In the year 1880 there will be four Eclipses of the Sun and two of the Moon.

1. A total eclipse of the Sun, January 11, 1880, invisible at St. John. Begins on the Earth generally, Jan. 11, 3h. 36.3m. A, mean time at St. John, in longitude $153^{\circ} 44'$ E of Greenwich, and latitude $4^{\circ} 33'$ N.

Central Eclipse begins generally Jan. 11, 4h. 39.6m. A, in longitude $142^{\circ} 20'$ E of Greenwich, and latitude $15^{\circ} 18'$ S.

Central Eclipse at noon, Jan. 11, 6h. 24m. A, in longitude 160° W of Greenwich, and latitude $10^{\circ} 24'$ S.

Central Eclipse ends generally Jan. 11, 7h. 40.3m. A, in longitude $109^{\circ} 47'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $41^{\circ} 41'$ N.

Ends on Earth generally Jan. 11, 8h 43.6m, A, in longitude $118^{\circ} 56'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $31^{\circ} 27'$ N.

2. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, June 22, 1880, invisible at St. John.

First contact with Penumbra, June 22, 6h 53.9m. M.

Beginning of total phase, “ “ 9h 7.5m. “

Middle of the Eclipse, “ “ 9h 25.9m. “

End of total phase, “ “ 9h 44.3m. “

3. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, July 7, 1880, invisible at St. John.

Begins on the Earth generally July 7, 6h 18.8m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude $59^{\circ} 37'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $22^{\circ} 47'$ S.

Central Eclipse begins generally July 7, 8h 6.8m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude $64^{\circ} 55'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $51^{\circ} 51'$ S.

Central Eclipse, at noon, July 7, 9h 10.4m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude $22^{\circ} 28'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $52^{\circ} 30'$ S.

Central Eclipse ends generally July 7, 9h 25.3m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude $8^{\circ} 10'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $66^{\circ} 34'$ S.

Ends on the Earth generally July 7, 11h 13.2m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude $12^{\circ} 44'$ E of Greenwich, and latitude $44^{\circ} 43'$ S.

4. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 1, 1880, invisible at St. John.

Begins on the Earth generally December 1, 10h 20.5m. A, mean time at St. John, in longitude $13^{\circ} 17'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $65^{\circ} 1'$ S.

Greatest Eclipse, December 1, 10h 46.9m. A, mean time at St. John, in longitude $42^{\circ} 43'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $67^{\circ} 56'$ S.

Ends on the Earth generally December 1, 11h 13.4m. A, mean time at St. John, in longitude $74^{\circ} 18'$ W of Greenwich, and latitude $67^{\circ} 10'$ S.

5. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, December 16, 1880, invisible at St. John.

First contact with Penumbra, Dec. 16, 8h 7.3m M.

“ “ “ Shadow, “ 9h 20.3m M.

Beginning of total phase, “ 10h 29.8m M.

Middle of Eclipse, “ 11h 14.6m M.

End of total phase, “ 11h 59.4m M.

Last contact with Shadow, “ 1h 8.9m A.

“ “ “ Penumbra, “ 2h 21.9m A.

6. A partial Eclipse of the Sun, December 31, 1880, visible at St. John, when the Sun will rise eclipsed.

Begins on the Earth generally December, 31, 7h 35.4m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 71° 44' W of Greenwich, and latitude 35° 31' N.

Greatest Eclipse, December 31, 9h 20.5m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 49° 29' W of Greenwich, and latitude 65° 8' N. Magnitude (Sun's diameter 1), 0.712.

Ends on the Earth generally December 31, 11h 4.5m. M, mean time at St. John, in longitude 5° 44' E of Greenwich, and latitude 52° 11' N.

EXPLANATORY.

Aphelion—That point of a Planet's orbit farthest from the Sun.

Apogee—That part of the Moon's orbit farthest from the Earth.

Astronomical Day is reckoned from noon to noon through the 24 hours. Thus July 21, 9h, is 9h A of July 21, and July 21, 15h, is 3h M of July 22.

Conjunction—A Planet directly between the Earth and the Sun is said to be in Inferior Conjunction with the Sun. A Planet with the Sun directly between it and the Earth is said to be in Superior Conjunction with the Sun. Planets are said to be in conjunction with each other, or with the Moon, when they are in the same sign and degree.

Declination—The distance of a heavenly body from the Equinoctial, measured north or south, in degrees or minutes, on a Meridian.

Ecliptic—The plane of the Earth's orbit, so called because Eclipses can take place only when the Moon is on or near it.

Elongation—The distance of a Planet from the Sun as seen from the Earth.

Equinoctial—The circle in the heavens traced by the Earth's Equator.

Node—That part of the orbit of a heavenly body which intersects the Ecliptic. If the body is passing from south to north, it is called the Ascending Node; if from north to south, the Descending.

Opposition—A Planet with the Earth directly between it and the Sun is said to be in Opposition to the Sun.

Penumbra—That portion of space around the shadow of the Earth, passing through which the Moon diminishes in brightness, in consequence of a part only of the Sun's rays reaching her surface.

Perigee—That part of the Moon's orbit nearest to the Earth.

Perihelion—That part of a Planet's orbit nearest to the Sun.

Quadrature—Two heavenly bodies are said to be in Quadrature when they are distant from each other by one-fourth of the Zodiac, or three signs apart.

The Sun's Declination and fast or slow of clock are given for apparent noon, or time of passing the Meridian of St. John.

The Moon's Southing is given in Astronomical time for the Meridian passage at St. John; and her Declination, when on the Meridian.

The Rising of the Moon is given from Full Moon to New Moon; and the Setting, from New Moon to Full Moon.

The Tides in the Calendar are the Morning and Afternoon Tides at St. John and Charlottetown. In the Tide Table (page 12) will be found Constants for finding the approximate time of High Water at each of the places given in the Table.

It will sometimes be found that when a Constant is added to the time of High Water at the Port of reference the sum exceeds 12 hours; in this case subtract 12 hours from the sum and the remainder will be the time of High Water at the required Port on the succeeding afternoon or morning, according as the Tide at Port of reference was a Morning or Afternoon Tide.

EXAMPLE.

High Water at St. John, Feb. 26,	11h 58m A
Moncton, add	54
	12 52
Subtract,	12
High Water at Moncton, Feb. 27,	0h 52m M

If a Constant to be subtracted is greater than the time of Tide taken from the table add 12 hours, then subtract the Constant, and the remainder will be the time on the previous morning or afternoon, according as the Tide from the Table was afternoon or morning.

EXAMPLE.

High Water at Charlottetown, July 11,	1h 12m M
Add,	12 00

FORECASTING THE WEATHER.

Men have, from a very early period, studied the weather, on account of its great influence on their pursuits, in order if possible to predict its nature and prevent those losses to the farmer and the sailor which result from violent storms.

The earlier students based their predictions on the phases of the Moon, but an examination of the Greenwich observations for more than half a century has shown that this theory is entirely unfounded. Weather prophets like Moore, Zadkiel and Venner claim in their Almanacs to be able to forecast the weather day by day for a whole year; but meteorological science in the British Isles, and the Signal Service of the United States, with the Weather Bureau of the Dominion, does not claim to forecast, with any certainty, the weather for more than three or four days at the most.

If an observer could obtain, at regular and repeated intervals, readings of the Barometer at stations distributed over a large area he would be enabled to trace the march of the storm, for it has been found that the wind always blows towards the place of the lowest barometer reading; and so, by means of the telegraph, he may warn those places the storm is approaching. Still, mistakes are often made, and the forecasts are not always infallible, so that much remains to be done before meteorology can be ranked among the exact sciences.

The Court sits at any place within the Province to be appointed by any three of the members; the Governor, Chief Justice, or one of the Judges of the Supreme Court, or Judge of Admiralty, being one.

PROBATE COURT for the City and County of Saint John is held every Friday at three o'clock at the Registry Office.

County Courts.

The Courts are established by 30th Victoria, cap. 10, passed June 17, 1867. The Act authorizes the appointment of one Judge for the counties of Charlotte, Carleton, and Victoria; one Judge for the counties of Albert, Westmorland,

and Kent; one Judge for the counties of Northumberland, Gloucester, and Restigouche; and one Judge for the counties of Kings and St. John—provided that said Court for the county of St. John shall not have or exercise any jurisdiction in any cause in which the City Court in and for the city of St. John, or the Police Court in the town of Portland, in the county of St. John, have or claim jurisdiction.

The Act also authorises the appointment of a Clerk for each Court, who shall be an Attorney. The sittings of the respective courts shall be held at or near the County Court House in the shire town.

The County Courts have not cognizance of any action—

- 1st. When the title to land is brought in question; or,
- 2nd. In which the validity of any devise, bequest, or limitation is disputed, except as hereinafter mentioned; or,
- 3rd. For criminal conversation or seduction; or,
- 4th. For breach of promise of marriage; or,
- 5th. Of any action against a Justice of the Peace for anything done by him in the execution of his office.

Subject to the above, the County Courts have jurisdiction, and may hold plea in all personal actions of debt, covenant, and assumpsit, when the debt or damages do not exceed the sum of two hundred dollars; and in actions on bail bonds given to a Sheriff in any case in a County Court, whatever may be the penalty or amount sought to be recovered.

Sittings of the County Courts.

The Courts hold Terms every year in each County, which Terms annually commence as follows:

Charlotte County—On the second Tuesday in the month of June; on the fourth Tuesday in March and October.

Carleton County—On the second Tuesday in March and December, and the second Tuesday in July.

Victoria County—On the fourth Wednesday in June, and the third Wednesday in November; and on the first Tuesday in December for return of executions only.

York County—On the second Tuesday in January, third Tuesday in March, and first Tuesday in June and October.

Sunbury County—On the third Tuesday in the months of January and June, and on the Wednesday next after the second Tuesday in October.

Queen's County—On the fourth Tuesday in January and June, and on the third Tuesday in October.

King's County—On the first Tuesday in January, April, July and October.

St. John County—On the fourth Tuesday in the months of January, April, July and October.

Albert County—On the third Tuesday in June, and on the second Tuesday in November.

Westmorland County—On the first Tuesday in June, and the second Tuesday in September and December, and on the first Tuesday in March; the September term only for return of executions.

Kent County—On the third Tuesday in January, on the last Tuesday in April, and on the first Tuesday in July, and fourth Tuesday in October.

A steam fog whistle situated 100 yards west of lighthouse sounds 10 seconds in each minute, with an interval of 50 seconds between each blast; it should be heard from 3 to 11 miles, according to the state of the weather.

Richibucto Head, on Headland. Latitude $46^{\circ} 39m 40s$; longitude $64^{\circ} 42m 30s$; fixed white light, visible 14 miles; white square tower, 70 feet above high water.

Cassid's Point, on Point. Latitude $46^{\circ} 19m 15s$; longitude $64^{\circ} 30m 20s$; revolving white light every half minute, visible 14 miles; white square tower, 40 feet above high water.

Shediac Island. Latitude $46^{\circ} 15m 20s$; longitude $64^{\circ} 31m 50s$; two fixed white lights, visible 10 miles; white tower, 48 and 56 feet above high water. Beacons.

Shediac Harbor, Point du Chene Wharf. Latitude $46^{\circ} 14m 20s$; longitude $64^{\circ} 31m 0s$; fixed white light, visible 6 miles, 15 feet above high water.

Jourimain, on Cape. Latitude $46^{\circ} 10m 0s$; longitude $63^{\circ} 48m 30s$; flashing white light every 10 seconds, visible 14 miles; white octagonal tower, 72 feet above high water; visible from S W round N to W.

on the west side of the entrance to Eastport and the St. Croix river, via Lubec Narrows. Good anchorage in West Quoddy Bay half a mile N W from the light. No passage through the Narrows: at low water; strangers should not attempt to go through without a pilot.

Little River Light, on an Island at the mouth of Little River harbor; tower white, attached to Keeper's dwelling; fixed light, varied by white flashes 1m 30s; visible 11 miles; seen from N E by $\text{E } \frac{1}{2} \text{ E}$, via eastward to south. Also, fog bell, struck by machinery twice a minute. Latitude $44^{\circ} 39' 45'' \text{ N}$; longitude $67^{\circ} 12' 5'' \text{ W}$. Good anchorage for a small number of vessels just inside the Island. To enter harbor, pass to eastward of the light.

Libby Island Light, at mouth of Machias Bay and River; latitude $44^{\circ} 34' 5'' \text{ N}$; longitude $67^{\circ} 22' 2'' \text{ W}$; grey tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles. South west end of Libby Island is divided in two parts at high water. Ship channel to Machias lies to eastward of the Island, or, get Avery's Rock Light to bear $\text{N } \frac{3}{4} \text{ W}$ and run for it, passing handy on either side, and continuing past a high, round Island on the left, and proceed from it a north course half a mile and anchor at the mouth of the river.

Avery's Rock, in Machias Bay, near mouth of River; tower built from the top of Keeper's dwelling, painted white; fixed red light, visible 14 miles.

Moosepeak Light. Latitude $44^{\circ} 28' 27'' \text{ N}$; longitude $67^{\circ} 31' 25'' \text{ W}$; white tower, white flash light, 30 seconds between flashes, visible 13 miles. Mistake Island is to west side of entrance to Bay of Fundy. For entrance into Moosepeak Harbor, pass to the eastward of light about a N W course one mile. There is another small harbor about N N E , $1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles from the light, called the Cow Yard. Bearings—to Libby Island light, N E by $\text{E } \frac{1}{2} \text{ E}$, 9 miles; to Petit Menan light, $\text{W } \frac{1}{4} \text{ S}$, 15 miles.

Moosepeak Automatic Buoy, in deep water, off Moosepeak light; works by action of the sea; often heard 4 miles. Bearings—Moosepeak light bears N by $\text{W } 1 \frac{1}{2}$ miles, Petit Menan Ledge $\text{W } \frac{3}{4} \text{ S}$ 15 miles, Petit Menan light W 15 miles, Libby Island light $\text{N E } \frac{3}{4} \text{ E}$ 9 miles.

Nashe's Island Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles. To enter Moosepeak Reach, west entrance, leave light on starboard hand; also, a guide to Pleasant River.

Narraguagus Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; located on Pond Island; entrance to Narraguagus Bay and Millbridge; bell struck by hand to answer signals in thick weather.

Petit Menan Light; latitude $44^{\circ} 22' 2'' \text{ N}$; longitude $67^{\circ} 51' 51'' \text{ W}$; tall grey tower; fixed light, varied by white flashes once in 2 minutes, visible 17 miles. This light is a warning against dangerous shoals, of which Petit Menan Ledge, or South East Breaker, bears S S E $3 \frac{1}{2}$ miles, on which is 6 feet at low water, (Iron Nun Buoy) painted vertically red and black stripes. Sims' Rock bears $\text{S } \frac{1}{2} \text{ E}$, 2 miles; 9 feet at low water (Spar Buoy). Tibbett's Ledge bears E by $\text{N } 3$ miles, 9 feet at low water; no buoy. On Petit Menan there is also a steam fog alarm giving 2 blasts a minute; intervals between blasts 8 and 42 seconds; heard 8 miles.

Prospect Harbor Light; tower white, showing a flashing red and white light, flashing once in 30 seconds; visible 11 miles; on the eastern side of the entrance to Prospect Harbor. In running for the Harbor, bring the light to bear $\text{N } \frac{1}{2} \text{ E}$.

Polished Plate Glass, at J. H. PULLEN'S, 14 Horsfield street.

Winter Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light visible 11 miles. On north side of west entrance to the harbor, guide to Musquito harbor also.

Egg Rock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 14 miles; on Egg Rock, in Frenchman's Bay. A fog bell, struck by machinery, giving 2 blows in quick succession, then an interval of 30 seconds, then one blow. Bearings—Bar harbor bears N W $\frac{1}{2}$ N, 4 miles; Baker's Island bears S W by S $\frac{1}{2}$ S, 8 miles.

Baker's Island Light; latitude $44^{\circ} 14' 27''$ N; longitude $68^{\circ} 11' 56''$ W; white tower, connected with Keeper's house; fixed light, varied by white flashes; on Baker's Island, off Mount Desert; a guide to Cranberry Island, north east and south west harbors. On entering either of these, leave light on the port hand; but if going to Bass harbor, leave it on starboard hand 1 mile. Bearings—Bass Harbor Head bears W $\frac{3}{4}$ N, 5 miles; Mount Desert Rock bears S $\frac{1}{2}$ W, 18 miles; Petit Menan Light bears E by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N, 16 miles.

North East Harbor Light; tower painted brown, with black lantern; fixed white light, visible 14 miles, on Bear Island; a guide to N E harbor by leaving it on starboard hand.

Bass Harbor Head and Light; tower painted white; fixed red light, visible 13 miles; east side of entrance to Bass harbor, Mount Desert; a bell struck by hand to answer signals; Baker's Island bears E $\frac{3}{4}$ S, 5 miles; this will be left 100 yards distant on starboard hand by vessels going to Bass Harbor.

Mount Desert Rock; latitude $43^{\circ} 58' 7''$; longitude $69^{\circ} 7' 42''$; grey tower; fixed white light, visible round entire horizon 14 miles; on Mount Desert Rock, Maine; a bell struck by machinery. Bearings—Baker's Island bears N $\frac{1}{4}$ E, 18 miles; Petit Menan light bears N E $\frac{1}{2}$ E, 23 miles; Moosepeak bears N E by E $\frac{1}{2}$ E, 38 miles; Mazineus lights bear W $\frac{1}{4}$ S, 33 miles. Vessels bound to St. John will run E N E straight up between Grand Manan and the American shore.

Burnt Coat Harbor Lights; two; white towers, showing two fixed white lights, 100 feet apart, visible 11 miles; on south end of Swan's Island, Maine. To enter the harbor, get the lights to bear N E $\frac{3}{4}$ N, or in range, and run for them.

Eggmoggin Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 9 miles; on Green Island, at entrance to Bluehill Bay and Eggmoggin Reach; also guide to Ellsworth.

Saddle-Back Light; tower, upper part, grey; lower part, white; on an Islet near S W end of Isle au Haute; a guide to Isle au Haute Bay, and to East Penobscot Bay; fixed white light, visible 12 miles.

Mark Island Light, on an Island at the western entrance to Deer Island Thoroughfare, or to Merchant's Row; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles. This station is in Isle au Haute Bay, bearing about N N E from Saddle Back 4 miles. To enter Thoroughfare, leave light on starboard hand; to enter Merchant's Row leave it on port hand.

Heron's Neck Light, on the south point of Green Island, the most southern one of the Fox Islands; a guide to Carver's Harbor and to Hurricane Sound; white tower; fixed red light, visible 14 miles.

Eagle Head Light, on Eagle Island, at the head of Isle au Haute Bay; guide to the N E entrance to Penobscot Bay. Vessels on entering will leave Saddle Back on the port hand and run straight for Eagle Head, leaving it on the port side; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles.

All kinds of wood imitated by first-class grainers, at 14 Horsfield street.

Pumpkin Island; white tower; fixed white light, visible 9 miles; a guide to Eggemoggin Reach from the west; leave it on the starboard hand.

Dice's Head; white tower; fixed white light, visible 17 miles; west side of entrance to Castine harbor, Maine.

Fort Point Light; white tower; fixed white light, on Old Fort Point; left hand side of entrance to Penobscot River.

Grindel's Point; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; on the north side of entrance to Gilkey's harbor, on Long Island, Penobscot Bay.

Negro Island Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; at south side of entrance to Camden harbor.

Indian Island Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles; east side of entrance to Rockport harbor, Penobscot Bay.

Brown's Head Light; white tower, attached to Keeper's dwelling; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; on western side of Fox Island, and at east side of western entrance to Fox Island Thoroughfare; is extinguished when Thoroughfare is closed by ice.

Owl's Head Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; guide to Rockland harbor; also to vessels bound up or down western Penobscot Bay.

White Head Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 58' 42''$ N; longitude $69^{\circ} 7' 28''$ W; grey tower, connected with white dwelling; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; at western side of western entrance to Penobscot Bay; also a steam fog alarm, giving a blast of 8 seconds duration once a minute.

Matinicus Lights; latitude $43^{\circ} 47' 0''$ N; longitude $68^{\circ} 51' 18''$ W; two grey towers, 180 feet apart, and ranging N N W and S S E; fixed white lights, visible 15 miles; located on Matinicus Rock. Bearings—Mount Desert Rock bears E $\frac{1}{4}$ N, 33 miles; Monheigan Light bears W by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N, 21 miles. Course to Portland, W $\frac{3}{4}$ N, 64 miles. Also, a 12 inch steam fog whistle, sounding blasts of 5 seconds duration with intervals of 25 seconds between; also, a bell struck by machinery, which will be used in case of accident to whistle.

Monheigan Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 45' 52''$ N; longitude $67^{\circ} 18' 57''$ W; grey tower; white flash light, visible 19 miles, flashing once a minute; on Monheigan Island. Bearings—Matinicus bears E by S, 21 miles; Seguin Light bears W $\frac{3}{4}$ N, 20 miles; White Head Light bears N E $\frac{1}{4}$ E, 18 miles. Also, on Manancas Island, near Moheigan, a steam fog alarm giving 2 blasts of 5 seconds each per minute, with an interval of 8 seconds between the blasts, then a pause of 42 seconds.

Tenant's Harbor Light; white tower; red flash light, visible 13 miles, flashing once every half minute; on south west side of entrance to Tenant's harbor. (Only used by small vessels.)

South St. George, or Herring Gut; white and grey tower; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; on Marshall's Point, east side of entrance to Herring Gut, St. George, Maine.

Franklin Light; white tower; fixed light, varied by white flashes; on Franklin Island; a guide to vessels entering Thomaston, Me.; leave it on starboard hand going in.

Pemaquid Point; white tower; fixed white light, visible 14 miles; west side of entrance to Bristol Bay, and east side of entrance to John's Bay.

Townsend Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; on Burnt Island, west side of entrance to Townsend harbor.

Sheepscott Light; white tower; white flash light, visible 12 miles, flashing twice a minute; on Hendricks Head, on the east side of Sheepscott Bay, and entrance to Sheepscott River; guide to Southport and Wisconssett.

Pond Island Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; entrance to Kennebec River, and guide to vessels entering it; to be left on the port side going in. Also, a bell, struck by hand.

Seguin Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 42' 25''$ N; longitude $69^{\circ} 45' 31''$ W; grey tower; fixed white light of the first order, visible 24 miles; on Seguin Island, off the mouth of the Kennebec River; to enter the River, leave the light on the starboard hand, and run for Pond Island. Also, a steam fog whistle, sounding blasts of 8 seconds duration at intervals of 52 seconds. Bearings—Half-way Rock Light bears W $\frac{1}{2}$ N, 13 miles; Pond Island Light bears N, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles; Cape Elizabeth bears W by S, 22 miles; Monheigan Light bears E $\frac{1}{2}$ S, 20 miles.

Half-way Rock Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 38' 21''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 2' 13''$ W; grey tower; fixed white light, varied by red flashes, flashing red once a minute; on Half-way Rock, Casco Bay. Bearings—Seguin Light bears E, 13 miles; Portland Head bears W, 8 miles; Cape Elizabeth bears W S W, 9 miles.

Portland Head Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 37' 22''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 12' 29''$ W; white tower; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; on west side of entrance Portland harbor. Also, a Daboll's air trumpet, giving blasts of 8 seconds duration once in 40 seconds.

Portland Breakwater; white tower; fixed red light, visible 8 miles. This is a harbor light, and stands on the end of the granite breakwater extending out from the south side of the harbor; to be left on the port hand in passing up the harbor.

Cape Elizabeth Lights; latitude $43^{\circ} 33' 50''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 12' 9''$ W; two red towers, 900 feet apart, and ranging N E by E and S W by W; easterly light white, fixed; westerly light white, revolving once a minute, visible 18 miles. Also, a fog trumpet, giving 2 blasts of 5 seconds each with an interval of 8 seconds between them, then a pause of 42 seconds. Bearings—Boon Island Light bears S W $\frac{1}{2}$ S, 30 miles; Thatcher's Island bears S W $\frac{3}{4}$ S, 62 miles. These lights are a warning against dangerous shoals, of which Alden's Rock is mostly to be feared, bearing E by S 5 miles, on which is 6 feet of water at low water; the others range from 14 to 18 feet at low water. To approach Portland at night, get Portland Head light to bear N N W and run for it, leaving it a fair berth on the port hand, then run N by W 1 mile, then N $\frac{3}{4}$ W till Breakwater light bears N W by W $\frac{1}{2}$ W, then run N W $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

Wood Island Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 27' 23''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 19' 45''$ W; white tower; red flash light, visible 13 miles, flashing once a minute; near entrance to Saco River, and guide to Winter harbor and Biddeford Pool, by leaving it on port hand. Also, a bell struck by machinery, two blows in rapid succession followed by an interval of 25 seconds, then one blow.

Goat Island; latitude $43^{\circ} 21' 27''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 25' 31''$ W; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; (harbor of refuge) on the north side of entrance to Cape Porpoise harbor (near Kennebunk); leave on starboard hand going in.

Boon Island; latitude $43^{\circ} 7' 16''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 28' 36''$ W; grey granite tower, 133 feet above high water; fixed white light, visible 18 miles; off York. Bearings—Cape Elizabeth lights bear N E by N, 30 miles; Matinicus

lights bear E by N, 80 miles; Cape Ann lights bear S by W $\frac{1}{4}$ W, 30 miles; Isle Shoals light bears S W $\frac{1}{4}$ S, 12 miles.

Isle of Shoals; latitude $42^{\circ} 58' 0''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 37' 25''$ W; white tower; light, flashing, red and white, visible 15 miles, flashing every 30 sees; on White Island, the most south western of the Isle of Shoals cluster, off Portsmouth, N H. Bearings—Boon Island light bears N E $\frac{1}{4}$ N, 12 miles; Whale's Back light bears N W $\frac{1}{4}$ N, 12 miles; Newburyport Bar bears W by S, 13 miles; Cape Ann lights bear S, 17 miles.

Whale's Back Light; latitude $43^{\circ} 3' 30''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 41' 48''$ W; old tower white, new tower natural granite color; fixed light, varied by white flashes, visible 13 miles; flashes once in $1\frac{1}{2}$ minutes. Also, a bell, struck by machinery 4 times a minute, located in the old tower; both to be left on starboard hand going into Portsmouth.

Portsmouth Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 14 miles; on left side of inner entrance to Portsmouth harbor.

Newburyport Harbor Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 12 miles; Also, a beacon, range of light, 336 feet in front of main light; black tower; fixed white light, visible 8 miles. These lights, in range, guide across the bar, in best water; bar constantly changes; outer bar buoy is in range with inner bar buoy and both lights; the beacon is moved as the channel changes. This station is on the north end of Plum Island, and on the south side of entrance to the Merrimac River, Mass. (Strangers should not attempt to enter.)

Newburyport Upper Harbor; two lights (beacons); outer beacon, black tower, fixed red light, visible 10 miles; inner beacon, red tower, fixed green light, visible 12 miles; both on Bailey's wharf, and to be left on the port side passing up the harbor.

Ipswich Lights; a main light, with a range light in front; main light, fixed, varied by white flashes, visible 11 miles, flashing once in $1\frac{1}{2}$ minutes, shown from a white tower; range light, fixed, white, visible 8 miles, shown from a black tower; the lights are 625 feet apart, N E $\frac{1}{4}$ E and S W $\frac{1}{4}$ W; in range, they guide to entrance of channel across Ipswich Bar in best water; on Castle Neck, south side of entrance to Ipswich River.

Annisquam Light; white tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; a harbor of refuge for small vessels; on Wigwam Point, east side of entrance to Annisquam harbor; 6 feet of water on Squam Bar at low tide. To cross the bar, bring the light to bear south and run for it, leaving it on the port side; then run for the Lobster Rock Beacon, and leave it on the port side also.

Straitsmouth Island; on south side of Sandy Bay, entrance to Rockport harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to be left on port hand in going to Rockport. Bad ledges lie off this light. Strangers should keep the north shore of Sandy Bay best aboard on entering Rockport; shelter only for a few small vessels.

Cape Ann Lights; latitude $42^{\circ} 38' 15''$; longitude $70^{\circ} 34' 30''$ W; two grey granite towers, 165 feet above sea level; fixed white light, visible 20 miles; the lights are 900 feet apart, in range at S S W and N N E; located on Thatcher's Island, off Cape Ann, and the northern limit of Massachusetts Bay; to be left on the starboard hand in going towards Boston. Bearings—Isle of Shoals bears N, 17 miles; Boon Island N N E, 30 miles; Gloucester Light S W by W $\frac{1}{4}$ W, 6 miles; Long Island Light S W by

Plain Glass, at J. H. PULLEN'S, 14 Horsfield street.

W, 24 miles; Cape Cod Highland Light S by E $\frac{3}{4}$ E, 43 miles; London Ledge S E by E, $\frac{1}{2}$ mile; Salvage Ledge N N E, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles. Also, a 10 inch steam whistle, giving each minute a blast of 8 seconds and a blast of 4 seconds, with an interval of 4 seconds between them.

Gloucester Harbor Light, on Eastern Point; on east side of entrance to Gloucester harbor; white tower; fixed red light, visible 9 miles. When coming from the Eastward, bound into Gloucester harbor, give the light a good berth to clear Eastern Point Ledge (spar buoy); then, when the light bears N E $\frac{3}{4}$ N, run N W $\frac{1}{2}$ N until the upper harbor light bears N E by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N, then run for it, and anchor $\frac{1}{2}$ mile S by W from the light. Also, a bell on Eastern Point, rung by machinery, striking two blows each half minute.

Gloucester Upper Harbor Light, on Ten Pound Island, east side of entrance to inner harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; to enter harbor, bring this light to bear N E by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N, and run for it until Eastern Point light bears S $\frac{1}{4}$ W, then run N $\frac{1}{4}$ E till Ten Pound Island light bears E S E, (anchor), or run N E by E $\frac{3}{4}$ E to the inner harbor.

Baker's Island Lights; latitude $42^{\circ} 32' 10''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 47' 10''$ W; two white towers, ranging S E and N W; fixed white light, visible 15 miles; located on the north end of Baker's Island, south side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbors. In coming from the Southward, and bound to Salem, keep the lowest light open to the east of the high light, and run for it; this guides to the eastward of the South-east Breakers and Searl's Rock. Give Baker's Island a wide berth, leaving it on the port hand, then run for Hospital Point light, bearing W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N; now, Salem harbor is to the W S W of you, and Beverly harbor W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N. Also, on Baker's Island a bell which strikes two quick blows each half minute.

Hospital Point; grey tower; fixed white light, visible 13 miles; on Hospital Point, north side of entrance to Salem and Beverly harbor.

Fort Pickering Light; red tower; fixed white light, visible 10 miles; on Winter Island, north side of entrance to Salem harbor. On entering Salem harbor from near Hospital Point, get Derby Wharf light in range with Fort Pickering light to clear the Haste Shoal; good anchorage half a mile S W by S from this light, with Derby Wharf light bearing W by S.

Derby Wharf Light; on the end of Derby Wharf, Salem upper harbor; red tower; fixed red light, visible 9 miles.

Marblehead Light, on Marblehead Neck, south side of entrance to Marblehead, and to Salem South Channel; white tower; fixed white light, visible 11 miles; good anchorage half a mile W by S from this light. To enter harbor, after passing Half-way Rock, bring this light to bear W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N and run for it until the light bears S W half a mile, then run N W until the light bears S by W, then run S W $\frac{1}{2}$ W into the harbor.

Egg Rock Light; white tower; fixed red light, visible 12 miles; guide to Swampscot anchorage and to Broad Sound. Leave it $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles on the starboard hand on entering Broad Sound.

Minot's Ledge Light; latitude $42^{\circ} 16' 9''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 45' 34''$ W; entrance to Boston Bay; granite tower, natural color, 100 feet high; fixed white light, visible 17 miles. Davis's Ledge Buoy bears E by S; Boston light bears N W $\frac{1}{2}$ W, 7 miles. This course must be kept good, northerly, to pass Bell Boat, off the north side of the Hardings Ledge (about $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles from

Minot's Ledge Light). A good mark to clear the Hardings Bell Boat, after passing Minot's light, is to keep Long Island Head light (fixed white) just open to the north of the Narrows light, which is a red light.

Boston Light; latitude $42^{\circ} 19' 39''$ N; longitude $70^{\circ} 53' 25''$ W; on Little Brewster Island, north side of entrance to main ship channel to Boston; white tower; white flash light, flashing once every half minute, visible 17 miles. When the light bears north one half mile, run west until Long Isle light just opens out south of the Narrows light, then run for it, leaving the Narrows light on the starboard hand. Also, an air trumpet, giving blasts of 7 seconds, followed by interval of 43 seconds.

Narrows Light; brown house; fixed red light, on the right hand side of Narrows, in ship channel entrance to Boston harbor. When this light bears north, run N W $\frac{1}{2}$ W until the east side of Galloup's Island bears S by W, then run N W by N until Long Island light bears W by S $\frac{1}{2}$ S.

Long Island Light; on the N E end of Long Island and southern side of entrance to Boston inner harbor; white tower; fixed white light, visible 16 miles. In coming up ship channel, and after leaving Six Mate buoy on the port hand, and Long Island light bears W by S $\frac{1}{2}$ S, run W by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N for the south end of the Castle until the Castle North Wharf bears N W by W $\frac{3}{4}$ W, or abreast of the State Ledge Buoy (red, No. 3), then N W $\frac{1}{2}$ N to the Upper Middle Buoy (black No. 9), which leave on port hand, then the course to Long Wharf is N W $\frac{1}{2}$ W. But if approaching Boston from Cape Ann, via Broad Sound, bring Long Island light to bear S W by W, and run for it until Deer Island Point Beacon bears N W by N $\frac{1}{2}$ N three-eighths of a mile distant, then W by N $\frac{1}{4}$ N up the harbor. Strangers should bear in mind that in the middle of Broad Sound there is but 8 feet of water at low tide; but by keeping on the southern side of the Sound, leaving the Graves Automatic Buoy half a mile on the port hand and the Devil's Limb Buoy (a black can buoy No. 1) $\frac{1}{2}$ mile on port hand, and running straight to Ram's Head Buoy (black can No. 5) about W S W passing Aldrich's Ledge Buoy (black can No. 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ mile on port), then leaving Ram's Head Buoy 50 yards distant on port, and run about W $\frac{1}{2}$ S to clear Deer Island Point Beacon, you can carry 14 feet safely.

Port Charges---Rates of Pilotage.

Established by a Law or Ordinance of the Common Council of the City of St. John.

One dollar per foot for bringing any ship or vessel into the harbor of Saint John, and mooring her into a safe place or berth, or securing her alongside one of the wharves; and one dollar per foot for removing and taking any ship or vessel out of the harbor.

In cases where pilots shall be detained on board vessels, under and by virtue of the quarantine or health laws of the Province, they shall be entitled to demand and receive from masters of such vessels the sum of two dollars per day for every day of such detention, in addition to the allowance.

Coasting vessels going from one part of the Bay of Fundy to another, British steamboats, or British vessels drawing under six feet of water, are not compelled to take pilots; when employed, they are to be paid according to the rate above mentioned.

For removing vessels from any mooring ground to any wharf, or from one wharf to another wharf, and seeing them properly moored or secured, the following rates:—For vessels not exceeding 100 tons, \$1.50; for vessels over 100 tons and not exceeding 200 tons, \$2; for vessels over 200 tons and not exceeding 300 tons, \$3; and for all vessels over 300 tons and not exceeding 400 tons \$4; and 25 cents for every 50 tons such vessel may measure over 400 tons.

First Distance—From Partridge Island to Musquash Cove Head, bearing northward, \$1 per foot.

Second Distance—From Musquash Head to Point Le Preaux, bearing north-west, \$1.25 per foot.

Third Distance—From Point Le Preaux to north head of Grand Manan, bearing north-west, or North Channel, bearing south-east, \$1.50 per foot.

Fourth Distance—From the north head of Grand Manan or North Channel,

CEMENT FOR BROKEN CHINA, GLASS, &c.—Dissolve half an ounce of gum acacia in a wineglass of boiling water: add plaster of Paris sufficient to form a thick paste, and apply it with a brush to the parts required to be cemented together. Being colorless, this recipe possesses advantages which liquid glue and other cements do not.

CEMENT FOR LEATHER AND CLOTH.—An adhesive material for uniting the parts of boots and shoes, and for the seams of articles of clothing, may be made thus: Take one pound of gutta percha, four ounces of India rubber, two ounces of pitch, one ounce of shellac, two ounces of oil. Melt the ingredients together, and use hot.

TO CLEAR ROSE TREES FROM BLIGHT.—Take sulphur and tobacco dust in equal quantities, and strew it over the trees of a morning when the dew is on them. The insects will disappear in a few days. The trees should then be syringed with a decoction of elder leaves.

TO PRESERVE TABLES.—A piece of oil-cloth (about twenty inches long) is a useful appendage to a common sitting-room. Kept in the closet it can be available at any time to place jars upon, &c., &c., which are likely to soil your table during the process of dispensing their contents: a wing and duster are harmonious accompaniments to the oil-cloth.

GILT FRAMES may be protected from flies and dust by oiled tarlatan pinned over them. Tarlatan, already prepared, may be purchased at the upholsterer's. If it cannot be procured, it is easily made by brushing boiled oil over cheap tarlatan. It is an excellent material for keeping dust from books, vases, wool work, and every description of household ornament.

LAMP WICKS.—Old cotton stocking may be made into lamp wicks, and will answer very well.

GLASS should be washed in cold water, which gives it a brighter and clearer look than when cleansed with warm water.

GLASS VESSELS, and other utensils, may be purified and cleaned by rinsing them out with powdered charcoal.

SILVER AND PLATED WARE should be washed with a sponge and warm soapsuds every day after using, and wiped dry with a clean soft towel.

TO CLEAN KNIVES AND FORKS.—Wash the blades in warm (but not hot) water, and afterwards rub them lightly over with powdered rotten-stone wet to a paste with a little cold water, then polish them with a clean cloth.

FRUIT STAINS IN LINEN.—To remove them, rub the part on each side with yellow soap, then tie up a piece of pearlsh in the cloth, &c., and soak well in hot water, or boil: afterwards expose the stained part to the sun and air until removed.

MILDEWED LINEN may be restored by soaping the spots while wet, covering them with fine chalk scraped to powder, and rubbing it well in.

TO KEEP MOTHS, BEETLES, &c., FROM CLOTHES.—Put a piece of camphor in a linen bag, or some aromatic herbs, in the drawers, among linen or woolen clothes, and neither moth or worm will come near them.

CLOTHES CLOSETS that have become infested with moths should be well rubbed with a strong decoction of tobacco, and repeatedly sprinkled with spirits of camphor.

SCALD your woodenware often, and keep your tin-ware dry.

TO TAKE GREASE OUT OF VELVET OR CLOTH.—Procure some turpentine and pour it over the part that is greasy; rub it till quite dry with a piece of clean flannel; if the grease be not quite removed, repeat the application, and when done, brush the part well, and hang up the garment in the open air to take away the smell.

ECONOMY.—If you have a strip of land, do not throw away Soap-suds. Both Ashes and Soap-suds are good manure for bushes and young plants.

WOOLLEN CLOTHES should be washed in very hot suds, and not rinsed. Lukewarm water shrinks them.

CAUTION.—Do not let Coffee and Tea stand in tin.

SEE THAT NOTHING IS THROWN AWAY which might have served to nourish your own family or a poorer one.

AS FAR AS POSSIBLE, have pieces of bread eaten up before they become hard; spread those that are not eaten, and let them dry, to be pounded for puddings, or soaked for broth.

LINEN RAGS should be carefully saved, for they are extremely useful in sickness. If they have become dirty and worn by cleaning silver, &c., wash them and scrape them into lint.

A BONNET AND TRIMMINGS may be worn a much longer time, if the dust be brushed well off after walking.

APPLES intended for dumplings should not have the core taken out of them. as the pips impart a delicious flavor to the dumpling.

BLACKING FOR LEATHER SEATS, &c.—Beat well the yolks of two eggs and the white of one; mix a tablespoonful of gin and a teaspoonful of sugar, thicken it with ivory black, add it to the eggs, and use as a common blacking; the seats or cushions being left a day or two to harden. This is a good dressing for boots and shoes.

FOR VENTILATION open your windows both at top and bottom. The fresh air rushes in one way, while the foul air makes its exit the other. This is letting in your friend and expelling your enemy.
