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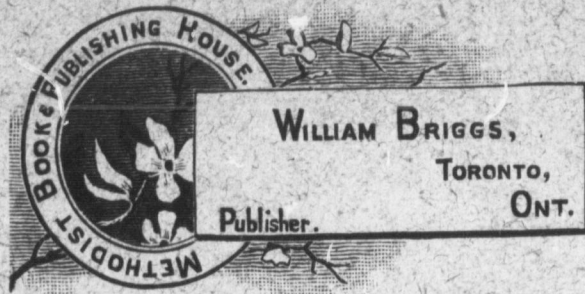

A LETTER OF GREETING
TO THE CANADIAN ASSOCIATION.

December 18, 1890.

*To the Ladies of the Toronto Auxiliary, and of its branches
at Port Hope, Hamilton, Woodstock and London.*

MY DEAR FRIENDS,—

In view of your approaching annual meetings, I have great pleasure in sending you a brief letter of most cordial greeting and congratulation on the consolidation and progress of your association. We have been gladdened during the year by the visits of several Canadian friends, and we are rejoiced to learn from them of the growing interest felt in Toronto and throughout your neighborhood in French evangelisation. It is always cheering to us to have even a passing glimpse of those who, distant as their dwelling is, watch our progress with prayerful sympathy.

The year past, while it has brought to us some special trials, has been marked in our history by much mercy. It is the conviction of all the closest observers that there is a *reaction* in France in favor of serious thought. In spite of the torrent of infidelity and worldliness, we find so many in Paris and elsewhere, who are ready and thankful to listen to the message of the Gospel when it is brought within their reach. Nothing could afford a more resistless proof of this than the visit of the Missionary Boat ("Herald of Mercy") to Paris last May, June and July. Moored in the Seine at the celebrated Pont de la Concorde, in the very centre of Parisian gaiety, the services on board were thronged with most attentive listeners, very many of whom had never before heard the Gospel.

Four services a day were held. The entire attendance during the seven weeks of the vessel's stay was 23,500. We shall never forget the impressive scene—the crowded cabin—the evident delight in the gospel hymns—the new crowd rushing in as soon as the gangway was thrown open, etc. We are very anxious to have, if possible, a *permanent* missionary boat—to go through all the rivers and canals of France. Captain Pim and his wife, two devoted Christians, members of the Society of Friends, desire freely to give their lives to this special service, and we are now seeking for contributions to enable us to have the boat built, and to meet the annual outlay. If realised it promises to be a great blessing, as, thus, hundreds of places can be visited which are, as yet, wholly destitute of evangelistic effort.

Of the stations immediately cared for by you, La Rochelle and Rochefort, I can speak with thankfulness and confidence. Our missionary, M. Dürrelman, has gone on to labor in the two towns with unremitting diligence and marked success. We all feel him to be truly a "man of God," and his excellent wife is like-minded. Happily they have sent me in their annual report early, so that I am able to forward you a copy of it, together with the added statement of M. de Richemond, Archiviste of the Charente-Inférieure, who is the invaluable voluntary helper of Mr. D., and a man of great intelligence and influence. M. Durrelman's broken English will amuse you, but I thought it well to send it you just as I received it from him. I will only add the mention of an incident respecting his eldest boy, which Mr. D. was too modest to insert in the report. He told me that when his boy had gained certain high prizes in La Rochelle Public Schools, he was asked to write an essay, to be laid before the school authorities, in which he was to state what he wished to become. To his father's great joy he inserted the following words, "I wish to become a medical missionary in order that I may bring many souls to Christ."

I do trust, dear friends, that you will be encouraged to go on to support this work in the two western sea-ports, attending your gifts with your prayers. I see that its annual cost, including rent of mission halls, incidentals, schools, evangelist's support, etc., is about \$1,200 to \$1,300.

We have been delighted to find that as your association has become developed so as to have now four additional branches, you are ready to undertake additional work; and we have proposed to you the interesting branch mission in the large city of Toulouse, with three mission halls. The Rev. Daniel Robert, our missionary there, is a truly devoted man, and will, when you are able to take up, in whole or in part, the work, be ready to send you periodical reports of its progress. Its entire annual cost is about \$1,700 or \$1,800, I think,—you could take up such part of it as you judged within your means,—say, if you will one of the three halls. Let us hope that, with the spread of your branch associations, you may, in due time, be able to adopt *the whole* work at Toulonse. Our good missionary just now writes to us begging that he may have a *magic lantern* to exhibit scriptural subjects—a great attraction to the French people everywhere. This would cost some \$20. Unhappily our funds are so inadequate that we cannot grant his request. Should some Christian friends be moved to offer this special gift, I have no doubt it would be much blessed.

And now, my dear friends, I can but, in closing, express my fervent wish that I could be with you, and plead the cause of France for Christ, face to face. May the Divine presence be felt amidst your assembly, and may spiritual blessing descend into your own hearts in proportion to the zeal and self-denial which shall inspire you to attempt great things in the Saviour's cause.

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT,

FEB., 1891.

The ever-widening feeling favourable to the spread of missions is encouraging to those whose hearts are in sympathy with missionary enterprise, whether at home or abroad, and rejoices them to think that as year rapidly follows year we are growing nearer to our divine Master's command, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." This mission in whose interest we are met has just entered in its 20th year, more secure than ever in the affections of its adherents in France, and its friends in Great Britain and America. Dr. McAll said, at the May meeting in London, "I never could understand why I should have been chosen for such a work of being in some sense one of the pioneers for my Lord Jesus across the twenty miles of shining sea, but I can say that if I had ten lives to consecrate I would gladly devote them all to the spread of the knowledge of Christ in France." And Dr. Pierson, in a late number of the *Missionary Review*, echoes the same sentiment, "If I by prevailing prayer could pray 20 years back into a life that is already past its meridian, I would gladly go and help Dr. McAll." And Mrs. Dodds, daughter of the late Rev. Horatia Bonar, whose married life was spent in the mission until the death of her husband, speaking of her return to the work, says: "Evidently the McAll Mission is not a work which people can lightly leave. The heart once put into it remains in it." She has once again become identified with the mission as editor of the *Quarterly Record*. The mission has had its first May meeting in London in Exeter Hall, and held its first conference in Paris with representatives from Great Britain and America. It is hoped to hold this latter annually so that the workers from both sides of the Atlantic may meet for brotherly fellowship, and to confer to-

gether as to the best methods of carrying on the work. New openings for the work have been made at Aurillac and Besançon, and a second hall opened at Poitiers. A mission church has been built on the site of a hall at Bercy, where for sixteen years the mission has been endeavouring to spread the light. The building has been erected through the generosity of two ladies. Mr. Greig, the esteemed superintendent of the children's work, and who for ten years has been laboring among the people, is the pastor. The finances have not admitted of any other new work, though the French brethren, who are ready freely to do all the work, and who ask only for halls, are constantly pressing forward and are sorrowfully refused. Unforeseen expense has been incurred by the Paris Committee, chiefly in making repairs and alterations in some of the central mission halls, which were absolutely necessary for safety and comfort; also the mission has suffered in the loss by death of two or three of its largest contributors. The soldiers' reading rooms, established by this mission, is a work of much promise. They are at Nice, Marseilles, Montpellier. This year one has been opened in Avignon, and one in Paris. These are supplied with books, periodicals, writing materials, and the Bible holds a prominent place on the tables; lectures on social economy are given, and addresses by the pastors of the city from time to time. Dr. McAll has often said, "The best way to evangelize the young men of France is to seek them in the barracks, where each French citizen must pass three of the best years of his life." The work of the mission boat has again rejoiced the hearts of the directors. This boat, the "Herald of Mercy," owned by Mr. Cook, of Gosport, has been several times loaned to Dr. McAll, and this year was moored in the Seine, at Paris, at the Pont de la Concorde. The novelty of this floating church would no doubt attract, but the recorded incidents indicate that the Word has found a place in many hearts. The mission hopes soon

to own a boat. Already an appeal has appeared in the *Christian*, which has obtained some results. Among the friends God has given an excellent captain, he and his wife are ready to leave their home and spend their lives on the rivers and canals for the sake of Jesus Christ. Many of the workers of the mission are willing to give their holiday time, to assist in the services on board. A few hundred pounds and the salvation boat constructed, equipped, and adapted for its work, will carry along the shores and to inland towns the glorious message of the Gospel of Peace.

The two free dispensaries in Paris are doing a noble work. Dr. Estrabaut, the physician in charge, has gained the entire confidence of these people; his power to relieve their bodies makes them inclined to believe his word implicitly, on every subject. A man came to him one day, and putting his hand on his side, said, "I have a pain here." The physician set to work according to the most approved methods, to find out whether heart, lungs, or some other organ was at fault. "Oh, no," said the man when at last he saw that the doctor was puzzled, "it is not that; it was the words I heard in the meeting that gave me the pain." Cherefully did Dr. Estrabaut prescribe for that trouble. The doctor hopes to open another dispensary shortly, at Grenelle, a suburb of Paris. The one at St. Etienne, under the care of Dr. Hastings Burroughes, has in connection a soup kitchen and night refuge. The Dr. has had his way opened up wonderfully in the establishment of this refuge, and last year the county council passed a vote of thanks to him and his colleague, and voted a sum of money for its sustenance. Mothers' meetings, sewing schools for children, bible classes, Sunday schools, all form part of the mission. In the Sunday schools, there are 235,000 children. Temperance meetings are also held in different places with good results. At La Rochelle and Rochefort, in which we are particularly interested, M. Durrleman speaks encouragingly of the meetings. At

Rochefort on Sunday evenings the hall is filled to overflowing, and on week nights from 60 to 80 persons. At La Rochelle some anxiety has been felt owing to the fact that since several conversions have taken place amongst the Roman Catholics, the hall has been closely watched, so that workmen seen to enter risk losing their work, and suffer in other ways; notwithstanding the attendance during the summer has kept up, the presence of the Holy Ghost is felt in the meetings a sure token of better things to come. At Toulouse, the new station taken up temporarily by this association, M. Robert reports the attendance at the meetings good. In the earlier part of the year, when it was brought to the notice of the regular attendants, that the funds of the mission were low, it was suggested the advisability of helping, the suggestion resulted in weekly contributions, which reached at the end of the year 200 frs., and this from a poor people. M. Robert since he has come amongst them has opened two mission schools for children with an average attendance of 50. We are sorry to have to record this year the death of Rev. R. McAll, cousin of Dr. McAll, and the representative of the mission in England and editor of the *Quarterly Record*; also the loss sustained by French Protestantism in the death of Rev. Eugene Bersier. From the first he was a warm friend of Dr. McAll, and for years had given one evening a week to speaking in the halls.

The work of the Canadian association has had a fair amount of success. Eight monthly meetings have been held with an average attendance of 26. At these Bible readings have been given by members, or inspiring words from some one who had recently visited the mission. Letters received from Paris and the stations in which we are directly interested come as a welcome message bringing news from the field. We also receive the *Quarterly Record* from Paris and the *McAll Record* published by the American McAll Association, from whom we get a large quantity

of literature bearing on the work. We are glad to record the formation of four auxiliaries during the past year, at Port Hope, Woodstock, Hamilton and London. The opening meetings at each of these auxiliaries was an augury of success for the future. We are glad to welcome them as part of the association, thankful that God's leading hand has been with us.

London auxiliary has a membership of 51, Woodstock 50, Hamilton 30, Port Hope 18. The amount raised during the year was \$1500, of which we wish to acknowledge from Hamilton auxiliary \$60, London \$41, Woodstock \$30.27, Port Hope \$18.30. We desire to thank all the ministers who have so kindly from their pulpits given notice of our monthly meetings, to the Church and daily papers for notices of our work, to the directors of the Y. M. C. A. for the use of the library in which we hold our meetings, and to all those who have helped to make those meetings profitable and pleasant.

We feel in summing up our year's work how little we have done, how small have been our gifts in view of the possibilities and responsibilities of this missionary work. We are indeed glad of the widening of our horizon in the work of the association, and look forward to welcome many auxiliaries this coming year to help in this mission so eminently blessed of God.

The present situation of France is favorable to the spread of Evangelical Christianity, the attitude of the Government is a tolerant one towards all forms of religious thought, and from recent articles in some of the leading papers of Paris, a great change has taken place in the religious ideas of students in the higher institutions of learning in France. They are no longer disciples of Voltaire, they deal with religious questions as with any scientific problem, seriously and without prejudice. Do not these things indicate the open door? May we enter in in "His name."

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

CANADIAN McALL ASSOCIATION.

Article 1.

NAME AND OBJECT.

Sect. 1. This organization shall be called the Canadian McAll Association.

Sect. 2. Its object shall be to aid the Evangelistic Mission in France, known as the "McAll Mission" in the promotion of a pure Christianity in France. In furtherance of this end it shall endeavour to organize Auxiliaries throughout the Dominion, and these shall report annually or oftener if necessary to this Association.

Article 2.

MEMBERS.

Any person may become a member of this Association on payment of an annual subscription of \$1.00. The payment of \$25 by one person at one time or in installments during the year, shall constitute such person a life member.

Article 3.

OFFICERS.

Sect. 1. A Board of Directors shall be elected representing equally as far as possible the various denominations. The Presidents of Auxiliaries to be ex-officio members of the Board.

Sect. 2. The Board of Directors shall annually elect by ballot its own office bearers.

Sect. 3. The Board shall have power to fill any vacancies which may occur in its number during the year.

Article 4.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Sect. 1. The Board of Directors shall meet quarterly (or oftener if necessary) for the transaction of business, 7 members constituting a quorum. It shall be the duty of the Board in general to diffuse information respecting the work, and to do all other busi-

ness which may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this Association.

Sect. 2. The President or, in her absence, one of the Vice-Presidents shall preside at all meetings.

Sect. 3. The President or Secretary shall prepare and present the items of business of the Board of Directors, and shall superintend the execution of all measures adopted by the Board.

Sect. 4. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to conduct all correspondence for the Board and to make an annual report to the Association at the annual meeting, and to keep a full and permanent record of the proceedings of the Board and of the annual meetings.

Sect. 5. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and keep an account of all the funds paid into the treasury and to disburse them by order of the President, and to give an itemized report of receipts and expenditures at the annual meeting her accounts shall be examined by an Auditor appointed by the Board.

Article 5.

ANNUAL MEETING.

The annual meeting shall be held at such time and place as may be appointed by the Board to hear the annual reports of the Board through the Secretary and Treasurer, and transact other business of the Association, with suitable religious services.

Article 6.

AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be altered or amended at any regular annual meeting by a vote of two thirds of the members present, adequate notice having been given at least three months previous.

FOR AUXILIARIES.

Article 1.

NAME AND OBJECT.

Sect. 1. This society shall be called the "Auxiliary of the Canadian McAll Association."

Sect. 2. The object shall be to aid the Canadian McAll Association

in the work of promoting interest in, and raising funds for the "Evangelistic Mission in France, known as the McAll Mission."

Article 2.

MEMBERS.

Any person may become a member of the Auxiliary by the annual payment of 50c.

Article 3.

OFFICERS.

The officers shall consist of a President, one or more Vice-Presidents, Secretary and Treasurer.

Article 4.

COMMITTEE.

A committee not exceeding 12 may be appointed annually, who with the officers shall constitute an executive committee who shall conduct the affairs of the Auxiliary during the year.

Article 5.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS.

Sect 1. The President shall preside at all meetings, and have a general oversight of the work.

Sect 2. In the absence of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall take her place.

Sect. 3. The Secretary shall give notice of meetings, keep the minutes of the same and prepare the annual report which she shall forward to the Secretary of the Association, with the list of officers for the ensuing year.

Sect. 4. The Treasurer shall report the state of the treasury at every meeting, and remit the funds half yearly to the Treasurer of the Association.

Article 6.

MEETINGS.

This society shall hold regular meetings, when all suitable means shall be adopted to promote interest in the work, also an annual meeting to elect officers and hear the annual reports.

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
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
