

ANNUAL MEETING.

The regular Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held in the Church on Monday the 2nd March, 1874, E. McGillivray, Esq., in the Chair. The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. D. M. Gordon.

Mr. Robert Cassels was appointed Secretary.

Reports were presented from the Kirk Session and Temporal Committee, with Financial Statements and Building Account. These were referred to a Committee for publication in pamphlet form, for distribution among the members of the Congregation.

By-Law No. 8, referring to the Minister's Salary, having been read, was submitted by the Chairman to the Congregation and unanimously ratified.

REPORT OF THE KIRK-SESSION.

At the close of another financial year, when the condition and interests of the Congregation are under review, the Kirk-Session submit their Annual Statement, and in doing so they desire to express their gratitude to God for His continued goodness.

The accommodation afforded by the Basement of the new Church, in which for the greater part of the year the services of the congregation have been held, and, still more, the increased accommodation of the Church proper, which was opened for public worship on the 25th of January last, has told somewhat on the strength of the congregation. During the year 49 families have been added. Ten have been removed, three having been broken up by death, and seven having left the city, giving a nett increase of thirty-nine. The number is now 254; but, in addition to these, there are 46 adherents not included in the list of families; reckoning, as is usually done, three of these as equivalent to a family, the number of families at present connected with the congregation must be set down as 269.

At date of last Report the number on the Communion Roll was 304. During the year 83 have been added, 15 have been removed (5 by death and 10 by departure from the c y), so that the nett increase has been 63. The number at present on the Roll is 372. Forty Baptisms and twenty-one Deaths have, since last Report, been entered on the registers of the congregation.

The condition of the SABBATH SCHOOLS has not greatly altered during the year. The one which meets in the Basement of the Church is now superintended by Mr. ROBERT CASSILS. It has on its roll 29 office-bearers (including Librarians and Secretary), and 206 pupils. The Lower-town S. School still meets in St. George's Ward School-house. Its former Superintendent, Mr. G. C. HANEY, has been pursuing his studies for the ministry at Princeton, N. J.; prior to his departure he was presented by the teachers and pupils with an address and inkstand as a token of their appreciation of his valuable services. The School is now under the superintendence of Mr. PETER LARMONTH. The number of its office-bearers is 9, of pupils 62. The total number of S. S. office-bearers is thus 38, and of S. S. scholars 268.

The Schools continue to support two orphans in one of the India Orphanages of the Church of Scotland. The receipts during the year have been \$351.01; expenditure \$311.15; balance in Treasurer's hands, \$39.86.

The WEEKLY PRAYER MEETING has, during the past winter, been attended more largely than formerly, but the attendance is still far short of what might naturally be expected. The prayer meeting is held in the Basement every Wednesday evening, at half-past seven o'clock. At the close of the prayer meeting the S. S. teachers meet to prepare the lessons for the following Sabbath.

The LADIES' AID SOCIETY meets in the Basement every Wednesday afternoon, at two o'clock. This Society was organized in November last. It includes the work of poor relief, district visiting, tract distribution, management of congregational re-unions, and other such labours as the ladies of the congregation can appropriately engage in. Even in a financial point of view the Society has been of much service, having raised \$370 for Church furnishings. The Sersion regard it as a very important assistance in congregational work.

Last year it was deemed desirable that an increase should be made in the Eldership. It was accordingly resolved that Mr. James Henry, for many years an elder of the Church elsewhere, be received into the Kirk-Session, and Messrs. Erskine H. Bronson, George P. Drummond, and George E. Elliott were elected by the membership of the Church. On the 6th July, 1873, these gentlemen were ordained to the holy office of the Eldership, and Mr. Henry was received into the Session of this Church, in the presence of the congregation. Each Elder has a district assigned to him for visitation.

In October last the Session conferred with the Temporal Committee regarding the best means of liquidating the debt incurred in the erection of the Church. \$15,000 had been borrowed, to be repaid, principal and interest, in ten years by annual payments of \$2092; and \$7000 had been borrowed at 8 per cent., without any arrangement for payment of principal. There was thus the sum of \$2642 to be raised annually, in addition to previous revenue. To meet this requirement it was resolved to introduce what is known as "the envelope system." Each member of the congregation was requested to contribute, for this special purpose, a certain amount every Sunday, enclosing their contributions in envelopes provided for the purpose and bearing the names of the donors, and giving these in with the usual collection. It was hoped that, if the amount thus raised should exceed the immediate requirements which it was introduced to meet, there might be some reduction of pew rents or of the debt of \$7000, for payment of the principal of which no arrangement had been made. The Session undertook the control of these special contributions. The receipts have been very encouraging. The weekly contributions range from 5 cents to \$1.25. The total amount already raised is \$1060.68, part of which, however, has been paid as subscriptions for the whole year. The weekly average has been \$55 for the sixteen Sabbaths that the system has been in operation, while at the same time the ordinary weekly collections have been somewhat These contributions are sufficient for the immediate increased. requirements of the purpose for which the system was introduced, but they must be considerably increased before any material reduction can be made either in the debt of \$7000 already referred to, or in the pew rents. Now that the congregation has entered the Church with some increase in its membership, the Session hope to find an increase in the contributions,

It should also be mentioned in connection with the above, as will be seen from the Report of the Temporal Committee, that, in addition to the amounts here referred to, the sum of \$13,400 is yet required for the completion of the Church, of which about \$5000, it is estimated, will be realised from unpaid subscriptions.

The Session regret that the contributions to the Schemes of the Church, and to other work outside of the borders of the congregation, have been so small during the past year. Though equal to those of previous years they are not by any means as large as might be reasonably expected from the number and wealth of the congregation; and though the contributions for congregational purposes have, upon the whole, been liberal, yet in the vast field of mission work, both home and foreign, we have done but little.

It is worthy of record that the Kirk-Session voted unanimously in favour of the "Basis of Union" sent down by the Synod, and the congregation were also unanimous with the exception of two dissentient voices.

The Presbyterian is supplied as usual to each family of the congregation on the first Sabbath of every month.

To the Congregation of St. Andrew's Church, Ottawa :

GENTLEMEN, - In submitting to you another Annual Report, the Temporal Committee desire to record their grateful acknowledgments to God for the success which, by His blessing, has thus far attended the efforts of the Congregation towards the completion of this beautiful Church, and to express their hope and trust that the blessing of God may be continued to us as a Congregation. In Initiating The Proof In Proof International

Now that the new Church has been opened for service, it may be interesting, to note and record the incidents of progress made in regard to this. On Sabbath the 21st January, 1872, the last service in the old Church on the present site was held. On the 14th June, same year, the corner stone of the new Church was laid by the Rev. D. M. Gordon, when appropriate addresses by Clergymen and friends of the Church were delivered. On Sabbath the 2nd March, 1873, the Basement of the Church being completed and fitted up, was opened for Divine Service and so used until Sabbath the 25th January, 1874, when, the body of the Church having been completed, it was formally opened for Service. On that occasion appropriate sermons were delivered, in the forenoon by the Rev. Dr. Jenkins of Montreal, in the afternoon by the Rev. Thomas Wardrope, of Guelph, and in the evening by the Rev. D. J. Macdonnell, of Toronto.

While it affords your Committee much satisfaction to refer to the largely increased accommodation afforded by the new Church, still, from the number of applicants at present unsupplied with pews, your Committee have reason to think that had it been of even larger dimensions, it would have been desirable on this account. of another interest of the set

As you are aware, the pews in the body of the Church were recently leased for the ensuing year, commencing this

first day of March, and the location of applicants having been determined by the amount of premiums offered above the fixed annual rental, the whole were taken up at the meeting for that The premiums to be received from this source, being purpose. under a special arrangement, are only applicable to the current year, but the annual rent, as fixed at present, amounts to \$4,300. This is based on the requirements for ordinary annual expenditure, and the payments for interest and reduction of principal of loans, which hitherto have had to be met out of the sums so borrowed, thus impairing the means necessary for the erection of the Church ; but the system of weekly voluntary contributions in charge of the Session, now specially made, will prove of very material aid towards this, and your Committee have pleasure in expressing their great satisfaction at the success that has attended this effort, the weekly average being about \$55.

About \$13,400, will still be needed to cover the outstanding liabilities, and what will yet be required in completing the spire, fencing, &c. Towards this a large amount of subscriptions should have been available, but which, your Committee regret to have to state, remain as yet unpaid; they are therefore not without apprehensions that a considerable portion of this amount may fail to be realized, and in the meantime they estimate about \$5,000 only as the amount they can at present reckon with certainty from this source.

As the debt due by the Church, for loans borrowed on the security of the lot and building, amounts to \$20,500, and as \$7,000 of this is payable within four years, and \$13,500 in nine years by annual payments of principal with interest, your Committee would earnestly appeal to the continued liberality of the Congregation for its liquidation, and would express their hope that the weekly contributions in envelopes may be increased through others of the Congregation who are not yet on the roll of contributors to this praiseworthy scheme.

rowed on the 0,500, and as ad \$13,500 in with interest, he continued an, and would a in envelopes ation who are orthy scheme. as being still posolidate the present loans and spread the annual payments over a longer term, your Committee would now recommend an effort to be made to borrow the amount at a longer date, and for this purpose to get an Act of the Legislature of Ontario passed, authorizing the Congregation to borrow, on the security of the Church property, and by issue of Debentures or otherwise, a sum or sums of money sufficient to pay off the present loans, and to extend the term of payment over a period of twenty years.


The accounts of the Treasurer for the past year will be submitted, shewing the Annual Revenue and Expenditure for past year, and also the expenditure in the building of the Church. Your Committee, however, having been unable to get several statements of contractors' accounts in time to permit of examination and adjustment, the amounts shewn by the Treasurer as due will be subject to correction in this respect, and are given only approximately in the meantime.

In conclusion, your Committee in yielding up the trust committed to them by you, beg to say that their best attention has throughout been given to promote the interests of the Congregation, and they hope and trust that in the selection and appointment of their successors, the Congregation may be wisely directed by God, and that the interests of the Church may be largely promoted and advanced through His blessing
