STOP MOB LAW JUDGE ORDERS

Cairo, III., Grand Jury to Prosecute Would-be Lynchers

of Negro Purse Snatcher.

CAIRO, Ills., Feb. 18.-With three companies of militia guarding the courthouse and jail, under the direct supervision of Adjutant General Frank S. Dixon, Cairo settled down to-night to complete quiet after strenuous 24 hours. It is believed the mob spirit is quelled. No crowd is allowed to congregate:

Threats were made to-day against Sheriff Fred Nellis for the killing of Alexander Halliday, and the wounding of four other men by deputies in beating back the mob that attacked the jall last night, in an attempt to lynch a negro purse snatcher.

John Pratt, the negro, was sentenced to-day to prison for not more than fourteen years. He will be taken to prisen to-morrow morning with twelve other convicts in a special tiain. Lincoln Wilson, arrested as a suspected companion of Pratt, was released to-night. A searching grand jury investigation of the attack on the jail was ordered by Judge Butler. His instructions to the grand jury were in substance a demand that the rioters be brought to justice and made to stand trial for rioting.

Nothing Has Yet Been Done at Ottawa to Secure the U. S. Minimum Tariff, and Time is Short.

WASHINGTON, D.C., Feb. 18,-No steps have yet been taken by the British or Canadian Governments looking to the determination of the question of whether Canada, in view of her tariff treaties with other countries, is entitled to the minimum tariff rates of the United States under the Payne-Aldrich Act.

In view of the fact that the maximum rates under this act will automatically be applied to Canada on March 31, only six weeks hence, unless it is shown in the meantime that Canada is entitled to the lowest rates, the state department has sent communication to Ambassade

Bryce, stating in substance that the government, entertaining only feeling of the warmest friendship for the people of Canada, regrets that no steps have been taken, either by Canada or Great Britain, to place the United States in possession of facts which might prove that the Dominion is entitled to the most favored rates. It was suggested that the British Government indicate what course it would like to pursue in arriving at the facts, whether thru the British foreign office or the Ottawa officials. The state department is quite willing to adopt any feasible suggestion as to procedure that might be made, but owing to the short time yet remaining it is thought that negotiations should be as prompt as possible.

CUTTING OUT TELEPHONES TO REDUCE EXPENDITURE

Board of Works Estimates Slashed by \$35,000 in Effert to Get

a 21-Mill Rate.

HAMILTON, Feb. 18 .- (Special) -The board of control, at another of its secret session this afternoon, on the estimates, decided to cut out the telephones supplied by the city to the six members of the board of health. In that way \$150 will be saved. The whole list of city telephones will be inspected to see how many may be dispensed with. The board of works estimates were cut down from \$107,000 to \$72,000. The amount of insurance carried by the city will also be investigated with a view to cutting. The sum of \$7800 was cut off the board of health estimates, all the proposed increases in salary being wiped out. as well as the appropriation for another sanitary inspector. The con-trollers have practically got the esti-mates pruned down so that they are within the revenue that will be obtained fro a 21 mill rate.



In the interest of the police and of . the citizens themselves, The World believes that stricter measures should be adopted for the suppression of the use of fire arms. In the first place it should be made an offence punishable with imprisonment to carry a concealed revolver. In the second place no one should be allowed to sell fire arms without a license. A register of all such sales should be kept, and returns made or kept available for the police. as in the case of poisons. Second-hand dealers especially should be required strictly to observe this regulation. In the third place no person should be permitted to purchase fire arms without a permit from the chief of police. With such regulations the dangerous nuisance of carrying concealed fire arms might be suppressed.

There are times when the police need weapons to destroy animals. A horse with a broken leg, a mad dog, or a cat in a fit may need a humane bullet. It is suggested that weapons be placed at designated stations or patrol boxes for

CANADIAN GRAIN, AND A BRITISH.

PREFERENCE. In connection with the tariff reform agitation in the United Kingdom and the proposal to impose duties on food imports accompanied by a material measure of preference to imperial products, a curious view is being taken by some Canadian journals that profess free trade opinions. They suggest with an air of triumph that Canada has no ground to welcome a tax on her wheat, even if it be only half that levied on foreign grain. This, of course, simply ignores the special circumstances of the British market. If Britain were in a position to supply her own needs, the imposition of a duty, however-small, might be regarded as to that extent adverse to imperial importing interests. But Britain's food imports are very large and must continue to be so for many years to come. Their volume will not be materially lessened, if indeed they are at all affected, by the duty contemplated, and this being so, the preferential rate enjoyed by Canada and other British states will be of real value and cannot but result in encouraging imperial development and exchange of trade.

That benefit will be even greater than at first sight appears, since British prices may admittedly be raised by at least a part of the maximum duty, possibly more than the amount of the preferential duty. This it is conceded by tariff reformers themselves may happen, and they turn its edge by urging that a reduction of the present

Let us look at the effect of aeronau-

tics upon architecture. Man has up to this date lived upon the surface of the earth. It has been but natural that he should design his architecture that he should design his architecture to be seen from the surface view.

"Now study it from this new aerial point of view. Among the considerations which will present themselves are the graceful modeling of the roof, as more generally seen at present in country houses, where the roof surfaces are gracefully medical where faces are gracefully modeled, where material is agreeable in color, texture, line—that is, where tile, slate or shin-gle is used instead of the flat noofs now generally so ugly, with their hidenow generally so ugly, with their hide-ous tin surfaces or smeared tar effects, ugly chimney pots and smelly, smoky ventilators. This latter class of roofs must be transformed and made agree-able to the passerby in the sky, if laid out like some of the recent roof gardens of our large hotels.

"I grant it is a difficult problem to design architecture to be seen from all points of view. But this is where the understanding and the cunning of the artist come in.

"General architecture will need to be so designed as to be artistic and beautiful when seen from above as well as from below." the artist come in.





DR. WULLNER THRILLS

Pours Into Songs Astonishing Amount of Passion, Horror, Sorrow or Happiness.

Germans in Toronto to be in Massey did not show up in any great number. twenty songs on the program he cannot be accused of failure in generos-

The program consisted of ten songs of Schubert's, four of Schumann's, and two each by Brahms, Hugo Wolf and Richard Strauss. It was "Cacilie" by Strauss that he repeated when encored. and the splendid fire and passion of the rendering justified the applause, but several others were equally worthy of the distinction. Those who heard Herbert Witherspoon sing "Die Beiden Grenadiere" last Wednesday in Cleveiand were able to make an interesting comparison. While Dr. Wullner's voice has not the power his dramatic abil-ity is far more intense. This was apparent in the Schubert songs. The subtle grisliness which he imparted to the Eri King, the agony and woe of "the Doppelganger," the pathos of "Der Wanderer," the despairing passion of "Du Liebst Mich Nicht," were all superb. In the lighter Schubert numbers he was delightfully artistic, the yearning tenderness of "Die Tau-benpost," the playful "Die Forelle," the rollicking joy of "Der Musen-schn," which secured three recalls, and the picturesque delicacy of "Alinde" showing an extraordinary range of temperament. Grahms' morbid songs were perfectly rendered, but Wolf's "Fussreise" was not surpassed in charm by anything he sang. Dr. Wullner is able to take a little song and peur into it an astonishing amount of passion or horror or sorrow or happiness. This concentration is the secret of his success. He feels his songs intensely and his audience must perforce feel them too. And his voice is equal to the demands he makes upon it. Coenraad V. 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



Sugars and canned goods are firm. Country trade is generally active. Good sleighing in nearly all parts of the country has helped considerably and remittances are reported fairly good.






