


#### ECLIPSES IN 1880.

In the year 1880 there will be four Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

1. A total eclipse of the Sun, January 11, 1880, invisible at St. John. Begins on the Earth generally, Jan. 11, 3h. 36.3m. A, mean time at St. John, in longitude 153° 44′ E of Greenwich, and latitude 4° 33′ N.

Central Eclipse begins generally Jan. 11, 4h. 39.6m. A, in longitude 142°

20' E of Greenwich, and latitude 15° 18' S.

Central Eclipse at noon, Jan. 11, 6h. 24m. A, in longitude 160° W of Greenwich, and latitude 10° 24′ S.

Central Eclipse ends generally Jan. 11, 7h. 40.3m. A, in longitude 109° 47'

W of Greenwich, and latitude 41° 41' N.

Ends on Earth generally Jan. 11, 8h 43.6m, A, in longitude 118° 56' W of Greenwich, and latitude 31° 27' N.

2. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, June 22, 1880, invisible at St. John.

First contact with Penumbra, June 22, 6h 53.9m. M. Shadow, 7h 50.6m. " 9h 7.5m. " Beginning of total phase, " 9h 25.9m. " " Middle of the Eclipse, 9h 44.3m. End of total phase, " " 11h 1.2m. Last contact with the Shadow, " " 11h 57.9m. Penumbra,

3. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 7, 1880, invisible at St. John.

Begins on the Earth generally July 7, 6h 18.8m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 59° 37′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 22° 47′ S.

Central Eclipse begins generally July 7, 8h 6.8m. M, mean time at St. John,

in longitude 64° 55′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 51° 51′ S.

Central Eclipse, at noon, July 7, 9h 10.4m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 22° 28′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 52° 30′ S.

Central Eclipse ends generally July 7, 9h 25.3m. M, mean time at St. John,

in longitude 8° 10' W of Greenwich, and latitude 66° 34' S.

Ends on the Earth generally July 7, 11h 13.2m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 12° 44′ E of Greenwich, and latitude 44° 43′ S.

4. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 1, 1880, invisible at St. John. Begins on the Earth generally December 1, 10h 20.5m. A, mean time at St. John, in longitude 13° 17′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 65° 1′ S.

Greatest Eclipse, December 1, 10h 46.9m. A, mean time at St. John, in

longitude 42° 43′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 67° 56′ S.

Ends on the Earth generally December 1, 11h 13.4m. A, mean time at St. John, in longitude 74° 18′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 67° 10′ S.

5. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, December 16, 1880, invisible at St. John.

First contact with Penumbra, Dec. 16, 8h 7.3m M.

"Shadow, "9h 20.3m M.

Beginning of total phase, "10h 29.8m M.

Middle of Eclipse, "11h 14.6m M.

End of total phase. "11h 59.4m M.

Last contact with Shadow, "1h 8.9m A.

"Penumbra, "2h 21.9m A.

6. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 31, 1880, visible at St. John, when the Sun will rise eclipsed.

Begins on the Earth generally December, 31, 7h 35.4m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 71° 44′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 35° 31′ N.

Greatest Eclipse, December 31, 9h 20.5m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 49° 29′ W of Greenwich, and latitude 65° 8′ N. Magnitude (Sun's diameter 1), 0.712.

Ends on the Earth generally December 31, 11h 4.5m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 5° 44′ E of Greenwich, and latitude 52° 11′ N.

#### EXPLANATORY.

Aphelion-That point of a Planet's orbit farthest from the Sun.

Apogee—That part of the Moon's orbit farthest from the Earth.

Astronomical Day is reckoned from noon to noon through the 24 hours. Thus July 21, 9h, is 9h A of July 21, and July 21, 15h, is 3h m of July 22.

Conjunction—A Planet directly between the Earth and the Sun is said to be in Inferior Conjunction with the Sun. A Planet with the Sun directly between it and the Earth is said to be in Superior Conjunction with the Sun. Planets are said to be in conjunction with each other, or with the Moon, when they are in the same sign and degree.

Declination—The distance of a heavenly body from the Equinoctial, measured north or south, in degrees or minutes, on a Meridian.

Ecliptic-The plane of the Earth's orbit, so called because Eclipses can take place only when the Moon is on or near it.

Elongation—The distance of a Planet from the Sun as seen from the Earth.

Equinoctial—The circle in the heavens traced by the Earth's Equator.

Node—That part of the orbit of a heavenly body which intersects the Ecliptic. If the body is passing from south to north, it is called the Ascending Node; if from north to south, the Descending.

Opposition—A Planet with the Earth directly between it and the Sun is said

to be in Opposition to the Sun.

Penumbra-That portion of space around the shadow of the Earth, passing through which the Moon diminishes in brightness, in consequence of a part only of the Sun's rays reaching her surface.

Perigee—That part of the Moon's orbit nearest to the Earth. Perihelion—That part of a Planet's orbit nearest to the Sun.

Quadrature—Two heavenly bodies are said to be in Quadrature when they are distant from each other by one-fourth of the Zodiac, or three signs apart. The Sun's Declination and fast or slow of clock are given for apparent noon, or time of passing the Meridian of St. John.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical time for the Meridian passage at St. John; and her Declination, when on the Meridian.

The Rising of the Moon is given from Full Moon to New Moon; and the Setting, from New Moon to Full Moon.

The Tides in the Calendar are the Morning and Afternoon Tides at St. John and Charlottetown. In the Tide Table (page 12) will be found Constants for finding the approximate time of High Water at each of the places given in the Table.

It will sometimes be found that when a Constant is added to the time of High Water at the Port of reference the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case substract 12 hours from the sum and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required Port on the succeeding afternoon or morning, according as the Tide at Port of reference was a Morning or Afternoon Tide.

If a Constant to be subtracted is greater than the time of Tide taken from the table add 12 hours, then subtract the Constant, and the remainder will be the time on the previous morning or afternoon, according as the Tide from the Table was afternoon or morning.

#### FORECASTING THE WEATHER.

Men have, from a very early period, studied the weather, on account of its great influence on their pursuits, in order if possible to predict its nature and prevent those losses to the farmer and the sailor which result from violent storms.

The earlier students based their predictions on the phases of the Moon, but an examination of the Greenwich observations for more than half a century has shown that this theory is entirely unfounded. Weather prophets like Moore, Zadkiel and Venner claim in their Almanacs to be able to forecast the weather day by day for a whole year; but meteorological science in the British Isles, and the Signal Service of the United States, with the Weather Bureau of the Dominion, does not claim to forecast, with any certainty, the weather for more than three or four days at the most.

If an observer could obtain, at regular and repeated intervals, readings of the Barometer at stations distributed over a large area he would be enabled to trace the march of the storm, for it has been found that the wind always blows towards the place of the lowest barometer reading; and so, by means of the telegraph, he may warn those places the storm is approaching. Still, mistakes are often made, and the forecasts are not always infallible, so that much remains to be done before meteorology can be ranked among the exact sciences.

The Act also authorises the appointment of a Clerk for each Court, who shall be an Attorney. The sittings of the respective courts shall be held at or

near the County Court House in the shire town.

The County Courts have not cognizance of any action— 1st. When the title to land is brought in question; or,

2nd. In which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation is disputed, except as hereinafter mentioned; or,

3rd. For criminal conversation or seduction; or,

4th. For breach of promise of marriage; or,

5th. Of any action against a Justice of the Peace for anything done by him

in the execution of his office.

Subject to the above, the County Courts have jurisdiction, and may hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant, and assumpsit, when the debt or damages do not exceed the sum of two hundred dollars; and in actions on bail bonds given to a Sheriff in any case in a County Court, whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

If insufficiently paid, not less than one rate, double the amount of the deficient postage will be charged on delivery, except letters for the United States, which must be fully prepaid.

Whale's Back Light; latitude 43° 3′ 30′′ N; longitude 70° 41′ 48′′ W; old tower white, new tower natural granite color; fixed light, varied by white flashes, visible 13 miles; flashes once in 1½ minutes. Also, a bell, struck by machinery 4 times a minute, located in the old tower; both to be left on starboard hand going into Portsmouth.

Partsmouth Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 14 miles; on left side of inner entrance to Portsmouth harbor.

Newburyport Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; Also, a beacon, range of light, 336 feet in front of main light; black tower; fixed white light, visible 8 miles. These lights, in range, guide across the bar, in best water; bar constantly changes; outer bar buoy is in range with inner bar buoy and both lights; the beacon is moved as the channel changes. This station is on the north end of Plum Island, and on the south side of entrance to the Merrimac River, Mass. (Strangers should not attempt to enter.)

Newburyport Upper Harbor; two lights (beacons); outer beacon, black tower, fixed red light, visible 10 miles; inner beacon, red tower, fixed green light, visible 12 miles; both on Bailey's wharf, and to be left on the port side passing up the harbor.

Ipswich Lights; a main light, with a range light in front; main light, fixed, varied by white flashes, visible 11 miles, flashing once in 1½ minutes, shown from a white tower; range light, fixed, white, visible 8 miles, shown from a black tower; the lights are 625 feet apart, N E ½ E and S W ½ W; in range, they guide to entrance of channel across Ipswich Bar in best water; on Castle Neck, south side of entrance to Ipswich River.

Annisquam Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; a harbor of refuge for small vessels; on Wigwam Point, east side of entrance to Annisquam harbor; 6 feet of water on Squam Bar at low tide. To cross the bar, bring the light to bear south and run for it, leaving it on the port side; then run for the Lobster Rock Beacon, and leave it on the port side also.

Bearings—Isle of Shoals bears N, 17 miles; Boon Island N N E, 30 miles; Gloueester Light S W by W \ W, 6 miles; Long Island Light S W by

#### Plain Glass, at J. H. PULLEN'S, 14 Horsfield street.

W, 24 miles; Cape Cod Highland Light S by E \ E, 43 miles; London Ledge S E by E, \ mile; Salvage Ledge N N E, 1\ miles. Also, a 10 inch steam whistle, giving each minute a blast of 8 seconds and a blast of 4 seconds, with

an interval of 4 seconds between them.

Gloucester Harbor Light, on Eastern Point; on east side of entrance to Gloucester harbor; white tower; fixed red light, visible 9 miles. When coming from the Eastward, bound into Gloucester harbor, give the light a good berth to clear Eastern Point Ledge (spar buoy); then, when the light bears N E \( \frac{3}{4} \) N, run N W \( \frac{1}{2} \) N until the upper harbor light bears N E by N \( \frac{1}{4} \) N, then run for it, and anchor \( \frac{1}{4} \) mile S by W from the light. Also, a bell on Eastern Point, rung by machinery, striking two blows each half minute.

Glowester Upper Harbor Light, on Ten Pound Island, east side of entrance to inner harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to enter harbor, bring this light to bear NE by N \( \) N, and run for it until Eastern Point light bears S\( \) W, then run N\( \) E till Ten Pound Island light bears

ESE, (anchor), or run NE by E ? E to the inner harbor.

Boker's Island Lights; latitude 42° 32′ 10′′ N; longitude 70° 47′ 10′′ W; two white towers, ranging S E and N W; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; located on the north end of Baker's Island, south side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbors. In coming from the Southward, and bound to Salem, keep the lowest light open to the east of the high light, and run for it; this guides to the eastward of the South-east Breakers and Searl's Rock. Give Baker's Island a wide berth, leaving it on the port hand, then run for Hospital Point light, bearing W by N ½ N; now, Salem harbor is to the W S W of you, and Beverly harbor W by N ½ N. Also, on Baker's Island a bell which strikes two quick blows each half minute.

Hospital Point; grey tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; on Hospital

Point, north side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbor.

Fort Pickering Light; red tower; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; on Winter Island, north side of entrance to Salem harbor. On entering Salem harbor from near Hospital Point, get Derby Wharf light in range with Fort Pickering light to clear the Haste Shoal; good anchorage half a mile S W by S from this light, with Derby Wharf light bearing W by S.

Derby Wharf Light; on the end of Derby Wharf, Salem upper harbor; red

tower; fixed red light, visible 9 miles.

Marblehead Light, on Marblehead Neck, south side of entrance to Marblehead, and to Salem South Channel; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; good anchorage half a mile W by S from this light. To enter harbor, after passing Half-way Rock, bring this light to bear W by N ½ N and run for it until the light bears S W half a mile, then run N W until the light bears S by W, then run S W ½ W into the harbor.

Egg Rock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles; guide to Swampscot anchorage and to Broad Sound. Leave it 13 miles on the starboard

hand on entering Broad Sound.

Minot's Ledge Light; latitude 42° 16′ 9″ N; longitude 70° 45′ 34″ W; entrance to Boston Bay; granite tower, natural color, 100 feet high; fixed white light, visible 17 miles. Davis's Ledge Buoy bears E by S; Boston light bears N W ½ W, 7 miles. This course must be kept good, northerly, to pass Bell Boat, off the north side of the Hardings Ledge (about 4¾ miles from

Minot's Ledge Light).) A good mark to clear the Hardings Bell Boat, after passing Minot's light, is to keep Long Island Head light (fixed white) just open to the north of the Narrows light, which is a red light.

Boston Light; latitude 42° 19′ 39′′ N; longitude 70° 53′ 25′′ W; on Little Brewster Island, north side of entrance to main ship channel to Boston; white tower; white flash light, flashing once every half minute, visible 17 miles. When the light bears north one half mile, run west until Long Isle light just opens out south of the Narrows light, then run for it, leaving the Narrows light on the starboard hand. Also, an air trumpet, giving blasts of 7 seconds, followed by interval of 43 seconds.

Narrows Light; brown house; fixed red light, on the right hand side of Narrows, in ship channel entrance to Boston harbor. When this light bears north, run N W  $\frac{1}{2}$  W until the east side of Galloup's Island bears S by W, then run N W by N until Long Island light bears W by S  $\frac{1}{2}$  S.

Long Island Light; on the NE end of Long Island and southern side of entrance to Boston inno harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 16 miles. In coming up ship channel, and after leaving Nix Mate buoy on the port hand, and Long Island light bears W by S \ S, run W by N \ N for the south end of the Castle until the Castle North Wharf bears N W by W ? W, or abreast of the State Ledge Buoy (red, No. 3), then NW 1/2 N to the Upper Middle Buoy (black No. 9), which leave on port hand, then the course to Long Wharf is N W & W. But if approaching Boston from Cape Ann, via Broad Sound, bring Long Island light to bear S W by W, and run for it until Deer Island Point Beacon bears N W by N & N three-eighths of a mile distant, then W by N | N up the harbor. Strangers should bear in mind that in the middle of Broad Sound there is but 8 feet of water at low tide; but by keeping on the southern side of the Sound, leaving the Graves Automatic Buoy half a mile on the port hand and the Devil's Limb Baoy (a black can buoy No. 1) & mile on port hand, and running straight to Ram's Head Buoy (black can No. 5) about WSW passing Aldrich's Ledge Buoy (black can No. 3 1 mile on port), then leaving Ram's Head Buoy 50 yards distant on port, and run about W & S to clear Deer Island Point Beacon, you can carry 14 feet safely.

#### Port Charges---Rates of Pilotage.

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John.

One dollar per foot for bringing any ship or vessel into the harbor of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside

one of the wharves; and one dollar per foot for removing and taking any ship or vessel out of the harbor.

In cases where pilots shall be detained on board vessels, under and by virtue of the quarantine or health laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from masters of such vessels the sum of two dollars per day for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance.

Coasting vessels going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British steamboats, or British vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the

rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates:—For vessels not exceeding 100 tons, \$1.50; for vessels over 100 tons and not exceeding 200 tons, \$2; for vessels over 200 tons and not exceeding 300 tons, \$3; and for all vessels over 300 tons and not exceeding 400 tons \$4; and 25 cents for every 50 tons such vessel may measure over 400 tons.

CEMENT FOR BROKEN CHINA, GLASS, &c. - Dissolve half an ounce of gum acacia in a wineglass of boiling water: add plaster of Paris sufficient to form a thick paste, and apply it with a brush to the parts required to be cemented together. Being colorless, this recipe possesses advantages which liquid glue

CEMENT FOR LEATHER AND CLOTH.—An adhesive material for uniting the parts of boots and shoes, and for the seams of articles of clothing, may be made thus: Take one pound of gutta percha, four ounces of India rubber, two ounces of pitch, one ounce of shellac, two ounces of oil. Melt the ingredients

To CLEAR Rose TREES FROM BLIGHT.—Take sulphur and tobacco dust in equal quantities, and strew it over the trees of a morning when the dew is on them. The insects will disappear in a few days. The trees should then be

To PRESERVE TABLES. - A piece of oil-cloth (about twenty inches long) is a useful appendage to a common sitting-room. Kept in the closet it can be available at any time to place jars upon, &c., &c., which are likely to soil your table during the process of dispensing their contents: a wing and duster

GILT FRAMES may be protected from flies and dust by oiled tarlatan pinned over them. Tarlatan, already prepared, may be purchased at the upholster-If it cannot be procured, it is easily made by brushing boiled oil over cheap tarlatan. It is an excellent material for keeping dust from books, vases, wool work, and every description of household ornament.

LAMP WICKS.—Old cotton stocking may be made into lamp wicks, and will answer very well.

GLASS should be washed in cold water, which gives it a brighter and clearer look than when cleansed with warm water.

GLASS VESSELS, and other utensils, may be purified and cleaned by rinsing them out with powdered charcoal.

SILVER AND PLATED WARE should be washed with a sponge and warm soapsuds every day after using, and wiped dry with a clean soft towel.

To Clean Knives and Forks.—Wash the blades in warm (but not hot) water, and afterwards rub them lightly over with powdered rotten-stone wet to a paste with a little cold water, then polish them with a clean cloth.

FRUIT STAINS IN LINEN.—To remove them, rub the part on each side with yellow soap, then tie up a piece of pearlash in the cloth, &c., and soak well in hot water, or boil: afterwards expose the stained part to the sun and air until removed.

MILDEWED LINEN may be restored by soaping the spots while wet, covering them with fine chalk scraped to powder, and rubbing it well in.

TO KEEP MOTHS, BEETLES, &c., FROM CLOTHES.—Put a piece of camphor in a linen bag, or some aromatic herbs, in the drawers, among linen or woolen clothes, and neither moth or worm will come near them.

CLOTHES CLOSETS that have become infested with moths should be well rubbed with a strong decoction of tobacco, and repeatedly sprinkled with spirits of camphor.

SCALD your woodenware often, and keep your tin-ware dry.

TO TAKE GREASE OUT OF VELVET OR CLOTH.—Procure some turpentine and pour it over the part that is greasy; rub it till quite dry with a piece of clean flannel; if the grease be not quite removed, repeat the application, and when done, brush the part well, and hang up the garment in the open air to take away the smell.

Economy.—If you have a strip of land, do not throw away Soap-suds. Both Ashes and Soap-suds are good manure for bushes and young plants.

WOOLLEN CLOTHES should be washed in very hot suds, and not rinsed. Lukewarm water shrinks them.

CAUTION.—Do not let Coffee and Tea stand in tin.

SEE THAT NOTHING IS THROWN AWAY which might have served to nourish your own family or a poorer one.

As FAR AS POSSIBLE, have pieces of bread eaten up before they become hard; spread those that are not eaten, and let them dry, to be pounded for puddings, or soaked for broth.

LINEN RAGS should be carefully saved, for they are extremely useful in sickness. If they have become dirty and worn by cleaning silver, &c., wash them and scrape them into lint.

A Bonner and Trimmings may be worn a much longer time, if the dust be brushed well off after walking.

Apples intended for dumplings should not have the core taken out of them, as the pips impart a delicious flavor to the dumpling.

BLACKING FOR LEATHER SEATS, &c.—Beat well the yolks of two eggs and the white of one; mix a tablespoonful of gin and a teaspoonful of sugar, thicken it with ivory black, add it to the eggs, and use as a common blacking; the seats or cushions being left a day or two to harden. This is a good dressing for boots and shoes.

FOR VENTILATION open your windows both at to and bottom. The fresh air rushes in one way, while the foul air makes its exit the other. This is letting in your friend and expelling your enemy.
