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C. N. R. CROP REPORTS INDICATE A BIG YIELD

One Hundred Points in West Send Encouraging Statements—Grain, The Late, Doing Well With Favorable Weather Conditions.

Judging from the report just received at the Canadian Northern offices covering the period ending the middle of July, crop prospects in the west were never brighter, and everything points to a yield of grain even in advance of the average.

The agents of the C.N.R. report conditions from the stations along the main line of the system and also from the various branch lines, and advice is thus received at once from at least 100 points in the grain-bearing districts.

While some places report that the crop has been somewhat delayed, and in one or two instances, hail has done considerable damage, all agree that, with the continuance of the present favorable growing conditions, the harvest will be a record. The yield on the main line, Groux, White Plains, Ell, Portage, Beaver, with some 40 other stations as far as and including Edmonton, report that all grains are growing rapidly, with excellent prospects, crops, in most instances, being a record for the year.

At Gladstone all grains are coming very fast and were expected to be in shot blade by the 21st inst.

Excellent Weather.

Crop conditions at Togo were never better, and excellent weather prevailed for a long time. At Quill Lake the growth has not been so rapid and was eight or ten inches behind last year. Grain was beginning to head out at Maymont and wheat was knee high at Vegreville, with other crops in proportion.

The Edmonton report says: "Crops in this district are doing splendidly." The report from the Wawanesa district begins rather pessimistically at Wawanesa, stating that crops were growing slowly. Still a little rain had freshened things up considerably, but the outlook there was that crops of all kinds would be light. Methuen Junction reports a very short crop of wheat, although other grains were doing fairly well. Carman received rain very badly, as did also Rosalia, Greenway and a few other towns.

JUMPED FROM RUNAWAY FRACTURES HER SKULL

Miss Jennie Day, a Cobourg School Teacher, Meets Death While Out for Pleasure.

COBOURG, July 24.—A distressing accident occurred near here, resulting in the almost instant death of Miss Jennie Day, for years a member of the public school staff.

Miss Day was one of a party of eight who had early in the evening driven to Coldsprings. On their return, about 10 o'clock, the horses became unmanageable in some way and ran away, throwing the occupants out and causing severe injuries to all the party. Miss Day tried to save herself by jumping, in so doing she struck her head, causing a fracture of the skull, from which she died in a few hours.

KILLS SELF WITH HATCHET. Girl, Delirious While Ill, Inflicts Fatal Injuries

ST. CATHARINES, July 24.—(Special.)—A strange death at Humberstone has been reported.

Anna Caroline Utz had been ill with typhoid fever, but had declined to have any one sit up with her. Her father awoke early in the morning and sought his daughter's bedside to find that she was missing. The alarm was given and a search instituted and the missing girl was found in a semi-conscious state in a nearby barn. Marks of violence were visible about her head and forehead and her hair was matted with blood. She had a hatchet, with hair and blood upon it, and was found with a few feet from her. Dr. Neff was summoned and was unable to revive her while on the way to her home when she expired.

It is believed the girl, while delirious, inflicted the wounds upon herself.

CHINAMEN WITH SMALLPOX. Five of Celestials Supposed to Be in Toronto, May Spread Contagion.

Look out for the yellow peril. This is in substance the advice of Dr. Sheard, who is searching the city for three Chinamen, who are understood to have arrived in the city yesterday morning. A telegram from North Bay is to the effect that a smallpox patient on a train from the west had been reported that they had been attacked. Thus far their whereabouts are unknown.

There are now 25 smallpox patients in the Swiss Cottage, the latest sufferer discovered being an 11-year-old boy living on Isabella-street, who received contagion from a pedlar, now under care for the disease.

DOESN'T HURT THE SOO. Strike in the Michigan Mines Has No Effect on Steel Plant.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., July 24.—(Special.)—According to a statement made to-day by Manager of Mines R. W. Seelye of the Lake Superior Corporation, the strike of the dock hands and miners along the north shore of Lake Superior will not affect the operations of the corporation unless the strike continues for some time, which is not probable. The Lake Superior people have a large tonnage of iron ready for shipment in the vicinity of Escanaba, Mich., which will last for an indefinite period. The report that the strike has extended to the Helen mine at Michipicoten is unfounded, the mine being a non-union one. The steel plant at the Soo will not be affected by the strike.

HERE'S A FLAG INCIDENT. Britisher Fined and Jailed for Trampling Old Glory.

MARQUETTE, Mich., July 24.—Following his conviction for tearing down the United States flag and then trampling on it, James Grant, a British subject, was brought here to-day to serve 30 days in jail and a fine of \$10.

May Change Labor Day.

It was decided last night that the amalgamated carpenters would make an effort to celebrate Labor Day on Friday in May instead of the first Monday of September, now in vogue.

PUBLIC BUTTS IN ON POLICE Result is That Criminal Escapes or Imagines That He Has a Grievance.

MONTREAL, July 24.—(Special.)—After hearing several papers during the forenoon and deciding unanimously to hold the next convention in Quebec, the Chief Constables' Association of Canada adjourned this afternoon.

Deputy Chief Stark read a remarkable paper on "Trial by the People," in which he enumerated the difficulties which undue interference by the public causes the police authorities in their efforts to suppress crime.

Moral suasion and punishment, said he, were the two methods of dealing with criminals. Educators and philanthropists must deal with the first method, while the police authorities have to use the second. The difficulties thrown in the way of punishing criminals, by maudlin public sentiment, aroused by capable criminal lawyers, had always proved a serious stumbling block to the efforts of the police. If the criminal had a friend at all that friend would seek the influence of political people, whether municipal, provincial or federal. An effort would be made to obtain bail privately. If the judge or clerk of the court were what is known as "dead easy," a cash bail was put up out of the fruits of the crime and the criminal disappeared never to be seen in the neighborhood again. If, however, the magistrate was experienced, the application for bail was renewed in open court, with the usual grandstand play of denunciation of police methods and an appeal to the public uttered all the time with a judicious eye on the press stand.

Then the public gets in and the criminal at last believes himself to be a victim, a martyr, railroaded to conviction by perjured police officers, aided by a prejudiced jury and judge," said the deputy.

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REDMOND WILL OPPOSE GRANT TO LORD CROMER Premier Announces a Resolution to Allow Him \$250,000 Honorarium.

LONDON, July 24.—In the house of commons to-day Premier Campbell-Bannerman presented a royal message proposing a special grant of \$250,000 to Lord Cromer, who recently resigned the post of British agent and consul-general in Egypt, in recognition of his services to that country.

William Redmond, Nationalist, announced the intention of opposing the voting of this sum.

THREE MINUTES TOO LONG. Boy's Body Recovered From Water, But Life Was Extinct.

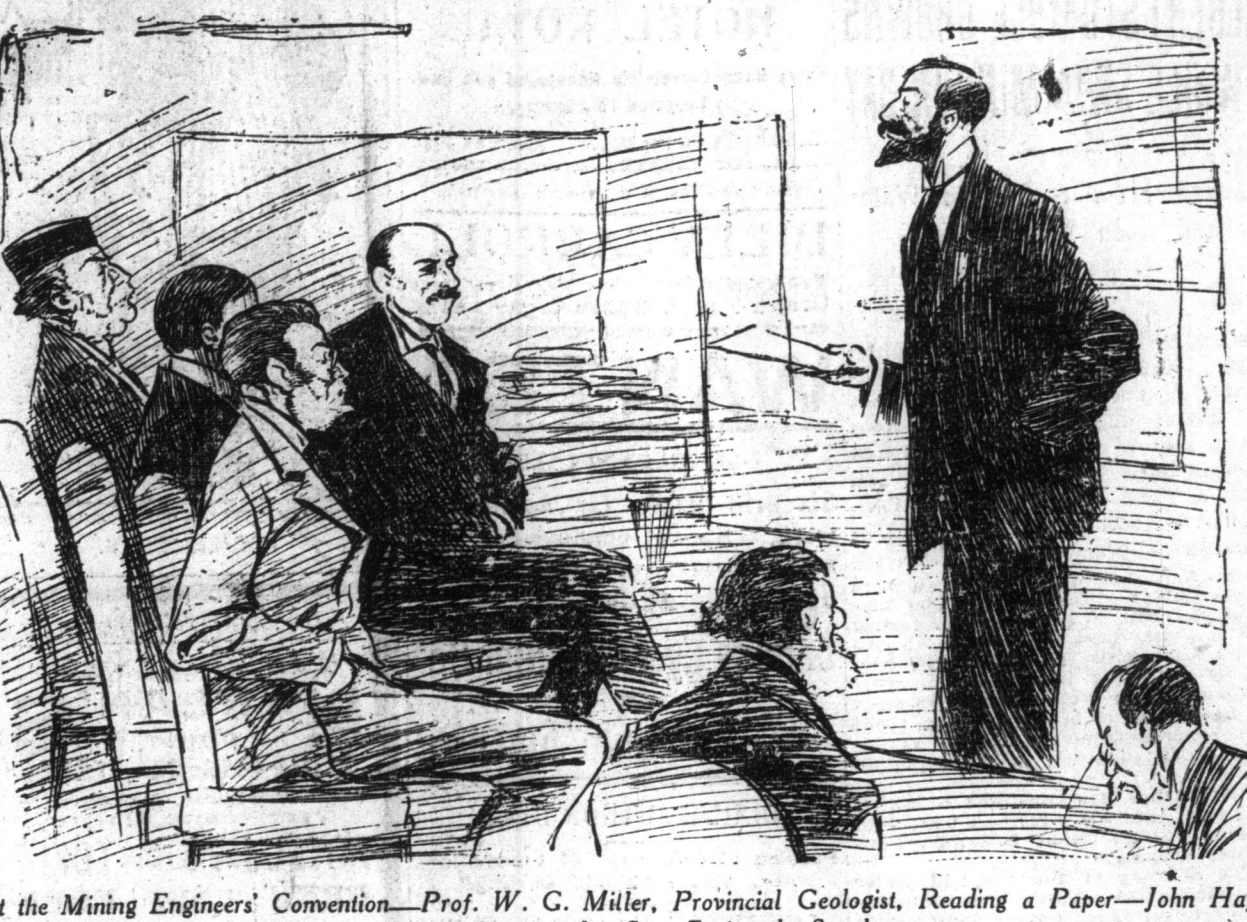
BROCKVILLE, July 24.—(Special.)—Claude, the second son of Charles Beyle of Duane, contracted cramps while bathing in De Bar Pond and was drowned.

WINNIPEG, July 24.—(Special.)—The city council this afternoon decided to accept the offer made by P. A. Heunrich and G. W. Farrell for the \$3,000,000 issue of 30-year debentures. The price is 94 flat.

The council gives an undertaking not to sell any further kind of issue for six months and also not to sell for a further period of six months any deeds under 94.

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M'KEOWN SAFE IN DUFFERIN BY 100

Conservative Candidate Carries By-Election After a Close Contest.

ORANGEVILLE, July 24.—(Special.)—Mayor Charles R. McKeown (Conservative) was to-day elected to the legislature for the County of Dufferin, by a majority of 100 over J. R. Woods (Independent). Three of the polling places gave the latter the significant majority of 23. The majority of the late Dr. Lewis was 22.

The result was in doubt until the last returns were received, and as a consequence the excitement ran high. The mayor addressed the electors from the balcony of the Queen's Hotel when his election was assured. He promised impartial representation. The prohibition end of the fight was lost sight of in the campaign, which

was "the lawyer against the farmer," and the cry became a serious one in the county.

The fine Citizens' Band turned out and serenaded the victor to-night.

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VICTORIA CONFLAGRATION WIPED OUT "TENDERLOIN" District Was Not an Imposing One—Loss Estimated at \$150,000.

VICTORIA, B.C., July 24.—The fiercest fire in the history of Victoria raged at the northwestern section of the city yesterday between the hours of 3 p.m. and 8 p.m., and in that time, before it was got under control, completely gutted ninety dwelling houses, two churches, a school house, and twenty small cabins. No lives were lost. The estimated damage is \$150,000.

The fire broke out in the Chinese quarter near the waterfront in the rear of a blacksmith's shop. A strong breeze from the west blowing flames spread rapidly, houses catching at irregular intervals, sometimes as far as 200 yards apart.

By 8 o'clock further damages were averted, although masses of ruins continued to smoulder for many hours afterwards.

With the heavy wind blowing the embers were carried great distances, and it was not long until the fire was raging half a mile away from where it started.

The heat was something terrible, and it was impossible to remain any longer within the heat zone for any length of time.

Great credit is due the firemen for the splendid manner in which they acted, under adverse circumstances.

While entering, the visiting warships saluted the forts with 21 guns, and as they swung around to drop anchor near the American cruisers Washington and Tennessee saluted the Japanese division with 15 guns.

LEOPOLD LOSING HOLD ON HIS CONGO KINGDOM.

Belgium Likely to Take Over the African Possessions in January.

BRUSSELS, July 24.—The close of King Leopold's long struggle to stave off the annexation of the Congo to Belgium, and to retain his personal sovereignty over the rich and extensive African state, is foreshadowed in the agreement reached on July 12 between the Belgian and the Congo Governments, elaborating the terms upon which the Congo Free State shall pass into the possession of Belgium.

The transfer will mark an important epoch for the Congo, as heretofore the entire conduct of affairs has been under the personal direction of King Leopold and a cabinet of Congo officials entirely separate from and independent of the constitution for the Congo affairs.

The proposed transfer comes at a time when Major Letombe's charges of Congo atrocities are again directing attention to the past administration. The real fight will follow upon the terms of the annexation. When Belgium was created in 1830, Belgian colonies were not foreseen and no provisions were made in the constitution for colonial administration. The Belgian Royalists want the law to practically convert the present administration into an autonomous government, not responsible to parliament.

The other side (Liberals and Radicals) also desire to give the Congo full autonomy, but insist that unless the administration is made directly responsible to parliament, there will be no way of correcting present abuses and preventing the exploiting of the natives for the benefit of the rubber and ivory companies. In other words, they say the humanitarian reasons which now exist for annexation would be defeated and the whole scheme for getting the Congo instead of the present maladministration might as well be abandoned.

The indications are that the subject will be threshed out in parliament during the fall and that January and February, 1908, will see the Congo Free State a colony of Belgium instead of a personal dependency of King Leopold.

For five months after the Belgian parliament committed itself last December to the principle of annexation, Count Smet de Naeyer, the premier, and a strong personal friend of the king, blocked the way, and the parliamentary commission appointed to investigate the intricacies of the Congo financial administration was powerless to get the facts.

The Congo government assumed power in May upon the promise to push the question, but there is a stipulation that it had made an agreement with the king, who was ready at last to yield on the question of annexation through fear of the humanitarian reasons, but, who, it is believed, has no intention of permitting the Belgian parliament if he can help it, to pry too closely into the Congo administration.

At a meeting of the executive of the Canadian Public Ownership League the proposed abolition of level crossings on the waterfront received careful consideration, and it was decided that having regard to the safety and convenience of the public together with the necessity for providing adequate transportation facilities and the cost of maintenance, the plan suggested for the elevation of the railway tracks is vastly superior to that calling for the construction of overhead bridges, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted: "It is hereby resolved that the interests of this league, having the interests of the public at heart, approve of the proposed plan for the elevation of the railway tracks along the waterfront."

The plan was respectfully recommended to the mayor and city council the adoption of the plan for the elevation of the tracks as the best and most practicable solution of the level crossing difficulty in this city. That we pledge ourselves to do everything in our power to further the said plan and urge its adoption.

Immigration and Independent Political Action at Next Dominion Election Chief Topics.

Alphonse Verville, M.P., president; James Simpson, vice-president, and P. M. Draper, secretary-treasurer of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, have addressed a circular letter to the organized labor bodies in Canada, calling attention to the twenty-third annual meeting of the congress, which opens in Winnipeg on Sept. 16.

The laws passed during the last session of the Dominion Parliament, as well as those enacted by the various provincial legislatures, will afford much room for discussion, and will require the exercise of the best thought in the world.

One of the most important questions to come before the convention will be the policy of the congress towards immigration. The advent of thousands of immigrants, and the promise of thousands more, have brought the immigration question to the forefront, and to-day it ranks as one of the most difficult problems confronting organized labor, affecting, as it does, our wages, our hours of labor, in fact every condition that surrounds us in the sale of our labor.

So, too, the reports of the provincial executives as to the progress of the political action, determined upon at the Victoria convention, will be of great and enduring interest.
