reception of reports from Committees on Private Bills will expire to morrow, the same be extended until Thursday, the 29th instant.—Time extended accordingly.

Mr. Ives, from the Select Standing Committee on Miscellaneous Private Bills, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, reporting the Bill No. 45 respecting The Dominion Lands Colonization Company, without amendment.

On motion of Mr. Bergin, the Second Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, was concurred in.

Mr. Taylor introduced a Bill No. 86 to incorporate "The North American Telegraph Company," which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Friday next.

On motion of Mr. Girouard, the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections obtained leave to employ a short-hand writer, to take down such evidence as the Committee saw fit.

On motion of Mr. McDougall (Cape Breton), an Order of The House was issued to the proper officer for a Statement showing the quantity of Coal carried over the Intercolonial Railway each year since 1880, tor the Spring Hill and other collieries in the County of Cumberland, Nova Scotia; the stations at which the same has been delivered, and the quantity delivered at each station; the rate per ton per mile at which such coal was carried for the several collieries. Also a similar Statement of the quantity of coal carried from each colliery in the County of Pictou. Also a Statement showing the number of coal cars built for the Intercolonial Railway coal traffic, and employed thereon, and the cost of such cars.

Mr. Taylor moved, that The House do now go into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain Resolution:—

That it is expedient to bring in a Bill to regulate the manufacture and sale of Oleomargarine, Butterine, and other substitutes for Butter:

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said Debate was, on motion of Mr. Bowell, adjourned.

On motion of Mr. Casey, an Order of The House was issued to the proper officer for copies of all correspondence between the Minister of Militia and Defence and any official of the Militia Department, and any officers of Volunteer Corps, whether on active service or not, all officials of Rifle Associations, and other parties, in reference to the character of the ammunition made at the Quebec Cartridge Factory and supplied for use in the field, for practice, or at rifle matches; including reports of all tests of such ammunition made by any such officers or officials of Rifle Associations.

At Six o'clock P. M. Mr. Speaker left the Chair, to resume the same at half-past Seven o'clock P. M.

(The Order for Private Bills was called under Rule 19.)

The Bill No. 18 to incorporate The Midland Bank of Canada, was read the third time, (Title changed to that of "The Anglo-Canadian Bank,") and passed.

The Bill No. 43 to amend the Act incorporating The Canada Atlantic Railway Company was considered in Committee of the Whole;—and progress having been made and reported,—the Committee rose, and obtained leave to sit again on Friday next.

On motion of Mr. Thompson (Antigonish), the Order of the Day for House again in Committee on Bill No. 9 respecting The Revised Statutes of Canada, was discharged, and the Bill was referred to a Select Committee composed of Messieurs Thompson (Antigonish), Abbott, Beaty, Davies, Edgar, Girouard, Landry (Kent), Laurier, Royal, Tupper, Weldon and Wood (Brockville), with instructions to examine the work of Revision which has been done since last Session.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the Bill No. 5 to extend the jurisdiction of the Maritime Court of Ontario;—and after some time spent therein, the Committee rose, without reporting.

The House then adjourned.

Four Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of the Dominion Short Horn Breeders Association; and of The Agriculture and Arts Association, of Ontario; severally praying that the Bill now before Parliament

to amend "The Animal Contagious Diseases Act," may become law.

Of Peter McPherson and others, of Napanee Mills and other places, Counties of Lennox and Addington; of W. Milikan and others, of Sharbot Lake and other places, County of Frontenac; of David Huether and others, of Neustadt and other places, County of Grey; of James H. Paddon and others, of St. Thomas and other places, County of Elgin; of David Dunn, ex Warden, and others, of the County of Simcoe; of John Young and others, of Glanford and other places, County of Wentworth; of Richard Johnston, Mayor, and others, of Palmerston and other places, County of Wellington; of C. Of Michael Blake and others, of the Town of Portage la Prairie, Manitoba; praying that an Act may be passed incorporating the Portage la Prairie and Lake of the

Woods Railway and Navigation Company.

Of George Dutnall and others, of Metchosin and Esquimalt Districts, British Columbia; praying that the isolation of the Quarantine Hospital lately erected at Albert Head, Vancouver Island, be made complete by prohibiting all access thereto except by water.

Of William Patterson and others, of the Municipality of York, County of Gaspé; complaining of a reduction in bounties to fishing boats; and praying that in the matter of fishing bounties, full and perfect justice may be done to Canadian fishermen.

Sir Heetor Langevin, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Third Report of the said Committee, reporting the Bill No. 33 to incorporate The Shuswap and Okanagan Railway Company, with amendments.

Mr. Tupper introduced a Bill No. 87 to incorporate The Columbia Valley Railway Company, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Charlton, the Order of the Day for House in Committee on Bill No. 20 to punish Seduction and like Offences, and to make further provision for the Protection of Women and Girls, was discharged, and the Bill was referred to a Select Committee composed of Messrs. Charlton, Cameron (Huron), Casgrain, Curran, Hilliard, Patterson (Essex), Shakespeare, Temple and Thompson (Antigonish).

The House resumed the further consideration, in Committee of the Whole, of certain proposed Resolutions to provide for the granting of Charters of Farm or Real Estate Banks.

The following Resolutions were adopted :-

1. That it is desirable, in order to obviate the impoverishing drainage of money from Canada to pay interest upon borrowed capital, that the amount of foreign capital required for the development of our agricultural as well as other resources be

limited to as small an amount as practical.

2. That it will materially lessen the necessity to borrow foreign capital if mortgages on improved farm property be made a negotiable security by an issue by the Government of Canada of Dominion Notes equal to any such mortgages on improved farm lands to the extent of one-half the actual value thereof, such notes to be redeemable in Government bonds based upon such real estate mortgages, and bearing inter-

est at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum.

3. That in order to prevent any clashing of interests between such farmers' banks and ordinary chartered banks, as well as for the general convenience of the public, it is expedient that there be uniformity in the circulating medium, and that all banks be compelled to circulate only Dominion of Canada Notes; and in order to compensate chartered banks for any profit they may derive from the issue of their own bills, there shall be an estimate made of such profit up to the expiration of the charter of all such banks by properly authorized actuaries, and the amounts so arrived at shall be paid by an increased issue to said banks, of Dominion of Canada Notes.

4. That in order to provide for the interest on any bonds issued by the Government of Canada to redeem notes issued to farmers' banks there shall be a special stamp marked upon such Dominion Notes characterizing the particular farmers' bank to which said notes have been issued, and such farmers' banks shall provide the interest to the Treasury Department of the Government to meet that of any bonds issued by the

Government of Canada for the redemption of such notes.

Resolutions to be reported.

The said Resolutions were accordingly reported, read a second time, and agreed to.

Mr. Orton then introduced a Bill No. 88 to provide Banking and Loan facilities to those engaged in Agricultural pursuits; which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Monday next.

Mr. McCarthy moved, that the Bill No. 6, for constituting a Court of Railway Commissioners for Canada, and to amend the Consolidated Railway Act, 1879, be now read the second time;

And a Debate arising thereon,—the said motion was, with leave of The House, withdrawn, and the Bill withdrawn.

The House then adjourned.

Mr. McLelan—On Monday next—Committee of the Whole to consider the following Resolutions:—

That it is expedient to confirm the agreement, made subject to the approval of Parliament, between Her Majesty the Queen, acting for the Dominion of Canada, therein represented by the Honourable A. W. McLelan, Minister of Finance, therein called the Government, and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, therein called the Company, represented by the Chief Executive Officer thereof, in the following form and words:—

"(1.) That inasmuch as the amount actually advanced to the Company by the Government on account of the sum of \$20,000,000, secured by the first mortgage bonds of the Company, to the amount of £4,109,500 sterling, is \$19,150,700, it is agreed that the Company shall repay to the Government with interest at the rate of four per centum per annum, as provided by the Act 48-49 Victoria, Chapter 57, the said sum of \$19,150,700, such payment to be made in two equal instalments, the first of which shall be paid on the first day of May next, and the second thereof on or before the first day of July next, both with interest as aforesaid.

"(2.) That upon full payment of the said two cash instalments and interest as hereinbefore provided, the land grant of the Company shall be reduced by such number of acres as shall be sufficient, computing the value thereof at \$1.50 per acre, to extinguish the balance of the loan of \$29,880,912, mentioned in the Act 48-49 Victoria, Chapter 57, that is to say, the sum of \$9,880,912, with interest at the rate aforesaid to the first day of May next; and such reduction shall be effected by the retention by the Government of land; of equal average quality and value with the lands constituting the portion of the Company's land grant not heretofore disposed

of by the Company.

"(3.) That upon the settlement of all accounts respecting the said authorized loan of \$29,880,912, and payment and settlement as aforesaid of all sums of money due thereon, all the bonds of the Company secured exclusively upon the land grant of the Company, commonly called land grant bonds, now held by the Government in excess of the sum of \$5,000,000, of such bonds held by the Government under the construction contract of the 21st October, 1880, shall be cancelled, and the debenture stock of the Ontario and Quebec Railway Company held by the Government under the Act 47 Victoria, Chapter 61, section 1, shall be returned to the Company; and the Government shall authorize the Company under section 10 of 48-19 Victoria, Chapter 57, to mortgage the Algoma Branch to such amount per mile as is author-

ized by the charter of the Company with respect to the main line.

"(4.) That upon the settlement in manner aforesaid of the indebtedness of the Company to the Government, the Company may issue first mortgage bonds upon the remaining lands granted to them under their said contract, in such manner as is provided by their Charter in respect of the issue of land grant bonds, and to such amount per acre as they shall deem fit, not to exceed \$2 per acre, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, all of the outstanding land grant bonds obtainable being first duly cancelled, and a reserve being made from the new issue to cover such outstanding land grant bonds as cannot be obtained for cancellation. And in the event of the Company making such issue, the Government will accept in exchange for the said \$5,000,000 of the said land grant bonds, a like amount of the new issue of bonds, such bonds to be held and dealt with in the same manner as the Government were by 44 Victoria, Chapter 1, intituled: "An Act respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway," authorized to hold and deal with the said \$5,000,000, so exchanged."

"(5.) That all necessary legislation required to carry the provisions hereof into

force shall be asked for from Parliament at its present Session.

2. That it is expedient to provide-

(a.) That the Government and the Company be authorized respectively to carry out and perform the conditions of the said agreement, according to their intent and purport; provided that the Governor in Council may extend the time for the payment of the first instalment and interest mentioned in the said agreement, to a date

not later than the first day of July now next.

(b.) That so soon as the payment and settlement of the sum advanced on the said sum of twenty-nine millions eight hundred and eighty thousand nine hundred and twelve dollars, and interest, shall have been effected, as provided by the said agreement, the Company, under the authority of a special general meeting of their shareholders, called for the purpose, may issue mortgage bonds, secured upon the branch of the said railway, known as the Algoma Branch, constructed and to be hereafter constructed, completing the connection between the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the River Ste. Marie, which issue shall constitute a first mortgage and privilege upon the said branch railway, constructed and to be thereafter constructed, including the rolling stock and plant applicable thereto, and upon the tolls and revenues thereof, after deduction from such tolls and revenues, of working expenses and of such rolling stock and plant appertaining thereto, as shall be declared and described in any deed of mortgage securing such bonds, which shall be executed by the company, in conformity with its charter. And before the issue of such bonds, the company shall make by-laws, prescribing

the mode in which, in case of default in the payment of the interest on such bonds, or of the capital thereof, the rolling stock and plant (if any) included in such mortgage as appertaining to the said branch, shall be identified, and the tolls and revenues derivable from such branch, ascertained and distinguished from the tolls and revenues of the main line, and making such further provisions as may be just and expedient for the protection of the holders of the bonds secured upon the said branch line, without interfering with the rights of the holders of other securities of Company. Such by-laws to be submitted for approval to the Governor in Council, and upon such approval, a certified copy thereof to be deposited in the office of the Secretary of State, and that thereafter such by-laws shall continue to be valid and binding upon the Company, and shall not be altered or repealed by the Company, so long as the bonds referred to therein shall remain in force.

(c.) That the mode of se uring the said mortgage bonds, and the rights, privileges and remedies applicable thereto and available to the holders thereof, shall be such as are described in sections twenty-eight, thirty-two, thirty-three, thirty-four,

thirty-five and thirty-six of the charter of the Company.

(d.) That the Company may also issue mortgage bonds to such amount as they shall deem fit, and as shall be approved by the Governor in Council, and according to the terms of the said agreement, secured upon the lands of the Company to which they shall then be entitled under the provisions of the construction contract executed on the 21st October, 1880, and the provisions of sections thirty, thirty-two, thirtyfeur, thirty-five and thirty-rix of the charter of the Company shall apply to such last-mentioned bonds: But that in making such last mentioned issue of bonds, the Company shall reserve and place in the hands of the Trustees of the mortgage securing such bonds, if Trustees are created by such mortgage deed, and if not, then in the hands of some person or company appointed for the purpose by the Governor in Council, an amount of the said bonds equal in value to the land grant bonds then outstanding and unsatisfied above and beyond the sum of five million dollars of such bonds in the hands of the Government, the exchange of which is provided for by the said agreement; and the bonds so reserved shall not be used or disposed of for any other purpose whatsoever, except for providing, by payment or exchange, for the land grant bonds so outstanding and unsatisfied.

(e.) That upon the completion of the said Canadian Pacific Railway according to the said contract, and upon its being duly opened for traffic, the disqualification of the Shareholders thereof from becoming or being members of the Senate or House of Commons by reason of their being such Shareholders shall be removed, and shall

cease and determine.

Mr. Beaty, from the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

The Committee have examined the Notices given on the Petition of L. E. Baker and others, praying for an Act of incorporation under the name of The Yarmouth Steamship Company (Limited), and find them short in point of time, but as the proposed Act, if passed, will not interfere with any vested rights, and will be to the interests of the part of the country affected thereby, the Committee recommend that

the Notices given be deemed sufficient.

The Committee have also examined the Petition of S. I. Dawson and others, praying to be permitted to lay befere The House their Petition for an Act of incorporation under the name of The Victoria and Sault Ste. Marie Junction Railway Company, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills, and the reasons assigned by the promoters for the delay in presenting their Petition are sufficient, in the opinion of the Committee, to justify them in recommending that the necessary permission be granted.

That the provisions of paragraphs 2 of section 226 of the Consolidated Inland Revenue Act, 1883, respecting the duty on goods manufactured in bond, may, in the case of spirits to be used for chemical or manufacturing purposes only, be varied by the Governor in Council; that spirits used in a bonded manufactory for the production of ether and such chemical compositions as are determined by the Governor in Council, shall be charged with the same rate of duty as methylated spirits; that no such spirits and no methylated spirits shall be removed from a bonded manufactory, except into the possession of a person having a permit to sell or use the same, and that the Governor in Council may make regulations respecting the sale of such spirits.

5. That 200 pounds of cavendish or other tobacco may be entered for warehouse by one entry, and that 100 pounds of such tobacco may be ex-warehoused by one entry; and also, that packages containing ten pounds of manufactured Canadian

That the provisions of paragraphs 2 of section 226 of the Consolidated Inland Revenue Act, 1883, respecting the duty on goods manufactured in bond, may, in the case of spirits to be used for chemical or manufacturing purposes only, be varied by the Governor in Council; provided no increase shall be made in such duty; that spirits used in a bonded manufactory for the production of ether and such chemical compositions as are determined by the Governor in Council, shall be charged with the same rate of duty as methylated spirits; that no such spirits and no methylated spirits shall be removed from a bonded manufactory, except into the possession of a person having a permit to sell or use the same, and that the Governor in Council may make regulations respecting the sale of such spirits.

5. That 200 pounds of cavendish or other tobacco may be entered for warehouse by one entry, and that 100 pounds of such tobacco may be ex-warehoused by one entry; and also, that packages containing ten pounds of manufactured Canadian

tobacco and over, may be removed in bond from one warehouse to another.

6. That no oleomargarine or other substitute for butter shall be manufactured, except by persons duly licensed, and that the Governor in Council may make regulations respecting such manufacture and the supervision thereof; and also respecting the inspection of oleomargarine imported.

Resolution to be reported.

The said Resolution was accordingly reported, read a second time, and agreed to

Mr. Costigan then introduced a Bill No. 101 in amendment of "The Consolidated Inland Revenue Act, 1883," and the Act amending the same, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to morrow.

Of the Nova Scotia Branch of the Dominion Alliance; and of the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance, Nova Scotia; severally praying that no change may be made in the Canada Temperance Act which would lessen its prohibitory character, or make more difficult its adoption or enforcement.

Of the Organized Workingmen of Oshawa; praying for the abolition of the

present system of granting Assisted Passages to Immigrants.

Of the Organized Workingmen of Oshawa; praying for the passing of an Insolvency Law containing a clause providing for a first lien for one month's wages due employés at time of assignment.

Of A. McDonald and others, of Fort Qu'Appelle, North-West Territories; praying for the passing of an Act authorizing the granting of land to the Wood Mountain

and Qu'Appelle Railway Company in aid of their Railway.

Sir Hector Langevin, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, reporting the following Bills, with amendments, viz.:-

And,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 29th ultimo, for a Return showing Seizures made at the port of Winnipeg, or any of its outposts, by the Customs officers or officials, between January 1st, 1885, and the 11th of March, 1886, in which fines were imposed, deposits forfeited, or goods sold after seizure; giving the names of the persons upon whom fines were imposed, who forfeited deposits, or whose goods were sold after seizure; giving the amount of each fine imposed, of each forfeit deposited, and of the amount obtained in each case in which goods were sold; and stating in detail the name, official position and salary of each officer to whom any part of the money so realized was paid, and the amount in each case thus paid to the said officer.

On motion of Mr. Foster, The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting "The Steamboat Inspection Act, 1882."

PRAYERS.

Seven Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The following Petitions were read and received :-

Of the Victoria, British Columbia, District of the Methodist Church; and of the British Columbia Branch of the Dominion Alliance; several praying that no change may be made in the Canada Temperance Act, which would lessen its prohibitory character, or make more difficult its adoption or enforcement.

Of the Municipal Council of the Town of Milton, County of Halton, Ontario; praying for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, or for such an amendment of the Act as will provide for a repeal vote, when petitioned for, by one-third of the electors; or permit the sale of ale, beer and light wines in Scott Act counties.

Of Eustache St. Pierre and others, of the Township of Amherst, County of Ottawa; praying that the said Township may be annexed to the County of Argenteuil.

Mr. Speaker informed The House, that the Clerk had laid the following papers on the Table, viz.:—

General Statements and Returns of Baptisms, Marriages and Burials in the Districts of Arthabaska, Gaspé, Kamouraska, Saguenay and Terrebonne, for the year 1885.

The Petition of Henry Asker and others, of Lakes Porter, Lawrencetown and Chezzetcook, County of Halifax, Nova Scotia, praying for certain amendments to the Fisheries Act and Regulations, being read;—

Mr. Speaker decided,—"that as the Rules require the signatures of at least three petitioners on the sheet containing the prayer, and that no signatures should be pasted on or transferred to a Petition, the present Petition could not be received."

On motion of Mr. Ross, the Petition of James Sutherland and others, presented this day, praying to be permitted to lay before The House, a Petition for certain amendments to the Act incorporating The Winnipeg and Hudson's Bay Railway and Steamship Company, notwithstanding the expiration of the time for presenting Petitions for Private Bills, was read and received, and referred to the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

Mr. Thompson (Antigonish), presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, of the 29th ultimo, for copies of all the evidence, together with the Judge's charge, and all other papers relating to the trial of Loison Mongrain for the murder of David L. Cowan, a Policeman, fate of the County of Carleton. Also, all petitions, correspondence and Orders in Council relating to the commutation of the death sentence of Loison Mongrain.

Sir Hector Langevin presented,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 5th ultimo, for copies of all Reports made by Inspector Sweetnam concerning alleged irregularities in connection with the management of Pickering Post Office, in the County of Ontario, and in particular of his report upon the investigation held by him at the Village of Pickering in December, 1883; and copies of all correspondence between Inspector Sweetnam and the Post Office Department relating in any way to charges made against the management of said Post Office, and a copy of instructions to the Inspector given upon such report.

Mr. Charlton moved, that the following Resolutions be adopted, viz.:-

1. That the growing practice in the Canadian House of Commons of delivering speeches of great length, having the character of carefully and elaborately prepared written essays, and indulging in voluminous and often irrelevant extracts, is destructive of legitimate and pertinent debate upon public questions, is a waste of valuable time, unreasonably lengthens the Sessions of Parliament, threatens by increased bulk and cost to lead to the abolition of the official Report of the Debates, encourages a discursive and diffuse, rather than an incisive and concise style of public speaking, is a marked contrast to the practice in regard to debate that prevails in the British House of Commons, and tends to repel the public from a careful and intelligent consideration of the proceedings of Parliament.

2. That it is expedient to adopt the following rules to apply in future to the mode

of conducting debates in the House of Commons of Canada:

(1). The speech of the Finance Minister, the reply to the same, or the speech of a member moving a motion or resolution shall not exceed two hours each, except by

consent of the House obtained at the opening of the debate.

(2). With the exception of the Budget Speech of the Finance Minister, the chief reply to the same, and the mover of a motion or resolution, no member shall in any debate speak at greater length than one hour and a half, except the acting leader of the Government, or of the Opposition, who shall not exceed two hours each, except by the unanimous consent of The House.

(3). After any question shall have been under the consideration of the House for three days, speeches upon the same shall be limited to one hour each, except in the case of the acting leader of the Government, or of the Opposition, who shall not exceed two hours each, except by the unanimous consent of The House.

(4). After any question shall have been under the consideration of The House for five days, The House may, upon the motion of any member, and by a three-quarters vote of the members present, restrict the time to be occupied by any member, except the acting leader of the Government, or of the Opposition, to not less than fifteen

(5). The above restrictions as to time shall apply to the proceedings of The House when in Committee, as well as when Mr. Speaker is in the Chair, but shall not be held to abridge the privileges of a member, when The House is in Committee, except as to the length of time he may speak upon each occasion when he is entitled to

(6). The foregoing rules as to restriction of time may be suspended for one speech in the case of any individual member, by the unanimous consent of The

(7). No member shall be allowed to read his speech from MSS., but this shall not be held to debar from the use of memorandum, and notes of the character of head-

3. It shall be the duty of Mr. Speaker to enforce the foregoing rules.

Sir Hector Langevin moved in amendment thereto, that the second and third of the said proposed Resolutions be struck out; which was agreed to.

The main motion, as amended, was then agreed to.

Mr. McCraney moved, that an Order do issue for a Return giving a complete statement, in detail, of travelling expenses of the Governor General, under Return 150, 1885; an itemized statement of each and every amount paid and charged, under the heading of travelling expenses, since Confederation; to whom paid and for what service; when such expenses were incurred; the nature and extent of the trip, upon which each item of expenditure was incurred; the number of persons comprising the Vice-Regal party, their names, occupations and nationality; -which was

Mr. McCraney moved, that an Order do issue for a Return, in detail, under the head of Contingencies for Rideau Hall, since Confederation, a full complete itemized statement of all sums, classed under the heading of Contingencies in the Governor General's office; showing to whom each amount was paid, for what service or articles, giving the exact amount for each expenditure; -which was negatived.

Mr. McCraney moved, that an Order do issue for a detailed Statement, since Confederation, of the Governor General's salary and staff; to whom were salaries paid in Governor General's office, in each year, with names; the amounts paid to each; the occupation of such persons before entering said office, nationality and age; -which was

Mr. McCraney moved, that an Order do issue for a Return, since Confederation, for fuel and light for Rideau Hall, the exact amount paid for in each year, to whom paid, the quantity and grade of fuel purchased, the price per cord of wood or ton of coal; and also the amounts paid for light in each year, to whom paid, the price per article, together with the quantities; -which was negatived.

Mr. McCraney moved, that an Order do issue for a detailed Statement of gardening and grounds for Rideau Hall, since Confederation, to whom has money been paid for care of grounds or for gardening, rate per day and the class of work done for such wages; also what permanent improvement and value, if any, are included under the head of gardening and grounds; -which was negatived.

Mr. McCraney moved, that an Order do issue for a Statement, in detail, of the cost of additions, alterations repairs and maintenance of Rideau Hall; showing by whom were additions, alterations and repairs ordered, by whom done, and at what cost for each item, since Confederation.

Mr. White (Cardwell) moved in amendment thereto, that all the words after the word "ordered" be struck out, and the following words substituted in lieu thereof, "distinguishing between the work done by contract and otherwise, together with the names of the contractors, when the work was done by contract;"—which was agreed to.

The main motion, as amended, was then agreed to, and the Order issued accordingly.

That this House is of opinion that steps should be taken to celebrate in a suitable manner the inauguration of the Canadian Pacific Railway, as one of the greatest

undertakings of this Country.

Of David Townsend and others; of Benjamin Burke and others; of Philéas Bourgeois and others, of Main-à Dieu, Cape Breton, Nova Scotia; and of the Reverend G. M. LeBlanc and others; severally complaining of a reduction in bounties to fishing boats; and praying that in the matter of fishing bounties, full and perfect justice may be done to Canadian fishermen.

The said Resolution was referred to a Select Committee, composed of Sir John A. Macdonald, Sir Hector Langevin, Sir Richard Cartwright, Messrs. McLelan, Laurier and Bowell, to draft an Address embodying the same.

MOST GRACIOUS SOVEREIGN:

Bill No. 70 respecting The Manitoba and North-Western Railway Company of Canada;—and

Bill No. 74 to incorporate The Ste. Ursule, Mattawin and Lake Temiscamingue

Railway Company,

With reference to the last-mentioned Bill, the Committee have deemed it advisable to amend the preamble thereof to make it conform to the provisions contained in the said Bill.

The Committee have also had under consideration the amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 27 to amend the Act incorporating The West Ontario Pacific

Railway Company, and recommend that the same be concurred in.

Mr. Bergin, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parlia" ment, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :-

The Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament beg leave to present the following as their Fourth Report:-

The Report of their Sub-Committee appointed to audit the Printing Accounts, and for other purposes, together with the Report of the Clerk of the Committee on the Printing Services of the past year, and the Parliamentary Printing Account Annual Statement, for the fiscal year from the 1st July, 1884, to the 30th June, 1885, all thereto annexed; which, having adopted, they respectfully recommend for the consideration of both Houses.

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE.

COMMITTEE ROOM.

29th April, 1886.

The Sub-Committee, to whom was referred the auditing of the Printing Accounts of the past year, and the Clerk's Report, beg leave to report as follows:-

That they have carefully examined the Annual Statement of the Parliamentary Printing Accounts for the fiscal year from the 1st July, 1884, to 30th June, 1885, and having compared the several items of expenditure with the receipted accounts and the vouchers connected therewith, and being thus satisfied of the correctness of the accounts, they have certified accordingly and have signed.

The Sub-Committee regret to state that the manuscript of the above "Annual Statement of Accounts," though in the hands of the Auditor General for several months past for audit, and signature, had not been returned to the Clerk of the Committee to be submitted to them in the usual manner, though, as stated by the Clerk,

applied for personally several times, and also by the following letter:-

OTTAWA, 22nd March, 1886.

J. L. McDougall, Esq., Auditor-General.

DEAR SIR, -As the Senate re-assembles to-morrow, the Sub-Committee for auditing the Printing Accounts may be summoned at any moment, so will you be good enough to send me over the Annual Statement as sent to you for audit. With a good deal of trouble I have gone over your printed "Statement of Accounts" for

Printing, Printing Paper and Binding, as contained in pp. 129 and 130 of your Annual Report, and find we agree as to totals, but on p. 131 the item "Less coat of Reports," etc., \$6,895.58 is incorrect, this sum having been charged in the previous year in my Annual Statement, as examined by Mr. Bissonette and certified by you; also in the same page, the cost of printing Private Bills is put down at \$380—I could not include this sum in my Annual Statement for 1884-5, as the House was still in Session on 30th June when the fiscal year expired, and it might have been affected by legislation before Parliament closed. The deposit to the Receiver-General not being made till the 30th July, 1885, it belongs to the accounts of the present year, 1885-6, not to those of the past year, 1884-5.

I received the sum of \$10,000 by letter of credit in May last, being refund on amount of the cost of printing Departmental Reports. This sum apparently is not mentioned by you at all, though it was money placed to my credit in 1884-5, and consequently must be accounted for by me in my statement of that year's receipts and

expenditure.

On Friday the Auditor did appear before the Sub-Committee, but while verbally acknowledging the correctness of the "Annual Statement," as submitted by the Clerk, did not sign or certify it, but stated, he would send a written communication, which was received on the 12th inst., and is as follows:—

OTTAWA, April 12th, 1886.

Sir,—I beg to call the attention of the Committee to the insufficiency of the vote for Miscellaneous Printing, controlled by the Queen's Printer, to meet the cost of printing the portion distributed by the Departments of the Departmental Reports submitted to Parliament.

I would suggest that the Committee request the Secretary of State to make a recommendation to the Government for an additional estimate, so that the \$9,454.83 now charged to the vote on account of last year's printing, and the whole of the cost of this year's printing, may be met by the whole appropriation. I presume that an additional estimate of \$16,000 for this year, and about \$6,000 for next year, would be necessary.

If my suggestion were adopted, a settlement of accounts, which would show exactly the amount for which the vote for Parliamentary printing is supposed to provide, and that for which the vote for miscellaneous is supposed to provide, could be made. Manifestly this arrangement would entail no additional expense, but would be the means of distributing properly the two expenditures under the two heads.

The above letter, not in any particular answering the Order of the Sub-Committee of the 6th inst., as sent to the Auditor-General, nor yet being an answer to the letter sent to him by the Clerk, on 22nd March last, thus ignoring the Committee and withholding from them the result of the audit of his Department on the Printing Accounts and throwing the whole responsibility of certifying to their correctness upon the Sub-Committee, they have unanimously passed the following Resolution as a Recommendation:—

Resolved,—That as the Auditor-General, though acknowledging verbally the correctness of the Receipts and Expenditures by the Clerk of the Committee as shown in the Annual Statement of Account, has not signed the same in the usual form without assigning any reason therefor, thus rendering his audit valueless, it is recommended that, in future, the accounts be not sent to him for audit, but that they be audited by the Sub-Committee, as is the present practice, in addition to that of the Audit Department, and that so much of the Third Resolution of the First Report of the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts of the Session of 1880, that provides that the payments on account of Printing, made under the authority of the Joint Committee of both Houses on Printing, should be audited by the Auditor-General, be rescinded. The Sub-Committee would also recommend that, in accordance with the Eighth Report of the Committee of last Session, circulars be at once sent out by the Clerk of the Committee to the several paper manufacturers, requesting tenders for the supply of Printing Paper for the next year.

The Sub-Committee would also recommend that no change do take place in the present system of insurance on the Printed Sheets, Bound Volumes, etc., as contained in the buildings occupied by the contractors for the Printing and the Binding.

REPORT OF THE CLERK OF THE COMMITTEE.

To the Chairman and Members of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament:—

Gentlemen,—I beg to submit the Annual Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Printing of Parliament, for the fiscal year ended the 30th June, 1885.

The Committee will perceive this Statement is not signed by the Auditor-General. I furnished him some time ago with a copy for that purpose, but it has not yet been returned to me.

In the Eighth Report of the Committee, as concurred in last Session, the follow-

ing Resolution appears :-

Resolved,-That as the several contracts for the Printing, Binding and Printing Paper expire on the 31st day of December next, it is recommended that they be extended for one year from that date, and that during the recess tenders should be called for by advertising for the performance of the Printing and Binding required for the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada for the periods of five and ten years, to be computed from the 1st day of January, 1887, and to be completed on the 31st day of August in the fifth or tenth year, as the case may be, instead of the 31st day of December; such tenders to be sent in, in a sealed envelope, addressed to the Clerk of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, not later than 12 o'clock noon of the first day of the next Session of the Parliament of the Dominion, after which time no tenders will be received, such tenders to be made on blank forms which can be had on application from the Clerk of the Committee. The calculations testing the value of each tender shall be made upon the amount of work performed in the fiscal year 1883-1884, as shown in the detailed accounts, and that the several terms, conditions and provisions, as contained in the said blank form of tender, shall be binding on the several tenderers, and shall form the basis on which the several contracts shall be drawn up.

It is also further recommended, that the supply of Printing Paper required for each year be purchased by tender during the Session and stored for use as required,

thus, it is hoped, ensuring uniformity of make and colour.

In accordance with the first part of that Resolution, I prepared the contracts for the extension for one year, and submitted them to the several contractors for signa-The contractors for the supply of the Printing Paper and performing the Binding both signed, but the contractors for the Printing declined to do so and sent me the following letter:-

OTTAWA, November 27th, 1885.

DEAR SIR, -In pursuance of our Mr. MacLean's conversation with you yesterday, we would wish to disavow any intention to delay until disadvantage should arise to

our profit.

We had taken care to ascertain within what time we could be supplied with the material required for the change in form and type of Hansard, and we had no other intention than to do the work, trusting to Parliament to do what could be shown to be fair. But taking the Government and Parliamentary work as one lot, you will readily understand that the part, and that the heavy and unprofitable part, cannot

be done at as cheap a rate as the whole.

In fact we had no hesitation in saying that the present Parliamentary contract will not stand upon its own bottom, and if we should be limited to that we would have to throw ourselves upon the consideration of Parliament. We would not put ourselves in the position of coming forward to suggest or to ask anything; but to meet your desire as expressed yesterday, that the service with which you are charged, inclusive of Hansard, should be in a more satisfactory shape, we would say that should the Departmental contracts, together with that which Parliament and the House of Commons have already accorded us for another year, be in like manner extended, we will undertake to furnish the type required for the change in Hansard. On the 31st December last, the Printing contract expired, and on the 2nd January I received the following letter from Messrs. MacLean, Roger & Co., the late contractors :-OTTAWA, January 2, 1886.

SIR,-Our contract with Parliament for the Printing of both Houses having expired on the 31st ultimo, we have thought it proper, in case we should be required to continue to perform the Printing service of Parliament for the term of the year now entered upon, to advise you that we will ask for such service an advance in excess of the rates in the contract just expired of thirty-five per cent,

We think that we have just and reasonable grounds for this claim, some of which

are as follow:-

1st. That the Trades Union have advanced the rate of wages ten per cent., thereby causing us a loss of four thousand dollars per annum, not contemplated when the contract rates were accepted.

2nd. The policy of "cutting out the fat," in other words, changing the form and reducing the grade of printed matter, thus practically cutting from beneath the

contractor's feet the ground upon which he built his tender.

3rd. The uncertainty as to whether the contract for the Departmental Printing

will be continued to us.

We are most desirous to assure you that we have no intention whatever to put the Joint Committee or Parliament at any disadvantage, or to embarrass you in your office.

We intend to go on with the work, and to perform it as faithfully without the contract as we did whilst we were subject to its provision, until Parliament will have time to make arrangements.

But we would ask you to lay this correspondence before the Committee, as our

In a subsequent conversation with the Printers, they agreed to complete the Printing of the Departmental Reports to be submitted to Parliament this Session as under the provisions and at the prices of the late contract. I have not as yet received any vouchers, neither have I been asked for or paid any money under the demanded advanced rates.

In carrying out the next part of the Resolution I issued advertisements during the recess, calling for tenders for the Printing and Binding required by Parliament. In answer I received apparently seven tenders, in sealed envelopes, which I now

submit to the Committee.

As the latter part of the Resolution provides that the supply of Printing Paper required for each year be purchased by tender during the Session, it would be necessary for the Committee to take action in the matter to provide the supply for next year.

I also received the following letter relating to insurance from the Auditor-

General :-

OTTAWA, November 17th, 1885.

DEAR SIR,-I notice two payments by you in October, 1835, amounting to

\$57.50, for insurance on Sessional Papers.

Enclosed please find a copy of an Order in Council, in which the Executive Departments are requested to give up the practice of insuring Government property.

As the same reasons for action apply in the present case, would it not be well to

get an expression of opinion on the subject from the Printing Committee.

The Committee of the Privy Council have had under consideration, upon the suggestion of the Acting Minister of the Interior, the general question of insurance against fire of Government property; and they are of opinion, and humbly advise Your Excellency, that in view of the large amount, varied character and widely separated position of the property in the Dominion belonging to the Crown, it is a wise economy for the Government to underwrite its own risks, as well on moveable as on immoveable property, and they recommend that all existing policies (if any exist) be suffered to lapse and no new ones effected, and that a copy of this Order, should Your Excellency approve of it, he sent to every Department of the Government.

COMMITTEE ROOM, 30th June, 1885.

Sir Hector Langevin presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, of the 14th instant, for a copy of the Memorial of the North-West Council presented to the Government by Messrs. Wilson and Ross, Members of said Council, and of any answer made to said Memorial and of any correspondence between the Government and the Lieutenant-Governor of the North-West Territories or other parties in reference thereto.

Mr. Foster presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, of the 5th instant, for copies of all correspondence between the Government of British Columbia, or any person, and the Dominion Government, with regard to the deep-water Fisheries on the coast of British Columbia.

Mr. Royal introduced a Bill No. 119 to amend the Act to incorporate the Winnipeg and Hudson's Bay Railway and Steamship Company, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Landerkin, it was Ordered,—That Mr. Speaker do issue his Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery to make out a new Writ for the election of a Member to serve in this present Parliament, for the Electoral District of the County of Haldimand, in the room of the late David Thompson, Esq., removed by death.

Mr. White (Cardwell) introduced a Bill (No. 120) to make further provision respecting the administration of the Public Lands of Canada in British Columbia, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to-morrow.

Mr. Carling presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor General, of the 31st ultimo, for a copy of the appointment of Angus McDonald, of Upper Washabuck, Victoria County, N.S., as Census Enumerator in 1881; also copies of all correspondence between the Government, or any member thereof, and any other person relative to the cancellation thereof.

On motion of Mr. McLelan, The House resolved to go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the following Resolution:—

That it is expedient to provide that if, after the Canadian Pacific Railway shall have been constructed and duly placed in operation to its terminus on the seaboard in the Province of British Columbia, it shall be established to the satisfaction of the Government that the retention of the amount of \$5,000,000 in bonds under the provisions of the construction contract, as security for the operation of the Railway, is no longer necessary in the public interest, the Governor in Council may order that the said bonds be released and delivered to the Company.

The Bill No. 84 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to make further provision respecting Summary Proceedings before Justices and other Magistrates," was read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 94 further to amend the "Dominion Lands Act, 1883," was considered in Committee of the Whole;—and progress having been made and reported,—the Committee rose, and obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of The House.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway Company.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolutions were adopted:-

1. Resolved,—That it is expedient to confirm the agreement, made subject to the approval of Parliament, between Her Majesty the Queen, acting for the Dominion of Canada, therein represented by the Honourable A. W. McLelan, Minister of Finance,

therein called the Government, and the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, therein called the Company, represented by the Chief Executive Officer thereof, in the fol-

lowing form and words:

"(1,) That inasmuch as the amount actually advanced to the Company by the Government on account of the sum of \$20,000,000, secured by the first mortgage bonds of the Company, to the amount of £4,109,500 sterling, is \$19,150,700, it is agreed that the Company shall repay to the Government with interest at the rate of four per certum per annum, as provided by the Act 48-49 Victoria, Chapter 57, the said sum of \$19,150,700, such payment to be made in two equal instalments, the first of which shall be paid on the first day of May next, and the second thereof on or before the first day of July next, both with interest as aforesaid.

"(2.) That upon full payment of the said two cash instalments and interest as

herein before provided, the land grant of the Company shall be reduced by such number of acres as shall be sufficient, computing the value thereof at \$1.50 per acre, to extinguish the balance of the loan of \$29,880,912, mentioned in the Act 48-49 Victoria, Chapter 57, that is to say, the sum of \$9,880,912, with interest at the rate aforesaid to the first day of May next; and such reduction shall be effected by the retention by the Government of land; of equal average quality and value with the lands constituting the portion of the Company's land grant not heretofore disposed

of by the Company.

"(3.) That upon the settlement of all accounts respecting the said authorized loan of \$29,880,912, and payment and settlement as aforesaid of all sums of money due thereon, all the bonds of the Company secured exclusively upon the land grant of the Company, commonly called land grant bonds, now held by the Government in excess of the sum of \$5,000,000, of such bonds held by the Government under the construction contract of the 21st October, 1880, shall be cancelled, and the debenture stock of the Ontario and Quebec Railway Company held by the Government under the Act 47 Victoria, Chapter 61, section 1, shall be returned to the Company; and the Government shall authorize the Company under section 10 of 48-49 Victoria, Chapter 57, to mortgage the Algoma Branch to such amount per mile as is author-

ized by the charter of the Company with respect to the main line.

"(4.) That upon the settlement in manner aforesaid of the indebtedness of the Company to the Government, the Company may issue first mortgage bonds upon the remaining lands granted to them under their said contract, in such manner as is provided by their Charter in respect of the issue of land grant bonds, and to such amount per acre as they shall deem fit, not to exceed \$2 per acre, subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, all of the outstanding land grant bonds obtainable being first duly cancelled, and a reserve being made from the new issue to cover such outstanding land grant bonds as cannot be obtained for cancellation. And in the event of the Company making such issue, the Government will accept in exchange for the said \$5,000,000 of the said land grant bonds, a like amount of the new issue of bonds, such bonds to be held and dealt with in the same manner as the Government were by 44 Victoria, Chapter 1, intituled: "An Act respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway," authorized to hold and deal with the said \$5,000,000, so exchanged."

"(5.) That all necessary legislation required to carry the provisions hereof into

force shall be asked for from Parliament at its present Session.

2. Resolved,—That it is expedient to provide—

(a.) That the Government and the Company be authorized respectively to carry out and perform the conditions of the said agreement, according to their intent and purport; provided that the Governor in Council may extend the time for the payment of the first instalment and interest mentioned in the said agreement, to a date not later than the first day of July now next.

(b.) That so soon as the payment and settlement of the sum advanced on the said sum of twenty-nine millions eight hundred and eighty thousand nine hundred and twelve dollars, and interest, shall have been effected, as provided by the said agreement, the Company, under the authority of a special general meeting of their shareholders, called for the purpose, may issue mortgage bonds, secured upon the branch of the said railway, known as the Algoma Branch, constructed and to be hereafter constructed, completing the connection between the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway and the River Ste. Marie, which issue shall constitute a first mortgage and privilege upon the said branch railway, constructed and to be thereafter constructed, including the rolling stock and plant applicable thereto, and upon the tolls and revenues thereof, after deduction from such tolls and revenues, of working expenses and of such rolling stock and plant appertaining thereto, as shall be declared and described in any deed of mortgage securing such bonds, which shall be executed by the company, in conformity with its charter. And before the issue of such bonds, the company shall make by-laws, prescribing the mode in which, in case of default in the payment of the interest on such bonds, or of the capital thereof, the rolling stock and plant (if any) included in such mort-gage as appertaining to the said branch, shall be identified, and the tolls and revenues derivable from such branch, ascertained and distinguished from the tolls and revenues of the main line, and making such further provisions as may be just and expedient for the protection of the holders of the bonds secured upon the said branch line, without interfering with the rights of the holders of other securities of Company. Such by-laws to be submitted for approval to the Governor in Council, and upon such approval, a certified copy thereof to be deposited in the office of the Secretary of State, and that thereafter such by-laws shall continue to be valid and binding upon the Company, and shall not be altered or repealed by the Company, so long as the bonds referred to therein shall remain in force.

(c.) That the mode of securing the said mortgage bonds, and the rights, privileges and remedies applicable thereto and available to the holders thereof, shall be such as are described in sections twenty-eight, thirty-two, thirty-three, thirty-four,

thirty-five and thirty-six of the charter of the Company.

(d.) That the Company may also issue mortgage bonds to such amount as they shall deem fit, and as shall be approved by the Governor in Council, and according to the terms of the said agreement, secured upon the lands of the Company to which they shall then be entitled under the provisions of the construction contract executed on the 21st October, 1880, and the provisions of sections thirty, thirty-two, thirty-feur, thirty-five and thirty-six of the charter of the Company shall apply to such last-mentioned bonds: But that in making such last-mentioned issue of bonds, the Company shall reserve and place in the hands of the Trustees of the mortgage securing such bonds, if Trustees are created by such mortgage deed, and if not, then in the hands of some person or company appointed for the purpose by the Governor in Council, an amount of the said bonds equal in value to the land grant bonds then outstanding and unsatisfied above and beyond the sum of five million dollars of such bonds in the hands of the Government, the exchange of which is provided for by the said agreement; and the bonds so reserved shall not be used or disposed of for any other purpose whatsoever, except for providing, by payment or exchange, for the land grant bonds so outstanding and unsatisfied.

(e.) That upon the completion of the said Canadian Pacific Railway according to the said contract, and upon its being duly opened for traffic, the disqualification of the Shareholders thereof from becoming or being members of the Senate or House of Commons by reason of their being such Shareholders shall be removed, and shall

cease and determine.

NOTICES OF MOTIONS.

Mr. Mitchell—On Monday next—Enquiry of Ministry—Whether the Government have in their possession any report or reports from any officer of the Marine and Fisheries Department in reference to the Aspee Bay affair, and if so, whether they will lay them before the House?

Mr. Thompson—On Monday next—Bill intituled: "An Act to amend the law respecting Crown Cases Reserved."

Mr. Blake—On Monday next—Enquiry of Ministry—Whether Mr. Dewdney has been authorized to inform the Indians of the North-West Territories that no arrests will be made of any who took part in last year's troubles?

Mr. Blake—On Monday next—Enquiry of Ministry—Whether Mr. Dewdney has been authorized to notify the North-West Indians that there is a law both for whites and Indians, prohibiting them from carrying firearms in settled districts; and that as the Government intends to send a large number of soldiers and police into the country, it will be necessary for any Indian who wishes to hunt off his reserves to get permission from his agent to carry firearms; and that if found off his reserves with firearms, without the permission of his agent, he will be liable to arrest?

3. Section eighteen of the said Act passed in the 45th year of Her Majesty's Reign, and chaptered 23, is hereby amended by the addition of the following sub-

sections:-

2. Whenever the Court is of opinion that it is just and equitable that the Company should be wound up, they may make an order for that purpose upon application by petition on behalf of the Company, or by any shareholder of the Company, notwithstanding that such Company is not insolvent.

3. When the application is made on behalf of a shareholder such application shall be made after notice to the Company in the manner hereinbefore provided, and all the other provisions of this Act, so far as applicable, shall apply to the proceed-

ings for winding up a Company under this section.

4. Whenever the affairs of a Company have been completely wound-up under the said Act, the Court may make an order that the Company be dissolved from the date of such order, and the Company shall be dissolved accordingly, and such order shall be forthwith reported by the Liquidator to the Secretary of State. (Imperial Act, 2 -26 Victoria, chapter 89, section 111.)

5. The provisions of sub-sections 2, 3 and 4 of this section shall apply to all Companies now incorporated or hereafter to be incorporated under "The Canada Joint Stock Companies' Act, 1877," but shall not apply to any other Companies or

Corporations.

Mr. Thompson—On Monday next—Bill intituled: "An Act to extend the Boundaries of the District of Keewatin, and to amend the Law respecting such District."

Mr. Mackintosh-On Monday next-Enquiry of Ministry-Is it the intention of the Government to institute an enquiry into the causes of the floods from the Rideau River in the vicinity of the City of Ottawa?

Mr. Cook-On Monday next-Enquiry of Ministry-Is it true that the Government have refused to allow the settlers of Muskoka District to take fish in nets in the waters of Lakes Muskoka, Rousseau and Joseph?

Mr. Chapleau-On Monday next-BILL intituled: "An Act respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery."

Mr. Thompson-On Tuesday next-Committee of the Whole to consider the

following Resolutions:-

1st. That it is expedient further to amend the law respecting the North-West Territories, to provide for the repeal of the enactments now in force respecting Stipendiary Magistrates therein, and for the establishment of a Supreme Court of civil and criminal jurisdiction in and for the said Territories, to consist of five judges.

2nd. That it is expedient to provide for the payment to each of the said judges, out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, of a yearly salary of Four thousand dollars, with travelling allowances, to be fixed by the Governor in Council, and a retiring annuity equal to two-thirds of such salary, on conditions similar to those

applicable to like cases in the Provinces of the Dominion.

3rd. That it is expedient to empower the Governor in Council to divide the said Territories into five judicial districts, and to appoint for each a Sheriff and a Clerk of the said Court. Each Sheriff to be paid out of the said Consolidated Revenue Fund a yearly salary of Five hundred dollars and to receive such fees as the Lieutenant-Governor prescribes. Each such Clerk to be paid by fees to be fixed in like manner.

4th. That the mover have leave to bring in a Bill founded on the foregoing Resolutions, and to come into force on a day to be fixed by Proclamation under an

Order of the Governor in Council.

Mr. Thompson-On Tuesday next-Committee of the Whole to consider the

following Resolution :-

That it is expedient to provide in Committee of the Whole under Bill No. 10 of this Session intituled: "An Act respecting Real Property in the North-West Territories":

1. That the salaries of Registrars, Deputy Registrars and other necessary Officers, and such incidental expenses of carrying the said Act into effect as are sanctioned by the Governor in Council, shall be paid out of moneys to be provided by Parliament for the purpose.

2. That a proper building may, under orders of the Governor in Council, be provided and maintained at the public expense in each Registration District for the deposit and safe-keeping of documents connected with the Registration of Titles

under the Act.

3. That the Governor in Council may from time to time provide the necessary books and forms, provide any additional forms he deems necessary, and make such rules and regulations as are necessary to carry into effect the provisions of the said Act, and make such rules and regulations as to him appear necessary for giving effect to the Act, in cases unprovided for, according to its true intent and purpose.

4. That all fees payable under the said Act or in connection therewith shall be

settled by Tariff made by the Governor in Council.

5. That the Registrar may demand and receive the fees so settled, and perform the duties for which they are made payable, on payment thereof, and shall keep a correct account of all moneys received by him under the said Act and pay over the same to the Minister of Finance and Receiver-General, as shall be directed by the Governor in Council.

Four Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table

The following Petitions were read and received:-

Of the Trades and Labour Council of the City of St. Thomas; praying that the Bill now before Parliament to amend "The Dominion Elections Act, 1874," may become law.

Of the Nova Scotia Conference of the Methodist Church; of the Temperance Alliance of the County of Annapolis. Nova Scotia; of the Synod of Mcntreal and Ottawa of the Presbyterian Church in Canada; of the County of Cumberland Prohibitory Alliance, Nova Scotia; and of the Brant District Division of the Sons of Temperance; severally praying that no change may be made in the Canada Temperance Act which would lessen its prohibitory character, or make more difficult its adoption or enforcement.

Of Alexander Nichol and others, of the Village of Stayner, County of Simcoe, Ontario; praying that notwithstanding the Petition of the Municipal Council of the said village, in that behalf, the sale of Wine and Beer may not be permitted in Scott Act Counties.

Of the Municipal Council of the Town of Port Hope, County of Durham; and of Francis Dalby and others, of Elora and other places, County of Wellington, all of Ontario; severally praying that the Canada Temperance Act may be so amended as to permit of the sale of Light Wines and Beer.

Sir Hector Langevin, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Eighth Report of the said Committee, reporting the Bill No. 17 to amend the Act respecting The North-West Central Railway Company, with amendments.

Mr. Bergin, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament beg leave to present the following as their Fifth Report:—

The Committee carefully examined the following documents, and recommend that they be printed:—

Mr. McLelan then introduced a Bill No. 123 to explain the Act forty-eighth and forty-ninth Victoria, Chapter fifty, intituled: "An Act for the final settlement of the claims made by the Province of Manitoba on the Dominion," which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Tuesday next.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting the establishment of Experimental Farm Stations.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved, - That it is expedient to empower the Governor in Council to establish an experimental farm station, or experimental farm stations, and to acquire a limited extent of land, and set apart a limited extent of the public lands of Canada for that purpose, and for the purpose of tree planting and timber growing; and also to fix the rate of remuneration of persons employed to carry such provisions into effect, such remuneration to be paid out of moneys voted by Parliament for that purpose; and further to provide that such reports, samples, plants, and other products as are designated by the Minister of Agriculture, shall be transmitted by mail free of charge, subject to regulations made by the Postmaster-General.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting the salary of the additional Judge of the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice for Ontario.

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved,-That it is expedient to provide that the salary of the additional Judge of the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice for Ontario, appointed under the Act of the Legislature of that Province, 48 Victoria, Chapter 13, shall be Five thousand dollars per annum, to be paid out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, and that Section 1 of the Dominion Act, 46 Victoria, Chapter 9, be repealed.

Mr. White (Cardwell)—In Committee of the Whole on the Bill (No. 94) to amend the Dominion Lands Act of 1885, the following clauses as an addition to said Bill:—

Clause 38 of the Dominion Lands Act with the sub-sections thereof is hereby repealed, and the following section with the sub-sections thereof substituted therefor:

3×. If any person or company shall be desirous of assisting by advances in money intending settlers to place themselves on homestead lands in Manitoba or the North-West Territories, and of securing such advances, such person or company may make application to the Minister of the Interior, stating the plan or project intended to be acted upon, the steps to be taken in furtherance thereof, and the amount to be advanced to such settlers, and the Minister of the Interior may sanction and authorize

such plan or project, or refuse his sanction and authority thereto.

(a) If such plan or project be so sanctioned, and such person or company shall thereupon place any settler upon a homestead, a statement of the expense incurred by such person or company in paying the actual bona fide cost of the passage and of providing for the subsistence of such settler and his family, of erecting buildings on his homestead (to which purpose at least one-half of the advance made shall be devoted) and of providing horses, cattle, farm implements and seed grain for him, together with an amount in money sufficient to cover the interest on the amount advanced for a time to be agreed upon, to enable such settler to obtain a return from the cultivation of such homestead, shall be furnished to him, and upon his approval thereof, shall be submitted with proper vouchers in support thereof to the local agent, who shall examine and verify the same both by such vouchers and by an examination of such settler, and of such person or company, or their representative; and shall certify the result of such verification by a writing upon such statement signed by him, and thereupon such settler may make and execute an acknowledgment in writing of the amount so advanced to him, and may by such writing create a charge upon such homestead for the amount of such advance, not exceeding the sum of six hundred dollars, and for the interest thereon, at a rate not exceeding eight per cent.

(b) Such acknowledgment and charge shall be in the form of Schedule Q hereto appended, and a duplicate thereof shall be deposited with the local agent, and thereafter the holder of such charge shall have the right to enforce payment of the amount so advanced and of the interest thereon by ordinary legal proceedings. Provided always, that the time to be fixed for the payment of the first instalment of interest upon such advance shall not be earlier than the first day of November in any year,

nor shall it be within less them two years from the establishment of such settler upon such homestead. And provided also, that such settler shall not be bound to pay the capital of such advance or any part thereof within a less period than five years from the date of his establishment upon such homestead.

(c) Upon such acknowledgment and charge being duly executed and duly registered in the Registry Office for the Territorial Division in which such homestead shall be situated, the same shall constitute and be and remain a first charge upon such homestead after the issue of the patent or certificate of patent for such homestead.

until duly satisfied and extinguished according to law.

(d) If such settler shall not perform the conditions of settlement required to entitle him to a patent for such homestead within the time and in the manner provided by the Dominion Lands Act, and shall thereby forfeit his right to obtain a patent, the holder of the charge created thereon may apply to the Minister of the Interior for a patent of such homestead and upon establishing the facts to the satisfaction of the Minister shall receive a patent in his name therefor, and such patentee shall be bound to place a bond fide settler on such homestead by the sale thereof to such settler or otherwise within two years from the date of such patent, and in default of so doing within the said period shall be bound and obliged on demand to sell the said homestead to any person willing to become a bond fide settler thereon for such sum of money as shall be sufficient to pay the amount of such charge and interest, and the expenses incurred by the patentee in obtaining such patent and in retaining the homestead, on pain, in case of refusal, of an absolute forfeiture of the said property and of all claims thereon and of the patent or other title thereto. But if the settler has acquired a right to receive a patent for the land so charged and does not apply for the issue of the same, the holder of such charge may obtain such patent, or certificate for patent, in the name of the person entitled to receive the same or of his legal representatives, and thereafter the said charge shall become a statutory mortgage on such homestead.

Section 5 of the Act 43 Victoria, chapter 42, intituled: "An Act relating to interest on Money's secured by Mortgage on Real Estate," and all amendments to the

said clause shall apply to all charges created under the provisions of this Act.

Twenty-two Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

Sir Hector Langevin presented,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 8th March last, for a Return of all statements and estimates made by the Department of Indian Affairs, of moneys due to Indians under the Robinson Treaty; also of all correspondence and documents whatever in relation to the same subject.

Mr. Abbott, from the Select Standing Committee on Banking and Commerce, presented the Fifth Report of the said Committee, reporting the following Bills with amendments, viz.:—

Bill No. 75 to incorporate the School Savings Bank.

Bill No. 91 to incorporate the Yarmouth Steamship Company (Limited).

Bill No. 90 to amend and consolidate the Acts relating to the Montreal Board of Trade.

Bill No. 112 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to consolidate the borrowing powers of The Western Canada Loan and Savings Company, and to authorize the said Company to issue Debenture Stock."

Bill No. 113 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to consolidate the borrowing powers of The Freehold Loan and Savings Company, and to authorize the said Company to issue Debenture Stock";—and

Bill No. 69 respecting the Bank of Yarmouth.

With reference to the last-mentioned Bill, the Committee have amended the preamble thereof to make it conform to the provisions contained in the said Bill.

The Bill No. 98 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to consolidate the borrowing powers of The Canada Permanent Loan and Savings Company, and to authorize the said Company to issue Debenture Stock," having been referred back to the Committee for further consideration, they have again amended the same.

The Committee also report the Bill No. 114 to amend the Acts respecting the

British Canadian Bank, without amendment.

On motion of Mr. Hackett, the Bill No. 128 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to incorporate the Northumberland Straits Tunnel Company," was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading, to-morrow.

On motion of Mr. Robertson (Hamilton), the Bill No. 129 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act for the relief of Flora Birrell," was read the first time (on a division) and ordered for a second reading, to-morrow.

On motion of Sir Hector Langevin, it was Resolved, That for the remainder of the Session Government measures shall have precedence on Wednesday after Questions put by Members, and that the Order of the Day for Monday be the same as for Wednesday; Private Bills having the precedence as usual on Monday.

Mr. Thompson moved, that The House do go into Committee of the Whole,

to-morrow, to consider the following Resolutions:-

1st. That it is expedient further to amend the law respecting the North-West Territories, to provide for the repeal of the enactments now in force respecting Stipendiary Magistrates therein, and for the establishment of a Supreme Court of civil and criminal jurisdiction in and for the said Territories, to consist of five judges.

2nd. That it is expedient to provide for the payment to each of the said judges, out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, of a yearly salary of Four thousand dollars, with travelling allowances, to be fixed by the Governor in Council, and a retiring annuity equal to two-thirds of such salary, on conditions similar to those

applicable to like cases in the Provinces of the Dominion.

3rd. That it is expedient to empower the Governor in Council to divide the said Territories into five judicial districts, and to appoint for each a Sheriff and a Clerk of the said Court. Each Sheriff to be paid out of the said Consolidated Revenue Fund a yearly salary of Five hundred dollars and to receive such fees as the Lieutenant-Governor prescribes. Each such Clerk to be paid by fees to be fixed in like manner.

4th. That the mover have leave to bring iu a Bill founded on the foregoing Resolutions, and to come into force on a day to be fixed by Proclamation under an

Order of the Governor in Council.

Whereupon Mr. Thompson informed The House, that His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject matter of the said Resolutions, recommended them to the House.

That it is expedient to provide in Committee of the Whole, under Bill No. 10 of this Session intituled: "An Act respecting Real Property in the North-West Territories":

1. That the salaries of Registrars, Deputy Registrars and other necessary Officers, and such incidental expenses of carrying the said Act into effect as are sanctioned by the Governor in Council, shall be paid out of moneys to be provided

by Parliament for the purpose.

2. That a proper building may, under orders of the Governor in Council, be provided and maintained at the public expense in each Registration District for the deposit and safe-keeping of documents connected with the Registration of Titles under the Act.

3. That the Governor in Council may from time to time provide the necessary books and forms, provide any additional forms he deems necessary, and make such rules and regulations as are necessary to carry into effect the provisions of the said Act, and make such rules and regulations as to him appear necessary for giving effect to the Act, in cases unprovided for, according to its true intent and purpose.

4. That all fees payable under the said Act or in connection therewith shall be

settled by Tariff made by the Governor in Council.

5. That the Registrar may demand and receive the fees so settled, and perform the duties for which they are made payable, on payment thereof, and shall keep a correct account of all moneys received by him under the said Act and pay over the same to the Minister of Finance and Receiver-General, as shall be directed by the Governor in Council.

Whereupon Mr. Thompson informed The House, that His Excellency the Governor General, having been informed of the subject matter of the said Resolution,

recommended it to The House.

Ordered, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the said Resolution.

Sir Adolphe Caron presented,-Return to an Order of The House, of the 14th ultimo, for copies of all documents addressed to the Honourable the Minister of Railways, praying on the part of Jean Baptiste Plante, of St. Charles, that his claim for two horses killed on the Intercolonial Railway may be referred anew to the Dominion Arbitrators.

Mr. Blake moved, that an humble Address be presented to Her Majesty respectfully to assure Her Majesty that the interest and concern felt by the Commons of Canada and the people whom they represent, in the condition of Ireland, and their desire that some means may be found of meeting the expressed wishes of so many of Her Majesty's Irish subjects for the grant to Ireland of a measure of local self-government, still continue as warm and earnest as in the year 1882, when they were humbly signified to Her Majesty by an Address to the terms of which this House affirms its abiding adhesion;

Humbly to inform Her Majesty that this House hails with joy the submission by Her Majesty's Government to the Parliament of the United Kingdom of a measure

recognizing the principle of local self-government for Ireland,

And humbly to express to Her Majesty the earnest hope of this House that the principle of the said measure may be affirmed, and that it may form the basis for such a settlement of this great question as shall conduce to the peace, happiness and prosperity of the Empire.

Mr. Costigan moved in amendment thereto, that all the words after the word "That," be struck out, and the following added instead thereof:- "the Commons of Canada desire to express their deep and abiding interest in the prosperity and happiness of their fellow-subjects in Ireland, and their adhesion to the sentiments expressed in the Joint Address to Her Majesty of both Houses of the Canadian Par-

liament passed in the Session of 1882;

"That in such Address Parliament suggested that Canada and its inhabitants had prospered exceedingly under a Federal system, allowing to each Province of the Dominion considerable powers of self-government, and expressed a hope 'that if consistent with the integrity and well-being of the Empire, and if the rights and status of the minority were fully protected and secured, some means might be found of meeting the expressed desires of so many of Her Majesty's Irish subjects in that regard.'

"That in answer to the said Address the then Secretary of State for the Colonies was commanded to state that 'Her Majesty will always gladly receive the advice of the Parliament of Canada in all matters relating to the Dominion and the administration of its affairs; but with respect to the questions referred to in the Address, Her Majesty will, in accordance with the constitution of this country, have regard to the advice of the Imperial Parliament and Ministers, to whom all matters relating to

the affairs of the United Kingdom exclusively appertain.'

"That this House having reference to the tenor of the said answer, does not deem it expedient again to address Her Majesty on the subject, but earnestly hopes that such a measure or such measures, may be adopted by the Imperial Parliament as will, while preserving the integrity and well-being of the Empire and the rights and status of the minority, be satisfactory to the people of Ireland and permanently remove the discontent so long unhappily prevailing in that country.

Mr. McMullen moved, in amendment to the said proposed amendment, that all the words after the word "That," be struck out, and the following added instead thereof: "The following words be added to the original motion after the word "adhesion," and that this House is confirmed and strengthened by the events which have occurred since the passage of the said Address, in its conviction that the true interests both of Ireland and the rest of the Empire will be served in the highest degree by the grant of Home Rule to Ireland."

That inasmuch as in view of the extension of the electoral franchise to the North-West Territories, and of the remoteness of certain portions of the said Territories, it may appear that the allowances for fees and disbursements provided by section one hundred and twenty-six of "The Dominion Elections Act, 1874," will be inadequate or insufficient for a fair and just but economical remuneration for the services performed, the Governor in Council may make a tariff of fees, costs and expenses, based, as nearly as may be, on the tariff of fees, costs and expenses in the said section set forth, to be paid and allowed to Returning Officers and other persons employed at or with respect to elections under the Act respecting the representation, in the Parliament of Canada, of the North-West Territories, and may, from time to time, revise and amend such tariff; and that a copy of every such tariff, and of every amendment thereof, shall be laid before the House of Commons at the then next Session thereof.

Whereupon Sir Hector Langevin informed The House, that His Excellency the Governor-General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said Resolution,

recommends it to The House.

Ordered, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, on Tuesday next, to consider the said Resolution.

Mr. Blake moved, That Mr. Blake, the Member representing the Electoral District of the West Riding of the County of Durham in this House, having stated in his place in The House that he is credibly informed, and believes he can establish by satisfactory evidence, that at and for many years before the 3rd July, 1884, the date of the last election for Cape Breton, one Mathew Roche, of Lingan, was a voter for the District and was also a Government official, as a member of the Pilotage Board comprising Sydney, one of the greatest ports in Canada, to which were attached two comparatively unimportant out-ports;

That during the election, Murray Dodd, Esquire, then and now a member of this House for Cape Breton, pressed Mr. Roche to vote for Mr. McDougall because he was the Government candidate, brought out and selected by them to carry the county, if possible, in their interest; and stated to him, as a reason for his so voting, that it was the invariable rule that where a Government officer voted against the Government candidate he ran the risk of being turned out, and warned him that, if

he should so vote, such would be the consequence in his case;

That subsequently H. F. McDougall, Esquire, then and now a member of this House for Cape Breton, and Mr. Dodd, M.P., proposed to the Government that Mr. Roche, who they believed had, notwithstanding such warnings, voted against the Government candidate at the said election, should be, in consequence of his vote, superseded in his office, and some progress was made in the attempt;

That rumours got abroad, and the Government was made aware of the facts and

of the rumours, and hesitated to act;

That Messrs. McDougall, M.P., and Dodd, M.P., continued to press for the removal of Mr. Roche; and in the end a plan was devised for the accomplishment of their object, by the remodelling of the Pilotage Board, and the creation of a new Board for the comparatively unimportant out-ports, on which minor Board Mr. Roche was to be put without his consent, and the constitution of a Board for the great Port of Sydney on which Mr. Roche's name was not to appear;

That having heard that he was by some such scheme to be turned out, Mr. Roche communicated with Mr. Dodd, M.P., who told him that the fact was so; reminded him of his requests and warnings about voting against the Government candidate,

and told him that he must submit to the consequences;

That the substance of this statement was communicated to the Government, which, however, proceeded to carry out the plan, and created the two Boards accordingly; thus accomplishing the end sought of displacing Mr. Roche from the main functions of his office in pursuance of the threat of Mr. Dodd, M.P., and the determination of Mr. McDougall, M.P., to punish him for voting, as they believed he had

voted, against the Government candidate;

A Select Committee be appointed to enquire into all the circumstances connected with the said charges, with power to send for persons, papers and records; and that the witnesses be examined on oath or affirmation; and that the Committee do report in full the evidence taken before them, and their proceedings on the reference; and that Messrs. McCarthy, Davies, Colby, Cameron (Huron), Coursol, Langelier O'Brien, Weldon, and Townshend do compose the said Committee.

Sir Adolphe Caron presented,-Return to an Order of The House, of the 29th March last, for a Return showing all sums of money paid to any member or members of this House or the Senate, on account of services rendered in connection with the North-West Rebellion, giving the names, the services performed and the respective sums paid each, the date at which the services commenced and terminated; also all sums paid on account of travelling expenses, outfit or otherwise, giving each name, amount paid, what for, and date of payment, separately.

And,-Return to an Order of The House, of the 19th ultimo, for a Return showing the names and number of those who acted as Police Scouts during the North-West Insurrection; also, the names of those who have since applied for a land grant

bounty for said services, the same as that given to the Volunteers.

And also,-Return to an Order of The House, of the 7th ultimo, for copies of all correspondence between the Minister of Militia and Defence and any official of the Militia Department, and any officers of Volunteer Corps, whether on active service or not, all officials of Rifle Associations, and other parties, in reference to the character of the ammunition made at the Quebec Cartridge Factory and supplied for use in the field, for practice, or at rifle matches; including reports of all tests of such ammunition made by any such officers or officials of Rifle Associations.

Mr. Bowell presented,-Return to an Order of The House, of the 28th ultimo, for a Statement showing the amount of Liquor of all kinds imported into Canada during the year 1885; the amount of same exported, and estimated value of same.

And, -Return to an Order of The House, of the 29th March last, for a Return

giving :-

1. The number of Chinese immigrants that have arrived in Canada from the 20th day of August, 1885, to the 31st day of January, 1886, specifying the ports at which such immigrants have arrived.

2. The number that have arrived direct from China.

3. The number that have arrived from other countries, specifying the countries.

4. The total amount of duty collected from such immigrants.

5. The number of Chinese that have entered as tourists, merchants, men of science or students.

6. Whether in either case (if any) certificates were presented from the Chinese Government endorsed by the Charge d'Affaires, Consul or Consular Agent, or other representative of Her Majesty, at the place where the same was granted, or at the port or place of departure.

7. The cost to the Department of Customs, in consequence of the administration by that Department of the Act restricting and regulating Chinese immigration into

Canada.

8. Copies of all the correspondence (if any) between Trades Unions or other Societies, corporate or incorporate, or persons and the Department of Customs, urging more strict supervision over Chinese immigration, together with complaints (if any) against any officer of Customs in connection with the administration of said Chinese Restriction Act.

9. The total number of Chinese persons that have left Canada during the same

period.

Mr. Thompson presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor-General, of the 19th ultimo, for a Statement of the names of all cases in which judgment has been given by the Supreme Court of Canada, the reports of which have not yet been published, together with the respective dates on which such judgments were delivered.

Mr. Foster presented,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 19th ultimo, for a Return giving the number of Whitefish fry at the various Fish Hatcheries of the Dominion for distribution next spring; also the number of pickerel and black bass; also the instructions that have been given for their distribution.

Mr. Bergin moved, That the Fourth Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, be now concurred in;

And a Debate arising thereon;—the said motion was, with leave of The House, withdrawn.

The following Bills were severally read the third time, and passed, viz.:-Bill No. 122 for the relief of the Corporation of the Town of Cobourg;—and

Bill No. 123 to explain the Act forty-eighth and forty-ninth Victoria, Chapter fifty, intituled: "An Act for the final settlement of the claims made by the Province of Manitoba on the Dominion."

The Bill No. 131 further to amend the Act respecting the Canadian Pacific Railway, was read the second time (on a division), considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for a third reading on Thursday next.

The following Bills were severally read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, and ordered for a third reading tomorrow, viz.:—
Bill No. 125 to amend the Law relating to the Salaries of certain Judges of the

Supreme Court of Judicature for Ontario,

Bill No. 120 to make further provision respecting the administration of the Public Lands of Canada in British Columbia; -and

Bill No. 126 to amend the Law respecting Crown Cases reserved.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the appointment of Judges in the North-West Territories.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolutions were adopted :-

1. Resolved, -That it is expedient further to amend the law respecting the North-West Territories, to provide for the repeal of the enactments now in force respecting Stipendiary Magistrates therein, and for the establishment of a Supreme Court of

civil and criminal jurisdiction in and for the said Territories, to consist of five judges.

2. Resolved,—That it is expedient to provide for the payment to each of the said Judges, out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, of a yearly salary of Four thousand dollars, with travelling allowances, to be fixed by the Governor in Council, and a retiring annuity equal to two-thirds of such salary, on conditions similar to those applicable to like cases in the Provinces of the Dominion.

3. Resolved,—That it is expedient to empower the Governor in Council to divide the said Territories into five judicial districts, and to appoint for each a Sheriff and a Clerk of the said Court. Each Sheriff to be paid out of the said Consolidated Revenue Fund a yearly salary of Five hundred dollars and to receive such fees as the Lieutenant-Governor prescribes. Each such Clerk to be paid by fees to be fixed in like manner.

4. Resolved,—That the mover have leave to bring in a Bill founded on the foregoing Resolutions, and to come into force on a day to be fixed by Proclamation under an

Order of the Governor in Council.

Report to be received to-morrow.

The House went again into Committee of the Whole on Bill No. 124 respecting Experimental Farm Stations, which was reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 101 in amendment of "The Consolidated Inland Revenue Act, 1883," and the Act amending the same, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for a third reading, to-morrow.

The Bill No. 115 respecting the representation of the North-West Territories in the Parliament of Canada, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole;—and progress having been made and reported,—the Committee rose, and obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of The House, to-morrow.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider a certain proposed Resolution respecting fees and expenses in connection with the Electoral Franchise in the North-West Territories.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolution was adopted:-

Resolved,—That inasmuch as in view of the extension of the electoral franchise to the North-West Territories, and of the remoteness of certain portions of the said Territories, it may appear that the allowances for fees and disbursements provided by section one hundred and twenty-six of "The Dominion Elections Act, 1874," will be inadequate or insufficient for a fair and just but economical remuneration for the services performed, the Governor in Council may make a tariff of fees, costs and expenses, based, as nearly as may be, on the tariff of fees, costs and expenses in the said section set forth, to be paid and allowed to Returning Officers and other persons employed at or with respect to elections under the Act respecting the representation, in the Parliament of Canada, of the North-West Territories, and may, from time to time, revise and amend such tariff; and that a copy of every such tariff, and of every amendment thereof, shall be laid before the House of Commons at the then next Session thereof.

Four Petitions were brought up, and laid on the Table.

The Petition of Donald Kennedy and others, of the County of Glengarry; praying that no change may be made in the Canada Temperance Act, 1878, which would lessen its prohibitory character or make more difficult its adoption or enforcement, was read and received.

Sir Hector Langevin, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Eleventh Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee have had under consideration the amendments made by the Senate to Bill No. 58 to incorporate the St. Lawrence and Atlantic Junction Railway Company, and would recommend that the same be concurred in.

They have also had under consideration Bill No. 79 respecting the Napanee, Tamworth and Quebec Railway Company; and Bill No. 119 to amend the Act to incorporate the Winnipeg and Hudson's Bay Railway and Steamship Company, and

have agreed to report the same with amendments.

They have also considered Bill No. 87 to incorporate the Columbia Valley Railway Company, and Bill No. 89 to incorporate the Kootenay Railway Company of British Columbia, and have deemed it advisable to amalgamate the said Bills and to report the same under the title of "The Kootenay and Athabasca Railway Company," and would recommend that the fees and charges paid on Bill No. 89 be

refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

They have also had before them Bill No. 63 to incorporate the Rock Lake, Souris and Brandon Railway Company, and Bill No. 16 to incorporate the Medicine Hat, Dunmore and Benton Railway Company, and Bill No. 31 to incorporate the Alberta Railway Company, and also Bill No. 55 to incorporate the Portage la Prairie and Lake of the Woods Railway and Navigation Company, and would recommend that as the promoters thereof have expressed their intention of not proceeding further with the proposed measures this Session, the said Bills be withdrawn, and that the fees and charges paid thereon be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation.

On motion of Sir Hector Langevin, it was ordered that the fees and charges paid on the Bill No. 89 to incorporate "The Kootenay Railway Company of British Columbia," be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation, the said Bill having been amalgamated with the Bill No. 87 to incorporate "The Columbia Valley Railway," under the name of "The Kootenay and Athabasca Railway Company."

On motion of Sir Hector Langevin, the following Bills were severally withdrawn, and the fees and charges paid thereon were ordered to be refunded, less the cost of printing and translation, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Eleventh Report of the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, viz.:—

On motion of Mr. Kirk, an Order of The House was issued for a copy of the Contract entered into by the Government for the building of the Short Line Railway from Montreal viá Fredericton to Salisbury.

Mr. Bergin moved, That the Fourth Report of the Joint Committee of both

Houses on the Printing of Parliament, be now concurred in.

Mr. McLelan moved in amendment thereto, That the said Report be not now concurred in, but that it be referred back to the said Committee, with instructions to amend the Resolution on the Auditing of the Printing Accounts by providing that any statement of the accounts which may be required by the Committee be not subject to the examination of the Auditor-General, and that all accounts, vouchers, etc., required by the Auditor-General for his examination, under the third Resolution of the First Report of the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts of the Session of 1880, be, as heretofore, sent to him for audit;—which was agreed to.

That during the election, Murray Dodd, Esquire, then and now a member of this House for Cape Breton, pressed Mr. Roche to vote for Mr. McDougall because he was the Government candidate, brought out and selected by them to carry the county, if possible, in their interest; and stated to him, as a reason for his so voting, that it was the invariable rule that where a Government officer voted against the Government candidate he ran the risk of being turned out, and warned him that, if

he should so vote, such would be the consequence in his case;

That subsequently H. F. McDougall, Esquire, then and now a member of this House for Cape Breton, and Mr. Dodd, M.P., proposed to the Government that Mr. Roche, who they believed had, notwithstanding such warnings, voted against the Government candidate at the said election, should be, in consequence of his vote, superseded in his office, and some progress was made in the attempt;

That rumours got abroad, and the Government was made aware of the facts and

of the rumours, and hesitated to act;

That Messrs. McDougall, M.P., and Dodd, M.P., continued to press for the removal of Mr. Roche; and in the end a plan was devised for the accomplishment of their object, by the remodelling of the Pilotage Board, and the creation of a new Board for the comparatively unimportant out-ports, on which minor Board Mr. Roche was to be put without his consent, and the constitution of a Board for the great Port of Sydney on which Mr. Roche's name was not to appear;

That having heard that he was by some such scheme to be turned out, Mr. Roche communicated with Mr. Dodd, M.P., who told him that the fact was so; reminded him of his requests and warnings about voting against the Government candidate,

and told him that he must submit to the consequences;

That the substance of this statement was communicated to the Government, which, however, proceeded to carry out the plan, and created the two Boards accordingly; thus accomplishing the end sought of displacing Mr. Roche from the main functions of his office in pursuance of the threat of Mr. Dodd, M.P., and the determination of Mr. McDougall, M.P., to punish him for voting, as they believed he had

voted, against the Government candidate;

A Select Committee be appointed to enquire into all the circumstances connected with the said charges, with power to send for persons, papers and records; and that the witnesses be examined on oath or affirmation; and that the Committee do report in full the evidence taken before them, and their proceedings on the reference; and that Messrs. McCarthy, Davies, Colby, Cameron (Huron), Coursol, Langelier, O'Brien, Weldon, and Townshend do compose the said Committee.

And the question being again proposed on the said motion; Mr. Orton moved in amendment thereto, That all the words after "That" be struck out, and the following added: - "the Order for the second reading of the Bill

No. 104 to amend 'The Canada Temperance Act, 1878,' be now read."

Sir Hector Langevin—On Wednesday next—Bill intituled: "An Act respecting Tolls over the Dunnville Dam and Bridge connecting Works constructed over the Grand River.

Mr. Tassé—On Wednesday next—Enquiry of Ministry—Whether the Government has cognizance of a document addressed to the Electors of Ontario, under date of 26th October, 1882, the which document, signed "Frank Smith and John O'Donohoe," contained, amongst other things, the following declaration:—

"There are two political parties in this country, one calling itself the Conservative or Liberal-Conservative, the other the Liberal or Reform party; each claiming the confidence of the country, each having a certain tollowing among the people, each having certain traditions and a certain measure of support among the Catholic

people.

"The undersigned, in common with large numbers of their Catholic fellow-countrymen, are in alliance with the Conservative or Liberal-Conservative party. They recognize in that party and in its policy the strongest claim on their support as citizens; and as Catholics, they declare that the history of the country will show that it is from this party only that the Catholic people have received fair representation in the Cabinet and in the Senate, a fair distribution of the public patronage

and a fair support at all times for Catholic candidates at the polls.

"On the other hand, they assert with confidence that the relations between the Liberal or Reform party and the Catholic people, have been most unsatisfactory to the latter. When the Reform party had power to use, and patronage to bestow, the Catholic people, even that portion of the Catholic people in direct alliance with them remained without representation of a proper character in the Government and the Senate; Catholic candidates were openly abandoned by the Liberals at the polls; and the public patronage was distributed without regard to their interests under a system of administration which practically recognised such interests as regarded the rest of the population. And for several years at an earlier period than this, the Catholic Church, its doctrines, ceremonies, religious orders, bishops, priests, and people, were the victims of the incessant and blasphemous vituperation of the recognised organs of the Liberal party; while in the press, in the Legislature and at the polls, the Conservative party acted in friendly accord with the support of the Catholic Church and people.

"The alliance between the two parties in Dominion and Provincial affairs is now complete; the Conservatives and Reformers of Ontario, are now in alliance with the Conservatives and Reformers of the Dominion. Each has made public profession of this union. And as Catholics the undersigned, in common with thousands of their fellow-Catholics, are desirous of legitimately giving their aid to their political friends in this Province, in the fullest confidence that their policy will be as just and their acts as generous as in Dominion affairs. Though the Conservative party in Ontario affairs have been for years in Opposition, there is nothing in the published speeches of their leaders or in their published resolutions adopted in convention with which as citizens they do not heartily concur, and nothing that as Catholics they

are called on to disagree with. Our Separate School system owes much to the wisdom of the Conservative party. That party are supported in the Legislature by some of our fellow-Catholics. They have nominated several of our fellow-Catholic as their candidates, and when in power, they will be as faithful to their Catholic friends as the Catholic Conservatives have been to them."

made a member of the Senate?

The Committee would also recommend that, on account of the size of the Volumes of the Journals and Sessional Papers of the Sessions of 1884 and 1885, being over and above that specified in the contract, that the Contractor, W. McG. Mortimer, be allowed an additional sum of five cents per volume for the volumes bound in those years; such sum to cover all demands for extras of whatever nature or kind soever.

Mr. Girouard, from the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:-

The Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections, in obedience to the Order of the House, made on the 5th day of April last, beg leave to report that they have enquired into the charges then made by Mr. Edgar, from his place in Parliament, in reference to certain transactions relating to John White, Esq., M.P. for East Hastings, James C. Jamieson, of Belleville, a journalist, and the Honorable Mackenzie Bowell, Minister of Customs.

The Committee sent for persons, papers and records, and examined witnesses upon oath, they report the evidence so taken, their proceedings and their finding

thereon.

1. That John White, Esq., then and now member for the Electoral District of East Hastings, in conjunction with one George A. Simpson, D.L.S., on the second day of March, 1882, applied to the Department of the Interior for a grant of the lands hereinafter mentioned then open for colonization and settlement under the regulations for the sale and settlement of lands in the North-West Territories of the 23rd of December, 1881, with the intention of associating with himself and Mr. Simpson such persons of sufficient means for that purpose to enable them to satisfy the Government of their good faith and financial ability to fulfil the stipulations contained in the regulations aforesaid.

2. The said White invited the co-operation of Mr. Simpson in the said application, on account of the special knowledge which Mr. Simpson had acquired of the quality of the lands open for colonization purposes in the North-West Territories, and in consideration of Mr. Simpson making a selection of lands, for which application should be made by them. He (Mr. White) agreed with Simpson that he would allow him, Simpson, a one-twelfth interest in the lands, should the application therefor be successful, or at the option of Simpson, the sum of five hundred dollars in

3. Mr. Simpson accepted such proposal, and selected for White and on his own behalf the lands hereinafter described, and, on the second day of March, as hereinbefore stated, made application for the following tract of land, viz., Townships Nos. 43 and 44, and fractional Townships Nos. 45 and 46, in Range No. 27, fractional Townships Nos. 43, 44 and 45, in Range No. 28, and Township No. 45, and fractional Township No. 46, in Range No. 26, west of the second principal meridian in the North-West Territories.

4. Mr. Simpson having signified his election to accept the five hundred dollars in lieu of the one-twelfth interest in the said grant of lands to Mr. White, the latter gentleman offered to Mr. J. C. Jamieson, if he would pay to Mr. Simpson the said sum of five hundred dollars, that he, Jamieson, could, for the said sum, obtain the one-twelfth interest in the said grant which Mr. Simpson had had the option of taking in pursuance of the agreement made with him as already stated. And Mr. Jamieson accepted the proposal and accordingly, subsequently, paid to Mr. Simpson the sum of five hundred dollars, and thereby acquired the right to a twelfth interest in the said grant of lands.

5. Mr. White, having on the 30th of March, 1882, represented to the Depart ment that he had associated with him certain gentlemen whose names he gave in a communication of that date, and the Minister of the Interior being satisfied of the good faith and ability of these gentlemen with Mr. White to fulfil the stipulations, which under the regulations, would be imposed on them as a condition of obtaining the grant, reported in favor of the grant being made, and an Order in Council was accord ingly passed for the same on the eleventh day of April, 1882. This was communicated to Mr. White, as the representative of the Prince Albert Colonization Company, by which name it had been arranged that the Company which it was then intended

to form should be called.

6. On the second day of June following, an agreement in the terms insisted on by the Department of the Interior and which was identical as with that required by the Department of all colonization companies on a grant of lands being made to them, was entered into between the so-called Prince Albert Colonization Company, not then incorporated, Mr. William Sharples, the provisional president executing on behalf of the said Company and the Government, and the gentlemen thus associated together paid into the Department over \$20,000, being one-fifth of the purchase money of the said lands, the amount required to be paid on entering into the contract in accordance with the terms of the said regulations.

7. Subsequently letters patent incorporating the Prince Albert Colonization

Company were obtained.

8. The corporators of the said Company, in arranging among themselves as to the shares or interests in the said Company which they should hold, and as to the terms upon which Mr. White should be admitted as a shareholder, after some negotiations with him, in consideration of the fact that he was the originator of the scheme and of the trouble that he had in the formation and promotion of the Company, and for the further consideration that he should continue to assist and promote the interests of the Company, agreed that he, the said White, should have a one-twelfth share in the net profits of the undertaking, and thereupon, by a certain agreement in writing, dated the 10th day of May, 1883, executed by the Company, and a certain memorandum, executed by Mr. White, bearing date the 19th day of the said month of May, it was agreed that the said White should subscribe for one-twelfth the number of shares in the said Company, upon which, without the calls thereon being paid, dividends as earned by the Company should be declared and paid, on condition, however, that the said shares were not to be delivered or transferred until the calls which might be made thereon should be paid (interest, however, not being charged).

9. A similar arrangement was made with Mr. Jamieson who claimed as the purchaser of the interest which he had understood and as your Committee find, properly understood, the said Simpson was to have had in the said colonization grant a twelfth interest in the estate belonging to the said Company and not merely a one-twelfth interest in the net profits thereof, but in the end the said Jamieson accepted the terms as aforesaid: dissatisfied, however, with the arrangement which he had been obliged to accept, he immediately sold out his interest in the Company to Messrs. P. R. Palmer and William Jeffs, that is to say on the 19th day of May, 1883, from which time forth he had no further interest in the said Company except as the paid

Secretary-Treasurer thereof.

10. Your Committee find that Mr. Jamieson was and is a son-in-law of the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie Bowell, then and now member for North Hastings and Minister of Customs, but Mr. Bowell was not associated in business with Mr. Jamieson in any way or manner whatsoever, and except that Mr. Bowell lent his son-in-law as he had been in the habit of doing before that, the money which Mr. Jamieson used in purchasing Mr. Simpson's interest in the said colonization grant, he had nothing to do with the matter. And your Committee find that Mr. Bowell had no interest direct or indirect in the said transaction or in the said Jamieson's share therein, nor was he consulted during its progress, nor had he any knowledge of the matter further than being informed by Mr. Jamieson that he had the offer from Mr. White of the one-twelfth share in the grant which had been promised to Mr. Simpson for his services in selecting the land, for the sum of five hundred dollars. Your Committee further find that upon Mr. Jamieson selling out to Messrs. Palmer and Jeffs he returned to Mr. Bowell the money which he had so borrowed of him as hereinbefore set out.

11. On the 21st day of May, 1883, Mr. Jamieson, as Secretary of the Prince Albert Colonization Company, in pursuance of a resolution passed at a meeting of the Directors of the said Company, Mr. White, however, not being present, applied as Secretary to the Department of the Interior, in exchange for a portion of the lands.

granted to the said Company, for a grant of sections 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 13 in fractional Township 45, Range 27, west of the 2nd Meridian, on the south side of the Saskatchewan, known as the Parish of St. Louis de Langevin. To this application the Govern-

ment acceded, but the exchange was never carried out.

12. There is no evidence that the said White had anything to do, or assisted, or interfered in anyway in inducing or prevailing upon the Government to consent to such exchange, nor that the said Jamieson did more than apply for the same as the paid officer of the said Company; and in fact, as it appears from the evidence of the Deputy Head of the Department, that in almost every instance when a Colonization Company went into operation and commenced settlement, there was an exchange of lands, it being to the interest of the Government, that the land held by the companies for colonization should be of fair quality. There was no favor in having such

exchanges made nor any influence or interest required to obtain it.

13. That Mr. White, on or about the 22nd day of April, 1882, on behalf of the Trenton Colonization Company, applied for Townships 53, 54, 55, in Range 17, Township 53 in Range 16, and Townships 53 and 54 in Range 18, west of the 4th Principal Meridian, which said lands are in the neighborhood of Edmonton, under the regulations respecting the sale and settlement of Dominion lands for the purpose of colonizing the same. The application was entertained by the Department of the Interior. This tract of land Mr. White offered to the Prince Albert Colonization Company, asking that the said last-mentioned Company should allow him, in case they should accept the grant, the same terms as the paying stockholders of that Company had already allowed him for the land granted the said Company. The Company, however, declined the proposal and nothing appears to have come of the application to the Government, no grant having actually been made.

14. One C. B. Fralick, of Belleville, or Messrs. Fralick & Jeffs, and not so far as the evidence shows Mr. White or Mr. Jamieson, applied for a grant of lands for colonization purposes in the neighborhood of Shell River, and on the 6th day of June, 1882, a grant was made to sixteen gentlemen, among whom were Messrs. White and Jamieson who appeared and were represented to the Government as being members of a company which was organized under the name of the Shell River Colonization Company. But your Committee find that the said Jamieson was not a member of or interested in the said company and had nothing to do with the application for, or obtaining the grant of land for the said company, and that although Mr. White had agreed to become a member of said company, he was to become such member and to hold his stock therein upon the same terms and conditions as the remainder of the shares were held by the other stockholders thereof.

15. Your Committee find that the said John White did not use nor attempt to exercise any influence with the Government, or any Department of the Government, to obtain a grant for colonization purposes of the 51,200 acres of so-called choice lands near Batoche, as alleged in the said charge, but that, on the contrary, (1) The said lands were a portion of the North-West Territories then under the regulations of the 23rd December, 1881, for the sale and settlement of the Dominion lands, open for colonization purposes to all persons or companies who might make application therefor, on the terms and conditions of the said regulations, and more especially on applicants being able to satisfy the Minister of the Interior of the good faith and

ability, to comply with the said conditions.

(2) And because it was the policy of the Government to encourage the taking up of lands by companies for colonization purposes, of which it appears more than 300 were actually formed with a view to the more quick and speedy settlement of the

North-West Territories outside of the railway belts.

(3) That there was no other applicant for the said lands or any part thereof, and no occasion for the use or exercise of any influence which the said White may or may not have had with the Government, of which pretended influence there was no evidence before your Committee.

16. Your Committee find that although the said White intended to associate with himself and Simpson, and subsequently, after the sale by Simpson to Jamieson,

with himself and Jamieson, persons having means to enable him to satisfy the Government of the financial ability of the Company which he was about forming to carry out the scheme of colonization, and without which it would have been impossible for him or any other individual to attempt the colonization of so large a tract, yet your Committee find that he did not apply for or obtain the said grant with a view of trafficking with the same, but, on the contrary, intended to remain bound and did in fact continue to be one of the persons who agreed to carry out the terms and conditions on which the said colonization grant was made and to make the said scheme if possible a success.

17. Your Committee find that the said White did receive, as fully set out in the foregoing portions of their report, from the gentlemen whom he admitted to a participation in the said scheme of colonizing the said lands, certain allowances as between the said persons and himself, but your Committee are of the opinion that the agreement come to between those gentlemen and Mr. White was and is a matter of private concern only and in which the public has no possible interest of any kind. That in making such arrangement the said White violated no general law nor any rule of Parliament, nor was he in any way guilty of a breach of any of the privi-

leges of your honorable House. 18. That the charge that Mr. White fulfilled the alleged agreement to promote the interests of the Prince Albert Colonization Company, in obtaining from the Government an Order in Council for a favorable exchange, or any change, of part of their land, is wholly unfounded, and was not attempted to be supported before your

Committee by a tittle of evidence.

19. Your Committee further find that the said White and Jamieson did not, nor did either of them, procure an agreement from the Government of a choice or of any description of lands for the Shell River Colonization Company, and the charge in

that respect was unsupported by any evidence.

20. And your Committee are of opinion that the charge made against the Honorable Mackenzie Bowell was made without the slightest ground or pretext for preferring it. That it was stated in terms disingenuous, misleading and unfair, and regard being had to the full and complete knowledge which Mr. Edgar had of all the circumstances of the case before preferring it, your Committee are further of opinion that the making of so unfounded a charge admits neither of palliation or excuse.

21. Your Committee beg further to report that no evidence adduced before them disclosed or in any way supported any charges within the competence of your honorable House to deal with, nor affecting in any way the honor of the members charged.

22. Your Committee have been called upon to ascertain, as one of the matters

referred to them, whether Mr. Edgar, who made the charges which were referred to your Committee, had been, as he alleged, credibly informed of the matters charged by him and had just ground to believe that he could establish the same. Mr. Edgar, although sworn as a witness before your Committee, declined to answer certain questions put to him touching this matter, and your Committee are unable to find, under the circumstances, that Mr Edgar had been credibly informed as he alleged, and as to certain of the charges made, more especially that referring to the Hon. Mr. Mackenzie Bowell, your Committee are of opinion that he had no information that could be esteemed credible or sufficient to warrant a reasonable belief in its truth.

And your Committee beg to report further that Mr. Edgar, although called and sworn as a witness, refused to answer the following question which he was required

to answer by the order of your Committee :-

"You state that you were credibly informed of the statements which you made to the House and which appear in the notice. Will you be kind enough to tell me

who informed you?"

Mr. Edgar, in refusing to answer the question, said: -"I decline to disclose the sources of information upon which I brought forward these charges in the House. I can give no information based on my own knowledge of any of the subjects connected with this enquiry. I have received my information from confidential sources which could not be disclosed without a breach of faith of which I will not be guilty. I also

refuse on the ground that it is against public policy to lay down the view that there must be a disclosure of names of individuals on whose information charges are made in Parliament, which may affect Governments, influential public men, or political parties."

Mr. Thompson introduced a Bill No. 138 to amend the Act respecting the Electoral Franchise and the Dominion Elections Act, 1874, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading, to-morrow.

Mr. McLelan moved, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the following Resolutions :-

1. That in addition to the sums authorized by the Acts 36 Victoria, Chapter 62, and 43 Victoria, Chapter 17, to be raised in the manner hereinafter mentioned for the relief of the Quebec Harbour Commissioners and the improvement of the said Harbour, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to raise, by the issue of Debentures bearing interest, payable half yearly, at a rate not exceeding 4 per cent. per annum, a further sum of seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

2. That the sum so raised may be advanced, from time to time, to the said Commissioners, to enable them to complete their Wet and Tidal Docks, now in course

of construction in the said Harbour.

3. That the repayment by the Commissioners of the sum so advanced shall be provided for in the manner prescribed by the Act first above cited, as amended by the Act 46 Victoria, Chapter 39, for the repayment of the sums advanced to the Commissioners under it, and subject to the provisions of the said Act in that behalf.

Whereupon Mr. McLelan informed The House, that His Excellency the Governor-General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said Resolutions, recom-

mended them to the House.

Ordered, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, to-morrow, to consider the said Resolutions.

Mr. McLelan moved, That the Bill No. 131 further to amend the Act respecting

the Canadian Pacific Railway, be now read the third time.

Mr, Watson moved in amendment thereto, That the Bill be referred back to the Committee of the Whole, for the purpose of amending the same by providing that as a condition of granting the proposed relief to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company it shall be stipulated that the Company shall no longer claim that no lines of railway should be permitted to be constructed within Manitoba, south of the Canadian Pacific Railway - except such lines as shall run south-west or to the westward of south-west-and that no lines of railway should be permitted to be constructed within fifteen miles of latitude forty-nine; -which was negatived on the following division:-

A., and others, of the Town of Oakville, County of Halton; severally praying for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, or for such amendment thereof as will exempt from its operation Beer and Light Wines; and that on petition of one-third of the electors of any City or County in which the Act is in force, a vote on its repeal may be taken at any time.

Mr. Rykert, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented the First Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee have had under consideration the item of \$2,000 paid to the High Commissioner for Canada in London, and charged to Civil Government Contingencies on Page 49, Part II, of the Auditor-General's Report on Appropriation Accounts, for the year ended 30th June, 1885, and beg leave to submit for the information of The House the voucher furnished them for the said expenditure, which voucher is appended hereto.

Sir Hector Langevin, from the Select Standing Committee on Railways, Canals and Telegraph Lines, presented the Twelfth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee have had under consideration Bill No. 128 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to incorporate the Northumberland Straits Tunnel Railway Com-

pany," and have agreed to report the same with amendments.

The Committee have also had before them Bill No. 81 to incorporate the Lennox Passage Bridge Company, and the promoters thereof having expressed their intention of not proceeding further with the proposed measure this Session, they would recommend that the said Bill be withdrawn.

On motion of Mr. Paint, the Bill No. 81 to incorporate the Lennox Passage Bridge Company, was withdrawn.

Sir Hector Langevin introduced a Bill No. 139 respecting Tolls over the Dunnville Dam and Bridge connecting works constructed over the Grand River, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading to morrow.

Mr. Thompson laid on the Table,—Report of the Chief Engineer of Government Railways, submitting the Reports of Messrs. Donken and Hyndman on Cape Breton Surveys, 1886.

On motion of Mr. Béchard, an Address was voted to His Excellency the Governor-General for a statement of the sum claimed by each of the Counsel employed by the Crown in the trials resulting from the North-West troubles in 1885, and the amount paid to each of such Counsel; and all correspondence and papers on the subject.

The amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 105 to amend the Act to provide for the granting of a Subsidy to the Chignecto Marine Transport Railway Company (Limited), were taken into consideration, and concurred in on a division.

The Bill No. 134 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to amend 'An Act respecting a Reformatory for certain Juvenile Offenders in the County of Halifax, in the Province of Nova Scotia," was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 135 from the Senate, intituled: "An Act to amend "An Act respecting Offences against the Person," was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with an amendment, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed, as amended.

The Bill No. 133 further to amend the Law respecting the North-West Territories, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole;—and progress having been made, and reported,—the Committee rose, and obtained leave to sit again at the next sitting of The House.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the improvement of the Harbour of Quebec.

The following Resolutions were adopted:-

1. Resolved,—That in addition to the sums authorized by the Acts 36 Victoria, Chapter 62, and 43 Victoria, Chapter 17, to be raised in the manner hereinafter mentioned for the relief of the Quebec Harbour Commissioners and the improvement of the said Harbour, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council to raise, by the issue of Debentures bearing interest, payable half yearly, at a rate not exceeding 4 per cent. per annum, a further sum of seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars,

2. Resolved.—That the sum so raised may be advanced, from time to time, to the said Commissioners, to enable them to complete their Wet and Tidal Docks, now

in course of construction in the said Harbour.

3. Resolved, -That the repayment by the Commissioners of the sum so advanced shall be provided for in the manner prescribed by the Act first above cited, as amended by the Act 46 Victoria, Chapter 39, for the repayment of the sums advanced to the Commissioners under it, and subject to the provisions of the said Act in that behalf.

Resolutions to be reported.

The said Resolutions were accordingly reported, read a second time, and agreed to.

Mr. McLelan then introduced a Bill No. 140 respecting the improvement of the Harbor of Quebec, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading, to-morrow.

A Message was received from the Senate with the following Bill No. 141 of their own, intituled: "An Act further to amend the Law of Evidence in certain cases," to which the concurrence of this House was desired. (On motion of Mr. Thompson, the said Bill was read the first time.—Second reading to-morrow.)

Mr. Orton-On Friday next-Enquiry of Ministry-Whether the Government will consent to a day being given to consider the various amendments to "The Canada Temperance Act," as was given upon the motion of Mr. Jamieson last Session?

Mr. Pope-On Friday next-Committee of the Whole to consider the follow-

ing Resolution:-

That it is expedient to provide that the Minister of Railways and Canals be authorized to construct a Railway from a point on the Straits of Canso to Louisburg or Sydeny, as a public work; that the Government Railways Act, 1881, shall apply to such work and that the location and all other incidents of the said work shall be determined by the Governor in Council.

Mr. Pope-On Friday next-Committee of the Whole to consider the follow-

1. That whereas by an Act, 46 Victoria, chapter 25, the Governor in Council was authorized to grant to the Baie des Chaleurs Railway Company, incorporated by Act of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, a subsidy not exceeding \$3,200 per mile, nor exceeding in the whole \$320,000, for one hundred miles of their railway from Metapediac on the Intercolonial Railway, to Paspebiac in the Province of Quebec, and by the Act 47 Victoria, chapter 8, further authority was given to the Governor in Council to grant a subsidy, not exceeding in the whole \$300,000, for a branch of the Intercolonial Railway from Metapediac eastward towards Paspebiac, twenty miles in the Province of Quebec, subject in both cases to certain conditions mentioned in the said Acts respectively; and the said company, by two separate instruments designated as articles of agreement, made in duplicate, between Her Majesty Queen Victoria and the said company, both bearing date the seventh day of November, 1885, have undertaken to construct, in the manner and subject to the conditions set forth in the said instruments respectively, as well the said twenty miles as the remaining eighty miles of the railway from Metapediac to Paspebiac, and it was further agreed that the Government should request Parliament, at the present session, to authorize the arrangement hereinafter mentioned as to the application of the subsidies aforesaid to the several portions of the said 100 miles of railway; it is expedient to provide: (1) That the said subsidy of \$300,000 shall apply to the first section of twenty miles eastward from Metapediac; (2) that the subsidy of \$3,200 per mile authorized for the said first section shall, with the \$3,200 which alone would have been applicable to the second section of twenty miles eastward from Metapediac, be also applicable to it, making \$6,400 per mile applicable to the said second section; and (3) that to the remaining sixty miles of the said 100 miles the subsidy of \$3,200 per mile shall apply.

2. That it is expedient to provide, that the two instruments of agreement men-

tioned in the next preceding resolution, which were made subject to the approval of

Parliament be approved and confirmed.

One Petition was brought up, and laid on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Taylor, the matter of the indebtedness of Mr. Herman H. Cook, as dues for timber cut on Indian Reserves on certain Islands in the Georgian Bay, in the years 1872 and 1873, and the remission of \$1,486.24, together with the interest thereon, was referred to the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts.

On motion of Mr. Bergin, the Sixth Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, was concurred in.

Mr. White (Cardwell) moved, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, to morrow, to consider the following proposed Resolutions:—

1. That it is expedient to extend the provisions of the Act respecting grants of land to members of the Militia force on active service in the North-West: (a) to the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of any irregular force raised by authority, and actively engaged, and bearing arms in the suppression of the Indian and Half-breed outbreak, other than as a home guard at or near their place of residence; (b) every scout actively engaged therein whose services have been certified to by competent authority; (c) the master, pilot and crew of the steamer "Northcote," and the crew of every other boat engaged in action during the outbreak; (d) every person regularly appointed to the medical staff, and actively engaged during the outbreak; (e) nurses and hospital dressers actively engaged during the outbreak, and reported for special meritorious service by the Major-General commanding; (f) members of the enrolled Militia force who, having started with their corps for active service west of Port Arthur, were incapacitated by accident or disease from accompanying such corps on service beyond that point, and were ordered to return home, or were invalided, and if they have since died, their legal representatives.

2. That holders of certificates of pre-emption entry at the time when they were called out for active service, to whom the said Act and the foregoing resolutions apply, may tender the warrant mentioned in section 3 of the said Act, in payment of moneys due in respect of such entry, but that such warrants shall not be so receivable from substitutes of holders of certificates in this resolution before mentioned.

3. That members of the several corps enlisted and serving under the provisions of section 21 of "The Consolidated Militia Act of 1883," entitled to participate in the advantages conferred by the said Act, may tender such warrants in payment protanto for any lands they select for settlement within six months after the expiry of their term of service, provided that each such member shall notify the Minister of the Interior before the first day of August, 1886, whether he will accept a warrant to be applied, as in this resolution mentioned, or scrip for eighty dollars, as by the said Act provided.

Whereupon Mr. White (Cardwell) informed The House, that His Excellency the Governor-General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said Resolutions, recommended them to The House.

Ordered, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, to morrow, to

consider the said Resolutions.

Mr. McCarthy—In Committee of the Whole on Bill (No. 138), An Act respecting the Electoral Franchise and the Dominion Elections Act, 1874—To add the following sections:—

Section three of "The Electoral Franchise Act" is hereby repealed, and the fol-

lowing substituted therefor:-

"3. Every person shall be entitled to be registered in any year upon the list of voters for the proper polling district of any electoral district or portion of an electoral district, and when so registered to vote, if such person—

"(1) Is of the full age of twenty-one years, and is not by this Act or by any

law of the Dominion of Canada disqualified or prevented from voting; and

"(2) Is a British subject by birth or naturalization; and

"(3) Is the owner of real property within any city or part of a city in the electoral district, of the actual value of at least three hundred dollars, or within any town or part of a town in the electoral district, of the actual value of at least two hundred dollars, or in any place in the electoral district, other than a city or town.

of the actual value of at least one hundred and fifty dollars; or -

"(4) Is the tenant of any real property within the electoral district, under a lease, at a monthly rental of at least two dollars, or at a quarterly rental of at least six dollars, or at a half-yearly rental of at least twelve dollars, or at an annual rental of at least twenty dollars, and has been in possession thereof as such tenant for at least one year before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters, and has really and bond fide paid one year's rent for such real property, at not less than the rate aforesaid; except when the rental is an annual one and for a larger sum than twenty dollars, in which case it shall be sufficient that at least twenty dollars of the last year's rent which accrued next before the time aforesaid shall have been paid: Provided always, that a change or changes of tenancy during the year shall not deprive such tenant of the right to be registered on a list of voters if such change or changes have been without any intermission of time between the tenancies, and if the several tenancies are such as would entitle the tenant to be registered on a list of voters had such tenant been in possession under any one of them, as such tenant, for the year next before the time aforesaid: Provided also, that in any place except a city, town or incorporated village, the rental hereinbefore mentioned may be payable in money, in kind, or in money's worth of like value; and provided further, that if on any revised or final assessment roll the amount of the tenant's rent is not stated, the fact that the real property in respect of which his name is entered on such roll as the tenant thereof is assessed on such roll in cities at three hundred dollars or more, or in towns at two hundred dollars or more, or in any place other than a city or town at one hundred and fifty dollars or more, shall be prima facie evidence of his right to be registered on the list of voters; or-

"(5) Is the bond fide occupant of real property within any city or part of a city in the electoral district, of the actual value of at least three hundred dollars, or within any town or part of a town in the electoral district, of the actual value of at least two hundred dollars, or in any place in the electoral district, other than a city or town, of the actual value of at least one hundred and fifty dollars: Provided in every such case, that such person has been in possession of such real property as such occupant for one year next before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters, and is, and has been for such time in the enjoyment of the revenues and profits thereof; or-

"(0) Is a resident within the electoral district, and derives an income of at least three hundred dollars annually from his earnings in money or money's worth, or from some profession, calling, office or trade, or from some investment in Canada, and has so derived such income and has been a resident of Canada for one year next before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the

placing of his name on the list of voters; or-

"(7) Is a farmer's son not otherwise qualified to vote in the electoral district in

which his father's farm is situated; and -

"(a) If his father is living, is and has been resident continuously with his father for one year next before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters, if the value of such farm is sufficient, if equally divided among the father and one or more sons as coowners, to qualify them to be registered as voters, in which case the father and such one or more sons as so desire may be so registered as voters; and if there are more such sons than one resident as aforesaid, and claiming to be registered as voters in respect thereof, and if the value of the farm of the father is not sufficient to give the father and each of such sons the right to vote, in respect of such value if equally divided among them, then the right to be registered as a voter and to vote in respect of such farm, shall belong only to the father and the eldest or so many of the elder of such sons, being so resident as aforesaid, as the value of such farm, if equally divided,

"(b) If his father is dead, is and has been resident continuously with his father, or with his mother (after the death of his father), being the owner of the farm, for one year next before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters, if the value of the farm, in respect of which it is claimed that he should be registered as a voter, is sufficient, if equally divided among all the sons of such father as co-owners, to qualify them as voters under this Act, in which case such one or more sons as so desire may be so registered as voters; and if there are more such sons than one resident as aforesaid, and claiming to be registered as voters in respect thereof, and if the value of such farm is not sufficient to give each of such sons the right to vote in respect of such value, if equally divided among them, then the right to be registered as a voter and to vote in respect of such farm shall belong only to the eldest or so many of the elder of such sons, being so resident as aforesaid, as the value of such farm, if equally divided, will qualify; or-

"(8) Is the son of an owner of real property in such electoral district, or portion of an electoral district, other than a farm, and is not otherwise qualified to vote

in the electoral district in which such property is situated; and-

"(a) If his father is living, is and has been resident continuously with his father for one year next before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters, if the value of the real property on which his father resides, and in respect of which his father is qualified to be registered as a voter as owner, is sufficient, if equally divided among the father and one or more sons as co-owners, to qualify them to be registered as voters under this Act, in which case the father and such one or more sons as so desire, may be so registered as voters; and if there are more such sons than one resident as aforesaid, and claiming to be registered as voters in respect of such property, and if the value thereof is not sufficient to give the father and each of the sons the right to vote in

respect of such value, if equally divided, then the right to be registered as a voter and to vote in respect of such real property, shall belong only to the father and the eldest or so many of the elder of such sons, being so resident as aforesaid, as the

value of such real property, if equally divided, will qualify; or-

"(b) If his father is dead, is and has been resident continuously with his father, or with his mother (after the death of his father) being such owner, for one year next before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters, if the value of the real property on which his father, or his mother after the death of his father, resided or resides, and in respect of which such father would, if living, be qualified to be registered as a voter as owner, is sufficient, if equally divided among all of his sons as co-owners, to qualify them to be registered as voters under this Act, in which case such one or more sons as so desire may be so registered as voters; and if there are more such sons than one resident as aforesaid, and claiming to be registered as voters in respect of such property, and if the value thereof is not sufficient to give each of such sons the right to vote in respect of such value, if equally divided, then the right to be registered as a voter and to vote in respect of such real property, shall belong only to the eldest or so many of the elder of such sons, being so resident as aforesaid, as the value of such real property, if equally divided, will qualify; or-

"(9) Is a fisherman, and is the owner of real property and boats, nets, fishing gear and tackle, within any such electoral district, or portion of an electoral district, or of a share or shares in a registered ship, which together are of the actual value of

at least one hundred and fifty dollars."

Section four of the said Act is hereby repealed and the following substituted

therefor :-

"4. Every person who has been possessed of any of the qualifications to be registered as a voter for a portion of a year next before his being placed upon the list of voters, or the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters, and for the remainder of such year of another of such qualifications or of other of such qualifications shall be entitled to be registered as a voter, as possessed of the last of such qualifications possessed by him, if the change of qualification has occurred without any intermission of time, and if the several qualifications are such as would entitle him to be so registered if he had been in possession thereof for the time aforesaid."

Section five of the said Act is hereby repealed and the following substituted therefor :--

"5. The qualifications required of voters in respect of a city or town, or portion of a city or town, shall apply to voters in respect of a city or town, or a portion of a city or town attached for electoral purposes to a county or riding of a county in any electoral district; and the qualifications required of voters in respect of any place other than a city or town shall apply to voters in respect of any municipality or place not being a city or town, or a portion of a city or town, which is attached to or included for electoral purposes in a city or town, or portion of a city or town," Section seven of the said Act is hereby repealed and the following substituted

therefor :-

"7. A person qualified under this Act as a voter in respect of income, shall only be entitled to be registered as a voter in the electoral district in which he earns such income or performs the duties from which such income is derived at the time when he is placed on the list of voters, or at the date of the application for the placing of his name on the list of voters; and a person qualified otherwise than in respect of income, shall only be entitled to be registered as a voter in the polling district in which the real property in respect of which he is qualified is situate; but if such property is partly within one polling district and partly within another, although all within one electoral district, the person qualified in respect thereof shall be entitled to be registered and to vote in that one of such polling districts in which he desires to be registered as a voter.

Of Warren Totten and others, of the Town of Woodstock, County of Oxford, Ontario; praying for the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act of 1878, or for such amendment thereof as will exempt from its operation beer and light wines; and that on petition of one third of the electors of any City or County in which the Act is in force, a vote on its repeal may be taken at any time.

Mr. Rykert, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented the Second Report of the said Committee, which is as follows:—

The Committee have had under consideration items connected with the Dalhousie Branch of the Intercolonial Railway (Page 268, Part II of the Public Accounts, for the year ended 30th June, 1885), more especially with reference to freight and passengers carried by the said railway for the Inch Arran Hotel at Dalhousie, N.B., and have examined certain witnesses in connection therewith, and for the information of The House append hereto copies of the evidence given by the persons examined by the Committee, together with the exhibits fyled by them and a statement showing the cost of the enquiry.

Sir Hector Langevin moved, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, on Tuesday next, to consider the following Resolution:—

That it is expedient to provide that the Minister of Railways and Canals be authorized to construct a Railway from a point on the Straits of Canso to Louisbur or Sydney, as a public work; that the Government Railways Act, 1881, shall appl to such work, and that the location and all other incidents of the said work shall be determined by the Governor in Council.

Whereupon Sir Hector Langevin informed The House, that His Excellency the Governor-General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said Resolution,

recommended it to The House.

Ordered, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, on Tuesday next, to consider the said Resolution.

Sir Hector Langevin moved, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, on Tuesday next, to consider the following Resolutions:—

1. That whereas by an Act, 46 Victoria, chapter 25, the Governor in Council was authorized to grant to the Baie des Chaleurs Railway Company, incorporated by Act of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, a subsidy not exceeding \$3,200 per mile, nor exceeding in the whole \$320,000, for one hundred miles of their railway from Metapediac on the Intercolonial Railway, to Paspebiac in the Province of Quebec, and by the Act 47 Victoria, chapter 8, turther authority was given to the Governor in Council to grant a subsidy, not exceeding in the whole \$300,000, for a branch of the Intercolonial Railway from Metapediac castward towards Paspebiac, twenty miles in the Province of Quebec, subject in both cases to certain conditions mentioned in the said Acts respectively; and the said company, by two separate instruments designated as articles of agreement, made in duplicate, between Her Majesty Queen Victoria and the said company, both bearing date the seventh day of November, 1885, have undertaken to construct, in the manner and subject to the conditions set forth in the said instruments respectively, as well the said twenty miles as the remaining eighty miles of the railway from Metapediac to Paspebiac, and it was further agreed that the Government should request Parliament, at the present session, to authorize the arrangement hereinafter mentioned as to the application of the subsidies aforesaid to the several portions of the said 100 miles of railway; it is expedient to provide: (1) That the said subsidy of \$300,000 shall apply to the first section of twenty miles eastward from Metapediac; (2) that the subsidy of \$3,200 per mile authorized for the said first section shall, with the \$3,200 which alone would have been applicable to the second section of twenty miles eastward from Metapediac, be also applicable to it, making \$6,400 per mile applicable to the said second section; and (3) that to the remaining sixty miles of the said 100 miles the subsidy of \$3,200 per mile shall apply.

2. That it is expedient to provide, that the two instruments of agreement mentioned in the next preceding Resolution, which were made subject to the approval of

Parliament be approved and confirmed.

Whereupon Sir Hector Langevin informed The House that His Excellency the Governor-General, having been informed of the subject-matter of the said Resolutions, recommended them to The House.

Ordered, That The House do go into Committee of the Whole, on Tuesday next,

to consider the said Resolutions.

Bill No. 136 further to amend the Act respecting Fishing by Foreign Vessels;—
and

Bill No. 137 respecting the Carleton City of Saint John Branch Railway.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions making provision for grants of land to members of the Irregular Forces of the Militia of Canada.

(In the Committee.)

The following Resolutions were adopted :-

1. Resolved,—That it is expedient to extend the provisions of the Act respecting grants of land to members of the Militia force on active service in the North-West:

(a) to the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of any irregular force raised by authority, and actively engaged, and bearing arms in the suppression of the Indian and Half-breed outbreak, other than as a home guard at or near their place of residence; (b) every scout actively engaged therein whose services have been certified to by competent authority; (c) the master, pilot and crew of the steamer "Northcote," and the crew of every other boat engaged in action during the outbreak; (d) every person regularly appointed to the medical staff, and actively engaged during the outbreak; (e) nurses and hospital dressers actively engaged during the outbreak, and reported for special meritorious services by the Major-General commanding; (f) members of the enrolled Militia force who, having started with their corps for active service west of Port Arthur, were incapacitated by accident or disease from accompanying such corps on service beyond that point, and were ordered to return home, or were invalided, and, if they have since died, their legal representatives.

2. Resolved,—That holders of certificates of pre-emption entry at the time when they were called out for active service, to whom the said Act and the foregoing Resolutions apply, may tender the warrant mentioned in section 3 of the said Act in payment of moneys due in respect of such entry, but that such warrants shall not be so receivable from substitutes of holders of certificates in this Resolution before

mentioned.

3. Resolved,—That members of the several corps enlisted and serving under the provisions of Section 21 of "The Consolidated Militia Act of 1883," entitled to participate in the advantages conferred by the said Act, may tender such warrants in payment pro tanto for any lands they select for settlement within six months after the expiry of their term of service, provided that each such member shall notify the Minister of the Interior before the first day of August, 1886, whether he will accept a warrant to be applied, as in this Resolution mentioned, or scrip for eighty dollars, as by the said Act provided.

The said Resolutions were accordingly reported, read a second time, and agreed to.

Mr. White (Cardwell) then introduced a Bill No. 142 to make further provision respecting grants of land to members of the Militia Force on active service in the North-West, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading on Tuesday next.

The Bill No. 133 further to amend the Law respecting the North-West Territories, was again considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, and ordered for a third reading on Tuesday next.

Resolved, That whereas by an Act, 46 Victoria, chapter 25, the Governor in Council was authorized to grant to the Baie des Chaleurs Railway Company, incorporated by Act of the Legislature of the Province of Quebec, a subsidy not exceeding \$3,200 per mile, nor exceeding in the whole \$320,000, for one hundred miles of their railway from Metapediac on the Intercolonial Railway, to Paspebiac in the Province of Quebec, and by the Act 47 Victoria, chapter 8, further authority was given to the Governor in Council to grant a subsidy, not exceeding in the whole \$300,000, for a branch of the Intercolonial Railway from Metapediac eastward towards Paspebiac, twenty miles in the Province of Quebec, subject in both cases to certain conditions mentioned in the said Acts respectively; and the said company, by two separate instruments designated as articles of agreement, made in duplicate, between Her Majesty Queen Victoria and the said company, both bearing date the seventh day of November, 1885, have undertaken to construct, in the manner and subject to the conditions set forth in the said instruments respectively, as well the said twenty miles as the remaining eighty miles of the railway from Metapediac to Paspebiac, and it was further agreed that the Government should request Parliament, at the present session, to authorize the arrangement hereinafter mentioned as to the application of the subsidies aforesaid to the several portions of the said 100 miles of railway; it is expedient to provide: (1) That the said subsidy of \$300,000 shall apply to the first section of twenty miles eastward from Metapediac; (2) that the subsidy of \$3,200 per mile authorized for the said first section shall, with the \$3,200 which alone would have been applicable to the second section of twenty miles eastward from Metapediac, be also applicable to it, making \$6,400 per mile applicable to the said second section; and (3) that to the remaining sixty miles of the said 100 miles the subsidy of \$3,200 per mile shall apply.

2. Resolved, That it is expedient to provide, that the two instruments of agreement mentioned in the next preceding Resolution, which were made subject to the approval of Parliament, be approved and confirmed.

pose.

4. Resolved,—That all fees payable under the said Act or in connection therewith shall be such as are settled by Tariff made by the Governor in Council, together with one-fifth of one per cent. on the value of the real property registered, if such value amounts to or is less than \$5,000, and one-tenth of one per cent. on the additional value when the value exceeds that sum; and twenty per cent. of such gross fees shall be applied to the formation of a Land Assurance Fund for the purposes in the said Bill set forth. The value shall be ascertained by the oath or solemn affirmation of the applicant, owner or person acquiring such land. If the Registrar be not satisfied as to the correctness of the value so attirmed or sworn to, it shall be lawful for him to require such applicant, owner or person acquiring such land to produce a certificate of such value under the hand of a sworn valuator appointed by a Judge, which certificate shall be received as conclusive evidence of such value for the purpose aforesaid.

2. The subsidies hereinbefore mentioned as to be granted to Companies named for that purpose, shall be granted to such Companies, respectively. The other subsidies shall be granted to such Companies as shall be approved by the Governor in Council as having established to his satisfaction their ability to construct and complete the said railways respectively. PRAYERS.

Mr. Rykert, from the Select Standing Committee on Public Accounts, presented the Fourth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :-

The Committee have, in accordance with the Order of The House, of the 20th instant, enquired into the matter of the indebtedness of Mr. Herman H. Cook, as dues for timber cut on Indian Reserves on certain Islands in the Georgian Bay, in the years 1872 and 1873, and the remission of \$1,486.24, together with the interest thereon; and in connection therewith have examined certain persons, and for the information of The House append hereto copies of the evidence given and of the exhibits fyled by them.

[For the evidence and exhibits accompanying this Report, see Appendix to the Journals, No. 5.]

Mr. Colby, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library of Parliament, presented a Report from the said Committee, which is as follows:-

The Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library of Parliament have the

honor to report as follows:-

That the attention of the Committee has again been drawn to the necessity for limiting the number of persons having the privilege of the Library during the recess, and for preventing loss and mutilation of books. It has been ordered that the names of all persons found, or suspected of committing a breach of the rules of the Library, be reported to the Speakers, and that the privilege of such persons be cancelled pend-

ing the action of the Speakers.

That the Committee has learned with regret that, during the present Session, the Journals, Public Accounts and similar documents, have been mutilated by persons desirous of saving time in copying, and that a whole page of the bound copy of the Montreal Gazette, containing the Letter of Archbishop Taché on affairs in the North-West, was deliberately torn from the volume. The Committee desire to express in the strongest way their disapproval of conduct which cannot be guarded against and which threatens to destroy the usefulness of the Library.

That the Canadian section of the Library is now so full and so important, and the catalogue so crowded and imperfect, that a re-print of the latter has become necessary, and the Committee recommend that the sum of two thousand dollars be

provided for that special purpose.

That a Sub Committee to consider certain letters and petitions concerning the status and salaries of certain of the Officers and Messengers of the Library, was appointed; and the report of the said Committee, which is appended, was adopted.

That it was considered fitting to order that the works of the principal German writers be obtained in the original for the use of those to whom that language is

native or familiar.

APPENDIX A.

1. That in the case of Mr. A. H. Todd it is advisable that the Joint Library Committee request the Government to cause to be paid to Mr. Todd the full salary of \$1,600 provided for him by Order in Council of November 27, 1885, and that the payment of said salary date from July 1, 1885, together with the statutory increase due him from July 1, 1884.

2. That in the case of Mr. Laperrière it is advisable that the Joint Committee request the Government to cause to be paid to Mr. Laperrière the full salary of the month in which he was superannuated, as well as the superannuation allowance for

that month.

2. The subsidies hereinbefore mentioned as to be granted to Companies named for that purpose, shall be granted to such Companies, respectively. The other subsidies shall be granted to such Companies as shall be approved by the Governor in Council as having established to his satisfaction their ability to construct and complete the said railways respectively. All the lines for the construction of which subsidies are granted shall be commenced within two years from the first day of August next and completed within a reasonable time, not to exceed four years, to be fixed by Order in Council, and shall also be constructed according to descriptions and specifications and upon conditions to be approved by the Governor in Council, on the report of the Minister of Railways and Canals, and specified in an agreement to be made in each case by the Company with the Government, and which the Government is hereby empowered to make; the location, also, of every such line of railway shall be subject to the approval of the Governor in Council, and all the said subsidies, respectively, shall be payable out of the Consolidated Revenue Fund of Canada, by instalments on the completion of each section of the railway of not less than ten miles, proportionate to the value of the portion so completed in comparison with that of the whole work undertaken, to be established by the report of the said Minister:

The Resolutions adopted in Committee of the Whole, yesterday, respecting the salaries of Registrars and other officers in the North-West Territories, were reported, read a second time, and agreed to, and referred to the Committee of the Whole on Bill No. 10 respecting Real Property in the North-West Territories.

The Bill No. 10 respecting Real Property in the North-West Territories, was again considered in Committee of the Whole (the Resolutions adopted on the subject, yesterday, referred), reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

The amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 130 respecting certain Works constructed in or over Navigable Waters, were severally taken into consideration, and concurred in.

The Bill No. 132 respecting the Department of Public Printing and Stationery, was considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended,

Mr. Chapleau moved, That said Bill be now read the third time.

Mr. Mills moved in amendment thereto, That the said Bill be not now read, but that it be read a third time this day six months;—which was negatived on a division.

And the question being again put, that the said Bill be now read the third time, it was agreed to, and the Bill was accordingly read the third time, and passed.

The Bill No. 142 to make further provision respecting grants of land to members of the Militia Force on active service in the North-West, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported without amendment, read the third time, and passed.

Mr. White (Cardwell) laid before The House,—Copies of Orders in Council, Correspondence, etc., relating to grants of Dominion Lands to the following Railway Companies:—

Wood Mountain and Qu'Appelle Railway Company; North-West Central Railway Company;—and Manitoba and North-Western Railway Company.

In accordance with Order, The House proceeded to take into further consideration Items 5, 7, 8 and 9 of Resolution 1, Item 4 of Resolution 2 and Resolution 5, reported from Committee of Ways and Means, on Friday, 2nd April last, and the said Items and Resolution were referred back to the Committee of Ways and Means.

Mr. McLelan moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair, for The House to go again into Committee of Ways and Means.

NOTICES OF MOTIONS.

Mr. Amyot-On Monday next-Enquiry of Ministry-Whether the Government have received the following Resolution adopted by the Board of Health of the

City of Quebec :--

"That the steamship 'Parisian,' of the Allan Line, on her last trip from Europe to Canada, brought to port a person suffering from small-pox. It is said that the port physician of Quebec did not only not force the steamer to return to Grosse Isle Quarantine, but allowed the patient to land at Quebec and allowed the other passengers coming off the infected steamer to continue their route to Montreal, &c., without submitting them to the necessary disinfection, greatly to the detriment of the inhabitants of Quebec and Montreal. That it is Resolved, that this Commission protest against the conduct of the Medical Inspector of the Port of Quebec, and that a copy of this Resolution be transmitted to the Ministers of Marine and Agriculture, and praying that immediate steps be taken to enforce Quarantine Regulations, so that the public health may be protected. A copy of the above Resolutions have also been sent to the Hon. Messieurs Laurier, McGreevy and Bossé, the three members for Quebec." And is it their intention to take any and what steps to remedy that state of things, and prevent a recurrence of such acts of negligence?

Mr. Landry (Montmagny)—On Monday next—Enquiry of Ministry—

i. Have the Government received, at various times, communications setting forth that the breakwaters constructed in River du Sud (Parish of St. Thomas, County of Montmagny), for the protection of the Intercolonial Bridge, had themselves, by slightly diverting the course of the current, been the cause of considerable losses to the riparian proprietors?

2. Who gave that information, and at what dates was it brought to the know-

ledge of the Government?

3. What have the Government done? Did they order a survey of the locality?
4. When was the survey made? By whom? What are the names of the persons whom the Engineer saw, in relation thereto, in the County of Montmagny?

5. What is the date of the report made on this question? By whom is the

report signed, and when was it sent to the Government?

6. What is the conclusion of the report, and upon what is it based?

Mr. Landry (Montmagny)-On Monday next-Enquiry of Ministry-Is it true that, on the 20th May, 1884, a collision took place in the Port of Gaspé between the Government steamer "La Canadienne," commanded by Captain Ludger Bolduc, and the brigantine "Alliance," of Jersey?

Is it true that, in consequence of such collision, an enquiry was instituted by

the Government and conducted by Captain P. A. Scott, of the Royal Navy? Is it true that, at the said enquiry, Captain Scott did not receive the evidence of Commander Wakeham, for the reasons mentioned in the following letter:-

> " BOARD OF EXAMINERS OF MASTERS AND MATES, " HALIFAX, 16th July, 1884.

"SIR,-In reply to your letter of the 12th instant, asking why Commander Wakeham's evidence was not taken at the enquiry into the collision between the Canadian Government steamer "La Canadienne" and the "Alliance," I would say that Commander Wakeham informed me he was not on deck when the accident

occurred, nor was he there after "La Canadienne" rounded the Light-ship. But he did say to me he saw a light which he afterwards supposed might have been that of the "Alliance," and knew nothing further of the matter. As he was not present after rounding the Light-ship, his evidence was not taken.

Is it true that Capt. Bolduc was dismissed on the 27th May, 1884, and that, on the 17th June following, Commander Wakeham was asked to give evidence which he had not given at the enquiry, and which he gave on the 27th June, out of the presence of the accused, in a simple letter which does not even bear the form of a statutory declaration?

Is it true that Capt. Boldue has unceasingly demanded a fresh enquiry in order to justify himself against the charge of negligence imputed against him in evidence

given subsequently to the enquiry?

Is it the intention of the Government to grant the enquiry demanded by Capt. Boldue in the following letter:—

"Wm. Smith, Esq.,
"Dep. Minister of Marine,
"Ottawa.

"SIR,—I have received your letter of the 3rd July, informing me that no decision had been made to hold a second investigation, and that information had reached the Department that the light of the "Alliance" was seen from the deck of "La Canadienne" fifteen minutes before the accident took place. I expect that this information comes from people who would not like to see another investigation held. Further, if the light was seen, the chief officer was in charge of the look-out and was directing the wheel until a moment before the accident, and he left the bridge without notifying me. I am certain that if a proper investigation was held, as allowed to a captain of the merchant service, if the "La Canadienne" was found in fault for not having seen the light, the blame would not fall on me.

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE.

The Sub-Committee of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, to whom was referred the several Tenders received for the supplying the Printing Papper required by Parliament for the ensuing year, together with the samples of paper accompanying the same, beg leave to submit the following as their Report:—

The Sub-Committee had prepared, for their information, the accompanying "Table of Calculations" on the Tenders for the Printing Paper; and after carefully examining the samples of paper accompanying the same, they beg respectfully to recommend for acceptance the tender of Mr. J. R. Barber, of Georgetown, Ontario, it being the lowest, at \$4.35 per ream for the Royal, and \$1.75 per ream for the Foolscap.

REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE.

COMMITTEE ROOM, 29th April, 1886.

The Sub-Committee, to whom was referred the auditing of the Printing Accounts

of the past year, and the Clerk's Report, beg leave to report as follows:—
That they have carefully examined the Annual Statement of the Parliamentary Printing Accounts for the fiscal year from the 1st July, 1884, to 30th June, 1885, and having compared the several items of expenditure with the receipted accounts and the vouchers connected therewith, and being thus satisfied of the correctness of the accounts, they have certified accordingly and have signed.

The Sub-Committee would also recommend that, in accordance with the Eighth Report of the Committee of last Session, circulars be at once sent out by the Clerk of the Committee to the several paper manufacturers, requesting tenders for the supply

of Printing Paper for the next year.

The Sub-Committee would also recommend that no change do take place in the present system of insurance on the Printed Sheets, Bound Volumes, etc., as contained in the buildings occupied by the contractors for the Printing and the Binding, they being considered as of a very hazardous nature.

REPORT OF THE CLERK OF THE COMMITTEE.

To the Chairman and Members of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament ;-

GENTLEMEN,-I beg to submit the Annual Statement of the Receipts and Expenditure on account of the Printing of Parliament, for the fiscal year ended the 30th June, 1885.

In the Eighth Report of the Committee, as concurred in last Session, the follow-

ing Resolution appears :-

Resolved,-That as the several contracts for the Printing, Binding and Printing Paper expire on the 31st day of December next, it is recommended that they be extended for one year from that date, and that during the recess tenders should be called for by advertising for the performance of the Printing and Binding required for the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada for the periods of five and ten years, to be computed from the 1st day of January, 1887, and to be completed on the 31st day of August in the fifth or tenth year, as the case may be, instead of the 31st day

of December; such tenders to be sent in, in a sealed envelope, addressed to the Clerk of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, not later than 12 o'clock noon of the first day of the next Session of the Parliament of the Dominion, after which time no tenders will be received, such tenders to be made on blank forms which can be had on application from the Clerk of the Committee. The calculations testing the value of each tender shall be made upon the amount of work performed in the fiscal year 1883-1884, as shown in the detailed accounts, and that the several terms, conditions and provisions, as contained in the said blank form of tender, shall be binding on the several tenderers, and shall form the basis on which the several contracts shall be drawn up.

It is also further recommended, that the supply of Printing Paper required for each year be purchased by tender during the Session and stored for use as required,

thus, it is hoped, ensuring uniformity of make and colour.

In accordance with the first part of that Resolution, I prepared the contracts for the extension for one year, and submitted them to the several contractors for signature. The contractors for the supply of the Printing Paper and performing the Binding both signed, but the contractors for the Printing declined to do so and sent me the following letter:—

OTTAWA, November 27th, 1885.

DEAR SIR, -In pursuance of our Mr. MacLean's conversation with you yesterday, we would wish to disavow any intention to delay until disadvantage should arise to

our profit.

We had taken care to ascertain within what time we could be supplied with the material required for the change in form and type of Hansard, and we had no other intention than to do the work, trusting to Parliament to do what could be shown to be fair. But taking the Government and Parliamentary work as one lot, you will readily understand that the part, and that the heavy and unprofitable part, cannot

be done at as cheap a rate as the whole.

In fact we had no hesitation in saying that the present Parliamentary contract will not stand upon its own bottom, and if we should be limited to that we would have to throw ourselves upon the consideration of Parliament. We would not put ourselves in the position of coming forward to suggest or to ask anything; but to meet your desire as expressed yesterday, that the service with which you are charged, inclusive of Hansard, should be in a more satisfactory shape, we would say that should the Departmental contracts, together with that which Parliament and the House of Commons have already accorded us for another year, be in like manner extended, we will undertake to furnish the type required for the change in Hansard.

On the 31st December last, the Printing contract expired, and on the 2nd January I received the following letter from Messrs. MacLean, Roger & Co., the late contractors:—

OTTAWA, January 2, 1886.

SIR,—Our contract with Parliament for the Printing of both Houses having expired on the 31st ultimo, we have thought it proper, in case we should be required to continue to perform the Printing service of Parliament for the term of the year now entered upon, to advise you that we will ask for such service an advance in excess of the rates in the contract just expired of thirty-five per cent.

We think that we have just and reasonable grounds for this claim, some of which

are as follow :-

1st. That the Trades Union have advanced the rate of wages ten per cent. thereby causing us a loss of four thousand dollars per annum, not contemplated when the contract rates were accepted.

2nd. The policy of "cutting out the fat," in other words, changing the form and reducing the grade of printed matter, thus practically cutting from beneath the

contractor's feet the ground upon which he built his tender.

3rd. The uncertainty as to whether the contract for the Departmental Printing

will be continued to us.

We are most desirous to assure you that we have no intention whatever to put the Joint Committee or Parliament at any disadvantage, or to embarrass you in your office.

We intend to go on with the work, and to perform it as faithfully without the contract as we did whilst we were subject to its provisions, until Parliament will have

time to make arrangements.

But we would ask you to lay this correspondence before the Committee, as our petition respectfully submitted.

I have not as yet received any vouchers, neither have I been asked for or paid any money, under the demanded advanced rates.

In carrying out the next part of the Resolution I issued advertisements during the recess, calling for tenders for the Printing and Binding required by Parliament. In answer I received apparently seven tenders, in sealed envelopes, which I now

submit to the Committee.

As the latter part of the Resolution provides that the supply of Printing Paper required for each year be purchased by tender during the Session, it would be necessary for the Committee to take action in the matter to provide the supply for next

I also received the following letter relating to insurance from the Auditor-

Mr. Bergin, from the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, presented the Ninth Report of the said Committee, which is as follows :-

The Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament beg leave to present the following as their Ninth Report:-

The Contract for the Printing of Parliament having expired on the 31st December, 1885, the Committee would respectfully recommend the extension of the same from that date for two years, to the 31st December, 1887, on the same terms and conditions as heretofore, the contractors, Messrs. MacLean, Roger & Co., having stated that they are prepared to accept the said extension.

Mr. Kilvert moved, That as it appears from the Journals of the Senate of the 26th of May, 1886, that the Bill intituled: "An Act respecting the Northern and North Western Junction Railway Company," was withdrawn, at the request of the promoters, the Accountant of this House be authorized to refund the fees and charges paid thereon, less the cost of printing and translation; -which was agreed to.

On motion of Mr. Kranz, it was Resolved, That the 51st Rule of this House be amended so as to provide for the publication of Notices in the Territories of Canada of any intended application for a Private Bill, by inserting the words "or Territory" after the words "In any other Province," also by inserting the words "or District" after the word "County" wherever the same may thereafter occur, in accordance with the recommendation contained in the Fourteenth Report of the Select Standing Committee on Standing Orders.

On motion of Sir Hector Langevin, it was Resolved, That when the House adjourns to-day it stand adjourned until Saturday, at Three o'clock, P.M., and that the Government measures have that day and on Monday next precedence immediately after Routine and Questions to be put by Members.

Mr. Somerville (Brant) moved, That Mr. Somerville, the Member representing the Electoral District of the North Riding of the County of Brant in this House, having stated from his place that he is credibly informed, and believes that he can establish by satisfactory evidence, that Hector Cameron, then and now a Member of this House, was in the year 1884 using his influence and exertions to procure through the Government and Parliament a subsidy for the Eric and Huron Railway Company of \$3,200 a mile for thirty miles, amounting to \$96,000; and while so engaged he wrote to an officer of the Company, in effect stipulating that a commission or bonus of ten per cent. on the amount of such subsidy should be paid to him for himself, or for himself and two other persons whose co-operation in the business he had secured -one half of such commission to be paid on the subsidy being voted, and the other half on the money being paid over;

A Select Committee be appointed to enquire fully into the said allegations, with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to examine witnesses upon oath or affirmation, with instructions to report the evidence and all proceedings of the said Committee, and that the said Committee be composed of Messrs. McCarthy, Lan-

gelier, Macmaster, Fleming, Desjardins, Colby and Lister.

Sir Hector Langevin moved in amendment, That all the words from the words "paid over" to the end of the motion be struck out, in order to add the following: "and that the foregoing charges and allegations be referred to the Select Standing Committee on Privileges and Elections; with power to send for persons, papers and records, and to exemine witnesses upon oath or affirmation; "-which was agreed to, on a division.

And the question being put on the main motion as amended, it was agreed to.

The House went into Committee of the Whole to consider certain proposed Resolutions respecting the granting of subsidies to Railway Companies and towards the construction of certain Railways.

And it being Six o'clock, P.M., Mr. Speaker took the Chair, and left it, to resume the same at half-past Seven o'clock, P.M.

Assiniboine River, near the Town of Shellmouth, about twenty-six miles.

2. Resolved, That it is expedient to authorize the Governor in Council to grant to the North-West Central Railway Company, or to such other Company as may undertake the construction of the railway, Dominion Lands to an extent not exceeding six thousand four hundred acres for each mile of the Company's Railway from its commencement at Brandon Station, on the Canadian Pacific Railway, to Battleford, about 450 miles.

3. Resolved, That it is expedient to authorize the Governor in Council to grant to the Wood Mountain and Qu'Appelle Railway Company, Dominion Lands to an extent not exceeding six thousand four hundred acres for each mile of the Company's Railway from its commencement at or near a point in Township number four in Range number thirty, west of the second principal meridian, to the point where it will join the Manitoba and North-Western Railway, about 240 miles.

Mr. Chapleau presented,-Return (in part) to an Order of The House, of the 1st ultimo, for Statements from all Revising Officers in regard to the arrangements made by them for the printing of the Voters' Lists in their respective Electoral Divisions, showing whether tenders were called for, for such printing, or written contracts entered into for its performance, with copies of such contracts; names of parties with whom agreements (written or verbal) were made for such printing, and number of times lists are to be printed; stating rates allowed, per name or otherwise, number of names on first list, whether first list is printed by polling sub-divisions or not, manner of making alterations and additions after first printing, and all other details of such arrangements, agreements and contracts for printing said lists.

The following Bills were severally read the third time, and passed, viz.:-Bill No. 143 to authorize the construction of a Railway from the Straits of Canso, as a Public Work;—and

Bill No. 144 respecting certain Subsidies for a Railway from Metapediac, on the Intercolonial Railway, to Paspebiac. (On a division.)

The Resolutions adopted in Committee of the Whole, yesterday respecting, the granting of subsidies to Railway Companies and towards the construction of certain Railways, were reported, read a second time and agreed to.

Mr. Pope then introduced a Bill No. 146 to authorise the granting of the subsidies therein mentioned, for and in aid of the construction of certain Railways, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading, on Monday next.

The Resolutions adopted in Committee of the Whole, yesterday, respecting the granting of Dominion Lands to Railway Companies in Manitoba and the North West Territories, were reported, read a second time, and agreed to.

Mr. White (Cardwell) then introduced a Bill No. 147 to authorize the grant of certain subsidies in land for the construction of the Railways therein mentioned, which was read the first time, and ordered for a second reading, on Monday next.

Mr. McLelan moved, That Mr. Speaker do now leave the Chair, for the House

to go again into Committee of Supply.

Sir Richard Cartwright moved in amendment thereto, That all the words after "That" be left out, in order to add the following :-- "the expenditure for the Dominion of Canada for the year ending 30th June, 1878, was \$23,503,158.

That the expenditure for the fiscal year 1884 was \$31,107,756.

That the expenditure for the fiscal year 1885 was \$35,037,060, including \$1,700,000 for war expenses.

That the estimated expenditure for the present year up to 30th June, 1886,

is \$38,126,413, including \$3, 100,000 for war expenses.

That the estimated expenditure for the year ending 30th June, 1887, is \$34,220,379, exclusive of any Supplementary Estimates which may be proposed next Session.

That the fixed charges for interest, sinking fund and subsidies, together with the charges for collection of revenues, amounted to \$16,970,647 for the fiscal year

That the similar charges for the year 1885 amounted to \$22,442,231, and are estimated at \$22,508,469 for the year 1886, and \$23,079,082 for the year 1887.

That the total taxation for the fiscal year 1878 was \$17,841,938, and for 1885

was \$25,384,529.

That the estimated taxation for 1886 is \$26,000,000, and \$27,200,000 for 1887. That the actual deficit in the fiscal year 1885 was \$2,240,059, including \$1,700,000 for war expenses, and that the deficit for 1886 is estimated at \$4,900,000, including

\$3,400,000 for war expenses.

That the growth of taxation and expenditure from 1878 to 1886 is out of all proportion to the growth of trade and population and has attained such dimensions as greatly to hamper and impede the progress of the Dominion, and that the lavish outlay and the methods of expenditure and indifference to the increase of liabilities on the part of the Government during the above-mentioned period have contributed very largely to corrupt and demoralize the public service and to impair the independence of Parliament; -which was negatived on the following division:-

And also,—Return to an Order of The House, of the 4th March last, for a Return showing the number of men employed on the Intercolonial Railway between Campbellton and Halifax and between St. John and Shediac, including the men employed at the different stations, specifying the number at each station and the men employed on the machine shops at Moncton; the number and names of men dismissed or discharged from the employment of the Railway since first October last, and the several causes of such dismissal or discharges; also any reduction of wages payable to the employees or any of them since the first day of October last.

Mr. Costigan presented,—Return to an Address to His Excellency the Governor-General, of the 29th March last, for a Return of particulars of any claim made by John Heney, of Ottawa, for a refund of tolls paid by him upon vessels or wood passing through the Government Canals, together with copies of all Orders in Council passed by the Government in relation to such claim, and copies of all correspondence between the Government and the said John Heney, or any other person, respecting such claims for refund.

Mr. Colby moved, That the Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Library of Parliament, be now concurred in;

On motion of Mr. Bergin, the Tenth Report of the Joint Committee of both Houses on the Printing of Parliament, was concurred in.

The amendments made by the Senate to the Bill No. 136 further to amend the Act respecting Fishing by Foreign Vessels, were severally taken into consideration, and concurred in.

The Bill No. 146 to authorize the granting of the Subsidies therein mentioned for, and in aid of the construction of certain Railways, was read the second time, considered in Committee of the Whole, reported with amendments, considered as amended, read the third time, and passed.

A Message was received from the Senate, agreeing to the consequential amendament to the Bill No. 15 further to amend "An Act respecting Insolvent Banks, Insurance Companies, Loan Companies, Building Societies and Trading Corporations," without amendment.

And,-agreeing to the following Bills, without amendment, viz. :-

Bill No. 142 to make further provision respecting grants of land to members of the Militia Force on active service in the North-West.

Bill No. 143 to authorize the construction of a Railway from the Straits of Canso

Bill No. 144 respecting certain Subsidies for a Railway from Metapediac, on the Intercolonial Railway, to Paspebiac.

Then the Honorable the Speaker of the House of Commons addressed His Excellency the Governor-General as follows:—

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY:-

"The Commons of Canada have voted the Supplies required to enable the Government to defray the expenses of the Public Service.

"In the name of the Commons, I present to Your Excellency the following Bill:-

'An Act for granting to Her Majesty certain sums of money required for defraying certain expenses of the Public Service for the financial years ending respectively the 30th June, 1886, and the 30th June, 1887. and for other purposes relating to the Public Service,'

to which Bill I humbly request Your Excellency's assent."

To this Bill the Royal Assent was signified in the following words:-

"In Her Majesty's name, His Excellency the Governor-General thanks Her Loyal subjects, accepts their benevolence, and assents to this Bill."

After which His Excellency the Governor General was pleased to close the Fourth Session of the Fifth Parliament of the Dominion with the following Speech:—

Honourable Gentlemen of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I desire to convey to you my best thanks for the earnestness and assiduity with which you have performed your important duties.

The legislation of the Session has been of an eminently practical character, and

cannot fail to aid in the promotion of the material progress of the Country.

The grant of representation in the House of Commons to the North-West Territories will, if sanctioned by the Imperial Parliament (of which there is no reason to doubt), give the people of that vast region an interest and voice in the affairs of the Dominion, and enable them to lay the wants and requirements of their young country, with authority, before the great council of the nation.

You have at the same time conferred upon them the boons of an efficient judicial

system and a speedy and inexpensive mode for the transfer of property in land.

The measure for the establishment of a Central Experimental Farm, with auxiliary stations for the Provinces, will be greatly appreciated by our agricultural population.

I congratulate you heartily on the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway and on the repayment in money and land of the advances made in its aid from the

public Treasury.

The future prosperity of this great enterprise and the consequent advantage to the best interests of the Dominion I now consider as fully assured.

The appropriations in aid of various railways will tend largely to increase the trade and develop the resources of the districts traversed by them, and I am especially pleased to know that by the provision made for the construction of a Railway through Cape Breton, that historical Island will at last be brought into connection with the Railway System of Canada.

Among the many useful measures you have passed may especially be noticed the amendments of the Franchise Act. rendering its working more simple and less expensive; the Consolidation of the Statutes; the arrangement for the organization of a better and more economical system of Parliamentary and Departmental Printing;

and the amendment of the Dominion Lands Act.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons:

I thank you in Her Majesty's name for the supplies you have granted for the public service.

Honourable Gentlemen and Gentlemen:

In bidding you farewell until next year, I rejoice to be able to congratulate you on the general prosperity of the Country and the good promise of a plentiful harvest.

The Parliament of the Dominion of Canada was then prorogued until Monday, the twelfth day of July next.
