

From July 1st to July 12th, 1884.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT, 1884.

The Sabbath School work of the Church in all its branches is every year increasing in importance. Every year, too, the estimate in which the Church holds this department is becoming higher, and the attention paid to it more earnest and painstaking and devout.

More and more, it is being felt, that upon obedience, full and comprehensive obedience, to the Saviour's direction, "Feed my Lambs," depends not merely the advancement, but the very maintenance of positive Christianity. The child is father to the man, his early years give opportunities which the years of maturity, if reached, cannot afford, and the very fact of his being a child and having prospectively a term of many years before him, gives earnest of symmetrical and perfect life if only the great mainspring of Christian motive be set in motion in these earlier years.

In our own church this work is receiving a large amount of attention. We are not behind in what has been not inappropriately called, "The struggle for the child." By the publication of excellent children's papers, "Pleasant Hours," at "Home and School," have been provided to give "Sunbeams" of real and pure pleasure and instruction to our boys and girls. Indeed, we may call ourselves a "Banner" Church in this particular. And that is not all. The most careful and prescient legislation has been enacted to provide for all our schools such methods of government, and such a spirit of teaching, as shall tend to the great object of the work of the Sabbath School—the bringing of the children to Jesus.

In this country amid many difficulties, our Sabbath School work is developing rapidly.

The past year has been a good one and 526 conversions have been reported among our Scholars.

We now report 196 Schools, 937 Officers and Teachers, 8,309 Scholars, 1,065 members, 4,644 Libraries.

We present this report with deep feelings of gratitude for the spiritual success of the year. We rejoice at the conversions which have been tabulated. We pray that the effects may abide and intensify. Looking back and looking forward, we thank God and take courage.

PASTORAL ADDRESS.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE METHODIST CHURCH WITHIN THE BOUNDS OF THE NEWFOUNDLAND CONFERENCE.

Dearlly Beloved Brethren,—

Assembled in our Annual Conference, enjoying the privilege of association with each other, after the toils, privations and triumphs of another year, and favored with the presence of the Triune Jehovah; we naturally think of you, among whom we labor, and for whose souls we care, and devoutly pray that grace, mercy and peace from God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit may be yours.

The year has been a memorable one. While in labors more abundant, we rejoice they have not been in vain. The Kingdom of the Lord Jesus has been extending. On not a few circuits a blessed work of grace has been experienced, and many souls have been converted to God.

Eleven young men who have labored during the year with much success are now received on probation as candidates for the ministry.

Several churches and parsonages have been begun, and others, during the year have been completed. Successful efforts have been put forth by a few circuits for the better support of their ministers, and liberal things generally have been devised to aid in carrying on the expanding work of our Missionary Society.

Beloved Brethren, while you are striving to advance the material interests of the Church, permit us to remind you that without supreme devotion to God, your best efforts will be in vain. Lav all upon the altar. Clothed with the power which entire consecration brings, the early Christians went forth strong in the Lord and in the power of His might. They were mighty to the pulling down of the strongholds of Satan. Follow them as they followed Christ. "Be ye holy." Herein lies the secret of your success. Nothing can resist the power of a holy life. "May the God of peace sanctify you wholly."

"Let the word of God dwell in you richly," "Search the scriptures." Drink deeply from the fountain of eternal truth. Beware of the polluted stream of human opinion. Test man's theories by God's truth, "To the law and to the testimony." Attend regularly, seriously and prayerfully to the preached word. Pray before you hear, and after you have heard. Let the word preached be mixed with faith, that it may be profitable.

Prize the class-meeting. Resist any attempt at its disparagement. An element of the Church's strength in the past, it will add to her vitality in the future. Here, those who fear the Lord speak often one to another. "They shall speak of the Glory of thy Kingdom, and talk of thy power."

Let the prayer meeting go hand in hand with the class-meeting. In the later you will enjoy the fellowship of the saints, in the former you will hold communion with God. Let your private devotions prepare you for the active duties of life; and let the church militant be to you the anti-chamber of the church triumphant. Relying upon the promises, "By prayer and supplication with thanksgiving, let your requests be made known unto God."

Let Christ have a place in your family, and in the House of God, dedicate your children to God in baptism. Let the laws of Christianity rule the realm of home. Let the hallowed influences of religion pervade its atmosphere. Establish and maintain the family altar. Keep the fire always burning. Let the morning and evening sacrifice of prayer and praise be regularly offered. Make your homes the house of God, and forget not the assembling of yourselves together. The members, of a godly family may die, but their influence lives; "They rest from their labors and their works follow them." Keep the Lord's Day in the family. Make it the brightest and best of the seven. Banish gloom and asceticism; dismiss worldliness

frivolity and unnecessary work. Let it commemorate your risen Lord. Call the Sabbath a delight, a time of refreshing from the presence of the Lord.

"In holy *duties*, let the day,
In holy *pleasures*, pass away,"

The foundation of education is laid in the home. The nursery is the primary department. As the twig is bent the tree is inclined. Graduating from a good home, the children may retain their honors through life. Let sound principles be early implanted. Feed them with the sincere milk of the word that they may grow thereby. Travelling through life's dark wilderness, they will need trust-worthy guides. In the catechisms of our Church, you have at once the truth, simple and adapted to their capacity. Early engrave it upon the memory, impress it upon the heart and conscience; and hold up before them God's Holy Word as their only infallible and efficient counsellor and guide. "And thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up." Seek to foster in them a Missionary spirit. Set before them the ennobling and self-sacrificing example of the Missionaries of the cross. Especially make them acquainted with the heroic deeds of the pioneer Missionaries of the Methodist Church. The early history of that Church should be as familiar as household words. By placing before them what is good and ennobling, both secular and religious, leave no room for impure, immoral and exciting literature. Encourage them to read the biographies of eminent servants of God; let the thrilling adventures of Missionary heroes, the patient sufferings of eminent saints; the devotion of a great multitude in many lands, satisfy their love of the marvellous, and stimulate them to deeds of noble daring for God and man.

Consider your special vocation as the representatives of your Master. "Ye are my witnesses." No man liveth unto himself. "Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works, and glorify your Father which is in Heaven." Beware of sin, which in its multifarious forms will continually assail you. Sin is dangerous. Sin is poisonous. Sin is deadly. Dwell near the cross, and let the blood be your protection. Drink in of the spirit of your Master. "As much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men." "Blessed are the peacemakers." "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and clamour, and evil speaking be put away from you."

We hail with joy the progress of Temperance in our land; and with gratitude to God, recognize the cheering fact that several towns and settlements, availing themselves of the provisions of either the Local Option or Permissive Acts have, within the bounds of their respective places, prohibited the sale of intoxicating liquors. But the sin of drunkenness is still found in our midst. As men, lift up your voice against this common foe of humanity; as Methodists, "Touch not, taste not, handle not;" and as Christians, exert yourselves to save precious souls from a drunkard's grave and a drunkard's hell. Methodism is the deadly foe to intemperance. Let this war be more vigorously prosecuted until the great enemy shall be subdued, and over this land shall wave the banner of temperance.

The question of Sabbath observance is still one of absorbing interest, and demands your active co-operation. Your physical, temporal and eternal well-being is bound up in keeping the Sabbath. Guard well, then, the sanctity of the Lord's Day.

With the cause of God you stand identified. Let the welfare of the Church be the object of your constant solicitude. With the Methodist Church, particularly, you are closely identified. Having been converted through its instrumentality, and nourished under its ministry, its doctrines, and its methods, it becomes specially dear to you. Let your object and aim be to maintain its efficiency and power as an agency for saving souls, for building up believers in their most holy faith, and for the

advancement of the Redeemer's kingdom. Be faithful to God, and be faithful to His servants who labor in the word and doctrine. Strive to increase your gifts for the maintenance of the ministry. Give liberally, cheerfully, and as God prospers you. In no other branch of the Christian Church is the gospel preached with more simplicity and power. The past has witnessed its glorious triumph, the present finds its efficiency unimpaired. In twenty-nine circuits during the year, over sixteen hundred persons have professed to realize the saving power of the gospel of the grace of God. Methodism is still potent for good. The best of all is God is with us.

It is with devout gratitude to the great Head of the Church, that we recognize the consummation of the union of several branches of the great Methodist family in British America. Though hitherto in this land, happily enjoying the blessings of a united church, dwelling under one branch of the Methodist vine, we feel the reflex influence of union. Forming now one united church, extending from the Atlantic to the Pacific, immense responsibilities rest upon us. Hundreds of thousands are looking to us for the bread of life. If we are true to ourselves and to God, the past with its record of success, unequalled since the days of the apostles, will be repeated. Your privileges as members of this great brotherhood and your opportunities of working for Christ are unsurpassed. Let your privileges be appreciated and your opportunities improved. Guard well the precious inheritance we have received from our fathers. The prosperity of the church is largely in your hands. Be faithful to the solemn trust committed to you. Let no obstacle hinder you, no difficulty discourage you. Relying upon a covenant keeping God; in assurance of the presence and help and approbation of the great Head of the Church; let us go forward, and claim the land for Christ.

Finally, brethren, farewell. Be perfect, be of good comfort, be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of Love and peace shall be with you.
