

PRESIDENT'S MEAT REPORT (New York Globe).







THE McCRACKEN INQUEST Physicians Give Their Opinions

The inquest in connection with the death of Harry McCracken was resumed last night and during the session physicians gave evidence relative to the case,

stated that he had attended McCracken before he went to the hospital, and also said in answer to the coroner that a typhoid fever patient falling 40 feet might be killed thereby and others might not be injured at all.

Dr. W. J. Scott, superintendent of the hospital, said that typhoid patients usually give vent to low mutterings, but without violence. The doctor said that after the accident McCracken did not appear to suffer from the shock.


