good condition for plowing, and later it may be hard and difficult to plow, as the fall is usually dry. The great amount of rain that has fallen this summer can be stored up in the soil for future use.

Plowing early and then keeping the surface loose and fine by an occasional harrowing will make a better seed bed and crop than to wait until later.

### Butter Sansages.

A Minnesota creameryman has invented a new way of packing butter for private customers. He makes special paraffin cloth bags, holding one, two, three and five-pound lots of butter, and has invented a machine which will stuff and seal these bags quickly and inexpensively. These make airtight packages, keeping the butter pure and proof against moisture and odors. It is said that this scheme has proven quite successful.
