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LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

As adopted at a General Meeting of the Society, held in the City of Toronto, on the 3rd day of August, 1855.

[UNDER THE ACT OF INCORPORATION.]

ARTICLE I.—This Society shall be denominated the "UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY," having the same object in view as the British and Foreign Bible Society, that is—the circulation of the Bible, without note or comment.

II.—This Society shall endeavour to unite all the different Societies in the Province, and to concentrate their operations, in order to give more efficiency to the whole.

III.—This Society shall maintain in the City of Toronto a general dépôt of Bibles and Testaments from which all the Bible Societies in connection with it shall be supplied with the Scriptures at the lowest price at which they can be afforded.

IV.—The business of the Society shall be conducted by a Board of Directors, consisting of a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and Secretaries, together with twenty lay members, fifteen of whom, who shall have most frequently attended, shall be eligible for re-election each year, five of whom to form a quorum. All ministers of the Gospel, who are members of the Society, shall be entitled to a seat, and to vote with the Directors.

V.—The President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and Agents of all Bible Societies in connection therewith, shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board.

VI.—At the meeting of the Directors, the President, or, in his absence, the Vice-President first upon the list then present, and in the absence of such Vice-President, the Treasurer, and in his absence such member as shall be chosen for that purpose, shall preside.

VII.—Each person paying annually one dollar, shall be a member of this Society; and persons paying twenty dollars at any one time, either to this Society, or to any of the Societies in connection therewith, or through them to the British and Foreign Bible Society; or who may have rendered important services, shall, at the discretion of the Directors, be declared Life Members.

VIII.—That each Life Member of this Society shall be furnished with a Certificate of Membership, under the Corporate Seal of the Company, duly signed by the President and Secretaries for the time being, and shall be allowed to receive from the Depository annually, for distribution, Bibles and Testaments to the value of one dollar. IX.—That the Board of Directors, for the time being, shall have the appointment of Agents, Depositary, Colporteurs, Book-keeper, and Assistants of the Society, and the fixing of all salaries and allowances; and shall have the superintendence and management of all the property, real and personal, of the Corporation, as well as the management and control of its general affairs, and the appropriation of its funds, with full power to enact such rules as may be requisite to effect the objects contemplated by the Act of Normal States and States and

X.—The Board of Directors shall meet for the transaction of business once in each quarter, and at any other time when called together by the Secretary, or any three of the Directors.

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XI.—A general meeting of the Society shall be held in the month of May, in each and every year, or at such other time as the Directors for the time being may deem best for the interests of the Society; when the Officers and Directors for the ensuing year shall be chosen; a report of the proceedings for the foregoing year presented; together with the Treasurer's and Depositary's accounts, duly audited.

XII.—In the Annual Report of the Society, the efforts of the several Societies in connection with it, shall be distinctly mentioned, as respects the circulation of the Scriptures and the contributions to the funds; together with such other matter connected with them can be a several several

with such other matter connected with them as may be generally interesting. XIII.—That the general meetings of the Society shall be opened by reading a portion of the Sacred Scriptures, and with prayer.

XIV.—That no alterations in this Constitution shall be made except at a General Meeting of the Society, and after one month's notice of the same has been given to the Board.

RESOLUTION PASSED BY THE COMMITTEE RELATIVE TO GRANTS TO SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

That in all applications for grants of Bibles to Sunday Schools, the applicant be requested to furnish the Secretaries with an account of the state of the School; the number of Scholars and Teachers; the amount of Funds at to make such application;—all which should in every case be certified by a Minister of the Gospel, or some person of known respectability. And further, this Committee recommend that the Secretary be instructed to make grants in future only to destitute settlements; reporting the same to the next General Meeting of the Committee.

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RULES

FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AUXILIARIES.

That the members of the Bible Society in any city or other principal centre, approved of by the Board of Directors, may form themselves into a Central Auxiliary to the Upper Canada Bible Society under the following Rules and Regulations :--

- 1. That no Central Auxiliary shall make any laws or regulations inconsistent with the fundamental principles of the Bible Society.
- 2. That all the general Travelling Agents of the Society shall be appointed by and be responsible to the general Board of Directors.
- 3. Each Auxiliary shall have full power to establish Depositaries, employ Colporteurs, organize Branches, collect moneys, consult with, and advise Agents (while in their department of the field), and do all other business necessary for the efficient cultivation of that portion of the country assigned to it.
- 4. Each Auxiliary, in addition to the *ex-officio* members of this Board, shall have power to appoint three of its members on the general Board of Directors—their appointment to be notified to the Secretary of such Board, who will place their names on the printed list of Directors, and give due intimation to the Secretaries of such Auxiliaries of all Quarterly Meetings, at which alone the Travelling Agents shall be appointed.
- 5. The General Boards may make grants to the Auxiliaries for defraying the expenses of additional Colporteurs within their fields of labour, on special cause appearing to the Board to justify the same.
- 6. As all the books kept for sale by the Auxiliaries will be obtained from or through this Board, the Auxiliaries shall make quarterly returns to it of all money received by them for the sale of the Scriptures or otherwise; and after paying local expenses, the balance, together with the free grants from the various Branches, be remitted to the Board, to aid in the work of Bible distribution by the Upper Canada Society, and by the British and Foreign Bible Society, as the Auxiliaries or Branches may direct.
- 7. Each Auxiliary shall prepare and forward to the General Board, on or before the 15th of April in each year, a detailed account of its operations, including the Branches, up to the 31st of March, with a view to the preparation of the Society's Annual Report.

RULES

RECOMMENDED TO BRANCH SOCIETIES.

I. That a Society be formed in connection with the British and Foreign Bible Society, through the medium of the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of contributing to the circulation of the Holy Scriptures, without note or comment: the English copies being of the authorized version only.

II. That the Society be denominated "THE _____ BRANCH BIBLE SOCIETY."

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III. That all persons subscribing one dollar annually, or five dollars at one time, shall be members of this Society.

IV. That the business of this Society shall be conducted by a President, Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, Secretaries, and a Committee consisting of not less than —— other members; five to constitute a quorum.

V. That all Ministers of the Gospel who join the Society shall be reckoned members of the Committee.

VI. That the Committee shall meet quarterly, or oftener; the time and place of meeting to be fixed by themselves.

VII. That the Committee divide their sphere of operations into Districts, and appoint two of their own members for each district, to solicit subscriptions and donations from the inhabitants, and also to ascertain the wants of the people regarding the word of God.

VIII. That the whole of the subscriptions and donations received by this Society shall be applied, after deducting incidental expenses, to the purchase of Bibles and Testaments from the Upper Canada Bible Society, to supply this neighbourhood (which copies of the Scriptures the Committee are to sell to members at a reduced price, to others at cost, and to give, gratis, to those they know cannot purchase): and that the surplus be remitted, half-yearly, to the Upper Canada Bible Society, for the purpose of translating the word of God into the Indian languages, and for supplying other nations, through the Parent Institution, with the pure word of God.

IX. That a General Meeting of the Subscribers be held on the — day of — , in each year, at — , when the accounts shall be presented, the proceedings of the past year stated, a new Committee appointed, and a Report agreed upon; the Report to be published under the direction of the Committee, if required.

X. That on the formation of a new Committee, the Presidents, Vice-Presidents, Treasurers, Secretaries, and such three-fourths of the other members of the committee as have most frequently attended, shall be elip gible for re-election for the ensuing year.

TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY.

In presenting their Annual Report, the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society feel that they cannot proceed to give a detail of the operations of the past year, before adverting to the very serious loss which the Society has sustained in the death of James S. Howard, Esq., for many years the senior and acting Secretary. The Directors use no vain words when they say, that Mr. Howard's removal leaves a blank which it will be very difficult to fill. At the time of his sudden call, he appears to have been engaged in replying to a letter in connexion with the interests of the Society, the last work i. which his hand was put this being the business of the Bible Society, to the affairs of which he had for nearly 21 years given no small share of his time and attention. At a meeting of the Board, held shortly after his death, the following minute was adopted and ordered to be entered on the records of the Society, a copy to be at the same time sent to the widow and family of the deceased.

"Whereas it has pleased Almighty God, in his all-wise providence, to remove by a sudden stroke Mr. James S. Howard, for many years senior corresponding Secretary of the Upper Canada Bible Society, the Directors, at this their first meeting after his decease, desire to record their very high sense of Mr. Howard's worth and of the value of the services which he rendered to the Bible Society. For nearly twenty-one years he was connected with the Society as Secretary, and discharged the duty of that office with an energy and zeal which showed that his heart was truly in the work. He gave no small portion of his time to the business of the Society, and it is interesting to know that the last work which occupied his heart and his hand was connected with the interests of the Society. The Directors desire to lay to heart the sudden removal of their deceased colleague, and would seek divine grace that they may be enabled to work while it is called to-day, and to watch as those who wait for the coming of their Lord. In common with his family and many friends, the Directors mourn

his sudden departure, but they firmly believe that the call did not come upon him unawares, or find him unprepared. The Directors deeply sympathise with his mourning widow and family, and earnestly trust that while they sorrow, though not as those who have no hope, they may experience abundantly the consolations of the word and of the spirit of God."

We have also to notice the removal of one of the Vice-Presidents, the late Chief Justice McLean, one of the oldest friends of the Society, who died since our last anniversary, full of years, and of the honors, which he enjoyed as a good man and an upright judge.

The business of the Society for the past season has been of an encouraging and cheering nature, and indicates no diminished interest in the work of Bible circulation. An abundant harvest having been vouchsafed to us by the great Giver of all good, and a season of prosperity having been experienced throughout the Province, it might have been anticipated that after some seasons of depression there would be some progress in connexion with the operations of the Society. We are thankful to be enabled to say that the actual result has not disappointed such anticipations. This will appear by the following statements.

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AGENCY.

The Agents have during the year been engaged in their usual work, visiting the existing Branches and forming new Branches in localities where no Bible Associations formerly existed. In all, 41 new branches have been formed during the year, making 355 in all connected with the Society, including those within the bounds of the Auxiliaries of London and Kingston.

THE DEPOSITORY.

The business at the Depository has been carried on as usual, efficiently and zealously, by Mr. Carless and his assistants. The Directors believe that the work is done as economically as possible, with due regard to the efficiency of the Society They would state further that in every department of the work entrusted to their superintendence no needless expenditure is allowed.

AUXILIARIES.

KINGSTON.—In connexion with the Kingston Auxiliary there are now 32 Branches, three of those newly organized. For the year ending 9th January, 1866, the total issues were, Bibles 1,176, Testaments 1,681, and Parts 153; making in all 3,010. The total receipts were \$1,745 04. One Colporteur is employed within the bounds of the Kingston Auxiliary, whose labours appear to have been productive of no small amount of good. For many years there has been a Ladies' Bible Association at Kingston, in active operation. Both Mr. Brookman and Mr. Johnson have spent some time in the bounds of the Kingston Auxiliary, and the Committee report as the result of their labours a very perceptible improvement in the interest maniested in the Bible Society's career.

LONDON. — Connected with the London Auxiliary there are 60 Branches, to which no doubt considerable additions will soon be made. Two Colporteurs have been labouring within the bounds of this Auxiliary, by whom 4,111 copies of the Scriptures were put in circulation, although one of the Colporteurs has laboured only 9 months, and the other 11 months. The total amount received by the London Auxiliary for the year has been \$3,581 48, and the total of Scriptures issued 8,646. There is a Ladies' Bible Society in London, but it is not connected with the Auxiliary.

In carrying on the operations of the Auxiliary at London, on its new footing, there have been some difficulties experienced. These

have been under serious consideration with the Committee at London and the Board here, and it is hoped that they may be all surmounted, and efficiency and success secured in perfect harmony between the Upper Canada Society and the Auxiliary at London.

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OTHER SOCIETIES.

We rejoice to notice the successful prosecution of the work of Bible circulation by other societies, both in our own and in the sister provinces, as well as in other lands. The Montreal Society prosecutes its work in its wide field, embracing so many of the French Canadians, with vigour and success.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The American Bible Society, now that the war has been happily ended, and the process of reconstruction and consolidation commencep has a great work before it, which it is preparing to undertake with the energy that is characteristic of the nation. Even during the war frequent and large grants were made for the people and armies of the South, amounting in the aggregate to 300,000 volumes. Now a large field is opened among the coloured population, happily no longer in bondage. To supply the destitution among these, special efforts are being made by the Society. The present season is one of great interest to our friends in the United States. It is their jubilee year, the fiftieth year of their existence and operations as a Bible Society. Great preparations have been made for the celebration of this interesting season. Delegates have been appointed by the British and Foreign Bible Society, and on the cordial invitation of the Society in New York, delegates have been commissioned by this Board to be present at the meeting to testify our cordial goodwill and interest in their work. For wherever and by whomsoever the circulation of the Bible is carried on, the work is one, and all who are engaged in the work are brethren and fellow-labourers. We earnestly trust that our friends in the United States may, in this their year of jubilee, be enabled to set forward with increased zeal in the prosecution of their great work.

BRITISH AND FOREIGN BIBLE SOCIETY.

The operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society have been carried on during the year with no diminution of energy and zeal. We cannot minutely enter into a detail of their operations,

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We shall, however, as usual, print in the appendix to this report an abstract of the report of the Parent Society. We may here simply state, that in South America the work is encouraging. An agent was in the beginning of the season labouring on that continent from the Atlantic to the Pacific, and found in many quarters encouragement and co-operation.

In Turkey Dr. Thomson has been pursuing his arduous work with much energy and success. The sales have been very considerable, and the scriptures are penetrating into regions where they were previously little known.

The progress of the work of Bible distribution in China is very encouraging, although the work is not free from difficulties and dangers.

In Belgium, Switzerland, Germany and Italy, the work is carried on not only by the establishment of depots for the sale of the scriptures, but by colportage, on which latter mode of operation a special blessing appears in many instances to rest.

The domestic operations of the Society too are not destitute of interest, and the result appears to be a still increasing attachment to the Society which has done so much for the circulation of the Word of God throughout the world.

Great interest has been manifested in the new Bible House, which it has been necessary to erect. Many large contributions have been given by the wealthy, while smaller offerings have been freely given throughout the country. The foundation stone is to be laid (D.V.) by the Prince of Wales on the 11th June.

By a letter just received we learn that the receipts of the Parent Society for the year just ended were $\pounds 171,375$ 0s. 2d, and the payments $\pounds 182,402$ 3s. 5d. In Mexico and China, as well as in Austria, Russia and Portugal the work is prospering. A depot has just been opened in Warsaw for the supply of Poland. The issues of the Parent Society for the year were 2,287,000.

The directors in laying before their constituents this report and resigning their trust into their hands, would express the fervent hope and prayer that their successors may have vouchsafed to them much wisdom and earnestness, that they may strive to carry on the work with zeal and discretion. The work may not be without some difficulties, the nature of which need not here be particularly referred to. But it is hoped that by a patient, large-hearted and forbearing consideration of any such difficulties, they may be surmounted, and the friends of the Bible be more and more united in the great work of its circulation. Events both here and in other lands are occurring which should stimulate the energies of all who truly love the Saviour,

and His blessed word, to be more than ever earnest and energetic in seeking to establish the authority and promote the circulation of the word of God. It is that word alone which, opened and applied by the Spirit can make wise unto salvation. It is that word alone which freely diffused and exercing its proper influence can render a community truly free, enlightened and happy. It is that word alone which can be a safe guide through the difficulties and trials of life. It is that word alone which can lead to the glory and blessedness of an eternal life. Let it therefore be our delight and glory, as also our duty and our interest, to cherish and follow it, and to aid in the great work which has for its object and watchword, "The Bible for the world."

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

FOR THE YEAR ENDING JANUARY 23, 1866.

"It is good to be always zealously affected in a good cause," is an apostolic injunction; and in none more so than in the blessed work of Bible distribution.

Your Committee therefore, in accordance with past practice, appear before the members and friends of the Society, at this time, to lay before them a full and faithful report of the transactions which have marked another year of its labours and operations, which through the divine blessing have been brought to a termination thus far.

While your Committee regard it to be one of the highest honours to be engaged in directing the affairs of this institution, and are grateful to God for that measure of success with which he has favored the operations of the Society, and for the sympathy and co-operation experienced from the friends of the Bible cause during the past year, still they would with feelings of deep humility acknowledge their short comings in many respects in pressing forward this work with more earnestness and candour, and faith in Him, without whom nothing is strong, nothing is holy.

As this is in reality the first year in which your Auxiliary has assumed its new phase and organization, your Committee would ask the indulgence of the friends of the cause, in order that they may place before them a fuller statement than is on ordinary occasions required of the reasons and difficulties that have tended to hamper their operations.

And here they may remark that, in every new organization, there are new difficulties arising out of new duties and increased responsibilities, which call for time and adequate knowledge to meet and apply the proper remedies.

Our new organization was brought about with the view of more thoroughly meeting the wants and claims of a large section of country

that would be more within our reach, and consequently nearer to a more intimate acquaintance, in working out all the objects which the Bible Society contemplates.

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The chfef barrier in the way of success, your Committee believes has arisen principally from misunderstandings with the Branches, which have been assigned us by the Upper Canada Bible Society as a portion of our field of labour.

These misapprehensions have arisen partly from a want of a fuller explanation on the part of our Agent, of the relations which the Branches sustain towards us as an Auxiliary, and partly, it may be, from an insufficient knowledge of our own duties, in seeing that the requisite information was not earlier brought before them.

It may be well to state here, by way of explanation, that in assuming our present position, we anticipaied much of our pecuniary support would necessarily come from these channels, instead as formerly going to the Upper Canada Bible Society, as it had become a depot of supply of the Scriptures to them, thus furnishing them with copies of the word at a less cost of carriage, besides increasing their facilities of obtaining stock.

In this we have been greatly disappointed from the reasons previously mentioned, and we can only report here that, from sixty Branches in connexion with your Auxiliary, your Committee have received during the past year the small sum of \$174 17 as gratuitous donations. We had expected to receive a sum very much exceeding this amount. We had looked for a report of the Branches in the five counties assigned us, from the Agent of the Upper Canada Bible Society, whilst labouring in your district; however, as this is not forthcoming, and that gentleman is present with us to-night, he will no doubt be able duly to explain.

Another untoward circumstance financially, in diminishing our income from the city of London, has arisen from an incorrect idea prevailing, that the "Ladies' Bible Society," existing in our midst, is one and the same institution. Need we say, we hail the efforts of the ladies, as fellow-workers in the same great and glorious work of Bible distribution, and wish them God speed, while we make the distinction that they are in no way connected with us.

COLPORTAGE DEPARTMENT.

Your Committee have to report under this head, that since Feb. 6, 1865, two Colporteurs, Messrs. Crombie and Waddell, have been labouring in the service of your Society.

The following is an abstract of their operations for the time specified :

Mr. Crombie has been in the field 9 months and 20 days, up to November 20, 1865.

Mr. Waddell has been engaged 11 months, up to January 6, 1866.

Mr. Crombie has sold 806 Bibles, 1,086 Testaments. Total 1,892 copies.

Mr. Waddell has sold 671 Bibles, 1,548 Testaments. Total 2,219 copies.

Mr. Crombie furnished gratuitously 28 Bibles and Testaments and Portions of Scripture.

Mr. Waddell furnished gratuitously 21 Bibles and Testaments and Portions of Scripture.

Mr. Crombie has paid 5,340 visits to families.

Mr. Waddell has paid 4,004 visits to families.

Mr. Crombie, during his term, has laboured in the counties of Middlesez and Elgin.

Mr. Waddell has laboured in the West Riding of Middlesex, and in the counties of Lambton and Essex.

The visits of your Colporteurs have been highly appreciated, and we have reason to hope that the results and fruits of their labours will receive an abundant blessing.

We may add here, that only a mere portion of the field has been wrought, and your Committee look forward to large success accompanying the efforts of the Colporteurs in those portions of the district not yet travelled by them.

Messrs. Crombie and Waddell have been employed about two months in taking up collections and visiting in the city.

REPORT OF REV. S. B. JOHNSON. TO THE SECRETARIES OF THE U. C. BIBLE SOCIETY.

ORCHARD DALE, near ORONO, March 31, 1866.

DEAR SIRS,-In commencing my report of labors on behalf of your Society during another year, I am forcibly reminded of the importance of diligently performing the work committed us to do, from the fact that our honored friend to whom for the past eleven years I have addressed this paper has been called to his rest. I am never more impressed with the importance of the work in which we are engaged than when reviewing the various branches which compose our auxiliary, and when there is thus brought consecutively before me the condition and prospects of our several departments of operation, commencing with our cities, down to our small villages and rural population. God in his goodness has been pleased to bless our land with a return to prosperity, both as it regards its commerce and agriculture, and it must rejoice the heart of every Christian to mark that our noble Society has been enabled to report a large addition to its income, and a very considerable advance on former years' circulation of the Holy Scriptures. The attendance at our various public meetings, too, has been larger than I have ever known them previously, which is a gratifying sign that the general interest in the work is on the increase.

My labors commenced in the western field of labor. Mr. Brookman having been appointed to visit the branches in connection with the Kingston Auxiliary, now happily a portion of ourselves. I was deputed to visit some of his branches during his absence. I commenced with Beverly, an interesting branch, which I had the pleasure of forming some years since, and which has always been zealously conducted. Our meeting was well attended, and although their yearly returns had been made, a collection was taken up which was voted as a free contribution to the Society. I next visited Drayton, and found our friends had, without the agent, held their annual meeting, and appropriated their funds. Circumstances were not then such as to enable them to hold another public meeting with a prospect of success, and after a pleasant conference with the President and some other of the officers, I proceeded to the romantic little village of Glen Allan, where was held a very satisfactory meeting. I next proceeded to Millbank, quite a new place, but shewing appearance of growth and activity, and held an interesting meeting, after which I received \$22 43 as a free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society. At Arthur I was sorry to find that no arrangements had been made for a meeting, the good secretary, who has ever taken a lively interest in the Society, having removed. Having had an interview with the president, I proceeded to Mount Forest, where I was delighted to meet an old Bible friend from Peterboro', who, when there, was our valued secretary. The meeting was not largely attended, but was very interesting-the local

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clergy in their places to give their countenance and aid. I had a long drive to Durham, where, after an interesting meeting, I had the pleasure of receiving some \$44 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$25 to the British and Foreign Bible Society. At Hanover, a small new branch, I found some warm friends of the cause. Monies had been forwarded. Our meeting was quite interesting. I next visited a small branch that I had formed some two years since at the request of a tried friend from Meaford, and although from the paucity of population but little can at present be done, yet that little is cheerfully rendered with a view to his favor who accepts a cup of cold water to a disciple in the name of a disciple, as service rendered to himself. A small but most encouraging meeting. Nottawasaga was next visited, and I would I could speak favorably of their operations. A change of operations has been proposed by my successor, which will I trust lead to better results. I next proceeded to Feversham, a new small village in the township of Osprey, where after preaching on the Sabbath I organized a new branch on Monday evening under most favorable circumstances. A liberal subscription was taken up, and a supply of Scriptures ordered through me from our depository in Toronto before I left the place. Collingwood .- Our friends here, considering the circumstances of the place, work well, and give evidence of growing attachment to the Society. At Thornbury we had a highly satisfactory meeting. Returns had been duly made, and I found everything in good working order. At Meaford, too, the work was evidently in a satisfactory condition. We had good local help at the meeting. Owen Sound was next on the list, and though local circumstances were such that our meeting was not so large as usual, no diminution of interest was the cause. After the proceedings were satisfactorily brought to a close, I received \$71 79 on purchase account for stock received.

At Saugeen no announcement for a meeting had been made, and I was obliged to leave without any opportunity of presenting the claims of the Society in order to hold the anniversary of a small branch that had been organized some years ago by Rev. Mr. Ball, but which from an unfortunate oversight he had failed to report. After a Sabbath, in the course of which I gave three services, the meeting was held on Monday evening, and I trust a fresh impetus was given to the cause in this interesting settlement at Tara. The township of Arran, in which it is situated, is an excellent one, and a vigorous organization ought to be sustained. Tiverton came next in course, and is holding on. At Kincardine, a fine growing village, I was glad to witness great interest. A number of meetings had been held by the committee with the assistance of the local clergy in the course of the year, by which means their contributions had been double in amount what they had ever reached before. No better way of sustaining and increasing the interest of Bible operations is known than this. An excellent meeting. Returns previously forward. Teeswater was next in rotation, and is still usefully holding on. At Gorrie I found much disappointment that the agent had not paid them a visit during the year. We had, however, a very pleasant meeting, not I trust without happy results. Manchester .- This small branch was in good working order. An excellent meeting, and a warm interest displayed. This closed my summer tour, and after harvest I again commenced work at the beginning of September, holding two meetings in connection with the Norval branch-one at Glen Williams, the other at Union Church-on both of which occasions we were favored with the presence of Rev. Dr. O'Meara,

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Revs. Alexander and Ewing. The attendance was good, and the objects of the society were explained to friends of the cause living some distance from the place at which the annual meeting is held. I then proceeded to my eastern field of labor, commencing with the county of Ontario. As these branches had previously been visited during the winter, and as the busy season of the year rendered it impossible properly to attend to the work of collection, I shall now for some weeks to come have little to report in the way of funds, but I am very thankful to say that the collections were in due time properly made, and in most instances with a gratifying increase in amount.

My first visit was to *Dunbarton*, a small but liberal branch, well conducted. Our meeting was well attended, and great interest manifested in the operations of the Society. At *Duffin's Creek* our meeting, owing to the weather, was small. At *Claremont*, after a Sabbath appointment, we had, as always, an excellent meeting. Our friends here not only contribute largely, but come in large numbers to hear of the progress of the good work. In part of their field I was invited to form a new branch, which I did at *Greenwood*, with excellent prospect of usefulness and efficiency. "May the little one become a thousand."

I next proceeded to Columbus, but found it necessary to postpone the meeting, and after making arrangements to return I proceeded to Brooklin, where we held a very interesting meeting. At Zion we had quite our usual attendance, and much interest was manifested. At Hampton the attendance was large, and the meeting seemed alive to the importance of increased Whitby gave us a good meeting, and everything in general in diligence. good working order. A well-managed and liberal ally. At Oshawa, too, the attendance was highly encouraging. The contributions likely to be considerably in advance. Newcastle, owing to the business energy of its excellent secretary, had collected for the year, and here I received the first money since I left home. In advance of last year-all honor to the indefatigable lady collectors. Upwards of \$20 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$20 to British and Foreign, and \$20 to the Upper Canada Bible Society-in all \$60 84. Newtonville .- This little branch maintains its character for liberality. A good meeting, though returns not made. Orono. -We had a good meeting. The local clergy all at their posts, and rendered efficient aid. Kendal, a new branch, is not behind in the good work. An excellent meeting.

I then proceeded to visit the branches in connection with the Kingston Auxiliary. My report of this visit will follow this. My time was thus occupied to the close of the year, and here I will only observe that if my first visit gives sufficient opportunity to judge, the union is likely to be productive of highly beneficial results, both to them and to ourselves.

The first meeting in the New Year was held in Acton, where we had the presence of my esteemed collecgue Rev. T. Goldsmith, who gave an admirable address, which excited much interest. Returns have been since forwarded, and liberal as usual. Cobourg gave us an admirable meeting this year, and the employment of lady collectors had a most happy effect in increasing the contributions of the Society, which will be found considerably in advance. At Port Hope, as always, our attendance was very large, and the interest in Bible work in this town may be characterized as enthusiastic. The returns were not quite complete, and a further sum to the following

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large payments has since been made: \$108 18 on purchase account, \$50 free contribution to the British and Foreign, \$25 29 to the Upper Canada, and \$50 to the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society. Our excellent branch in Hope Township well sustains its high reputation. After an excellent meeting I received \$40 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$40 to Upper Canada, and \$20 to the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society. Coldsprings is up and doing. I received for British and Foreign \$17, Montreal Auxiliary \$17, though the returns were not all made. Baltimore .- This active organization is still fruitful as ever. Some explanations of the working of our Society were deemed perfectly satisfactory. We had an excellent address from Rev. Mr. McKenzie. The following liberal returns were made : about \$50 on purchase account in full, \$20 free contribution to the Upper Canada, and \$12 to the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society. The next evening I formed a new branch at Fenella, where, though we may not expect large returns, appears a desirable opening, which will I trust do its part towards sustaining the noble work in which we are engaged. Keene .- The returns not complete. We had a large and highly satisfactory meeting, after which I received \$38 67, being their purchase account in full.

Peterboro' .- Never have the friends of this vigorous auxiliary been more active or more successful than during the past year. As soon as notice of the time for holding the annual meeting was forwarded to the secretary, a committee meeting was called, at which it was decided to hold ten public meetings in the vicinity of the town, fully to explain the objects of the Society, and to increase its efficiency. These were all held, and were most of them largely attended. Our annual meeting was a fine gathering. An excellent staff of speakers, and a large amount of money realized. I received their purchase account in full; the free contributions have been since forwarded. A ladies' society here too is in vigorous operation. Lakefield, which has only recently been formed into a branch, works nobly. Meetings always largely attended, and contributions liberal. After a delightful meeting, I received \$20 free contribution to British and Foreign, and \$20 to Upper Canada Bible Society, leaving a respectable balance in hands of treasurer for a fresh supply of stock. South Monaghan .- Always up to the mark; has even excelled itself this year, the largest amount being realized that has ever been received. The meeting was more largely attended than before, and was delightfully encouraging. 1 received \$50 free contribution to the Upper Canada, and \$40 to the Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society, which did not exhaust the treasury. The attendance at our meeting in Grafton was also larger than usual, and everything in good order. I received \$20 to the British and Foreign, \$11 27 to the Upper Canada, and \$10 to the Montreal Bible Society. Our next meeting was at Belleville, a town behind none of its equals in Bible work. The year's operations have been remarkably successful. Nearly 800 copies of the word disposed of, and the contributions since forwarded very liberal. Long may Belleville retain its interest in the blessed labor in connection with which so much earnestness has been evinced. Percy is doing well. I received \$13 56 on purchase account, and a free contribution of \$25 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. I next visited Cavanville, with a view to the formation of a branch. Local circumstances, however, rendered it necessary to postpone it till another opportunity, which I shall gladly embrace when practicable. Hastings came next in rotation, and although the collections had not been made, has I doubt

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not ere this evinced its continued interest in this noblest of all objects. Norwood is doing well, and will I trust in the future do still better. A good meeting. After a short return to my family, which was not accomplished without some difficulty, I resumed my work at Manvers, where we have some zealous friends. We were favored with the presence and aid of Rev. Mr. Ewing, who had come to the meeting at some inconvenience, and who did us good service. I received \$17 94 on purchase account. Mount Pleasanl is still in healthy operation. Returns not all in-to be forwarded. Lindsay .- This rapidly improving town is, I am glad to say, strengthening its attachment to us. After a good meeting I received \$60 on purchase account, a free contribution of \$26 to the British and Foreign, and \$26 44 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Omemee .- Here is held the anniversary of the Emily branch. After an excellent meeting, I received their purchase account in full, a free contribution of \$20 to the British and Foreign, and a similar sum to the Upper Canada Bible Society. I next formed two new organizations, the one at Fenelon Falls, the other at Bobcaygeon, two rising villages north of Lindsay, at both with the prospect of much future usefulness. Mariposa is looking up in Bible matters. A good meeting. Returns, \$37 17, on purchase account. Our anniversary at Woodville was but poorly attended, and considering the reputation of the place, has scarcely yet reached its true position so far as our Society is concerned, still we have warm friends here. Beaverton is doing well. Meeting well attended, after which I received \$15 free contribution to the British and Foreign, and \$15 to the Upper Canada Bible Society, with a respectable balance with treasurer for fresh stock. Cannington, if not shewing so general an interest among the professing population as it should do, has yet some staunch and true-hearted Bible supporters. After an interesting meeting I received \$12 free contribution to the British and Foreign Bible Society. West Brock is in a better position than before, and I believe will yet accomplish more than has yet been realized for the supply of this inestimable treasure, both at home and Uxbridge .- This thriving village nobly sustains its reputation. abroad. The splendid new hall was well filled, and the meeting worthy of a town. Everything in excellent order, and well arranged. Returns, \$20 free contribution to British and Foreign, \$20 to Upper Canada, and \$10 to Montreal Bible Society. Prince Albert furnishes some generous supporters. I received their purchase account in full, and a donation of \$35, to be equally divided between the British and Foreign and Upper Canada Bible Society. Manilla gave us a good meeting this year, and is looking up. Returns not in. I received \$16 57, including a collection which was handed me by Rev. Mr. McGregor from his congregation. Cartwright closed my visits to the branches for the past year, and after a good meeting I received \$6 18 on purchase account, a free contribution of \$12 to the British and Foreign, and \$12 32 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. May the coming year find our important mission still growing in the affections of its friends, and increasingly honoured by the great Head of the Church for the accomplishment of his own glorious and eternal purposes.

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REPORT OF REV. T. GOLDSMITH. TO THE SECRETARIES OF THE U. C. BIBLE SOCIETY.

HAMILTON, May, 1865.

DEAR SIRS,-Closing the novitiate year of my agency, I am happy to report the work of a character which commends it to my judgment and my heart. Though it imposes much privation and inconvenience, in absence from home, long journeys and exhausting fatigue, still it erects a platform so elevated and broad, and aggregates so many sects in common enterprize and brotherhood, that it awakens my deepest interest and excites my profoundest admiration. The Bible Society, more than any institution of our age, vindicates the essential unity of our common protestantism. And though it does not directly seek to lessen the number of the sects, it gives them a converging tendency, by uniting their counsels and resources, and inviting their energies in a common enterprise. It knows no sect, yet embraces them every one; it details the creed of none, yet gives the foundation of all. It places "the Book" as a centre, around which it gathers the whole family of a common Saviour and unites them together in counsel, contribution and enterprize. Amid the many noble institutions of our age, this stands like the ALPS among the neighbouring mountains.

It would be discourteous were I to omit noting the warm-hearted and generous hospitality I have everywhere met from the friends of the Bible Society, and especially from ministers of all denominations, whose valuable suggestions and hearty co-operations have materially aided me in my work.

The first month (April) was, from the state of the roads, unavailable for the regular work; and it was spent in moving my family to Hamilton, in making a few informal visits to several branches, and preparing for my regular spring and summer tour. Immediately after attending our anniversary meeting in Toronto, I proceeded on my spring tour, commencing at Lloydtown, where the friends gave evidence of vitality, though there is room for greatly increased devotion to the work. Our meeting, though not large, was one of interest. From this place I received on purchase account \$26 34, and in free contributions to the British and Foreign, \$5 971, and the Upper Canada Bible Society \$5 971. Next day I formed a new branch at Schomberg. Here we had a spirited meeting; attendance large and collection good. An excellent staff of officers was elected, and the little bark fairly launched on the sea of life and action. From here I went to West Essa, where I found a feeble Branch in a comparatively new settlement, much needed in the place and doing a good work. The crops have been bad for several years, and money scarce. They paid me in free contribution to the Upper Canada Bible Society \$10. My next meeting was at Thornton, where for two or three years the meetings have completely failed from bad weather and other causes. The attendance was very good. The Sons of Temperabce had a meeting on the same evening, which they adjourned, and all came over to our meeting. Cash contribution was small, but they promise to do something better next year. From here I went to Barrie, where our meetings have been small for a number of years. Availing myself of the Sabbath day, I preached in the new Wesleyan chapel to a large congregation, and announced the meeting for the next night. On Monday I called on a num-

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ber, and when we went to the hall in the evening, I was delighted to find it well filled, and the resident clergy well represented on the platform. The cash contributions have been less in consequence of building two very fine chapels in the place. I received in cash for all purposes \$87 53. At Innisfit the Secretary had neglected to publish my appointment. My next meeting was at the Holland Landing. They had sent in their returns. From here I went over to Bradford, where we had a good meeting. Cash returns far too low for the place. They promise to do more in future. Next day I went to Ebenezer; small branch, but doing a good work. This finished my Schult I.

Subbath, June 25th, I spent with my excellent friend Rev. James Thom, as Rockwood, and preached for the Presbyterians and Wesleyans; and on Monday evening had a special Bible Society meeting in Rockwood. A large and enthusiastic meeting, and good collection. Tuesday evening, in company with Mr. Thom, I went over to Everton, where we had a large gathering, fine meeting and excellent collection. From here I went to Orillia, where I preached on Sabbath for our excellent Secretary Rev. Mr. Gray ; and on Monday evening held our meeting in the Temperance Hall. As usual in Orillia, the meeting was a success. Congregation good; five ministers present on the platform, who spoke well, and cash returns \$100. Our excellent President at Orillia drove me over to Oro, where, in a new and sparsely populated country, we had a fine meeting. Wednesday, 5th July, visited Aurora. Here we have one of our most active branches, and our meeting was a decided success. The next day went to Bond Head, fine branch, all alive. On the 7th, went the second time to Innisfil, where we had a capital meeting. Cash returns \$26 25. Sabbath, 9th July, preached at Laskey, and on Tuesday evening formed a new branch. I sent in circulars for meetings at Maple and Klineburg, with a view of forming branches, but through an oversight they were not published. On Friday, 14th July, went to Newmarket, where we had a fine meeting, large congregation, and good collection. On 17th July, 1 formed a new Branch in the pleasant village of Sutton; and on the following day formed another new Branch in Tottenham. The next day visited Bolton, where we had the largest meeting we have had for years in the place. This finished my tour for the summer.

On the 16th August, I formed a new Branch in Burtonville; and on 28th August proceeded to visit the Glanford Branch. The meeting small; returns not ready. Caledonia and Oneida are doing pretty well. Hagarsville and Ballsville very low.

Jarvis, September 1.—Fine meeting. Too early for their cash returns. Sept. 4th.—Nanticoke all alive; will send in their returns. Selkirk and South Cayuga, good meetings. Bridgeport is about defunct. Beamsville .- The friends here appointed collectors at the meeting, and will proceed at once to collect and send in. From this I went to Milton, and preached on Sabbath the 15th; and on Monday evening held the meeting, which was large and full of interest. This is one of our most effective branches. Returns not ready. Hornby, though feeble, is struggling for better things. Georgetown. - The evening was wet and dark, yet the attendance was fair; and I had the pleasure of meeting with Mr. Johnson, who drove over from Acton to be present with us. Contributions \$61 46. Norval still does nobly. I received our purchase account and free contrihutions, \$83 61. Palermo .- " To be, or not to be, that's the question" with Palermo. It is a struggle of doubtful issue. Monday, 23rd Nov .- Oakville deferred. 24th Nov.-Cooksville. This branch is feeble, though doing a good work. Streetsville is active; large and spirited meeting. Their returns were ready, in all \$70, divided in free contributions to the British and Foreigu, \$50, and to Upper Canada Bible Society \$20. Their purchase account was all paid up. The next day I visited Vaughan, where we had a very fine meeting, and I received from them in free contributions to the British and Foreign, the Upper Canada, and Montreal Auxiliary Bible Society the sum of \$52 80. The next day, in company with the Rev. Mr. Hay, I went over to Klineburg, where we had a small audience and organized a new branch. Weston -- Fair meeting, returns not ready. December 11th .- Visited the branch at York Church, and the next day the York Township branch. Meetings good. Cash not ready. At Thornhill an excellent meeting. Cash contributions \$40. The next day went to Buttonville. This branch is defunct. Richmond Hill still retains its honourable position. Meeting large and enthusiastic .. Cash returns \$90. Stouffville.-Good meeting though not large. I received from them \$24 37. South Etobicoke is still in the work. Free contributions \$22 42 Scarboro' is a splendid branch. Fine meeting, though a pelting storm. Free contributions \$90 28. Will send in more, Markham .- Very low. Its officers removed and nothing done. Through the energy of the Rev. W. McFadden, the meeting was published. We reorganized, hoping for better times. This closed a four months' tour.

January 4th .--- Visited Acton, where I had the pleasure of meeting my old friend and colleague Mr. Johnson. Good meeting. Contributions not yet ready. On Sabbath the 14th of January I preached in the Wesleyan Church (McNab Street) Hamilton, and announced for our anniversary meeting on Tuesday evening in the "Central" Presbyterian Church (Dr. Ormiston's). The night was exceedingly cold and stormy, still the attendance was good. The speeches were earnest, high-toned and effective. The available cash resources from the Hamilton branch for the year are in the aggregate \$577 14, and applied as follows: purchase account, \$127 14; free contribution to British and Foreign, \$350; free contribution to Upper Canada Bible Society, \$100. In addition to the foregoing they have raised for the building fund of the British and Foreign Bible Society £27 sterling, in sums ranging from \$5 to \$40. A noble example for our branches. The next day I went to Brampton-a long, cold drive-and found a small meeting, though one of real interest. The returns in this place are not up to the mark. They promise me a good subscription next year. Campbell's Cross. —All alive; fine meeting and large contributions. Cheltonham is still earnest in the work and doing well. Caledon West.—Good meeting; subscriptions not in. Caledon East .- Meeting of thrilling interest. Cash \$58. Mono Mills .- Feeble. Orangeville .- Here the secretary of the branch and some of the committee concluded to forego the anniversary of the Bible Society for the convenience of some little social! Mono Centre. - Bad storm. No meeting. Here I stopped and preached on the Sabbath and laid the claims of our Society before the people. From here I went to Priceville to form a new branch, but found they had not published. From this point I hastened away, to answer to an urgent request of the London Auxiliary to be with them at their meeting, which was held February 1st. After the refreshing services of the western metropolis of Canada, and exchanging friendly salutations with a brother colleague, and with many

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excellent Christian friends, I hastened with cheered and gladdened spirit to reach my appointment at Meaford. At Georgetown I left the cars, and with my horse and cutter made 40 miles of the journey in the afternoon. The next morning I started off for a 50 miles drive. The snow had fallen and drifted up the roads till the track was scarce discernible. At times I plunged into banks of snow five or six feet deep, when I would have to get out and lift the cutter, and help the horse through, and thus on I went, until about 8 o'clock I reached Meaford, almost frozen and my horse jaded out, and found the meeting assembled and in full progress, though they had given up seeing me that night. This branch is doing well. Owen Sound .----Meeting small. Doing well. Thornbury .- Very small. Have gone to work. Collingwood .- Splendid meeting. The snow all along from Owen Sound to Collingwood lay piled up like young Alps ! Nottawasaga .- About defunct. Feversham .- Doing splendidly. This is a new branch, formed in June last. They have paid their stock account of \$21 04, and made a free contribution of \$8 76 to the Upper Canada Bible Society. Eugenia .- Good meeting for the place. Subscriptions not in.

February 20th, I went plunging through snow banks into West Arran, and found that through an oversight my appointment was not published. Arran (Tara) has had only one anniversary meeting in seven years-is still alive. They appointed collectors at the meeting, and began the work at once. Saugeen .-- Dreadful rain, roads all afloat, no meeting. Port Elgin .--Raining fearful; small meeting. Paisley.-Good meeting: subscriptions not in. They appointed collectors, and will send in. Tiverton.-Excellent meeting; all alive. Riversdale they omitted to publish; had no meeting. Kincardine has fairly outdone itself this year. The largest meeting our Society ever held in the place, and best financial results. They have raised \$100 for free contribution. At Teeswater I found all dead. They re-organized. I hope to hear a good report of Teeswater. Walkerton. - A fair meeting. though a bad storm. At Hanover and Durham I found active branches and delightful meetings. Thursday, 8th March, I made a second visit to Carlisle, on my return home from Bruce and Grey, and found the house filled to the doors. They are now in full life. Dundas .- I visited this interesting and important branch on the 12th, and was cheered to meet so many who love the "Book" and labor to send it forth on "its mission." Cash returns: purchase account \$72 91, free contributions to British and Foreign \$60, and the Upper Canada Bible Society \$60, in all \$192 91. The next day I visited Oakville. The night was dark and rainy, but the meeting was a splendid success. March 25th, I visited Conetown and formed a new branch, which promises to be of importance to our work.

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REPORT OF REV. W. BROOKMAN.

TO THE DIRECTORS OF THE U. C. BIBLE SOCIETY.

LONDON, C. W., April, 1866.

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DEAR SIRS,—It is with grateful feelings to Almighty God for the mercies of the past year, and for the measure of blessing which He has vouchsafed to the labours of your agent, that I once more address myself to the duty of presenting you my Annual Report; and in the first place I will give a summary of my labours and the results thereof.

SUMMARY.

Your agent has travelled over 5,100 miles; formed 25 new branches, and visited altogether 178 branches, including new and old, besides preaching 107 times. The sums received in the branches from collections alone amount to \$7,993 60 (exclusive of the amounts raised by the sales of Bibles), and is thus classed: In the UPPER CANADA BIBLE SOCIETY'S field, \$4,888 50; in the LONDON AUXILIARY'S field, \$2,805 10. This is considerably over the preceding year's receipts, and we own the good hand of the Lord therein.

After attending the annual meeting of the Society at Toronto on the 10th May, 1865 ; I made the best of my way down to Kingston, where I met and conferred with the committee of that Auxiliary, at whose request the visitation of their branches was undertaken by your Agent. I found from the statements made by them, and the report of their late Agent, which was also considered too gloomy to publish, that there was anything but a prospect of a pleasing and exhilarating character to expect when I went around. However, using every means in my power in the way of advertisements to procure good audiences, and above all in dependence upon the Lord, after preaching thrice at Kingston, I started forth and paid my first visit to Gananoque, where, though we had to encounter a wet evening, I found a fair audience. There was no depository at this branch, which I am led to bel eve is one of the best fields for our work in the auxiliary, and I trust from what passed there is good ground for expecting that it will be worked up as such a noble cause demands. At Bath we had a good audience, and to sum up the matter of audiences, I may say that with one or two exceptions, arising from mistakes, and in two cases I fear from indifference, we had excellent assemblies everywhere, and sometimes very crowded ones. At Bath nothing had been done since 1862. At that time the ladies had collected \$27 free contributions. The committee were scattered; but prospects of a good branch appear in this place. Wolfe Island does very well for the Society, from what I ascertained. On Sunday I preached thrice at Kingston, and in my arrangements on Monday I was somewhat disappointed by a message from Wilton to the effect that it would be inconvenient at that season of the year to hold a meeting; so on the morrow started out to Newburgh, where an enthusiastic audience greeted me after the good old English fashion. I heard from them that they were glad once more to be connected with Toronto, as when formerly that was the case, the work had gone on pretty well. Newburgh presents a capital field, and with a little looking after will repay an Agent's visit. We have a warm friend in the resident Wesleyan minister, who will I trust redeem his promise of seeing to the

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welfare of the Society. At Centreville, by some neglect, the meeting had not been announced, and but one or two posters appeared in sight, so an audience of a dozen was all that greeted your Agent there. They had experienced two other disappointments, the bad effect of which was seen in indifference to the cause by both people and resident minister. Tamworth presented a very fair meeting, and an interest has, I believe, from the minister to the people, been aroused for the Bible Society. The new county town of Napanee did not furnish a good audience for so large a place, and I felt a little chill in the Bible atmosphere here. I trust, however, that our good friend the Rev. John Scott will be found a help to the work in this place. On Saturday I returned to Kingston, and met the Ladies' Association committee, with whom I had the pleasure of a conference upon their work and how it might be furthered. The free contributions of Kingston would be much benefitted if they would throw in their valued co-operation -at least such is my impression. Preached twice at Kingston on the Sunday, and from thence went on to Big Creek, where nothing had been done last year in the way of collections : in fact this was about the general statement made throughout my trip, which was not, however, to have collections made, but to prepare the way for the regular annual visitation; and I hope that the promises generally made throughout the branches, concerning collections, will be fulfilled. We had a capital meeting at Selby, and I think this branch promises well. It was here, if I remember aright, the depositary told me that, a short time before I visited the branch, a man came into the shop to purchase a copy of the Scriptures. After asking for the cheapest copy, and possessing himself of it, he was about to leave when his manner, which denoted no particular desire for the book, so attracted the depositary's attention, that he enquired why he bought the Bible. "Well sir," answered the man, "I don't mind telling you. You know Mrs. died the other day in our concession. Well, the minister came to bury her, and when he asked for a Bible, there wasn't one to be found. Now I don't like the idea of my laying dead in my coffin, and no Bible in the house." Such, alas! was the poor man's idea, which induced him to buy a Bible. However, it is the word of God of which the man has possessed himself, and we rejoice to hear that it has even thus found its way into his house. Sovereign grace may direct it into his heart yet. Roblin and Lonsdale promise well doing this year. Shannonville Episcopal church witnessed a good audience. Here we re-organized the committee, which had been once on a time, and so set the ship once more afloat. Preached twice at Belleville, one of our own flourishing branches, and in the afternoon delivered a short scriptural address, first to the Wesleyan Sunday-school, and afterwards a more lengthened address to a large gathering of children in "Christ Church" on the work of the Bible Society. At Melrose I found some interest displayed; and at Canifton an impetus was, I trust, given, which will bring forth fruit hereafter. The president of the Belleville branch promised me that they would keep their eye upon Canifton and cheer it by an extra meeting. The branch at Roslin had formerly worked well, but something had hindered them, and for two years nothing had been done. Tweed's capital audience had their hearts, I hope, wakened up, and promises were given that an interest should be displayed. Bridgewater, with its beautiful marble church and schoolhouse amidst the bush all around, we hope will start off afresh, and if its energetic proprietor, the Hon. B. Flint, will give them an occasional reminder, no doubt an excellent branch will be

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seen here. Preached at Belleville twice, and found next day an excellent meeting at Madoc, and every prospect of an interest being taken in the good work. At Stirling nothing had been done for a long while, through indifference; however, the best audience they had seen for some time met to be stirred up; and the resident old Kirk clergyman promised to get the committee under weigh for work by-and-by. Trenton does not display so much interest at present in the Bible cause as in the lumber cause, and a poor meeting, though the largest they ever had, was made the best of by your agent, who endeavoured to bespeak better times in this neighbourhood for the work. Consecon is looking up, and good results, I have reason to believe, will reward the agent's next visit. At Wellington I found no hopes of a meeting, as the only person in connection with the Society to whom I had written had left the place; so passing on to pretty Picton, I desired word to be given out that I would address them on Sunday afternoon (D.V.). So after preaching on Sunday morning at Picton, I drove out 10 miles and had a good and attentive audience ; elected a president and secretary, and received the promise of co-operation from one minister present ; and driving back again, preached in the evening, and so ended one of the hottest days I ever spent in Canada. From the commencement of work to the close of the day's labours I had not "a dry rag" on me-not an unusual occurrence on hot Sundays. Demorestville, I believe, was the only branch that had raised any free contributions for the Society's work here, and though but few came to the meeting, there are two or three good earnest spirits here, who are our warrant for a good hope in this neighbourhood. At Bloomfield our good Quaker friends, amongst others, turned out well, and in their meeting house, a rather strange ecclesiastical structure, we held a good meeting, though our position as speakers was rather awkward. The next day I went on to Milford, in company with a good friend of the Bible from Picton, who drove me out. Certainly everything looked downcast here. We called on the resident ministers - one was not to be found; but the two we saw with one consent began to make excuse, one saying, "I am packing up to leave this place, and therefore cannot come." We began to think that joy at such an event had for the nonce overcome his sensibility in the cause of the Word. The next one said, "I'm too tired; I've been busy all day," whereupon my lay friend could contain himself no longer, but pitched into the parsons of Milford in general, and this one in particular, and asked him, "What can we expect the people to be like, when thus too often the ministers of God's word act about the Bible Society and the Book; " upon which he wished us to come in and sit down, but we could not accept his offer, as the meeting evidently depended upon us whether it was "to be or not to be." However we mustered up at last some fifteen or twenty people and by-and-by in came our last-visited ministerial friend; and to do him justice, he aroused himself and I hope the people too; so after the addresses we re-organized, and an evident feeling of shame at the want of any earnestness whatsoever in this most noble of causes took possession of some minds; and we hope the vengeance vowed against their past lukewarmness will have its fruits. Through some delay in the post and other causes-one of them a change of meeting, through another Picton meeting announced for the same day-in spite of the goodwill of Mr. Percival, I saw on arriving at Amherst Island by steamboat, no probability of a gathering, and so returned by the next boat, in order to make sure of Picton meeting the following day, and there we had a famous meeting, members standing

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the livelong evening, as the great and extensive work of the British and Foreign Bible Society was set before them. They determined to form a Ladies'Association; and though we have a few friends of the Society here. especially our treasurer, Mr. Gray, things of late, as a branch had not been very flourishing. I trust an interest has been kindled afresh in the work of giving the Bible to the world. I now returned to Kingston. and after meeting the committee on Saturday, and preaching once at Wolfe Island, and twice at Kingston on Sunday. I once more started for home after seven weeks' absence, and arrived in time, under the Divine Providence, to take my place in the meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Huron.

To sum up-I found things had certainly been most backward from some cause. The want of money in the different neighbourhoods would account in some measure for the absence of collections at previous and annual meetings; for the farmers had no doubt experienced very hard times, much harder than we knew more westward; but at the same time the want of money, comparatively speaking, would not cause, in right feeling branches, any lack of interest in the noble labour of the Society. I urged the branches strongly to appoint collectors and start afresh, and however little could be given, let it be cheerfully and heartily received, and every encouragement shewn; so that when better times, under God, should come about, the Bible and its work to the world, might have its interest sustained through all weathers and circumstances : and from the branches I received the assurance that the thing should be done, as I unfolded to them also the high position which Canada occupies in this great work as an auxiliary of the British and Foreign Bible Society. I addressed a circular to them previous to their annual meetings, to remind them of their promises ; so that, looking to the Lord, in whose cause we have been working, we say that there is, with His pleasure, every reasonable prospect of the branches in connection with the Kingston Auxiliary, with a little nursing care, becoming useful and active members of the Bible Society.

In July, I started off for another tour, and commenced with our wellworked branch at Ingersoll, whose annual meeting in the winter I had been unable to attend through sickness. From thence I proceeded to Salford. This once paying branch Las sadly decayed, and has determined to connect itself with Ingersoll, from which it is not far distant, in hopes that the vigour of that branch may help them in collecting funds for the Society, though from henceforth they do not wish to be known as a distinct branch. I preached on Sunday at East Oxford and Otterville, and on the following days organized branches at the above places. At Mount Pleasant we had as usual a good meeting. It was not so at Burford and Beachville, but nevertheless I believe the interest is somewhat on the increase at these places. After preaching on Sunday in Nissouri township, I formed a new branch there, with encouraging prospects, which have since been amply realized. From thence I proceeded to the township of London, and formed two new branches, with the hope of another one being added thereto, which I am glad to say has been the case. In the township of Dorchester, I succeeded in the formation of two new branches, and at a subsequent period formed another one. I next visited West McGillivray, where we had a capital audience at our first annual meeting, and fair prospects of a good interest being taken in the great work. In Exeter, Rodgerville and McGillivray, which were also visited, the Bible Society's cause is well sustained. We had

a good meeting at Dorchester Station. After a few days' rest, I started on a northern trip, commencing with Stratford, where we had a fair meeting, considering the tremendous heat of the weather. Here your Society finds general acceptance, and much interest is displayed. Went on to Hollen, Rothsay and Harriston, and formed new branches there. At Howick a camp meeting was in progress, and no notice had been given of our meeting. At present but little interest is displayed in the work of circulating the Scriptures. A bad sign, in spite of an outward show in favor of spreading the Gospel.

Preached at Listowell and the neighbourhood, and held a good meeting in that flourishing little village on the Monday. By the advice of the friends, I delayed the formation of a new branch at Monckton, but I hope soon that something will be done there. At Ainlagsville, prospects are somewhat reviving, and a subsequent visit did not bring disappointment, as too often was the case here. Blyth and Londesborough, the latter a new branch of last year's formation, are looking up, and give good hopes of success. At Londesborough they had made a fair start. We had in the chair that evening he vice-president of the Society, who had commenced to work for the Society 55 years ago, in Old England, and had ever since taken an interest in the cause; so we ought to do well, especially as our friend has since been elected president.

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Reached home at the commencement of the Exhibition week, in which London took the opportunity of doing a great deal of good, in circulating the Scriptures amongst the dense masses of people upon the grounds, and a great many copies of the Bible were sold at a stand in the building, by one of the colporteurs, in more languages than the Euglish. Others also scattered a vast number of tracts among the crowds, and we trust much good was effected by thus freely sowing the seed of truth. I hope such a good work, upon such occasions, may be carried out elsewhere, and that our Bible Societies, at township and county and provincial gatherings may be found ready to lay hold of these golden opportunities.

And now commenced the usual heavy fall and winter work. At London Township, N. W. the same interest as ever was displayed. The collections had not been made, as it was rather too early, in their judgment, to send the collectors round. They afterwards sent in between \$70 and \$80. And here I must express my own personal regret, as well as on behalf of the Bible Society, at the heavy loss we have suffered since that annual meeting, in the death of our long tried friend, the Rev. J. Skinner, who for so many years was the zealous and active president of our London Township branch. His place is one that will not easily be filled : yet I trust a successor will be found, who shall keep up the interest in the work our departed friend loved so well. Postponing Pond Mills meeting by request, I found the friends at Lambeth assembled in much better numbers, and their contributions were fair, with good space for improvement. At Frome our meeting was rather small, in consequence of a Methodist camp meeting having been started upon the same evening. Their collections were somewhat smaller this year, though still good, through the waking up of the Fingal people, who had slightly intruded upon their territory. Sparta is going on pretty well. Port Stanley determines that efforts shall be made to revive the interest. Fingal had done well, and we had a good meeting. I had proceeded half way to Iona, when indisposition obliged me to return to St. Thomas, and for the next

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two or three days I was quite unwell, though still able to attend the meet-At Wallacetown we had a fair audience, and this energetic country branch this year raised by their collectors \$115. Aldborough .- In the rear as usual; being fair-day in the township, no meeting was held, and by the advice of the office bearers, I agreed to address the people upon the next Sunday, which I accordingly did in the afternoon, after an excellent audience in the morning at Duart, and from thence went on to Morpeth, for the evening service, and at both places there was considerable increase in attendance and contributions. Duart, so long backward, had rallied famously, the committee were all to their post, and the collectors and contributors had worked well together. Ridgetown I found as stirring as ever, with large accessions to their funds. What a value to the cause are good office-bearers ! Being requested to attend a special committee at Toronto, I left Rondeau and Buxton to be taken up by our local friends. Buxton I afterwards visited, though no meeting was held. Rondeau had received a good impetue, and fair collections were the result. I preached at Rondeau on the Sunday after my return from Toronto, and went on to Chatham the next day, where, though the collections had considerably increased, a very poor meeting awaited your agent in this important town, and unfortunately not a single minister of the gospel was present. The committee promised to see that the country around henceforth should be well canvassed-a duty in which some of the branches, I am sorry to see, are deficient. At Thamesville and Dresden things look favorably. A severe hoarseness prevented my attendance at Florence, and Bothwell was taken for me by my esteemed friend the Rev. J. Wright, as I had been specially summoned to attend a meeting of the London Auxiliary. However I was enabled to preach there on the ensuing Sunday. Bothwell has done well this year, baving doubled its subscription. Wardsville was slightly in arrears of last year's list, owing I fear to the secretary's post having been left unfilled for some time. How needful that the branches fill up appointments rendered vacant. What life to a branch is a good Secretary! Newbury, Strathburn, Mosa and Melbourne were all doing very well, with much better subscriptions.

My next route was along the eastern part of Lake Erie, commencing at St. Thomas, where we had a larger audience than usual; and the ladies had done admirably. Preached there and went on to Aylmer, where things did not look very healthy. Richmond was unwilling to continue its trials to become useful; the resident minister (of the Methodist body) threw cold water on the work, said the place was too small, though an excellent country lies around, and so this never very promising branch dies out unless some Christian man interested enough in the circulation of the Bible can be found to render aid. Port Burwell, Vienna, and Port Rowan were working fairly, although the country around had not been well canvassed, which we hope will be done next year. Walsingham and Vittoria give signs of a little more life; they have a capital field of well settled country, if they would but work it. At the latter place they have just acquired a vice-president who has befriended the Bible Society for the last 50 years, so we hope for better times. Lynedoch .- Increasing as usual. At Delhi a capital audience had assembled, through the appeals from the pulpit. And here let me urge upon the ministers of the Gospel the importance and necessity of making a pointed appeal to the people to come out to the meetings, if we are ever to have annual meetings worthy of the nobility of the

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ORUSO. A mere casual notice of the anniversary is not sufficient; the people do not seem yet to realize that the Bible Society belongs to their missionary enterprizes ; and if missionary meetings of each denomination are cordially noticed, and the people's attendance urged and consequently secured, what great gatherings of all Christian bodies would there be at the Bible Society's meetings! Let the ministers rally around the banner and urge the people to do the same, and we shall soon see a wondrous difference in contributions and attendance. At Delhi the ladies had become discouraged, and some little girls had been found willing to work, had taken up the collections, and had done very fairly. Let the *Delhi* ladies once more take heart after such a capital meeting. After preaching at *Simcoe* on the Sunday, we held our annual meeting on the following evening, when, as usual, we had excellent subscriptions and meeting. At Port Dover the meeting was not good, but the collections were. Scotland and Mount Pleasant had been busy with good results. Preached at Northfield, where I hope soon to see a branch of the Society. Went on to Mount Pleasant for the afternoon service, and then proceeded to Brantford for the evening; and on the Monday had an excellent audience at that flourishing branch; and at the close of the meeting we found \$131 in the plates! Their collections this year amount to \$600. Burford afforded a theme for thankfulness to see such great improvement in the audience and collections. We have now a Brantford committee man as our president there, and I hope under God's blessing to witness continued improvement. Things at present do not seem at all encouraging at New Durham ; but I am glad it is different at Norwich. At East Oxford, a country branch organized in the summer, we had a fair meeting, and between \$40 and \$50 collected. This was a good start. Springford has woke up at last, but Straffordville has gone sound asleep. No friends to Bible circulation there ! Otterville had made a respectable beginning; and Tilsonburgh remarkable progress every way. Culloden and Belmont had increased their collections and promise to become useful branches. Having ended my trip here, after a little rest, I started westward, commencing at Strathroy, which I hope will arouse itself, and occupy the position such a large and important village should take in the Society's work. Formed the new branch at Walford with a good start. Asked a local friend to take Warwick for me, as the roads were in a fearful condition, and frozen hard. I was very anxious not to miss arrangements for forming a branch in the Oil Territory, and made the best of my way by rail, and-I suppose I must call it a road-but such a road-to Oil Springs. The committee meeting however did not come off, and on Sunday morning I preached there to a large congregation, in order to start the meeting, and in the evening, after a break down over yon road, we reached Wyoming for service, at the end of which, a branch of the Society was agreed to be formed by a large audience. Adelaide still holds her position well-a rebuke to many who think a place too small to do anything. This year their collections amounted to between \$50 and \$70. Komoka is not dead yet, and her pulse seems to rise a little. We had but few at St. John's, the centre of a flourishing part of London Township. The prospects at present, however, are not very bright.

Christmas found me busy at and near home, both on Sunday and Monday, and after that went on to *Mount Brydges*, where our meeting was poor, through the wetness of the evening; but the collections afterwards received were very good. At *Delaware* we had a crowded meeting, and an interest

is displayed in this branch, as is also the case at *East Westminster*, next visited.

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Began the new year's work with an excellent meeting at West Nissouri, and capital collections were subsequently brought in. Thamesford-This flourishing branch was ahead of last year's work, and although the new West Nissouri branch had cut off many contributions, nearly \$100 had been raised by the collectors. Here we have very zealous office-bearers and collectors, and under God the good work prospers. A poor meeting at the County-town of Woodstock, but a very good increase in their subscriptions ; they promised also next year to see that the country around was canvassed. At Ingersoll we encountered the coldest night of the winter, but in spite of such a drawback, a most excellent audience had assembled, who listened with wonderful patience in that cold Town Hall to your Agent till the close, when, as soon as the plates had passed each person, they could stand the cold no longer, and there was a general rush to the doors, the usual votes of thanks, &c., being pronounced to almost empty benches. It is a pity such a good Hall could not be better warmed for public meetings. The collections were were very good, amounting to nearly \$200, a sum nearly double that of the former collections, before the Ladies' Association had been formed.

Princeton, St. George, and Paris are doing well. At Listowell, the stormy and wet night, with lightning (rather strange occurrence at this season), had prevented many, doubtless, from attending; still a very good audience assembled to hear of the world-wide work, and good subscriptions had been taken up. Returning home to London for Sunday duty, the next day I visited Galt, when we had a much better audience than usual, and increased This branch is becoming more and more vigorous, and this year had funds. collected nearly \$250. At Guelph they were largely ahead of last year's contributions, the sum being nearly \$340, besides a dying gift of \$100 from the late president, Thos. Sandilands, Esq. We all missed his well known form and presidential address. For a quarter of a century he had assisted in bringing the Guelph branch to its present honourable position. His place in the chair that evening was well filled by his successor, our esteemed secretary, James Hough, Esq., who passed a truthful and touching eulogium upon the merits of his predecessor. Would that all our branches, and especially some of our large town branches, had such men as we meet upon the Guelph committee! Rockwood, Everton, and Eden Mills were next visited, and were found going on well. After again returning to London for another Sunday's duty, I visited Berlin, where, though a poor meeting as usual greeted your Agent, yet the funds were in a better condition. I am convinced that if the people knew more of the operations of the British and Foreign Bible Society, which they might do by assembling at the annual meetings, the increase of funds would be very great. I trust our committees and ministers will endeavour to create a reform in this important matter. Washington and Chesterfield were sustaining their interest in the cause. Innerkip is but poorly supported yet. Shakespeare always presents a thin audience, but is working up each year in its funds. After preaching thrice in Nissouri, I held meetings in that neighbourhood which were exceedingly well attended. Embro and Lakeside had been diligent. The latter, a new branch, had begun well. Formed a new branch at Thorndale, where a good country around should well sustain a branch. On the 1st of February we held the annual meeting of the London Auxiliary, one of the best

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hat London has seen for many a year. London collections, we are glad to say, are better than they have been of late, although they fall far short of some of our towns in Canada at present, both actually and by comparison. We even know one small village branch that is ahead of London, and another one close on her heels. We speak not thus by way of complaint, but, that if by any means we may "provoke them to jealousy by them that are no people!" If London and its neighbourhood were properly canvassed, a large sum could be raised. We are most thankful to chronicle the above mentioned increase, and trust that good days are dawning upon the cause of Bible Society work In London. We wish them "good luck in the name of the Lord!" At Harrietsville and Dorchester Station I found the work started, and we hope they will do good service. St. Mary's is going on excellently, but we hope for some continued increase here in this flourishing town. Formed a new branch at Kirkton, and passed on to Exeter, where we found the collections somewhat less; but a good spirit is shown to the work of circulating the Scriptures in this branch. In this neighbourhood, and in one or two others, detrimental reports concerning the expenses of maintaining the Upper Canada Bible Society have been circulated. These reports I have met, and I believe overcome, by shewing the real state of the case, and the necessity of occupying and maintaining the ground in Canada, if we are to grow with the country's growth; and I have especially shewn the people that the best way to settle the little difficulty in their minds, about the expense being rather disproportionate to the present income, was to increase their subscriptions a little-let the yorkshilling increase to a quarter, let the quarter increase to the half-dollar, and the half-dollar double itself, and the complaints would never be heard. If men who sustain the work are really sincere in their desires to circulate the Book, here is a remedy-and it might be made a sovereign remedy. Preached a sermon on behalf of the Bible Society at Rodgerville, where they have since collected a fair sum for Bible distribution. Brucefield and Bayfield not good meetings, and though their collections were somewhat less, yet they had done pretty well. Clinton saw a small meeting comparatively, on account of a tremendous snow storm which made the roads for some days almost impassable. A great improvement was witnessed in their funds in spite of some local difficulties with Christian brethren concerning the manner of conducting the Society's work. Goderich, from the same causes in the natural and spiritual atmosphere, was not looking particularly bright. The following extract from a letter since received, I hope will be fulfilled: "I am happy to inform you that a fresh start has been taken by the branch here, and upon a much more satisfactory basis than heretofore. * * * The friends of the Bible Society intend prosecuting the work with vigour. wast when we next have the pleasure of a visit from the Agent of the Upper And we Canada Bible Society, to meet him with much more unity of spirit, and greatly increased financial prosperity." Manchester and St. Helen's are working fairly to exhibit a good interest. Proceeded through tremendous snowdrifts to Dungannon, Lucknow, and Bluevale, where I formed new branches with good prespects. Glenallen we hope to see growing. By the time I reached Elora, the roads were somewhat better. Here we had an admirable meeting, as usual, and the subscriptions were ahead of the year before even, good as that was, amounting to \$289. We all regretted that our valued secretary complained of failing health, as his years and honors increased; yet he was still up to the mark and as active as over, although he

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was thinking of retirement; but which, however, we sincerely hope may not take place till he "slips his anchor" altogether. We hope that Fergus, which every year creeps up quietly, does not cause the good man to fear lest she should "overhaul" him. Go ahead, Elora! "a stern chase is a long chase !" Fergus, like Elora, had done nobly. The meetings here are getting much better than in former days. Two of the resident ministers had addressed the Grammar school and common schools, and obtained upwards of \$10 from the children as their own bona fide subscriptions. Who can tell the good results which will flow fram instilling into the mind of the young an nterest in Missionary and Bible Society enterprises ! Will the towns and cities mark the conduct of Fergus? I may also say that Elora had obtained several dollars from a like source. At Garafraza a mistake had been made in the notice of meeting given out, so, unfortunately, we had no regular meeting. I afterwards preached there. Their collections were pretty fair. Erin-wet and bad roads, horse continually breaking through the snow, and for the next few days the travelling was bad indeed, as a frost soon after set in and fixed the roads in that shocking state. The collections at Erin are small yet, but in a fair way of increasing. Formed a new branch at Mimosa, and went on to Eramosa, where we found all doing well. Winterbourne saw a splendid meeting. They had done well, and promise still better things. I found things looking rather blue at Millbank. The Committee were having a bit of a nap; but they have since woke up and produced the best collection that has yet been made, amounting to nearly \$40. May they continue wide awake in this noblest of causes ! Stratford-The mere measured ing would not display the real interest that this County-town takes in the work. Their collections had considerably increased under their energetic and zealous secretary-a committee in himself! Over \$255 had been raised by collections. Here the sleighing and I parted company, and I scratched on to St. Mary's, and managed, through a kind friend, to get home in his buggy.

March "came in like a lamb, and went out like a lion" afterwards. started early in this month for a Northern trip, to commence at Carlingford, but had to put back on my 40 mile drive, from stress of weather, with two buggies to drag. Tried it the next day, but failed from the same cause to reach Fullarton. Tremendous gales of wind in your teeth, and dragging a buggy through occasional deep snow, with another buggy in tow, is no joke on your horse! However, I visited these places shortly afterwards. We had an excellent meeting in Hibbert Township, and a new branch was there formed. Preached at St. Mary's, and went on to Mitchell, from whence I had sleighing once more till the close of March. Mitchell and Listowell presented a very small audience for such thriving and large villages, and are not yet up to the work; but give fair promise of doing well. Drayton is somewhat behind its proper position, and we trust its resident ministers will use their influence to secure better results in such an excellently settled country. Arthur-Our secretary who had kept the work going was no longer residing here, and the president was indifferent to the cause, so no notice of meeting had been given, and nothing had been done. I hope to be able, by correspondence, to induce others here to revive the work. In the fine village of Mt. Forest we had but a poor meeting, and the Bible Society has not yet obtained the hold upon the understandings and hearts of its residents that I hope it eventually will. However, their subscriptions were much larger than during the previous year. Went on to Clifford to consult with Rev. W. Smithurst about the advantage of having a branch in

that neighbourhood; but the friends of the cause had deemed it better for the present to be connected with the Harriston branch. On Saturday I returned to Listowell, some 40 miles, amid one of the coldest, stormiest days of the season, and the next day preached at Howick and Wrozeter thrice —the former, a branch that needs stirring up very much, the latter, a place where I hope to see a branch formed. Ainlaysville is, I trust, reviving, as also is Blyth. Londesborough I hope will prove a good branch, as it promises well. Harpurkey always does well. It is to be united with Seaforth hereafter, as the village has gradually moved up to that enterprising and flourishing place. Egmondville, as usual, shews its love for the good work by its subscriptions, though the audiences are but thin. A visit to the rising branch at Fullarton, and a missionary sermon to a large audience, with an address at Carlingford, wound up the year ending March 31, 1866. Thanks be to God for all His lovingkindness so undeserved!

"We'll praise Him for all that is past, And trust Him for all that's to come."

And now Christian Sirs, in conclusion, I would again draw your attention to what I have each year pressed upon your notice-We want information circulated among the people concerning the Basis, the Object, and the doings of the Bible Society. Experience only confirms the view that a deep necessity exists for this groundwork of success. No Annual meetings can ever do this work in a sufficient manner. amount of ignorance that exists amongst the masses of our population, The especially the agricultural portion of it, is surprising. I have met even Ministers of the Gospel almost entirely ignorant of its work. Whilst this state of affairs remains, we cannot look for, nor can we receive, the sympathy and support that otherwise we should command. If we had a system of collecting cards annually issued, containing facts and figures drawn up concisely in an interesting manner, it would be a great means of producing increased support. Our collectors often complain of the ignorance with which they have to contend, and of the want of information, which they are unable to supply. Another means would be a circular to all the Ministers of the Gospel, written it may be by some one of their own denomination, shewing how their own missicuary societies have been and are still deeply indebted to the Bible Society. Ministers may rely upon it, that the peculiarly diffusive principles of Christianity, if well cultivated, will not only never injure local and denominational efforts to do good, but will bring reflex blessings on such neighbourhoods and churches. It is an invariable rule, that now-a days, where the missionary spirit is prospering, true religion is exerting its blessed influence; but where there's no missionary spirit, and where the Bible Society does not prosper, there also we shall find a deadness about spiritual things. Let such cast away the unsound and unholy principle which I have sometimes seen with regard to the British and Foreign Bible Society, "It doesn't bring grist to my mill." To the brethren in the ministry who have kindly aided me in forming so many new branches this year, I return, in the name of the Society, my hearty thanks; as I do also to all the kind friends by whom I have always been welcomed and hospitably received. Sometimes hard roads and rough fare, &c., shew that Canada can occasionally match the middle of last century in "merrie old England," when good, quaint old Berridge's experience was: "long rides and miry roads in sharp weather : cold houses to sit in with very moderate fuel, and

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three or four children roaring or rocking about you: coarse food and meagre liquor: lumpy beds to lie on, and too short for the feet; stiff blankets like boards for a covering, and live cattle in plenty to feed upon you: breakfast on tea that smells very sickly: mount your horse with boots uncleaned, and then ride home praising God for all mercies !"

REPORT OF S. B. JOHNSON, ESQ.

TO THE SECRETARY OF THE KINGSTON AUXILIARY BIBLE SOCIETY.

ACTON, C. W., December 26, 1865.

DEAR SIR, —After correspondence with yourself, I found it would be desirable, if possible, to visit your branches before the close of the present year, in order that your forthcoming report might furnish a true account of the actual state and condition of the various branches in connection with your auxiliary. Accordingly in the latter part of October I commenced the work allotted to me, and am very glad in general terms to report that the result of my visits has very much encouraged me to believe that the same spirit of earnest co-operation may yet be found to exist within the sphere of your operations, as may be said to characterize our branches in the western section of the province.

My first visit was to Trenton, where after meeting with an old friend, the Rev. Mr. Russ, Wesleyan minister, I proceeded with him to call on the principal parties in the village. We held a good meeting; a new committee was appointed; lady collectors were appointed, and the subscriptions were promised to be handed in by the close of the present month. Next proceeded to *Canifton*, where, after a small but interesting meeting, I received a small payment on purchase account, and collectors were appointed to canvass for subscriptions at once. At Shannonville matters looked gloomy enough. We did not succeed in getting a meeting. President and secretary both absent. The former I saw the next morning, who gave me a dollar as his subscription. I have promised them a subscription meeting as early as my engagements will permit, and hope to see some little accomplished there ere long.

I next visited the neat little village of Newburgh, where we held a good meeting. The treasurer had some \$40 on hand, which he promised to remit before the close of the year. Nopanee gave us a capital meeting, the warden of the county in the chair, who said it was the best Bible meeting he had ever attended. From this flourishing little town I received \$128 on purchase account, and \$10 free contribution to the Kingston Auxiliary Bible Society. After spending the Sabbath at Bath, and preaching twice, we held an excellent meeting on Monday evening. Collectors were appointed to aid the committee in having their subscription list complete by the end of the year. After some difficulty I obtained the next morning a skiff from a friend to the cause, and was rowed over the bay some five miles to Amhers Island. The water was very rough and the cold intense, but I found mysel none the worse after resting awhile at the hospitable mansion of — Percival

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Esq., a gentleman who evinces great interest in our work. A capital meeting, after which some dozen collectors were appointed, who will visit the families residing all over the island, and from the interest manifested I doubt not a liberal sum will be forwarded. A long drive the next day brought me to Waterloo, but no meeting had been appointed. No officers or society was in existence. I found here an old friend, Rev. Mr. Ward, for whom I preached in the evening, and arranged to return, spend the Sabbath with him, and hold a meeting for the Bible Society in his church in the evening. On the next day I drove to Gananoque, where I found the collectors had begun, but not completed their work. The meeting was small, but unusually interesting. I have promised them a Sabbath in the summer, and hope to see this busy little village soon alive to our noble work. On Sabbath, after a morning appointment at Waterloo, I drove over to Glen Allan, and preached in the afternoon, having thus an opportunity of urging the claims of our Society upon their attention, and announcing my meeting for the next Tuesday, which was quite a success. Collectors were appointed, and I expect a liberal return. In the evening I held a meeting at Waterloo. The committee, after consultation with friends, was nominated. I promised to see the secretary, who invited me to dine when I was passing the next Tuesday, which I accepted, and was much gratified to meet at his house with a number of the new committee. Lady collectors were appointed, who promised to do their very best, and I hope to see a useful little branch in this interesting locality. Harrowsmith, if not dead, is very low, but I hope to see whether there may not be found there "Some and thing yet." Wolf Island .- We held quite an interesting meeting here. I was hospitably entertained by Rev. Mr. Porteous, and vainly endeavored to repay his kindness by saving his horse, to which my veterinary powers were, however, not equal, as it unfortunately died, notwithstanding our best efforts to save it. I received \$22 70 from these warm-hearted friends, with a promise of as much more if I could visit them in the summer, which I hepe to do. At Wilton I found the friends so discouraged that they had decided it was of no use to call a meeting. However as I was there early I visited the schools, and did all I could under the circumstances, and held a very encouraging meeting in the Wesleyan Church. Officers and collectors were appointed, and I believe a good society may yet be found in this pleasant neighbourhood. At Centreville we had a fair attendance, but matters want stirring up here. At Tamworth, after preaching twice in the village and once in the country on the Sabbath, we had an excellent meeting on Monday evening. I received some payment of purchase account, appointed collectors, and left things in a hopeful and encouraging position. I next " visited Roblin, where, notwithstanding a wretched night, we had an interesting meeting. I received a small donation, and was glad to find an interest manifest on the part of the friends there. At Selby we had a good meeting, and I trust we may see a vigorous organization in this locality. Lonsdale gave us but a small meeting, though something ought to be done in this romantic little village. At Melrose there was very much to encourage us. An excellent meeting, a liberal community, and a thorough appreciation of the importance of the work, with past liberality to the cause, all induce the belief that the young ladies who promised their services may meet with marked success. At Roslin, after preaching for the Presbyterian minister in the morning, I went with him some ten miles into a fine country settlement, where Rev. Mr. McColl addressed a very large audience on the

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importance of a well-conducted Sabbath-school, after which a Sabbathschool, with the prospect of nearly 90 children, was duly organized. Difficulty arising as to a proper supply of Scriptures for the school, I was pleased to offer them at once a supply from our Upper Canada Bible Society, which led to a request that I would preach in the evening, and a warm invitation to visit them as soon as I could to organize a branch of the Bible Society among them, which I cheerfully promised to do. Our meeting at Roslin was quite a success. About \$20 was subscribed, which will I trust be collected by the close of the year. At Tweed our meeting was crowded to the very doors, and a most enthusiastic meeting was held. received \$15, and took up a subscription of nearly \$30 more, and I trust the results will be seen for some time to come. Business seemed to be unusually brisk in this little place. Bridgewater was next visited, and though in a neighbourhood abounding with rocks and stone, is certainly in many respects a model village, owned almost entirely by the Hon. Billa Flint, who carries on several large and important works. The foreman, and in fact the whole number of persons employed in each department, are an intelligent, earnest body of men. No liquor is allowed in the place. A very heautiful white marble church has been erected, and presents a fine appearance. After a very interesting and large meeting, I received \$5 free contribution, nearly \$35 being reserved to pay for a supply of Scriptures for the neighbourhood. Madoc gives promise of much future usefulness. After a goed meeting I received about \$40 due for Scriptures supplied. At Stirling, after a good meeting, I received their purchase account in full. Collectors were appointed to collect at once, and a strong branch should be sustained in this stirring village. After a Sabbath in Belleville, I proceeded to Prince Edward County, and held my first meeting in Wellington, a very pretty village on Lake Ontario. The meeting was well attended, and considerable interest was manifest. At Bloomfield, one of the finest parts of the country I have ever seen, our meeting, which was crowded to the doors, was a great success. A large amount of interest was shewn, some excellent collectors were appointed, and a liberal contribution may be confidently expected. Picton .- We had a highly satisfactory meeting in this beautiful little town, and the treasurer's statement shewed returns altogether amounting to \$486 from sales and collections, to which may be added \$8 collection at the meet-The ladies have formed themselves into a ladies' branch, and have done nobly. At Demorestville, the only branch from which I think Mr. Brookman received any money, some \$17 being paid to him as a free contribution, I was gratified to receive almost as much more-some \$7 due for stock, and \$8 free contribution to the Kingston Auxiliary. Here too, I was pleased to meet with an old friend, Rev. Mr. Cobb, the president of the Society. At Milford our meeting was small, the Wesleyans not choosing to give up a protracted meeting for one evening. A good deal of dissatisfaction was expressed on this account. Some excellent lady collectors were appointed, and I trust will be successful. After preaching three times at Consecon, we had a large meeting on Monday night. A strong spirit of liberality was manifest. I received some dollars on account, and the collection will be forwarded when made. Thus ended my first tour in connection with your auxiliary; and I confidently trust to meet with an increased spirit of liberality in the future. Wishing you every possible success,



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ABSTRACT OF THE SIXTY-FIRST REPORT

British and Foreign Bible Society, 1865.

Ir must, of necessity, happen that a certain amount of similarity will mark the operations of this Society from year to year. The object aimed at is one and simple. It is the same in all lands; and happily, the Constitution of the Society will tolerate no deviation from that object. Yet there are new phases through which the Bible work is perpetually passing ;---changes touching and moulding the action of human governments, which have an important bearing on the operations of the Society-new spheres of labour ever and anon opening, at the threshold of which ignorance and bigotry had erected and long maintained a resolute barrier-prejudices, which had kept jealous sentinel against the entrance of the Bible, relaxing their hold, and losing their authority over the human mind-facilities for labour unexpectedly secured, and so opportunely occurring as to give conclusive evidence that a special Providence has been the pioneer of the Society, favouring its designs, and giving scope for its agency-precious harvests reaped on fields where the seeds of Divine Truth had been scattered in past seasons with diligence and hope :---these and other circumstances cannot fail to impart features of intense and permanent interest to a work which may, in some degree, be divested of the novelty which characterized its early history, and appealed so powerfully to the sympathy and earnestness of the Christian Church.

FRANCE.—The past year forms no exception to the general success which has marked your operations in France. Many exciting topics have engaged the thoughts of Frenchmen, and the discussions to which they have given birth in all circles have created an influence which has increased, rather than diminished the demand for the Scriptures; and hence a circulation is announced considerably in advance of the last few years. It is with sincere gratitude to God that your Agent states, that between March 1, 1864, and February 28, 1865, the actual distributions amounted to 87,454 copies. The Committee have sanctioned the opening of Special Public Depôts in Paris, Marseilles, Bordeaux, and Nice.

BELGIUM.—There are no new features impressed upon your work in Belgium. Your Depositary at Brussels, Mr. W. H. Kirkpatrick, states that there has been a circulation during the year of 9,481 copies. The Committee have authorised an addition to the staff of Colporteurs in Belgium, as it appeared that there were parts of the country where visitation with the Scriptures was needed.

HOLLAND.—In the Netherlands the work of the Society proceeds with little variation of issues from year to year. Your Depositary, Mr. Van der Bom, reports that 21,437 copies have been circulated since the last annual statement. There are still seven Colporteurs at work in Holland, and to their efforts must be ascribed the circulation of 10,846 Bibles and Testaments.

GERMANY.—It is a most suggestive fact that your circulation last year, in connection with your German agencies, was more than equal to the whole annual circulation effected by the Society in all parts of the world, even after it had been labouring for a quarter of a century. From the four centres of your work, Cologne, Frankfort, Berlin and Vienna, more than 390,000 copies were issued, giving an increase of nearly 50,000, as compared with the previous year.

COLOGNE.—This portion of the Agency includes North-Western Germany and the Prussian provinces of Westphalia and the Rhine. The circulation effected from this point has been 103,860 copies; the circulation of the previous year was 86,488; so that there has been an increase of 17,372 copies. Twenty-one men have been employed in Colportage. Their sales, in eleven months, were 62,311 copies, being 13,649 in excess of the previous twelve months.

FRANKFORT.—The aspects of your work, as connected with the Frankfort Depôt, are not less encouraging than those which attach to the Cologne District. No fewer than 131,565 copies have been sent out during the past year, to answer the numerous and urgent requirements of your work. Fourteen Colporteurs have been employed in the district.

SWITZERLAND.—Your Agent feels grateful in recording a circulation of 54,092 copies in this portion of his field, being an increase in favour of the present year of 1,860.

BERLIN.—Eastern Germany falls to Berlin, and from the Depôts in that city and Breslau 138,006 copies have been issued during the past year. A most extensive and important sphere is identified with the Depôt at Berlin, including six provinces of Prussia, the kingdom of Saxony, and the Duchies of Anhalt and Mecklenburg. Mr. Millard devotes a considerable portion of his report to the interesting details of Colportage, and with precisely the same staff as before, the sales by this agency have amounted to 58,817 copies, being 6,547 more than in the preceding year.

AUSTRIA.—At the date of the last Report, it was stated that, by desire of the Committee, Mr. E. Millard had taken up his residence at Vienna, and was anxionsly pursuing negotiations, in the hope that direct operations on behalf of your Society might be established in Austria. Arrangements have been made for the establishment of three central Depôts—one at Vienna, another at Pesth, and a third at Prague. Tedious formalities had to be concluded before the authorizations were duly completed, so that the operations now to be reported include the work of six months only. It will be heard, then, with astonishment and delight, that there has already been a circulation of 25,298 copies in the principal languages of the Austrian empire.

DENMARK.—It is most gratifying to observe the progress by which your Danish operations have been marked. In 1862 the issues amounted to 16,-136; in 1863 they had reached 19,000; and last year they present a total of Icentinues of the the is within give to

ICELAND.—The information supplied from this deeply interesting spot continues to refer to the joy and gratitude manifested by the people in all parts of the island, for the invaluable boon conferred on them by this Society in the issue of the revised Icelandic Testament and Psalms, and in placing it within the reach of all classes. It is now the purpose of your Committee to give to Iceland the whole Bible in clear legible type, and portable in size.

Norway.—In the chief towns a group of Christian friends, interested in the object of the Society, are associated together to devise the most effectual means of circulating the Scriptures within some well-defined limits; correspondence is established with pastors, schoolmasters, and others, who are most conversant with the wants of the surrounding population; and Colportage is adopted wherever such agency is judged to be needful. From the Depôts at Christiania, Christianssand, Stavanger, Drontheim, Bergen, and Tromsö, nearly 20,000 copies have been issued.

SWEDEN.—The experience of the year brings out the important fact that there is a growing desire in Sweden to possess a whole Bible; for, with a decrease in the total issues as compared with 1863, there has been an actual increase of 1,500 in the number of complete Bibles issued from the Depôt. The entire issues of the year have been 82,670. Of these, 81,947 were in the Swedish, and 723 in foreign languages.

Russia.—The operations of your own Society in Russia are necessarily limited, for reasons frequently explained in these Reports; but the Christian friends through whom you act are enabled to state that their issues in 1864 have been one-third larger than in the preceding year, and amount to 31,993 copies. This progress is both gratifying and hopeful, and the Committee trust that enlargement will continue to distinguish the work which it is their privilege to conduct in Russia.

ODESSA.—Your correspondent in South Russia, Mr. Mclville, still resides at Odessa, ar continues to promote Bible circulation, so far as the limited facilities at his command enable him. Of the 3,754 copies circulated, the greater proportion were in the German language, and required to meet the wants of the colonists on the Azof.

PORTUGAL.—It must for the present suffice to observe that the Scriptures can be and are printed in Portugal on behalf of the Society; that the free and open sale of the Bible cannot be legally prevented; that the employment of Colportage is found practicable, though not without its difficulties; that a very earnest desire to possess and read the Word of God can be traced; and that, if unforeseen difficulties do not arise, a new and important sphere will be opened for your labours, which the Committee are resolved shall be cultivated with all the energy and resources at their disposal.

ITALY.—The circulation of Scriptures, in connection with the Italian work, during the past year, has been nearly equal to that of 1863; and your Agent, Mr. Bruce, thinks it a special mercy that, notwithstanding continued political excitement, the enhanced price of provisions, and the untiring enmity of the priests to the Bible and its propagators, 28,237 copies have found their way into the hands of the people, and have been disseminated over every part of the Italian peninsula and the adjacent islands, the small Pontifical territory alone excluded. The staff of Colporteurs has been increased to thirty-five: and although some complain of the difficulty of large success in

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consequence of past efforts, yet with a population of more than twenty millions, the Committee are by no means disposed to withdraw a single labourer

MILAN .- The Depôt here is under the charge of Signor Giaime, who also superintends the labours of the Colporteurs in Lombardy. The issues have

TURIN .- A larger issue than usual has rewarded the Christian diligence of the Depositary and Colporteurs, 4,466 copies having been disseminated.

GENOA .- The Committee have to deplore the death of Signor Betti, who, for some considerable time, has had the superintendence of the Depôt at this place. Signor Rettani, who has given good proof of Christian character and zeal, is now appointed to the charge of the Depôt. The issues have been

FLORENCE .- Additional importance will now attach to this city, constituted, as it is, the metropolis of the Italian kingdom, the seat of the Court, and the centre of political influence; and it is devoutly to be wished that these important changes may tend to the furtherance, not the detriment, of the work in which the Society is engaged. The circulation from Florence during the

ANCONA .- A Depôt occupies a favourable position in this town, and gives publicity to the sale of the Scriptures.

NAPLES AND SIGHY .- Ten Colporteurs are associated with the Depôt at Naples, some of whom have extended their travels into Sicily. The issues

MALTA .- The Malta Depôt is chiefly maintained, not so much for the sales that may be effected in the island itself, as for the convenience of those countries that are easily accessible from this point. Malta is in constant communication with Egypt, Syria, North Africa, &c., and Scriptures can be readily despatched to these lands, where the Society has many valuable correspondents and helpers. The issues have been 7,284: and of this number, 667 copies were purchased and paid for at the Depôt.

SYRIA .- BEYROUT .- The Committee have had an edition of the Arabic New Testament printed at the Beyrout Missionary press. A liberal distribution of the copies has been sanctioned, Schools and Missionaries having been freely furnished with supplies. The Committee have also agreed to pay the expense

TURKEY .- The issues, in spite of adverse circumstances, have fallen but slightly below those of the preceding year, and they are marked by some features of great encouragement. The various Depôts throughout European Turkey, Greece, and Asia Minor, sent forth, in 1864-

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BULGARIA .- The sales of Scriptures in Bulgaria show a large increase as compared with the previous year. This partly arises from the issue of the third a which

third and last volume of the Old Testament, recently completed, and for which there has been a good demand.

MACEDONIA AND THESSALY.—The district so indicated contains a very considerable Bulgarian population, and the issues for the past year are stated to have been ten times larger than usual.

NORTH ALBANIA.—After the Rev. Dr. Thomson had completed his long tour of observation in 1863, he requested the Committee to sanction the establishment of a Depôt and Colporteur at Scutari, the capital of North Albania, and containing 60,000 inhabitants, representing very mixed creeds. The proposal having been agreed to, Dr. Thomson placed Mr. Reidel at this centre, wit'i instructions to open a Depôt, and travel with the Scriptures as frequently as circumstances would permit.

BOSNIA AND HERZEGOVINA.—For nearly two years a diligent Colporteur has been stationed at Seraievo, whose success is quite equal to what could have been expected in this early stage of his operations. His sales during the year amounted to 704 copies, of which 574 were in the Servian, the common language of the people, and the rest in Turkish, German, French, &c.

MOLDO-WALLACHIA OR ROUMANIA.—The general circulation of Scriptures in Roumania last year amounted to 4,912 copies; being 340 in excess of the previous year. Of these, 3,019 were in the Wallachian or Rouman language.

GREECE.—In reporting that the sales of Scriptures are less encouraging than in the previous year, Dr. Thomson observes that the decrease may be fairly attributed to the unsettled condition of the country, which has had an injurious influence on all religious efforts for the welfare of the Greeks. The issues from the Depóts at Athens, Calamata, Syria, and Corfu, have been 1,240.

INDIA.—The subject of special Agency for India was adverted to in the last Annual Report. A resolution was adopted by the Committee, pledging the Society to send out some competent labourers acquainted with the country and its wants, who, keeping beyond the limits of existing Auxiliaries, and not clashing with their efforts, should organize plans for a very comprehensive circulation of the Word of God. Colonel Lamb has gone forth to his sphere of operations in the Bengal Presidency. He is now visiting the various Mission stations on the way to Allahabad, in the hope of securing such aid as will enable him to initiate an extensive system of Colportage.

CALCUTTA.—The issues from the Auxiliary Depôt have been less than in 1863, although, for reasons explained, it does not follow that the actual distribution has been diminished. In consequence of the Depôt at Monghyr being no longer necessary, it was relinquished in 1863, and a very large proportion of the existing stock of Scriptures was placed in the hands of Missionaries in the district, furnishing a supply sufficient for several years. It is owing to this circumstance that the average annual issues of the Calcutta Auxiliary have been disturbed, and the returns for 1864 appear comparatively small, amounting only to 19,903 copies. The Colportage operations have been continued on the same scale as before. The Committee have granted to the Calcutta Auxiliary 6,876 English Bibles and Testaments, 200 Portions for the Blind, and 500 reams of Printing Paper.

ALLAHABAD.—The North-India Auxiliary has effected a circulation far beyond any point hitherto attained, amounting to 32,702 copies. Of this num-

ber it has been the privilege of the Auxilliary to send forth amongst the natives of the North-West Provinces and Oude no fewer than 29,718 Bibles, Testaments, or Gospels and other portions of Scripture in their own languages. There are six Colporteurs labouring at Agra, three at Cawnpore, four at Etawah and Futtegurh, two at Benares and Gorruckpore, one at Meerut, Budaon, and Allahabad. Thus, over the district where the mutiny raged with such fierceness and intolerable cruelty, the Word of God is being widely diffused.

MADRAS.—The circulation effected in the year 1864 does not reach the limits attained in the previous year, but amounts to the goodly number of 80,364 copies. The system of Colportage has been more generally adopted in the Madras than any other Presidency, and it is regarded as the very best means of diffusing the Scriptures amongst the people who are not within the range of Missionary labours. To sustain in full efficiency all the plans and operations of the Madras Auxiliary, the Committee have granted 3,300 reams of paper, 493 copies of the Scripture, binding materials, for general operations, 2,000*l*.

BOMBAY.—It appears that 12,802 copies of Bibles, Testaments, or Portions, have been issued by the Bombay Auxiliary subsequent to the last Report, and it is hoped that following years will witness more extended efforts for the millions within this Presidency, now accessible to Christian agency.

CEYLON.—COLOMBO.—The sale of the Scriptures has been carried on with considerable success, and the issues, though smaller as regards complete Bibles, show an increase of Testaments and Portions. Two Depôts are established in Colombo; one on the premises of the Church Missionary Society, and a second in the native town.

CHINA.—Your Committee can report hopefully respecting China, as more has been accomplished for the circulation of the Scriptures than in any former period. The sower has gone forth to sow in many directions, scattering the precious grain which bears fruit unto life eternal. The appointment of Mr. Wylie, as your Agent for China, is in every respect leading to satisfactory results. He has devoted a large amount of time to travelling, visiting the Missionary stations to obtain such native help as could be enlisted on behalf of Colportage, and placing himself in friendly communication with all persons likely to afford co-operation in the development of his plans. The whole of the Colportage returns for the year give a total circulation of 32,465

SHANGHAE.—From January to December the following copies have been sent out: Bibles, 2,145; Testaments, 22,508; Portions, 1,303; making a total of 25,956 volumes.

Hong Kong.—From the statistics furnished by the Rev. Dr. Legge, who kindly acts as Secretary, it appears that 20,533 copies of the Scriptures have been issued from the Hong Kong Depôt during the year, being a much larger circulation than that of the preceding year.

CANTON.—During the year 1864 there had been a distribution, chiefly by gifts, of 52 Bibles, 4,000 Testaments, and 3,500 Gospels. One Colporteur has been employed, confining his labors to Canton and the towns and villages in its immediate neighbourhood.

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PERIN.—Your Committee have sanctioned the printing of an edition of the Four Gospels in the revised Mandarin colloquial dialect, a work much needed. The Scriptures are being quictly disseminated in the capital through various channels.

AUSTRALIA.—In reviewing the state of the Auxiliaries in the vast and flourishing Colonies of the Australias, the Committee have reason very thankfully to recognise symptoms of decided progress. The duties assigned to your Agent, the Rev. Dr. Tucker, have been discharged with ability and success. By his intelligence, zeal, and conciliatory spirit, he has won the confidence and affection of those with whom his labours have associated him. Considerable progress has been made in the formation of new Societies, and Dr. Tucker states that many more can be established in localities which he hopes, ere long, to visit.

NEW SOUTH WALES.—SYDNEY.—The past year has been fraught with blessing; for not only has there been a considerable increase in the issue of Scriptures from the Depôt, but the Auxiliary has been enabled to remit to the Parent Society the generous contribution of 500%, as an expression of unabated interest in general operations, and of the wish that is felt to bear, in some measure, the responsibility of maintaining them. The circulation of the year amounted to 6,763 copies, exclusive of Portions.

NEWCASTLE.—During the five years of the Auxiliary's operations, 1,870 copies of the Bible and New Testament have been circulated in the district.

QUEENSLAND.—BRISBANE.—In this thriving community the Bible Society has its place and its work. The Committee of the Auxiliary at Brisbane have not only provided for the city and its suburbs, but have established Depôts in the newly-formed towns on the coast, and in some of the far interior parts of the colony, where it is intended, as soon as practicable, to form Branch Societies.

VICTORIA.—MELBOURNE.—The Auxiliary has remitted, on its Purchase Account, the sum of 845*l*.; and its issues for the past year were 9,862 copies, being a small advance on those of the previous year.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.—ADELAIDE.—The report affirms that, although the issues of the year, 6,888 copies, present a small reduction as compared with the year immediately preceding, no unfavourable inference is to be deduced from this fact, as though the Auxiliary were losing spirit and energy. Your Committee have to acknowledge a noble contribution of 6007.

TASMANIA.—HOBART TOWN.—The Auxiliary reports a circulation of 2,976 copies of God's Word during the year, and while giving a full measure of attention to the wants and claims of its own sphere of action, remits the handsome contribution of 400*l*, towards the furtherance of your larger operations.

LAUNCESTON.—The issues last year were 726 copies, making a total of 21,856 since the Auxiliary was established.

NEW ZEALAND.—Very few letters have been received, during the year, from this part of the world, and very little information is it in the power of the Committee to supply in reference to that particular work in which the Society is engaged.

AUCKLAND.—The issues, including grants, were 1,721 copies. Your Committee have received 50l. as a Free Contribution, and 207l. 14s. 5d. in payment for Scriptures forwarded to Auckland.

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CANTERBURY.---Mr. Fisher, your correspondent at Christchurch, remits 100%. as a Free Contribution, and 150% for Scriptures, on behalf of the Canterbury Auxiliary. No statement of issues is given.

South SEAS.—TAINTI.—The pleasing intelligence has been received that the long expected shipment of Tahitian Bibles had at length reached this island, to the inexpressible delight of the Christian converts, multitudes of whom remain unshaken in their attachment to the Scriptures. The Rev. G. Morris, to whose care the Scriptures have been consigned, has remitted 176*i*. 18. 1*d*. on account of the sales already effected.

SAMOA.—The sales of the Scriptures during the last eighteen months has been on a scale surpassing all former experience, and thousands of copies have gone into circulation, and are now being thoughtfully and devoutly read. The Society has often received a gratifying return for editions printed at its expense on behalf of the South Sea Islands, but never have they received so prompt and large a return as in the case of the recent edition of the Samoan Bible, which was prepared during the residence in this country of the Rev. Dr. Turner. To the present time the extraordinary sum of 1,5337. 17s. 5d. has been remitted for sales, although the first consignment did not reach the island till May, 1863.

FRIENDLY ISLANDS.—TONGA.—The Rev. J. Eggleston, of Sydney, has remitted the sum of 106*l*. 17s. 8*d*. on account of sales of Scriptures in the Tongan and Fijian languages; and adds, that a much larger amount will soon follow, both from the Friendly and Fiji Islands, in payment for the editions recently forwarded to those parts.

Fin.—The Committee can at length announce the completion of the entire Bible in the language of Fiji.

MAURITIUS.—It appears that during the past year 2,498 copies of the Scriptures were issued from the Depôt at Port Louis; and it is worthy of observation that 578 were in the Malagassy language.

MADAGASCAR.—A communication has been received from the Rov. W. Ellis, dated Antananarivo, February 28, in which he describes the mode adopted for putting the Scriptures furnished by your Society into circulation, and the success which had followed. The Christian converts have been extremely anxious to possess a complete Bible, that they may know the whole Revelation of God. The committee have used every exertion to hasten the completion of the unfinished parts of the Old Testament, and they are happy to say that the last sheet is now in the press, and that the long-desired Malagassy Bible is finished, and ready for circulation.

SOUTH AFRICA.—CAPE TOWN.—The issues of Scriptures exhibit a falling off as compared with the previous year, and amount to 5,787 copies. Since the formation of the Auxiliary nearly 90,000 volumes have been disseminated, chiefly in the English and Dutch languages.

PORT ELIZABETH.—The last Annual Meeting of this Auxiliary was cheered by the information that a larger circulation of Scriptures had taken place than during any former period.

GRAHAM'S TOWN.—The issues of the year had included 707 Bibles, 579 Testaments, and 476 Portions, or a total of 1,762 copies. KING WILLIA tion of a new A efforts for the

KING WILLIAM'S TOWN.—The Rev. J. M. Cotterill has announced the formation of a new Auxiliary in the capital of British Kaffraria, where systematic efforts for the circulation of the Scriptures are most important.

WEST AFRICA.—ODUMASE.—The progress made in rendering the Scriptures into the Gà and Otji languages induces the expectation that in a few years the translation in both vernaculars will be completed, thereby making the whole Bible accessible to millious of people who are now under the degrading influence of hateful and bloody superstition. The Committee, at the request of the Church Missionary Society, have undertaken to print the books of Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy, in Yoruba, to the extent of 1,500 copies. For the same Society, the Committee have agreed to print the Gospel of St. John in the Ibo language.

SIEBRA LEONE.—The Auxiliary still finds a considerable demand for the Scriptures, and has received 2,398 additional copies during the year.

BUENOS AVRES.—Mr. Cerfield has had his residence at this place since his return to South America in 1862. In stating his issues for the year, a table of monthly sales is given, from which it appears that 4,564 copies have been sold, irrespective of Portions. The circulation is more than double that of the preceding year; and since 1858, when the work commenced, more than 10,000 copies have been scattered abroad in the River Plate district.

MONTE VIDEO.—The attention of Mr. Corfield has been given to this Province, and a Depôt is now established for the public sale of the Scriptures.

BRAZIL.—There has been a considerable sale of the Scriptures in the Brazils during the past year; but the precise number cannot be given, as the necessary returns have not been received.

WEST INDRES.—The Auxiliaries continue their useful operations, with more or less success, and a large circulation of Scriptures is effected. The advantages attending the occasional visitation of Auxiliaries by some representative deputed by the Parent Committee, have been so frequently attested by subsequent revival and enlargement, that it is intended to follow this course with regard to the West Indies. The Committee have entered into an arrangement with the Rev. W. Robertson, B. A., of Croydon, to undertake this important mission; and they have confidence that he will discharge the responsible duties confided to him with the intelligence, zeal, and catholicity so essential to secure success.

MEXICO.—The operations of your Agent, Mr. Butler, in this country, have been almost totally suspended since the date of the last Report. The larger portion of the year he has been compelled to spend in inaction, so far as respects the dissemination of the Scriptures, being detained in the city of Mexico to conduct negotiations necessary to ensure the perfect freedom of his work. Your Committee rejoice that the Emperor accepted the righteous policy of granting Mr. Butler the license he solicited, and decreed that the Scriptures might circulate without restriction through the country. The necessary document was handed to your Agent, and he can now offer the Bible for sale anywhere and everywhere, no man daring to make him afraid.

UNITED STATES.—NEW YORK.—The American Bible Society has never put forth such activity, never so largely enjoyed the sympathy and support of the Church, never received such splendid contributions, and never poured

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out such a continuous stream of Scriptures as during the past year. Liberality has risen to the great demands of the occasion, and American Christians are animated with the resolve that, whatever else may suffer by reason of the fearful calamity which has rayaged the land, the Bible cause shall never be crippled or impaired. The whole number of books issued from March 31, 1863, to March 31, 1864, was 1,425,146. The number of volumes distributed in foreign countries, so far as reported, was 75,418, making the total amount 1,500,564 volumes. The Committee received an urgent application for a grant of Scriptures, in English and other languages, from the American and Foreign Bible Society, an organization supported chiefly by members of the Baptist Church. To this appeal the Committee readily responded, and Scriptures to the amount of 21,500 copies were forwarded as a free grant.

BRITISH NORTH AMERICA.—The Report of last year announced the appointment of the Rev. H. Gill as visitor of the Auxiliaries in British North America. Mr. Gill has now accomplished the proposed visitation. Upper and Lower Canada, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, have had the advantage of his labours. Large and enthusiastic meetings have listened with intense interest to his advocacy of the Society, and the exposition of its world-wide work. From all sections of the Christian Church he has experienced the most cheering sympathy and co-operation, and the Committee confidently expect that the purposes of the visitation will be fully answered, and a new impulse given to the Society in these vast and important dependencies of the British Empire.

TORONTO.—The Upper Canada Auxiliary can announce a total circulation for the year of 26,593 copies, being 1,000 in excess of the previous year. The receipts have reached the noble sum of 4,400*l*. And while 1,000*l* has been remitted for the purchase of books, your Committee have received 680*l*. 10*s*. 11*d*. as a Free Contribution in aid of the Society's general objects.

OTTAWA.—There is an increase of circulation reported for the past year, 1100 Bibles and Testaments having been disseminated.

MONTREAL.—The circulation of Scriptures has attained a higher maximium than ever reached in past operations. The total issues of the past year comprised 7,001 Bibles, 8,172 Testaments, and 666 Portions, or together, 15,839 copies. There are now one hundred and eighty-four Branch Societies affiliated with the Montreal Auxiliary.

QUEEEC.—The Quebec Auxiliary is environed by Popish agencies and Popish influences, and has to pursue its operations amongst those who view them with suspicion and distrust; yet it steadily and patiently perseveres, and, while unable to make a display of striking figures, can point to labour that is not vain in the Lord. The past year shows a circulation under a thousand copies, but somewhat in excess of the previous year.

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NEWFOUNDLAND.—ST. JOIN'S.—Intelligence has been received from this colony respecting the operations of your Auxiliary during the two last years. There is no decrease in the demand for the Scriptures, and there is the same disposition as ever to co-operate with the Parent Society by liberal gifts, though the ability to contribute is in many cases, diminished by the unpropitious state of trade in the colony.

Domestre.—In touching upon various topics connected with the home oper ations of the Society, the Committee preface their remarks by a reference to departed friends, once fellow-labourers under the banner of Truth, but now called from the conflict and service of time to the repose and honours of a brighter world. Death has removed one of your Vice-Presidents, the Earl of Carlisle, K.G., who was for many years a zealous and warmly attached friend of the Society. It devolves upon your Committee to record another death, that of the Rev. G. J. Collinson, Incumbent of St. James', Clapham, and Honorary Life Governor of the Society. This sad and unexpected event has filled them with the deepest regret, and has deprived the Society of one of its most earnest and efficient advocates. Death, too, your Committee grieve to add, has entered the official staff of the Society, and called to his rest the Rev. J. D. Miller, one of your District Secretaries. The Committee have the satisfaction of stating that they have appointed George Hall, Eaq., of Quarndon, Derby, as successor to the late Rev. Mr. Miller, and they have every reason to believe that the Society has secured a well-qualified and efficient officer in the selection that has been made. The Committee have the pleasure of stating that the Lord Bishop of Peterborough has kindly acceded to a request, conveyed through the President, to become one of the Vice-Presidents of the Society.

FUNDS.—The RECEIPTS of the year, from ordinary sources, have amounted to 181,0732. 14s. 5d., being 12,1682. 10s. 5d. more than at any former period of the Society's history. But there must be added the following items on account of Special Funds:—China, 6042. 19s. 4d.; India, 1282. 19s.; New Bible House, 56462. 19s.; making a grand total of 187,4542. 11s. 9d. The sum applicable to the GENERAL PURPOSES of the Society is 102,6842. 2s. 9d. The RECEIPTS on the SALE of SCRIPTURES have been 78,3892. 11s. 8d. The TOWAL EXPENDITURE of the year, inclusive of 59222. 3s. on account of Special Funds, has reached the sum of 169,7422. 13s. 10d., being an increase of payments, as compared with the previous year, of 18,3862. 19s. 11d.

Issues.—The issues from the Home and Foreign Depôts have reached a total of 2,450,127 copes, including Portions. The total issues of the Society now amount to Forty-seven MILLIONS, NINE HUNDRED AND EIGHTY-NINE THOUSAND, FIVE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-NINE COPIES.

NEW BIBLE HOUSE.—It was announced in the last Report, that contemplated changes in the locality of Earl Street, Blackfriars, would involve the removal of the premises so long held by the Society, and cast upon your Committee the responsibility of taking the necessary steps for a new erection. The Committee, after various inquiries, were very much brought to the conclusion, that the line of the new street, leading from the Thames Embankment to the Mansion House, offered the only probability of securing a freehold site eligible in itself by its central position, and in all respects adapted to the wants of the Society. They have, therefore, acted upon this conviction, and after lengthened negotiations with the Metropolitan Board of Works, have entered into an agreement for the purchase of a plot of ground in a commanding situation, and but a short distance from the spot where the Bible Society has had its home for nearly half a century. With the most prudent and economical expenditure, it is estimated, that after the claim for compensation on behalf of the present premises is settled, a balance of 30,000% will remain to be provided by the contributions of the friends of the Society. The sum of 11,607% 2s. 9d. has already been promised with scarcely any help from the Auxiliaries throughout the country. A moderate contribution from each of the affiliated Societies would at once supply what is deficient, without imposing a heavy burden upon those who so generously sustain the operations of the Society by their stated and liberal subscriptions.

BIBLE WOMEN.—Your Committee feel that they make a very legitimate application of your funds by giving the support of the Society to that Agency now familiarly known by the designation of "The Missing Link" the Agency which penetrates the worst localities in this great Metropolis, for the purpose of bearing the message of Divine love to the dreary and desolate homes of those who are struggling with the huge difficulties of life, and have few to pity or to help. It may be truthfully affirmed that the Bible has been placed in thousands of families, for the first time, by means of this Agency; and it was a source of gratification to your Committee that, last year, 7844 copies of the Scriptures were drawn from the Auxiliary Depôts to supply the demands of humble subscribers through the agency of the Bible Women, two hundred of whom are now labouring in the very worst distric's of this crowded and overgrown Metropolis.

Scotland.—The supply of Scotland with the Scriptures almost wholly rests with the National Bible Society, which is growing in organization and resources from year to year. Its circulation in 1864 is thus enumerated :— Bibles and Testaments, 162,716; Portions, 74,538. These numbers include copies diffused by the agency of the Society in France, Italy, Germany, and China.

IRELAND.—The Hibernian Bible Society performs a good work in Ireland, and continues its operations with the same zeal and energy as heretofore. The Report just issued announces a circulation in the past year of 72,872 copies, making the total issues, since the formation of the Society, 3,237,664. A generous Contribution of 5002 has been received, whereby the Hibernian Bible Society not only expresses its sympathy in relation to your work, but its readiness to take some share in its pecuniary responsibility. The Sunday-School Society for Ireland has applied for and received a grant of 10,750 Bibles and 12,000 Testaments.

Conclusion.—While it is your privilege to review a glorious past, and to erect another "Ebenezer" to the God of the Bible, it must be distinctly borne in mind that we pause to contemplate an unfinished work. The complacent and graceful survey of what has been done must not make us insensible as to what remains to be accomplished. This is no season for indolent musing or selfish apathy. The adversary, whose name is Legion, is up and doing. To countless millions of the human race the Bible is yet a Book absolutely unknown. Over how large a portion of the world do Paganism, Mohammedanism, Papal superstition and infidelity, spread the pall of spiritual death! And what an insignificant result has been achieved in supplying mankind with the Scriptures, compared with what is to be attempted, yea, APPENDIX,

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what must be attempted, before the world shall be covered with the knowledge of the Lord, and every knee shall bow to the sceptre of our adorable Redeemer ! Let this, then, be the season for renewing our zeal in the service of God, and especially in that particular department of Christian work assigned to the British and Foreign Bible Society. The principles which led to the formation of this Society are still recognised, and felt to be of paramount importance and obligation; the Bible, God's Word of infallible inspiration; the Bible, the unquestioned heritage of man; the duty of those who possess it to impart it, in all languages, to those who are destitute. The efforts which are so insidiously made to stain the celestial lustre of the Bible. to weaken the voice of its Divine authority, and to undermine faith in its saving Truth, should lead God's people to redouble their exertions to disperse it the more widely, convinced that the Bible, thoughtfully, candidly, and prayerfully examined, supplies the best answer to all objectors. It is not an easy conquest, peradventure, that lies before us, for many foes are still marshalled, and watching to resist the onward and majestic march of Truth : but let us rejoice that it is nevertheless, a certain conquest, for the Power, Purpose, and Promise of the immutable God are on our side. Let us gird ourselves afresh for duty; let us seek a renewed baptism of the Holy Ghost ; let us, with invigorated faith and undying zeal, go forth in our great. enterprise, hoping and labouring for that predicted millennium, when "they shall not teach every man his neighbour, and every man his brother, saying, Know the Lord, for all shall know me, from the least to the greatest, saith the Lord,"

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
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
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
